OF C. HOLDS LUNCHEON

GOOD ATTENDANCE ON MONDAY EVENING. CHAS. W. CALLAWAY IS ABLE TOASTMASTER

On Monday evening the Perryton Chamber of Commerce was served a delicious luncheon in the basement of the Christian Church, the luncheon being served by the ladies of that church. It was in the manner of a get-together meeting and plans were made for the activity of that organization for the next few months were considered and planned. It was somewhat informal but a very enjoyable time was had by all present and it was a very beneficial meeting.

Chas. W. Callaway, local manager of the White House Lumber Company, very ably presided as toastmaster and a number of interesting talks were made by those present concerning the welfare of our city and country.

Proceeding the luncheon the local Boy Scouts organization rendered a very impressive and inspirational program concerning the work of the Scouts and the things the Boy Scout organization advocates and practices. The program was well rendered under the successful leadership of B. B. Kent, who was ably assisted by Leroy Hartman and Ernest Records. The good work which has been done by the Perryton troops was indeed a revelation to the business men of Perryton who pledged their assistance, financially and otherwise, for the continuation and promotion of this great work.

Speeches were made by various ones, giving suggestions for the betterment and a more successful year for the organization. Judge R. T. Correll was the first speaker called to the podium and he advocated placing the Chamber of Commerce on a sound financial basis and pled for greater co-operation of the organization for various city and county undertakings. Rev. E. G. Pennington spoke on the subject of good fellowship and unity, its value to the community. Judge J. M. Bull made an interesting talk concerning the building of better roads and the benefit derived from a recent visit to Austin at which he and Mr. W. B. LaMaster appeared before the State Highway Commission in the interest of the designation of more State Highways in Ochiltree county. Superintendent W. B. Irvin thanked the local Chamber of Commerce and all other organizations of the community which have so heartily co-operated with the public schools. He made a special reference to the high compliment paid to the Home Economics Department which is under the capable supervision of Miss Ruby Jane Simmons. It was a matter of much interest when Mr. Irvin stated that Miss Peek, State Inspector of the Home Economics Department, during her recent visit to Perryton, stated that the Perryton girls had made exceptional progress and the Home Economics Department of the Perryton High School passed a splendid inspection in the absence of Miss Simmons, who was ill at the time of Miss Peek's visit, and the girls of the department carried the work on during her absence.

Mayor F. P. Rogers made an interesting talk and pled for Diversified Farming and for the live stock and poultry promotion. James Russell Cook, Director of the Vocational Training Department of the Perryton High School, pled for more co-operation by the business men for the agricultural interests and spoke of the progress made in his department. It was a matter of interest when Mr. Cook discussed the cotton situation in this section of the state and he predicted that cotton could be successfully grown here and would be a paying crop if the people would plant a small acreage and properly care for it. Mr. Cook also predicted to be a second Mark Twain with his wit and humor. Dr. J. C. May ably spoke along the lines of the proper co-operation with the farmer and especially concerning the

development of the poultry industry. R. T. Shindler, who is always active in civic affairs, paid a tribute to the Municipal Band and Orchestra and to its efficient leader, Prof. Geo. Hyde. Judge Geo. M. Perry implored for the very best co-operation of the land owners of Ochiltree county, concerning future oil and gas development. He predicted for Ochiltree county some test wells within the next few months if the people would co-operate in the matter of blocking sufficient acreage to attract and interest some of the larger companies to drill test wells and insisted that the Chamber of Commerce lend its aid to this important matter. Judge J. M. Grigsby made a short talk, telling some funny stories about the early day in Mobeetie and kept the crowd in laughter with his jokes. He insisted for better co-operation of everyone for those things which promote the general welfare.

Attorney Jack Allen made an insistent plea for the land owners not to lease their land to oil lease sharks and to avoid having the county checkerboarded to such an extent that drilling blocks could not be obtained, and he predicted that the next few months will see some actual development and test wells in Ochiltree county but said this could only be done by a sufficient amount of acreage being obtained to induce oil operators to drill. He laid special emphasis on the matter of encouraging the continued development of the poultry and dairy industry. He furnished figures which showed that there had been shipped from Perryton during the year of 1925, close to a quarter of a million dollars worth of poultry, eggs and cream. He concluded with a toast to the good women of the Christian Church, who served the sumptuous banquet.

