Federated Clubs To Sponsor "Anthony Adverse" at Palace

"Anthony Adverse", Hervey Allen's monumental literary classic, brought to the screen with all its wealth of color and dramatic fire, has been booked by Mr. Audrey Cox for the Palace Theatre where it will have its showing Tuesday and Wednesday, March 30 and 31. Through the generosity of Mr. Cox, the picture is being sponsored by the Federated Women's Clubs of Lamesa, Mrs. E. J. Yates and Mrs. Russell Clark acting as co-chairmen, assisted by Mesdames Wright Boyd, Matt McCall, L. M. Pratt, T. F. Vaughn and William Gay.

Frederic March has the stellar role, with beautiful and talented Olivia de Havilland playing the leading feminine role. The picture follows the romantic adventures of Anthony Adverse thru five countries, across the seas and over three continents. For mammoth sets, for colorful and picturesque backgrounds, for dynamic action, for the unusual characterizations of its tremendous cast from Frederic March, the star, down to the smallest bit player, for the glamour of its romance, its human interest, and sheer, unadulterated entertainment, this picture is unsurpassed.

Warner Bros. have again accomplished the apparently impossible. It has a tremendous cast, with 98 speaking parts and 2,500 bit players and extras. This serves as the background for a drama of human life. Frederic March has given the screen some wonderful portrayals in the past, but never has he risen to the heights of dramatic fire as in the title role of this picture. His Anthony is a living, breathing person, stepping out of a book into real life on the screen. He is ably supported by Olivia de Havilland. This is Miss de Havilland's first great emotional role and she rises to it with true artistry. Other loves of Anthony are found in the characterizations portrayed by Steffi Duna and Gale Sondergaard. Both give unusually fine interpretations. Edmund Gwenn, the famous English actor, gives a wonderful portrayal of John Bonnyfeather, the grand father of Anthony, who sells his daughter into a loveless match for the price of a title. Anita Louise has never appeared more beautiful, nor has she ever given a better performance than as the daughter, who, married to a Spanish grandee, refuses to give up her handsome Irish army officer. Claude Rains gives an excellent portrayal of the grandee of Spain as does Louis Hayward as the young Irish lover. The members of the cast are too numerous to mention in their entirety but among those of special prominence who do exceptional work are Billy Mauch, Donald Woods, Henry O'Neill, Uedro De Cordoba and George Stone.

Two operatic sequences, staged by Natale Carosio, add to the beauty and magnificence of the picture. Original music that fits not only the scenes but the moods of the scenes, was written for the production by Erich Wolfgang Korngold. Special tribute must be paid to the direction of Mervyn LeRoy, and the screen play by Sheridan Gibney.

City Orders Summer Irrigation Water Rate

Attention is called to the fact that the City Commission has again decided to extend to water customers the privilege of a summer irrigation rate. This rate will begin the date of the March meter reading and will show for the first time on bills sent out May the first.

In order that everyone may clearly understand just how their water will be figured under the above mentioned irrigation rate, the following is given: First 5,000 gallons \$2.00 Each additional 1,000 gallons .15 All water used up to 5,000 gallons will be figured on the regular winter rate. This rate is instituted specifically for irrigation purposes, therefore strictly commercial users will not be benefited. However, the businesses such as court house, hotels and schools, who use, in addition to commercial water other water for summer irrigation, the following allowance will be made: an average of the water used during the months of December, January and February will be figured at the regular rate; all over this amount to be figured on the irrigation rate of 15c per thousand.

To customers who plan to avail themselves of this special rate, attention is called to the fact that very little benefit will be derived by those who water sparingly. This fact will be readily apparent after closely analyzing the above rate table. For instance, whereas the first 5,000 gallons cost \$2.00, each additional 5,000 gallons will cost only 75c. Therefore, the difference between a poorly watered place and one whose grass and trees are kept green and growing would likely amount to no more than dollar or so. This irrigation is meant to be used, and the city officials are hoping that everyone will take advantage of it to the extent that our homes and our city will be a matter of pride to us during the coming summer months.

