"COMMY COUP IN HUNGARY OUTRAGE", Truman

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 5.—(AP)—President Tru-
man today described the Communist coupe in Hungary
as an outrage and said the economic philosophy of Sen-
ator Taft R-Ohio, is the old idea of "boom and bust".

The President told reporters the State Department was
making a complete investigation of what happened in
Hungary.

President Truman read to a news conference, a 1,000-
word statement replying in caustic terms to a recent as-
sessment by Taft that "apparently the President and the ad-
ministration are abandoning talk of keeping prices down
in favor of heavy spending that will keep the mup."

The President reiterated a plea for voluntary price re-
ductions.

WEATHERFORD BANK ROBBER NABBED

FORT WORTH, June 5, (AP) James Clifton Wheeler,
26, conditionally pardoned Texas convict, walked into
the arms of three Fort Worth detectives today, his pock-
ets crammed with \$2,950 taken from the Citizens Nation-
al Bank of Weatherford, officers reported.

Police Chief R. S. Dysart said Wheeler made a full con-
fession to the lone robbery of the bank yesterday.

SENATE SPENDS \$3,305,000 MORE

AUSTIN, June 5. (AP) The Senate's last minute spend-
ing spree today yrammed through to final passage there
and back to the House with amendments, a bill appropri-
ating \$3,305,000 for individual projects scattered thruout
the state. All were passed by voice vote.

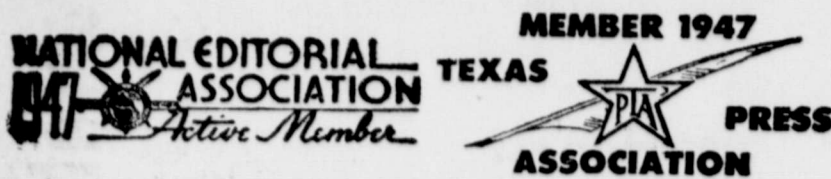

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

No. 4

Proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of two new sections to be known as Sections 17 and 18 providing a special fund for the payment of Confederate pensions and providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other improvements at state institutions of higher learning; providing for a five-cent reduction in the maximum allowable state tax on property; providing for an election and the

issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sections 17 and 18 which shall read as follows:

"SECTION 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven (7c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article 3, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two (2c) Cents on the

One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate hereinabove levied.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Five (5c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings, or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning; and the governing board of each of such institutions of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise not to exceed ten (10) years from the first (1st) day of January of each year in which such funds are allocated or re-allocated to said respective institutions; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to a period of thirty (30) years from the date of the adoption of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five (5c) Cent tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds hereby authorized; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"Funds raised from said Five (5c) Cents tax levy for the ten (10) year period beginning January 1, 1948, are hereby allocated to the following institutions of higher learning, and in the following proportions to wit:

"Not later than June 1st of the beginning year of each succeeding ten (10) year period, the

Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, based on the average long session full-time student enrollment for the preceding five (5) year period of time, shall re-allocate, to the above designated institutions of higher learning then in existence, all fund to be derived from said Five (5c) Cent ad valorem tax for said ten (10) year period; and all such designated institutions of higher learning which participate in the allocation or re-allocation receive any other state funds for the acquiring or construction of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Five (5c) Cents ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in of such funds shall not thereafter an amount sufficient to replace the loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of other state funds. This amendment shall be self-enacting. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose."

"SECTION 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars, and the Board of Regents of the University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Ten Million (\$10,000,000.00) Dollars. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than twenty (20) years from their respective dates, and in no event later than twenty-five (25) years after the date of the adoption of this amendment. This amendment shall be self-enacting..

"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at a special election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1947, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning, in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively;

Dear Friends:

Just now (Friday, May 30) I am so incensed at the action of the Republicans in repudiating the solemn promise of the Government to our farmers that I can hardly resist the temptation to devote this column to a strictly partisan discussion. I realize, however, that by the time you read this, the Congress will have probably acted on at least two other matters of vital importance—the Tax Bill and the Labor Bill.

As an illustration of the high-handed manner in which the Republicans handled the Agricultural Appropriations, I want to point out that after cutting \$25,000,000

off the Budget estimate for REA (which was already at least \$100,000,000 below the needs for the coming year), they limited the time for discussion to fifteen minutes. This allowed ten of us who wanted to discuss this just a minute and a half each. I submit that any political party that considers that rural electrification is only worthy of fifteen minutes discussion is hardly worthy of the support of rural people.

