Petition Asking Chief Of Police Be Elected Has Over 260 Signers

Petitions are being circulated this week by R. H. Henry, R. L. Gragg, E. F. Gilbow and Elmer Russell asking the city commissioners to call an election to decide whether the Chief of Police should be an elective office or should remain as it is now.

According to reports Thursday afternoon the petition has over 260 signers. According to law the petition only requires 10 per cent of the qualified voters which in this instance would be 110.

The petition will probably be presented to the commissioners at their regular meeting October 21. The law requires that the city manager has five days to look over the petition to ascertain if there is enough qualified voters before presenting it to the commissioners for final action.

Vote Fight In Wichita Is Decided

Appeals Court Holds Sartin's Petition Is Incomplete

The Second Court of Civil Appeals held in Fort Worth Tuesday that a trial court got the right result but used the wrong method in denying a Wichita County election contest in which B. D. Sartin claimed that he, and not Guy McNeely is the Democratic nominee for county judge.

In a specially-called opinion day set because of the "importance of the question and the shortness of time before the general election ticket must be printed," the court rendered a highly technical opinion in which it reversed and remanded the case, but declared the right result was achieved in the trial court.

Associate Justice Speer, who wrote the opinion, said Sartin's petition did not state a cause for action entitling him to the writs of mandamus and injunction which he sought. The justice said that a general demurrer should have been sustained in the trial court and Sartin should have been granted leave to amend his petition if he had so desired. Instead, the trial court submitted the question to a jury, which held that McNeely was the nominee.

Sartin's suit was based on the contention that by virtue of receiving a plurality in the first Democratic primary, he was nominee. The claim was asserted because, Sartin alleged, the Democratic executive committee did not officially and legally call the second primary.

The court held that there was a grave question of whether Sartin should be estopped from asserting that claim because he went ahead and ran off the race with McNeely and did not file his suit until the latter had won the runoff.

"He could not acquiesce in the acts of the committee and its chairman, and speculate upon the results of a second primary, and, after being defeated at the last election, repudiate the act of the primary and rely upon the results of the first," Judge Speer wrote.

Sartin sought to mandamus Julian McFall, county clerk, and C. C. Hudson, county Democratic chairman, to put his name on the general election ballot.

Burk And Electra Meet In Only 2-AA Conference Game

Bitter Series Renewed
Champions Of Last Season
Evenly Matched With Burk
Having Slight Advantage

The opening district melee in 2-AA football will be played here Friday under the lights when the Electra Tigers tangle with the Burk Bulldogs in the only conference game of this district. Electra are the defending champions and Burk is the baby team in the 8-team circuit.

So far, in losing an opener, 7-0, to Nocona and falling before Plainview 33-0, the Tigers have shown little of the strength that carried them to the conference crest last fall. Burk Burnett too has exhibited only a medium amount of ability in shadowing Nocona by one touchdown and being tromped by Cisco 27-13.

The Bulldogs were idle the past weekend, and their touchdown advantage on the basis of the Nocona series brands them as slight favorites to slap a third straight loss on the boys of Gentleman George Blair.

Hillmen Improve Fast
Coach Volney Hill's team, rated as one of the lower division occupants by pre-season dope, has improved steadily since the opening of practice Sept. 2. Without a lot of veteran material and lacking game experience the squad has come along fast to make unexpectedly impressive showings in its games so far.

The only direct comparison between the Tigers and the Bulldogs this year is the score of the Nocona games. Burk Burnett defeated Nocona 7 to 0. Nocona defeated Electra the following week 6 to 0.

The Electra Tigers will bring the prestige of their district championship to this game.

For The Consumer

The consumer who walks into the modern retail store today has a far better chance of getting what he wants and what he pays for than did the consumer of yesterday. And one reason for that lies in the progress that has been made in informative, accurate labeling of foods, drugs, cosmetics and other commodities.

