Governor Asks Action On Relief Bonds

Sterling On Stand Before Upper House

Ex-Governor Says He'd Follow Same System If Had Job Again

AUSTIN (AP)—Governor Ferguson Friday sent a message to the legislature urging immediate passage of a bill to authorize issuance of state bonds to provide relief funds.

The governor said present funds for relief, made available by the federal government, will be exhausted soon. She said she was fearful of the results unless the Texas relief policy is set forth within the next week in a specific bill.

AUSTIN (UP)—Governor Ferguson submitted Friday to the legislature passage of a law to make kidnapping for ransom, extortion or robbery, a capital offense. She also submitted increasing of the personnel of the state ranger force, and twenty-six additional subjects of legislation.

AUSTIN (UP)—Former Governor Sterling told the senate Friday if he again had the duty of disbursing unemployment relief funds, he would use the same system employed during his administration.

While Sterling was governor, money was distributed through three regional chambers of commerce. Sterling said state administrative expense during his governorship was one third of one percent of money distributed.

Mob Of 3,000 Storms Steel Firm's Plant

Pickets Grab Lunch Buckets Of Workers, Rip Clothing Off Them

CLAIRTON, Penna. (UP)—A mob of over 3,000 striking coal miners stormed Clairton Friday, stormed the gates of the Carnegie Steel Company's plant, and ripped clothing from a number of workers.

Hungry pickets seized dinner buckets of men on the way to work, and devoured the contents.

The miners charge the Clairton works, the world's largest by-product plant, is using coal from the south due to mining "holiday" in Fayette county.

Nine Thousand Forest Workers To Winter In Two Score Texas Camps

AUSTIN (UP)—Nine thousand Civilian Conservation Corps workers will be in Texas this winter in 45 camps. Relief Director Lawrence Westbrook said today. The announcement came after designation of five new forestry and four new soil erosion camps.

Forestry camps added are in Nacogdoches, Trinity, Jasper, Liberty, and Walker counties. Soil erosion camps are added for Williamson, Bell, Montague and Young counties. Park camp sites have been withheld pending state arrangement for permanent maintenance. A bill for the purpose is before the legislature.

Teachers Meet Saturday For Institute And Election Of Association Officials

County League Unit To Be Formed For Year; Texas Tech Extension Classes Planned; Convention To Be Discussed

First session of the Howard County Teachers' Institute for the 1933-34 session will be combined here Saturday, October 7, with the annual organization meeting of the Howard County unit of the League of Public Interests (Inter-scholastic League) and a conference on preparations for the spring meeting of the Oil Belt Educational Association, to be held in Big Spring.

Pauline Cantrell Brigham, county superintendent of schools, Friday announced the meeting, to be convened in the district courtroom at 10 a. m. October 7.

Attendance by teachers upon institute for at least four hours a day on three days during each session is compulsory. The October 7 meeting will represent one day of institute attendance. Sessions will be 10 a. m. to 12 noon and 1:30 p. m. to 3 p. m.

An effort also will be made to organize several classes in the extension division of Texas Technological College, J. McDonald, director of the division, is expected to be present. Mrs. Brigham said many teachers, anxious to meet the new

requirements of two years of college training for teachers in state aid and standardized rural schools, are expected to avail themselves of the opportunity of doing 9 term hours of work during the school session.

Officers of the County Teachers' Association and the county unit of the Bureau of Public Interests (Inter-scholastic League) will be selected.

W. C. Blankenship, superintendent of the Big Spring schools and executive committee member of the Texas State Teachers' Association, will address the gathering in a review of the past year's activities of that organization. Blankenship also will lead a discussion of plans for the spring convention of the Oil Belt association, when nearly 1,000 teachers are expected to be in the city.

Humble Edict Being Awaited By Field Here

70 And 75 Cents Paid In Western Sector By Two Companies

With postings of 70 and 75 cents for West Texas crude oil by The Texas Company and the Magnolia Petroleum company Howard-Glasscock producers Friday afternoon anxiously awaited word from Humble Oil and Refining company, which sets the price in the local field.

