HITLER TO BLAME FOR RUSSIA

CISCO POSTOFFICE EMPLOYEES STAGED REAL BLACKOUT AS PER WASHINGTON, D. C., ORDERS

Cisco's first blackout was conducted Tuesday night, when the entire postoffice building was in complete darkness, with only the moonlight to illuminate the locality.

This was a practice blackout, of course, following instructions from the postoffice department at Washington, Postmaster Luther McCrea explained, to familiarize employees with the proper method of concealing government property in case of enemy air raids.

So far as known this was the

first blackout for Eastland county.

PRICE CONTROL BILL SIGNED; IT IS WEAK

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—President Roosevelt today signed the emergency price control bill, but warned that this law does not mean the battle against inflation has been won.

He criticized provisions of the measure which permit agricultural prices to rise to 110 percent of parity.

U. S. ENVOYS GOT HOME BY THIN MARGIN

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 30.—Two dramatic narrow escapes punctuated the homeward flight of William G. Bullitt and George W. Earle, United States minister to Bulgaria, Earle revealed Friday.

Arriving at his suburban home here from a New York landing, the former Pennsylvania governor told how twice engines on the plane caught fire in midair.

The first time, flying across Africa in a four-motored army bomber, Earle related that he and Bullitt, President Roosevelt's personal representative, and other passengers were ordered to sit on the bomb racks, ready to bail out.

But the "last drop" of a fire extinguisher worked by the co-pilot who had climbed onto the wing to put out the fire.

They flew the South Atlantic, and coming up from South America, Earle said an engine again caught fire. An emergency landing was made on a Caribbean island, and they later were picked up by a Pan-American clipper which brought the party to New York.

TEAR GAS WAS USED TO STOP SOLDIER RIOT

FREDERICKSBURG, Va., Jan. 30.—A. G. Kendall, superintendent of city police, said tear gas was used Thursday night in dispersing a crowd of about 200 negro soldiers who sought to prevent the removal of police of one of their number from a negro hotel here.

No one was injured in the melee and the soldiers were loaded into army trucks and returned to the A. P. Hill Military Reservation, near here, the superintendent added.

OPENING AND CLOSING HOURS BE CHANGED

The daylight saving order of the federal government will go into effect Monday, February 9, at which time all clocks will be moved forward one hour.

Because of this change it will be necessary for merchants to rearrange their opening and closing hours, said P. R. Warwick of the chamber of commerce this morning.

For that reason a meeting of Cisco merchants and business men has been called for next Monday night, 7:30 o'clock, at the chamber of commerce, Warwick announced.

5 LONG RANGE NAZI BOMBERS BROUGHT DOWN

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Five of the new German Dornier 217 bombers publicized as being able to carry bombs to the United States have been destroyed thus far in night raids over Britain, the air ministry said Friday.

At least one was known to have been brought down late last year, it was stated, and the record this year also includes a number known to have been badly damaged.

"If its designers had hoped the speed of the new bomber would enable it to outfly our night fighters," the air ministry news service said, "they have been disappointed for Beaufighters have done particularly well against it."

SATURDAY IS LAST CHANCE PAY POLL TAX

A. A. Edmondson, deputy county tax collector, who has been stationed at city hall, here, since Wednesday as an accommodation to those who wish to pay poll tax, announced this morning that 150 have called and obtained the necessary credentials for voting in the 1942 elections.

Mr. Edmondson will be at the city hall until about 5:30 Saturday afternoon, which is the deadline for issuing poll tax receipts. The office at Eastland will probably remain open until later Saturday night, as further aid to those who always insist on waiting until the last minute.

Written exemptions are not necessary for those over 60 years of age, the collector stated. An affidavit at the voting booth on election day will suffice.

20 AGENTS OF ALCOHOL UNIT ARE INDICTED

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Claiming a loss of \$5,000,000 in taxes, the government has indicted 20 agents of the United States Alcohol Control unit as bribe-takers in allegedly permitting the diversion of huge quantities of denatured alcohol from its intended use as hair tonic and cosmetics ingredients to illegal making of liquor.

The indictment returned by a federal grand jury in Brooklyn Thursday charged that the conspiracy to defraud the government of alcohol taxes began with the advent of repeal and continued until recently.

