## Annual Reports Of ARC Workers Given

A review of the past year's operations of the Eastland County chapter of the American Red Cross was presented by committee chairman during the annual meeting of the county ARC unit held in Eastland at the office of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, Aug. 12.

Mrs. E. E. Freyschlag, county chapter leader, presided.

During the past 12 months, according to a report presented at the session, a total of 624 families were assisted by the American Red Cross under the direction of Rev. Otto Marshall, chairman of the home service committee. Of this number, there were 274 families requiring extensive case work. The total cost of this program amounted to \$2,527.97.

Mrs. John Love, fund campaign chairman, reported that the quota for the past year was \$7,194 and that to date a total of \$6,770.91 has been raised.

Mrs. Charles Sandler, blood program chairman of Cisco, stated that the quota of 718 pints of blood had almost been reached. A total of 708 pints were donated by the people of Eastland County.

Mrs. Bill Tucker, home nursing chairman, reported that the chapter now has three trained home nursing instructors and that during the past year three classes have been completed in home care of the sick. The next class is now

### New Seed Law Goes In Effect On September 1

A new seed testing law for Texas becomes effective on Sept. 1. John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture, said that laboratories at Austin and Lubbock will test farm and vegetable seed for germination and purity.

The cost will be \$2.50 for each test. Exceptions will be chaffy grasses, native grasses, mixtures and trashy seed, for which a \$5 fee will be charged.

To finance the inspection, a charge of 2c per bag will be made on seed sold. The present rate is 1c per bag. Agriculture Department officials said the charge would not apply to garden-seed packets of vegetable seed.

### Senator Byrd Urges Limit of National Debt

Senator Byrd of Virginia said that hope for balancing the budget rests almost entirely on keeping the present \$275,000,000 debt limit.

"If we can retain this present debt ceiling, there is some hope of balancing the budget," he said in a copyrighted interview with the magazine World Report. "But if we keep on borrowing the money, there's no hope at all."

Byrd successfully opposed the Eisenhower administration's effort to have Congress boost the limit from \$275,000,000 to \$290,000,000. He was one of the 114 majority of the Senate finance committee which blocked action on the proposed increase during the closing days of Congress. The debt now is about \$272,500,000,000.

Byrd said he regards that controversy as "one of the milestones in the preservation of the solvency of our government." If the debt continues to rise, he said, it will go "over the precipice of financial disaster."

Some \$600,000,000 of the public debt is not subject to the legal debt limit of \$275,000,000,000.

### New Moisture Saves Peanuts, Other Crops

Drought-breaking, crop-making rains ranging from one to four inches have soaked parched Eastland County and adjoining areas during the past 18 hours.

The rains were so general that no dry areas had been reported at noon today.

The first heat-breaking moisture drizzled earthward as a shower mid-afternoon Tuesday. This initial downpour was more or less general, but very light in some sections.

Shortly after midnight, however, heavily-clouded skies again began to weep and in the pre-dawn hours the county received a real drenching.

According to a roundup of reports at noon today, Eastland's precipitation totaled 1.25. Ranger's moisture was gauged at 1.91. Rising Star reported 1.98, bringing the total for that area since Sunday afternoon to around 3 inches.

At Pioneer and Cross Plains, the rains were much heavier, with the total for the week ranging up to more than five inches. Olden's precipitation was 1.25. Carbon received more than one inch as did Gorman, where the best shower in several weeks has been gauged.

In the north portion of the county ranchers in various sections report up to three and four inches, and the best rains in many weeks. At least one large earthen dam, owned by Judge L. R. Pearson of Ranger, was washed away. "We are in good shape up here," stated John Nix, who lives 8 miles north of Eastland near the Stephens county line.

The No. 3 plant of the Lone Star Gas Company was reported flooded at 9 a.m. Earlier this morning, it was reported that about three-feet of water covered the Breckenridge Highway in some spots. By 9 a.m., however, it had subsided to two feet and was going down steadily.

Tanks and creeks are all full, and range conditions are better than at any time in many months. Growing crops, it now appears, will show good returns at harvest season even without additional rain.

Much water was impounded in both the Eastland and Ranger municipal lakes. The Eastland reservoir is reported at its highest mark in history. At Ranger City Manager Lester Crossley reported that the Ranger lake was filled to the brim assuring a plentiful supply of water until the new Eastland County Water Supply District dam and giant water supply is completed.

Both cities have water supplies to carry them safely for more than a year, it was reported at noon today.

