Temporarily we are back on a job after a session at the capital. Needless to say it is pleasant to feel free of the restrictions incidental to hospitalization. Looks like there is nothing left to do but roll up my sleeves and help with the work.

This column, as has been stated before, is devoted to the welfare of the people of this community and not in any sense intended to serve as a mouthpiece for any political group or organization. We have heard me favorably comment on one of the writings under this heading. Any of our subscribers feel free to write in or tell their opinions on any subject at we may have tried to comment on.

In this issue of the Times it will be noted that another aspirant to the office of State Senator is making announcement. Henry Coffield, of Marfa, is the new candidate. Henry has been Marfa for a good many years and is familiar with the needs of this section of the country. We feel that there will be candidates to announce later for his post. Already Charles B. Moore, of Del Rio, has thrown his hat in the ring. It is understood that Heinie Winfield, of Fort Stockton, will not be a candidate this time. Let's investigate the candidates and make a voice intelligently. We aren't asking you to vote for any particular candidate — we only ask you to vote and vote your sentiments after a careful study of the aspirant's qualifications.

As the deadline date draws near for the place on the school trustee election, one candidate, Hugh Ross, permitted his name be placed on the ballot to fill the vacancy created by John Harrison, who refused to accept the place for another term. Little interest, as a rule is shown in school trustee election. Last year there were only 19 votes cast in the election which placed little Caroline on the board for another term. Mr. Harrison served well on the school board for which he receives no salary. If Mr. Ross is elected he will serve to the best of his ability with no hope of receiving anything but criticism for any actions the board may see fit to take. It is altogether possible at a "dark horse" candidate may be written in on election day — and, if such a move were decided upon anyone may be placed on the most important place in the local political set-up simply because of the indifference of the voters. Personally, I think that if a most undesirable man should be elected the voters would have no one to blame but their own indifference. Let's go to the polls and vote for a man who can do justice to a most important position. The Times will always and for a good school system will be managed, and will lend all support to members of the board of a better system of education for Terrell County.

Spring in the air makes for a paint-up ideas. It is hoped that many property owners in Sanderson will get bit by the bug. There are some unimproved places that should be put in shape. Sanderson is so situated as to make a most beautiful view of every citizen and proper care would strive to that end.

WOOL GROWERS GROUP TO MEET IN SAN ANTONIO IN JANUARY 1949

San Antonio will play host next January 25-28 to the annual meeting of the National Wool Growers' Association, according to word received this week from J. M. Jones, Salt Lake City, secretary of the association.

An attendance of not less than 1,500 is expected for the meeting due to the fact that Texas has the largest membership in the organization. Texas also lists several officials of the group. C. B. (Dutch) Wardlaw, Del Rio, is an honorary president, and Ray Willoughby, San Angelo, is vice-president. Clayton Puckett, Fort Stockton, president of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association, is of the opinion that the 1949 session will draw a record attendance from all parts of the United States.

CREW HERE TO START ROAD PAVING JOB

H. B. Zachry Company of San Antonio has a complete concrete crew on the job here to begin the three and one-half miles of road construction east of Sanderson. A crew of about twenty men constitute the skilled workmen to be used in doing the concrete work necessary for bridges and culverts before the road work gets under way, according to J. A. Herring, field office manager for the contracting company. H. A. COFFIELD ANNOUNCES FOR SENATORIAL POST

The announcement of H. A. Coffield, of Marfa, as candidate for Senator for the 29th District of Texas was received this week.

Henry A. Coffield, age 54, a native of Arkansas, has been a resident of Texas 31 years. He has a high school and university education as a mechanical engineer. A veteran of World War I, he served in the army throughout the war. After his discharge, he went into business at Marfa and is now actively engaged in the operation of ranching interests located in Jeff Davis and Presidio counties. During World War II, Mr. Coffield served as a member of the Presidio County Selective Service Board and was also actively engaged in construction work, building camps and airfields for the U. S. government.

A long-time resident of Marfa, Mr. Coffield served as mayor of that city for 14 years, retiring last year voluntarily.

