

HARDY TRIAL NOW PLANNED

CALIFORNIA ASSEMBLY
VOTES HEAVILY
TO IMPEACH

(By Associated Press)
SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 21.—Having voted to impeach Superior Judge Carlos S. Hardy of Los Angeles on charges of committing misdemeanors in office in connection with his activities in behalf of Alvin Karpis, the California assembly today expected to make plans today for conducting his trial.

The assembly voted 57 to 35 to impeach the judge yesterday after receiving recommendations of its committee which investigated Hardy's acceptance of \$2,500 from Mrs. Karpis while her husband was in the Los Angeles district attorney's office. Asa Karpis, then district attorney, filed a charge of conspiracy to obstruct justice against the judge, but it was dismissed.

ROW OFTEN CAUSE SERIOUS TURMOIL

TACNA-ARICA CONTEST
IS BROUGHT TO
AMICABLE END

SANTIAGO, Chile, Feb. 21 (AP)—The Tacna-Arica boundary dispute born in war and thriving through 43 years on international strife, has been settled by peaceful means.

Official announcement here says an agreement has been reached between the governments of Peru and Chile by which the province of Tacna goes to Peru and that of Arica to Chile.

The boundary between the two provinces is fixed slightly north of the railroad leading from the port of Arica to La Paz, Bolivia. This railroad, of the utmost importance to Bolivia since it is her sole outlet to the Pacific, remains in Chilean territory until it crosses the Bolivian frontier.

The railroad from Tacna to Arica will be in Peruvian control, while a spur which is to be constructed at Arica connecting the two lines will be under Chilean control.

The agreement is the result of diplomatic negotiations undertaken just four months ago. The resumption of diplomatic relations between them at the invitation of the United States Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg, last July.

The dispute had its origin in a war between Chile and the allies, Peru and Bolivia, in 1879. Chile won and occupied the two provinces. Resulting disputes over the land since often brought the two countries very near to war.

All but one of the doomed men went to death stoically but the fourth began singing hymns and making grimaces at his companions in death. Later he became violent and had to be brought to the gallows forcibly.

STEWART ISSUES ANOTHER APPEAL

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—Stockholders of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana who on March 7 will decide whether Col. Robert W. Stewart is to continue as chairman of the board, have been mailed a new appeal for re-election by Col. Stewart.

The letter charges spokesmen of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., with a "campaign of misrepresentation" in their effort to remove Col. Stewart from control. It expresses the hope that the contest between the younger Rockefeller and himself may be kept on a high plane. "It was my understanding that such, too, was

the hope and intention of Mr. Rockefeller," the letter continued.

"Then Mr. Rockefeller called for Egypt," Col. Stewart wrote in the letters which went into the mails last night. "Mr. Aldrich (Winthrop W. Aldrich, brother-in-law and attorney for Mr. Rockefeller) and Mr. Ivy Lee apparently did not understand the matter as he did."

"After saying he would embark on no 'unseemly scramble for proxies,' it surely must be without his knowledge or consent that others in his name have embarked upon a campaign of misrepresentation."

The chairman denied that he was asking a personal vindication of the stockholders. "That has already been given to me by two courts and two juries." What he wanted, he said, was that they vote "for the good of the company and your own good."

EREFILBUSTER IS NOW MENACING

THREE QUESTIONS ARE CASTING SHADOWS OVER SENATE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—In the closing days of the session three questions are casting fillbuster shadows over the Senate.

One is a difference in views over the proposed \$24,000,000 increase for prohibition enforcement; another revolves around the navy department measure carrying funds for the cruiser construction program; and the third hinges on the opposition of Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, to a provision in the interior department bill which would authorize the secretary of the interior to condemn any privately owned lands in public parks. All the bills affected are appropriation measures.

The prohibition item was added by the senate to the first deficiency bill and republican leaders have declined to let that bill die and to leave the \$24,000,000 out of the second deficiency bill. Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, has declared that if this program is followed the second deficiency bill would have a hard time getting through the

WITNESS TELLS OF CHANGED TALLY SHEET IN MCLOSKEY TRIAL

TESTIMONY HAD BEEN THROTTLED

ELECTION JUDGE AVERS HE WAS AFRAID OF 'CONSEQUENCES'

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Feb. 21.—Through a witness who said he previously had not told all he knew because he did not know what they would do to me in the county building, the prosecution in the trial of Congressman-elect Augustus J. McCloskey planned today to further project its theory that McCloskey, or his friends, wrote into the records illegal votes to defeat Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach for re-election. The case was transferred here from Bexar county (San Antonio).

Ed Englehardt, San Antonio city school board employee, swore yesterday that at the insistence of his superior, Fritz Russ, school board superintendent of buildings and grounds, he handed to Russ the copy of the tally sheet for the 20th San Antonio voting precinct, of which Englehardt was presiding officer, and that the paper came back carrying 30 addition votes for McCloskey.

The statutes would require Englehardt to keep the sheet. He gave it to Russ, he declared, after protesting unavailingly. While it was out of his hands, someone, he knew not who, changed the figures to give McCloskey 328 votes, the witness said.

Cross examined, Englehardt conceded that his statements before the congressional campaign expenditures committee and a San Antonio board of inquiry had been different and not as comprehensive. His testimony before the board, he added, had not been complete because he "didn't know what they would do

to me in the county building."

