Architect Sues Mrs. Lacy Rogers

LONGVIEW, Texas, Jan. 18 (UP)—A suit for \$40,000 filed against Mrs. Rogers Lacy by architect Frank Lloyd Wright has been transferred from Dallas County to 124th District Court here, it has been learned.

The petition alleges that the amount sought is the balance due Wright for preliminary drawings for a huge Dallas hotel planned by Mrs. Lacy's late husband, a wealthy East Texas oilman.

It states that \$10,000 of the contracted \$50,000 fee was paid by Lacy before his death and the suit seeks to collect the balance plus interest.

Plans for construction of the hotel were in abeyance at the time of Lacy's death and have never been reinstated.

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
