## Plan To Improve Water Work Will Cost \$54,700.25

The City of Colorado City has developed a plan to make water system improvements in an effort to rid city residents of rust colored water that occurs from time to time.

The advice of consultants has been sought in recent months and efforts are being made to clean the lines with water softeners. The work has been partially successful as the number of complaints received about rusty water has decreased since the effort was started.

The plan to replace old pipe where rust has accumulated and is dislodged by changes in water pressure was requested by Councilmen Rick Perkin and Eddie Piland.

City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., drew up the plan, based on taking care of the areas first that have the worst problems.

The plan, which does not cover all of the city's water system, will give a priority to the city's water department work schedule and will cost a total of \$54,700.25, which will be paid for out of existing funds and possibly by an increase in water and sewer rates.

Members of the council seem to favor increasing these rates in order to proceed with improving the water system as soon as possible. Piland said at a recent council meeting that the water and sewer rates are much too low as compared to other cities and he believes that city residents would be willing to pay a higher price to get better water.

Under the plan drawn up by Sadler, which has not yet been discussed by the council, there would be two parts of the plan, Unit I and Unit II.

Unit I would cost \$30,082.25

and would put new six-inch water lines from Watson to Eastover between Sixteen and Seventeenth Streets; from Watson to Eastover between 13th and 14th; from Watson to Eastover between 12th and 13th; from Austin to Rusk on 9th; from Austin to Rusk on 10th; Austin to Watson between 13th and

14th, and from 15th to 17th on Dallas.

Under Unit 2 proposals, new six-inch lines would be installed from 10th to 14th between Pine and Oak; from Oak to Chestnut on 11th; from 11th to 17th between Oak and Walnut; from Elm to Chestnut on 14th

and from 11th to 14th between Walnut and Elm.

These two units cover the areas of the city where the water situation is now the worst. No completion date for the water plan has yet been set as the plan has not yet been discussed by the council.

## Wolves 15, Brownfield 7

The Colorado City Wolves gave a large homecoming crowd and newly crowned homecoming queen Terre' Pawkett an exciting time Friday night as the Wolves scored their first points of the year and then went on to win a District 3-AAA game against Brownfield 15-7.

The Wolves were playing without one of their standout players, Russell Hertenberger, who was pulled out of the line-up shortly before the game started due to a back injury.

The Wolves were not to be denied even though they were playing a team that was much larger physically, had more speed and more experience.

The game started as a defensive battle with both teams moving the ball well until they got close to scoring territory.

Then early in the second quarter, Brownfield mounted a 62 yard drive in nine plays, ending on a one yard plunge on fourth down by Quarterback Mark Adams. The Point After Touchdown was kicked by Chayin Mousa.

With only little more than a minute left in the first half, the Wolves defense stopped the Cubs deep in Brownfield territory and the Cubs had to punt. The snap from center to the punter went high over the punter's head and into the end zone where the punter was tackled for a safety and two points, the Wolves' first score of the year.

From that time forward, the Wolves seemed to sense that a victory was near.

However, things didn't look so good on the kick-off opening the second half. The ball was fumbled by Wolves kick-off receivers and before they could get the ball it went out of bounds on the four yardline.

The Wolves were unable to get a first down but a long punt by Arnold Parker helped get the Wolves out of the hole.

Throughout the third quarter, the Cubs threatened to score time and time again, but the Wolves defense just wouldn't allow it.

One Cub drive was stopped on a fumble on the Wolves 19, covered by Amador Guerrero. Two other drives by the Cubs were stopped deep in Colorado City territory when the Cubs were unable to get first downs.

Then midway through the fourth quarter, after the Wolves had stopped a Cub drive on the Wolves nine yardline, the Wolves drove the ball to the Wolves 18, it was third and one. Arnold Parker broke through the left side of his line and bolted 82 yards for the Wolves first touchdown of the year.

The attempted extra point by Gene Banks was blocked but the Wolves were ahead to stay, 8-7, and the large crowd went wild.

The Brownfield team launched its efforts to come from behind but the Wolves defense, led by Bill Everett, Vicente Garcia, Gene Banks, Ed Warren and Julian Reyes time after time, threw Cub runners and the Cub quarterback for losses.

