paintment by the governor of top court judges from a panel submitted by a special nominat-ing commission. Judges occa-sionally would "run against their records" on a public ballot, with voters marking their preference for continued service or judicial retirement. Where judges are re-jected, new appointment would follow.

Norman Register, director of revenue and finance for the City of Dallas, says Texas' \$250 home-furnishings exemption from ad-valorem taxes should be either increased or done away with. Register told the local-govern-ments committee that in 1876 when the \$250 figure was written into the constitution it was enough money to furnish a house. Now, however, that's ridiculous, he said.

Another witness before the committee said that Lubbock and Dallas are the only two cities in the state which effectively col-lect their ad valorem taxes on cars.

Revision commission heard strong recommendation from former Gov. Allan Shivers for four-year-terms for governors and advice from Municipal Ad-visory Council that cities are los-ing "tens of millions" of dollars in bond interest rates because of antiquated provisions in Texas law.

"American Party" Name Free
Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has ruled that the "American Party" label may be used by George Wallace - for - President supporters in Texas.

Opinion, requested by Secretary of State Roy R. Barrera, noted that the American Party name has not been certified on a Texas general election ballot since 1920, therefore it is not a "pre-exist-ing" party whose name is pro-protected from use today.

Martin also held that county clerks must accept for filing American Party required notice for its conventions and regis-trars must furnish the party re-registered voter lists for not more than \$5 a set in counties where it holds conventions.

Party is determined to show a membership of 14,259, the number necessary to get Wallace on the Texas general ballot. Officials also served notice that their members will get a chance to vote at conventions on liquor-by-the drink and horse race betting, just like Democrats and Republi-cans.

Attack Water Standards
Proposed water quality stand-ards amendments were termed unreasonable by 200 oil, gas and chemical company representa-tives at a Texas Water Quality Board hearing.

One amendment would permit lowering of quality standards only where it is demonstrated to the board as needed to assure economic or social development.

It calls for the highest and best degree of waste treatment available for any industry, public or private project that conceiv-ably could create a new pollution source. Alternative proposes in-dustry be bound to comparably high standards of treatment the same as to those required of facilities serving the general public.

TWQ board probably will take no action before April 25.

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

According to the 1963 survey made by the Soil Conservation Service, there are 88.5 million acres of brush in Texas. This means that 82 percent of our 107 million acres of grassland is infested to some extent with light to heavy brush stands. Fifty-four million acres of this brush is so thick it is almost totally stopping the growth of grass. It is estimated that brush uses 146 million acre feet of wa-ter per year, or 40 percent of the water used in Texas each year.

Highway Dept. Let Two Seal Coating Contracts

Two contracts to seal coat highways in the Amarillo district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission during its April meeting. The work will be under the supervision of District Highway Engineer Charles W. Smith of Amarillo.

A contract covering 183.7 miles was awarded to J. H. Strain & Sons of Tye. Low bid was \$266,110.

The project includes the follow-ing:
Potter County: US Highway 87-287 from the Moore County line southward 6.8 miles; State Highway 136 from FM 293 to the Moore County line (18.8 miles); Ranch to Market Road 1061 from FM281 to Hwy (15.6 miles); US 66 from 0.7 mile west of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad underpass to Junction 279 (4.6 miles).

Randall County: FM 1541 from FM 285 to the Swisher County line (4 miles); FM 1706 from US 87 to the west and north 10.3 miles; FM 1714 from US 87 to FM 168 (10.5 miles).

Deaf Smith County: FM 1055 from US 385 to the Castro County line (2.5 miles); FM 2587 from US 385 to the west 6 miles; FM 290 from FM 1412 to the Oldham County line (10.9 miles).

Oldham County: Interstate 40 from Vega to the Potter County line (12.8 miles) and FM 809 from IH 40 to the Deaf Smith County line (1.7 mile).

Hartley County: FM 767 from Romero to Channing (35.7 miles). Dallam County: FM 296 from Textline to FM 1879 (13 miles) and FM 1879 from US 87 to FM 296 (12.7 miles).

Sherman County: SH 15 from US 54 eastward 6.6 miles, and FM 297 from the Dallam County line to US 287 (8.6 miles). Moore County: US 87-287 from SH 152 to 19th Street (1.6 miles) SH 152 from 287 eastward 0.6 mile; US 87 from US 287 west-ward 0.2 mile.

The seal coat project is ex-pected to take 85 working days for completion and will be under the active charge of Highway Department engineer H. L. Gal-legly of Dalhart.

A second contract calls for seal coating on 96.5 miles of high-ways and farm to market roads in the Amarillo District. It was also awarded to J. H. Strain & Sons, Inc. of Tye, for a low bid of \$167,262.

Armstrong County: US 287 from the Carson County line to 8.5 mi. southeastward.

Carson County: FM 293 from 5 miles west of Panhandle to SH 207 (5 miles); on FM 1342 from FM 293 to 4.8 miles north; on FM 2161 from US 60 to IH 40 (5.1 miles).

