"Within the Reach of the Plains People" is the title of the production which depicts the rise of history and civilization in America and Texas as told about by the lives of the men whose faces are carved in the stone of the college building.

A very elaborate spectacle is planned for the event which is to be the most elaborate ever shown on the Tech stage. The two pageants each performance was witnessed by more than 1,000 people.

Lighting, settings and costumes are being arranged for production by Miss Annah Johnson, head of the department of public speaking. Miss Johnson has charge of the dances and the Miss Eugenia Marshall will be the queen of the pageant. Miss Williams of Lubbock is the queen of the pageant.

Varying costumes of every period in American and Texas history will be worn in the procession. Miss Marshall, of the home economics department, being in charge of this work. W. R. Washburne and Harry Haire of the music department, will be in charge of the musical numbers of the pageant.

A large number of faculty members are aiding in the pageant this year, having charge of various parts of the work. The exact time of the pageant has not been decided on but will be announced before the latter part of the week, Miss Cox said.

Must Be Invited
U. S. Officials Say

WASHINGTON, May 8 (AP)—The state department made it clear today that the United States could act as mediator between Japan and the nationalist government of China only if invited to do so by both sides.

Actual Warfare Is
Indicated in Report

PEKING, May 8 (AP)—A state of actual warfare in Shantung is indicated by official Japanese reports. Latest word from Tsinan, capital of Shantung, states that heavy fighting ensued at 9 o'clock this morning when a contingent of the thirteenth Japanese regiment reconnoitering in a northern suburb of Tsinan along the railway was fired upon by the nationalists.

The Japanese are taking measures to enforce the proclamation of a neutral zone seven miles on either side of the Shantung railway where the nationalists were last reported attacking in great numbers.

Withdrawal Order Given. Today's fighting followed the issuing of an order by the Japanese general-in-command at Tsinan directing the Chinese nationalist troops to withdraw outside the neutral zone. The Chinese refused and began to adopt offensive measures, resulting in the proclamation by the Japanese of a proclamation announcing recourse to active measures to enforce their demands.

Justice Benanti was among those kidnapped. Others were Joe Galucci, Martin Nigro, precinct captain and Ben Ryan, city meat inspector. Angelo Gerard, custodian of the city hall, was missing and reported kidnapped.

Harry Goldburg, election judge, was warned to leave a polling place where he presided. He did.

Leaders of the Pendergast faction, led by Thomas Pendergast, charged that a faction which is contesting for leadership of the Democratic party here in the ward responsible for the kidnappings.

WEST TEXAS FIELDS HOLD LEAD IN
OIL PRODUCTION WITH MANY AREAS
SHOWING BIG INCREASE PAST WEEK

TULSA, Okla., May 8.—With the sensational West Texas fields taking the lead, daily average production of oil in several important areas increased during the week ending May 5, with the result that the total increase for the United States was 50,007 barrels, the Oil and Gas Journal will say today.

Production in the West Texas area increased 34,494 barrels during the week, bringing the total for that section to above 400,000 barrels. The gain was in the great Hendricks field, with slight losses being sustained in the Yates and other fields of the area.

DALLAS, May 8.—A political battle with intimate control of Texas' forty delegates to the democratic national convention as the prize of victory today in 253 county conventions waged as approximately 800 delegates to the state convention at Beaumont, May 22, were chosen.

It marked an intermediate step in the process of choosing Texas' 26 delegates to the national republican convention at Kansas City also were held while state republican party leaders claimed certain instruction of the delegation for Herbert Hoover for president.

Returns from the democratic precinct conventions indicated that the faction of the democratic party in Texas led by Gov. Dan Moody would have a majority in today's conventions, but the issue was enough in doubt to bring conflicting claims of control from mother faction leaders.

Governor Moody, while stating his opposition to the candidacy of Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York for the presidential nomination, has favored instructing the Texas delegates to work for a dry plank in the national platform and for a candidate for president in sympathy with such a plank.