On the Wolves next possession, they again threatened to score as Parker again broke through the left side of the line and gained some 30 yards, which was among his almost 160 yards rushing for the night.

However, that drive by the Wolves was stopped and Brownfield again got the ball on a punt. Time was now going short and the Cubs were beginning to get frantic. They passed, the Wolves Amador Guerrero stepped in front of a Cub receiver, grabbed the ball and raced 30 yards for the score. Banks kicked the extra point to make the score 15-7.

On the kick-off, the Cubs got a good return. However, on the next play, the quarterback was thrown for a loss. On the se-

cond play, Guerrero again stepped in front of a Cubs receiver for another interception.

Colorado High Athletic Director Weldon Brevard said the game was a tremendous effort by everyone involved, especially on defense.

On offense, outstanding players included Banks, Parker, Roger Roenfeldt, Ruben Ornelas, Julian Reyes and Bill Everett.

Many of the younger players got playing time in the game which helped rest players who saw most of the action.

During the past two weeks, the Wolves have been working long and hard to overcome fumbles and pass interceptions which have defeated them and stopped many possible scoring drives in previous games.

This hard work paid off as last week, the Wolves only lost the ball twice on turnovers against Dunbar and against Brownfield, there was only one fumble.

Next week, the Wolves travel to Lubbock to play Estacado in another district 3-AAA game. Also Friday night, in other district 3-AAA games, Dunbar defeated Sweetwater, Lamesa won over Lakeview and Estacado had an open date.

## Commissioners Hear Reports

Paul Hunter, Mitchell County Commissioner, presented a report on the studies being done by the ambulance committee to the Commissioners Court during their regular monthly session Tuesday morning.

Hunter is the county representative to the committee which is working out a solution to the need for ambulance service in the city and county and he reported that studies have been made of various cities and towns across the state, but that no solution has yet been recommended.

The committee, which includes Hunter, Wayne Shawn, of the hospital district, Sam Oden of Westbrook, Royce Mahon of Loraine and Eddie Pi-

land of the city council, met again Thursday night with Darrell Rains of Kiker-Rains-Seale in order to study the problem further.

Kiker-Rains-Seale recently informed the city and county that the funeral home can no longer provide ambulance service after Nov. 15.

According to Hunter, subsidy of a private operator is not economical, and the best solution seems to be for either the sheriff's department, the city police or the hospital employees to provide the service since there are very few times when ambulance service is needed in Mitchell County.

