Sgt. Ivy Smith, Jr. Wounded In Action In Korea Fighting

Wounded June 10, Ozonan Said Not Seriously Injured

Sgt. Ivy Smith, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivy Smith of Ozona, was wounded in action on the Korean fighting front on June 10, according to a telegram received by the parents here Wednesday night.

The telegram advised that the Ozona Marine's wounds were not serious and that he had not been evacuated from the fighting area.

Sgt. Smith, who is with the First Marine Division in Korea, had been wounded slightly at least three times before, according to letters received by his family. He recently wrote that he had "been hit" three times but only slightly hurt. He wrote recently to his wife, who lives in Austin, that he had been knocked unconscious by an exploding mine, but again was not seriously injured.

The Ozona Marine, a veteran of World War II, has been in action on the Korean front since last January. He sailed from the United States, after being called back into active duty from the Marine reserves, on December 16, going first to Japan and landing in Korea in early January.

OPS Man To Be In Ozona July 12 To Assist Merchants

Representative of Ft. Worth Dist. to Be at Courthouse

A representative of the Fort Worth District Office of Price Stabilization will be in Ozona July 12 to assist business men in Crockett county with their pricing problems, according to a letter received yesterday by Roy Thompson, secretary of the Ozona Retail Merchants Association, from George C. Bevel, information officer of the Fort Worth OPS office.

The representative will have headquarters in the courthouse starting at 9 o'clock and will be here throughout the day. Any business man who is experiencing difficulties with complying with OPS regulations, and few there are who are not or have not had difficulties, is invited to meet with the OPS representative who will assist in ironing out the difficulties.

The OPS man will be in Ozona a month after the initial meeting through the rest of this year, the Fort Worth office informed. The representative is scheduled to appear here the second Thursday in each month, in August, September, October, November and December, and on each such visit will be open to conferences with business men who are having pricing problems.

Continental Sets Deep Wildcat In World Pool Area

No. 1E-L. P. Powell To Drill to 11,000 Ft. With Rotary

Fifteen miles southwest of Big Lake, Continental Oil Co. has staked location for a deep Crockett county wildcat.

Projected to 11,000 feet with rotary and beginning at once, the firm's No. 1-E L. P. Powell will be 660 from south, 1,980 feet from west line of section 62-BB-EL&RR survey. It will be in the middle of the World (San Andres) field.

Neville G. Penrose of Fort Worth No. 1 University, slated 8-750-foot wildcat 12 miles east of Sheffield, was cementing surface pipe at 23 feet, with total depth 485 feet. Location is in section 1-29 University.

Continental No. 1-A Shannon estate, Crockett county wildcat, was preparing to drillstem test to total depth of 7,181 feet in the Ellenburger.

A core cut from 7,161 feet recovered oil-stained dolomite with an odor in fractures.

Earlier, the test recovered an estimated 2,200 feet of clean oil and 510 feet of oil and gas-cut mud on a two-hour drillstem test between 7,100-7,150 feet in the Ellenburger, topped at 6,949 feet, with drill pipe partially unloading while being pulled.

It also logged shows in a core cut between 7,150-7,161 feet.

Other Crockett tests Lario No. 1 Shannon was drilling at 3,986 feet in black shale and lime, Shell No. 1-5 University at 10,470 feet in lime, chert and shale. Texaco No. 1 Marrs, bottomed at 7,172 feet in No. 1 University and shut down for repairs at 1,135 feet.

Virginia Couple Hurt When Car Overturns on Road West of Ozona

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Stossell of Front Royal, Va., are under treatment in the Ozona Hospital for injuries suffered when their car overturned on Highway 290 about seven miles west of Ozona. Mr. Stossell is suffering from back injuries and Mrs. Stossell a fractured shoulder. Both are reported doing well at mid-week.

Miss Elsie Stossell, daughter of the couple, and another young lady, Miss Ora Neal, both escaped with minor injuries. Miss Stossell was driving the car when a tire blew out. She lost control of the car and it left the road and overturned in the bar ditch, coming to rest on its top. The Stossells were traveling west.

Two men, the driver and relief driver, escaped without injuries early last Thursday morning when the big truck in which they were riding struck a bridge two miles west of Ozona and overturned. The truck, loaded with mixed freight, came to rest in the middle of the highway, and traffic was blocked for nearly two hours. The truck was finally skidded to one side to allow one-way traffic until it was unloaded and lifted back on its wheels.

