## Local City-School Board Elections Set Saturday

Area residents will be voting in a number of city and school elections Saturday, April 5, 1980.

In the race for Deport City Council, Mayor Charles Foster runs uncontested. Christine Skaggs and Duane Glover will run unopposed for the two councilmen seats. The voting will take place at the City Hall, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In the Blossom City Council contest for mayor, L.C. Cotham, Frances Brewer, and Roger S. Johnson will be contending. Incumbent Mayor Lawrence Mears did not file for re-election. George W. Lemley, Roger E. Daughterty, and V. JoAnne Roberson will be running for the three councilmen positions. The voting will be at Blossom City Hall, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The Prairiland School Board will have two available seats for election. D.M. Grissom and Pat Graham will be running against each other for the three-year term of Place 1 (Blossom). Harold W. Morrison and L.C. Cotham will be running for the one-year term of Place 2 (Blossom) that was held by Bob Allen who resigned earlier this year.

Ernest L. Stinson runs unchallenged for the Place 4 position (Deport). The voting will be at the Cunningham Community Center, at Deport and Blossom Elementary schools and at Prairiland High School from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

John W. (Worth) Hood will be the only contestant seeking the office of the mayor for Bogata. In-

cumbant Dr. Jack Troutt, Mrs. Iva Hooker, and Danny Smith will be in pursuit of the

two city council seats. Mayor Wm. C. Barnard and councilman H.E. Bryson

did not seek re-election. The election will be held Saturday, April 5 at the

Bogata Fire Station, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. An election for the Board

of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata schools will be held on the same day.

Those running for the Bogata positions will be John M. Ward, incumbent, and Dr. E.E. Brooks, incumbent. They will be running for a three-year term.

Running for the Talco seat will be Jerry Clemmons, incumbent, and Patsy C. Smith. They will be running for a three-year term, also.

A one-year term will result from either Bogata or Talco, depending on the majority of the votes.

The voting will be held at the Talco and Bogata schools all day Saturday.

## New Target Prices Announced

Higher target prices for wheat and feed grains were recently announced. Producers who stay within normal crop acreage (NCA) qualify for farm program benefits based upon the new announced target prices.

President Carter signed

the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1980 on March 18, 1980. The Act will increase the 1980 target price of wheat to \$3.63 per bushel; of corn to \$2.35 per bushel; of grain sorghum to \$2.50 per bushel and of barley to \$2.55 per bushel. To receive these higher target prices, a producer must plant within their NCA.

for wheat, \$2.05 per bushel for corn, \$2.45 per bushel for grain sorghum and \$2.29 per bushel for barley.

The 1980 target price for upland cotton will be 58.4 cents per pound.

The new Act also extends the disaster payment program through the 1980 crop year for wheat, feed grains, upland cotton and rice. Disaster payments will be limited to \$100,000.00 per person.

The new Act will provide some form of coverage for all producers in Red River County who plant wheat, feed grain, upland cotton or rice.

For those producers who exceed their NCA, or do not have an NCA on their farm, program benefits will be computed under the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977. Target prices under the 1977 Act will be \$3.08 per bushel

## Clinic To Be Held

April 10

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations.

The clinic will be conducted at the Bogata City Hall April 10, 1980 from 2 to 4 p.m.

Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that this clinic is available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two (2) months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (DTP) and Tetanus-diphtheria (Td). All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine is also available to adults.

## Child Care Credit Explained

Taxpayers can now claim the child or disabled dependent care credit on payments made to a close relative, even though the payments aren't subject to social security taxes. Previously, payments to a relative qualified for the credit only if the relative's services constituted employment for social security purposes. Now, payments made to close relatives, such as a grandparent, sister, aunt, niece or nephew, qualify for the credit if the relative is not a dependent. Payments made to the taxpayer's child under age 19 do not qualify.

To meet requirements for the credit, a taxpayer must be employed in or in active search of employment while paying for the care; must have income from work during the year, and must have maintained a household that included one or more qualifying individuals. Qualifying individuals are dependent children under 15 years of age, a disabled spouse or a disabled dependent of any age.

