Federalized Troops Fire Over Rioters

OXFORD, Miss. (AP)—Federalized Mississippi troops fired over the heads of an angry mob in the streets of Oxford today as a pitched battle broke out over integration of the University of Mississippi.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy announced the arrest today of former Army Maj. Gen. Edwin Walker on charges of inciting a rebellion or insurrection.

China Celebration Snubbed By Soviet

TOKYO (AP)—The Soviet Union snubbed Red China's massive 18th anniversary celebration today, underlining the continuing rift between the giants of communism.

More than 500,000 persons marched through the Square of Heavenly Peace in Peiping, but not a single Soviet official of importance sat in the reviewing stand with Chinese leader Mao Tse-tung.

The encounter was about half a block off the town square which had been sealed off earlier. The soldiers bolted from their trucks on orders shouted by their officers and sprinted toward the firing. The battle-hardened troops pushed the crowd steadily down the street away from the square, firing in the air. No one was injured.

Dozens of rioters, mostly young boys with shirtings out, were being rounded up. At least 30 and possibly more were herded into the federal courthouse on the square. Prisoners were forced to place their hands over their heads and were marched at bayonet point to the courthouse.

The latest rioting came after former Maj. Gen. Edwin Walker had appeared in the square—clad in a dark blue suit and wearing a 10-gallon hat. He stayed in the square briefly, spoke quietly to some of those at the crowd nearest the trophy and then backed off as military eyes watched him closely.

The same youths, along with 100 others, earlier had been cleared from the square after cursing, screaming, and throwing rocks and bottles at passing military vehicles. They were driven from the square by MP's armed with tear gas, and bayonets fixed to rifles. Remnants of the crowd gathered about a half block away shortly before the firing broke out.

The time of economic recovery was sounded by Chen Yi today, but he added "we are still confronted with many difficulties. It would not be right to fail to see them."

Walker In Contrasting Role Today

Walker, who has since resigned from the Army, was in the midst of rioting at the University of Mississippi last night. This time trying to defend the state's position against the federal government.

Walker whipped up the students and others on the campus of the University of Mississippi Sunday night, when it became known that James H. Meredith, Negro, was on the campus.

Troops Take Over Oxford

OXFORD, Miss. (AP)—James H. Meredith, 29, a Negro enrolled in the University of Mississippi today under the bayoneted rifles of the federal government. Minutes later renewed violence began in downtown Oxford.

Mississippi National Guard troops—under federal control—by presidential order—fired over the heads of an angry mob in downtown Oxford in a pitched battle. The Tupelo, Miss., guardsmen drove away a mob from which the sound of firing sounded minutes before, using the threat of bayonets.

The new outbreak of disorder came after a lull in night-long rioting in which two persons—a newsman and an Oxford resident—were killed. Federal troops—numbering 4,000—look over the courthouse square in this scene from town of 5,253.

angry students gathered across the street. Meredith emerged smiling—his customary smile that seems to mask any nervousness he might feel. Immediately he got lost to his first class, returned to the scene of his registration and left thereafter in a caravan of Army vehicles.

Tangible evidence that the passions of the night hadn't blown away came from jeering, shouting students. The 11 hours of violence on the campus during the night officially ended at 6:15 a.m. when Brig. Gen. Charles Billingslee, commander of the federal troops in Mississippi, said: "I now declare this area secure."

Taft-Hartley Law Invoked In Longshoremen's Strike

NEW YORK (AP)—Longshoremen quit work on Atlantic and Gulf Coast ports today after their contract expired. Within 10 hours, President Kennedy invoked the Taft-Hartley Act in an attempt to end the work stoppage.

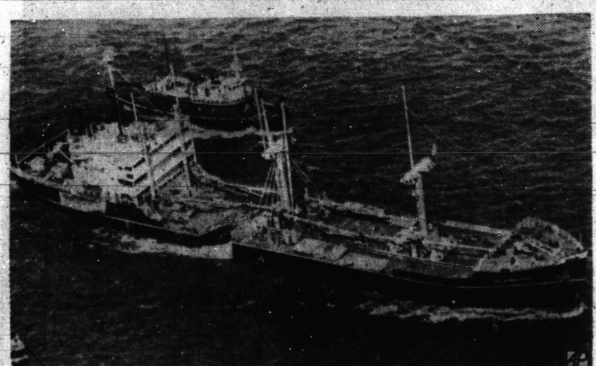
The presidential action, the first step in Taft-Hartley machinery, appeared to be the only immediate likelihood of bringing the unionized longshoremen back to docks from New England to Texas.