The Texas Company posted 75 cents per barrel in Winkler county and 70 cents in the Crane-Upton pools, each price an increase of 10 cents.

Magnolia posted 70 cents for West Texas.

Neither company buys production in this field other than its own.

Humble's action, whether it be an increase to 70 and 5 cents, or whether it be a repetition of several instances of the past year when Humble refused to follow Texas or Magnolia hikes, will determine the price for the local field, it is presumed.

Humble's price has always been followed by Corden, Shell and Col-Tex, the other principal purchasers from this field.

Magnolia posted, effective Friday, a price of a dollar per barrel for East Texas, a hike of 10 cents. This was the price announced Thursday night by the Texas company.

Sun Oil company also announced the dollar price in East Texas.

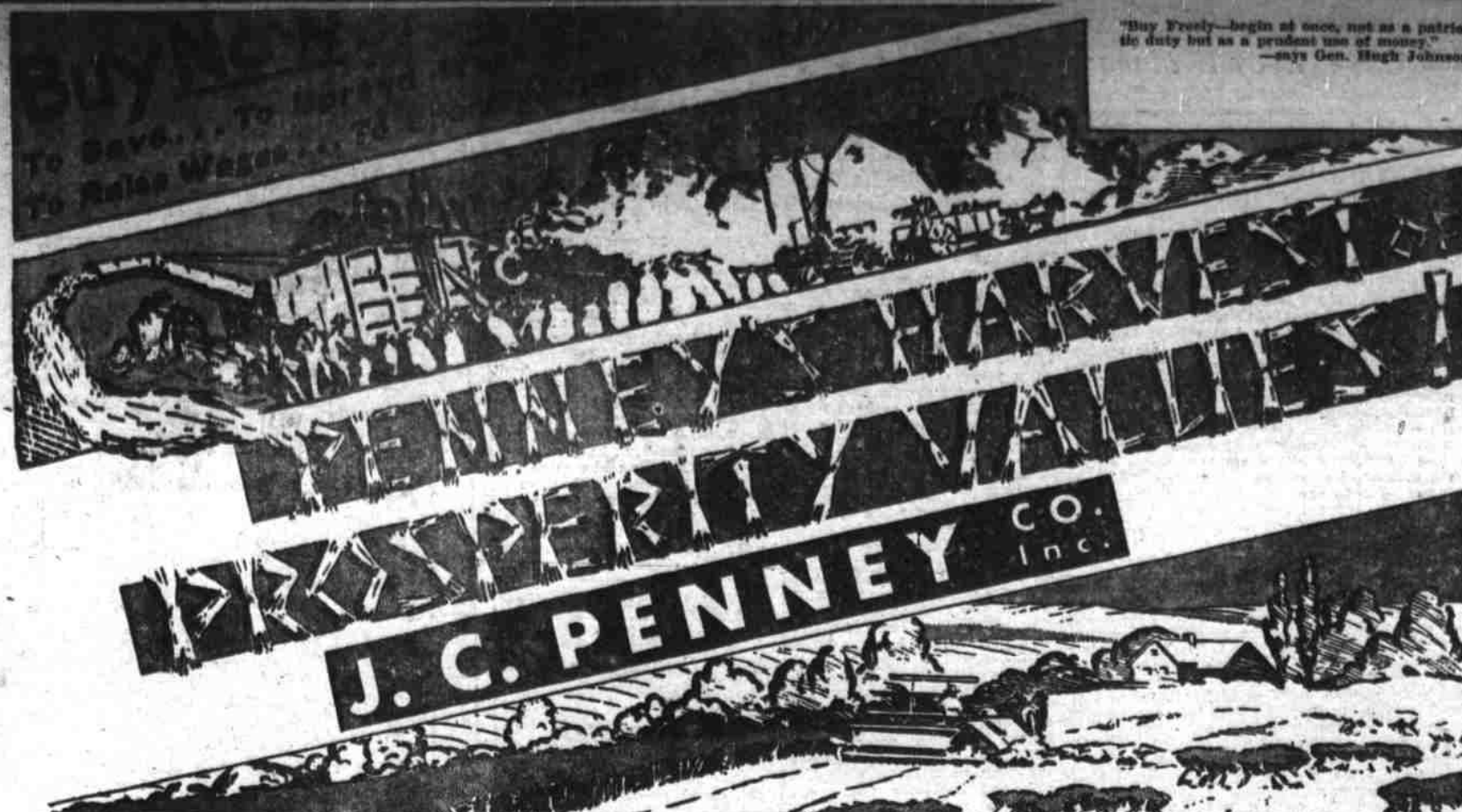

Inexperienced Club To Oppose Pat Murphy's Panthers, Bi-District Winner Last Year; 22 Players Selected To Make Trip

The light, inexperienced Big Spring high school Steer squad will meet speed and deception when they clash with the strong Austin high school's Panther eleven at El Paso tomorrow night.

Coach Bristow, Coach Brown and "Tiny" Reed will accompany twenty-two players to the border city early tomorrow morning. The two teams will be about even as far as weight is concerned. But for two light fellows, Thomas, a 135-pound guard, and Bechtol, shifty 135-pound halfback, the Steers would average much heavier than 157.

Coach Pat Murphy has been giving his Panthers some new deceptive running plays during the past week and will depend upon Herbert Baird, fullback; Raymond Salome, diminutive signal chiper, and T. G. Bailey, a new flash at the Eastside institution, to run them off behind a line that doesn't boast a lot of weight but will be scrapping from the opening whistle.

Lonam Reddit is expected to complete the starting backfield at the other half position.