Additional information on the credit is available in the free IRS Publication 503, "Child and Disabled Dependent care," which may be ordered by filling out the order form in the tax package or by calling the IRS number listed in the telephone directory.

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# Vaccine Cuts Cattle Losses

Accurate diagnosis, proper treatment, and a new vaccine could cut Texas cattle losses due to scours as much as 85 percent, says Dr. Ed Murray, of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association. "Since scours add up to an annual loss of 250 million dollars to cattlemen across the nation, and one out of every four cattle losses is the result of calf scours, cattle producers would be wise to take the proper procedures to prevent scours from getting a foothold in their herds," states Dr. Murray, the chairman of the Bovine and Ranch Committee for the Texas Veterinary Medical Association.

A new vaccine, to vaccinate the cow during pregnancy, will help reduce the high incidence and severity of viral scours among new calves. The vaccine, a two-dose program, can be given while pregnancy checking or while handling the herd for other purposes. The second dose should be given about a month before calving. While the usual practice has been to vaccinate the newborn calves within hours of birth, the management of reaching each and every new calf so quickly is a near impossibility on a larger ranch. Dr. Murray, a Spur, Texas Veterinarian, states that the vaccine helps reduce viral scours that are attributed to the two most common scours viruses, the Rotavirus (once called Reo-Like Virus or Reovirus) and the Coronavirus.

A vaccinated pregnant cow "vaccinates" her calf against the scours with its first drink of colostrum. A single dose given to the calf within six to 12 hours after its birth provides the same protection for those cattle producers who prefer this management method, states Dr. Murray.

"Accurate diagnosis," stresses Murray, "should be strived for by the cattleman who is faced with the treatment problems of calf scours. Treating scours without knowledge of the culture sensitivity may be

wasted money, time, effort, and result in calf losses." Dr. Murray recommends several steps for treating scours:

Consult your veterinarian immediately at the first sign of scours. Avoid waiting for the problem to spread to other calves in the herd, or for the calf to become dehydrated.

Separate the scouring calf and dam from the rest of the herd if possible;

Have the veterinarian make an accurate diagnosis and implement proper treatment.

With an accurate diagnosis the calf then can be treated with the proper drug, and proper body-fluid replacements—the results being the reduction of scours spreading among the herd and positive results in cutting calf losses.

Prompt medical attention is an important factor, adds Murray. Calves not treated quickly may lose vital nutrients, body fluids, and electrolytes, resulting in dehydration and a high mortality rate.

"The reduction of cattle losses simply adds up to good management for the cattle producer, especially financial management," Murray stated. "Loss of a newborn calf causes the producer to lose the entire year's profit from the cow as well as the additional expense of feeding the cow a year without a calf. 1980 figures approximate the cost of one newborn calf at \$275."

Cattlemen should consult their veterinarian to see if the new vaccine is the proper management procedure for their herd, added Dr. Murray.

# Founder's Day Fun Run Set April 19

Runners from throughout Northeast Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana will converge in Mt. Pleasant, Texas April 19 for the second annual Fun Run.

This year's race comes as part of a city-wide celebration of Founder's Day which features a variety of activities from trail rides and tennis tournaments to side walk sales. The Festival begins April 17 and runs through Sunday April 20 when a giant air show climaxes the event.

"We are looking for a bigger run than last year," John Tolbert of the First National Bank in Mt. Pleasant, which sponsors the race, said.

Three events are scheduled this time with runners competing in five-mile and one-mile races in addition to a two-mile walk,

Tolbert explained. All races begin at 9 a.m.

All events will begin at the Mt. Pleasant High School on FM 1734 which is North of I-30. Registration will be at First National until the 19th, when registration will be available on the high school campus.

The five-mile run is broken into ten classes with men competing in groups of 18 and under, 19-24, 25-29, 30-39, 40-49, and 50 and over. Women will be broken into age groups of 19 and under, 20-29, 30-39, and 40 and over.

The mile run will be limited to racers under 12 years of age.

The two-mile walk has no age limit. T-shirts will be

given to all entrants and trophies will be awarded to the top three finishers in each class of the five-mile run. Merchandise awards will be given to the top male and female finishers.

Entry fees will be \$4 for the five mile and \$2 for the one mile run and two mile walk.