The 500 IILA members in Charleston, S.C., posted pickets promptly at the midnight deadline. At Philadelphia, where some 5,500 IILA members are affected, about 50 of them worked overtime Sunday to unload vessels.

Prospects for quick agreement on a new work contract seemed remote. The White House said Kennedy would create a board of inquiry to report to him by Thursday on the nature and scope of the work stoppage.

negotiations collapsed Saturday between the IILA and the New York Shipping Association, the employers' group here, after weeks of fruitless bargaining. In an effort to clear ship cargoes before the longshoremen's work stoppage, more than 10,000 of them labored at overtime wages Saturday and Sunday at 52 New York harbor piers.

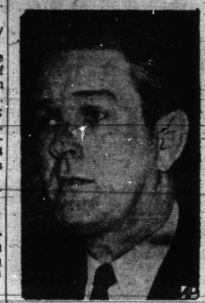

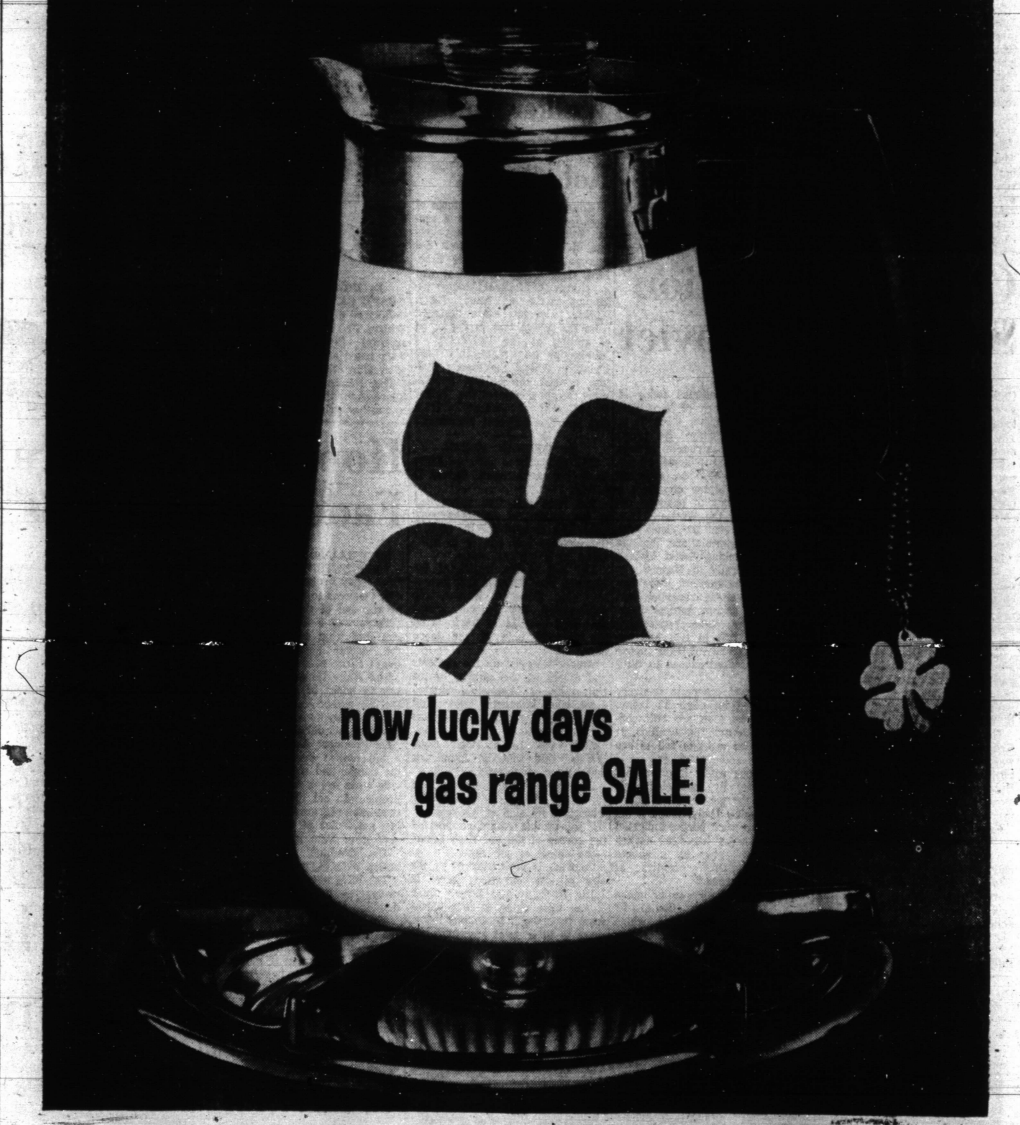

Adult Coloring Books Becoming Latest Fad

NEW YORK, (AP)—One of the hottest items in the publishing business these days is the coloring book for adults. They aren't expected to color it, however; just buy, look and laugh.

Presumably they have been looking and laughing because they certainly have been buying the books.

At prices ranging from \$1 to \$2.98, sales are nearing the million mark after only eight months.

The spree of coloring books—done in the style long popular with children—got off to a fast start late last December and it origin was about as much of a gag as anything else.

The authors were three Chicago advertising people, Martin A. Cohen, Dennis M. Altman and Marcie Hafs.

They put up \$300 each to bring out what was called "The Executive Coloring Book," to sell for \$2.98 a copy. It was designed as a spoof of advertising executives.

For instance, a drawing representing an executive carries this line below: "This is my suit. Color it gray or I will lose my job."

By Christmas, all 1,600 copies of the original printing were gone and there was a clamor for more. The authors turned over distribution to Pocket Books Inc. of New York.

The book now has sold about 200,000 copies and still is going strong.

A rash of similar books wasn't long in hitting the stands. There were coloring books for secretaries, corporations, V.I.P.s, investors, housewives and just about anybody you could name.