Moody Opposed by Love. One of the leaders who disputes the claims of the Moody democrats is former national committeeman Thomas B. Love of Dallas who as organizer of a bone-dry group called

DRY PLANK, RELIGION, USED IN CAMPAIGN FOR PRIMARY

(By Associated Press)
BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 8.—Al Smith is the issue before Alabama today as thousands of democratic voters go to the polls to elect delegates to the Houston convention. In addition to the election of delegates who will cast Alabama's 24 votes full state and county states are to be named. Opponents of the New York governor have used prohibition and religion as campaign arguments while those favoring Smith have brought the party mandate of "no delegates pledged to vote against any man" to the fore.

Hoover And Watson Fight In Indiana

INDIANAPOLIS, May 8.—The strenuous battle between Herbert Hoover and Senator James E. Watson for the state's 32 delegates to the Kansas City convention and for the republican presidential preference vote attracted nationwide interest in the Indiana primary today. Senator Watson did not end his campaign until the last minute, having made a radio address from Wayne last night after having three speeches in that Hoover stronghold during the day. Watson predicted victory in every district while Oscar G. Poellinger, campaign manager for Hoover, issued a statement declaring Hoover would win by a comfortable margin.

Democrat Unopposed
The democratic presidential preference will go unopposed to Evans Allen, Indianapolis banker, who was written in on the ballots to head the vote. The campaign for state offices and for short term in the senate ended last night with candidates delivering last minute speeches from platforms and over radios. Radio stations over the state and several powerful outstate stations have been utilized by a number of candidates from the beginning of the campaign. In one instance Kenneth M. Landis, age 17, son of Frederick Landis, candidate for the republican nomination for governor, traveled from radio station to radio station by airplane, making speeches in behalf of his father who suddenly became ill.

Former Governor Goldborough opposed for the republican nomination.

WBAP To Broadcast Pageant Messages

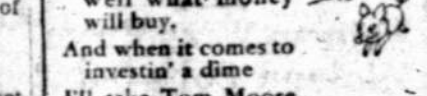

The Japanese chief of staff in his report replied in detail to charges made by Huang Pu, former mayor of Shanghai, against the Japanese. He asserted that Huang Pu took refuge at the Japanese battalion headquarters when the fighting began and later admitted that it was

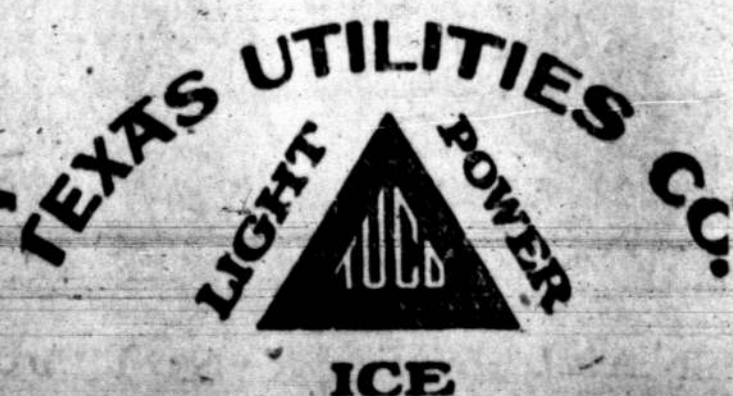

BRITISH ORDER PRINCE CAROL FROM COUNTRY

RUMANIAN MAY VISIT AMERICA, HIS AIDES SAY IN LONDON

(By Associated Press) LONDON, May 8.—The British government today ordered former Crown Prince Carol of Rumania to leave the country. Recent Carolist activities have become too embarrassing, the government decided. Carol intimated that he might go to America. He admitted that a manifesto had been printed in London saying that he awaited only a call from Rumania to return to assume the throne in place of his six-year-old son, King Michael. Copies sent to America. Copies of this manifesto, he said, had been sent to America some time ago and were ordered distributed Saturday. "I have had no financial assistance from America," Carol said. "But I have strong support there. It is possible that if my plans fail I shall visit America." The manifesto was also to have been distributed throughout Rumania by airplane, but the British government learning of this plan, prevented the planes from leaving England.