Tolbert said that arrangements are complete for rest rooms and showers as well as first aid stations. A police escort for the five mile run is planned and medical assistance is available.

# Diabetic Educational Training Center Opens June 1

Camp Sweeney Diabetic Educational Training Center for diabetic boys and girls, age six through 16 years, will open for the 31st year of

operation June 1, 1980, with three three-week sessions as follows: June 1 to June 20; June 22 to July 11; and July 13 to August 1.

Camp Sweeney is located nine miles east and one mile north of Gainesville, Texas on 338 acres of rolling timbered hills with three dormitories for boys and three for girls; a non-denominational chapel; a modern hospital; a 39 acre lake for boating, fishing and water-skiing; a sanitary swimming pool, tennis courts, recreational pavilion, target range and 20 gentle saddle horses.

Under the supervision of a specialized medical staff, dietitian and counselors, these children are taught their proper diet with regulated exercise, how to take their own urine tests and give their own insulin injections. Of major importance, through this group association with other young diabetics, they realize they are not alone with their disorder and with proper knowledge and instruction they can learn how to live with their lifelong companion-Diabetes.

Diabetes is hereditary, incurable and increasing yearly. It is the third killer of diseases and ranks third as the cause of blindness. Medical authorities estimate one-fourth of the World's population carries the diabetic gene and some 5,000,000 cases of diabetes are in the United States, of which more than 500,000 are children.

# Chemotherapy Expanded

Chemotherapy patients, previously required to travel to Dallas or Houston for treatments, may now receive treatments at St. Joseph's Hospital, Paris, Texas, according to Administrator Sister Mary Eustace. Treatments have been previously available at the hospital, but through association with a medical oncology group in Dallas, services have been greatly expanded.

Most chemotherapy treatments are now available at the hospital's chemotherapy unit, according to Lloyd W. Kitchens, M.D., although some forms of cancer such as leukemia may still require treatment in Dallas.

The 10 doctor team of oncologists, of which Kitchens is a member, is based at the Sammons Cancer Center at Baylor Medical Center in Dallas. John C. Bagwell, M.D., Lewis Duncan, M.D., and Merrick Reese, M.D., founder of the group, will be performing services at St. Joseph's each Tuesday, according to the hospital.

Local physicians, if they desire, may also perform chemotherapy treatments through consultation with the oncology group at any time. Jane Tangney, R.N., director of both the emergency room and the oncology unit, spent a week with the Dallas group recently, expanding her experience with chemotherapy application. She and other oncology unit personnel are fully qualified to perform the treatments.

When the expanded unit opened on March 4 with the Dallas physicians attending, 18 patients arrived either for treatments or consultation. Only nine had been expected.

The physicians are now seeing an average of 10 patients per week, and as patient load increases, the oncology group will send more than one physician during the weekly treatment day, according to Kitchens. The oncology group is performing similar services for hospitals in Corsicana and Odessa, scheduling weekly treatments and consultations.