After the witness had said that eight of the election officers who served with him had been appointed illegally, the defense decided to predicate a motion for dismissal on this point. If the ballot box officials had acted illegally, counsel argued, any tampering with the returns would not be criminal. McCloskey, democrat, former Bexar county judge, is under five indictments charging him with altering, in his official position, the returns favorably to his race for the 14th Texas congressional seat. Of Wurzbach, republican. The former jurist was indicted with Charles Ramirez, his erstwhile secretary, and Elmer Wernette, but these latter will go to trial later.

Choose Airplane For Eaker Flight

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—An announcement was made by the war department today that the airplane chosen for the dawn to dusk flight of Captain Ira C. Eaker from Brownsville, Texas, to Panama, will be christened the "Pan-American" at Kelly Field, San Antonio, March 8. Miss Mary Fechet, daughter of the chief of the army air corps, will perform the ceremony, and the "Pan-American" will leave Brownsville at dawn, March 10.

TESTING PICKER

John Deere Men Here To Check Over Tests Work

In connection with experiments upon mechanical cotton pickers, A. T. McCrary, engineer of the John Deere Tractor Works, and Harold Winter, engineer of the Deere-Manure Works, are in Lubbock checking up on the progress made here during the past several months in the cotton picking machine tests conducted by the John Deere Plow company.

Possibilities of tractors on the South Plains also will be investigated by these engineers while they are in this section. Much progress is reported in the tests made here both on the horse-drawn and tractor-drawn machines. The tests have been conducted on the O. P. Thompson farm, just east of the state experiment farm, four miles from the city. The John Deere crew has been here for the past ninety days, headed by V. F. Bozeman, and including Bruce Morse, Messers, Court, Gallen and Corley.

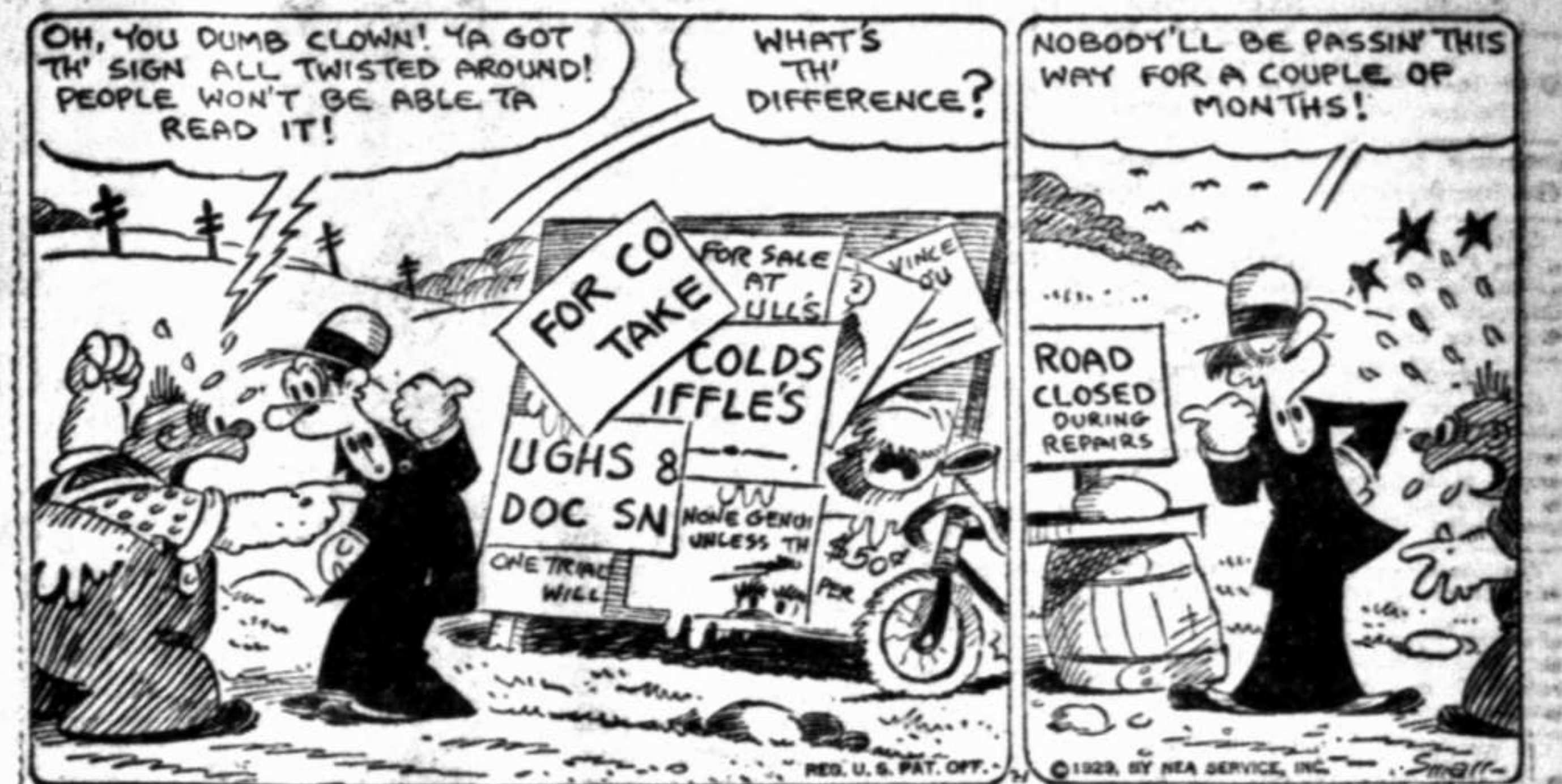