If a packaged or canned product is top-quality, it says so. And if it is below the best standard, it says so too, with equal frankness. Its net weight must be plainly printed. If artificial colorings or flavorings have been added, that must be admitted. The same rule applies to most merchandise from hardware to silk slips—a customer is advised of the quality he pays for.

What has caused that salutary advance? The answer must take into account several factors. The law is one—labeling legislation has been widely perfected and such bodies of the Federal Trade Commission have done excellent work in showing the packager who tries to fool the people that misrepresentation doesn't pay. Consumer groups must also be given their share of credit—they have worked with other groups involved to good effect. And last but not least has been the influence of the modern retailer, who literally operates on the principle that the consumers' interest is his interest.

The organized retailers, chain and independent, have shown an extremely progressive spirit in working with canners, packagers, manufacturers, and the representatives of the consumed. They have analyzed the many problems involved, and have helped advance the logical solutions. Modern retailers compete aggressively with each other when it comes to getting business—but they are only too glad to cooperate when the welfare of the consumer is involved. American merchandising, as it exists today, seems to have proven itself to be the most efficient distribution system ever devised for supplying the public with necessities as well as luxuries in maximum variety and quality at minimum cost.

Financing Rearmament

Financing the arms program will require tremendous sums of money.

It will be up to the taxpayers of the present and the future to buy airplanes, warships, rifles, tanks, and all other needed weapons, and to pay for the maintenance of naval and military forces. These expenses must be borne by the public alone.

Equally important is that part of the cost which can be borne by private industry. Before an airplane can be built there must be a factory—before a battleship's keel can be laid down there must be a shipyard—before a soldier can be issued a uniform there must be a tailoring plant to make it for him. And here is where private money should be used to the limit. The commercial banks have pledged their willingness to make loans for defense needs. So have the investment bankers, whose work is to dispose of industrial securities to raise capital for plant expansion and to provide operating capital. There is no lack of private savings ready to go to work in this country today, to create the tools necessary for building American security.

There has been talk of putting the government even more widely than at present into the business of providing this capital, through such lending agencies as the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. Not one cent of government money should be used in this manner until it has been definitely proven that private capital for the purpose is unobtainable. Only if that is done, can the democratic system be preserved, and the direct cost of defense to the taxpayers be kept at the lowest possible level.

The buildings and grounds in Dallas represent more than \$15,000,000. That the people of Texas appreciate their own fair is shown by the fact that an all-time record in the 51-year history of the exposition was set last year when 1,036,708 persons passed through the turnstiles.

A few days ago, your columnist strolled around the grounds where crews were putting things in readiness for the opening on October 5. Looking at the double row of great exhibit halls with the long pool between, one could visualize the scene that soon would come into existence under the star-spangled Texas sky—silver fountains, thousands of many-colored lights, throngs slowly shuffling past the giant murals, the dull hum of voices, the throb of music in the distance, and the pungent odor of mustard-smearing hot dogs.

Many educational features have been arranged—an exhibit from Mexico, historical, archaeological and handicrafts; a citrus display from the tropical Lower Rio Grande Valley; an exhibit from the fruit belt of Cherokee, Panoia, Nacogdoches, Rusk and Shel-

