Highway Patrol Investigates Nine Accidents In December

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of December, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed, two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,405.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1970 shows a total of 113 accidents resulting in five

persons killed, 47 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$99,694.00.

"Operation Motorcade" which was in effect during the Christmas and New Year's holidays recorded 101 traffic deaths as compared to the estimated 87. Ten of these traffic fatalities occurred in the Lubbock Region in the following counties: Cochran, Crosby, Parmer, Swisher, Wichita and Wise which had one fatality each with Dallam and Potter Counties

having two fatalities each.

The Patrol Supervisor reminded all motorists to think about the more than 30,000 people that have been killed in Texas traffic accidents during the last 10 years, and to join the drive to reverse this alarming trend of traffic deaths by strict observance of traffic laws and rules of defensive driving.

Debbie Davis Shows Champ

Debbie Davis was the big winner in the swine division last week at the Amarillo Fat Stock Show. Miss Davis brought home Grand Champion Barrow honors with her 220-lb. Hampshire entry. Bred by Debbie and Phil Davis, the barrow won over 400 other barrows in the show.

Paul Williams, manager of the Amarillo Sears store, was high bidder for Miss Davis' champion barrow. The firm paid \$2.50 per pound, bringing her a grand total of \$550.

Seventeen years old, Miss Davis began her swine project a few years ago after winning her first pig in a Sears' swine program for youth.

Other Hart entries placing high were Cathy Nelson, second

place, and Stanley Harris, third and fourth, in the middleweight crossbred division. Larry Sanders placed second and ninth in the heavyweight and lightweight cross divisions, respectively.

Terry Hill placed seventh with his entry in competition with 100 steers in the recent Hereford show at the Fat Stock Show in Odessa.

Federal Land Bank Ass'n. Reduces Interest Rate

John A. Perrin, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt, received word today that The Federal Land Bank of Houston has reduced the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 8 percent. "This reduction affects more than 90 million dollars of variable rate loans to more than 2800 farmers and ranchers throughout Texas," Perrin stated.

The variable rate loan plan which was introduced by the Houston Bank in July 1969 lets the interest rate "float" over the variations in the money market. In large measure, therefore, the rate in any specific year will reflect the changes in prices which the Bank must pay for the money it makes available for farm mortgage loans. Perrin pointed out that this action is in line with the Bank's policy in providing farmers and ranchers credit at the

lowest possible cost consistent with sound business practices.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long term real estate loans on farm and ranch lands throughout Texas. On January 1 of this year, the Bank had over \$529 million in volume of loans outstanding.

The local association makes and services loans in Castro county. Members of the local board of directors are Jack Summers, Sid Sheffy, Ed Drerup, Irvin Ott and Wade Mills.

A CHILD'S MEAL

No matter how carefully a mother plans and prepares meals for her young child, it does his growing body no good unless he eats everything on his plate. He should also enjoy his meal. Maybe he occasionally prefers raw carrots to cooked carrots, or hamburgers to meat loaf.

In allowing a Canadian television team to interview two American airmen held prisoner in North Vietnam, the Hanoi regime sought to present the captives as opponents of America's Asian policies. The communists also endeavored to give the impression that the prisoners of war are well treated. As usual, Hanoi was engaged in trickery.

Americans trotted out for questioning by Western newsmen aren't free to express their real feelings. If they report the brutal and degrading treatment to which they are subjected, they or their fellow prisoners may be tortured or killed. Even if the men being interviewed don't fear for themselves, they aren't likely to say anything that will endanger their comrades.

If the television networks want to present an accurate account of life inside a North Vietnamese prison, they can interview the handful of Americans who have been released as an international political gesture. One of these former prisoners of war is Lt. Col. Norris M. Overly, USAF, who was shot down over North Vietnam in 1967 and spent five months in communist captivity.

In a recent talk at the annual Air Force Association meeting, Col. Overly told how he was wired to a 50-gallon oil drum and transported across the country. Women, children and old people, he reported, "would pick up rocks and come right up to you and bash you in the face."