Police Guard Estate. Police were on guard today at the Surrey estate where Carol is staying and the morning papers said that the government's decision, which was in effect an order of expulsion, had been communicated to Carol shortly after midnight by three Scotland Yard officers. The request that Carol leave was in accordance with the usual procedure when a foreigner uses English territory as the center for intrigues against a friendly government.

Country Resembles Giant Armed Camp. BUCHAREST, Rumania, May 8.—The whole of Transylvania today resembled an armed camp as 5,000 peasants marched on the capital to demand from the regency a change of government.

There was no doubt that the regency and cabinet were disturbed by the manifestation although statements of the government and other sources differed greatly as to the importance and volume of the peasants' march. **Army Planes Held Ready.** Army airplanes ready to suppress a revolt with bombs hovered overhead as the peasants marched. Government cavalry brought up the front and rear of the marching horde. Perfect order prevailed when the peasants reached Sibiu and the cavalry escort was under instructions not to impede the march unless the peasants tried to incite the countryside.

After informing the peasant leader, Julio Maniu, that they would not grant the resignation of the Bratianu government, the regents summoned Premier Vintila Bratianu and J. G. Duca, minister of interior. With them they discussed what reply would be made to the demands of the peasants. It was thought in some circles that the regency seeking a way out might ask Nicholas Titulescu, foreign minister, to form a cabinet in order to placate the peasantry among whom he is popular.

Delegations Return. The ministry of the interior issued a formal statement saying that all delegations to the peasant congress at Alba Julia had returned to their starting point. Two hundred peasants attended the congress and the Associated Press correspondent found that 5,000 reached Sibiu, about 30 miles from Alba Julia, after a march of a night and a day. Martial law prevailed in Transylvania and the Rumanian-Hungarian border was closed to automobile traffic. All travellers were being sharply scrutinized, questioned and searched.

Peasants Not In With Carol, Claim. SIBIU, Rumania, May 8.—Before leaving for Bucharest, Julio Maniu, leader of the national peasant party, said that the peasants had no connection whatever with former Crown Prince Carol and did not intend to recall him. He asserted that Carol's name was not mentioned once during the congress at Alba Julia.

While the peasants march to Bucharest did not have his sanction, M. Maniu, said he was powerless to prevent it in face of the bitter indignation of the peasants toward the present government which Maniu expected would fall at any minute.

U. S. To Demand He Meet Requirements. WASHINGTON, May 8.—Government officials said today that Prince Carol of Rumania would have to satisfy the American consul general's office in London that he meets all qualifications required by the immigration law before a visa of his passport, remitting him to enter the United States, would be given.

"PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN PORTRAITS" SENATOR WALTER F. GEORGE

GEORGE IS EXPONENT OF
STATES' RIGHTS

EDITOR'S NOTE: This, the 24th of a series of Presidential Campaign Portraits, tells the story of Senator Walter F. George. This is the concluding article in this series.

WASHINGTON, May 8. — Twice in the past 16 years the south has offered a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the presidency, and now it is offering another.

At Baltimore in 1912 and again at New York in 1924 it was Senator Oscar W. Underwood of Alabama. At Houston in 1928 it will be Senator Walter F. George of Georgia.

Between ex-Senator Underwood, now living in retirement on his country estate near Washington, and Senator George there is a strong similarity, though George mainly lacks Underwood's massive quality. Each is multi-mannered, soft-spoken and has a demeanor that is always calm, courteous and even courtly. Neither looks anything like the "southern collier" type of politician that the cartoonists draw.

Events have moved swiftly for the quiet little Georgian who sits behind his desk in the Senate Office Building here, puffing on an old corn-cob pipe.

When Underwood was battling Champ Clark and Prof. Woodrow Wilson for the nomination at the Baltimore convention in 1912, Walter F. George was an obscure prosecuting attorney in rural Georgia.

Next he became judge of the superior court of that circuit, where he served for five years. In 1917 he became an associate justice of the supreme court of Georgia, and he remained until he entered the U. S. Senate.

