Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas
"Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

THE GREAT WATER RESOURCES OF EAST TEXAS. The Corps of Engineers is one of the most consistently efficient organizations in the Federal government — we may disagree occasionally on a specific project or policy, but there is no question that this is a singularly dedicated group of people who are construction minded as opposed to the wrecking crew philosophy that we sometimes have to deal with. When we note that our District extends into six water basins — the Red River, the Sulphur, the Cypress, the Sabine, the Neches, and the Trinity — we can appreciate the importance of water to East Texas and of continuing our long and close cooperation with the Army Corps of Engineers.

WATER DEVELOPMENT IN THE 1973 FISCAL YEAR. It is a pleasure to record that for the current fiscal year the Corps is programming a total of slightly over \$20 million directly affecting our 21-county First District area.

TOURISM. This is one of the substantial advantages being derived from the Great Lakes of East Texas. In 1971, about 17 million persons visited Lake Texarkana, Lake O' the Pines, Pat Mayse Lake, and Sam Rayburn Reservoir. These splendid lakes also promote residential, industrial, and commercial growth; control flooding; and conserve water; but remember that one tourist is as valuable as a bale of cotton — and twice as easy to pick!

A MILITARY MEDICAL COLLEGE. More than five years ago, I strongly advocated the establishment of an armed services medical academy to train physicians for the military. Congress has approved a bill (H. R. 2) to accomplish this and also to expand existing scholarship programs for students at civilian medical schools who agree to serve one year in the armed forces for each year of government-financed education. This legislation will give the military a dependable supply of qualified doctors and eliminate the drafting of young physicians. It also opens up new opportunities for young people who might otherwise be unable to finance a medical education. It will be several years before the new Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences is ready for its first students, but the scholarship program should soon be available. Developments will be reported in future newsletters.

TWENTY-FIVE MILLION AMERICANS ARE CREDIT UNION MEMBERS. This is a great force for good in the U. S., and to give credit unions an equal opportunity to serve their communities, I have introduced H. R. 16580 to set up a new central credit union bank to provide essentially the same services that the Federal Reserve and Federal Home Loan Bank Board provide for commercial banks and savings and loan associations. As with all other credit union programs, costs of operating the National Credit Union Bank will be paid for by the credit unions themselves.

AMERICA. In their beginning history lessons, youngsters are likely to learn how our country got its name — from Amerigo Vespucci, the Italian explorer, who was the first to publish his belief that a new continent had been discovered. Vespucci was appointed Chief Navigator of Spain because of his superior knowledge of nautical science and his upright, scrupulous, and trustworthy character. The Vespucci family name means "wasp" which is an interesting early association of a descriptive term in common use today. "Amerigo" itself denotes "master craftsman," and America means "rich through work" — an appropriate title for a new world of labor and prosperity. Europe, incidentally, is derived from "ereb" or setting sun and Asia came from "asu" or rising sun.

SSGT Jas. Stockton On Staff OSU-AFTC

Austin. — Gov. Preston Smith, as had been long reported, summoned legislators back to Austin Monday to consider competitive insurance rates and strengthened budget controls for the governor.

He spelled out his recommendations in a joint session of the House and Senate.

While he has indicated he will battle to put his recommendations across, Smith said he has no plans to call more than one 30-day special session.

On the other hand, he is reluctant to open the session agenda to permit consideration of other matters until the competitive rating bill has been disposed of.

Smith said he considers as the most important step toward insurance reform and consumer protection replacement of the system of rate-setting by the State Board of Insurance with a competitive rate system.

Recent attorney general's opinions, complained Smith, have virtually stripped the governor of authority to insure adequate funding of state services. The opinions held he could not order transfer of funds from one state agency to another and that appropriations bill riders giving him effective power to pass on itemized spending are invalid.

Smith acknowledged that in calling a fourth special session of the 62nd Legislature (the 62nd is the first legislature since 1934 to have to meet so often) he had taken no easy course.

Insurance companies reportedly are pretty well divided on the competitive rate issue. They defeated a similar proposal last year.