Col. Overly was confined for a time in a little hut divided into 12 bamboo cells. He was

placed in one of these cells, lying on his stomach with his feet in wooden stocks. His arms were tied behind him with wet ropes. He was forced to stay in this position for 29 days.

Arriving at the main POW prison in Hanoi, Col. Overly was placed in a tiny cell. Many of the cells have leg irons on the bed boards. The prison routine is arranged in such a way that the prisoners don't see each other and have no way of buttressing their morale by a group presence. During the day, the prisoners are exposed to endless propaganda broadcasts. "This is what our men have been going through," Col. Overly said, "some for as long as six years."

While American New Left spokesmen regularly visit Hanoi and report the prisoners are being well-treated, Col. Overly described the true conditions. "I think we can safely say," he concluded, "that the North Vietnamese will go down in history as the most inhumane and cruel enemy we have ever fought because of the sheer number of years they are making so many of our men suffer."

Col. Overly's testimony should be borne in mind when one hears New Left apologists for Hanoi say that we should accept their "peace" terms and allow them to have a role in the government of South Vietnam. To allow this brutal regime to extend its will over additional millions of people would be an unconscionable act.

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Bill Clayton Appointed To Committee On Counties

House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher announced Thursday the appointment of State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake as Chairman of the House Committee on Counties.

The Springlake Representative is one of only five House Members who will serve as both a Chairman and a Vice Chairman of House Standing Committees. The Committee on Banks and Banking will have Clayton as its Vice Chairman. Mutscher said that 8-year veteran member will return to two committees on which he served last session: State Affairs and Conservation and Reclamation. He has also been asked to serve on the Rules Committee.

The 21-member Counties Committee has jurisdiction over all matters relating to Counties, their creation, organization, boundaries, government and finances, and the compensation and duties of their officers.

"The Committee system is the heart beat of the Legislative process. It is at this level that the citizens of Texas have an opportunity to express themselves concerning legislation," Mutscher said. "This 62nd Legislature will be faced with many difficult challenges and I feel fortunate to have Mr. Clayton in the leadership of these two important House

Committees."

Mutscher was recently re-elected unanimously to the Speakership, and he is one of only five Texans to be so honored with a second consecutive term.

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Bill Changing Requirements To Benefit Small Hospitals

A bill introduced by Congressman Bob Price in October to change staffing requirements for small hospitals has been signed into law by President Nixon.

"Under previous regulations hospitals could not collect payments from Medicare unless at least one registered nurse was on duty during each of the three eight-hour hospital shifts," Price explained. "This new law will make it possible for 50-bed and under hospitals to treat Medicare patients if they provide 24 hour nursing service by licensed vocational nurses when registered nurses are not on duty."

Price introduced the legislation on behalf of the many hospital administrators, doctors, nurses, and concerned

citizens throughout the 18th district and Texas who have been concerned about the problem.

"It would be a great blow to the residents of small towns if community hospitals would have been forced to close their doors because of unrealistic Federal regulations," Price said.

"I am very pleased that my colleagues in the Congress and the President had the foresight to take such quick action on this legislation," he added.

European Tour Planned For Students And Adults

A European tour last summer proved so exciting, educational, and interesting to some Plainview residents that two of the group, Mrs. John Blaine and Mr. William Fred Webb, plan to sponsor a similar trip to the continent this coming summer.

The three week student and adult economy tour originates from Dallas with the Student Travel Abroad Agency. Air travel will be chartered American Flyers Airlines, DC-8 jetliner. Air travel will be roundtrip from Dallas, a feature not offered in most economy tours. Travel within Europe will be by rail, hovercraft, steamer, and deluxe motorcoach.

The group departs Dallas

June 11, 1971, and arrives in London, England June 12. Tours within London will include Palace, witnessing the Changing of the Guard, Piccadilly Circus, the Houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey, Hyde Park, Tower of London, Royal Exchange, St. Paul's Cathedral, Old Curiosity Shop of Charles Dickens' fame, and other points of interest.