### Pfc. C. R. Rogers Is Serving With Unit In Korea

WITH THE 7TH INFANTRY DIV. IN KOREA—Pfc. Carlie R. Rogers, whose wife, Vespell, lives at 701 Bonham St., Grand Prairie, is serving in Korea with the 7th Infantry Division.

The 7th Division, which made the amphibious landing at Inchon in September 1950 has carried the fight to the Communists in every sector of Korea from Pusan in the South to the Yalu River in the North.

Rogers, son of C. R. Rogers (mother deceased) of Ranger, is a mechanic in Battery C of the 31st Field Artillery Battalion. He entered the Army in March 1952, received basic training at Fort Ord, Calif., and arrived overseas this March. Rogers is a 1948 graduate of Doddams High School and was an employee of the Lone Star Gas Company in Grand Prairie in civilian life.

### Young Fathers Get Warning By Draft Head

Attention, draft-age papas and expectant fathers in the Eastland County vicinity:

You have but one week in which to report to the Eastland Selective Service Board about your children—or be liable for induction into the U. S. armed forces.

Stike Selective Service Director Paul L. Wakefield reminded such men of the Aug. 24 deadline today.

Draft-age men who become fathers or expectant fathers on or after Aug. 25 no longer will be eligible for deferment because of dependency, under an executive order of President Eisenhower.

"Draft-age fathers and men expecting children had best act now, as notification later than midnight of Aug. 24 will not permit local boards to classify such men as 3-A for their dependents," said Wakefield.

#### OUTPUT RISES

Domestic crude oil and lease condensate showed a daily average gain of 18,050 barrels to 6,554,350 during the week ended Aug. 15, the Oil and Gas Journal said today.

Cumulative production for 1953 is now 1,463,303,250 barrels compared to 1,394,475,675 a year ago.

Texas production was reported unchanged at 2,884,575.

Gainers included Oklahoma, up 1,900 to 552,200; Louisiana, up 1,600 to 696,275; and Arkansas, 1,400 to 78,000. New Mexico was down 100 barrels to 199,950.

### Three Named To City's Tax Review Board

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### Harvest Vegetables Young For Top Table Quality



See 7-Foot Row of Radishes Every Week and Eat Them Young and Crisp.

Amateur gardeners alone can enjoy the luxury of young vegetables. They cannot be found in the markets because buyers prefer big ones, and the young vegetables do not keep well. By picking vegetables as soon as they are large enough to serve, which may mean when half grown, the amateur grows the harvest and learns about delicious flavor which cannot be preserved.

Until it reaches full maturity the best place for any vegetable is growing in the garden rather than frozen, or in a refrigerator. But those that grow fast, especially, should be harvested before full maturity, because after that point they begin to deteriorate. Timing is the secret of enjoying quality from your own garden.

Pick radishes before they turn pithy. Carrots as large as your little finger make a dish long remembered. Beets just forming, cooked with their leaves, are delicious. If you pick snap beans before seed have begun to show in the pods, they are at the top of tenderness and flavor, and the bushes will keep bearing until insects or disease kills them.

While parsnips retain their quality even after the ground freezes, they are delicious when very young. All summer squash, including the zucchini, cocozelle and Turk's cap varieties, are at their best when only a few days old; and if these young fruits are kept picked off, the plant will

produce almost as much in weight as when fruits are allowed to reach full maturity.

There is a certain point when peas reach the height of their sweetness, and the gardener who has learned to know the signs and harvests peas to be cooked within an hour, will feast upon a dish of rare perfection. Sweet corn has a similar peak of perfection, which gardeners learn to recognize. Both these vegetables begin to lose flavor within a few minutes after they are picked, due to their sugar changing to starch.

Leaf vegetables should not be allowed to grow old. Swiss chard, which will keep producing edible leaves all summer, if the old ones are picked off, is commonly allowed to grow too large. Never let the leaves grow longer than 10 inches; when they grow larger, cut them off and throw away, to encourage tender new ones that replace them. New Zealand spinach, another all-summer green, makes huge bushes, but only the tips of the stems should be cut off for cooking. A few plants will supply the family, because new and tender tips will constantly be formed.

In contrast to all these, tomatoes should be allowed to stay on the home garden plants longer than they do on the commercial grower's, because they are picked for the market before they are ripe. The flavor of a vine ripened fruit is far superior.

## Home Demonstration Agent Hints On Fall and Winter Gardening

It is true that most spring gardens in the county were not very productive because of the drought and hot, dry winds, but there is still a chance for a fall garden.