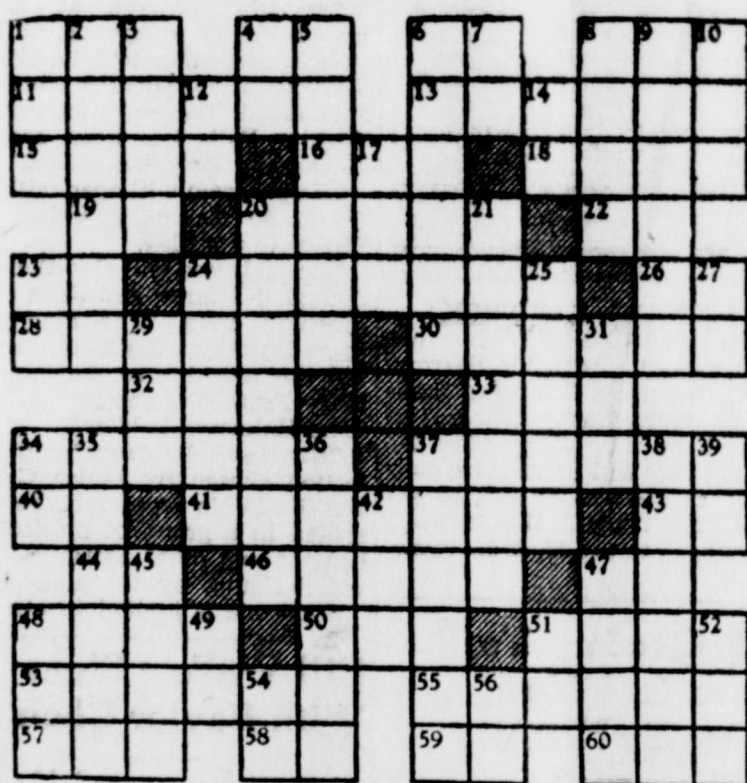

Q. Are any Texas dailies and Texas weeklies using newsprint produced in Texas?

A. Yes. The Fourth Estate in Texas is cooperating more and more with this new Texas industry.

Bargain: In 1810, Vincente Micheli bought 22,142 acres of Texas land from two Indians, "Son of the Left-Handed One," and "Little Dark One," for the following considerations: one blue tunic, one white shirt, eight brass bracelets, a portion of vermilion, one bundle of red ribbon, one gun and fifty shots of powder with balls. This information, Bascom Giles, commissioner of the general land office, states is contained in the Spanish Archives of the land office. Micheli asked the Mexican government to confirm title to the land, but, believing the amount paid to be exorbitant, the government confirmed title for only half the amount of land (two leagues).

Q. What is the enrollment of the University of Texas?

A. Enrollment for the last long session ending June 3, was 11,000 the largest in the history of the University. It is the ninth largest University in the United States.

Q. What is the proportion of men to women in the University of Texas?

A. Approximately seven to three.

Q. How large is the faculty of the University?

A. There are 560 persons on the faculty: 155 professors, forty-eight associate professors, fifty-nine assistant professors, 145 instructors, and 155 tutors.

Historical: J.L.C. Beaman, publisher, contributes the following historical information: Jim Wells county was named for Judge James B. Wells and was organized in 1912. Judge Wells was a prominent South Texas citizen. The Orange Grove Observer was

established in 1924 by Garland Buck, deceased, and in 1928 was purchased by Mr. Beaman. Oil field developments in the Orange Grove area are developing the section.

Q. Is the son or daughter of a World War veteran given any preference in state schools of higher education?

A. No. A bill to waive entrance fees for World War orphans has been on the calendar of the state legislature each of the past several years but has failed to become a law.

Q. Is there any loan fund available for children of deceased or disabled World War veterans?

A. Yes. The Texas department of American Legion Auxiliary has a student loan fund that was set up in 1934. To date more than fifty sons and daughters of deceased or disabled World War veterans have had loans totalling more than \$20,000 and of the sixteen students who have completed their college work and become wage earners, nine have returned all of the money they borrowed.

Two Ways To Barbecue At Home

Almost any woman is made of stern enough stuff for an open-air barbecue once during the out-of-door season, even to cooking the meat herself over a smoking fire. Yet, the pleasure of eating a barbecue frequently, minus the discomfort of heat and fighting off gnats and mosquitoes, may be enjoyed at home at any time by using the gas range, provided it is the modern type with controlled high-to-low temperatures.

A barbecue may be prepared by either of two ways—roasting in the oven if it is capable of maintaining a low temperature; or by broiling, if the range is the special new design with a deep, smokeless broiler and a burner having a radiant, which has become so popular.

The broiler barbecue requires a slightly longer cooking time than roasting in the oven by low temperature; but it is just as easy and the meat is tender and delicious in flavor.