Hansford County: SH 136 from the Oklahoma state line to SH 15 (18.3 miles). Lipscomb County: FM 1454 from Foltlett to Wolf Creek (12.3 miles).

Hutchinson County: FM 1559 from SH 136 to SH 207 (4.9 miles). Ochiltree County: FM 281 from US 83 to SH 70 (14.3 miles); and on FM 2711 from US 83 to 7.6 miles eastward.

This contract is to take 75 working days. L. K. Cantrell is the Highway Dept. engineer in charge of the project.

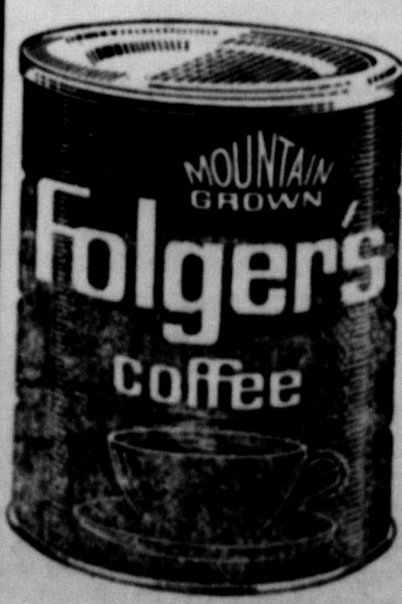

LOOKIN' BACK

In this age of draft card burning and demonstrations against the government, of "conscientious objectors," and those who criticize our leaders, it is refreshing to read a letter from Cleary C. Bird written in July, 1918, and mailed from somewhere in France to T. J. Coffey in McLean. It reads in part: "Believe me, Uncle Sam thinks a lot of his boys and he is going to take care of them. He is a great Uncle and I am willing to serve him until victory is won."

Another letter intrigues me. It was written by Ann Rowe McCown Davenport (Mother of Mrs. Nola Crisp of McLean) to her daughter Robin in Washington, D. C. Mrs. Davenport and family came to Gray County and settled north of Alamo in 1905.

Mrs. Davenport describes the building of a stick and mud chimney, as follows: "Take split-slat looking wood and build them up pig-pen fashion, daub the cracks with mud, then plaster on the inside with mud to keep the wood from being exposed to the fire."

Mrs. Davenport said that when she was a child and had watched one such chimney being built, she heard an old woman say that the chimney would draw cats from under the bed. The child took it literally and one day put the family cat under the bed and was disappointed not to see it being sucked up the chimney.

Actually what Mrs. Davenport hinted at but did not enlarge upon is good reading: "Sometimes (she writes) I'll tell you the story of when Dick set the bed on fire, his getting in the well, and you driving snakes down on me. Nola's mixing a wash tub of dough, you all shaving the dog, the bald man at the circus, the pained man, the baptism of the wooden legged man, putting bumble bees in Dick's pockets, and your home circuses. "Yes, we agree with you, Mrs. Davenport, yours was a lively group of children!"

Speaking of letters, Don Alexander has a collection of them written by his ancestors over a period of 40 years (June, 1837 to May, 1877) which make most interesting and informative reading. Through not intentional on the part of the writers, much national and state history is reflected in these family messages, one to another.

The introductions of the old-time letters reflect the customs of the age in which they were written: "A favorable opportunity offered and I embraced it of letting you all know that we are in the land of the living and enjoy good health. . . . We once more write you a few lines which leaves us all enjoying good health with the exception of the whooping cough of which disease we are getting well. . . . Your welcome letter was received by me some time ago and I often said to myself I would answer it, but something always happens to prevent the fulfillment of my design. . . . We now embrace this opportunity to address to you in writing a few lines for your information and happiness. Through the goodness of God we can say all are in good health and our desire is you may be favored in like manner. . . ."

Some favorite closings are: "We subscribe to you our love and best respects for all connections. . . . I will now conclude by subscribing myself yours with respect." Concerning letters: Soon you, as an early settler in these parts, will be receiving a letter asking for the story of you and your family. It is full of suggestions as to the material we need for the history of Gray County.

Please read these letters carefully and send in your story as soon as possible. If you are an old-timer, regardless of where you live now, and do not get a letter, it is because we do not know your address. Drop us a card and we will be glad to send you a letter. If you know the name and address of other early settlers, you will do a great service to send us their addresses.

Mark the fourth Sunday in April on your calendar and meet us at the school cafeteria at 2:30 for the Alamo-McLean Historical meeting.

Final Wheat Report Clarendon College Rodeo April 12

Due May 15

Gray County Farm Newsletter Wheat Acreage Report

The final date to report final wheat acreage is May 15. Producers may report their final wheat acreage at any time now if they have decided how much wheat they want to leave.

Measurement Service

Any producer who does not want to measure and report his own wheat acres can request measurement service. This request must be filed in the county office by May 1. The cost for this service is \$7.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each plot over one.