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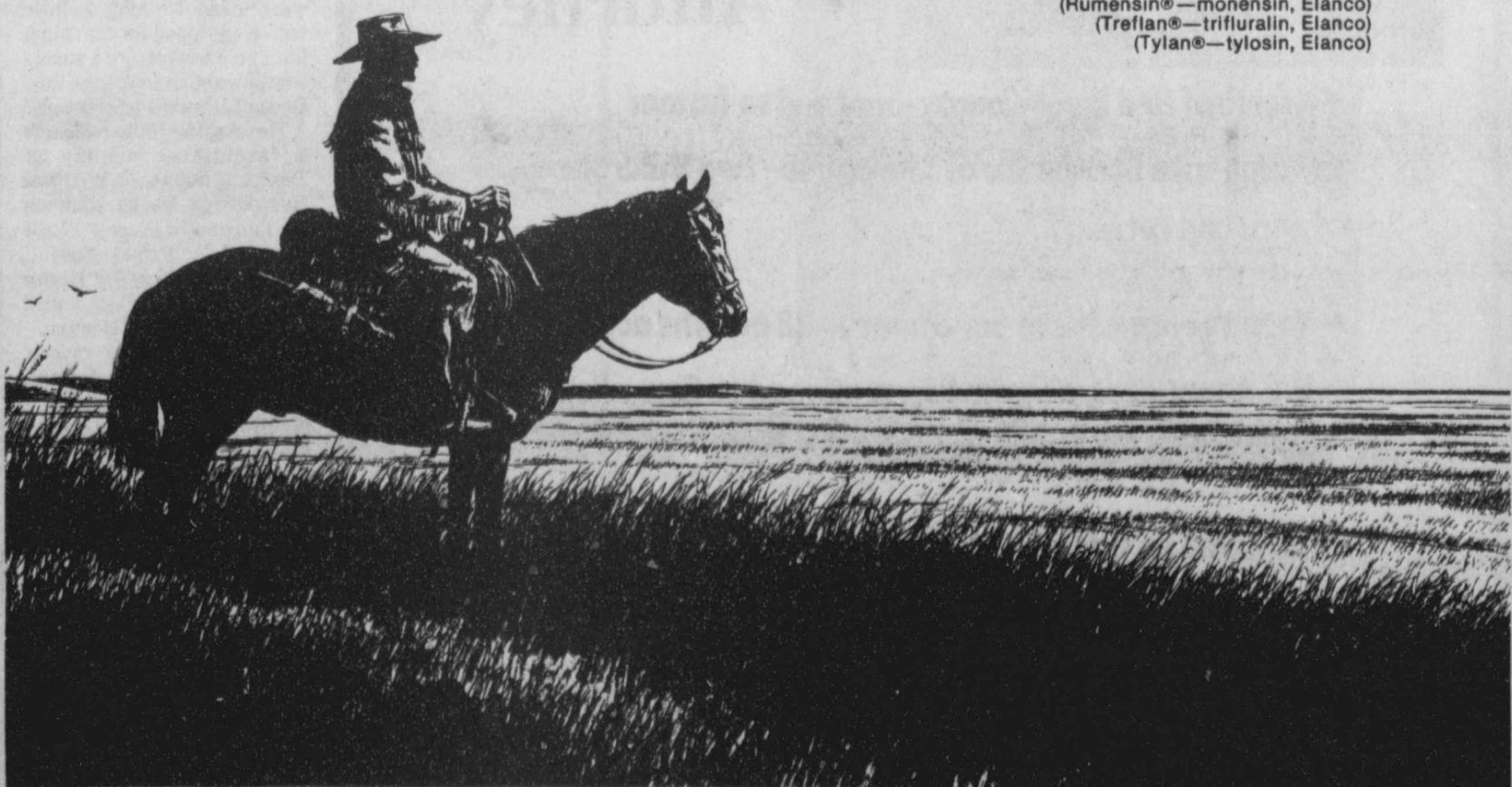
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### Mrs. G.H. McCluer Gives Book Review

### Annona Grant Approved For Water System

Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. announced today that the Economic Development Administration has approved a grant in the amount of \$208,500 to the City of Annona to help enlarge the community's water system to increase water pressure for fire protection.

In addition, there will be \$91,200 provided from Section 304 funds, \$22,800 from the State of Texas, and the City of Annona will provide \$25,000. These funds will enable the City to build a storage tank and install water lines, pumps and fire hydrants.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said written or telephoned comments on the proposed law changes will be accepted until April 11. These comments will be presented to the Parks and Wildlife Commission before it officially adopts the new regulations for 1980-81.

