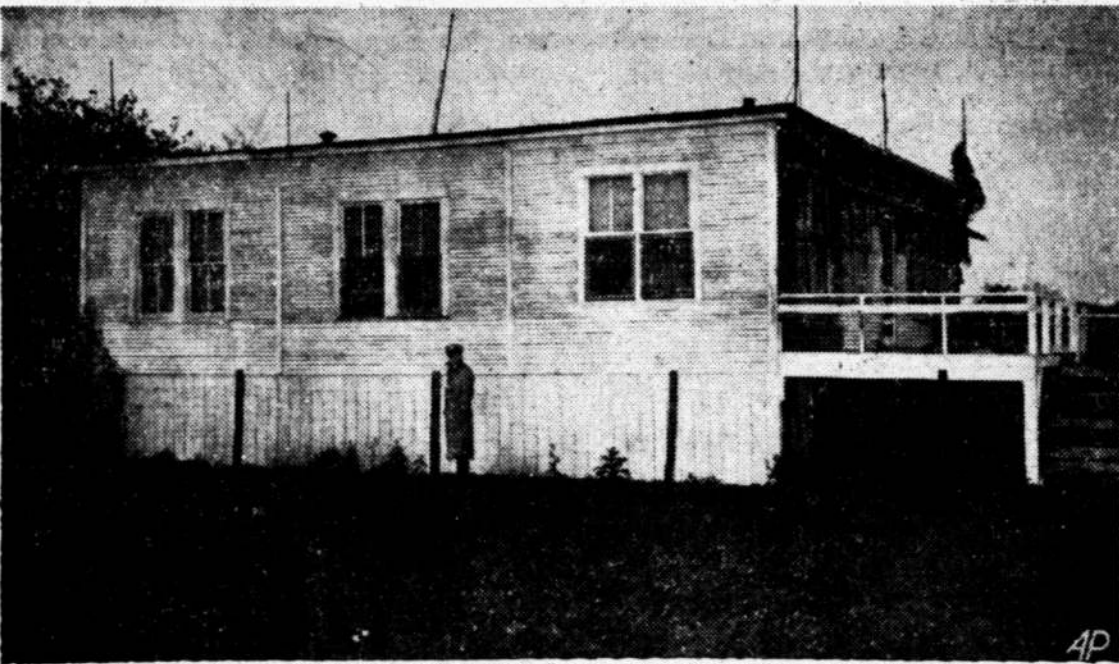

Many Changes In County School Set Up In Making Change To 12-Grade System

County Trustees In Meeting Thursday Discuss Various Phases Of School Activities In County

At a county trustee meeting held in the District Court Room Thursday afternoon, the most important topics for discussion were the 12-year system for Dawson County and the Free Lunch program.

Trustees of the county had not had time to study the effects of the twelve grade system and were therefore not ready to express their convictions. However, since that time word has been received in Dawson County that it is mandatory that the new system be employed. Plans will get under way immediately to make those adjustments for inauguration of the new system.

McCollum Field Will Be Scene Of Gay Time When Children Of County Gather

National Boys and Girls' Week will be observed in Lamesa beginning Saturday of this week and running through Saturday of next week, according to officials of the Lamesa School system.

Highlight of the week's activity will be the May Day celebration at McCollum Field on Friday afternoon of next week, when the Lamesa Elementary School will play host to the children of the schools of the county for a few hours of fun, play and festivity.

The program will begin at three o'clock and all students of the different schools will engage in a few hours of games.

A picnic lunch will be observed from 5 until 6 o'clock for all those who bring their lunches. Ample space will be provided on the campus for those who bring their lunch it was announced by school officials.

Beginning at six o'clock the students of the Lamesa Elementary School will present a colorful May Day pageant on the football field.

A great deal of activity among the student body in the selection of the May Queen has been noted this week, and her crowning will be one of the outstanding attractions of the celebration Friday. The Queen is being selected by allowing one vote for each cent given. Proceeds will be applied to the tennis court fund.

The play activities in which any child of grades 1 to 7 may participate will consist of such races as the 50-yard dash, the 100-yard dash and the 440-yard relay. Those who care to do so may take part in such games as baseball, volleyball, soccer ball, boxing and tug-o-war. Others may display their skill at tumbling, broad-jumping, pyramid building, etc. There will be other games of interest for children and spectators. The purpose of these games will be for enjoyable participation rather than for individual or group participation.

No admission charges will be made for any part of this program and every person in the county is cordially invited and urged to attend.

Big Spring Will Play 3 Games Opening Sunday

Some Of Contests May Be Played Under Lights If The Weather Warms Up

The Loboes after dropping two games to the Lubbock Hubbers to open the season in Lamesa, left Thursday morning for Lubbock where they will play three games with the Hubbers.