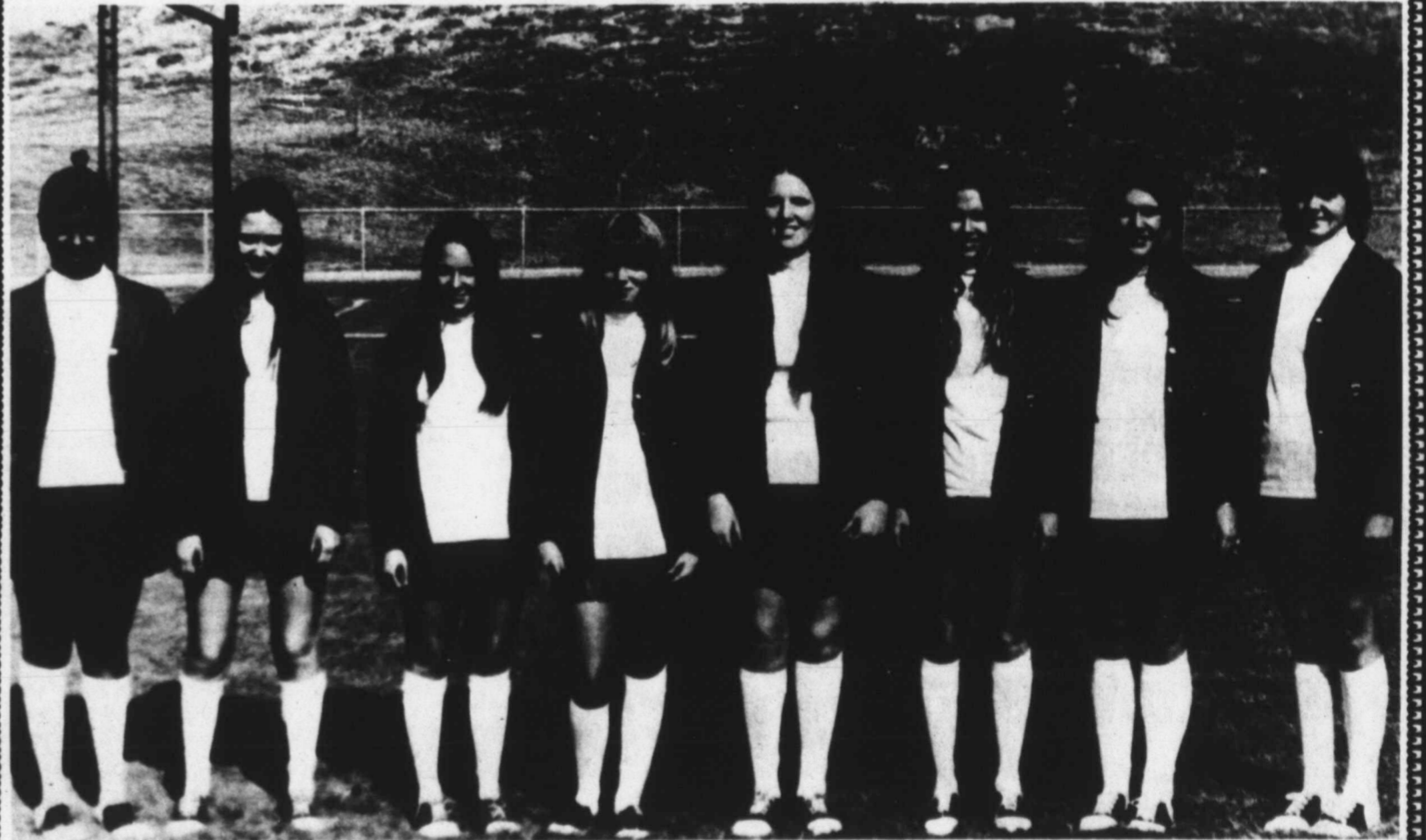

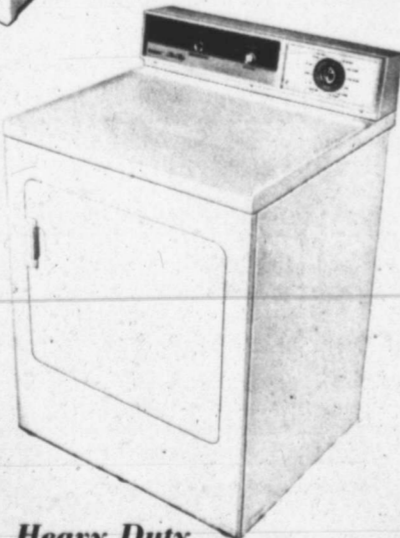

For each mile that each girl rides, she will collect pledges for a certain amount of money that will go to UNICEF.

UNICEF is the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund which is financed through voluntary contributions, with matching funds supplied by the governments of nations which are helped.

UNICEF's special targets are to help meet the needs of children in developing countries and to insure their healthy physical, intellectual and emotional growth by building permanent health services, improving the nutrition of children and of expectant and nursing women, strengthening family and child welfare, raising educational standards and making education more realistic in view of actual life prospects in the developing countries, training urgently needed workers and providing relief and rehabilitation assistance when natural or man-made disasters threaten the well-being of children.

A large part of UNICEF aid takes the form of equipment and supplies. Depending upon the project, UNICEF may provide such items as: equipment, drugs, and dietary supplements for maternal and child health services; motor vehicles, bicycles and maintenance equipment; audio-visual teaching aids; equipment and paper for the local production of textbooks, health and nutrition education materials; play materials for day-care centers; vaccines and equipment to produce vaccines; well-digging rigs, piping and pumps for clean water supply; garden tools and poultry-raising equipment; hand tools and workshop equipment for pre-vocational training; milk processing equipment; emergency aid items such as blankets, medical equipment and materials for shelter and water-purification.

In recent years, other types of aid have become increasingly important, particularly training stipends, financing for teaching staff, aid for planning and program development, engineering and technical services for food conservation, and service on transport maintenance.

--No. 7- to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund.

--No. 8- has to do with the ad valorem taxes in cities, towns and villages.

--No. 9- authorizing the leg-