In the line, two players who showed well in the opening game with Yaleta as reserves, Wright, a tackle, and Carson, a guard, are expected to get the call at left tackle and right guard, respectively. Their work in the Yaleta game, coupled with the fight shown during the past week, gives them an edge over J. B. Wilson and John Almsworth, respectively.

Henry at left end, and Hamilton, left guard, are expected to complete that side of the line with Clint Lee holding down the center job.

Charlie Edens, at right tackle, and H. Walker, at right end, are expected to complete the right side of the line.

Bristow, with one or two exceptions, will have a fairly hefty line. On the left side, Dean, a 170-pound-

100,000 Pigs Will Have Been Bought Of Texans When Campaign Is Ended

FORT WORTH, (UP)—More than 100,000 pigs will have been bought in Texas in the government's hog reduction campaign by the time the drive ends Friday night, Local Co-ordinator A. A. Lund said Thursday.

Since the program began a month ago, he said, 79,000 pigs and 520 piggy sows have been bought at premium prices here. An additional 2500 will be purchased before the campaign closes, he estimated. Pigs bought at San Antonio and Houston will bring the state total to the 100,000 mark, he said. Texas pig shippers will receive a total of \$244,500 as result of the drive, Lund said.

Market specialists here have predicted the reduction campaign, by reducing the pork surplus, will cause the market price to increase about 16 per cent by the beginning of next year.

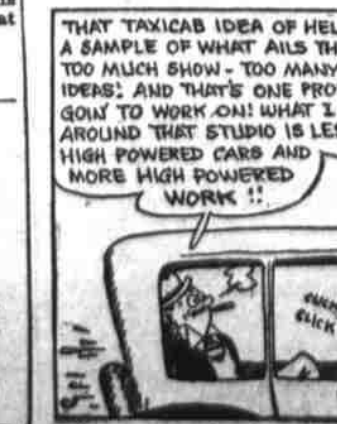

Berry Pie An Unfailing Favorite For Autumn Day Meals

There is something so old-fashioned and appetizing about a berry pie—it fits in so well with the season that the wise homemaker will find her popularity steadily increasing if she serves this delectable dessert often.

Naturally a pie is only as good as its crust—so if you are not already proficient in the gentle art of pastry making suppose you try the following recipe for greater success.