Work Started on Country Club House

Contract for building of a club house at the new country club site was let Monday of this week, with work to start immediately. Allen and Waller received the building contract.

The club house will be a modern frame structure, with five rooms. It is planned to complete this house in about six weeks.

The new country club started only last year, is located on the Big Spring Highway about two miles from town.

Work Started On Stanton Highway

Another step forward in the development and advancement of Dawson county and Lamesa was begun this week when work was started on the improvement of the Lamesa to Stanton road.

Funds are being furnished by the Works Progress Administration and Dawson county. This is the first WPA project the county has sponsored and work was slow in being started in that the county had to set up their organization and it took time to do this.

The project calls for 15.2 miles of caliche base with topping, to be built in 4 mile units. The road is to be built to all state specifications, and when completed will be comparable to all the standard state highways in Texas. Mr. C. H. Collins of Brownfield, will be the WPA superintendent in charge of the construction.

Plans also call for a concrete bridge over Sulphur Draw just outside the City limits of Lamesa. This bridge is unique in that it will be the only bridge in Dawson county. The testing of the caliche for the road base was begun on Thursday morning.

This is one of the most important roads in the Lamesa trade territory and for many years citizens of Lamesa have been endeavoring to get the road improved. Some of the richest farming territory in Dawson county will be served by this road and residents of the southwestern part of Dawson county will be happy to learn that the work has at last begun, assuring them of an all-weather route to Lamesa.

It will also save travelers going from Lamesa southwest to Stanton, Midland, Odessa and other points in that direction many miles of extra travel, shortening the distance at least 25 or thirty miles. Dawson county is to be congratulated upon securing the order for this work.

Lamesa Polo Team to Meet San Angelo Club

The Lamesa polo team and all first string horses went to San Angelo last Friday where they played a practice game Friday afternoon with the San Angelo Rainbow crack polo team consisting of all veteran players who have played in the east and on the west coast for several years. In fact, several years back went to England carrying their horses and playing that year or season without losing a game.

Friday's practice game was 12 to 9 in favor of the San Angelo club. Sunday another game was played before a large crowd. Both teams and horses were in perfect shape. San Angelo people claimed this was the fastest game ever played on the 'Head of the River Ranch field'. Lamesa team lead 10 to 0 at the half and finished leading 14 to 5.

There will be two return games played in Lamesa at the Lamesa Country Club polo grounds the 3rd and 4th of April and it will be worth while to see these games, and people of this country will not have the chance to see this class of polo often.

San Angelo players will truck 23 fine finished polo horses. They will be shipped from here to Wichita, Kansas, where they will play one week, then be shipped on to Detroit where they will be placed on the market. (These horses will bring \$1,000 and better.) This string of horses are bred up from the famous Billy Anson horses. Mr. Anson coming direct from England to Head of the River Ranch near San Angelo where this strain of horses have been bred, raised and finished for over thirty years. With these horses will be a polo horse trainer from Detroit and one from the West Coast.

Lamesa players have just started back to playing polo, playing one practice game here March 7, playing Rowell Military Institute at Rowell March 24, in San Angelo, March 21. They will go to Rowell again March 23 and San Angelo will be here April 3-4.

Interscholastic League Meet Being Held This Week

The annual Dawson county Interscholastic League Meet will be held this week in Lamesa. Twenty-seven school units are to take part in the various contests most of which are of literary nature—Story-telling, declamation, extemporaneous speech, one-act play, choral singing, arithmetic, picture memory, music memory, ready-writers, debating, spelling and arithmetic contests are featured in the Friday contests. Other events are to be held Saturday.

The League was originated by the University of Texas some thirty years ago and the organization has grown to include more than 7000 schools of all sizes. The League record books include the names of most of the public men of Texas as pupils who took part in public speaking contests during their high school training.

Director of the various events in this county are: V. Z. Rogers, general director; W. C. McKenzie, debate; T. H. Bass, athletics; X. R. Banks, declamation; Mrs. J. L. Morris, picture memory; Miss Gertrude Jones, ready-writers and choral singing; Mr. G. M. Roberts, arithmetic; Mrs. J. E. Barron, spelling; Henry Cash, extemporaneous speech; Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, Three-R's; and Miss Della Dean, one-act play.

