# Wolves Win 8-7 Victory

Corky McAdams slapped a hard drive to centerfield to score Larry Currie and vault the Colorado High Wolves to a narrow 8-7 victory over the Howard County Junior College Jayhawks.

Tight clutch pitching by Wolf hurler Skipper Warren throttled the Hawks in the last three innings after they had knotted the score at 7-7 in the top of the sixth.

Howard County jumped off to a short lived 2-0 lead with a pair of runs in the second following a scoreless first inning. The Wolves bounded back in their half of the inning as Corky McAdams slugged a home run with one aboard to tie the score at 2-2.

Larry Currie was the Wolf starter, but was replaced by Warren in the third.

Hawks threatened in the third when Glaspy reached second after escaping a rundown when he was caught off first base on an alert pickoff attempt by Warren. The Wolf hurler bore down to strike out the side, however, and left Glaspy stranded on second.

Wolves pushed across three runs in their half of the action-filled third.

Ronald Hillhouse was issued a base on balls to start the inning. Perry Millsap sacrificed Hillhouse to second. David McKay was hit by the Hawk pitcher.

Currie came to the plate and received a free trip to first on four straight pitches. McAdams received the third walk of the frame on a full count pitch and forced in Hillhouse.

Howard County sent a new hurrier to the hill to face Wayne Snowden who promptly greeted him with a blazing single to right center scoring McKay and Currie.

Reggie Noble popped to short and Mike Mundy flew out to center to end the inning with the Wolves on the big end of a 5-2 bulge. Jayhawks rallied for four tallies in the fourth to go ahead for the second time by a 6-5 margin.

T. Emerson led off for the Hawks with a single and scor-

ed when Kelly put down a perfect ball.

Next batter sent a roller to third. Kelly attempted to score from third, but Noble threw catcher Millsap a perfect pop and the leaping Hawk was out at home.

A hard single to left put another jayhawk on base and set the stage for a two-base blow by ex-wolf Mike Hart, now paying for the Hawks.

One scored on Hart's double and two more came across on a mult by the Wolf second baseman.

In the fourth Ronald Hillhouse drew his third base on balls of the contest and Millsap reached first on an infield single.

McKay drew a walk to load the bases. Currie came to the plate and was also passed forcing Hillhouse in from third to tie the score again.

McAdams came to bat next. He worked the Hawk hurler to a 3-0 count. On the fourth pitch, which the umpire called a strike, McAdams misunderstood the call and trotted to See Victory Page 8.

## New First Grade Orientation Set

All children and parents of those eligible to attend the first grade in Colorado City next fall are asked to attend a pre-enrollment and orientation program at the Primary School on Tuesday from 9:30-11 a.m.

Parents are asked to bring birth certificates for their children to show that the prospective students will be six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1965. If birth certificates are presented during the orientation hour, the enrollment process will be greatly aided according to Brooks Teague, principal of Primary School.

Supt. of Schools Frank W. Wilson urged parents to accompany their children if at

all possible. Children throughout the Colorado Independent School District including the Wallace School area are expected to be in attendance for the meeting.

In addition to birth certificates, the children should bring proof of their vaccination for smallpox.

Mrs. Mike Hammans, school system nurse, will be on hand for the orientation.

During the program informal speeches will be made by Dr. W. S. Rhode and Dr. H. Jene Steakley.

Letters have been sent to the parents of all boys and girls known to be eligible for school in the fall.

Parents and children are asked to help by informing those not receiving letters of the orientation meeting.

That puts the project just 25 books short of the required 500. The books of stamps are part on an appreciation tour to be arranged for Miss Gladys Miller, high school teacher who recently signed a contract for her thirteenth year in the Colorado High School English department.

Miss Miller plans to visit Europe and to rout the Holy Land. Sponsors of the drive for stamps are Ex-Students Association of Colorado High School and the Philathea Sunday School Class, First Methodist Church.

Sunday May 30 has been set for an afternoon reception honoring Miss Miller with a "Bon Voyage" party in Fellowship Hall, First Methodist Church with Philathea Class members as hostesses.

## Drive Started In Opposition

Concern has been created in Mitchell County and other cotton-producing sections of the area over a proposed modification in the cotton skip-row program.

The proposed change, which would take effect for the 1966 harvesting season, would have a definite hard-hitting effect on dryland farmers in the county and particularly those with a small amount of acreage.

In addition the bank letter urged all those concerned with the agriculture industry to write their congressmen and senators.

Mahon Protests  
Congressman George Mahon, representing the 19th District, has issued a strong protest to the USDA in regard to the proposed change.

Mahon has also requested a public hearing on the matter to afford cotton growers a chance to appear and protest the proposed action.

In addition Mahon said he would join the growers in appearing before the House Committee on Agriculture.

Letter Issued  
In one release the Congressman speaking in regard to the proposed change said, "Some estimate that as a result of skip-row we are producing one third more cotton than we otherwise would produce. I pointed out to officials that if they are correct in assuming that skip-row is responsible for producing one third more cotton than we otherwise would, then to eliminate skip row would certainly represent a disasterous blow to cotton farmers, especially dry land cotton farmers."

Further Comment  
Mahon went on to say that the new regulation, if accepted, would be a disasterous blow and would result in eliminating many growers.