They will return home Sunday for an eight game home stand. The Big Spring Bombers, under the management of Jodie Tate, former Lobo manager, will furnish the competition beginning Sunday. They will play Monday and Tuesday as well.

On Wednesday the Clovis Pioneers make their first official 1941 appearance in Lamesa for a two-game stand against the Loboes.

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday the Amarillo Gold Sox will be at Lobo Field for their first series of the new season.

It has been suggested that, provided the weather has warmed up sufficiently, the first game under the lights might be reeled off here next week. It is likely that a definite announcement will not be made however, before the game here Sunday with the Bombers.

The entire circuit suffered from the effects of the weatherman on their opening day Tuesday, with games played at Lamesa, Clovis and Borger. The game at Wichita Falls between the Spudders and the Bombers, was called off on account of rain.

A crowd of only 500, due to the cold weather, saw the Amarillo Gold Sox win their opener from Clovis 5 to 3. The Borger Gassers garnered their opener over the Pampa Oilers, who were guilty of nine errors, 15 to 5.

Hubbers Clean Loboes Two Times In Row To Open New WT-NM Season This Week

Cold Weather Keeps Many People At Home For The Opening Games Of The Season Played In Lamesa

The opening of the West Texas-New Mexico League baseball season in Lamesa Tuesday, was considerably dampened by the cold weather and the severe drubbing the Hubbers from Lubbock administered to the Lamesa Loboes.

With a chilling east wind and heavily overcast skies, only slightly more than fifteen hundred fans braved the weather to hear the cry of "Play Ball" in the opening tilt. Overcasts were in evidence throughout the crowd, and the grandstand looked more like a football stadium spotted with blankets, than it did a baseball grandstand.

The Hubbers jumped on Carl Force, Lamesa starting pitcher in the first frame for a total of four runs, and started the same thing in the second, when, after one man was out he was sent to the showers. His teammates added to his troubles, as well as the Lubbock score, by making several errors behind him.

Arroyo, a new pitcher from El Paso, relieved Force in the second, with the bases loaded. He gave up nine hits in the seven and two-thirds innings he worked, and looked very good.

The Lubbock hurler, Sakas, although touched for a total of ten safeties and walked eleven men, kept them well scattered, and it was only until the fourth that the Loboes could tally. They added two more in the sixth and three in the ninth on a pinch home run by Bob

Schools Of Texas Will Adopt New Twelve Grade Plan Next Session

State Superintendent L. A. Woods announced this week that the official pattern for the schools of the state next year would be an eight year elementary school with a four year high school, making a total of twelve years. The school boards and superintendents and teachers were urged to begin now to prepare for the change to the 12-year system.

Soon after the tenth of May, the State Department of Education will issue a bulletin listing the minimum requirements for each of the eight grades of the elementary school. It shall be the duty of each county or community to enrich this minimum course with such materials as the local situation needs and desires.

Dr. Woods further asks that with the help of the local and county

boards, all schools be classified according to the following plan with the definite understanding that the new grade is to be added below the high school level.

For schools not maintaining accredited high schools:

One-teacher schools - 6 grade.

Two-teacher schools - 8 grades.

Three and four-teacher schools - 9 grades.

Five or more teachers - 10 grades.

For accredited High Schools:

Two-year fully accredited High Schools - 10 grades.

Four-year fully accredited high Schools - 12 grades.

No school will be classified by the county as a seven or eleven grade school.

Schools on the accredited (stan-

dardized) Elementary list must wait to some future date to be able to determine how many grades they can teach and retain their accreditation.

Pupils who will complete this year the work of the seventh grade will, under the new plan, enter the 8th grade next year. To make the change in a school without the loss of time, all grades above the fifth will be renumbered by simply raising it one numeral. Then the first five grade will be reorganized into six grades by the use of any method the faculty sees fit to employ, making sure that the least amount of changing and friction is the result.

A survey made by the State Department of Education shows that the schools are increasing in ever

increasing numbers of their own initiative, and that the school officials of the state endorse the 12-year system in an overwhelming majority. Since this type of school is undoubtedly for the best interest of the school children of Texas and that it is impossible to have any semblance of organization with two standards involved, it seems that there is no doubt that the new system is best.

The State Board of Education has officially adopted some books for the new set-up and is thus taking the lead in aiding in the new type of organization. An enormous task is on the teachers and administrators of the state for the next 12 months in order that as little confusion may result in the change as possible.