For a small barbecue, use a rolled roast of lamb about 2½ pounds in weight. Do not season the meat, as the sauce supplies the seasoning. The broiler should be preheated five minutes and the roast placed on the rack in the lowest position in the compartment—which is almost ten inches from the flame; the burner is turned to the lowest possible point to maintain a flame. This low temperature, plus the burner radiance, broils the meat through in one and three-quarters hours, with but one or two turnings required.

As in all barbecues, emphasis is placed upon the sauce served with the hot, thin slices of meat. The following is a recipe treasured in a Georgia family:

2-3 sup Catsup; 1-3 cup vinegar;

1-3 cup Worcestershire sauce; 1

tablespoon sugar; 1 teaspoon prepared mustard; few grains Cayenne; juice and grated rind of 1 lemon; 1 teaspoon salt; 2 tablespoons meat drippings; 1 medium onion, grated.

Combine all ingredients in a saucepan and boil over the simmer unit of a top gas burner for five minutes. Serve warm with slices of the meat.

For an oven-roasted barbecue, any one of these three types of meat may be used: eye of the round of beef, leg of pork, boned and rolled, or leg of lamb, boned and rolled.

Place a three-pound roast, unseasoned, on a trivet in an uncovered shallow roasting pan. Roast at a low oven temperature of 300 degrees Fahrenheit, for one and three quarters to two hours. If using the cold start method, five to eight minutes should be added to the roasting period.

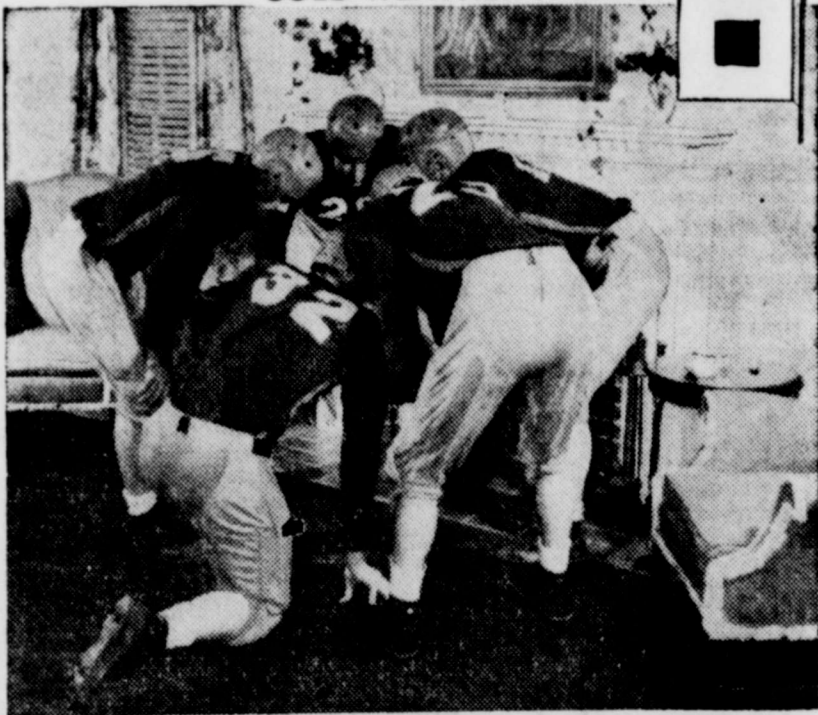

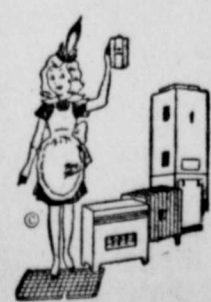

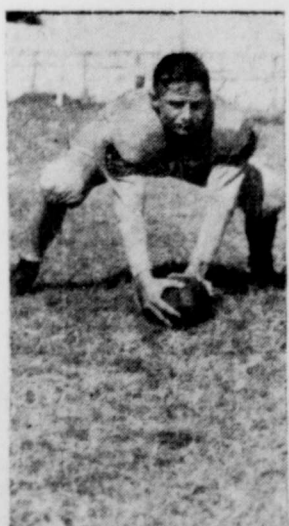

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DON'T KILL TREES

By J. S. GORE

Soon after coming to Burkburnett I became interested in trying to beautify back yards and vacant lots, most of which had been more or less damaged by waste oil and abandoned oil wells.