All events are to be held, this Friday and Saturday, March 26 and 27 except playground ball for both boys and girls which will be held on Saturday, April 3rd at the Lamesa school campus.

Klondike and Ackerly Schools Get Additional Credits

Klondike and Ackerly schools are both attaining the status of fully accredited four-year high schools this year. Deputy State Superintendent G. D. Holbrook, after visiting these schools last week, reported that he would recommend to the Committee on Classified and Accredited Schools that the following credits be granted to these schools for this year:

Klondike: Bookkeeping, fourth year English, first and second year Spanish, one-half unit each in Texas History and typing.

Ackerly: Third and fourth year English general science, one-half unit in commercial arithmetic.

This gives Klondike a total of seventeen and one-half affiliated credits and Ackerly a total of sixteen. These communities are to be congratulated upon this attainment. 11 Towns Represented At Highway Meeting

One hundred and fifty representatives from towns along State Highway 15 in Texas and New Mexico attended the East-West Highway Association meeting in Lamesa last Thursday.

A good meeting was held with much enthusiasm shown by the delegation on the completion of Highway 15 through Texas and New Mexico. Eleven towns had delegations present with Snyder leading with 75 delegates, including the Snyder high school band.

Speakers on the program were: Carl Rountree, Lamesa; Homer T. Burleson, Anson; Sam Richardson, president of the Association, Lamesa; G. M. Barrett, divisional engineer of Lubbock; W. A. French, divisional engineer of Abilene; Charles G. Cotten, Fort Worth; R. A. Thompson, Dallas; John M. Chamberlin, Mineral Wells; Col. Thomas Boles, superintendent of the Carlsbad Cavern, Carlsbad, N. M.; Victor L. Minter, Carlsbad, N. M.; Mayor Ross Walker, Hobbs, N. M.

Gibb Gilchrist, chief engineer of the State Highway Department, was delayed and did not reach Lamesa in time for the meeting but came later in the afternoon and held a conference with officials of the association.

Dawson Chalks Up Envious Loan Record

Farmers in Dawson county who were rescued from economic drifting by the Resettlement administration, have set an enviable record for the repayment of their indebtedness, according to the recent report of the county supervisor.

Dawson county had 280 clients who obtained standard loans from the Resettlement administration. Clients were loaned \$112,227.37, or an average of \$408.22 per client. These loans were to be repaid over a three-year period.

The repayments due in 1936 totaled \$73,018.47, but the Dawson county farmers paid \$77,138.81, or considerably more than one hundred per cent of what they owed. And further of the 280 clients set up on a sustenance unit, approximately 100 clients have been fully rehabilitated, and will need no further aid.

Rehabilitation clients last year, thru the aid of the Soil Conservation Service and the Extension Service, conserved and terraced approximately 4500 acres of the land they were farming. Dawson county has the only participation loan in effect in its area—a registered jack for the purpose of raising the standard of work stock in the county.

On a basis of the farm plans which old clients are submitting for the new year, it is estimated that approximately 75 per cent of all living expenses will be furnished by the home.

Rehabilitation has made an enviable record of success in Dawson county, and observers believe that its benefits will continue to be felt in the future.

The regulations governing choice of a play for 1937 contests requires that all competing casts present comedy or farce type of play.

The length of the play cannot exceed forty minutes. The two plays of the evening will furnish plenty of entertainment for the public which is cordially invited.

The program is scheduled to begin at 7:45. The school representatives will draw for the privilege of showing first or last.

4-H Club Livestock Show Opens Here Friday, March 26

The 4-H Club Livestock and Poultry Show for this county opens today in the large cottonseed warehouse on the railroad southeast of Lamesa. Preparations are complete for the housing of the various livestock and poultry exhibits. The building has been lighted so that the visitors will be able to see the exhibits at night. The Dairy Cow Show sponsored by the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation is being held in the same building.