George of Georgia, as he has come to be known, was chosen to a special election to succeed the fiery Senator Tom Watson of Georgia, who died in office. It was difficult to imagine a greater contrast than the one between the quiet, bigoted and flaming Tom and the calm and quiet, calm man who succeeded him.

Senator George did not go to office immediately. For one month he was in the Senate in a little harmless hippopotamus, he "stood aside" so that the late Senator Pelton, then in the Senate, could be sworn in as the first man ever to become a member of the body. The venerable Mr. Pelton had been given a temporary complimentary appointment by Governor Hardwick of Georgia.

During his six years in the Senate, which have been marked by re-election, Senator George has distinguished himself on several occasions. Dignified orator, convincing logic and quiet persuasiveness have been his instruments of triumph. He never indulges in the belabored, desk-pound arm-waving tactics of many state speech makers.

George's most recent big battle was the one in which he opposed Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana, and succeeded in having Walsh's proposed senatorial probe of the nation's "power trust" transferred to the Federal Trade Commission. He said he made this shift as an advocate of state's rights, insisting that a senatorial investigation in the heat of an election year might be followed by ill-considered federal legislation which would further overlap and curtail the rights of the states to regulate their own public utility companies.

The fact that a gigantic and well-aided power lobby supported the probe amendment that killed the state probe is undeniable, as is the fact that George comes from a state that is now entering a prosperous new economic era as the result of vast power development. But Senator George's announced move in championing the rights of the states to manage their own affairs, so happens that the largest in-

dividual contributor to Senator George's campaign in 1928 was Frank E. Shumate, vice president of the Georgia Power Company. But the amount was only \$750 and George and Shumate have been life-long friends, as the senator told me when I asked him about it.

Senator George comes from an old family in rural Georgia, his ancestors having migrated from South Carolina several generations ago. He had two uncles in the Confederate army, his father being only 10 years old at the outbreak of the Civil War.

Born on a farm near Preston, Ga., on Jan. 29, 1878, he has spent his life among rural surroundings, living now in Vienna, Ga., a little town of 1900 population. He attended common schools, studied law at Mercer and began practice at Vienna in 1901. Two years later he married Miss Lucy Heard of Vienna, and two children have been born to them. In 1907 he entered politics by being elected solicitor-general of the Cordele judicial circuit and held that post until he became a judge in 1912.

In marked contrast to the able but bigoted Tom Watson whom he succeeded in the Senate, George is one of the most tolerant of men. He has tried persistently to keep the level of politics above the bitterness of religious rancor.

Discussing bigotry and prejudice, he once said: "The leaders of thought should devote themselves to the task of lifting political campaigns from the sordid level and pitching them upon the higher plane of vital issues affecting the common weal."