Traveling by rail and hovercraft to Paris, France, the tour group will visit the Paris Opera, Madeleine Church, Champs-Elysees, Montmartre, Notre Dame, and the Louvre Museum. A trip to Versailles to view the Gallery of Mirrors, the Royal Chapel, and the beautiful gardens is also included.

In Italy, the tour will travel to Milan and on to Florence where the Medici Chapel containing Michelangelo's masterpieces will be seen. Also included will be St. Lawrence Church, the Cathedral, Giotto's Bell Tower, the House of Elizabeth Barrett Browning, the Pitti Palace and Gallery, Uffizi Gallery, and the Church of Santa Croce containing the tombs of Michelangelo, Rossini, and Galileo.

Three days will be spent in historical Rome. Sightseeing in the "Eternal City" includes the popular Trevi Fountain, Piazza di Spagna, the Spanish Steps, Piazza Colonna where the Marcus Aurelius Column is located, the Pantheon, a two thousand year old pagan temple. Piazza Navona, built on the ruins of the Circus Maximus, Vatican City, the Roman Forums, and the Palatine Hill where Rome is said to have been founded. The Colosseum, the Church of St. Peter in Chains, including the viewing of the "horned" statue of Moses sculpted by Michelangelo. From Rome, an optional tour to the Isle of Capri is available. This trip will include the viewing of the spectacular Blue Grotto. Traveling to Venice, the

group will visit St. Mark's Square with its famous Basilica, the Doges' Palace, the Piombi Prisons, and the famous Bridge of Sighs.

Departing Venice by rail and motorcoach, the tourists will visit Lucerne, Switzerland. Here the sightseeing includes the Lion Monument dedicated to the Swiss Guard, the wooden Chapel Bridge of 1333, the wooden Dance of Death Bridge of 1407, both adorned with interesting paintings of the period. An afternoon excursion by steamer on Lake Lucerne takes the group to Alpnachstad where they make the fascinating ascent to 7,012 feet Mt. Pilatus. From the top of this mountain, one enjoys a breathtaking panoramic view of the surrounding Swiss countryside.

From Lucerne the group continues by motorcoach, touring via Zurich into Germany by way of Schaffhausen with the famous Rhine Falls, through the heart of the Black Forest in view of the Feldberg Ridge, on to Freiburg, Baden-Baden, Karlsruhe, and on to historic Heidelberg. A rhine steamer trip passing by the many castles lining the river valley and a view of the famous rock "Lorelei" will bring the group to Koblenz. Continuing by motorcoach, the tour will continue to Bonn, capital of West Germany and the birthplace of Beethoven. In Cologne, the famous Cathedral will be the highlight.

Touring through the industrial Rhine-Ruhr district, the group will cross the border into the Netherlands. Continuing via Arnhem, scene of airborne landings in 1944, and by way of Utrecht, the party will arrive in Amsterdam, exciting city of the Netherlands. Highlights in Amsterdam include the Rijksmuseum with its Rembrandt Rembrandt's House, the Old Portuguese Synagogue, the New and Old Church, and the Stock Exchange.

From Amsterdam the group will depart from Schiphol, Europe's most modern airport, and fly direct to Dallas, Texas.

The tour will be conducted from June 11- July 2, 1971. 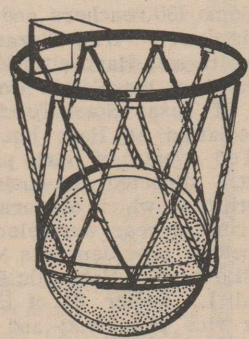

TELEGRAM

Editor's Note: The following telegram was received from Bill Clayton Wednesday morning regarding Senator Bentson's appointments to senate committee.

Representative Bill Clayton in contact with Senator Bentson Monday, was advised of the senate committee appointments. The senator thought an appointment to the agriculture committee, but Clayton considered the Public Works appointment of even greater importance to agriculture and water resource development to the area.

Emphysema Is Adults' Fastest Growing Disease

One of the fastest growing causes of adult disability in this country is emphysema, a disease affecting the lungs.