Judging of exhibits will begin at 10:00 o'clock. At 2:30 p. m. the auction sale for the beef calves will be held just outside the show building. A number of local firms have indicated their intention of bidding on the calves. The prize list for the show was published in last week's issue of this paper. An additional prize group has been added to the poultry division and will be paid by Baldwin's Store. Ribbons will be given all the winners through fourth prizes.

About seventy club boys will have their demonstrations on exhibit. Exhibits include dairy calves, beef calves, swine and poultry. A considerable number of farmers are expected to exhibit their cows in the dairy show.

Federal Aid Asked For Highway Park

Many improvements are being made at the highway park at the intersection of Highways 9 and 15, south of Lamesa. Today 500 trees have been set out, a well dug, and all well equipment to be added in the very near future.

Six hundred and seventy-five dollars will be spent at the park site, with the city furnishing the well, the county a 10,000 gallon storage tank and gasoline engine, with the Luncheon and Licens Clubs paying the balance.

G. M. Garrett, divisional engineer has made application to the State highway department that this park be made a Federal State project, asking for \$7,000 to further improve the site. This is expected to be granted with work to start sometime after July the first.

Members of the park committee are J. E. Barron, chairman, Dr. V. L. Lawson and A. G. Bearden.

Lamb County Sheriff Killed By Negro

Sheriff F. A. Loyd, 48, who took the reins of Lamb county's law enforcement after federal investigation had proved a former sheriff guilty of conspiracy, died of bullet wounds in a sanitarium at Lubbock early Monday morning.

Leroy Kelly, negro, who shot the sheriff at Littlefield Saturday night, was held in the Lubbock county jail for safekeeping.

Funeral services were held at Littlefield Tuesday at the First Baptist church, with burial in the Littlefield cemetery.

Sheriff Loyd was the second South Plains peace officer to be killed by a negro in a little over a year. Deputy Sheriff F. E. Redwine of Tahoka was slain March 6, 1936 by Elmo Banks, negro, who was later electrocuted.

Loyd was shot when he and a deputy attempted to arrest Kelly after it had been reported that the negro had shot a negro woman. Locating Kelly the officers ordered him to surrender. Loyd answered with a burst of gunfire. Loyd returned the fire and grappled with the negro. When the sheriff fell the deputy grabbed his dropped gun and fire twice at the negro. The negro was later captured by a posse of citizens.

Wins at Southwestern Exposition Field Meet

Jack Hughes, Lamesa High School's sole representative at the Southwestern Exposition Track and Field Meet at Fort Worth last Friday and Saturday, scored six points in the meet, winning first place in the discus throw with a toss of 137 feet 10 inches, and a fourth place in the shot put.

Jack's winning throw in the discus compared favorably with those of the college and university divisions and was about ten feet further than the winning throw for the prep school or college freshman division.

Clovis Johnson, another ex-Lamesa High School student, also won honors at the meet, competing for the North Texas State Teachers College, in the college division, winning third place in the 440 yard dash and running a lap on the winning team in the mile relay, in which a new record was set.

R. H. Huddleston, track coach of Lamesa High, accompanied Hughes to Fort Worth.

URGE EVERYONE TO CLEAN HOUSES AND YARDS

Austin, March 23.—The accumulation of winter's beris represents a distinct menace to the health of adults and particularly to little children, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who urges everyone to clean their houses and yards at this time. It is not only good housekeeping but ordinary sanitary principles indicate the necessity of prompt removal of all waste matter in and around the neighborhood of yards of homes, but the definite lessening of the spread of diseases, especially those affecting infants, is vitally connected with this procedure.

Flies help spread typhoid fever, dysentery, diarrhea, tuberculosis, anthrax, and cholera. They breed, live and feed in filth. To prevent their increase all refuse should be disposed of at once, garbage kept in covered containers, privies made sanitary, and houses screened. Every neighborhood raises its own flies, so that their number is an index to the sanitary conditions.

Mosquitoes are responsible for the spread of malaria, dengue, and yellow fever. Malaria is spread by the bite of the Anopheles or malaria mosquito. Dengue fever and yellow fever are transmitted by the Aedes Aegypti or Tiger mosquito. The best way to prevent these diseases is to destroy the

breeding places of the mosquito. They breed in standing water, therefore, one should drain, ditch, or fill such places, spray oil on water each week, or stock the water with surface minnows as they will eat the wigglers. Houses should be well screened to protect against these insects. After the spring cleaning is finished, it should be kept in this condition at all times.