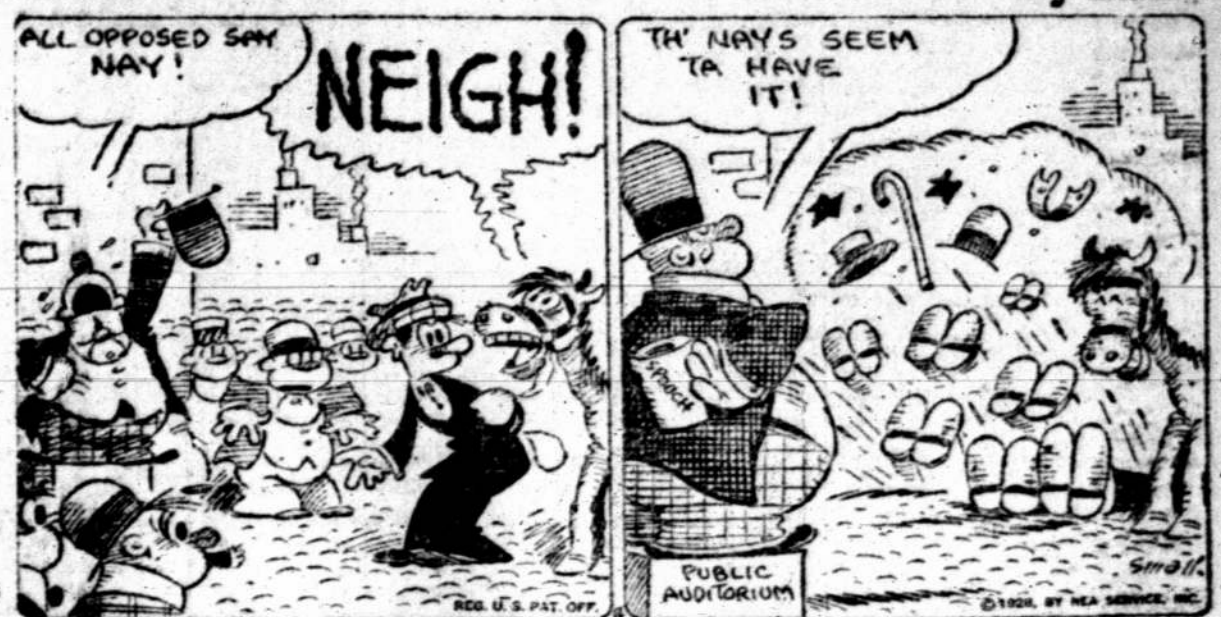

Buick's Victory

Victory is a great thing. The
man who fights his way through
obstacles, overcomes discouragement
and doubt and wins his goal
in spite of everything is greatly to
be envied. To the victor belong
not only the spoils but a feeling
of achievement that is beyond price.

Yet sometimes the fight, in itself
is worth more than the victory.
In there lives a man named David
Buick. Something like a quarter
of a century ago he founded the
Buick Motor Co. He developed the
valve-in-head engine and, with W.
Dumont, helped bring one of Amer-
ica's most famous industrial
giants into being.

But today David Buick is poor.
At 74, he has to work as instructor
in a Detroit trades school to sup-
port himself. The streets are filled
with shiny autos bearing his
name, his name, in fact is the
very symbol of wealth and power.
But he himself is obscure and for-
gotten. He cannot afford to own
a car.

This is a tragic story. But David
Buick, who might be expected, to be
the most disconsolate and unhappy
of men, is cheerful. His eyes still
flash brightly as he talks to you.
He smiles frequently and easily.

He tells you, rather proudly, of
his early struggles. He worked
14, 16 and 18 hours a day for seven
years, to establish the Buick Motor
Co. how, during all those years, he
never took a day off—not even on
Christmas, how neither he nor any
other executive in the plant ever
looked at the clock or thought of
going home until every bit of work
had been completed, and how in
1910, his health broke down and
forced him to retire.

The net result of this overwork
was that David Buick lost out. In-
stead of being a multi-millionaire
today he is poorer than most of
the mechanics who work in the
Buick factories. Yet he doesn't re-
gret the work he put in. He doesn't
feel bitter against fate.

He didn't get the victory—but he
had the fight! For years he knew
the joy of hard, desperate combat.
For years, he knew the satisfaction
that comes to the man who gives
himself without stint and spends
himself utterly. And the memory
of it still heartens him.

The indomitable will of the born
fighter still animates him. He ex-
presses contempt for the man who
when beaten, "lets on his hand and
feels sorry for himself."
Knocked down? All right; get up
and fight, again, even if you know
you can't win. At least you can
fight, and keep on fighting until
you drop.

Victory isn't everything. The
fight itself is its own reward. David
Buick doesn't want your pity. He
doesn't feel that he needs it. Life
has given him certain rewards,
even if he isn't a millionaire; and
who shall say that David Buick is
not one of the most admirable of
the motor kings of Detroit?

Military Parks

The secretaries of war and the
interior have asked Congress, to
transfer seven national military
parks from the jurisdiction of the
War Department to that of the
Department of the Interior.

They point out that the National
Park Service, created 12 years ago,
has charge of most of our national
parks, and that the transfer of
these military parks will be in the
interests of economy and efficiency
included in the proposed transfer
are some of the most famous Civil
War battlefields, such as Gettys-
burg, Antietam, Shiloh and Freder-
icksburg.

