## Over Three Hundred Prisoners Burn To Death In Ohio Penitentiary Fire; Prison Riot Threatens

## London Naval Treaty Expected To Be Signed Today

### Treaty Ready To Be Sealed By Delegates

Five-Power Disarmament Negotiations Come On Close At Final Plenary Session This Morning In London

### Final Plans Made

Results Of Conference Are Contained In 7,000-Word Document After 3 Months; Americans To Sign First

LONDON, April 21. (AP)—The London naval treaty is ready to be signed and sealed tomorrow.

Three months ago today the five-power disarmament negotiations were inaugurated by King George and tonight the results are contained in a document of 7,000 words which rests at St. James' Palace where the final plenary session will begin tomorrow morning.

Stimson Broadcasts Talk

As final arrangements were made tonight for the wind-up session, Gen. Henry L. Stimson broadcast from London his interpretation of the treaty's significance, his words being directed to the luncheon of the Associated Press in connection with the annual meeting and being carried over the United States by a radio network.

When the moment comes for signature of the treaty, Stimson is expected between 7 a. m. and 1 p. m. (6 to 7 a. m. E. S. T.) Colonel Stimson, as chief American delegate, will lead the line of envoys who will pass on the table on which the treaty will be signed—the "horse shoe" conference.

### City Sued In Damages Suit

Lubbock Again Named Defendant In Two Cases Asking \$11,250 As Result Of Subway Construction Here

The City of Lubbock again was named as defendant in two suits yesterday afternoon in 22nd district court by Howard, attorneys for the plaintiffs, as to the damages which they claim their property is being practically useless through construction of the underpass at the intersection of Avenue H with the main Fe tracks.

Both suits, as filed by McWhorter & Howard, attorneys for the plaintiffs, total \$11,250. The first, filed for C. R. White, of this city, complains of damage to his property which is located at No. 12 in block 40 of the original town of Lubbock. White alleges that the property formerly was valued at \$4,000 but that destruction of means of ingress and egress has rendered it practically valueless at this time. He charges that the underpass is from 8 to 15 feet in depth in front of the property and that prior to the time of construction the street was on a level. His suit is for \$3,750.

The second suit, filed for Mrs. Graves, also charges that her property, located at lots 13 and 14 in block 40 of the original town of Lubbock, has been rendered useless and asks for the sum of \$7,500. Each of the suits ask for the damages to bear interest.

A. McDonough Is Freed On \$1,500 Bail On Pro Count

### Scores Trapped In Ill-Fated Cells Perish As Disastrous Flames Wipe Out Four Blocks

Army Troops, National Guardsmen, Prison Guards, Police On Duty In Attempt To Maintain Order; Convicts Are Blamed With Starting Blaze, Cutting Fire Hose

COLUMBUS, O., April 21. (AP)—More than 300 men, confined in Ohio penitentiary here, met death tonight when a disastrous fire swept four cell blocks in the ill-fated tiers of cells. More than 100 others were affected seriously by smoke and it was feared more would die.

Regular army troops, national guardsmen, prison guards and Columbus police were on duty in the prison late tonight attempting to maintain order among more than 1,000 convicts who were loose in the prison yards, and who, it was believed, had set several fires in the prison cotton mills, had cut fire hose and threatened firemen.

Yards Resemble Armed Camp. Penitentiary yards resembled an armed camp after a pitched battle. Lying on the grass were the bodies of some 200 victims of the blaze, most of them killed by dense smoke. In the prison hospital basement lay 100 other dead.

A few dead were known to be in G. and H. cell blocks, where the fire burned furiously for several hours after it started in an adjoining block and spread rapidly under a stiff wind.

Loose convicts were being driven into the dining halls. Troops were having trouble controlling the men who, earlier in the excitement aided in rescue work.

Incendiary Blaze Charged. The first intimation that the fire was of incendiary origin came from State Fire Marshal Ray Gill. He said he believed the fire was set in several places simultaneously, in the I. and K. cell blocks. The later fire in the cotton mills was incendiary, he said.