"I shall not present a platform of vague promises that are forgotten the day after election," said Mr. Coffield. "I am a candidate only because I know that I can and will give the citizens of this district honest and fair representation. I shall work for everything that will benefit the state and our district. I will not favor any individual or group that would reap a benefit for themselves at the expense of the district."

Continuing he said, "I expect the advice and help of every good interested citizen in this district. Then when we successfully attain some goal, I can not say 'I did it', but we all can say 'We did it'. That is government by the people. That is Democracy."

Mr. Coffield is well known in this district and familiar with the needs of the district.

Sonora's annual Wool and Mohair Show has been scheduled for June 16 and 17, officials have announced.

Climaxing the show an auction sale will be sponsored by the Sonora Lions Club. There will be both junior and adult divisions. Fleeces will be judged on length of staple, uniformity of fiber, shrinkage, weight, character and preparation. Entries must be in the warehouse of the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company by 5 o'clock the afternoon of June 15.

In the single fleece contests, only 12-months wool and mohair fleeces may be entered. Each exhibitor is allowed only two fleeces. Bags may have either 8-month or 12-month wool. All wool and mohair exhibited must have been shorn in 1948 and must be from sheep and goats run strictly under range conditions.

Reasons given for the show are: "To encourage production of better wool and mohair, to encourage better preparation of wool and mohair for market, and to sponsor a type of club work applicable to the ranch area of sheep and goat production."

Faculty of Sul Ross Music Department In Recital March 18

Music lovers of the city are promised a treat next Thursday evening, March 18, when the faculty of the Music Department of Sul Ross State Teachers College will be presented in recital at the high school auditorium. The recital is being sponsored by the Eagle Band with all proceeds going to the uniform fund. Admission will be 40c and 15c.

Freeze in Area Bad For Stock

A cold blast from one of the worst blizzards to hit the Southwest in years reached Terrell County Wednesday evening with devastating effect on the stockmen of this section. The cold wind whipping in from the ice-covered sections of the Panhandle and North Texas has taken an unestimated toll in losses to the sheep and goat raisers of West Texas. Many have recently shorn goats that will result in damaging losses to the herds. The dry cold will not damage, however, to the extent of a wet cold which hit other areas. Lambing season at this time will bring about a heavy loss to lambs and ewes.

Freezing temperatures were reported throughout Wednesday as far south as San Antonio. Subfreezing weather was expected to reach all parts of Texas except the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

At press time it was impossible to determine the amount of damage suffered in Terrell County but estimates by stockmen place the loss suffered at a high figure.

Many of the ranchers fear bursted water lines which will necessitate moving stock or hauling water to some pastures.

The need of moisture here is great but with freezing temperature it would be disastrous at present.

ROSE AGREES TO PLACE NAME ON SCHOOL BALLOT

The name of Hugh Rose will appear as a candidate for election to the School Board on April 3. Mr. Rose consented to have his name placed on the ballot after John Harrison, whose term expires, refused to accept the place on the ballot for another term. Mr. Harrison stated that he felt the duties of the school board members should be placed in other hands and not let the same members have to shoulder the responsibility year after year.

Mr. Rose submitted to pleas from friends to have his name appear on the ballot, stated he was not seeking the office but would serve to the best of his ability if elected.

It is hoped that a representative vote will be cast in the April third election. The members of the board deserve the vote of confidence and will feel that they are carrying out the mandates of the voters if a county-wide representation is registered at the polls.

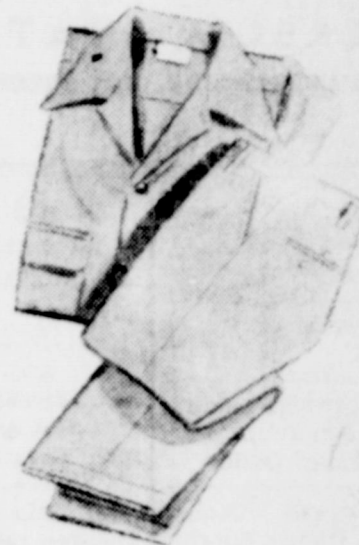

Economic Highlights

Which potential candidate for the Republican nomination for president has the largest popular following? There is no way to give a conclusive and incontestable answer to that question. However, beginning March 9, when New Hampshire holds its primary election, light will be cast on the issues to a gradually increasing degree. Between now and early June, 16 states will call upon their voters to choose standard-bearers for the top job in the nation. The results will not, of course, be conclusive. The avowed candidates — such as Dewey, Taft and Stassen — are permitting their names to be entered only in the states in which they think they have a chance. And in only a few states is the vote cast a mandatory order on the delegates. In other words, the nominating conventions, and not the rank and file of voters, will do the picking.