Grazing Wheat Acres

There has been much misunderstanding on whether wheat could be grazed this year and still used for certificate payment and history purposes. We have been advised that the regulations on this will remain the same as last year. Wheat that is grazed can be used for certificate payment credit and for history purposes.

Abandoned Wheat Acres

Producers who abandon wheat acreage due to natural causes and want this acreage to be credited as wheat for payment needs to file a request for this credit only if the land will be replanted to another crop this year. If the land will be summer-fallowed or left no request is necessary.

Cotton And Other Crops

Any producer who plants cotton or grain sorghum and loses the crop due to natural causes will need to file a request for cotton credit if he will replant the land to another crop. This is important to cotton producers as they will need to file this request before replanting the land to some other crop if the acreage is to be credited as cotton for payment and history.

Wheat Loans

The maturity date for 1967 wheat loans is April 30. Producers having wheat under loan will have three options: (1) redeem the collateral by repaying the loan plus interest (2) Forfeiture of the receipt to CCC and (3) Request to have the loan extended. This request must be made by April 30. If the loan is extended, the producer keeps possession of the wheat and pays

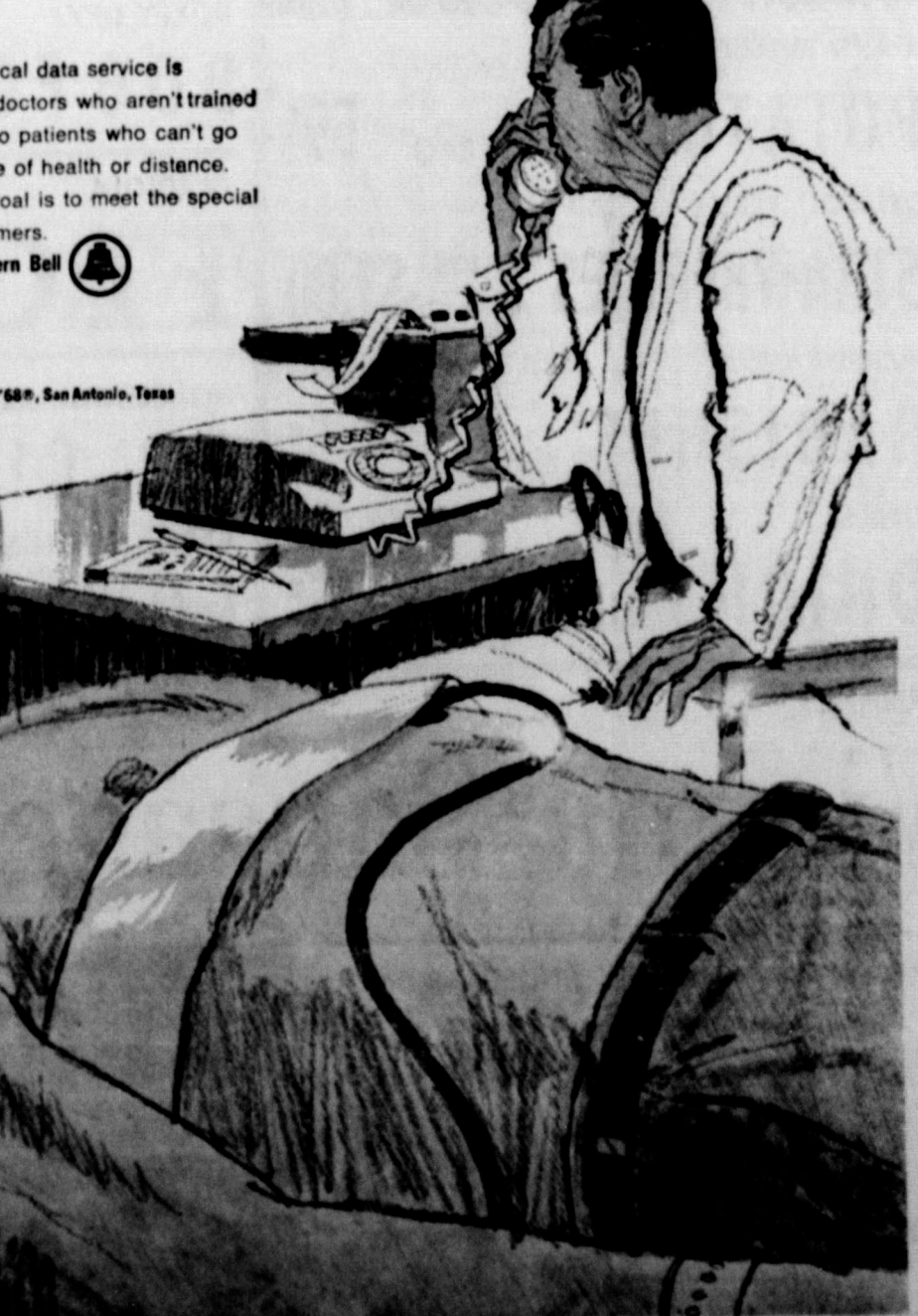