County Tax Values May Climb Nearly Million Dollars

Compromise With Oil Companies to Bring Discount Cut

Property valuations for tax purposes in Crockett county for 1951 will be nearly a million dollars above the total for the previous year, or approximately 22 3/4 millions of dollars, following action of the Commissioners Court sitting as a final board of equalization here Monday.

The valuation raise affected oil companies operating in the county, and was agreed upon by the court and representatives of the major companies having the largest holdings in the county after a morning conference at the courthouse.

Approximately 85 per cent of the total county valuations represents phases of the oil business, production, drillings, pipelines, equipment, royalty, etc.

The final valuation as fixed by the court was in the nature of a compromise, a five per cent raise in oil property values and withdrawal of the usual 3 per cent discount granted on taxes paid in October as if affects school taxes. The oil companies agreed to pay their taxes in October as usual, despite the fact that the discount will not be allowed on the school portion of the tax bill.

The withdrawal of the prompt payment discount was made to affect all taxpayers alike as regards the school portion of taxes. The school tax rate is \$1.50 on the \$100 valuation, representing \$1 for maintenance and 50 cents for retirement of outstanding bond issues. The usual discount schedule of 3 per cent in October, 2 per cent in November and 1 per cent in December will likely be granted on county and state taxes as in past years, but will not apply to school taxes.

A tentative budget of county and school revenues and expenditures for the coming year was prepared by County Judge Houston Smith and was closely examined by oil company representatives. The conference committee from the oil companies approved the budget in its entirety. Judge Smith said, and the valuation schedule was agreed upon as necessary to meet expected expenditures.

"Without the raise, the county would have faced a possible \$30,000 deficit," Judge Smith declared.

The 1951 county tax rate will be set sometime in August, and will probably be the same as last year, Judge Smith said. The county rate last year was 95 cents on the \$100 valuation. Taxpayers will realize some saving from the state rate since the 30-cent ad valorem tax heretofore collected by the state was eliminated by constitutional amendment. The state rate last year was 72 cents and will probably be set at 42 cents this year.

Tandy Completes Pre-Flight Training At Naval Air School

PENSACOLA, Fla. — June 23, 1951.—Naval Aviation Cadet, Kerry S. Tandy, 19, son of Dr. and Mrs. H. B. Tandy of Ozona, Texas graduated from the U. S. Naval Pre-Flight School Saturday at Pensacola, Florida.

In addition to a thorough physical training program, the fifteen week Pre - Flight course which Kerry completed includes aeronautical and naval subjects aimed at preparing officer candidates for flight training and eventual commissioning as naval officers. Nav. Cad. Tandy was graduated from Ozona High School in May, 1948. He served in the Navy as an enlisted man prior to entering the Pre-Flight School last February.

Kerry was assigned to the U. S. Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Whiting Field, Milton, Fla., where he is engaged in primary flight training. Upon completion of his (Continued on Page Two)

SQUANDERING YOUR MONEY

Anyone who has the slightest interest in honest, economical government should read an article by Charles Stevenson in the June 9 issue of the Saturday Evening Post, called "How Government Pressure Boys Squander Your Money." The point of it is well described by the Post's sub-title: "With expensive books, cocktail parties and thousands of paid press agents, government agencies beat the drum to glorify and perpetuate themselves. They try to teach you what to think — at your expense."

Mr. Stevenson's article deals with governmental publicity activities — paid for, of course, by all the taxpayers. Here is a small sample of what he has to say: "Budget Bureau statistics indicate that \$105,000,000 is spent annually from taxes to pay 3,400 Federal publicity employees and circulate

their product. Much of this represents statistical reports, desirable promotion of good farming practices, information concerning social-security benefits, plus other services authorized by Congress. But much of it is also sheer propaganda of another order. In one week The New York Times received enough government news releases to fill 800 of its columns, and the Journalism Quarterly, on analyzing 286 releases of this type found 55,080 words of press-agency, 10,166 words to influence legislation, and 45,615 words to influence policy.

Mr. Stevenson names names. The Federal Security Administration has shot the works in promoting compulsory government health insurance. The Bureau of Reclamation has beaten the drums to the limit in trying to force socialization of the power industry and government power development, especially in the West. And government propaganda has entrenched the Army Engineers "as an all-powerful pork-barrel construction agency."

It is an amazing story — and a disheartening one. How much longer will the "government pressure boys" be permitted to squander the taxpayers' money in this manner?

