During August, 1952, there were 25 days when the temperature was 100 degrees or more. On the other six days, it was 96 one day, 97 one day, 98 one day and 99 three days.

For comparison, August, 1953, had only five days when the temperature went 100 degrees or more. It was 90 degrees or hotter on about 12 days. We've only had three 90 degree or hotter days since August 18.

Night time temperatures have been cooler this year, too. They've been in the high 60s and the low 70s all during August. Last year, there were more low 80s than high 70s among the nights of August.

PART OF CISCO got a good rain yesterday. On the west side of town, up to half an inch fell, while it only sprinkled over on the east side and in the downtown area. Southwest of Cisco, it also rained up to half an inch in places.

"Before moving to Double Mountain, we had lived two years in Breckenridge and a few years in Bosque County, living on cotton-tail rabbits, wild honey and berries. I went to school in Cisco and got my 'college degree' at the frame school building located on the spot where the grammar school is today."

"In those days we said speeches, but now they call it 'reading.' I always developed a severe headache on Friday afternoons, as I could never speak in public. I am timid unto this day. If I could have been able to speak in public, I would possibly have been as good a lawyer as B. W. Patterson. But he was not scared like I was, and was always just a little ahead of me in school."

The change was made in order to allow members of the National Guard and other organizations that meet on Monday night to attend the booster meetings. BURLESON SPEAKER AT ANNUAL MEET OF COUNTY FARM BUREAU

"Food is the greatest weapon this nation has to use in its fight against Communism, and the country's farmers are doing a good job in keeping the food supply plentiful," Congressman Omar Burleson of the 17th District told a large crowd of Eastland County Farm Bureau members and guests at their annual barbecue Monday night at Eastland's city park.

Mr. Burleson complimented the Farm Bureau, a national organization, on "a very sound program for the benefit of the farmers." He noted that bureau's Washington officials are highly respected by Congressmen "because they never ask for anything that is unreasonable."

The congressman revealed that he and other West Texas solons

made an unsuccessful fight to have this drought stricken area exempted from all agricultural quotas this year. "Our section had crop failures in 1951 and 1952 and contributed nothing to the current surplus in farm products, and we felt justified in asking for exemption from quotas this year."

Mr. Burleson said that "we must sell the farm program over again each year in Washington." He noted that the Eisenhower administration is doing a better job with the farm problem than at first, "and I am supporting the administration."

The current weak beef markets was attributed in part by Mr. Burleson to the importation of Argentine beef. He believed that the drought relief feed program was working smoother than in the beginning.

Congressman Burleson was introduced by B. J. Gist of Abilene, director of District Seven, Texas Farm Bureau Federation.

A. Z. Myrick of Cisco, president of the Farm Bureau, was master of ceremonies. He introduced the visiting Farm Bureau personnel. Introduced were Bob Lilly, field representative of District Seven, and Hub King, director from Terry County.

Mr. Myrick reported that almost 1,000 men, women and children attended the affair. It was the largest annual meeting ever held by the bureau. The visitors consumed 642 pounds of barbecue. To finish out the meal the committee cooked 50 pounds of beans, 200 pounds of potatoes for salad, 40 pounds of onions and 60 gallons of coffee. In addition they served 1,000 dishes of ice cream and 800 bottled drinks.

Schools Will Introduce New Educational Ideas This Fall

FALL HUNTING SEASON BEGINS FOR TEXANS; DOVES UP FIRST

The annual fall hunting season opened in Texas today as nimrods in the north zone of the state took to the fields at noon in search of mourning doves. The dove season ushers in a hunting season that will go into January of 1954.

While the dove crop generally appeared to be below par, the Cisco area was due for fair hunting. Recent rains have improved the outlook. Quail hunting which doesn't begin until Dec. 1, is not expected to be too good in this area.

Here is a summary of most of the 1953 fall hunting seasons in Texas:

Mourning Doves — September 1-October 10, North Zone; noon to sunset; ten doves a day, ten in possession. October 1-November 9 South Zone; noon to sunset; ten doves a day, ten in possession.

White-Winged Doves — September 11, 13, 15 — 4 p. m. to sunset; ten doves a day, ten in possession. Antelope — October 1-9, West of Pecos; October 20-24, and October 27-31 in Panhandle. Limit, one buck antelope. Special permit required.