Many Texans may be unable to attend the hearings, which sometimes have to be scheduled during normal working hours. Also, some sportsmen are interested in regulations affecting distant counties in which they hunt, fish or trap. 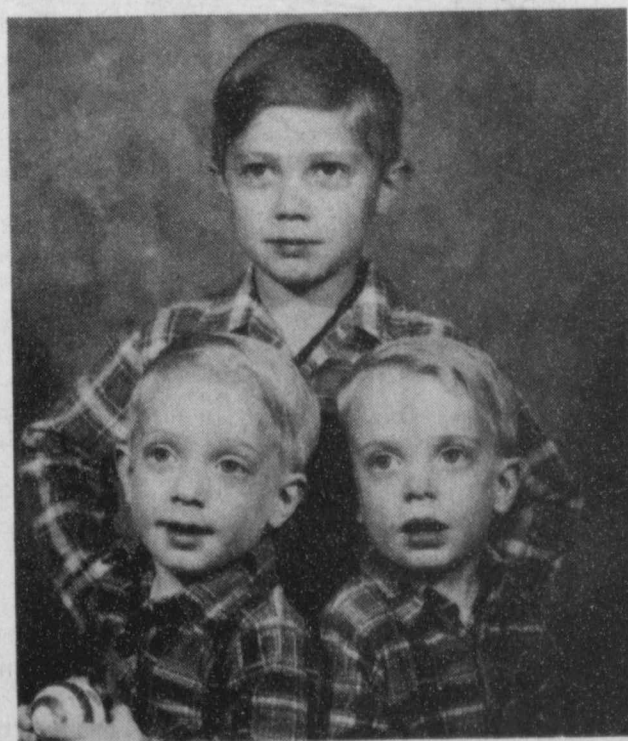

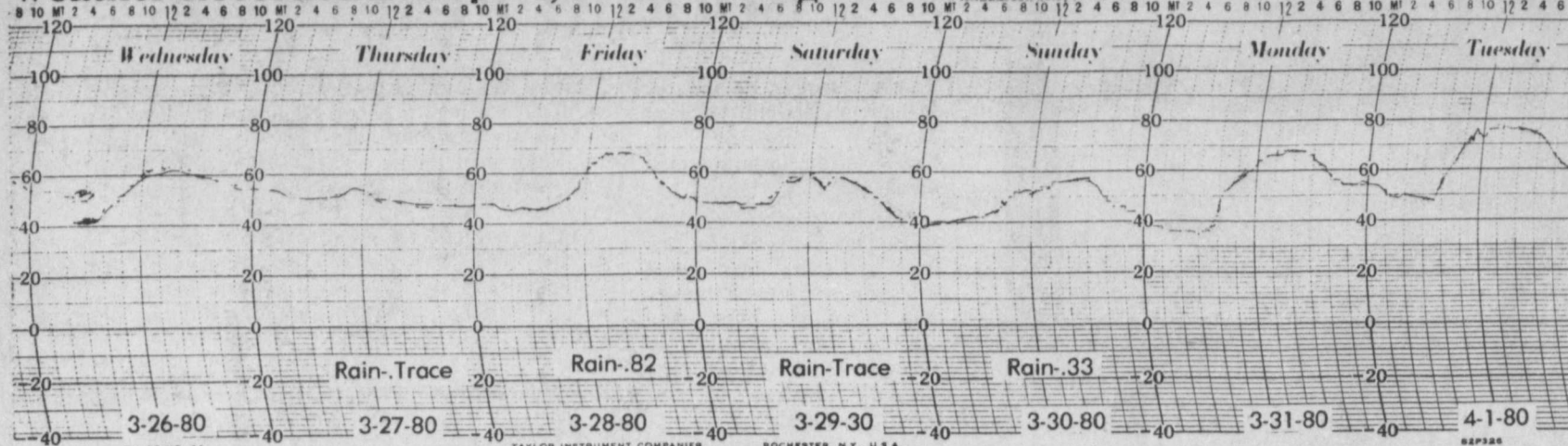

## East Texas Eating

By Margie Rice  
Warm Fruit Pudding is a quick, versatile, and nutritious dessert that found its way to East Texas from Germany. Make it now with fresh apples or frozen strawberries. A little later try it with fresh blackberries, and as the season progresses with plums, peaches, or cherries.

Warm Fruit Pudding is a cake-type pudding. Apples form a soft, pretty topping.

The pudding batter rises to cover other fruits. It is a favorite supper dessert at our house. The aroma from the oven and at serving is as delicious as the taste.

The one quart of fresh fruit that the recipe calls for gives a thick, layer of fruit. Less fruit will suffice, though the resulting pudding is not quite as good. I have used a pint of frozen strawberries, thawed. You might try it with canned fruit if you have some handy.

