## Stanolind Well Is 1,279 Barrel Producer

### County Electrification Program Completed

#### Near Two Hundred Miles Of Line To Be Erected Here

#### Over Four Hundred To Be Served By Unit

The completion of the organization of the Rural Electrification Program in this county was announced this week, with a total of 481 members in the county signed up for the service.

Present plans call for the erection of approximately 200 miles of line in Dawson County, with a sub-station located in Lamesa.

Maps have been completed and are now in Washington awaiting only the approval of the Federal government, before actual construction can be started.

According to Rip Spraberry, one of the leaders of the move, it is expected that actual construction will get under way within the next few weeks.

Tentative plans call for the servicing of Hancock, McCarty, Key, Midway, Sparenberg, Patricia, Klondike and Welch, with service extended to homes between these different communities.

There is little doubt in the minds of the leaders of the movement, that government approval will be received on the project as sent in. Thus another dream is about to be fulfilled in Dawson County and she will take her place among the progressive counties of the State and Nation.

It is noted that, although this first project is complete, it does not mean that those who did not sign at first will be excluded. They may go ahead with a new project according to those in charge of the movement.

#### Enrollment Goes Higher As School Enters 2nd Week

#### Total Reaches 1,475, And Is Still Gaining

The enrollment grows. On Monday, September 18, the Elementary School enrollment for Lamesa Public Schools jumped to 905 and the High School enrollment reached 540 for a total enrollment of 1,445 white pupils.

The enrollment in the colored school has reached 30 pupils for a grand total of 1,475 pupils.

This is still short of the number which may be expected from the census rolls and from the transfer list.

#### Pierce's Toggery Are Celebrating 20th Anniversary

#### Pioneer Merchants Started In 1919

Pierce's Toggery of Lamesa this week are celebrating their Twentieth Anniversary in business in Lamesa.

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pierce came to Dawson County in 1914, settling on a farm which they had purchased, in the Woody community.

At that time they purchased their present building on the west side of the square, which they have occupied since.

Mr. and Mrs. Pierce claim the distinction of being the oldest firm in town under the same name and management.

Besides the store building, they own a beautiful home in Lamesa as well as several pieces of real property, both in town and country. #### Official Test Is Run This Week On Field Discovery

#### To Drill More Wells In Vicinity Is Report

Latest reports available from the Stanolind Oil and Gas Company Jeanette Raynor No. 1, discovery well in Eastern Gaines County, is that by official test the well made 1279 barrels of pipeline oil in 24 hours.

It is understood that the derrick has been removed and storage tanks constructed. Work of oiling down the roads around the well was being done Wednesday. It is not known whether the well is now flowing or whether it has been shut in awaiting proration orders.

Preliminary work is being done in the form of determining how deep the alkali is in Cedar Lake, with the idea of determining what sort of a structure to hold derrick and build base for road, for an offset to be drilled in the lake. It is understood that the first well to be drilled directly west of the discovery which would throw it out in the lake.

At the time of going to press it had not been determined how deep this formation is or how deep operators would have to go before they secure a permanent foundation on which to work.

It is understood that three offsets will be drilled in the near future. One to the west, another to the south and the third to the southwest of the discovery well. This information is reported by local operators, although it has not been confirmed by the company.