Take a look around in your garden that you started last spring and see if there are any plants that have survived the hot summer weather. They may still produce this fall if you give them a little help.

Such plants as tomatoes, okra, peppers, pole butter beans and possibly black-eyed peas can be rejuvenated. Feed them fertilizer, working and watering into the soil around the plants. About a half cup full of 5-10-5 around each plant should be sufficient. Be sure to water thoroughly.

If the plants have not been previously mulched spread hay about three or four inches deep around the plant over an area of about three to four feet. Mulch keeps moisture in the soil longer, keeps the ground cool, and keeps down weeds and grass. In dry weather these old plants will need to be watered about every five to seven days.

There are other vegetables that you can plant now for vegetables in early fall and winter. Germination at this season of the year is usually poor. It is well to increase the rate of seeding about 25 per cent over that used in the spring garden in order to obtain a good stand. If you soak seeds overnight before planting be sure to irrigate the soil well before planting the seeds.

The ground should be pressed down firmly around the seeds. Cover the row with a mulch of hay or similar material to a depth of about 2 inches until the plants begin to come up. Stir the soil frequently to conserve moisture and prevent soil packing. If gardens are irrigated it is a good idea to stir the soil just as soon as it is dry enough to pulverize.

Avoid deep cultivation. In irrigating it is better to make a shallow furrow between the rows where the water may run slowly and penetrate to the roots of the plants. This is considered better than rapid irrigation or sprinkling over the soil.

So that the vegetables will grow off fast and be flavorful, use commercial fertilizer. With irrigation use about three pounds of a complete fertilizer such as 5-10-5 to 1-foot row space. Keep a sharp lookout for insects and have a supply of insecticide on hand to take care of any pest outbreaks.

These vegetables may be planted now to mature before frost: Greenbeans (Tendergreen, Topcrop, Stringless Green Pod), mustard (Tendergreen, Florida Broadleaf), Irish Potatoes (Bliss Triumph), radishes (Scarlet Globe), Squash (Early Prolific Straightneck). These will withstand light frost: English Peas (Laxton's Progress), Turnips (Purpletop, Shogoin), Lettuce (Great Lakes, Salad Bowl), Cabbage (Copenhagen, Charleston Wakefield), Beets (Detroit Dark Red), Swiss Chard (Lucullus).

These will withstand heavy frost: Collards (Georgia, Louisiana Sweet), Spinach (Bloomsdale), Carrots (Danvers Half Long, Chantenay).

Details and specific information on planting individual vegetables such as how deep to plant, how far apart to thin plants in the row, recommended varieties, etc., can be obtained from Extension Bulletin C-59 on "Fall and Winter Gardening" or B-70, "Gardening." These bulletins may be obtained at the County Home Demonstration Agent's office in the courthouse in Eastland.

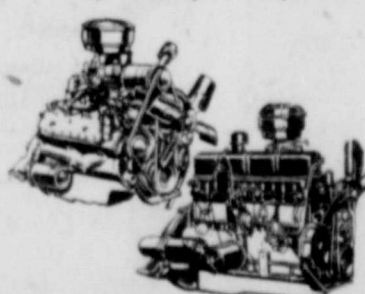

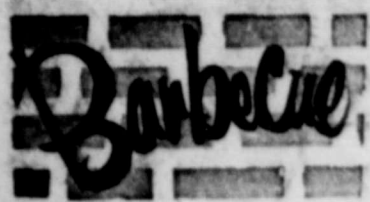

Col. Garland Williams, director of intelligence for the Internal Revenue Service, has indicated a lot more might be collected if more tax investigations were available.

The Austin office was third in the nation with gambling tax collections of \$74,223 in June, the last month for which figures are available. Indianapolis led with \$113,099. Chicago was second with \$75,975, and New Orleans came in fourth with \$63,709 collected during the month.

Not a single gambling stamp was sold at Dallas during June and only 12 were sold in the past year. By comparison, there are 1,644 stamp holders in the Austin district. Twenty were sold in June.

The law making purchase of the tax stamps mandatory for gambling operators was passed by Congress in the wake of the Kefauver crime investigations. The purpose of the law was to force gambling into the open, where they could be prosecuted by local officials, observers recalled.

The Internal Revenue Service had no explanation of why gambling should be more prevalent in South Texas than in the northern portion of the state.

However, observers pointed out that Galveston, which is in the Austin collection district, has been accused of allowing widespread gambling activities.
