U. N. Given Resolution

Soviets, Red China In Row Over Albania

By STANLEY JOHNSON MOSCOW (AP)—An open rift over Albania is rocking the Soviet-Chinese boat, but it has little or no chance of capsizing it.

That was the diplomatic assessment here today after the startling disclosure that Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai in a speech to the 22nd Soviet Communist party Congress Thursday had severely criticized Premier Khrushchev's condemnation of the tiny Communist nation on the Adriatic.

The Albanian regime sides with the Chinese Communists in their contention that war is still a legitimate weapon to spread communism. In what Western observers considered an implicit criticism of Peiping's rulers, Khrushchev, in opening the party Congress Tuesday, had accused Premier Enver Hoxha and other Albanian Communist leaders of failing to support his policy of peaceful coexistence with the non-Communist world and of trying to lead their country back to the

era of Stalinist repression. Chou did not name names, but Khrushchev was plainly his target when he declared: "Any public, one-sided censure of any fraternal party does not help unity and is not helpful to resolving problems."

"To lay bare a dispute between fraternal parties or fraternal countries openly in the face of the enemy cannot be regarded as a serious Marxist-Leninist attitude."

Chou said disputes and differences between Communist parties or governments "should be resolved patiently in the spirit of proletarian internationalism and on the principles of equality and unanimity through consultation."

The Chinese Premier said "the grouping of American imperialists and Yugoslav revisionists is trying every way to drive a wedge in the cohesion of progressive forces around the world."

Chou's defense of Albania did not extend to Yugoslavia, whose Communist leadership Khrushchev also had attacked Tuesday.

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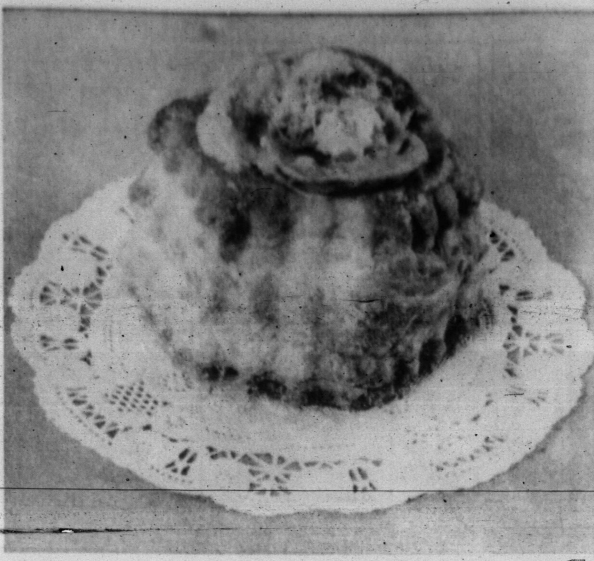
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MUSHROOMS AU GRATIN

Easy Meal For Busy Mothers

- 6 baked patty shells
 - 1 pound mushrooms
 - 4 tablespoons butter
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 4 teaspoon dry marjoram
 - 1/2 cup chicken broth
 - 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
 - Salt and pepper to taste
 - 1/4 cup heavy cream
 - 1 tablespoon sherry (optional)
 - 2 tablespoons grated cheese
- Wash mushrooms remove and chop stems finely. Slice caps and cook stems and caps in butter for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in flour and gradually stir in chicken broth. Add marjoram, parsley, salt and pepper, and cook, stirring, for 5 minutes. Stir in cream and sherry and cook, stirring for 3 minutes longer. Fill baked shells with mushroom mixture. Crumble patty caps, mix with cheese and sprinkle over filling. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 15 minutes.

Shiny Apple Slices

Glazed apple slices are delicious warm or cold, as a dessert or as a garnish for the meat platter. To prepare you peel and quarter large cooking apples. Melt 2 tablespoons butter, add 1/2 cup brown sugar and a teaspoon of cinnamon. Cover the skillet and cook over a low flame 10 minutes. Remove the cover, increase the flame and cook, stirring frequently until apples are slightly transparent, glazed and tender.

Early fall spraying is recommended to control magnolia scale and euonymus scale. A malathion spray is an effective control of the sap-sucking magnolia scale. The spray should be applied on a mild day. The female magnolia scale is large and round and white. The best time to spray is after the females have shriveled or have dropped from the tree.

Rumex, or coal, attacks ground covers, including many valuable fine and shrub varieties. Pachysandra and hollyhock are susceptible. Spray with a combination of DDT and malathion.

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'Doorway To Safer Living' Program For 20th Century

"Doorway to Safer Living" was the program theme for the Twentieth Century Club meeting Tuesday at the Martha Ann Woman's Club. The president, Mrs. John Hamilton, introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Jerry Edwards, who spoke on "Safety."

