Irrigation School By Bob Thurmond January 26th

An irrigation school will be held for all farmers in Briscoe County in the County Courtroom Tuesday January 26th at 1:30 p. m. Irrigation being relatively new in Briscoe County, plus the fact that farmers are faced with producing more on less land as the advent of acreage allotments, it is felt that such a school will be very beneficial.

R. V. "Bob" Thurmond, Associate County Agent for Irrigation, will conduct the school. Mr. Thurmond is one of the outstanding irrigation men in the nation. He has been prominent in irrigation meetings and conferences all over the Country. He started out as an assistant County Agent in Lamb County when Lem Weaver was County Agent there, and has continued with the A. and M. College Extension Service.

The proposed topics are to include:
1. Ground water on the high Plains;
2. Drilling and Constructing Water Wells;
3. Irrigation and Power Units;
4. Methods of irrigation;
5. Land Preparation for Irrigation;
6. Irrigation Equipment and Pipeline and time for Irrigating Crops. These sessions will last until 4:00.

If this meeting is successful and is received favorably Mr. Thurmond will return in the spring and put on a field Demonstration.

Pre planting irrigation is one of the best practices that an irrigation farmer can use on cotton and grain sorghum. There are many advantages to this type work and will be discussed at length during the meeting.

Income Tax Reports:

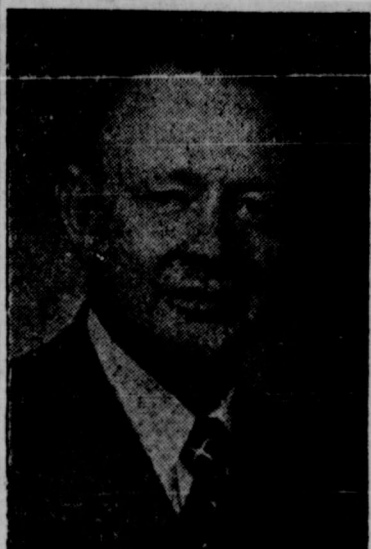
Many of the farmers have been of the opinion that if they did not show a profit in 1953, that it was not necessary for them to file an Income Tax Return.

John Stapleton To Make Race For District Attorney

District Attorney John Stapleton Tuesday announced his candidacy for re-election. The district he serves is the 110th, and it is composed of Floyd, Briscoe, Motley and Dickens Counties.

Stapleton was elected district attorney in 1946, just after returning from the service, and he has been serving in the office since January, 1947.

In making his statement, Stapleton said, "I am grateful to the people of the district for all they have done for me, and for the cooperation I have had in the office. I feel the experience I have had qualifies me for the office, and I shall make the race upon the record of my service. The district attorney's office is the most important prosecuting office within the gift of the people. It handles all of the serious crimes of felony grade. I have given the office my best."

"I am happy to report to the people that in the four counties of the district, we have had a gradual decrease in felony crimes every year since 1946, whether any credit is due me for the record or not. This has not been the experience of the rest of the country which has had an increase in crime during these same years. I feel that we have made this good record in our district because of the cooperation of all of the people."

Stapleton also said, "I like to point to the success we have had in saving many young men from the penitentiary through use of the suspended and probated sentences laws. The court and officers of our district have tried to apply these laws wisely to make good citizens rather than criminals, and we feel that we have succeeded. Some have failed, of course, but by far the vast majority of the boys and young men given the benefit of these laws have made good. Lives have been saved, and thousands upon thousands of dollars have been saved for the tax payers."

Stapleton stated that he would wage an active campaign and asked the support of all. "I shall deeply appreciate the help of everyone," he concluded.

A veteran of World War II, Stapleton entered the army as a private, and was discharged four years later as a captain. He served two and a half years in the Southwest Pacific with artillery units. Stapleton has lived in Floyd County almost all of his life. He was raised in Lockney, and he has lived in Floydada, except for the time spent in service, since his marriage in 1941. He is a graduate of the South Texas School of Law. Before entering the army, he served one term and part of another as county attorney of Floyd County.

The Stapletons have two children, Johnny, age 7, and Sandra Jean, age 6 both of whom are in school. Stapleton has been active in civic affairs. He served at one time as president of the Floydada Lions Club and later as president of the Rotary Club. He is a member of both the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The Stapletons are members of the First Baptist Church of Floydada where he is serving his third year as president of the Brotherhood, and is the teacher of a men's Sunday School class.