E. C. Carver, local agent of the Santa Fe, made his usual humorous speech and told a joke on the Ford car. The Municipal Orchestra furnished music during the evening which was greatly enjoyed by everyone. The Herald appreciates the good work done in the past by the Perryton Chamber of Commerce and we trust this organization will continue its good work as the next few months will be one of the most important periods of development and expansion the north Panhandle has ever known and there is much to be done by this organization. The next regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will be held Monday night at the City Hall and a large attendance is desired and urged. Come and do your part for your city and county.

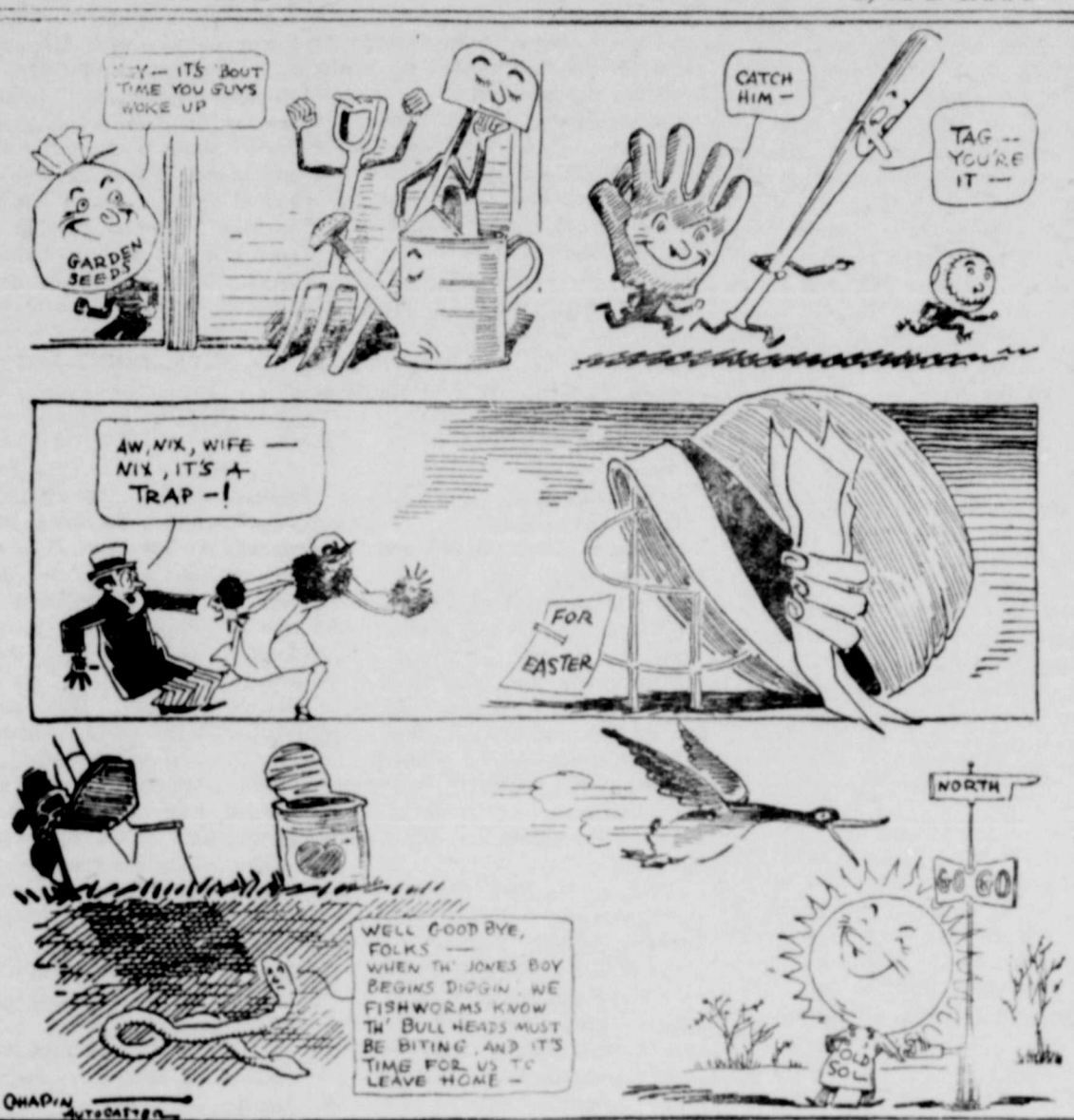
The school district is large and it is easy to overlook some, and therefore it is the business of all to help enumerate the children in this year's census.

