United Fund Organization Considered

United Fund in Abernathy?

Sentiment is developing for the establishment of a United fund organization for Abernathy. The purpose of such an organization is to combine the many drives for funds under one heading for two main reasons: 1) to reduce the number of times every individual has to be contacted each year to support the many worthy projects we are called upon to support, and 2) To be able to do a more thorough job of seeing to it that everyone who wants to support these activities is actually contacted.

The United Fund is entirely local anywhere the plan is used. The cost of the United Fund drive is entirely local and there is absolutely no outsider involved in the activities of any local United Fund group or its activities.

The only way the state United Fund enters into the picture is through suggestions from it and through its educational work in establishing United Funds. The Abernathy United Fund, if it becomes established, may elect to make a voluntary contribution to the state organization but it will be an amount set by the local group and entirely according to the judgement of the local group as to the value of the state organization has been to the local group.

It is projected that at a later date and organizational meeting will be called at which meeting ALL persons interested in the organization of a United Fund can get together to implement the idea.

Be it remembered that the United Fund will be communitywide and NOT limited to "in-town" participation.

It could work for the progress of Hale County as a whole.

AUSTIN — Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon has been appointed chairman of the Texas Senate Committee on Contingent Expenses by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes.

Sen. Hightower was also named Vice Chairman of the Senate Committee on Constitutional Amendments and as a member of the Committees on Agriculture and Livestock; Claims; Education; Finance; Jurisprudence; Oil and Gas; State Affairs; Transportation; Water and Conservation; and Youth Affairs.

"I know that Sen. Hightower will continue to do an outstanding job as Contingent Expense Committee chairman," Barnes said in announcing the appointment. "His past service to his state makes him extremely well qualified for the job, which will be of high importance as we perform the tasks of the 61st Legislature."

Sen. Hightower also served as Chairman of the Contingent Expense Committee responsible for administering the actual funds to operate the Senate during the last session of the Legislature.

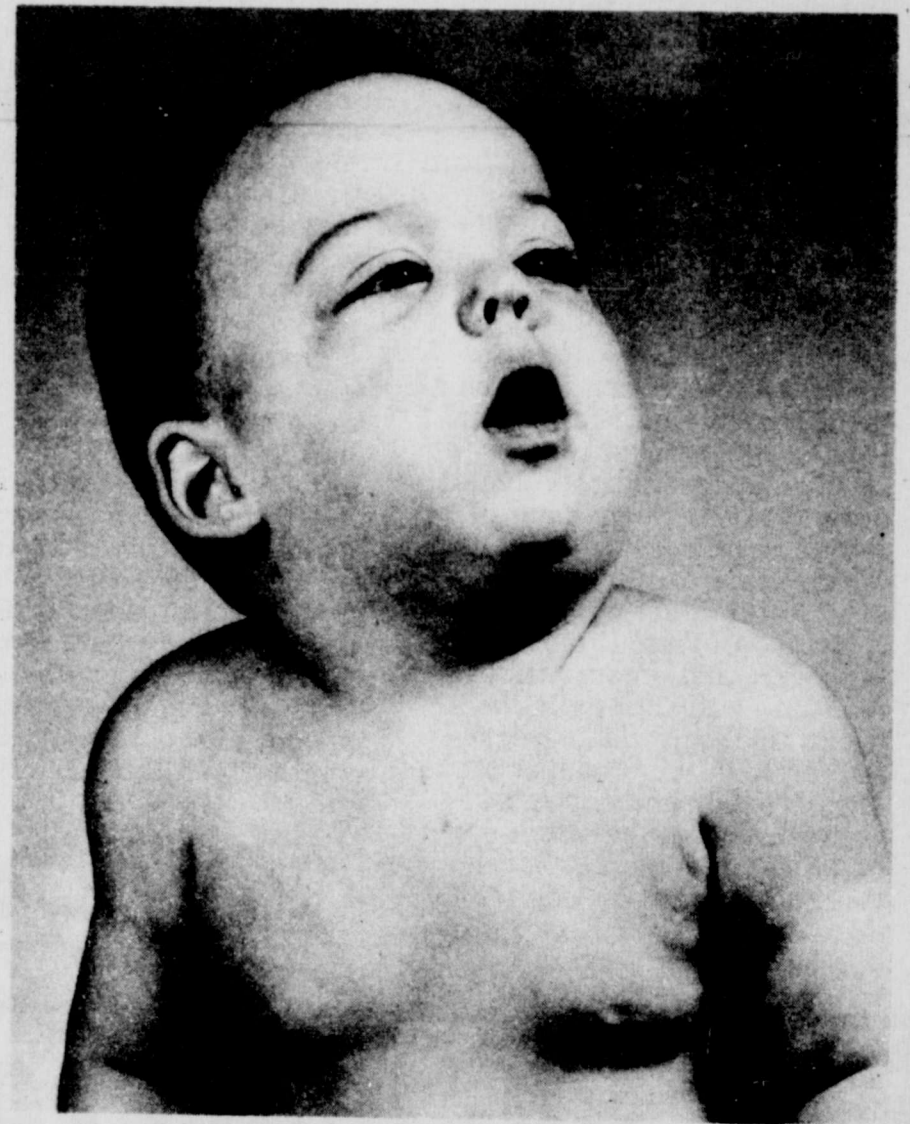