The main thing is to see that
these parks are kept up. As shrines
for patriotism they are of incal-
culable value. No one can visit
such a field as that of Gettysburg
without coming away a better Amer-
ican. It is to be hoped that Con-
gress will look into the matter and
take such action as will best pre-
serve these parks for future gener-
ations.

Officials of the Santa Fe met
in a "Safety First" meeting at
Slaton the other day and spent
some time in discussing ways
and means of averting acci-
dents. Mr. A. R. Tillman, an official of
Albuquerque, an official of the
Santa Fe, came up to Lubbock
and in an address before the
Lubbock Rotary club urged that
a "Safety First" Campaign be
inaugurated here.

Mr. Tillman quoted interesting
statistics bearing upon accidents—
especially upon grade crossing
smashes. His suggestion that Lub-
bock inaugurate a "Safety First"
Campaign was undoubtedly a good
one but the Plainsman couldn't
help but wonder why the Santa Fe
didn't give impetus to a local cam-
paign by deciding to obey under-
passes where its tracks intersect
with Broadway and Avenue H.

Such action is about the only
way the Santa Fe will ever
make Lubbock people believe
that it is really interested in
safety measures at grade cross-
ings. It doesn't take a "Safety
First" specialist to know that
underpasses at both places are
needed and no "Safety First"
campaign could possibly be suc-
cessful here without the con-
struction of these underpasses.

The Santa Fe can send safety
speakers to Lubbock with such
notorious regularity that they ap-
pear to be forming a parade but
their speeches, regardless of how
interesting, will never make much
impression. Now is the time for
action and not speeches.

As The Plainsman under-
stands it there is a legal loop-
hole which forestalls any forcing
of the Santa Fe to construct
the underpasses on Broadway
and Avenue H, and which
makes it virtually impossible to
make the Port Worth and Den-
ver construct an underpass
where its tracks will intersect
with South Avenue H—which is
also the channel of entrance
for highways 7 and 9.

But legal loopholes are of little
service to the man who is man-
aged at a dangerous grade crossing
as Plummer Fanny so aptly said
the other day. There's not much sat-
isfaction in explaining to the nurse
that you had the right of way!

It's fine to urge the public
to remember "Safety First!"
But some real constructive action
at the same time is not so worse!

That Man on Avenue Q says mar-
riage is a game of give and take—
with the husband giving the salary
and the wife taking it!

Many people are objecting to
the preponderance of crime news
in the papers. Daily publica-
tions all over the nation
have, in the past three years,
given over more space to the
dissemination of crime news than
they ever have before in all
the history of the newspaper
game. There's too much crime
news in the papers all right—but
there's also too much crime
in the land. Therein lies a
problem.

The men who build the news-
papers are not building them ac-
cording to their own tastes. The
most successful newspapers are now,
and always have been, the ones
which appeal to the greatest num-
ber of people. Hence an analysis
of the situation indicates above and
below the surface that the reading
public has the last say concerning
what the newspaper will be.

From daily business and social
contact with them, The Plainsman
fancies that he knows newspaper
men fairly well—better, at least,
than the man outside the profes-
sion. And, among the newspaper
men whom the writer has known
personally and professionally, he
has found a large majority who
would rather play up a story on
local advancement than the rarest
crime yarn ever spun.

But the desire of the men who
edit your news is not fulfilled.
They are given certain tools with
which to work—their tools are the
news items of the day as that news
filters in from over the state,
nation and world and from the local
sources. With the tools which they
have they build an edition. If more
crime goes into the construction
than any other material it is be-
cause crime is more rampant today
than ever before.

And the dear public—sad though
it may be—is partial to exciting
news. The Hickman case, figures
show, boosted circulation in metro-
politan districts to heights which
were second only to Colonel Lind-
bergh's epochal flight to Paris dur-
ing the good year 1927. Those fig-
ures indicate that the public is in-
terested in the antics of criminals
to such an extent that the interest
must be served. It is another case
of where majority rules and if you
do not happen to be part of that

SEE-SAWING and BROADWAY

NEW YORK, May 8.—Valets,
chauffeurs and butlers of Wall
Street figures suddenly find them-
selves perched on the street.
Servant girls and maids in the
homes of the rich have been sur-
prised at their sudden popularity.
Their phones have buzzed and they
have received endless invitations to
theaters and supper.