When it came to the payment for soil conservation practices what we commonly call AAA payments the Republicans added injury to insult and coldly repudiated the obligation of our Govern-

ment as plainly expressed in the law to pay for these practices during the crop year of 1947. At last year Congress passed an amendment to the appropriations bill specifically authorizing and requiring the Department of Agriculture to formulate and administer a 1947 program "amounting to \$300,000,000." The amount was definitely fixed and I had personally seen to it that the record was clear and that it was the intent of Congress to put a floor under the amount the farmer could count on. If anyone of you care to read the Record, it is printed on page 6142 of the Congressional Record of May 28, 1947. In spite of previous promises, the Republican Majority voted to cut these funds practically in half.

They also voted to reduce the funds for school lunches from 75 to 45 million dollars and then took away most of the so-called "Section 32" funds which have come from tariff collections and have been used to assist in the disposal of agricultural surpluses. It has been these funds that have been used to purchase surplus foods for school lunches.

They also cut the funds for agricultural research; the funds for REA loans (although we did get more here than it had at one time appeared likely); they wiped out the funds for the Soil Conservation Service and for a whole list of other services helpful to farmers. I was proud of the fact that time and again we got every Democratic vote in the House for amendments to restore various cuts, and at the end we only lacked six votes of being able to re-commit the bill. We still hope for better treatment in the Senate.

Over night the Conferees between the House and Senate have agreed on both the tax bill and the labor bill. Doubtless both reports will be before us next week. As this is a Holiday (for most people) in Washington, I have not seen the actual agreements on either bill, but from the newspaper reports, it seems pretty clear that the labor bill is going to be a real effort to protect the public and to place the labor unions on the same basis of responsibility for their acts as corporations.

I have heretofore pointed out that in my opinion we would do better to apply any surplus we have to paying our national debt than to reducing taxes. If there were to be any tax cut at all, I think it should be in the form of larger exemptions to small tax payers. The Republican tax bill is primarily intended to assist big business which has already received substantial relief by the removal of the excess profits taxes.

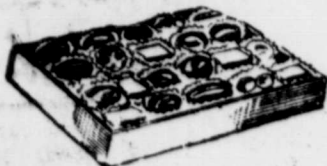

providing for a Five Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

"Against the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five (5c) Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

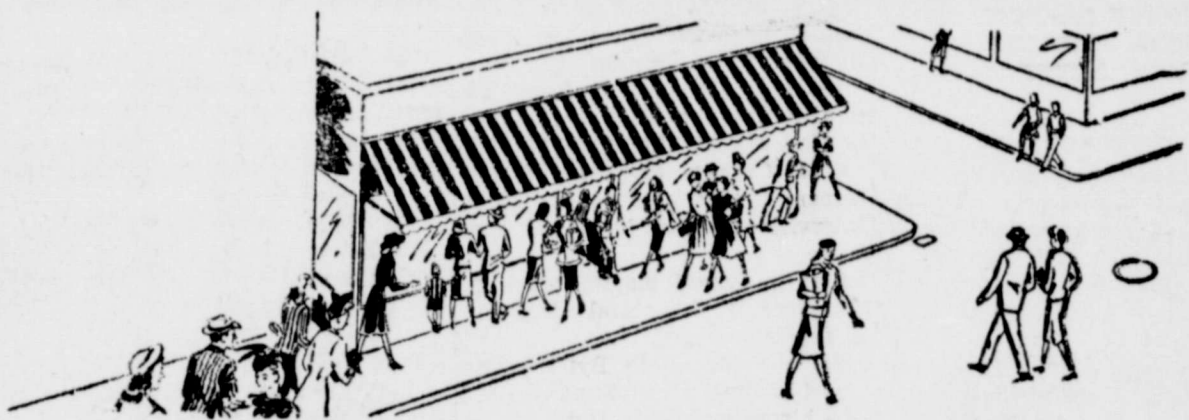

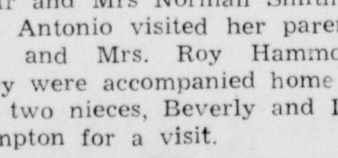