HIGHLY PRAISED BY INSPECTOR AND AFFILIATED WITHOUT SENDING SAMPLES OF WORK TO AUSTIN

Miss Lillian Peek, State Assistant Director of Home Economics Education was a welcome and pleasant visitor in our schools last Thursday and we are proud of the report on this department. Miss. LOCAL MAN CATCHES
GERMANY ON AIR WAVES

R. C. Johnson, the local Ford man, recently received an Official Certificate of Verified International Reception, from the Radio Digest, which certifies that Mr. Johnson received a radio program from Station HA, Hamburg, Germany, on Wednesday night, January 27, which was one of the programs broadcasted during the International Reception week. No program was announced during this week and those tuning in on them, were to write to the Radio Digest Publishing Company describing the program in order to receive the certificate. Mr. Johnson picked up the program on a 5-tube set and says the reception would have been quite clear had it not been for a code station interfering.

RABBIT DRIVE BIG SUCCESS

A large representation of Perryton folks went up to Blue Mound last Friday to participate in the Big Rabbit drive being staged in that community. They report the drive as being very successful. It is estimated that between 1,500 and 2,000 rabbits were killed. No record was kept so it not certain just how many of the pests were slaughtered. About 200 men with guns were on the field and about 500 people were present at the big barbecue at the school house at noontime. The folks at Blue Mound had prepared over 120 gallons of fine soup and an abundance of coffee and every body present reports that Blue Mound sure treated them fine.

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING
A NECESSITY

When the enemies of co-operative marketing use other than their chief stock in trade, which is misrepresentation and silly twaddle about the farmer signing away his rights, they sometimes make a near approach to argument. One instance of this is when they state there is no need for co-operative marketing, because, as they say, the merchant and middleman can and does render this service more efficiently and economically. The only thing wrong with such a statement is that it is not true. The middleman has not handled cotton more efficiently or more economically than the farmers are doing it for themselves, through their co-operative associations.

Farmers have been compelled to buy and sell certain products co-operatively by economic pressure. The movement on the part of the farmer is due to no perversity or wild fancy on the part of the farmers, as some city people seem to think, but is in response to an economic necessity, for economic laws are inexorable.

There can be no fair sale or purchase, unless there is an equality between buyer and seller. There can be no fair sale of cotton by a farmer to a cotton buyer unless the seller and buyer are equal in the following respect:—

1. The seller must know as much about cotton as the buyer. That is, he must know its class or grade and the length and character of the staple as well as the buyer. There are many country and small town cotton buyers who don't know much about classing and stapling cotton, but on the whole, no one will claim that the farmer can possibly know the value of the cotton he offers for sale as well as the cotton buyer. In fact, not one out of 100 farmers, when shown a bale of cotton and told the price of middling cotton with 7-8 to 1-inch staple, can tell its value within \$5 to \$10 a bale. Classing and stapling cotton is so difficult that even the so-called experts differ considerably, and it is utterly impossible for the average farmer to know the class and staple of the cotton he offers for sale.

2. There can be no fair sale unless the seller knows as much as the buyer about the world's markets, demand and consumption, and production. Individually, the average farmer cannot be in daily touch with this information, while the buyer generally has the latest information on these points, therefore under the old system of selling cotton there can be no fair sale or purchase.

3. There can be no fair trade unless the desire of the buyer to buy is as strong, or equal to the desire of the seller to sell. As a rule the buyer only wants to buy when he can buy low enough to make a good profit, for men who buy cotton from the farmers are not consumers of cotton, but merely merchants or speculators. On the other hand, the farmer not only wants to sell, but in most cases must sell at the best price the buyer will offer, hence there can be no fair sale of cotton by the farmer under the old system.

4. There can be no fair sale of cotton by the farmer unless he has equal financial independence with the buyer. If he must sell in order to pay his debts, which is the case with 70 per cent of cotton producers, then he is not financially independent, and under such a condition there can be no fair sale of his cotton to a buyer who is in a more favorable financial situation.