Of the agents named, 15 pleaded innocent when arraigned and were released in \$2,000 bail each for trial March 4. The remaining five are to report in federal court next week. United States Attorney Harold M. Kennedy said all but three defendants were still in the service when the formal charges were returned.

FD OKS BUT PROMISES REVENGE WITH SPRING-TIME

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The senate appropriations sub-committee approved unanimously a 26 1-2 billion dollar naval appropriation bill—largest in any nation's history—carrying nearly six billion dollars to be spent in the next 18 months for building the greatest fleet and air arm in the world.

Earlier in the day, Mr. Roosevelt signed a bill appropriating 12 1-2 billion dollars for construction of 33,000 more army planes and equipping them.

TEXAS TWISTER KILLS SEVEN; HURT OTHERS

DALLAS, Jan. 30.—Seven negro tenants on a farm near Ennis were killed today when a tornado demolished their dwellings. Six were children; the other a woman. At Longview the twister dipped down north of that city and destroyed a farm house, injuring three white people, one seriously.

STEEL MEN'S WAGES AHEAD LIVING COSTS

NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—At a press conference Thursday, Eugene G. Grace, president of Bethlehem Steel Corporation, made public a study showing workers' earnings in the company have been rising faster than the cost of living.

Bethlehem's total payroll in the final quarter of 1941 was \$112,390,452, an increase of 81.8 percent over the \$61,821,119 for the final quarter of 1940, the study said.

Average hourly earnings in the fourth 1941 quarter were \$1.13, compared with 96.9 cents a year earlier. Average weekly earnings were \$45.85 compared with \$37.03.

In contrast, Grace said, the cost of living, as measured by the national industrial conference board index, rose only 8 percent between the fourth 1940 and 1941 quarters. Bethlehem's employees totaled 188,576 in the fourth quarter, compared with 128,417 in the same period of 1940, and Grace hinted they would number over 200,000 in the near future.

ALIENS MUST WORK.

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts), Jan. 30.—An official announcement Friday said 2,140,000 alien men and women had been put to work in Germany in addition to 1,500,000 "prisoners of war." The announcement said 960,000 were working on farms, 50,000 as waiters and domestic servants, and the rest in commercial, industrial and transportation jobs.

PLANES OVER IRELAND.

A NORTHER IRELAND TOWN, Jan. 30.—Anti-aircraft defense batteries opened fire Friday when enemy planes appeared over northeastern Ulster.

Japan's armies met strong Allied resistance almost within artillery range of Singapore Island and in the Philippines today, but A. Hitler acknowledged in a Berlin speech that he no longer knew when the war would terminate.

Hitler's speech on the ninth anniversary of Nazi rise to power contrasted sharply to previous anniversary declarations. He accepted full responsibility for defeats in Russia, but indicated Japan's attack on the United States had released a U-boat fleet to strike against American vessels.

Much of his speech was devoted to personal attacks on President Roosevelt and Premier Churchill, but he promised that when spring comes again the German air fleet and armies would recapture much more than has been lost in Russian winter fighting.

Dispatches from the Russian fighting front provided the background for Hitler's speech by reporting the Red Army, driving forward in the Ukraine, had taken Lozovaya—less than 70 miles from the big bend of the Dnieper river—and was threatening to cut the Axis communication lines to the Azov sea front and Crimea.

In Libya the Germans held Henkhazt and a line 16 miles to the east—possibly cutting off some British forces in that city.

In the Philippines, American and Filipino forces under General MacArthur are preparing for new onslaughts by the reinforced Japanese.

In Malaya the Japanese have hammered to within 18 miles of Singapore.

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A GREAT MEXICAN.

We who live above the Rio Grande river have always been inclined to underestimate the Mexicans. There, as in other Latin American countries, is much poverty and ignorance but also culture and character. These qualities showed to advantage in a speech made at Rio de Janeiro. It was a Mexican who made the biggest hit. When Ezequiel Padilla, handsome and cultured foreign minister, rose and faced that international audience, the delegates took notice. Speaking quietly, he said:

"The men who have fallen in Wake and the Philippines have not fallen only to defend the honor and sovereignty of the United States; they have also fallen to defend the human liberties and the common destiny of America." He spoke then of "The free American, the man in whose face shines the dignity of being one," and the audience leaned forward, eagerly drinking in his eloquent words. He pleaded not for anything material or merely Mexican. He spoke "not only of economy, but at the same time of an American moral entity, so that we shall be able to prove that we are not only interested in the construction of shipyards and airplanes, but also in the progress and development of the free man of America."