MONEY NEWS GOOD AND BAD — Legislative budget writers received some good news and some bad news just before they headed into the new special session:

- Next year's tax bill may not be nearly as large as many had feared, due in part to federal revenue sharing.

- The federal government may force the legislature to make a \$50 million emergency appropriation early next year due to sharp limits proposed on new "social services" aid to welfare recipients.

- Legislative Budget Board Director Tom Keel told board members lawmakers likely won't face "a severe tax problem" in 1973 unless spending runs "inordinately high."

Keel and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes at the same time pointed out that Congress is expected to cut back on the welfare assistance which was relied on to balance the current state budget. The loss of federal money may run 40 per cent of the anticipated \$124 million over the next five fiscal quarters.

Both Barnes and Keel anticipated passage of a \$90 million (for Texas) revenue sharing bill by Congress. Predictions of a small new tax need do not take into account possibility of the state's having to assume the entire cost of public school education.

DEATH SENTENCES COMMUTED — On request of local prosecutors and law enforcement officials, the Board of Pardons and Paroles has commuted death sentences to life imprisonment for 29 Texas prisoners.

The U. S. Supreme Court re-

cently held that the death penalty as it is applied in the U. S. violates the constitutional ban against cruel and unusual punishment. Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin is appealing the case.

At the time of the High Court ruling, 66 Texans were under death penalty convictions, 41 of them on death row near Huntsville and 25 still in county jails awaiting transfer to prison.

AGRICULTURE RECEIPTS \$3.25 BILLION — Texas' total cash receipts from sales of crops and livestock during the last year totalled \$3.25 billion, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported.

Only California and Iowa have higher cash receipts.

Hidalgo County in the Lower Rio Grande Valley had the highest returns of all Texas Counties — \$117.3 million. Deaf Smith County in the Panhandle west of Amarillo was the only other to top the \$100 million mark. Its receipts were \$103.36 million. Parmer, Castro, Hale, Swisher, Cameron, Lubbock, Hansford and Lamb counties were in the top 10. Livestock accounted for almost two-thirds of the total cash receipts.

Major agriculture production area is the irrigated High Plains with \$668.1 million in receipts. The Blacklands rank second in cash receipts (\$347.8 million).

AG OPINIONS — The public has a right to fish in newly-created canals and waterways dredged from state bays into and over private property providing there is access and subject to state regulation, Attorney General Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- A National Guard sergeant injured in a crowd control demonstration by another Guardsman is entitled to medical expenses.

- When a county tax assessor-collector dies or vacates his office, duties fall on the chief deputy when bond is posted and approved.

- The coordinating Board, Texas College and University System has no authority to hold an official meeting without posting the agenda 30 days earlier.
- Parks and Wildlife Department may purchase liability insurance for its officers and employees.

CRIME RATE RISES — In the time it takes to read this item, a major crime may have been committed.

Texas Department of Public Safety reported recently a major crime occurred every minute in the state during the first six months of 1972. The semi-annual DPS Crime Report indicates the rate of major crime was 1.1 per cent higher at the end of June than at the same point in 1971.

An estimated 233,615 major criminal offenses occurred January-June this year — an overall rate of 4.173 per 100,000 population.

APPOINTMENTS, RESIGNATIONS — James Estelle, head of the state prison system, was named to the Criminal Justice Council executive committee.

Lyle B. Cherry of Wichita Falls is a new member of the Study committee on Traffic Court Reorganization.

R. L. (Bud) Reed will become assistant executive director of Texas Industrial Commission October 15.

Rebels Defeat Hawkins 16-8

After defeating Maud last week, 75-0, Rivercrest Rebels were held scoreless by Hawkins in the first half of Friday night's football action. The Rebels put it together in the last two periods though and came out the victors, 16-8.

Hawkins Hawks came out playing tough as they capitalized on a Rivercrest fumble on the second play of the game.

Hard running Hawk fullback James Williams took the ball on the fifth play and scored from 25 yards out. The extra point try resulted in a fake place kick and the Hawkins quarterback crossed the line for an 8-0 lead.

Defense was the Rebels' key as the Hawkins runners showed good speed and fine maneuvers, but the front line of the home team kept the middle sewed up and the Rebel linebackers filled up any gaps that appeared.