5. There can be no fair sale of cotton by the individual farmer unless he is as good a salesman as the merchant is a buyer. Equality here is absolutely impossible. Cotton buyers are comparatively few in number, are picked for their ability to buy well, and devote several months each year to this business. On the other hand, the farmer spends about 11 months in the business of production, and a few days in selling the result of his labor. Moreover, salesmen are born, not made, and only a few farmers are born salesmen, and those who have the natural faculty of salesmanship have too little practice to enable them to cope with the trained cotton specialists who buy cotton.

Therefore, the farmer cannot have a fair chance when he sells his cotton individually. Individually, the average cotton grower cannot be equal in any of these respects to the average cotton buyer, therefore co-

operative selling is an economic necessity, for collectively and co-operatively the farmer can sell his cotton under conditions which will give him more nearly an equal chance. Individually, farmers cannot hire classers, salesmen, and experienced business men to sell their cotton, but co-operatively they can employ as good as the world produces. Individually, farmers cannot be as strong financially as the buyers, but collectively and co-operatively they are as strong financially as the strongest cotton merchants. If these be facts, and they are, proved beyond the shadow of a doubt in the farmer's experience during the last half century, then co-operative marketing, the only means by which an equality between buyer and seller can be obtained, is an absolute necessity.—The Progressive Farmer.

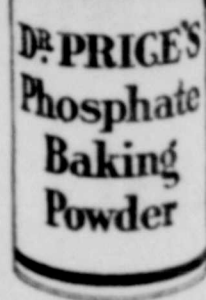
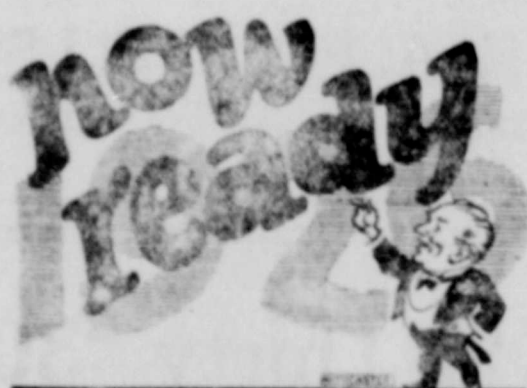

Things You Should Know

OUNCE OF PREVENTION

Physicians and drugs are indeed of inestimable value in worthy effort to combat disease already on hand; but the student of preventive medicine, it seems to me, is capable of doing even greater good. If you happen to know that typhoid germs get into the system with drinking-water from a contaminated well, you at once take steps to eradicate the danger before harm is done.

The mosquito that breeds in your rain-barrel is a carrier of disease. Remove the cause of the trouble. A swamp near your home is a constant menace and should not be tolerated—drain it. If you are a user of milk, be sure that your source of supply is pure and healthy. Remember that tuberculosis germs may be swallowed as well as inhaled. If you contemplate moving into a purchased home, see that its walls and floors have been treated with an unfailing antiseptic; it will cost time, effort and money, but the outlay is less than for invalids and funerals.

Many tenement dwellers use bedding purchased at second-hand stores. There should be a law compelling thorough fumigation before such goods are used. Pillows in hotels and sleeping cars should be thoroughly disinfected each morning after use; merely changing of lines is a misleading measure to hide the 'damp spot' left by the traveler with a mild case of influenza.

It is the business of physicians and public health officers to see that everything possible is done to ward off disease. To own a good book on preventive medicine should be one of the first duties of intelligent citizenship—this cannot help but minimize the need of physicians and—possibly the undertaker.

FACULTY COMMENT

The P. T. A. met in the auditorium last Monday afternoon with a fairly good number present. The program as previously announced was carried out and enjoyed by those present. This was the first meeting held for a month as the meeting scheduled for two weeks ago was postponed on account of other things.

Sometimes when we look at men and women in the various vocations and professions of life, we are made to marvel at the scarcity of real big, outstanding men and women. It seems that so many are on a common level of ability or accomplishment that one wonders whether or not they have all been cast from the same mold. There does not seem to be present that desire to excel or outstrip the average person in mental achievement. Mere average attainment satisfies too many people. They cannot see beyond it and consequently are content to be classed as such. It is therefore no wonder that we have so much mediocre service and mediocre scholarship.