As he finished, says Time magazine, "the applause broke out like the first clean crack of thunder very near, and it went on and on, while this Man of America stood by his seat in his coffee-colored linen suit and bowed his thanks and his hope. It was the vision that Ezekiel Padilla projected which might be Rio's triumph."

If you want to criticize the government—local or state—pay your poll tax before Saturday night and do it with a ballot. Otherwise, you should keep reasonably quiet.

MULES WANTED.

Anybody who thinks the mule is becoming extinct has not seen the one-mule southern farms and has not consulted the army. For either environment this patient beast is invaluable.

A doubter would find 4,500,000 mules in this country today, if he looked long enough. And the U. S. Army, reduced to a mere pittance of 7,000 mules, is reported as wanting 15,000 more of them. There is talk of a mule boom.

This patient beast has his faults, but also his points. For some purposes the army cannot get along without him. Nothing on wheels will serve so many purposes so patiently and adequately. He may lack beauty and speed, but he shines in extreme heat or cold, in mountain or desert, wherever speed or intelligence is no object, but strength and patient endurance are required.

And let no horse be "snooty" about this distant and ungainly relative. A horse, for the same purpose, brings less than a mule in the market.

Happy thought: What some of us have been calling mule will probably not survive the war.

Speaking in general, we Americans have worked such few hours for so many years that we should be rested up enough now to do a real day's work.

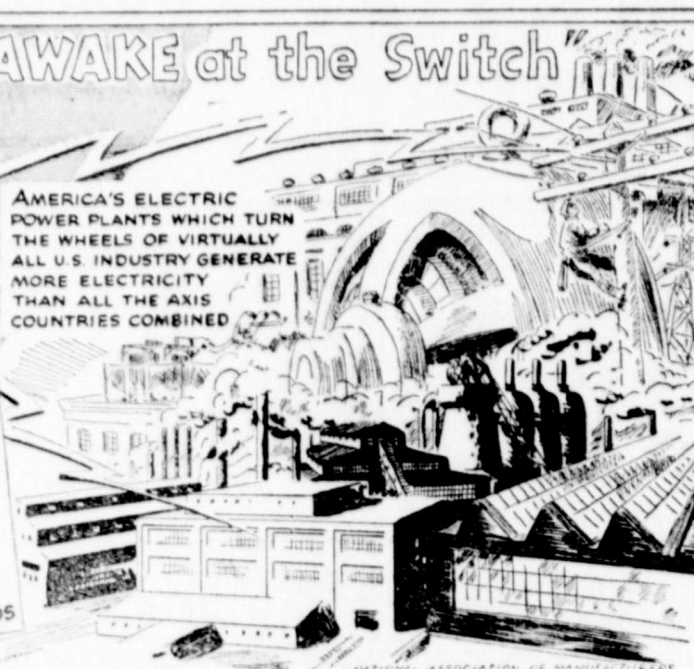

INVALIDS CLUB WORKS TOWARD SELF-SUPPORT

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 30.—More than 2,400 physically handicapped persons throughout the nation now look toward this city for guidance in their efforts to become self-supporting and useful members of society.

It is the headquarters for one of the most unique organizations in the world, Wheelchair Club, Inc., a non-profit corporation. Purpose of the club, as set forth in its articles of incorporation, is to provide employment and opportunities for employment for the physically handicapped who can and want to work, to aid the families of crippled children, and to provide a long-range program of compensation for the hopelessly crippled.

Organized in April, 1940, under the leadership of C. B. Darrell, a successful automotive engineer and publicist, although severely crippled by arthritis, the club already has completed plans to open an automobile polish manufacturing plant here in which some 50 physically handicapped persons will find employment.

Hoist Lifts Him in Car. Vice president of the club is Len Sellner, who is paralyzed from his lungs down, yet has driven his specially constructed automobile thousands of miles without an accident.