Warm Fruit Pudding

one-third cup butter or margarine

one-third cup sugar

one egg, well beaten

one cup flour

one tsp. baking powder

one quart apples, blackberries, plums, peaches, or cherries, washed and chopped coarsely.

one cup sugar  
one-fourth tsp. nutmeg or cinnamon (Optional)

Cream together butter and sugar. Stir in the beaten egg. Sift together flour and baking powder. Stir into the creamed mixture alternately with the milk, beating the mixture after each addition until it is smooth. Sprinkle the coarsely chopped fruit with the sugar and nutmeg or cinnamon. Spread the batter into a greased 8" square baking pan and pour the sugared fruit over the batter. Bake in a 350 degrees oven for 40 minutes. Serve warm. Top with heavy cream if you've got it and can stand the calories.

## Gardening Made Easy

By Barrie L. Kridler  
This is your last chance to apply "weed and feed" fertilizers preventing those summer weeds that ruin the looks of a well tended yard. Be Careful! Follow those directions to a letter. Some of these fertilizers can not be used near trees and shrubs without severe damage or death. Ask for help if you are not sure. Chemicals make our lives a lot easier, but only when used properly.

Monday, we saw the first hummingbird (they may have been here earlier, but with the spring rush, who had time to notice). Wash those old hummingbird feeders well and hang them in a conspicuous spot. Last year they were "humming" around the spot where it always hangs in the yard when we first noticed them - so you do get the same birds back each year. Fill the feeders only part way full, until more arrive, to keep the solution fresh. It will be mid-summer before the young ones are raised and they arrive by the droves to feast. These birds are attracted to carolina jasmine, redbud, asalea, narcissus, honeysuckle and the wild buckeye at this season. Try to add at least one of these to the yard for early color and "hummer" food.

All over town I see burned, bleached house plants as people get in too big a rush on moving plants outside after a long winter inside. These plants will burn after ten minutes of full sun at this time of year. First put them out on a porch or garage where they receive only bright light - no sun. Gradually move them into more sun after a week. The safest thing to do is wait until the trees have enough leaves to shade and put them under a tree. Most tropicals are damaged by temperatures below 55 degrees and almost every night will be below

that for a while. Ferns, begonias and geraniums will take more cold, but even they are not comfortable outside yet.

We still may have a killing frost into April, so go easy on peppers, tomatoes and egg plant unless you can cover them. The soil is still quite cool and warm weather plants and seed will just rot until hot weather comes. Early season crops such as lettuce, radish, beets and broccoli will do fine. Petunias, snapdragons, daisies, glads, pinks, dustymiller and poppies should go out now while the weather is cool. This is the last chance to plant pansies this spring. Feed and keep watering new plantings until we get a good rain. Trees and shrubs need this first feeding soon - lawns can wait a week or two unless you are applying a "weed and feed" fertilizer. The first feeding is the most important of the year!