The second to make a resounding splash was called "The JFK Coloring Book." Its subject is President Kennedy and his administration, and sells for \$2.

The book is published by Kamin Inc. of New York. This is a corporation composed of Jackie Kannon, a professional comedian, and Alexander Roman, who runs a printing firm. Kannon estimates sales at nearly 300,000 since publication in May.

Parkinson Passes His Third Law

IN LAWS AND OUTLAWS. By C. Northrop Parkinson.

Parkinson has no peer when it comes to spoofing the whole business world, and that covers a lot of territory.

This is his third book on the secrets of getting ahead, and he makes a cheeky and cheek-tongued claim that any young desk slave can get to the top by following the precepts in this volume. There is more sense than nonsense in his claim.

He has some jolly good chapters on picking the right father-in-law; on the slick ways of pretending to be a character (the conformity pattern of the Organization Man is too obvious these days, it seems); and on learning the ways of double-dealing in corporation politics.

He lets you in on the slypery procedures of the business consultant, and you learn that the consultant often is a cat's paw.

He has a devastating chapter on the ways in which an annual statement can be rigged to present a good or bad picture, according to the machinations of the insiders. He classifies the kinds of committee chairmen and gives some penetrating pointers on paper work. And he promulgates Parkinson's Third Law: "Expansion means complexity and complexity, decay."

Professor Parkinson is wise, witty and wacky. The initiated and uninitiated alike will find a lot of sly common sense in his pages.

Moth-Eaten Leopard Is Not Likely To Change His Spots

The melancholy days arrived a trifle early this year. Their advent coincided with the visit of Sir Oswald Mosley, the abominable British Fascist, as a lecturer at the University of Buffalo.

In view of Mosley's record for more than 30 years, including the organization of the British Union of Fascists in 1932 and a British jail term as a Fascist, it is incredible that this political man in a tuxedo should solemnly assure his Buffalo audience that he is neither an anti-Semite nor a racist.