Sellner is the inventor of the tennis ball button and employs 150 physically handicapped persons in his manufacturing plant. He has bought his own home, put his sister through business college and supports his mother.

Sellner claims to have installed one of the first steering wheel gear-shifts in his automobile.

HOBSON CALLED TURN ON JAPAN 35 YEARS AGO

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 30.—"Japan has gone further toward making plans for war than any white nation has ever gone. She teaches 'hate the foreigner' and 'prepare for war.' In her preparation for war, she is locating on our Pacific coast and is filling Hawaii with soldiers."

These might have been the words of a patriot last year, a few days before Pearl Harbor and Wake and Guam. But they were not. They were spoken in Memphis on the night of Oct. 14, 1907.

The speaker was Capt. Richmond Pearson Hobson, naval hero of the Spanish-American war and later Congressman from Alabama.

Hobson, the man who blew up the collier Merrimac to blockade Cervera's fleet in Santiago harbor, told his Memphis audience that "one of the strongest reasons for enlarging the navy is the fact that this country is threatened by Japan."

"Japan has had the war habit for more than 800 years; it is with her a question of heredity," he said.

Hobson called for a "two-ocean navy." He said the Japanese were enlarging their navy "for no other purpose than to grapple with the white race for supremacy of the world."

Attacked by Press.

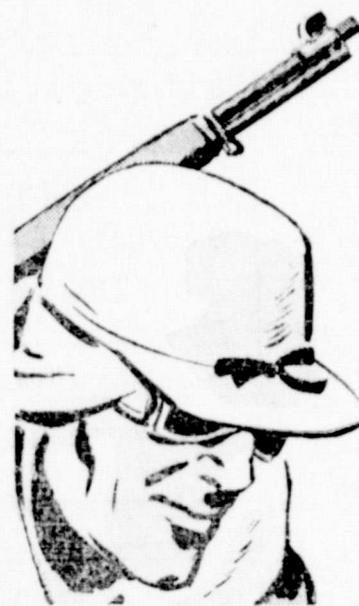
Hobson urged spending \$50,000,000 a year to enlarge the navy, saying that the United States should start with \$100,000,000 the first year.

His figures may not seem excessive now, but they were enough to shock the public of 1907.

Hobson was branded as a "public nuisance" by the press. Memphis newspapers reported the audience "listened with great interest, and some of Capt. Hobson's words were heartily applauded."

But in less than a year—July 16, 1908—the Independent, a weekly magazine, printed the following under the heading "A Public Nuisance":

"We refer—we more than refer, we point to, we inculcate and arrange Richmond Pearson Hobson as a public nuisance, who fails to be a menace to public peace solely because the sensible American public, startled at first by his positive assurance of what he 'knows,' will not take him seriously. . . . He is a public nuisance and a national disgrace. . . . ridiculous as the belief of martial heroes."