The days are now getting long enough "to make a difference" in the time between sun rise and sun set. School people notice this more perhaps than many others. The mothers have more time in which to get their children off to school and start the day's work. That makes it a little easier in following the daily routine. Yes we feel sure that many of them are glad to see the days stretch out a little. It gives the country people a little more time every morning, and they can make

good use of it in getting to school.

The trustee election will be held on April 3 and this is none too early for patrons and voters to be thinking the matter over. Whether old trustees are to be retained or new ones elected. The matter is worth thinking over very carefully as this office is one of much importance to the entire community. The best material available should always be found on the school board in order that justice may be done to the school and community. Usually those who are most successful with their own affairs will also be more successful in managing the affairs of the school. To do ones full duty on the school board means to give impartial, efficient, effective, cooperative and high-minded service.

The work of taking the school census is progressing right along and it is hoped that no child within school age for next year will be left out in this taking. This is important as the school census of the district determines the state apportionment for the next year. Hence every child enrolled adds just that much more to next year's fund.

The Perryton District is more fortunate than some others in that it can have nine months school throughout the district. When we hear of some of the country schools closing about this time of the year, we are reminded of our more fortunate situation and feel rather good over it. The certainty of a full year makes a better school and enables trustees and teachers to make bigger plans for conducting the school. Good standards and efficiency can better be maintained when this is the case.

It is likely that arrangements will soon be made for the baccalaureate sermon to be preached here at the close of school. Correspondence is now under way with one or two prominent ministers in this section of the country and a definite promise to come is expected within a short time. Such choice of ministers will be made as will insure an able and educational sermon and one in keeping with this pleasant occasion.

Miss Simmons, our Home Economics teacher, has been out of school the last week on account of the flu. We hope she will soon be over this spell of the flu and be back with us again. During her absence some of the larger girls, with the help of Mrs. Shanks, have been holding things together in order that this department might be in shape when the inspector, Miss Peek, arrived to look over things.

The modern high school presents many problems that are not easily

solved. The giving of "individual help" to the student is almost out of the question. Students are passed from one room to another in successive periods and do not have a very long or very close contact with any one teacher. Thus this continual shifting about precludes the giving of that personal touch and personal assistance so much to be desired.

Another present day high school problem is the amount of influence exerted over the students by outside affairs and outside attractions. In many cases this outside influence so engrosses the student that he or she considers the high school as a kind of social routine through which he must pass. It is no common thing to see boys and girls merely "sit through" their high school days, with no thought of further schooling after their gauntlet is run.

DISHES FOR FALL MEALS

A nice croquette to serve with a fish course is the following:



Hominy and Horseradish Croquettes.—Take one-fourth of a cupful of hominy, steam it until tender, add one-half teaspoonful of salt, three-fourths of a cupful of milk scalded, and cook with it until absorbed. Add two tablespoonfuls of butter, three and one-half teaspoonfuls of grated horseradish root. Cool, shape, dip into crumbs, into egg, crumbs again and fry in deep fat. Drain on brown paper.

Prune Pudding.—Wash three-fourths of a pound of prunes. Cover with cold water and soak over night. Cook in the same water until soft and the water nearly evaporated. Remove the stones and cut the prunes into small pieces, then sprinkle with one-half cupful of sugar. Beat four eggs until stiff and add the prunes gradually. Pour into a slightly buttered pudding dish and bake in a moderate oven twenty-five minutes. Serve with a custard sauce well chilled.

Canadian Meat Pie.—Remove the meat from a knuckle of veal. Put the bones into a kettle, cover with cold water, add two slices of onion, one slice of carrot and twelve peppercorns. Bring to the boiling point, add the meat, and simmer until tender. Remove the meat, simmer the stock to two cupfuls. Put a slice of ham in a frying pan, cover with lukewarm water and let stand an hour. Brown four tablespoonfuls of butter with four tablespoonfuls of flour and stock, then add the veal and ham cut into cubes and simmer twenty minutes. Cover with pastry and bake.

Baked Crumbed Potatoes.—Force hot boiled potatoes through a ricer; to three and one-half cupfuls add three tablespoonfuls of butter, one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt and one-fourth teaspoonful of pepper. Add two-thirds of a cupful of hot milk, and beat the potatoes vigorously. Turn into a buttered baking dish, pour over one-half cupful of heavy cream, sprinkle with coarse crumbs and bake until brown.