ATLANTIC CITY. (Special)—Harold P. Nutter, Camden, New Jersey, is the new president of The International Association of Lions Clubs (Lions International). He was elected by unanimous vote at the 34th Annual Convention of the Association which closed here at the Convention Hall today. Nutter succeeds H. V. Petry, Jr., Carrija Springs, Texas.

The convention concluded a year of unprecedented progress for Lions International, according to the report made by R. Roy Keaton, Chicago, Illinois, Director-General of the Association. He reported the addition of 837 new Lions Clubs and 14,756 men to the roster of the Association during the eleven-month period ended May 31, 1951, for a total of 8,757 clubs and 417,597 members. He stated also that during the fiscal year, Lions Clubs were established in three additional countries: Finland, Italy and Uruguay. Lions International, he added, is the largest, strongest, and most active service club organization in the world, with Lions Clubs in 31 countries on five continents.

RENEWAL CERTIFICATE

The undersigned Nelson Morris, Edward Morris, L. S. Burk, Ruth Morris Bakwin, and Muriel Morris Buttinger, being desirous of renewing the limited (special) partnership heretofore entered into by and between them in order to embody in said limited partnership certain increases in the capital contributions by the general and limited partners do hereby certify as follows:

(1) That the name of the firm under which such limited (special) partnership is now conducted and shall continue to be conducted shall be Nelson and Edward Morris, Ltd.

(2) That the general nature of the business to be transacted is the production, purchase, sale, transportation and distribution of petroleum and its products, and gas, the dealing in real estate, personal property, oil and gas leases, royalties, mineral rights or fractional interests therein and all things necessary or incidental thereto and also the purchase, sale, investment and re-investment in bonds, stocks and other securities.

Regan Charges of Waste by Military Probed by Committee

WASHINGTON. — Rep. Ken Regan was asked by the Hebert Sub-committee, now investigating military procurement, to appear before it this week and discuss his findings in wasteful procurement.

as Regan presented to Congress earlier in the session.

Regan scored heavily what he termed "ridiculous extravagance of the procurement section." Regan, who served in the last two wars, collected considerable information on this subject from his experience and from friends then in service and from civilian sources of the moment.

He was questioned particularly about the large quantities of paint, which Regan said had been purchased in too great amounts and in too small sizes to keep satisfactorily. He declined to reveal the name of his friend in the paint industry who had supplied him with facts and figures. He is what Regan termed, "an honest, tax-paying citizen, who does not wish to appear before your committee, but who simply wants to see that we prevent these wasteful occurrences from happening in the future."

Regan said he had learned that instead of 6 million gallons of paint, the military had sought 7½ million gallons and received bids only on two million. If it had received what it sought, it would have "dried up the market," said Regan. The bids came when there was a shortage of resin. He said out of 1200 paint manufacturers in the country only 60 were asked to bid.

Regan suggested that in the future, the purchasing be done in the

areas where the paint is used rather than elsewhere, the added expense of shipping and storing it.

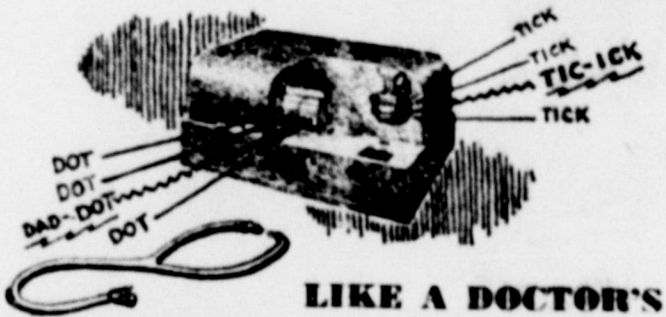

WASHINGTON.—Rep. Ken Regan, 16th district, said today that he is highly gratified with the action of the House and Senate Committees on Banking and Currency in which they cancelled the next two proposed rollback orders on beef.

"In the belief the rollback on commercial cattle order of May 20 with the proposed two additional rollbacks was working an especially severe hardship on the ranches of West Texas, I have been very concerned as to the best procedure and am gratified in hearing of the action of these groups.

"The first rollback served no beneficial purpose for saving to consumers and created a substantial loss. Under the present Committee action, this May 20 order will stand, however.