Waterfowl — November 6-January 4, five ducks a day, ten in possession; five geese a day and in possession in the aggregate.

Deer — November 16-December 31 under General State Law; November 20-25, West of Pecos; November 14-23 in Panhandle. Many special local seasons. Limit varies from two buck deer under General Law to one buck deer in other instances.

Turkey — November 16-December 31 under General State Law; November 14-23 in Panhandle. Limit three gobblers under General Law, two gobblers in Panhandle. Special dates and limits govern several counties.

Quail — December 1-January 16 under General Law; one-half

Changes Planned For All Schools

Many new innovations will be introduced to students in the Cisco public schools as they enter Tuesday, September 8, for the 1953-54 school year, it was reported today by Arlin Birt, school superintendent.

Children enrolling for the first time in Cisco schools, those in the first grade, will be presented a diploma showing that they have successfully completed their first year of school. Noted on the miniature sheepskin will be the fact that they will receive a similar award when they have successfully completed 12 years of work in the Cisco schools.

When the student registers this week he will be given a book welcoming him to the school for his first year. The book will be filled with instructions and with suggestions to parents as to habits, diets and other items of interest to both student and parent.

Mr. Birt announced that the P. E. periods during the day would be completely changed and that close supervision of the student during the game period would be in order. A special program of games, appropriate for each grade and age group, has been planned and will be under the direction of the director of activities. Each individual teacher will supervise the activities of her room. There will also be a music supervisor in each of the grade schools and the junior high school. The supervisor will work with the student and the teacher.

Students in the junior high school will have the greatest change when they enter into the new year. The schedule has been completely overhauled and many of the courses combined. There will be three class periods of one hour each for the students. The periods will include math, social science and language arts. In addition to the three class periods there will be two study periods, one of which may be used by the student for music if he desires.

The fifth period of the day has been set aside as the activity period. The activity period during the week will consist of four days for physical education and the fifth day for a guidance period. During the guidance period, the student will be given instruction in exploratory courses designed to allow the student to become better acquainted with what he will face in high school. The courses will be for six weeks each and will include shop work, agriculture, homemaking, art and others.

The principal change in the high school will be the allowing of members of the senior class the special privilege of choosing the manner in which his off periods and study periods are spent. The student will be allowed to go to his home, to the study hall or to other places if he chooses. The plan was adopted in order for the student to be better able to handle off periods when he enters college, Mr. Birt said. He said that if the students cooperated the program would be continued, and if not it would be dropped.

The entire athletic setup in the lower grades has been changed, and additions have been made in the high school program. O. B. Graham, coach at Cisco Junior High School last year, has been named utility man to work with the various schools, along with Jack Everett, director of activities. Mr. Graham will have charge of the program from the first through the fifth grades and will institute football, basketball, baseball, track and other sports in both schools. Programs will be arranged for both boys and girls.

In the junior high school a well rounded program has been planned with a regular schedule in all sports. Bobby Zellers will coach the boys, and will be assisted by James Wimbish. Zellers, a former Cisco Junior College student, graduated from Howard Payne College. Wimbish is a graduate of Abilene Christian College. Mrs. Miriam Bledsoe will coach girls athletics.

Moisture and Heat May Reduce Seed Germination

Reduction in germination of seed after harvest usually is caused by moisture, molds, heating, mechanical injury or some combination of these factors.

It is extremely difficult to separate the causes but moisture content of the seed is probably the most important, according to Prof. L. N. Bass of the Iowa State College.

Mold growth and heating are interrelated but neither occurs unless there is sufficient moisture present. Mechanical injury is also affected by moisture content of the seed at the time of harvesting and cleaning. If the seed is too dry, excessive breakage may occur.

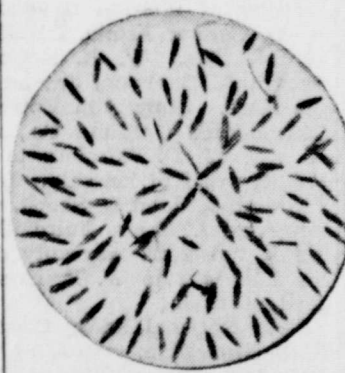
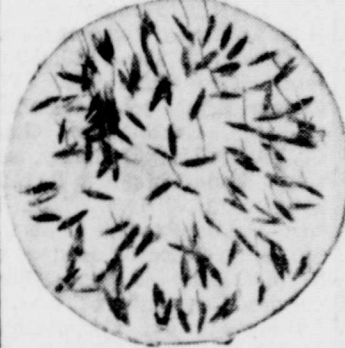
Storage of seed begins the moment it is harvested whether it is put in a bag and left in the field, piled in a wagon, or placed loose in a bin or in a pile. The most critical period for the seed is the first few days after harvest, especially if harvested directly from standing green plants. If such seed is not handled in a manner to facilitate rapid drying, mold growth and heating will result in very rapid loss of viability.