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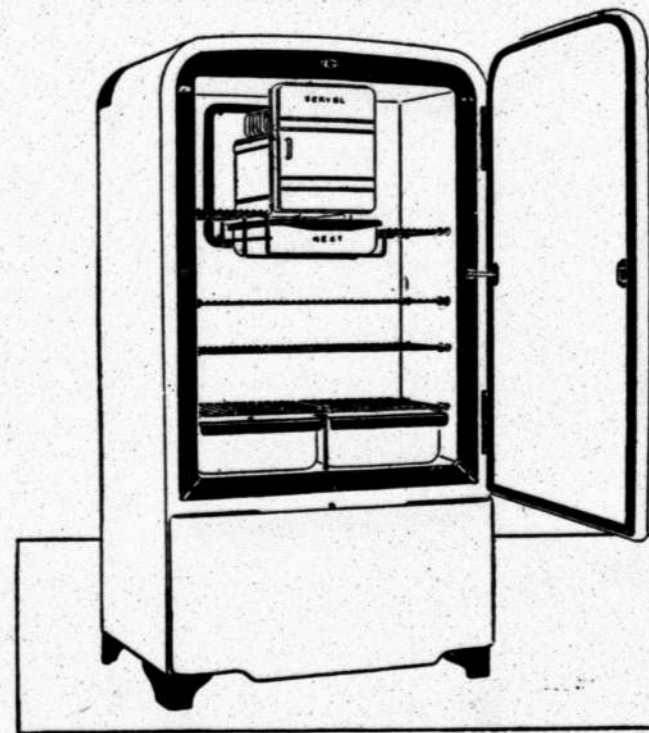

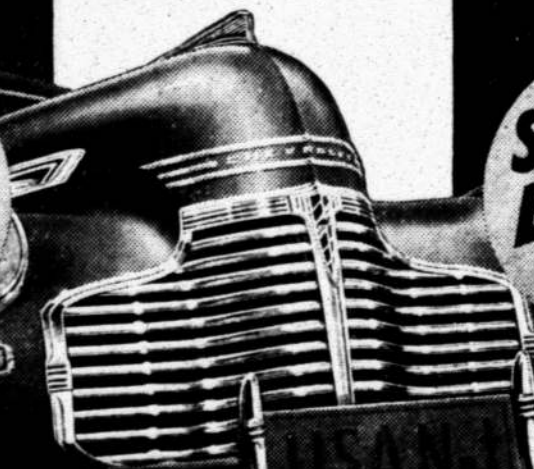

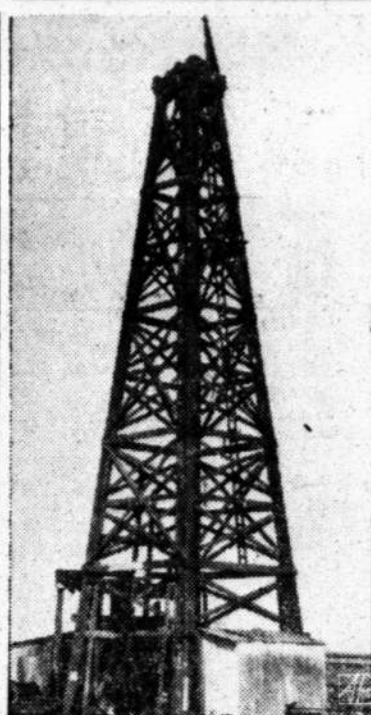

I will try to give it to you in a nutshell. Back in 1850, Uncle Sam needed transportation more than anything else. The wood-eating Iron Horse looked like a pretty good bet. It might even be an improvement on the Pony Express. It not only might be able to get the mail

through as fast—it might be able to carry some freight too.

The men who manipulated the railroad looked around too. They would be willing to stake their all if they just had something big in return. What could Uncle Sam offer? Uncle Sam looked around. Goodness knows, he did have land. West of the Mississippi there was more land than any one ever had dreamed of.

Soon the "biggest real estate deal since the Louisiana Purchase" was in progress. It involved vast land grants on one hand, agreement to complete vast railroad systems on the other. When the history of this era is fully written, it will fill volumes. For 21,500 miles of high iron, the United States gave away 158 million acres of land. That was about the equivalent of all the Atlantic seaboard states from Maine to Florida, inclusive. In addition Uncle Sam had the privilege on all of these lines of shipping freight at half the established rate. Also, all government employees were to travel on half fare.

This, mind you, was on practically all railroads operating west of the Mississippi, exclusive of the Texas mileage. When Texas came into the Union, it retained state domain over all its lands. Outside of Texas, the railroads could have almost anything they asked for — if they completed a line. Seventy-five of them did.

For a long time it was wonderful.