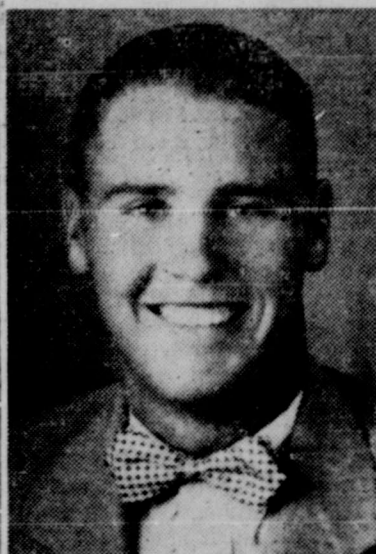

AUTOMOBILE INSURANCE PREMIUMS MAY BE CONTROLLED

Enlightened public opinion can prevent further increases in the price of automobile and other liability insurance. This opinion was expressed today in Dallas by T. R. Mansfield, President of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service, Inc.

The insurance leader said current costs of insurance would be reduced if each individual motorist could be persuaded to act in the public's best interests, which co-incides with his own best interests. He further stated that people are prone to forget that funds held by insurance companies are actually monies contributed by buyers of insurance, or as the Supreme Court of Texas states in effect "the insurance business is impressed with public interest." "Unless the insurance industry conscientiously guards these funds against fraudulent claims and excessive or unfair settlements and awards," said Mr. Mansfield, "the industry can pay just claims only by going to the public to get more money—that is, larger premiums."

He pointed out that insurance companies feel a responsibility to tell the public the factors that influence the price of insurance and it would then be up to the public to decide at what level they wish to pay. The public can help by safe, courteous driving; support of stricter traffic law enforcement; support of behind-the-wheel training of youths; careful and thorough inspection of vehicles and support of driver licensing laws.

"Accident claims in liability cases must be paid on a fair and just basis," Mansfield said, and added, "too often jurors fail to realize that the source of money for personal injury cases is actually the public's pocketbook and not some mythical source of unlimited wealth."

Farm Youths Talk Safety



What would you do if you had only one day to make your farm safer? That's what newsmen asked a group of young safety experts at the recent National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. They were winners of awards presented by General Motors in the National 4-H Farm and Home Safety Program.

"I'd declare a 'safety day' and turn out the whole family to locate and mark all hazards on the farm," was the answer of Margie Sellers, 17, Whitesboro, Texas. Margie was one of eight national winners awarded \$300 college scholarships by GM, which also presented expense-paid trips to the 4-H Congress to both national and state winners among the 425,000 4-H youths who took part in the safety program.

All the youngsters agreed that although safety demands continuing, day-by-day attention, it might be good to set aside one day for eliminating hazards—and then go at the job as though there would be no more time for it.

"It would make you decide what safety improvements were most important, and then concentrate on them," said George N. Fleming, 18, Simms, Montana. "I would check the things that get most use, such as farm machinery and home appliances, and make sure that they were in safe operating condition."

Gayle Givens, 17, Frederick, Oklahoma, observed that a "safety day" would be a hard blow against one of safety's most dangerous enemies—procrastination. She and Erich Willen, 17, Westminster, Maryland, both national winners—said that if they had only one day for safety they would concentrate on the home.

"That's where most accidents happen," Erich explained. "I would check things like stairs, rugs, and medicines."

Hope E. Caswell, 17, Canton, New York, said she would concentrate on eliminating fire hazards.

"They are often the least obvious," she said. "And a bad fire is just about the most serious disaster that can hit a farm."

Other suggestions included proper storage of tools; building sturdy pens for livestock, and checking electrical equipment.

Telephone!

We would like to extend our thanks and appreciation to our subscribers in the Bean (South Silverton) Exchange for their patience in waiting for telephone service.

The lines and switchboards are complete except for sections involving joint use of lines with the General Telephone Company and in installing the telephone sets. Also, the General Telephone Company will have to install the necessary switches in Silverton, and build circuits south on their tall line to meet those of the Cooperative's coming north. Requirements for these facilities were given the General Company slightly over three years ago, but the switches and equipment for their part have not yet been installed. Of course, it will be impossible for the two exchanges to be connected until this equipment is ready.

The Cooperative has been informed by the General Company that the facilities for toll service (long distance) will be made available first. It would then be possible to connect to the outside world and into Silverton by use of toll lines. The Extended Area Service trunks or "free service lines" would be made available as soon as equipment and contractual arrangements could be made. No definite time for these services has been given by the General Telephone Company.