He presented many facts concerning safety in driving within the community and on the highways. Laws pertaining to the following: emergency vehicles, ways individuals can be helpful in time of an emergency, and survival highway techniques were discussed.

"Safety is a subject that is very dear to me," Mr. Edwards said. "It is very hard to live. More people should work harder to save lives for there are more lives lost on our highways than by notable diseases. It is too easy to go fast nowadays because car manufacturers are busy making vehicles easier to handle and with more horsepower for faster speed. Also our state spends more money each year improving our highways."

Large crowds gathered at the scene of a wreck due to the fact that several emergency vehicles are involved in answering an emergency call. Besides the ambulance, there's the police department or sheriff's department, the highway patrol, the press, and the fire department. Today with so many cars and trucks using putane there is greater danger of fire than ever before.

The law states that when one hears the siren of an approaching emergency vehicle, one must pull over to the right hand curb and stop. It is also against the law to follow an emergency vehicle to the scene of a wreck. Most things we do have to be blended with the common sense. So I would suggest that you do two things when you hear the sound of a siren. One, check and see what's around you before you stop. You might pull out in front of an approaching car. Second, if you are at an intersection, look all around you before you pull out of your lane to come to a stop.

When you come upon a wreck on the highway do not move an injured person or you will be liable for the use of common sense. If you are at an intersection, look all around you before you pull out of your lane to come to a stop.

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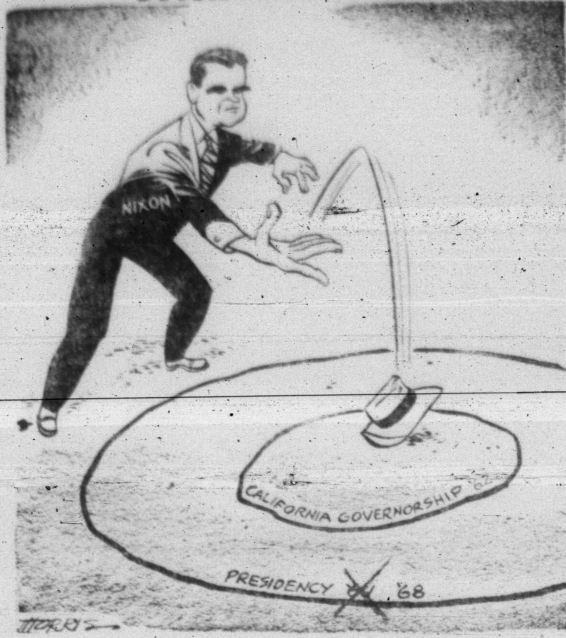

Many Women Are Anxious To Take Advice Of Man's Legion

There is news for the National Man's Legion. The organization should remember that it is the organization that proposes to solve all problems—peace, prosperity, unemployment and the common cold—by the simple process of giving the boot to every woman who seeks and surreptitiously returns her to the kitchen.

In the classified advertising section runs in a New York newspaper it declares: "Today's Tea... 27,000 per cent more... superior to the woman. For prosperity and peace, abolish all female labor. Join the National Man's Legion."

Since the column containing this formula for paradise appeared early in September, the letters written me by women eager to join the legion have piled up. I have arrived in such unmanageable number as to delight the National Man's Legion. And, perhaps, surprise it a bit.

Women of all ages in every section of the nation can't wait to join punching the time clock of gainful employment. If only—and there is one proviso—the legion supports them in the manner to which their own efforts have accustomed them.

"I had my life. I have been trying to find some man who would support me," writes a woman from St. Louis, who signs herself "Dying to Quit." Neither my father, my brothers, nor my uncle ever showed the slightest interest in providing me with food, shelter or clothing," she continues.

"For the past twenty years I have been the sole support of myself and my mother."

"So I say to the Man's Legion: Let me know when your support starts so I can quit. Hurry!"

A Salt Lake City woman signs herself "One Who Knows" and writes:

"The legion's formula that men are 100 per cent more intelligent than women—they are not!—is just what I need. I am a woman and I have to support myself and myself. I am stuck with families because men don't want the responsibility of being husbands or fathers."

"I speak from experience. My husband wanted a large family. After the fourth child arrived, he told me 'I'm too young to be stuck with all this responsibility.' So he walked out. Ever since I have worked to support my children and myself."

"There are days when my back hurts a bit worse than Fred. Keep saying 'I'll be perfectly willing not to work any more if it will support the kids and me. We like to eat.'"

"If the law stipulated that the man must take the children and make a proper home for them, in case of divorce and lawyers would have to quit for lack of business."

"In an odd of every 100 divorces, the cause is the husband and father who no longer wants the responsibility of supporting anyone but himself. The man wants his freedom and, what's more, he takes it. I know I've been supporting myself and two children for years."