Regan said he is also "taking some measure of satisfaction in knowing I did not support this control law last year, and I am not convinced of the need for supporting its extension. I am a firm believer in free competitive enterprise system for our country, the greatest in the world, and I do not believe the government controls

can do other than force us further into a socialistic, centralized form of government, and I have consistently voted against every socialistic measure that has come before Congress since I have been here."

AUSTIN.—Americans pay dearly for their independence!

In actual conflict on the fields of battle, it cost 4,044 lives to buy it in the Revolution, about 529,000 including the Korean war dead, to preserve it — and 793 lives to celebrate it last July 4th alone! Texas contributed to the bloody toll to the tune of 40 traffic victims, excluding scores of other non-traffic violent deaths.

That ironic fact underlines the Texas Department of Public Safety's campaign to reduce accidents, "especially on Texas highways, this Fourth — the day which commemorates our victorious struggle for independence.

Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Public Safety Department, points out that the mid-week Fourth this year will bring only a one-day holiday for most persons, thus safety will receive a decided "assist" from the calendar.

Garrison urges every citizen to exercise the utmost caution with fireworks, boating, swimming and motorizing while enjoying the holiday.

"Be sane and be safe on the Fourth," he says, "and be alive on the 5th."

Midweek Holiday May Save Many Lives, But Don't Depend on It

AUSTIN. — The calendar may save your life this Fourth of July!

That was the unusual statement issued today by Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, in pointing out that the Fourth this year will fall in mid-week, thus affording a single holiday for most people.

Because of the Wednesday holiday, Garrison emphasized that many lives will be saved that might otherwise be forfeit to a longer period. To rely on the calendar to save your life, however, is to gamble with safety, he added.

Every holiday is a day of increased hazards, Garrison said, due to the increased traffic volume and the other extra hazards which usually accompany periods of relaxation. All of these demand extra caution to avert disaster.

Last year 40 lives were lost in traffic accidents during the long-tour-day 4th of July holiday in Texas. This year the toll will be considerably less but still twice the normal for an average Wednesday. Traffic will claim 10 victims on the single day in the State this year, Garrison estimates. Still another 28 persons will die of

drownings and other non-traffic violence on that day.