Fumbles hurt Rivercrest as they dropped the ball seven times and recovered only once. Bobbles came on what looked to be scoring drives.

One fumble was on the visiting team's five yard line and was picked up by the Hawks. Another on the Hawk 27 reversed the Rebel goal line direction.

With the second half under way the Rebels put on the pressure and forced the Hawks to punt. Large gains by quarterback Terry Giddens and back Danny Black then put the ball in scoring position on the four-yard marker.

Fullback Stanley Jones powered through on the right side for six points. The PAT was no good with seven minutes to go in the third period.

Trading the ball back and forth several times, Rivercrest ended up on the Hawks 12 with a fourth down and long yardage. Place kicker Bruce Case put the ball through the uprights for three points and a Rebel lead.

Hawkins punting again in the top of the last frame gave the Rebels another chance to score.

W. M. Simpson, a speedy runner took the ball downfield quickly and then over from the one. Case came on to do the kicking chore, making it 16-8. The Rebels ran out the clock for their second victory of the year.

Cotton Harvest Moving Rapidly

The Bogata Gin had weighed 1474 bales at mid afternoon Wednesday. Mr. Mitchell says the staple is extra good for so dry a year and the grade is holding good.

Blackland Prairie Gin at Deport had checked in 2500 bales Wednesday morning with seed selling for \$45.

Cotton quality remained good and harvest moved ahead rapidly according to Roy W. Gilreath, Officer in Charge of the USDA Classing Office in Dallas.

Samples classed for the week ending September 15 totaled 42,316. This brought the seasonal total to 85,015, according to Agricultural Marketing Service records.

For the week, samples from 1863 bales ginned in Lamar County were classed, bringing the season's total to 2965 from that county.

Grades showed only slight change from the previous week. Middling Light Spotted (32) accounted for 49 per cent of the cotton classed during the week. Strict Low Middling (41) was next at 22 per cent, followed by Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) 12 per cent and Middling (31), 10 per cent.

Staple lengths averaged longer than the previous week. Ranking first was 40 per cent staple 31 compared to 37 per cent the previous week. Next was 32 per cent staple 32 up from 18 per cent previously. Decreasing to 16 per cent from 38 was staple 30. Staple 33 accounted for 10 per cent of the samples.

Micronaire readings were in the 3.5 - 4.9 range on 94 per cent of the samples.

Pressley strength averaged 87,000 pounds per square inch compared to 88,000 the previous week. Eighty per cent of the samples were in the 85,000 PSI or higher range and 20 per cent in the 80-84,000 range.

The price trend continued downward as merchants continued to limit buying at current price levels. Available price information showed Middling Light Spotted (32) staple 30 selling at an average price of 22.30 cents per pound.

Q: How hard is it to repair boat damage?

A: Surface scratches and hairline cracking in the gel coat (called "crazing") are cosmetic damages and do not



hurt the strength of the hull or deck. They can be repaired easily.

The repair area should be cleaned with detergent and clear water and completely dried. Use masking tape to mark off the area being worked on. The nicks and scratches can be easily touched up with a resin repair kit from your dealer. And the crazing can be repaired by opening the cracks with an electric hand drill and a V cutting tool so that a gel coat patching resin can be forced into the cracks with a spatula or squeegee. The V cut should extend slightly below the gel coat

Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corp. and about 1/4 an inch beyond the ends of the cracks. Follow resin time and temperature directions suggested by the manufacturer. Do not work in direct sunlight. In temperatures below 65, you'll need a heat lamp for curing the repair compound. After the resin is cured, wet-sand the area with 600-grit sandpaper and compound, then polish it to a gloss.

Q: When does painting become necessary?

A: Painting for appearance may be desired if polishing no longer restores the gel coat to its like-new luster. Or you may want to change the colors. There are many marine coatings for Fiberglass on the market. No primers are necessary. A thorough cleaning and sanding is the general preparation.

Q: How should you go about repairing structural damage?

A: Structural damage, such as ruptures of the hull caused by impact, involves a more complicated procedure. Structural repair kits and repair instructions are available from the dealer, manufacturer, or a marine hardware store.