EAST TEXAS SCHOOL BLAST CLAIMS 455 LIVES THURSDAY

Accumulated gas under the basement floor ignited by some unknown means, was given by a court of inquiry as the cause of the New London school disaster last Thursday afternoon.

The blast which occurred last Thursday afternoon just after three o'clock was the greatest school tragedy in the history of civilization, claiming a total of 455 lives, students and teachers. Practically every family in the New London school district, located in the heart of the East Texas oil fields, and one of the richest in the world, suffered the loss of from one to four children. Nearly every town in Texas was affected in that some relative was killed in the blast.

The Courier is not carrying a complete story of the tragedy due to the fact that the state dailies have carried the story in both news and picture form and to do so would only be a rehash of already known facts. Dawson county along with the rest of Texas and the United States bows its head in sorrow and extends sympathy to those who lost loved ones.

The appropriations committee of which I am vice-chairman, has completed a very busy week.

On last Saturday, we entrained along with the Finance Committee of the Senate, for Kingsville, and the lower Rio Grande Valley on an inspection trip of that portion of the State. At Kingsville, we inspected Texas A. & I., and returned to Austin early Monday morning.

Since returning, the members of the committee have been literally swamped with requests for interviews by the people interested in the passage of House Bill No. 600, which makes an appropriation of \$1,900,000 to the Department of Education for the rural aid fund. The appropriation committee held a public hearing on the bill Thursday night two weeks ago, at which time the Superintendent of Public Instruction attempted to show the committee that this appropriation was necessary. Failing to do this the bill was referred to a sub-committee for further consideration and study in an effort to determine the needs of the rural fund.

Although a complete report has not been made to the main committee, they have, however, discovered that over \$2,000,000 is available in the rural school fund for which no comptroller warrants have been issued, and in the event this fund should be released, there would be no necessity for appropriating any additional funds, anything like as large as requested, and no danger of any premature closing of schools at this time.

The committee has asked the Supt. of Public Instruction to release this money to the rural schools and I wish to urge all people that are interested in this matter, whose school is facing a financial crisis to urge the above gentleman to cooperate in this matter. Judging by the contents of the various telegrams and letters I have received in this regard, I realize that many of you are under the impression that the rural school fund is exhausted. This impression is erroneous, and an attempt has been made to mislead the people of Texas in this matter in an effort to bring pressure to bear on the legislature so as to secure the appropriation of \$1,900,000.

No one is any stronger in favor of aiding the rural schools of Texas or any phase of education than I, but I do want to know how and where this money will be used before creating additional deficits at this time. From all the information the sub-committee has been able to derive, the amount needed at this time is \$500,000 rather than \$1,900,000 to bring the rural aid fund up to the 87 per cent of the approved request made by the Deputy State Superintendents. From all the available information there is now sufficient money in this fund to pay 80 per cent of the grant of the Deputy State Superintendents rather than 70 per cent as you have been lead to believe.

I know that the taxpayers of Texas want their children to have every dollar they need for rural education, and I also know that they do not want this or any other legislature to waste a million and a half dollars by appropriating that much more than is necessary to this department or any other department.

The appropriation committee has adopted a policy of inquiring as to the proper amount needed for continuing rural aid on its present high standard.