Chief of Police Harry E. French of Columbus, helping to command the situation in the prison enclosure, ordered all women nurses from the penitentiary at 9:45 p. m. He said he issued the order to insure safety for the women.

Rescuers continued to rush in oxygen tanks and other medical supplies. A call was sent out for Company 37, Ohio National Guard, an auto truck unit. The machines will be used to carry the dead to the Coliseum in the State Fair grounds.

Warden Thomas at 9:45 p. m. asked for two more companies of soldiers, including one regular army unit from Fort Hays and one national guard company. These were quickly supplied by authorities. Medical detachments of the national guard were ordered in from Delaware, Ohio and a regular company there under Capt. Harry Whitlatch was ordered to stand ready for duty.

"Bad Men" Loose In Prison. Prison guards in the penitentiary yards reported that about a half-dozen members of Company K, the bad men of the prison, were loose in the enclosure, and it was feared they would stir up trouble.

Prisoners working on the mill fire, which was finally extinguished, reported to the warden that some convicts had cut their hose and had tried to fire their gasoline wagon.

In all, 1,500 Ohio national guardsmen were on duty in the prison or on the way. About one-third of the loose convicts were locked up in their cells by 9:20 p. m.

Telegraph blanks were issued to convicts. They were told to address notes to relatives and were assured they would be sent so the relatives would know they had escaped death in the conflagration.

Major General V. W. Huff, O. N. G., was in charge of the troops in the prison. There was some disorder in the dining rooms, but the guards quelled it before any one was hurt. The convicts broke up some furniture before they were brought under control.

The scene within the prison yard continued one of utter disorder after darkness descended. At least 600 convicts, all orderly and aiding rescuers and firemen, were in the yard. Doctors, clad in white, worked valiantly on unconscious prisoners. Other prisoners, row upon row lay on the damp green lawn, covered fully with blankets. These were numbered among the dead. Prison guards rushed to and fro, attempting to keep the prisoners orderly and aiding in the rescue work.

Warden Thomas and Director of Welfare Hal H. Griswold, ended their preliminary investigation at 1:30 a. m. They heard testimony of guards and inmates. They said no official statement would be issued at this time, and that the inquiry would be continued tomorrow.

CONFIRMATION OF PARKER DOUBTFUL. (By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 21. (AP)—Little hope for the confirmation of Judge John J. Parker, of North Carolina, to be a member of the Supreme Court was held out tonight by senate leaders after the judiciary committee today voted ten to six against the nominee. Organized labor and negroes have opposed Parker.

A majority of both republicans and democrats on the committee voted against Parker including three administration regulars. Previously, the committee refused to invite the nominee to subject himself to examination on the protests against him.

Despite the committee vote there was no indication tonight that President Hoover would withdraw the nomination or that Judge Parker would ask that his name be recalled from the senate.

## Purdue Runner to Seek New Record

## REVIEW OF THE WEEK'S FOREIGN NEWS

With drafting of the London naval treaty last week, the naval conference marched rapidly toward the close.

The document is to be signed Tuesday morning by representatives of the five great sea powers represented, thus culminating three months of negotiations. The American delegation hopes to sail for home immediately thereafter.

Rioting flared in India in the sixth week of Mahatma Gandhi's civil disobedience campaign. Serious demonstrations occurred Wednesday in Calcutta. Karachi and Poona as protests against the imprisonment of Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru and Mayor J. M. Sengupta, nationalist leaders. One native was killed at Karachi by a police bullet and more than 50 persons were injured in the three riots. Among the injured were two Americans, Albert N. Baudin of Houghton, Michigan, and Frank Bond-Nelson of Buffalo, N. Y.

Fire took heavy toll, trapped in an ancient church while attending a Good Friday vigil, nearly 150 villagers of Contessa, Rumania, died when the place caught fire. Fifteen died in a stampede at Licata, Sicily, after a motion picture film caught fire. From Manila came reports that 20 persons were dead and 5,000 homeless after fire had ripped out a sawmill and the homes of laborers at Caddi.