There will be a definite charge to the Cooperative for the "free service trunks". This charge is to be based upon reciprocal costs of lines and switches necessary to give this service between the Cooperative and the General Company.

The Cooperative is doing everything possible to speed completion of the bottlenecks involved. In the near future, installation crews will complete exchanges for which connecting facilities have been made available. The telephones will then be installed and local service will be given to those people who are on lines that are or can be completed.

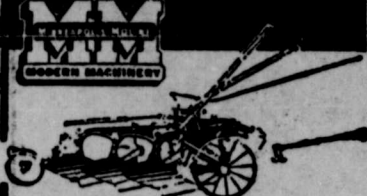

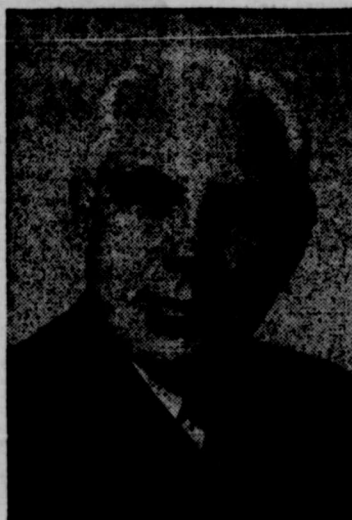

SAVINGS BONDS CHIEF SEES RECORD IN '54



Washington, D. C., January 1—Earl O. Shreve, National Director of the U. S. Savings Bonds Division, Treasury Department, has expressed his appreciation to the American people for their record support of the Savings Bonds program in 1953. In a year-end statement, Mr. Shreve forecast that more series E and H Savings Bonds would be sold in 1954 than in the past record postwar year. He said further that all indications pointed to a record sale of savings bonds to people who planned to buy their individual 1954 annual maximum of \$20,000 E Bonds or H Bonds during January and February. He added that his confidence in 1954 Savings Bonds sales reaching new highs was based on the popularity of the Payroll Savings Plan with many millions of employees across the country, and the enthusiastic support given to the Bond-A-Month Plan by banks. Mr. Shreve, formerly president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, and sales vice-president of the General Electric Company, also reported that owners of 75 per cent of about \$10 billion in E Bonds that have so far matured are retaining these bonds to take advantage of the automatic ten-year extension privilege.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q—I'm planning to take a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill. How much will my GI training allowance be?

A—Your training allowance will be computed on the basis of the established charge which the school requires non-veterans to pay for the same course.

Q—As a member of the organized reserves, may I count time spent on training duty—as opposed to regular active duty—in figuring how much entitlement I'll have for Korean GI Bill training?

A—No. Time spent on training duty does not count in determining entitlement under the Korean GI Bill. However, if you were recalled for regular active duty—and not training duty—that time would count.

Q—I understand that if a Korean GI trainee's entitlement runs out past the mid-point of a school term or semester; he'll be allowed to finish that term or semester under the Korean GI Bill. Will entitlement expire before he finishes his training?

A—No. Entitlement may not be extended under any circumstances for veterans taking on the job or institutional on farm training under the Korean GI Bill. The law permits such extensions only for veterans in school.

Q—Is it possible for two veterans, who own a farm in partnership, to take institutional on farm training on the same farm?

A—Yes, it is possible, provided that conditions are favorable enough to assure the success of both veterans, and provided that both training programs meet all the qualifications of the law.

State Selective Service Announces Changes

AUSTIN, Texas.—State Selective Service headquarters announced today that Texas draft boards have been called upon to take action which will result in the reinduction of some men who already have performed service under the draft law.

Authority for the action is based on a change in Selective Service regulations, following an executive order of President Eisenhower, which was put into effect in December.

As a result of the change in regulations, 137 state draft boards will review more than 60,000 files of men who already have spent some time in uniform, Brigadier General Paul Wakefield, the state draft director, said.

"The new regulations will remove possibility of evasion of minimum equitable service by a small number of persons who, under the former regulations, were required to be classified as having satisfied requirements if they had served on active duty

for one day or more," General Wakefield said.

As revised, the regulations will require a minimum of six months or more of honorable service. The state draft director pointed out that men who do not satisfy this minimum may be otherwise deferrable, but their cause must be reopened.

This change will mean, General Wakefield said, that an estimated 2,000 to 3,000 persons in the nation and an estimated 100 to 150 in Texas now classified as I-C (discharged or reserve) will be subject to possible reinduction.