Decent people do not have as short a memory as Mosley apparently believes. There are millions who still recall his bully boys invading London's East End to rough up Jews, just for the fun of it, before the last war no less than their recent incursions.

"Until after the outbreak of the Second World War," says the Columbia Encyclopedia (published by the Columbia University Press), "he conducted a speckmaking campaign of vilification and abuse, directed largely against Jews."

In his Buffalo speech, Mosley tried to sell his Union Movement, a political mishmash he concocted after World War II. By chance, I was in England on assignment when Mosley unveiled this movement at a press conference in November, 1947. I still have, as a souvenir of that sickening conference, a four-page pamphlet describing the organization that Mosley distributed to the press.

In the light of reason and especially in the light of history since 1947, Mosley's blueprint (Un-

ion Movement) for a new European society turns out to be one of the most daily documents of this century.

Completely blind to the ferment of freedom at work in Africa, Mosley's pamphlet boldly announced the "Development of Africa to End Poverty and Want"—in Europe! Africa, under Mosley's plan, was to become the permanent sweat shop, supply depot and material prop of the white men of Great Britain and Europe.

Mosley's pamphlet declared "we directly challenge the policy and method of the old parties who say that we are in Africa only as trustees for the Negroes, until they are able to govern themselves. Our trusteeship in Africa is for white civilization.

"Africa never has been and never will be developed by the Negroes," the pamphlet continues. "The

European alone can develop Africa and, in so doing, he will save his continent and the world."

Under the Mosley plan, Negroes were to be the white man's eternal hewers of wood and drawers of water. And Negroes outside Africa would be shipped back to their ancestral home to aid in hewing and drawing.

Throughout the press conference, Mosley, an arrogant and self-possessed man, spoke with contemptuous disdain of democracy, a noun he usually preceded with the adjective "decadent."

"Democracy and Fascism died in 1939," he declared. "They have no relevance in the world today." (In Buffalo, 15 years later, Mosley told his audience he no longer was "a Fascist in the prewar sense," whatever that means.)

In 1947, he spoke of "the squalid practices imposed by democracy" and inferred their end when he came to power.

In the course of the press conference in 1947 Mosley said he would not permit publication of any "leftist" newspapers when his Union Movement was successful.

Before the 1947 press conference ended Mosley admitted that although every European would be welcome to join his movement, Jews were barred because they would forbid mixed marriages between Jews and Gentiles. And he planned to expel from Great Britain all Jews who were only recent arrivals.

Perhaps the cause of freedom of speech was served by Mosley's appearance in Buffalo. But who really believes that this moth-eaten leopard has changed his shoddy spots.

Britain May Sell Missiles

LONDON (AP)—The Foreign Office disclosed today Britain may sell guided missiles to the Middle East following a new American arms deal with Israel.

British informants here said the American decision was "merely notified to this country shortly before its announcement"—and without prior consultation. Government-officials in London have made no secret of their irritation at U.S. arms sales policies, particularly to such countries as West Germany, because these have had the effect of pushing British weapons out of their old markets.

QUESTION: Where do birds go at night?

ANSWER: As you study birds you are certain to notice how active they are, hopping, flying, watching out for enemies, grabbing insects for food. The fast pace at which they live means that they are tired at night, especially in their wing muscles, and need plenty of rest to prepare for the next day. The boy who sent us this interesting question added that he couldn't seem to find any birds sleeping at night. This is because it is dangerous for them to go to sleep unless they are well hidden. Birds are expert at concealing themselves, and that's why we don't see them at night. Many sleep standing on the edge of trees, high up and hidden in the foliage. Others sleep deep inside thickets on the ground such as the bobwhites we show, heads all facing out so the flock may scatter if alarmed. *Wise birds often sleep in the water, where they are safer than they would be if on shore.*