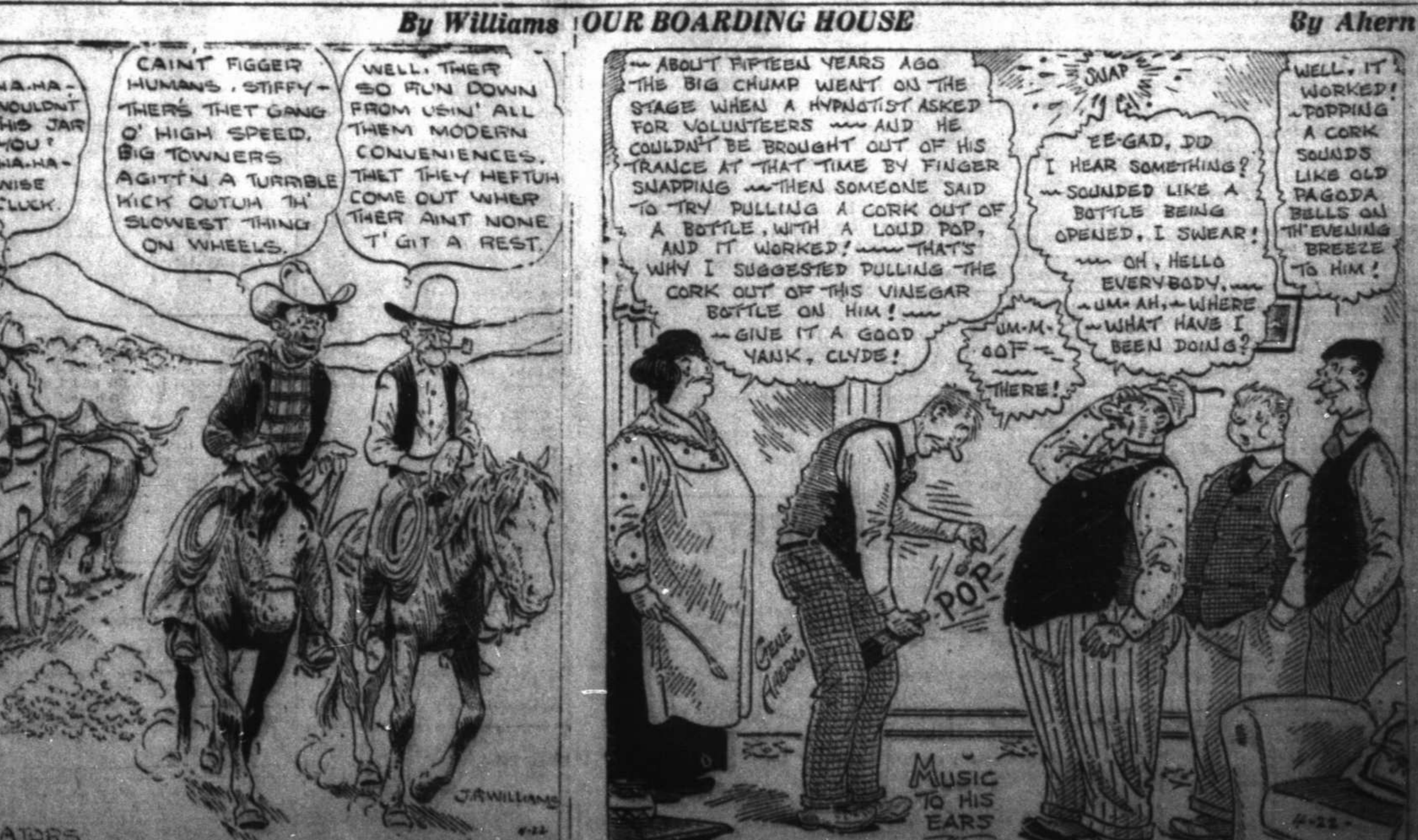

Review To Be Made Soon Of Moody's Term

Two More Statements About Accomplishments During Administration Expected To Be Given This Week

AUSTIN, April 21. (AP)—Two more statements from Governor Moody, touching on the ups and downs of his administration with the 41st legislature and giving his views with reference to solving pending problems are expected this week. He gave a review of his three-year's tenure as governor yesterday.