Causes and effects of emphysema were known, but the disease received greater emphasis in 1964, says the Texas State Department of Health. A report that year by the U. S. Surgeon General's Advisory Committee on Smoking and Health incriminated cigarette smoking as a contributing cause of the disease. It was found that for cigarette smokers the death rate from chronic bronchitis and emphysema was six times greater than for non-smokers. Emphysema and chronic bronchitis are closely related although they may develop independently. Emphysema often develops from chronic bronchitis.

Deaths due to emphysema have increased about five times in the past 10 years. Frequently the victims live in areas where air pollution is a constant problem.

Emphysema is described as an impairment of the bellows action of the lungs. In the course of the disease, the walls of the millions of tiny air sacs (called Alveoli) within the lungs are gradually destroyed. As the air spaces become larger, the victims find it increasingly difficult to expel all the air inhaled, and air becomes trapped in the

lungs. As the disease progresses increasingly large amounts of air are trapped in the lungs, causing the lungs to become enlarged. At the same time, they become less efficient in exchanging oxygen for carbon dioxide.

Frequent respiratory infections, increasing breathlessness, a feeling of tightness in the chest, general weakness and a tendency to tire easily are signs of the disease.

Eventually, emphysema destroys the elasticity of the lungs -- the ability to expand and contract. As interference continues, an increased burden is imposed on the heart which must work harder to pump blood through the damaged lungs. Under such strain, the heart may enlarge and eventually give out.

Emphysema doesn't strike suddenly but comes on gradually, sometimes after several seasons of bad colds, each accompanied by a severe cough and often with chronic bronchitis. The cough may become chronic.

There is no known cure of emphysema, but with early treatment under a doctor's care most patients can get some relief from their attacks of breathlessness. Treatment can enable many to live comfortably for a long time.

For the sweet-tooth, we are sharing desserts today. These are tasty and tempting and provide the perfect finish for any meal.

CHERRY SPOON-UP

2 cans prepared cherry pie filling
1 can Pillsbury crescent roll
1 1/2 c. dairy sour cream
1 c. firmly packed brown sugar
1/4 tsp. nutmeg

Spread prepared pie filling in a 13" x 19" pan. Separate roll dough into 4 rectangles and place over filling. Combine sour cream, brown sugar, and nutmeg. Spread over dough. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes. May be topped with whipped cream or ice cream.

LOG CABIN PUDDING

1 c. sweet milk, scalded
1 pkg. plain gelatin
1/4 c. cold water
1 c. Log Cabin Maple syrup
1 3/4 c. whipped cream or 1 pkg. dream whip
1 c. pecans
Vanilla wafers - enough to cover bottom of pan and top

Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Let stand 5 minutes. Combine milk and gelatin mixture, add the syrup. Let congeal. Then add to first mixture, the whipped cream, and pecans. Roll enough vanilla wafers to cover the bottom of pan. Then pour the mixture into pan. Then put more crushed wafers on top. Place in refrigerator to chill.

SOUR CREAM POUND CAKE

3 c. flour
1/4 tsp. soda
1/8 tsp. salt
2 sticks butter, room temp.
3 c. sugar
6 eggs, separated, room temp.
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. lemon flavoring
1 c. sour cream

Sift flour, soda and salt together. Cream butter and sugar. Add egg yolks, one at a time, beating until creamy. Add flavorings and dry ingredients alternately with sour cream to creamed mixture. Beat egg whites; fold into mixture. Place in greased tube pan. Bake in 300 degree oven for one hour and 30 minutes. Glaze cake while hot with Lemon Glaze. Use 3/4 cup powdered sugar

and juice of one lemon. Blend sugar and lemon juice well; pour over hot cake.

OSGOOD PIE

1/2 c. butter
2 c. sugar
4 eggs, beaten
1 tsp. vanilla
1 c. chopped raisins
1 c. chopped pecans

Cream butter and sugar. Add beaten eggs, vanilla, raisins, and pecans. Pour into 2 unbaked 9 inch pie shells. Bake in slow oven at 300 degrees for 1 hour.