Agricultural and vegetable seeds harvested with high moisture, require less heat for a shorter time to kill, than drier seed. High moisture seed also heats more rapidly. Bluegrass seed harvested at 37 per cent moisture and tightly packed in a burlap bag lost 56 per cent germination in 29 hours and after 41 hours germinated only 4 per cent. Other seed harvested at the same moisture level and placed loose in the bags so it was well ventilated did not heat or suffer loss in viability. Thus, if high moisture seed is stored under conditions that promote heating there will be a very sudden drop in viability. The rapidity of the drop will depend upon the rate at which heating occurs, and the temperature developed.

It is generally assumed that a moisture content of 10 to 14 per cent is low enough for general storage. It must be remembered that seeds will come to a moisture equilibrium with their surroundings regardless of their moisture content when in storage.

Several months at temperatures as high as 80°F. Seed stored at such high temperatures will lose viability very rapidly, however, if the moisture goes much above 12 per cent.

The accompanying photographs illustrate the effect of proper and improper handling of bromegrass seed on its germination.



Above, bromegrass seed properly harvested and stored, germinates 95%; below, same improperly handled and stored, germinates 10%. Black dots in lower picture are fruiting bodies of molds.

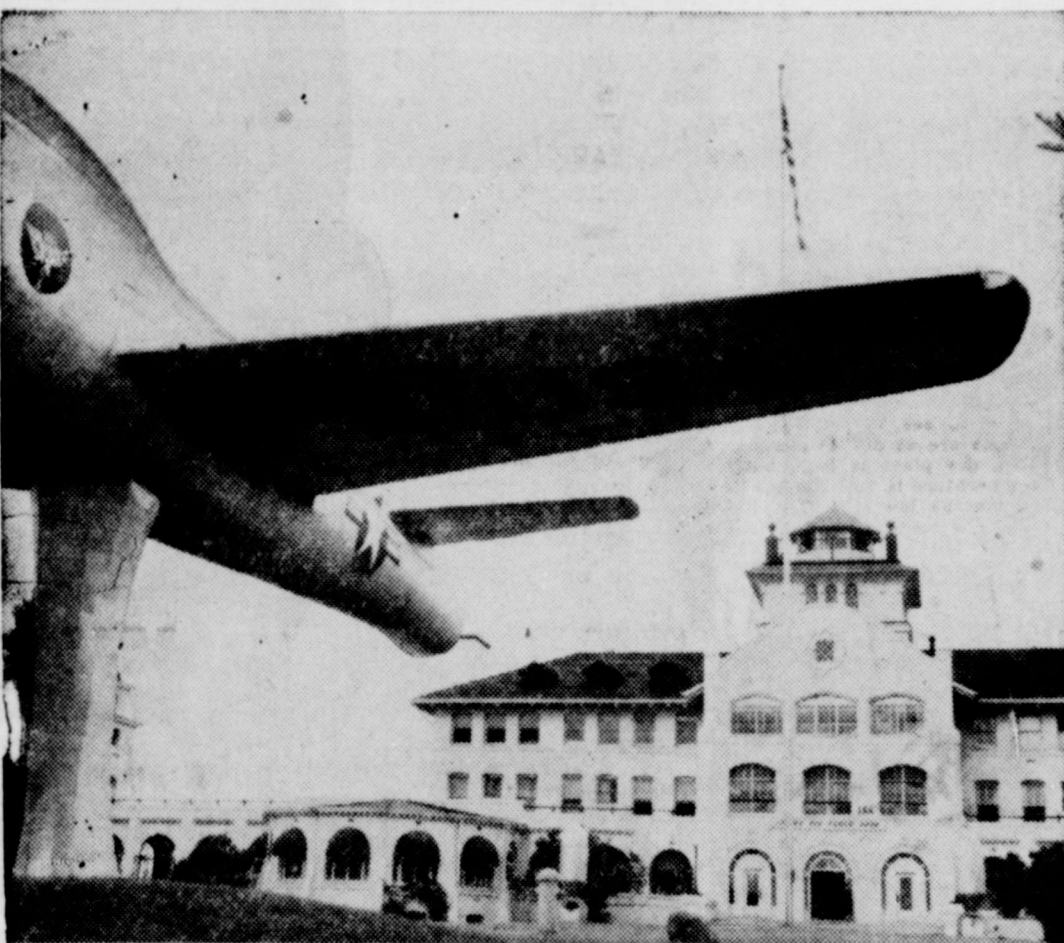

HEALTH TALKS

You may hear that all sinus trouble is about the same. The problem of diagnosis and treatment of sinus disease is not always easy to solve, however, because of the complex nature of the sinuses, plus the different diseases that may be present in any one or any combination of sinuses.