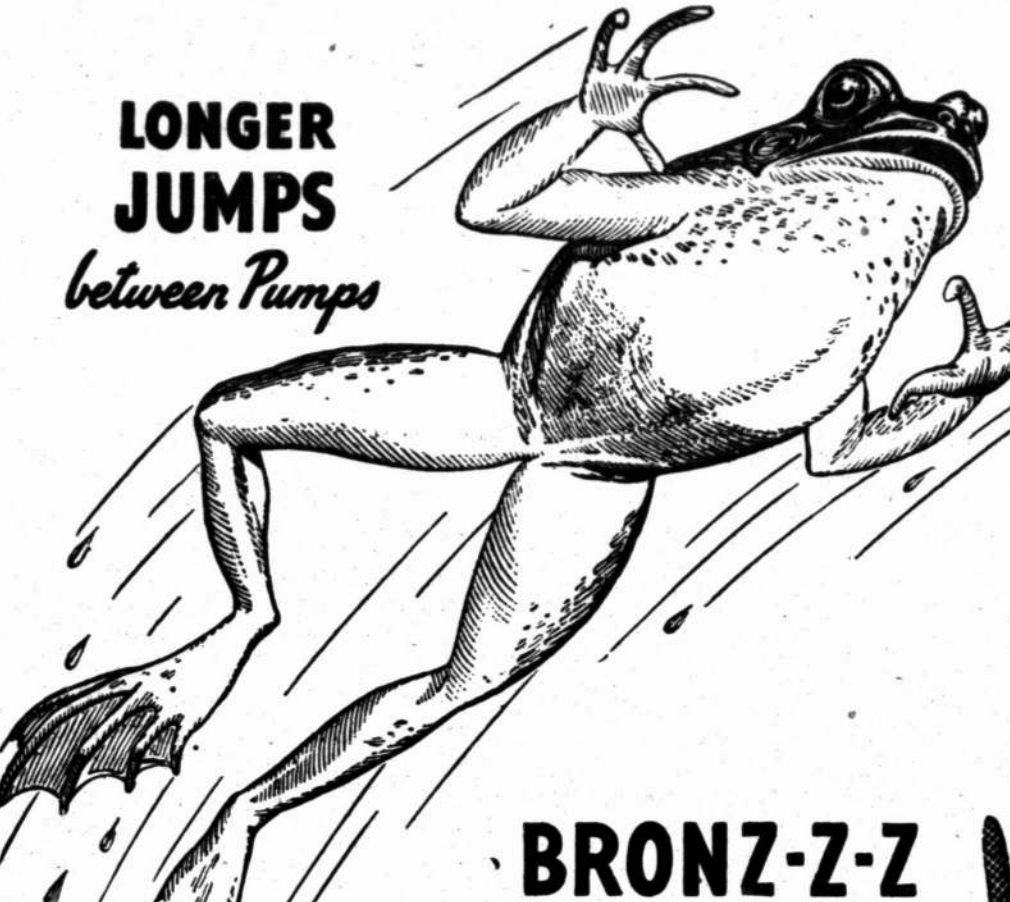

kinds of wood, which is not unusual in itself, as several years ago he had one which consisted of 100 different pieces, with each piece marked with the place it was inserted in the cane.

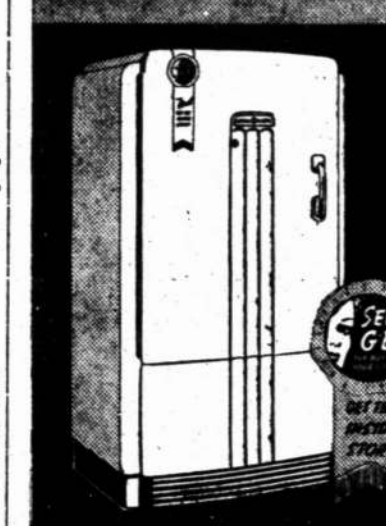

## New Figures Show Approved Census For County Down

### Lamesa Schools Show Only County Increase

The approved census roll of the county was received this week showing a severe decrease in scholastics for the county as a whole. Last year's enumeration was 4,220 while this year the total was reduced to 3,884. This represents the total living in Dawson county which were enumerated. The parts of Terry, Lynn, Howard, Martin, and Borden counties which are enumerated in this county runs the total to 4,015.

The loss in the county seems to be fairly uniform except for the Lamesa Independent School District which gained 75 scholastics for a total of 1,583. In the common school districts of the county only 822 were counted. This decrease was caused by the consolidation of tracts this year which took in several of the districts which were formerly common.

Klondike Independent District enumerated 359 which is a gain over last year but this gain is due to the fact that Pleasant Valley was added to their District during the past year. Spangenberg Independent and Union Independent District enumerated 325 and 324 respectively. Both of these districts show a slight loss over the past year. Dawson Independent District has a count of 285 for its first time to operate as a consolidated district. Ackerly enumerated 185 in Dawson county with another 99 in

## Farmers Warned Of Selling Crops From Govt. Acres

Dawson County farmers who planted any kind of peas on government acres are cautioned not to harvest and sell them from the farms, according to Joe M. Peterson, Chairman of County Committee.

The regulations concerning the sale of any soil conserving crops grown on government acres are very plain and easy understood, Mr. Peterson said. Peas, cane, or sudan, harvested and sold, changes the classification of the land where these crops were grown from soil conserving to soil depleting. The penalty for overplanting the general or feed acres is 5 times the rate of pay which otherwise would be received, or an average of about \$5.60 for Dawson County.

There is no restrictions however on the use of peas, cane or sudan as feed or seed on the farm where other soil building practices have been carried out to earn the soil building payment.

Several thousand dollars are turned back to the United States treasury each year from this county because of improper use of soil conserving crops. Farmers are urged to talk to their local committee man, or the county committee if there is any doubt about how to get all payment due under his application.

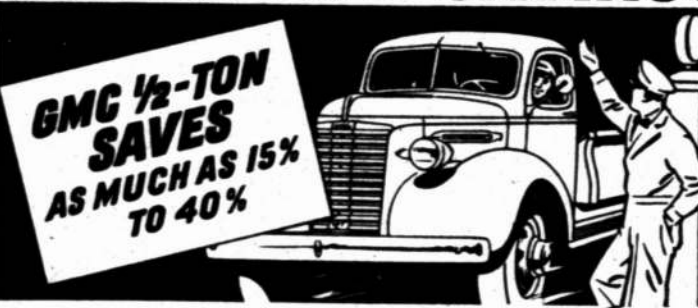

## Motor Vehicles Law Is Changed

The certificate of title act was passed by the last session of the legislature, and will eventually effect all automobile owners. This act becomes effective October 1, 1939, and applies only to automobiles sold after that date.

In other words, those persons buying or selling an automobile, either new or used, whether from a dealer or an individual, must possess a certificate of title to that machine on and after October 1, 1939. On and after January 1, 1942 all owners must have a certificate of title therefor.

The certificate of title will be mailed direct to the applicant from the highway department at Austin, Texas. After one obtains a certificate of title the automobile may then be sold by appearing before any notary public, and signing same before him. Therefore all automobiles sold after October 1, 1939 must have a certificate of title.