STRAWBERRY CREAM DELIGHT

1 c. crushed pineapple
1/2 c. sugar
1 - 3 oz. strawberry gelatin
1 c. cold water
1 c. grated American cheese
1 c. chopped nuts
1/4 c. sugar
1 c. whipped cream or 1 pkg. Dream Whip, whipped

Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Bring sugar and pineapple to a boil and pour over gelatin. Cool until thick in ice box. Then add nuts, cheese, and sweetened whipped cream. Refrigerate over night.

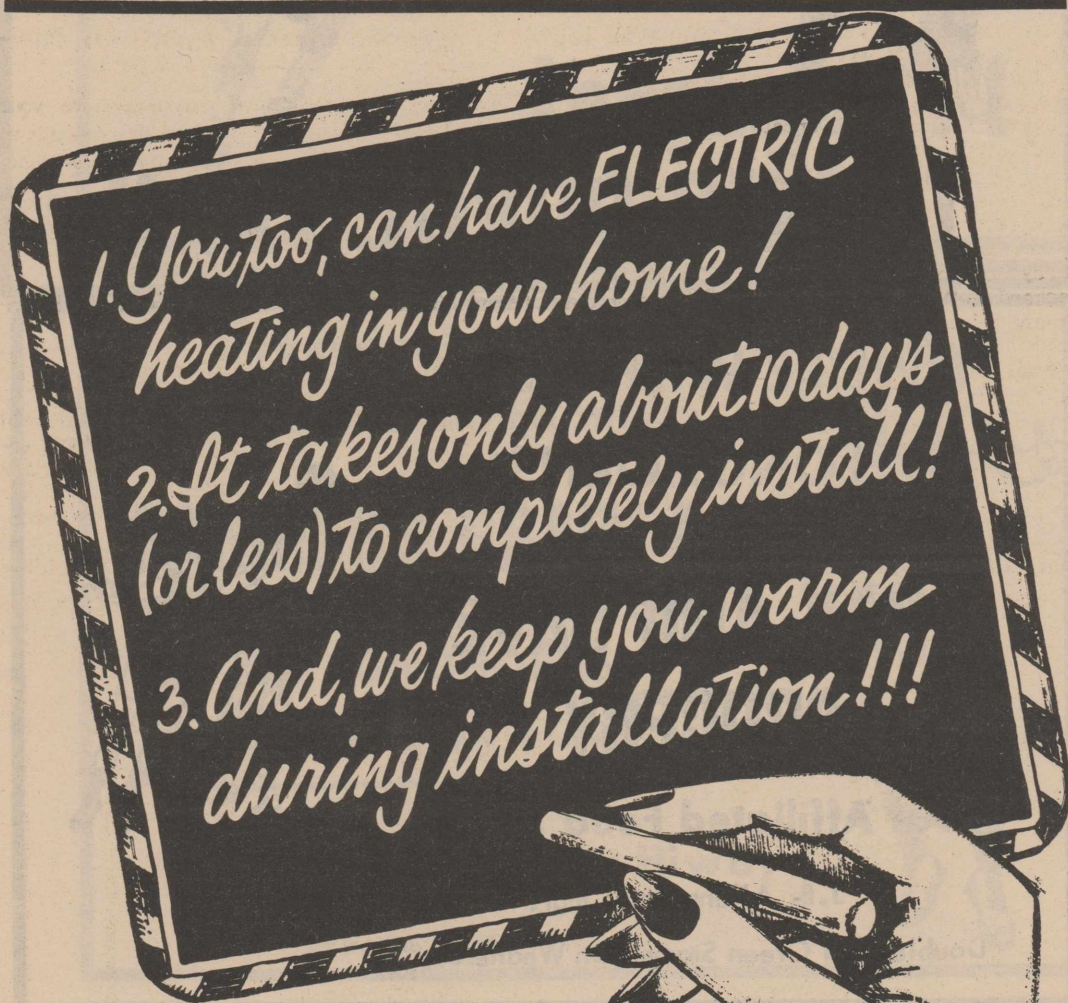
Castro TSTA Elects Officers

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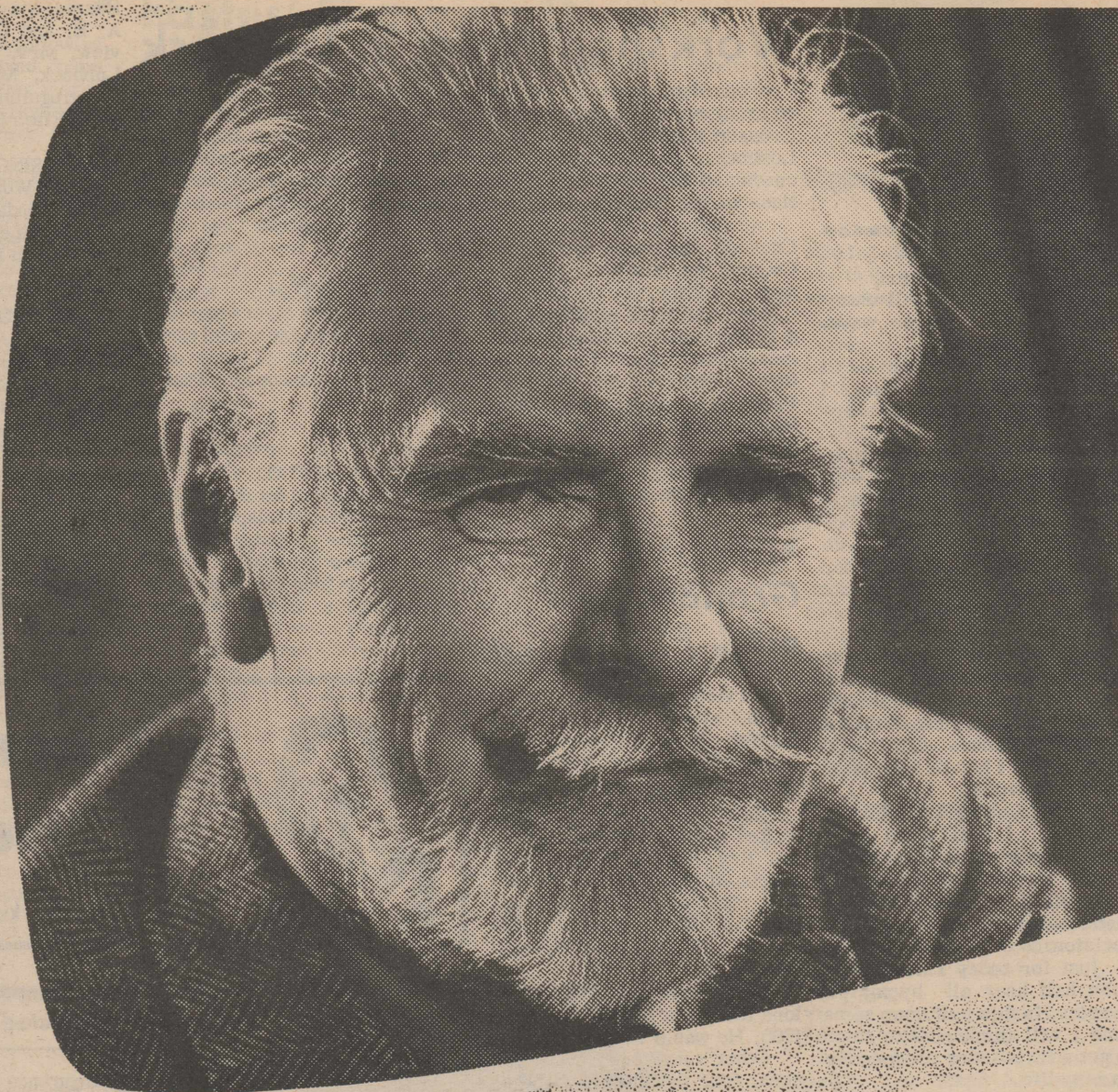

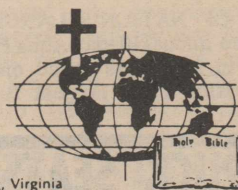