Combining the knowledge of my boyhood days in the orchard of my father and many interesting articles by noted horticulturists and a few bulletins from U. S. department of Agriculture with my experiments which resulted in growing radishes sixteen inches long; strawberries larger than any that have been shipped from regular berry growers; very large pears on two year old trees, and peaches too large for Mason jar necks, am hoping I may at least help others to avoid killing their trees.

Remember, oily dust blows into your yard, and no doubt some petroleum is in your soil, caused by drip from car when standing, besides that resulting from the boom day carelessness. When you allow the water to run down around the roots of trees it not only carries more or less oil to root of tree, but leaves soil very soft, permitting the usual swaying of the tree by wind, to loosen the roots and leaves large open spaces around tree to become the

harbor for termites, tree borer, cracks in bark of trunk when soil is not kept

When necessary better results can be made by making a broad trench around tree at inches of firm soil to keep water from and force water into feeder roots, while die while tree is water all going to tree to the tap root er roots dry.

Much better and may be secured after each watering, weeds, or old cotton moisture, or by soil as soon as being sure to mulch soil cracks very dry air down to roots.

Murray Evans' Kicking Big Factor At H-S-U.

Because of the educated toe of Murray (Boom Town) Evans, fair haired son of Burkburnett, the Hardin-Simmons Cowboys slate was clean today as Coach Frank Kimbrough's Ranchers worked to fill their host role in the annual Rose Festival game, with Arizona State of Tempe, at Tyler, next Saturday.

For the second year in a row, Murray, a junior center, provided the boot that gave the Cowboys a thrilling 15-13 win over Centenary's Gentlemen, at Shreveport.

With two minutes to play, the Cowboys trailing by a point, 12-13, after he'd missed two earlier conversion kicks, and fourth down for the Cowboys on the Centenary 17, Murray dropped back to the 25, and with Co-captain Owen Goodnight holding, booted it true between the posts from a difficult angle for victory.

A year ago, when a sophomore fullback, Evans booted the conversion point that won for Hardin-Simmons, over Centenary, 7 to 6, after Kirk McKinnon's 95-yard run back of a kickoff tied the score.

This year, converted by Coach Frank Kimbrough into a role as substitute center, and a successor to Clyde (Bulldog) Turner, last year's all-American now the starting pivot for the Chicago Bears, Evans had twice missed conversion kicks after first half touchdowns by the Cowboys, before he provided the story book finish to the game.

At Burkburnett, Evans played fullback in 1937, when Volney Hill's eleven won its district, defeated Stamford in a hectic 26-20 bi-district playoff, and romped over Putnam, 54-0, in the regional Class B final. He played center his junior year. A 1937 teammate, Tolle McKown, is now a sophomore in the H-SU backfield.

To Round Up Antelope By Airplane

An airplane will replace horsemen when the Texas game department resumes trapping of antelope in West Texas next month, it is announced. Trapping of antelope on over-grazed areas and the transportation of them to less heavily grazed land is necessary because the fleet animals will not jump fences higher than three feet.

The game department, using a technique developed by the New Mexico department, trapped nearly 300 antelope near Sterling City last fall. Horsemen were used to round up the antelope and drive them through a series of pens into a corral, where they were picked up, placed in crates and transported to their new homes sometimes more than 200 miles distant. Despite the fact antelope are extremely wild when attempts are made to drive them, so successful was the trapping of them last year that only six of the animals were killed.

Experiments by game managers in attempting to turn antelope in any direction desired by the use of an airplane has proved successful, it is said. With a plane flying no lower than 500 feet, antelope can be directed. It is expected that not only will the game department be able to cut its trapping crew from a dozen men to four, but that twice as many antelope can be trapped in half the time. This will mean an appreciable saving to the department and also that more areas suitable for antelope which are not now stocked can be populated with the pronghorns.