Railroads had gold and silver mines from lands, cattle and sheep acres.

They built towns and cities—and sold lots. It was the era that brought the Harriman and Hill fortunes and a hundred others. It was an age that is all behind us now.

And what has happened since? The railroads ran out of land that was worth one hoot an acre and they were saddled with the agreement to carry government freight and personnel at half price. In came the great western federal power and irrigation projects. Government agents, acting for the engineers and contractors, brought trainloads of cement, machinery, steel, lumber and sand—and all of it went to destination at half price. The railroads went to Washington with tears in their eyes.

Last year Congress passed the transportation act of 1940. It permitted the railroads to turn back to the government all their unpatented or unsold lands and get out from under the strain of carrying federal property and government employees at half price.

Since then, about 30 roads have turned back every acre, except for rights-of-way. It adds up to about 200,000 acres, or one seven-hundredths of the original grants. Most of it is desert, swamp or mountain top and doesn't amount to much. But it is the squaring of accounts — the end of one of the most fantastic eras in American history—when natural resources were so

bountiful that building a mile of track was good for a brace of ranches.

It's all over now. The Illinois Central, the C. & N. W., the Katy, the Rock Island, the C. M. & St. P., the Missouri Pacific, the Frisco, the

Great Northern, the Southern Pacific and many others have settled their accounts—turned in the worth less land—and now can charge Uncle Sam the same freight rates they charge Joe Doakes. It may not save the railroads, but it will help.

Signing Up For Cotton Stamp Is Advised

In the six Farm Sheet and Cotton Stamp Plan meetings held in the county last week, a large number of Farm Plan Sheets were signed by Farm operators, said Vernon Martin, Secretary of the Dawson County A. C. A. Thursday. There were approximately a total of 700 people in attendance at these meetings. There still remains quite a number of farm operators who have not executed and signed their 1941 Farm Plan Sheets, he said. All operators who did not attend one of the meetings and whose farm has not been reconstituted should call at the County A. C. A. Office as soon as possible to sign their Farm Plan Sheets if they have not already done so. Further delay in attending to this matter may be the cause of delay in the applications for parity payments, Martin pointed out.

Between two and three hundred farms are involved in either a split or combinational 1941. This group will not be able to execute a farm plan sheet until final approval of reconstituted allotments by the State A. C. A. Office. This group of farm operators will be officially notified of their revised acreage allotments as soon as final approval is received, after which the farm plan sheets may be signed.

It is urgent that all intention sheets which were mailed to most farmers in the county be filed in the county office as soon as possible. Several hundred of these intention sheets for the cotton stamp plan have already been mailed to Washington. These intention sheets should be filled out and signed regardless of where the operator intends to fully participate in the cotton stamp program or not. Since there is no obligation in signing the intention sheet it is pretty good insurance to have this form on file in case the farm did not measure out the full allotted acres or fail to have full allotted acreage due to some other cause, Martin pointed out.

Contour Furrows Pay On Pasture Lands In Area

Contour furrows on many pastures in Lamesa Camp Area have more than paid for the cost of construction in one year, according to C. W. Firestone, Engineer of the soil conservation service.

The Soil Conservation Service recommends that pasture furrows be constructed at any time when the ground is moist and states that the spring of the year is usually a very good time to plow such furrows.

Now is a good time to construct contour furrows before the spring rush of planting and cultivating begins. Most pasture land of the county has received good rains recently, and the ground is in fine condition for furrowing operations.

The Service recommends a 3-row lister with the center beam removed as being the most satisfactory implement for contour furrowing. When brush and rocks prohibit the use of a lister, a disc plow will prove very satisfactory as it will go over such obstacles without damage to equipment.

Furrows should be spaced according to the slope of the land, but on most pastures of the county the Soil Conservation Service is recommending a spacing of approximately seven feet.

Prize money amounting to \$1,300 has been posted by the Post Stampede, Inc. for Post's first "big time" non-professional rodeo to be held there June 6-7. It was announced Monday by officers of the organization.

Four feature events, calf roping, wild cow milking, saddle bronc riding and steer riding, have been planned, said G. W. Connell, president of the organization.

The rodeo will be staged at the Post High School Athletic field where lights are available for night shows. Seating arrangement, including a permanent grandstand for 2,000 people and portable "bleachers" for 1,600 will be provided for this year's show.

May 1, five weeks preceding the rodeo, was set as date at which time everyone will be asked to donate western regalia to help advertise the big two-day entertainment.