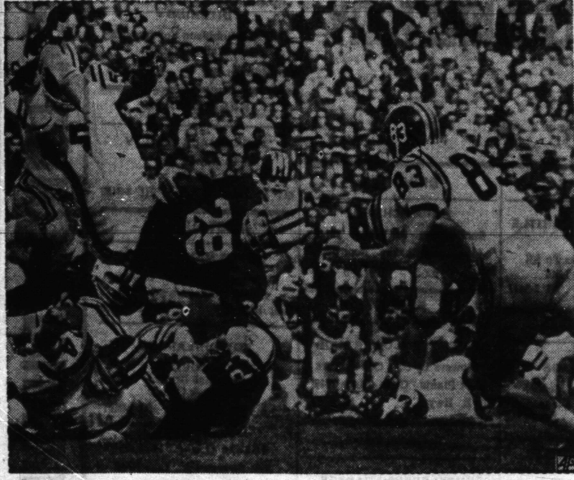

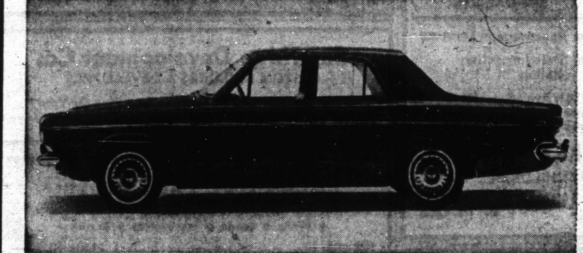

Thousands Of Texans Take Oral Vaccine

Additional thousands of Texans turned out to receive Sabin oral vaccine against polio Sunday, and in one county—Victoria—they took the controversial Type III variety.

Approximately 195,000 residents in four counties of the Lower Rio Grande Valley took sugar cubes treated with the Type I vaccine and 36,436 attended makeup clinics for Type II in Galveston County.

In Victoria county, 25,163 lined up for distribution of the Type III serum. This amounted to about 54 per cent of the county's 46,000 residents and compared with an Aug. 19 turnout of 34,122 for Type I.

Dr. Roy G. Reed said the Victoria County Medical Society decided to proceed as planned despite advice from the U.S. surgeon general against adult use of the Type III vaccine. The local view, he said, was that the "government's recommendation was an act of hasty judgment" based on meager data.

Victoria County's showing demonstrated confidence in its physicians, Dr. Reed said, and was considered "very satisfactory in the face of the Washington recommendation." Makeup clinics are set for next Sunday.

Officials of the Hidalgo-Starr and the Cameron-Willacy county medical societies in the Lower Rio Grande Valley reported about 80 per cent participation in use of Type I vaccine on the basis of about 226,000 residents. They estimated 140,000 others, however, presently are in northern areas to help harvest crops.

Dates for distributing other types of vaccine in the four valleys remain to be set.

In Galveston County, 36,436 persons received Type II doses. About 62,000 took part in the program the preceding Sunday. Officials figured this provided immunization for two-thirds of the 150,000 eligible to take part in the county.

Business Is Banking On 4th Quarter

NEW YORK (AP)—Now is the time for you to come to the aid of the economy. And the nation's merchants and many of its industrialists are betting that you will, now that the spending season—known on the business calendar as the fourth quarter—is starting. Troublesome as the summer quarter was for many industries (notably steel), its overall report card was a lot better than many had feared. With that as a fairly solid base, the October-November-December quarter should follow its seasonal pattern and send consumer spending to new highs. What may happen in 1963 is something else, again, but the signs today are for rising retail sales in the next few weeks and increasing production in many industries at least this month and next. These widely held expectations are based both on seasonal patterns and on the sound base for much of the economy. The latter includes high personal incomes and savings, record employment totals, and a fairly calm public acceptance of (or resignation to) the risks and uncertainties of world and domestic affairs. Even the stock market breaks of May and June, which alarmed the pulse takers, failed to jolt the public much, beyond making it less inclined to speculate. The seasonal pattern is sharply marked in retail sales. Many merchants count on the final eight to 12 weeks of the year to make the difference between a so-so year and a quite profitable one by providing up to 40 per cent of the year's total sales volume. The pattern is far from universal, however. Good retail sales volume in coming months will put merchants in position to order again from manufacturers. That's why your spending in the next three months is important to the economy's general trend. Reaction To Talk On Sectional Line