There is now a closed season on antelope in Texas due to the fact that the animals decreased to a few thousand because of over-shooting. The game department is working toward an open season. This will mark the first attempt by any game department to round up and trap antelope by use of an airplane.

If the rounding up of antelope with an airplane is as successful as it is expected, several hundred additional section of West Texas land may soon be populated with the excellent game animal. More than 200 section of land were stocked with the pronghorns trapped last year. Antelope will not thrive in wooded areas, but there is much open land in West Texas upon which they will do well.

Javelinas Are Increasing

Javelinas, also called Collard, Peccary, the only native North American wild hog, are increasing in Texas, reports of game managers to the executive secretary of the State game, fish and oyster commission indicate.

The increase is largely due to the protection given this game animal by a state law which went into effect last year. It is now unlawful to shoot Peccaries except during the open season of Nov. 15 to Dec. 31. It is permissible to kill two during a season.

Javelinas are more common in Southwest Texas counties. They formerly ranged in far more areas than they now do, but the killing of them for meat, for their hides and for their bristles threatened the extinction of these animals.

Judging from requests for information concerning javelina hunting received by the game department, a large number of hunters from other states will invade Texas seeking Javelinas during the open season. Their heads are regarded by many sportsmen as a finer trophy than deer heads.

Skunk Tackles Terrapin

Whether a skunk which was seen recently attempting to bite the head off a terrapin was trying to get a meal or was merely playing with it like a cat does a mouse is problematical. The skunk was watched for a half hour by a state game warden. Frequently it would hold the terrapin down with one foot while attempting to bite its head off every time the terrapin came out of its shell. Then the skunk would back off and quietly watch for the terrapin to emerge. The "game" was still going on when the warden drove away.

Winter Food For Quail

This is the time of the year when landowners should start thinking about feeding quail during the rugged days of winter and the time when sportsmen should urge the owners of their favorite quail shooting grounds to help the birds. With a marked increase in Bobwhites being reported from many sections of Texas, it is more necessary than ever to leave food standing for these birds. A few rows of grain left standing at the field edges, is the best insurance possible for carrying over the game and insectivorous birds into the next year.

Talk About Tough Fish

A catfish so tough that the steaks had to be pounded like they were pieces of a longhorn steer was caught recently by Timothy Gray of Bandera, Texas. The huge cat weighed 45½ pounds. It's the first time we ever heard of a fish so tough steaks from it had to be pounded before being palatable.

Antelope trapping is one of the half-dozen game restoration projects being carried on by the department under the Pittman-Robertson program with the aid of federal funds, which are obtained by an excise tax on arms and ammunition.

In addition to rounding up antelope, it is possible the plane, which will be rented, will be used for making game surveys. It is impossible to make accurate counts of big game by surveys from the ground. It takes but a short time to count big game in any given area from the air. Such information is extremely useful in game management.

Gossett Bill To Bar Imported Oil Refused

Passage of a bill extending the national stolen property act to confiscated oil was urged in the house Tuesday by Representative Ed Gossett, according to special dispatches to Texas newspapers.

Replying to objections that the measure would antagonize someone, Gossett said, "This bill specifies no one except the wrongdoer whom we seek to restrain."

"We seek to protect our nationals from unfair competition from within the country, we certainly have the right and the duty to protect them from unfair competition from without this country, and I do not think it becoming of our great country to pussyfoot in any particular with wrongdoers," he declared.

The Texan pointed out that thousands of men are employed in the oil business in his district and declared that their standards of living and jobs "are entitled to protection from unfair competition from imported foreign oil, especially from importation of oil that has been stolen or confiscated."

The bill which was aimed particularly at imports of oil confiscated from American companies by the Mexican government, would authorize the president to ban its importation. The house defeated it later in the day, 109 to 103.