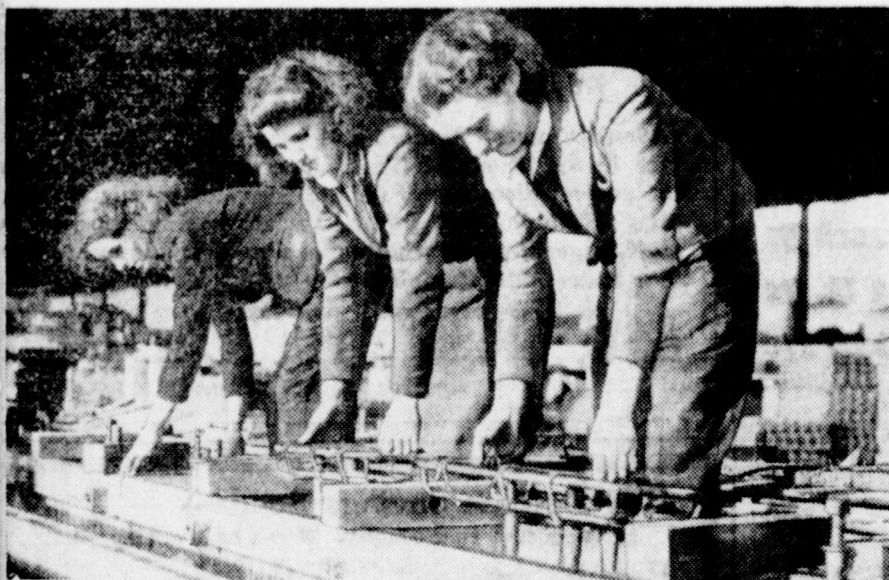

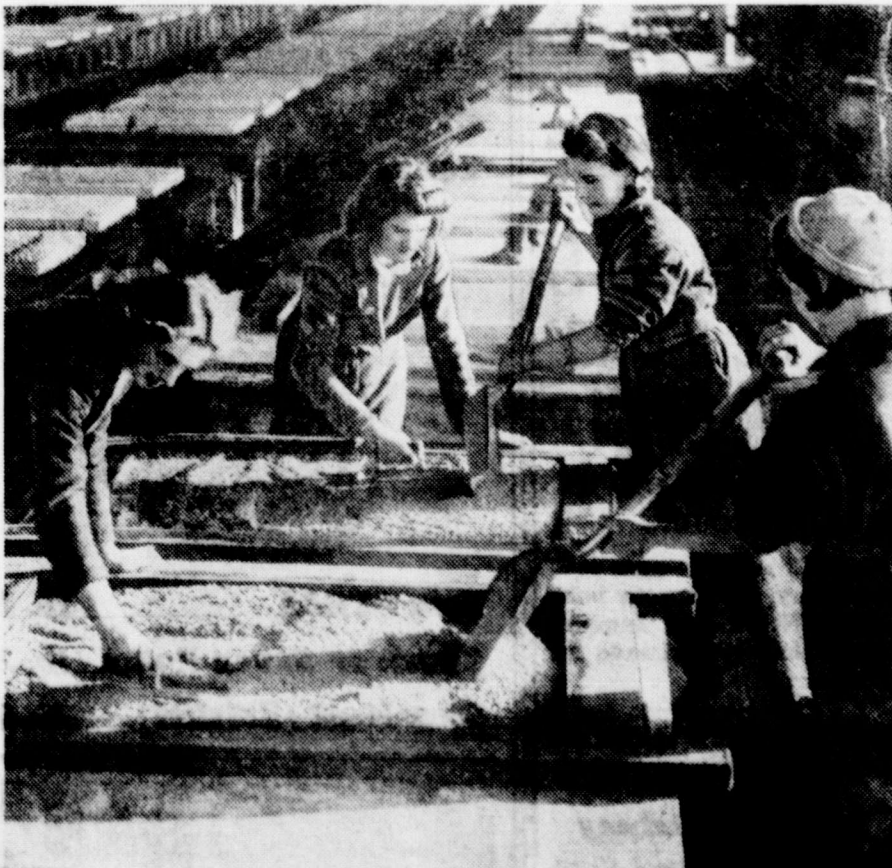

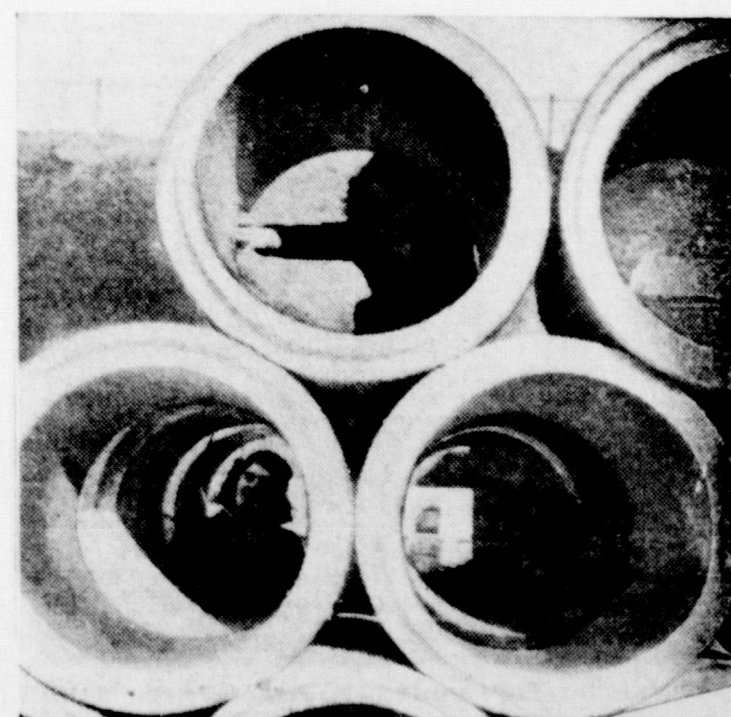

STATE'S OIL RESERVES UP AT END YEAR

AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—Discoveries of 117 new pools and 132 new producing horizons in old areas in Texas during 1941 added 1,007,750,000 barrels of oil to the state's known reserves, Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson estimated Friday.