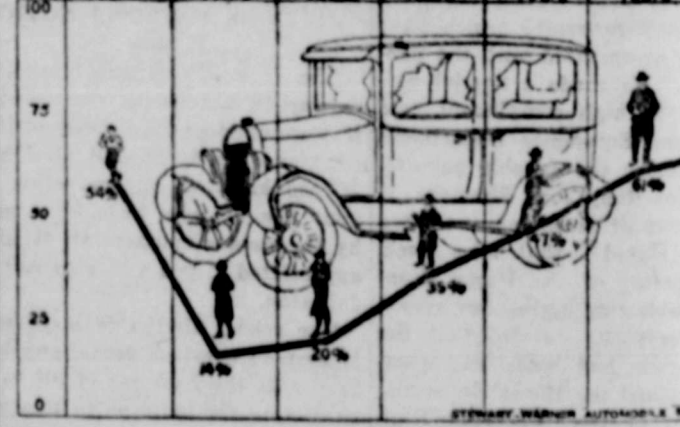

SHAKESPEARE'S seven ages of mankind made no reference to the who were cut off in their prime by automobiles. If he had, the Stewart-Warner Safety Council, it might have run something like parody on his famous lines:

At first the infant,
Killed by a truck while in his nurse's arms.
And then the careless schoolboy with his marbles,
Playing in the streets after his lessons
Are over. And then the lover,
Absent-minded, walking with a box of candy
Under his arm, to see his loved one,
Is struck by a taxi and hurled to the ground.
Next comes the gay young blood
Out for his evening's entertainment, whom
Sixty miles an hour lands forty years too soon
Upon a slab in some unfriendly morgue.
And then the banker, full of worldly pride and honors,
Jay-walks across the street between two mighty deals of finance
And wakes to find Saint Peter quizzing him.
Next, the family man, with years upon him,
Confused and jostled in the crowd,
Missteps, and dies amid thanksgiving
That his last premium was paid up.
And last, hoary age, tottering and feeble,
Perhaps with crutch, or eye too dimmed with time,
An easy victim for some selfish motorist,
Bare care, sans thought, sans skill, sans everything—but speed.
The chart above shows what proportion of all accidents happening to age group are automobile accidents. The toll is highest for the very young and very old. This situation is explained partly by the heedlessness of young and the infirmity of old age. Moreover, these two groups are involved in industrial accidents which makes their automobile casualties constitute a larger part of their total accidents.

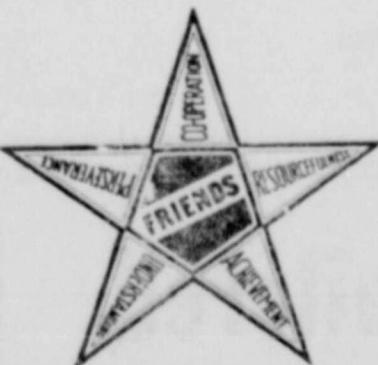

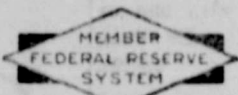

OCHILTREE COUNTY
INTERESTED IN HOGS

Col. C. C. French, Industrial Agent of the Fort Worth Stockyards company, Fort Worth, Texas, in connection with the joint hog importing campaign through his organization and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has submitted a proposition to the citizens of Ochiltree County, thru the Perryton Chamber of Commerce by which selected gifts may be imported into this county at cost plus \$1.00 per hog for immunization and dipping. Under the plan arranged representatives of the Armour and Swift packeries at Sioux City and Omaha will select one carload of not less than 80 hogs, all to be of registered parentage and pay for the same at the cash market prices at the stock yards on the day of purchase. These hogs will then be immunized against hog flu, hog cholera, hog pneumonia and other hog diseases, then dipped and placed in a hog freight car and shipped direct to Perryton and the hogs will not have to be taken out of the car to be fed enroute but the car will have a special feed vat built in the center of the same so that the hogs may be fed enroute. Upon arrival at Perryton these hogs will be distributed to those who have contracted for them and the first to come will be first served. All persons desiring these hogs should make immediate application to the Perryton Chamber of Commerce for participation in the movement.