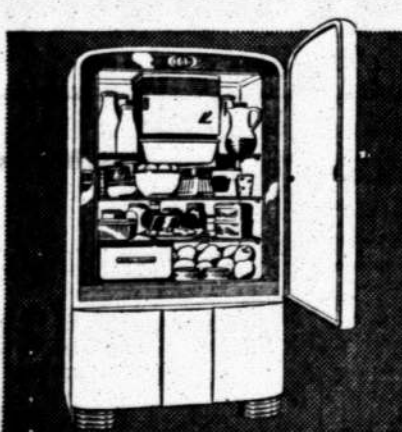

A Ghost Ship, The Normandie

NEW YORK — No visitors are allowed aboard the French liner Normandie, but that doesn't stop ghosts from getting in. And I went aboard, too, via the gangplank.

Since the war began in September, 1939, the Normandies has been docked at Pier 88, Hudson River. The French-speaking maintenance crew of 115 keeps to itself. At night only one or two flickering lights appear on the ship that in the old days was lit up joyfully, like a gas station.

I asked Capt. Alfred Zanger, first officer under Commander Herve le Huide, about the rumors one hears.

Sabotage? Nonsense, said the captain. In the first place, no visitors are allowed except by permission of the French Line. No packages can come aboard until they have been opened and examined. Seamen must show identification cards at the gang-plank, and utmost precautions are taken against fire. The ship's 160,000 horsepower engines are kept in good condition. She could sail tomorrow.

Mutiny? Starvation?

"Well, let's make a tour of the ship," said Captain Zanger. We did, by flashlight.

Ghostly enough, but hardly menacing, is the deserted dining salon with its furnishings and even its light fixtures shrouded in muslin. The odor of moth balls pervades the rooms that once were scented with France's finest perfumes. The long dim corridors leading to other deserted places were chilly, and our footsteps made scarcely a sound on the cheescloth floor coverings.

We passed the swimming pool ("Last summer we filled it with Hudson River water but it was too dirty.") We visited the children's playroom with its motionless merry-go-round.

The huge kitchen where 15 chefs used to prove the excellence of the French cuisine is unused now except for one stove. Here Chef Paul Bordet presided over a savory smelling kettle.

"Tonight's dinner," said Capt. Zanger. "Does that look like star-

vation? Carre de mouton roti—very good!"

"Wine, of course," said the captain.

The store of French wine gave out recently, so Capt. Zanger bought California's product. But before he selected a brand, he let the crew taste various samples of American wines. They voted their favorite unanimously—and it was the most expensive brand to be had.

Apparently the seamen live the life of Riley. But there have been grumblings over low pay (variously reported as from \$5 to \$20 a month). In September of last year it was reported that 90 per cent of the original maintenance crew of 130 had deserted and gone to join Gen. De Gaulle's volunteer forces in Canada. There's another report that crewmen are giving blood donations to the British.

Neither Capt. Zanger nor the French Line would comment on the reports.

Certainly the crew looks well-fed and happy. Their clothing and keep are provided and hospitable Americans send them tickets to the theatre, the movies and the opera.

Some of the men are studying English, but there was not sufficient interest in the subject to conduct regular shipboard classes.

SHANGHAI (AP) — The word "Japan" virtually has disappeared from the Chinese language press in Shanghai.

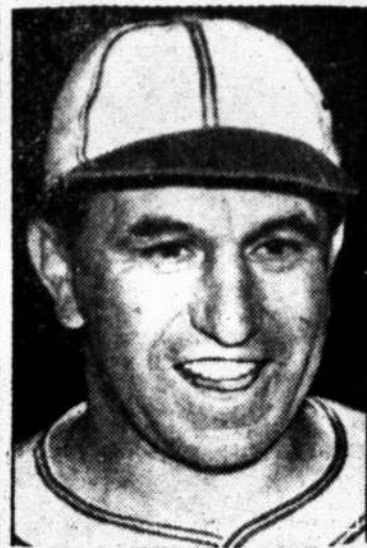
Under Japanese pressure, the municipal council has forbidden Chinese newspapers to make any

Workers Should Have Their Social Security Numbers

In a statement issued today by Robert M. Mayne, manager of the Big Spring Social Security Board field office, it was pointed out that as a result of the nation-wide labor recruiting campaign being carried on by State employment agencies, thousands of men may be called upon to leave their places of residence to take employment in defense plants in various parts of the country. In such cases, Mayne said, these workers should have their social security account numbers in their possession.

"It is also important that when a worker leaves home to take a job in some distant city or town he should leave a copy of his social security account number with his wife or some other member of his family where it may be readily secured in case the worker should lose or mis-place the number he had in his possession. By doing this he may be able to save time by writing or telegraphing back home for his number."

It was explained by Mayne that any field office of the Social Security Board will take a worker's security number.