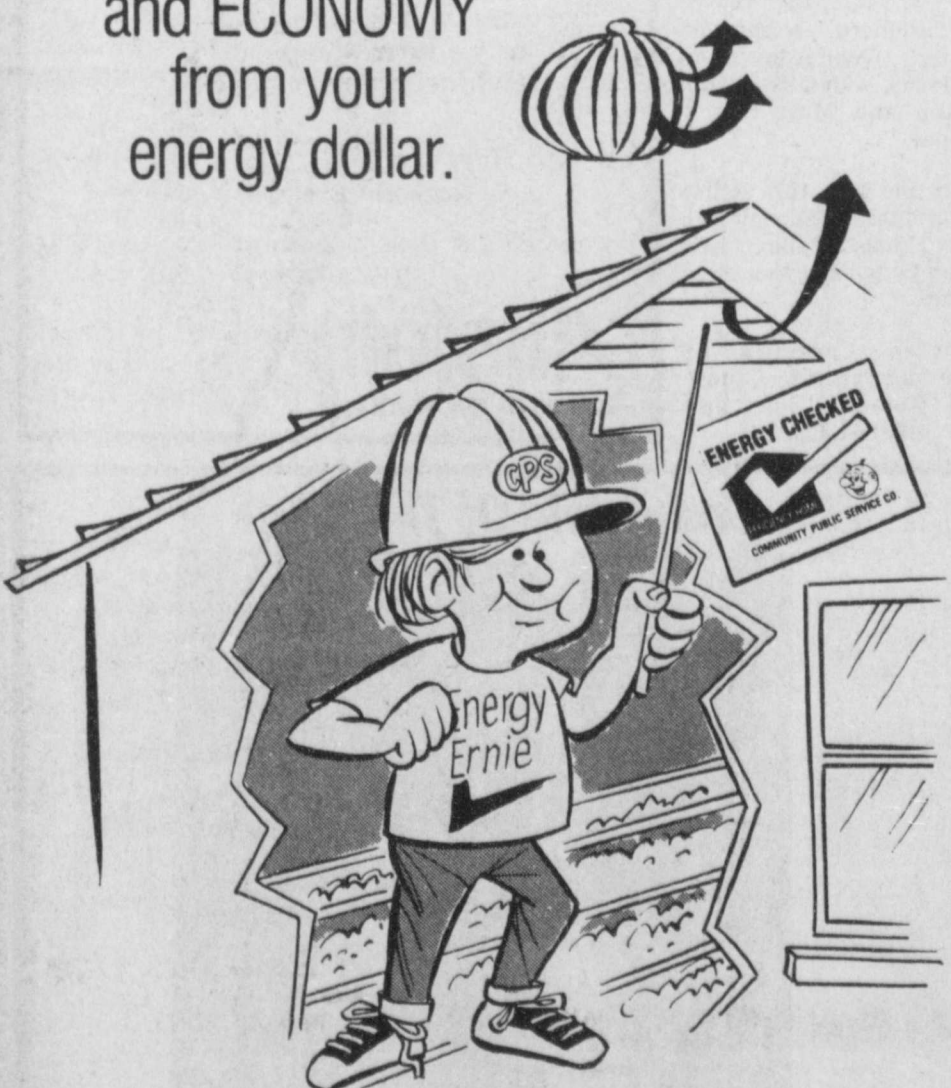

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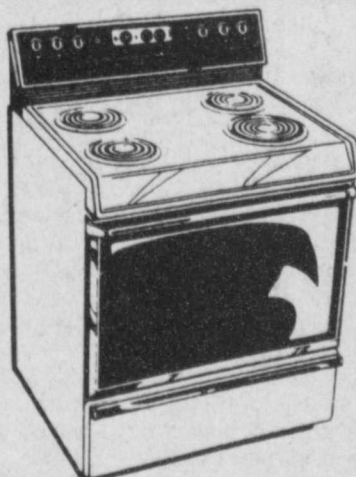
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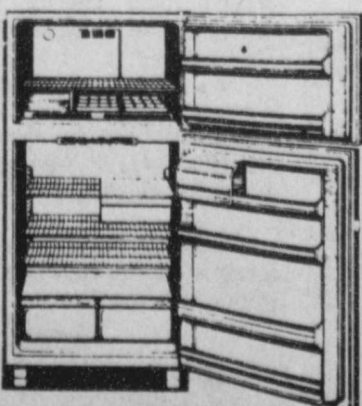

## New Publication Aimed At Reducing Calf Losses

Cattlemen can prevent some calf losses at birth if they know what steps to take to help the cow, says Bob Moody, county agent.

Now an expanded and updated publication has been prepared by the Extension Service that will assist cattlemen in dealing with calving problems, Moody adds.

The publication, "Recognizing and Handling Calving Problems," is authored by John R. Beverly, Extension animal reproduction specialist. It guides cattlemen through the calving process, instructing them and showing by illustrations how and when to give assistance.

If a cow does not successfully give birth to a live calf, the total management and feed cost invested in her is lost. Research indicates that 80 percent of all calf deaths occur at or near birth and that calving difficulty accounts for two-thirds of these deaths. Furthermore, calving problems are most common in heifers giving birth to their first calves—with more than half usually having calving problems.

"Since the reproduction capability of a cow - calf production, good management of the cow herd is of vital importance. If calving problems develop, cattlemen should be able to recognize these and provide assistance," the county agent says.

The new publication on calving problems should be of value to all cattle producers, Moody adds.