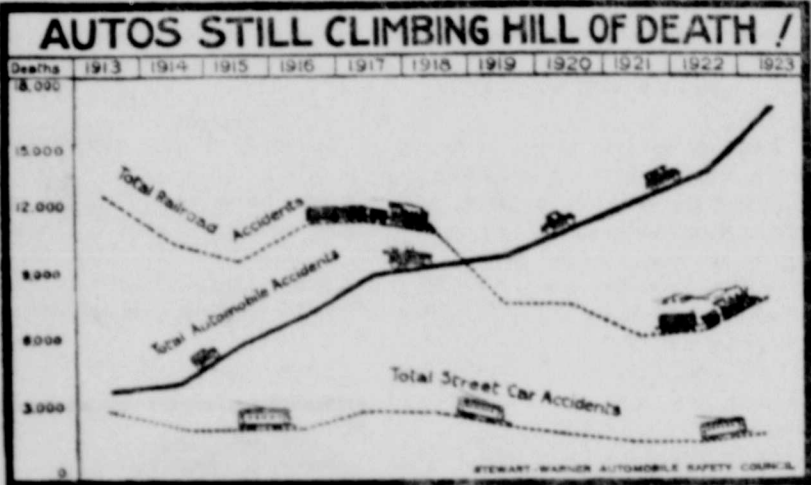

Auto Tragedies Increase as
Other Travel Is Made Safer



WHILE railroad tragedies and street car accidents in the United States have gradually been diminishing in the last ten years, the annual toll exacted by automobile casualties is steadily mounting, says the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents. Railroad accidents have been cut more than one-third, or from 12,520 in 1913 to 8,078 in 1923, the latest government figures available. Street car fatalities also have been cut down one-third or from 3,080 in 1913 to 2,000 ten years later. Automobile deaths, on the other hand, have increased over five-fold against the 3,822 deaths in 1913 we have 16,452 in 1923, and the score is growing each year.

Care, more care and still more care, is the solution of this national problem. The pedestrian must be always on the alert and as spry as a kangaroo, if he is to keep out of harm's way, and the driver for his part must never relax his vigilance for a moment when human lives are at his mercy.

FAMOUS FORTS
IN U. S. HISTORY

By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

It Fired the First Gun in the
Revolution

Contrary to popular opinion, the opening gun of the Revolution was not fired at Lexington, Mass., on April 19, 1775. That honor really belongs to Portsmouth, N. H., where the first overt act in the war for independence took place, December 14, 1774.

On December 13, 1774, Paul Revere, as yet unknown to fame but already acting as messenger in the cause of American liberty, rode posthaste into Portsmouth to warn the local committee of public safety that General Gage was planning to reinforce Fort William and Mary, an ancient fortress of stone in Portsmouth harbor.

Gov. John Wentworth heard of Revere's arrival and sent word to Capt. John Cochran, commander of the little garrison of five soldiers, to be on guard against an attempt by the colonists to seize the munitions in the fort. Accordingly Cochran mounted three four-pounders on the walls of the fort where an attack would most likely come and ordered a sharp watch kept that night.

About four o'clock the next morning a party of 400 citizens, led by John Langdon, later a governor of New Hampshire, and John Sullivan, destined for fame as the conqueror of the Iroquois confederacy during the Revolution, approached the fort in boats. Cochran immediately opened fire, but took care to shoot over the heads of the mob, for he realized what his fate would be if he killed any of them.

Undaunted by the firing, the colonists swarmed into the fort, took Cochran and his men prisoners, but released them after they had carried away 100 barrels of gunpowder (some of which, incidentally, was "returned" to the British from the flaming mouths of patriotic muskets on Bunker Hill a little later) and other supplies. Although Governor Wentworth issued a proclamation calling for the arrest of these "traitors to his majesty," nothing was ever done about it, and in June, 1775, after his efforts to enlist more men to defend the fort had failed, he moved into Fort William and Mary with his family to hold it for King George.

By August the situation had become so threatening that Wentworth was glad to make his escape on a British warship and immediately after his departure the Americans demolished the fortress. Years later another fort was built on this historic spot and it was appropriately named Fort Constitution, a fit successor to the British Fort William and Mary, where the opening gun of the Revolution was fired.