The sinuses are cavities in the bones of the skull which take their names from the particular bone or principal bone in which they happen to lie. There are four sets on each side of the face. The number of sinuses in each set may be greater in some persons; their sizes, shapes, and positions also may vary.

The general causes for sinus trouble are infected and allergy, or sometimes a combination of the two. The sinuses actually are offshoots of the nasal passage and are lined with the same type of tissue, the mucous membrane. Any infection that involves the nose, such as a cold, can affect the sinuses, and frequently a "hay fever" type of allergy also causes sinus trouble.

Most sinus disease victims don't need to be reminded what the symptoms are. If an attack is acute (severe with a relatively short course), there may be fever, general bad feeling, pain in the affected sinus, headache, sneezing, overflowing of tears, and a large amount of watery discharge from the nose that becomes pus-like in a day or two. If sinus disease is chronic, or long-lived, the symptoms are more likely to be the presence of disagreeable pus in the nose and throat, a rundown feeling, and general tiredness; pain or headache is seldom present.

Medical treatment for an acute attack usually is successful and may include bed rest, application of heat to the sinuses, nosedrops, steam inhalations, and irrigation or ventilation of the sinuses by the doctor, plus drugs to control the particular infection present or to lessen the effects of the allergy. Surgery is not usually done but has as its object allowing the sinuses to drain freely.

Operation is performed more often in the case of chronic sinus infection not controlled by medical measures. It aims either at establishing adequate drainage or removing diseased tissues from the sinuses, sometimes including bone.

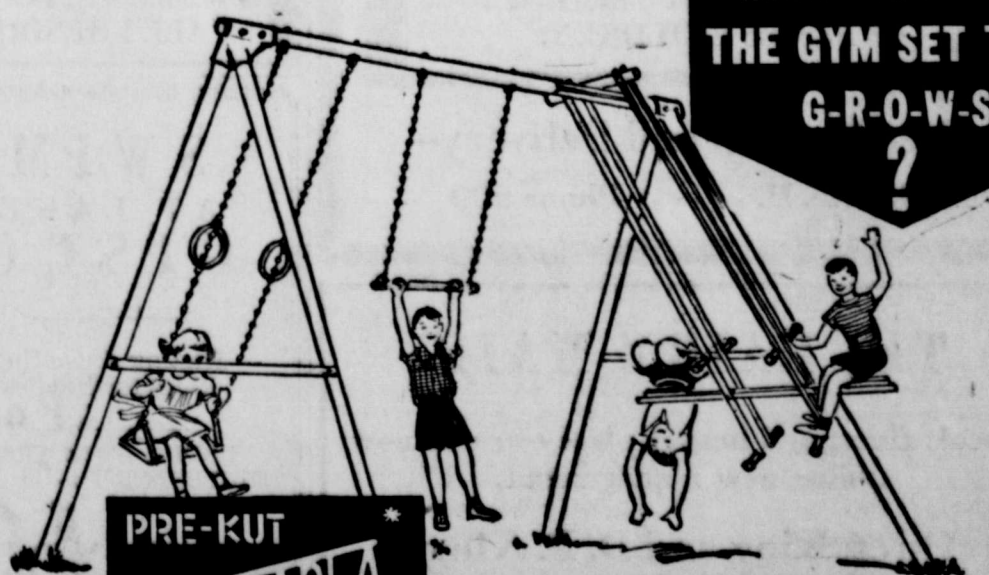