Compare Record

In his first statement, Governor Moody compared his highway building achievements with the administration of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson and in other ways gave an accounting of his stewardship. He claimed his administration had brought about the lowest average ad valorem tax rate for state purposes in recent years, after paying obligations inherited from previous administrations, including over \$6,200,000 in the highway department and over \$3,880,000 in other departments. He said his administration had improved the public school system by adding more than \$9,000,000 additional funds for their support and caused a reduction in the average cost of textbooks of \$2,000,000.

He said his administration had substituted competitive bidding for political favoritism in highway building and had contracted ten times more miles of concrete road in 1929 than in 1925, and that these were to be built at 20 per cent less cost, or over \$5,880 less per mile, than in 1925. Over 3,700 miles of all-weather highways had been contracted and put under construction during his administration, he said.

"Federal aid, which was held up and withdrawing threatened during the preceding administration because of inefficiency, has been obtained from the federal government and the yearly allotment to Texas recently increased from \$4,500,000 to \$7,500,000, bringing \$3,000,000 additional federal aid to Texas annually," he said.

TAX SUITS FILED

Hundred And Three Cases In District Court Here

J. C. Levens, assistant city attorney, yesterday filed one hundred and three suits for collection of delinquent taxes aggregating about \$7,500 in the 99th district court.

"Collection of about \$15,000 in city taxes is now pending," said Mr. Levens.

AUSTIN, April 21. "I am pleased Governor Kohler has agreed to send a committee to Texas to make a hard-surfaced highway in order to fairly estimate the productivity of Texas lands," Governor Moody said.

Vote No Bills In Conspiracy

Grand Jury Fails To Return Indictments Against Trio In Alleged Plot To Slay Lawyer, District Judge

PORT WORTH, April 21. (AP)—No bills in the murder conspiracy case against E. F. Houtchens, disbarred attorney, Miss Zula B. Stevenson, his law associate, and Sam H. Prather, Vinita, Oklahoma, were voted by a grand jury today.

Houtchens, Miss Stevenson and Prather were charged with conspiring to murder Dexter Scourlock, lawyer, and District Judge Jas. E. Mercer. The latter presided in the disbarment proceedings against Houtchens, and Scourlock was a member of the bar association committee pushing the disbarment case against Houtchens.

Prather testified at a court of inquiry to alleged meetings with Houtchens and Miss Stevenson, at which he discussed with them plans to do away with Scourlock and Judge Mercer for their part in the disbarment case.

Houtchens was disbarred for asserted unethical practices.

Molly Malone keeps the Night watch

Midnight! At the long switchboard in the telephone office sits a girl—a tiny figure in the vast, silent room. Softly the dark gloss of her hair, the silken sheen of her collar, catch the glow of light from the high ceiling. Molly Malone keeps the night watch!

Short hours before, a thousand tiny lights sparkled along the face of that switchboard. Scores of operators filled the room with the low undertone of their voices. Then, with the night, the flashing lights had ried away—the busy line of operators had dwindled as girl after girl left the ranks. Now the city sleeps. The calls are few. And Molly Malone, with a corporal's guard of helpers, watches the wires that cast their slender, nerve-like web over the town, the nation, and on to strange countries, foreign peoples.

A bell tinkles, breaking the silence. A score of feet away, a girl lays down the palette and brush with which she has been painting mystic symbols upon the switchboard face—little signs that, next day, will tell busy operators what telephones connect to each telephone line. A quick step; the girl bends over a flashing light whose presence the bell has signalled, calls a number to Molly.

Toward a tiny hole among the hundreds that honeycomb the board, Molly raises her hand unerringly. Swiftly she plugs in, answers: "Number, please!"

Near other sections of the board, other girls are busy at other tasks. One tests cords through which, tomorrow, will flow thousands on thousands of voices... another sorts into neat piles tickets on which long distance calls are recorded... a third puts sharpened pencils, tiny pads of paper, along the switchboard... preparations for the rush and bustle of the coming day. Yet each is alert for the tiny bells. As these now and again punctuate the stillness, they turn swiftly to the board, mark the number of the light that flashes, call it to Molly.