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressional reaction to President Kennedy's address to the nation on the University of Mississippi, along sectional lines. Following the president's radio-television address Sunday night urging compliance by Mississippians with federal court orders, seven of the state's eight members of Congress attacked it sharply. Senators from the North and West praised it as being an expression of the public will. Somewhere in between was Sen. Allan J. Ellender, D-La. Referring to federal court orders demanding admission of Negro James H. Meredith to the all-white University, he said, "I don't see the necessity of the court in this case a minute, but since it is the law, I don't see how it can be bypassed." Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., said succinctly, "I disagree entirely with the President's speech." Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said, "Thank God that reason, understanding and law seem to have prevailed." Sen. Jennings Randolph, D-W.Va., called the address "both a strong and reasonable statement." The President's speech drew support from Republicans, too. Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, R-Mass., said, "I thought the President expressed the sentiments of the government and the people of the United States extremely well. I support wholeheartedly what he said." Sen. Clifford P. Case, R-N.J., said on the speech, "Of course, I agree with it and I hope it will be effective." Eastland joined Sen. John Stennis and five of Mississippi's six House members in a statement denouncing the speech and Kennedy's actions in marshalling federal forces to back up the court orders. "Just as we have in the past, we shall continue to oppose the invasion of the civil rights of all the people of these United States and the concentration of all power government into some form of a totalitarian state," they declared. Former President Harry S. Truman, in a Kansas City interview, commented that Kennedy "is on the right track. He's doing exactly what he should do. To straighten it out, he should take whatever steps are necessary." Sen. Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., in a political meeting at Beverly Hills, Calif., called the Mississippi crisis "sad and disgraceful" but praised Kennedy's handling of it.

Johnson Says Reds Will Be Contained

MIDLAND (AP)—This country will not permit Cuba to export its "aggressive purposes" by the force or the threat of force, Vice President Lyndon Johnson said Sunday. "The United States will prevent the Cuban regime, by whatever means may be necessary, from taking any action against any part of the Western Hemisphere," he told 20,000 persons at a Jaycee-sponsored air show. "If at any time the Communist buildup in Cuba endangers or threatens our security in any way, we will do whatever must be done to protect our own security and that of our allies," Johnson said. He added that the United States will "do everything within our power to prevent such a development from occurring. We are resolved to do all that we can to assure the ultimate success of the cause of freedom in this country and our resolution grows stronger each day." Speaking later to 1,500 Texas School Administrators and School Board Association members in Austin, the vice president said our world leadership rests on our principles, not our skills. "If we in the United States are to continue our leadership for freedom, we must make certain that our publicly supported programs of education provide each young person with those skills and that training necessary to master the demands of an increasingly complex world," he said. "But at the same time we must recognize that our leadership today does not rest upon our mechanical skills—but upon the moral force of what we believe and what we stand for." "It is not enough to have universities and colleges of the first class. Those institutions of higher learning can be no stronger than the base upon which they stand, the supply of students from the secondary and primary schools."

Sark To Get A Modified Ambulance

SARK, Channel Islands (AP)—Sark's parliament has decided the island needs a new ambulance. But when the modern vehicle arrives from the neighboring island of Guernsey this week its engine and front wheels will be removed. What's left will be hitched to a tractor. Then the ambulance will be ready to answer emergency calls at a speed of 15 miles an hour. Automobiles are outlawed in Sark, a little island of 556 people in the English Channel. The only motor-driven vehicles permitted on the roads are tractors and an electrical invalid carriage for the island's ruler, the Dame of Sark, Mrs. Sibyl Hathaway. She suffers from arthritis. For years, members of Sark's parliament, known as the Chief Pleas, realized their old tractor-drawn ambulance was out of date. When Guernsey offered Sark a vehicle from its own fleet, the Chief Pleas jumped at the chance. Some members oppose the conversion plan, however. "What is the point of providing up-to-date equipment and then antiquating it?" asked Philip Perre. "We are paying Guernsey a nominal 50 pounds—\$140—for the ambulance and spending three times as much on the conversion. When the engine is removed, so, too, is the heating and lighting." The opposition almost certainly will be outvoted. Said publican Fred Hawkins, who is supervising the ambulance conversion: "We want to keep Sark the way it is. This is the way we like it."

The escape occurred near the Tellow Canal in the southern part of the city where the Communists have put up a series of barbed wire fences.