The notion has prevailed that
they were in a splendid position to
get "inside information" on the
Wall Street activities of their em-
ployers. They have been "spotted"
and "trailed"; their names have
been watched. In a few in-
stances there was some reason for
this, but as a general rule employ-
ers discourage speculation among
their employees and their friends. A
few chauffeurs and butlers now
drive their own cars, thanks to the
friendly market. And a waiter in
a Wall Street cafe where traders
gather for breakfast made \$85,000
in three days.

On the other hand, the man who
hears more "inside information" than
anyone outside the "street" never
gambles a dime. He is a
barber, favored by a score of mar-
ket manipulators. He has been
given hundreds of "good things,"
but he never plays them. He has
passed some of them on to close
friends and he has seen them get
the "market fever." He is content
with a rich patronage that recently
made it possible for him to open
a \$100,000 shop.

Statistics show that some 2,000
girls leave the small towns of
America each year to come to New
York. These same statistics show
that the average age of a runaway
girl has dropped from 17 to 15.
And statistics better than any
change little from year to year—
particularly where motives are con-
cerned. Girls leave home to come
to New York, so the records show,
because of unsympathetic homes;
because of a romantic-mindedness
that gives the "big city" a mag-
netic lure; because of an uncom-
fortable or embarrassing incident in
the home town which breeds a desire
to get as far away as possible and
find shelter on a place where no-
body knows you—and, of course,
the usual assortment of stage-struck
maiden.

A woman who has mothered thou-
sands of these runaways tells me
that they have wandered in from
every city and hamlet upon this
continent. "And they're not quit-
ters," she tells me. "I've known
them to wander up and down the
streets without food and without
shelter. They're game kids—these
youngsters who come to fight New
York. And that is one of the rea-
sons I can say that I never have
thizes with you as one sufferer to
another.

The day of the "wide open
spaces" is vanishing. If soon
will have gone to the happy
hunting grounds of the petti-
coat. It will be as extinct as the
wild buffalo. A San Angelo man
recently traveling by plane, of
course, from Kansas City to
Abilene in six hours and five
minutes. When the air age hits
us with all its force we'll think
no more of going to Chicago
than we do now of driving to
Post.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Three
old inventors, who have invent-
ed things all their lives and are
still at it today figure in an
other episode of an ancient feud
which has been brought before
Congress.

On one side is Thomas A. Ed-
ison.

On the other side are Emile Ber-
liner and C. Francis Jenkins of
Washington.

The fight centers on a bill in-
troduced by Congressman Ran-
dolph Perkins of New Jersey which
provides for the striking of a con-
gressional medal in honor of Ed-
ison and his many achievements.

Congress seldom grants such a
medal. Its last recipients were the
Wright brothers and Colonel Lind-
bergh.

Berliner and Jenkins, both of
whom claim important inventions
popularly credited to Edison, don't
want Edison to have that medal.

NATURALLY, they haven't rushed
up to Capitol Hill to make pub-
lic protest. But they're intensely
interested in the efforts of a girl
lobbyist who is working against
the bill on their behalf.

And they hope to have it stop-
ped, even though the House Com-
mittee on Coinage has reported it
favorably and Secretary of the
Treasury Mellon, who makes the
government medals, is said to fa-
vor it.

The anti-Edison movement is
based on the contention that Ed-
ison has claimed or appeared to
claim that he invented the micro-
phone, the continuous current
transformer, the gramophone and
the motion picture machine.

Berliner claims to be the in-
ventor of the first three and Jen-
kins claims the movies. Mrs. Clara
Louise Leslie, who is trying to per-
suade Congress to ditch the bill,
has collected a stack of evidence
to show to all concerned.

phone and the first to associate
the induction coil with the contact
transmitter—two indispensable in
telephony and radio broadcasting.