"If we were willing to face the truth," another woman writes, "we would have to admit that most men don't want to be men. A man wants to be a child all his life, yet with the conveniences and privileges of marriage. When that child is faced with a man's responsibilities, he walks out on his wife and children."

"I'm dog-tired, and if the legion will support me and the children, I'll quit tomorrow."

Well, as everyone knows, I'm just crazy about me. And I don't want to have to take sides. But it does seem to me at this point that the National Man's Legion either has to fish out bait or clothes some of its own.

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Hodges Keeps Moving On His New Job

NEW YORK (AP)—Probably the government's busiest guided missile today is Luther H. Hodges, a rolling stone upon whom no moss grows.

At 62, Hodges, secretary of Commerce, is the oldest member of President Kennedy's Cabinet, but he likes to point out he is also the only Cabinet member who drives a sports car.

"The trouble with a new job," Hodges has said, "is you don't know what you're getting into. I've been to Mexico and made two round-trip trips to Europe. Next week's destination: Tokyo."

"I've never worked so hard in my life," he said during a pause before an en route from Madrid to Washington. "This New Frontier is exciting and moves pretty fast."

Hodges, one of nine children of a small-town farmer, was always engaged at a fast clip. He helped work his way through college selling Bibles, made a fortune in business and got at \$2 to enter politics.

As Commerce secretary, the new Commerce secretary moved to help businessmen by simplifying the issuance of patents and speeding up U.S. census reports.

But Hodges, a strongly built, blue-eyed man with a fair amount of baggage as well as folksy Southern charm, is too restless to stay long behind a desk.

He isn't the board chairman type. He is a supersalesman, a missionary with a message.

This is his message: America needs to sell more goods abroad and it needs more foreign tourists to come over and spend money here.

The average American firm has had such a good market abroad that it hasn't felt it necessary to sell abroad. But it's time now they get into the export field as an insurance.

"As to travel, our people spend \$2.1 billion abroad each year. But all the rest of the world spends less than \$1 billion on trips to our country."

Hodges hugely enjoys his new role as the federal government's first official travel agent. And he has spread his gospel in person before audiences abroad, from Finland to Spain.

What does he tell them? He tells them:

"You've got more money now than you've ever had."

"Why not spend some of it seeing America—and invest some of it there, too?"

Practically everyone abroad has a basic desire to visit America," he said. "We have to increase the spending of foreign tourists here by \$100 million next year."

He is opening seven U.S. travel agencies abroad to spread information on the scenic and economic advantages of the Land of the Free and the Home of the Brave.

"The big obstacle is that many people over there think travel in America is too expensive. I told them in West Germany: 'Way it cost me more to come see you than it would you to come see us. That's the truth.'"

"Why, in one hotel it cost me 120 marks—about \$30—to stay overnight."

But Hodges said the amount of future foreign tourist travel here depends largely on Americans themselves.

"It isn't enough simply to get them over here," he said. "We have to make them feel so welcome when they want to come again. Word of mouth—that's the thing!"

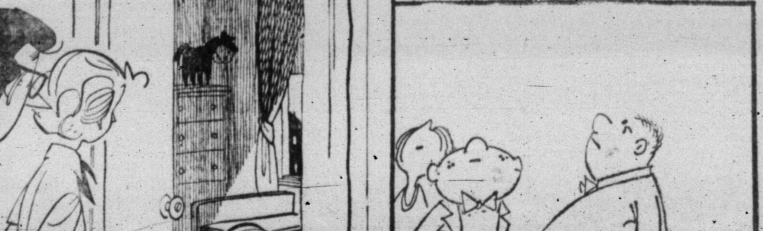

Four conference games that could put Arkansas in the driver's seat are scheduled in the Southwest Conference Saturday.

There would have to be some upsets for this to come about but it is the time of the year when upsets become the rule rather than the exception in this wacky football league.

Arkansas, leading the race with a 2-0 record, meets Texas, the nation's No. 3 team, in the headline game. They clash at Fayetteville Saturday afternoon.

Texas A&M, which is tied with Texas for second place, each with a 1-0 record, tackles angry Texas Christian at Fort Worth.

Should Arkansas win and Texas A&M and Rice lose, the Razorbacks would be in a most advantageous position, in seeking their third straight championship honors.

The odds makers don't look for this to happen, however.

Texas, which has won four straight games in a breeze, is the only unbeaten team in the conference and leads the nation in offense, is favored to put a damper on Arkansas hopes by a margin of seven points.

Texas A&M is a narrow favorite over Texas Christian. Baylor is picked by 13 points over Texas Tech and Rice is a two-touchdown or more choice over Southern Methodist.