In the meantime, the poll-makers are busy trying to find out what John Public thinks about the presidential hopefuls, and the political scene in general. The Fortune survey, published in the February issue of the magazine, asked some very interesting questions and got some very interesting answers. According to it, General Eisenhower led President Truman by a wide margin in public popularity — 48 per cent to 34 per cent with 18 per cent having no opinion. But the General has declared himself out of contention since the poll was taken, and it is generally believed that his decision will be accepted as final by the GOP high command.

The Fortune survey also asked those queried how they would vote if Truman were opposed to Dewey, MacArthur, Stassen, Warren, or Taft. In each case, the President came out on top. Dewey is very close — with 40 per cent to Truman's 43 per cent, 17 per cent holding no opinion. The weakest Republican candidate, the survey finds, would be Taft, whom Truman leads by an overwhelming margin of 52 per cent to 27 per cent.

This would indicate that Mr. Truman is a good bet for holding the lease on the White House for four more years. Yet, when the survey asked the voters which party they expected to win the decision next November, 48 per cent picked the Republicans and only 29 per cent chose the Democrats, with the balance cannily reserving their opinion. So neither party can be exclusively optimistic now. It seems certain that Mr. Truman has slipped a long way from the high popular esteem he enjoyed when he assumed the presidency. It is equally certain that he has climbed well back from the extreme low he reached during the railroad strike of more than a year ago.

Two of the most searching questions asked by Fortune were designed to find out just how much enthusiasm either party has aroused in the public breast on the strength of its record in running the government. The first question asked for an opinion on GOP performance since it has had a majority in Congress. Two per cent said excellent, 20 per cent said good, 47 per cent said only fair and 19 per cent said poor, with 12 per cent saying nothing.

At the same time, the Democrats are in almost the same boat. The second question asked for an opinion on the Administration's performance in handling the Executive Branch of the government. Three per cent of those answering said excellent, 25 per cent said good, 45 per cent said only fair, 17 per cent said poor, and 10 per cent had no opinion to offer. So the Democrats can hardly claim that an irrefutable ground swell of public favor is running their way.

As every political observer points out with defensive caution, what is true in February may be a dead duck in November. A worsening or an improvement in foreign matters, more boom or the start of some kind of a bust — possibilities such as these could cause a reversal of opinions and prospects over-

night. But if no great change occurs, this year's election should be very close. Both parties will extend the greatest efforts in many years. Neither, so far as it can be seen now, has a safe lead, and neither can afford to be complacent.

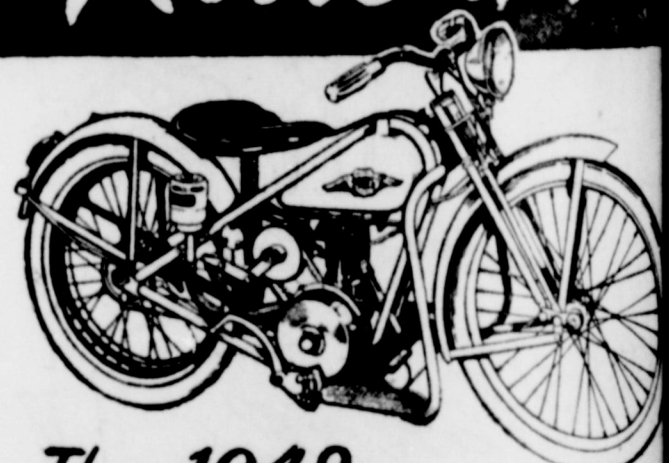