Master Pastry Recipe

2 cups sifted flour.
1-2 teaspoon baking powder.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
1-2 cup shortening.
Cold water.

Sift the dry ingredients together, add the shortening, mixing with a fork and finger tips, until the mixture is of a mealy consistency. Add water very slowly until the mixture is sufficiently moistened to hold together. Use as little water as possible. Roll dough on floured board until 1/8 inch thick. Fit loosely on a pie plate, trim edges and prick with a fork. Bake in a hot oven for fifteen minutes if the crust is to be used as a pie shell. The above recipe will make pie shell and top. Use 1-2 for pie shell only.

Cherry Pie
1 quart sour pitted cherries.
1-2 to 3-4 cups sugar.
1-4 cup flour.

Prepare pastry. Mix above ingredients together and put into lower crust. Cover with top crust which should be pierced with a fork. Bake in hot oven for 10 minutes, reduce temperature and bake 20 minutes more.

Strawberry Pie
1 baked pie shell.
8 macaroons, crushed.
1 quart strawberries mashed and hulled.

1 cup sugar.
Line bottom of baked pie shell with macaroons. Stand fresh, whole berries all over the bottom of the shell and around the sides. Crush one cup of berries, add one cup of sugar and cook until of thick jam consistency. Allow to cool and pour over prepared shell and whole berries. Chill and serve with whipped cream.

August Retail Distribution In Principal Cities 32 Per Cent Over Volume In Last Report

Retailers Seek More Accurate Gauge Of Consumer Demand Before Adding Stock; Bank Debts Off 8 Per Cent; Loans And Investments Expand

DALLAS, (UP)—Expansion in both retail and wholesale lines continued during August, the eleventh federal reserve district's monthly business review revealed Friday.

"Retail distribution, as evidenced by sales of department stores in principal cities," the report said "reflected an increase of 3.2 per cent over the previous month, and was 27 per cent in excess of that in August, 1932."

"The unusually large increase over the previous month, according to the review, was of special significance because seasonal decline in July was much smaller than usual. 'The volume of wholesale trade,' the report continued, 'showed less than the usual expansion, yet this was not surprising in view of the heavy distribution during the summer months. While reports indicate that consumer buying in rural sections is improving retailers who bought heavily earlier in the summer are attempting to gauge more accurately the prospective consumer demand before adding substantially to inventories.'

Bank debts to individual accounts, the report showed, fell off eight per cent during the month from July, a purely seasonal decline. They were, however, four per cent higher than for August a year ago.

Weather during August, generally was favorable to growing crops and ranges. The drought area in large part received much needed moisture, while in other sections the weather was such as to foster maturing of crops and hold in check insect activity and plant disease.

The federal department of agriculture in its September 1 report said crop conditions in the 11th federal reserve district were equal to or above those for the preceding month. Cotton prospects were improved, as were those of some feed crops.

"Federal reserve bank loans to member banks," the review said, "continued at a low level during the past month. The total of these loans amounted to \$4,237,000 on August 15, as compared with \$3,993,000 on August 15 and \$12,891,000 on the same date in 1932."

"The loans and investments of member banks in selected cities reflected a substantial expansion between August 9 and September 13. The daily average of combined net demand and time deposits of member banks was \$389,108,000 in August, representing a decline of \$7,730,000 from the previous month, and \$17,054,000 from August last year."

"The recession from a year ago, which has been gradually narrowing in recent months, was smaller in August than in any month since 1929."

Construction activity fell off sharply during August to a level under that of May. The August valuation of building permits, the report showed, was 52 per cent less than in July and four per cent below August last year.

August's meager wholesale expansion was blame on a 17.9 per cent slump in dry goods. Other reporting lines, notably farm implements, reported improvement, although the expansion in several cases was under 1929.

Dun and Bradstreet's figures showed 53 firms defaulting, with liabilities totaling \$798,981. In August, 1931, however, there were 92 insolventcies with an aggregate indebtedness of \$2,237,615.