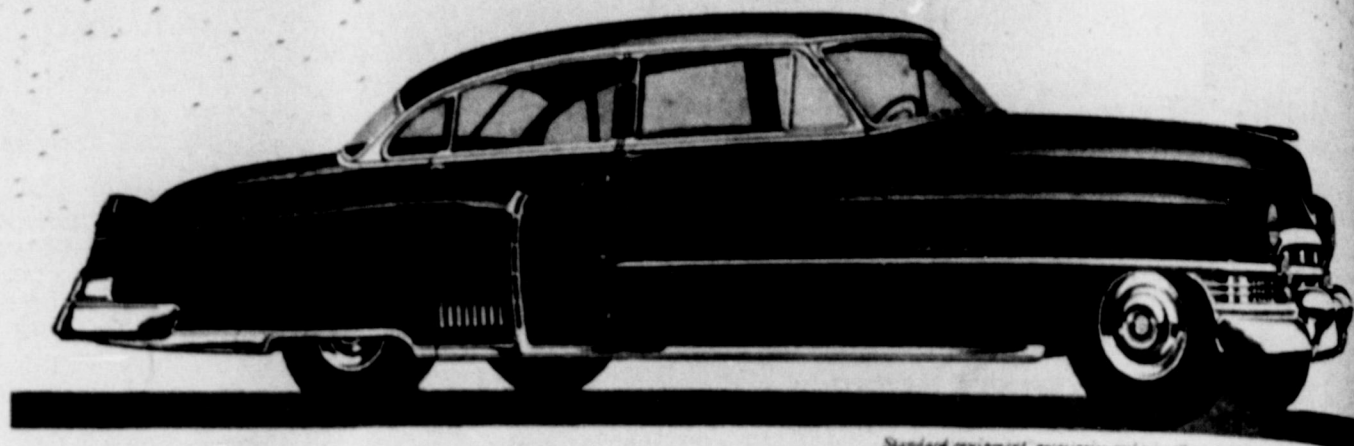

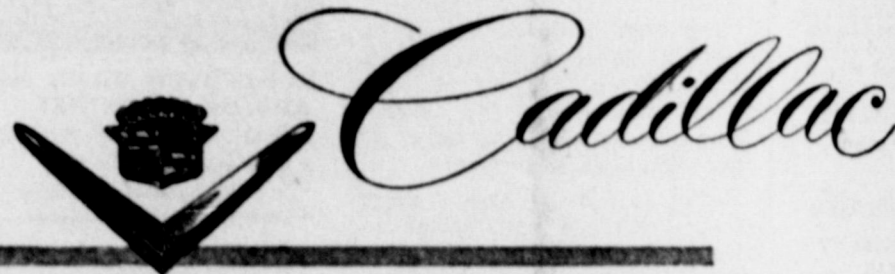

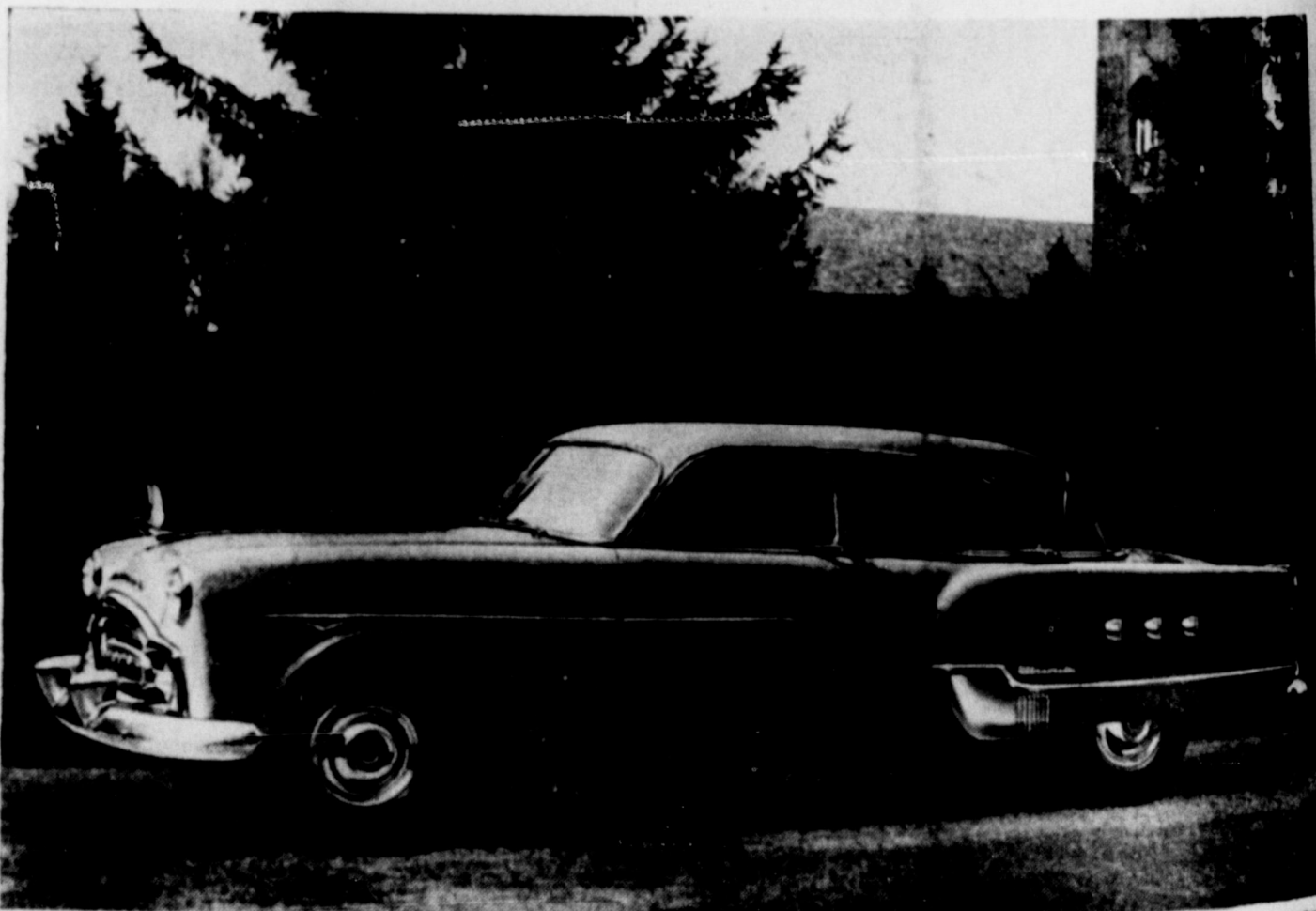