He said the state's known reserves amounted to 11,123,875,000 barrels, equal to 57 percent of the nation's reserves.

The commission recently issued an order under which the allowances of so-called "wildcat" wells was greatly augmented in order to encourage exploration.

PRIVATE SOURCE OFFERS TO MATCH \$500,000 VOTED BY THE STATE FOR CANCER CENTER

AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—Unless the board of regents of the University of Texas puts into operation the \$500,000 cancer research center and hospital voted by the 47th legislature, they stand to lose not only that appropriation, but in addition a matching donation by private sources.

The state cancer committee of the Texas Medical association, meeting in San Antonio Wednesday, passed a resolution recommending that Dr. John W. Spies be put in charge so that he could place orders for technical equipment immediately and make certain that the private donation be assured; that a site be secured and equipment ordered so that the cancer hospital may be put in operation, to help save the hundred people a week who die of this disease in Texas.

Representative Arthur Cato of Weatherford, author of the cancer hospital bill, gave the details here Thursday and announced that a private source had offered to match the state appropriation.

Bill Bought Million.
Cato originally offered his bill to the Texas legislature for a one million-dollar appropriation for the cancer hospital. The state senate cut the bill to a half million dollars.

"This offer of a half million dollars to supplement the state appropriation makes my dream come true," Cato said.

The hard work put in by the women's field army, the state cancer committee of the State Medical association, Dr. Spies, federated women's clubs, and members of the 47th legislature, has been justified.

Dr. James M. Martin of Dallas, chairman of the cancer committee of the Texas State Medical association, said that he would like to see Dr. Spies of Galveston, dean of the State Medical college, placed at the head of the new cancer hospital and research center, so that he could place orders for the technical equipment immediately, as a head of the new hospital alone can sign the requisitions.

CATTLE MARKET

All classes of cattle and calves found a steady market at Ft. Worth Friday. Hogs were steady to 15c higher than on Thursday at a top of \$11.75 paid by all interests. Fat lambs and aged sheep were steady with others scarce.

Bulk of the steers and yearlings was made up of medium to good kinds selling at \$9 to \$11 with one truck load of steers at \$10.25 and another at \$11. A few small lots of choice yearlings sold up to \$11.50. Common butcher yearlings cashed at \$7 to \$8.

Good beef cows brought \$8 to \$8.50; butcher cows \$7 to \$7.75; and canners and cutters \$4.50 to

\$6.75. Bull prices ranged from \$7 to \$8.75.

Good to choice fat calves ranged from \$10 to \$11.50 with a few veals up to \$12. Common to medium butcher calves brought \$7.75 to \$9.50 and culls cleared at \$6.50 to \$7.50.

Stockers were scarce. Quotable prices were: \$12.50 down on steed calves; \$11 down on feeder yearlings, and \$8.50 down on stocker cows.

Good to choice 180 to 200-pound butcher hogs cashed at \$11.60 to \$11.75 and good 160 to 175-pound averages at \$11 to \$11.55. Packing sows were steady at \$10 to \$10.50 and stocker pigs unchanged at \$8 to \$9.

In the sheep yards most good fat lambs sold at \$11.50; short aged wethers at \$6; and common and medium woolled ewes at \$5.

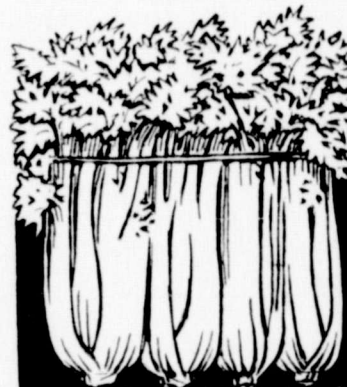