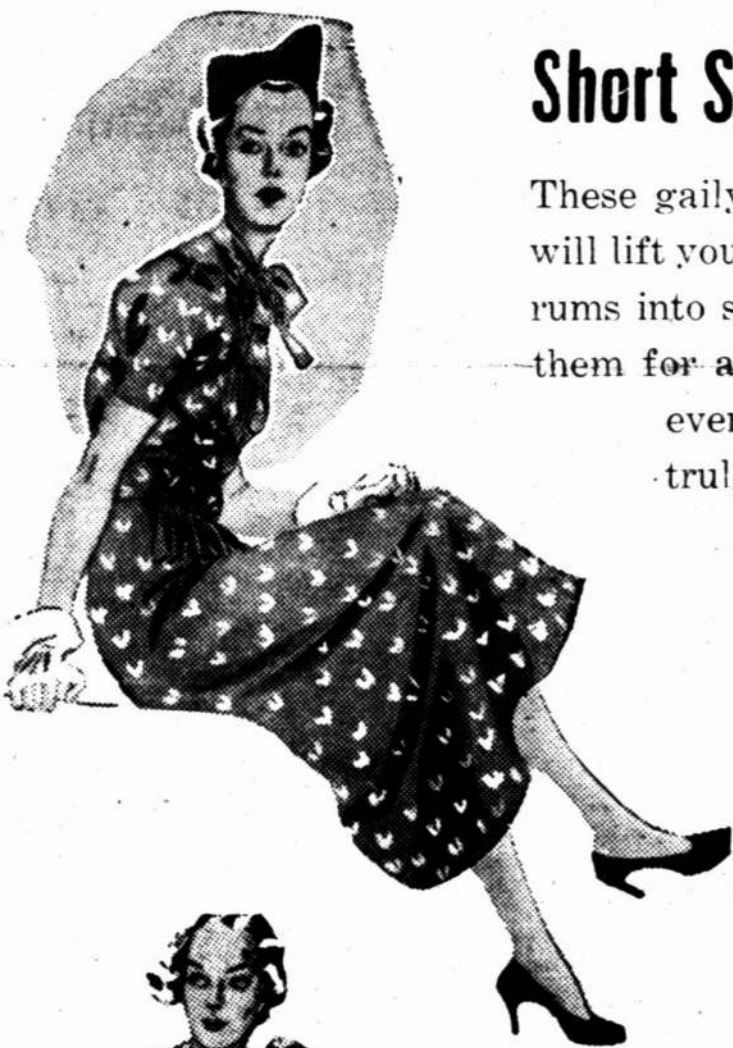

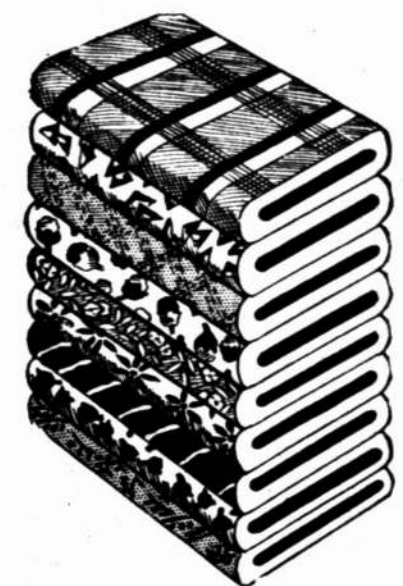

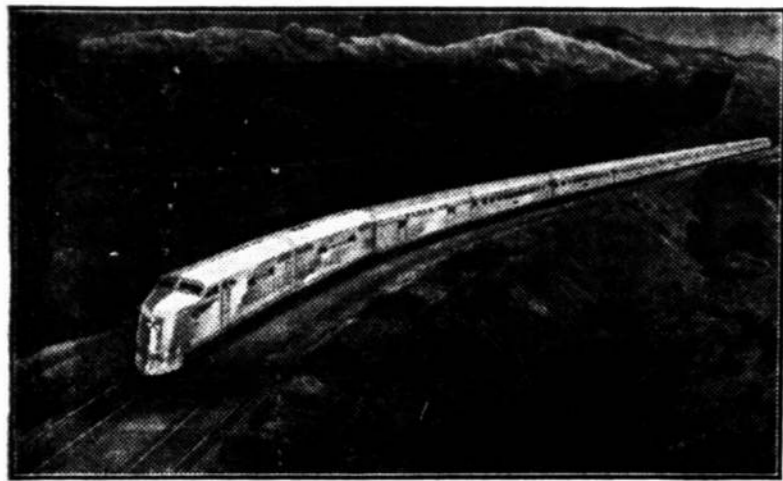