Berliner patented the gram-
ophone in 1887, a machine both vi-
brating and propelling the needle.
This, he says, is the present Victor
talking machine. Edison had tak-
en out a previous patent on a tin-
foil cylinder phonograph, but Ber-
liner says he invented the modern
disc talking machine and the
process of making unlimited num-
bers of exact copies from one mas-
ter record. In 1887 the Franklin
Institute awarded Berliner a medal
for his gramophone, but on Ed-
ison's 75th birthday he accepted
from his employees a Lorado Taft
statue called "Orpheus Discover-
ing the Gramophone Record,"
which depicted Orpheus holding
a disc record. Mrs. Leslie,
protesting to Congressman Perkins,
charged that Edison invented "only
the absolutely valueless tin-foil
phonograph."

Berliner was associated with the
Bell Laboratories in their pioneer
days.

to talk to anyone who answers at the
called telephone.

Station-to-station calls cost about
20 per cent. less than those where
you ask to talk to a particular person.

FOREIGN NEWS

Jap-Chinese War Paramount Issue In Week's Review

BY OSCAR WATSON

Cable Editor The Associated Press. The clash of the Japanese and Chinese nationalists at Tsinan, capital of Shantung province has overshadowed the interecine war between the north and south. For the moment the nationalist push toward the northern capital, Peking, has been forgotten in the more serious consequences entailed in Japan's intervention to protect her own and other foreign nationals in China.

Each Blames Other

On the occupation of Tsinan by Chinese troops under command of General Chiang Kai-Shek, the Japanese took measures to save the foreign settlement from the ravages of war. Each side blames the other for the fighting which ensued. Nationalist officials are reported to have been deliberately slain, while many of the Japanese soldiers were killed or wounded, and there were reports also of the death of numerous Japanese civilians.

With so many powers involved in China by treaty rights and with the Japanese government obligated to take some action against the Chinese authorities, the situation immediately became a dangerous one. Japanese reinforcements are being hurried to the scene of conflict and to various strategic points, while American and British warships are known to be stationed at ports in Chinese waters where their services may be available.

Refuse Northern Aid

Chang Tso-Lin, the northern dictator at Peking, offered support to the Japanese in the way of arms and munitions, to aid them in holding back the southerners, but the Japanese are said to have replied that they could handle the affair themselves.

At Tokyo the government is beset by the opposition parties, and last week a vote of non-confidence in Premier Tanaka was threatened. The political situation at Tokyo makes the affair more difficult to handle, and the reports from the Japanese capital indicated that the people there were not conversant with all the facts. 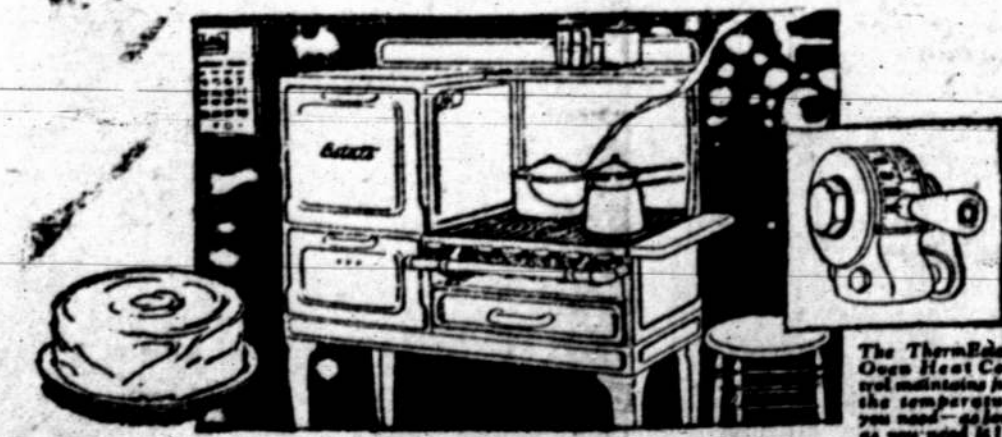
