STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT PUTS MAN IN LAMESA TO ORGANIZE CAMPAIGN; NAME COMMITTEES

A county Health Campaign fostered by the State Department and with expenses to be paid by the Federal government without involving the county money whatsoever, is being conducted for an eight month term in Dawson County. Myrtle Sexteroniu will manage the campaign. Dr. D. C. Peterson, a member of the State Department of Health and Miss Myrtle Sexton, representative of the district, are in town this week supervising the work. Dr. A. M. Gosch also of the State Department of Health and Miss Olga Buseh state health nurse are to stay in this district for a term of eight months with Lamesa headquarters for Martin, Borden and Lynn counties. This is to be a request campaign and request campaign and requests from an individual concerning any sanitation will be given attention by these officers.

This campaign will be conducted with the executive board as the governing body. A general assisting governing body. A general chairman of the town and county is appointed with assistant chairman who have charge of the different activities of the organization. The purpose of this health campaign is to check contagious disease existing in the county and to promote a general sanitary condition of the county.

A meeting was held Tuesday afternoon in the District Court room for the purpose of organizing the campaign. Mrs. Victor Crowley was elected County Health Chairman of the county. During this meeting was elected to this office with Mayor J. R. Lowrie as assistant. Chairmen of the various committees elected were as follows:

Secretary and treasurer, Mrs. E. T. Bailey; Publicity Director, W. A. Wilson; Chairman of Rural Sanitation of Schools, W. T. Webb; Chairman of the Women's Organization, Mrs. J. L. Morris; Chairman of the Medical Advisory

This will be the fourth annual drive conducted in this city. These campaigns have been found to greatly increase the civic beauty of Lamesa and each year plans are made for a more complete clean-up.

Launching out with the slogan "Cleaner, prettier and more sanitary city" Lamesa is thus doing her part in the health campaign also being conducted at the same time. Mayor J. R. Lowrie, as chairman of the Civic Department of the Chamber of Commerce is head of the drive, backed by the Chamber of Commerce and all other organizations of the city.

All-American Band Dream of Conductor

B. A. Rolfe Hopes to Organize Such A Unit

New York City.—To organize and lead an all-American concert orchestra, with native personnel and characteristic instruments, interpreting American music as it should be interpreted, is the paramount ambition of B. A. Rolfe, famous conductor.

"Because of the great variety of types of music in this country, I believe that the fulfillment of my dream might produce an entirely new orchestral set-up," Mr. Rolfe declares.

"New instruments would undoubtedly be brought in, such, for instance, as the banjo, which has done so much for the American dance orchestra, and which is America's only instrument contribution. It is the great, great-grandchild of a musical contraption called the 'z'im z'im' brought

from Africa with some of the first slaves landed in Boston.

"All members of my dream orchestra would have to be born here and if possible I would draw them from all sections—New England, the Middle West, the South and the West—so that each might contribute that distinctive something for which his environment has prepared him.

"It is impossible for any one who has not spent his life amid the tempo and rhythm of America to interpret the music which, while it is flavored melodically with the music of other nations, is entirely American as to rhythm and time.

"Take, for instance, a characteristic bit from a characteristic popular hit, 'Little Spanish Dancer.' While there is something of languorous, lovely Spain in this, it is also distinctively and clearly American in feeling and expression."

FLY CATECHISM

Or What Everybody Should Know About Flies

BY TEXAS STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

Question. Is the house fly known by any other name?

Answer. Yes. It is sometimes called the typhoid fly, because it has been found to spread so much typhoid fever.

Q. Is the fly the only means of carrying typhoid fever?

A. No. This disease is also carried by water, milk, and other foods, if the germs get into them.

Q. Does the typhoid fly spread other diseases?

A. Yes. It helps to spread cholera infantum, dysentery, tuberculosis and many other diseases.

Q. Do many flies live over the winter?

A. No. Only a few survive the winter months.

Q. What do flies do in the spring?

A. They begin feeding actively and soon commence laying eggs. For this purpose they go out to the outbuildings, and seek preferably horse manure; if they cannot find this, they may lay eggs in the wet, rotting animal or vegetable matter. They find this matter by smell, even though we may not notice any odor.

Q. How many eggs does a fly lay?

A. About 120 to 150 at a laying, and a fly may live to lay six times.

Q. How long does a fly live.

A. From two to three months in the summer; they may live longer in the winter.

Q. What are the stages in the life of a fly.

A. The stages in the life of a fly are: (a) Egg—eight to ten hours in the hot weather. (b) Maggot—six to eight days of active feeding upon filth and rapid growth. (c) Pupa—a resting stage

of two or three days in which the maggot becomes covered with a hard case and completes the great change from worm-like maggot to a winged insect. It then comes out a full grown fly.

"Little flies" do not grow into big flies. The little flies we see sometimes are a different kind from the typhoid fly.

Q. How old is a fly before it begins to lay eggs?

A. After coming out as a fly, it feeds, and flies about two weeks before it matures its first batch of eggs. This is very important, because if every fly gets caught during this two weeks, no eggs will be laid, and the pest will disappear.

Q. Does every neighborhood raise its own flies?

A. Yes. The number of flies found in each neighborhood is an excellent index to the sanitary conditions of that neighborhood.

Q. How much and how often do flies eat?

A. It is not unusual for a fly to swallow half its own weight in one meal, and it is almost continuously feeding if food is abundant.

Q. How does a fly eat solid food?

A. The house fly or typhoid fly has no teeth but is provided with a sucking tube or proboscis with which it laps up liquid. The fly which bites the stable fly, and these have sharp, piercing proboscises, with which they suck the blood of animals. In eating solid food, like candy or cake, the house fly first puts out a drop of saliva and then sucks back and forth with the proboscis until the dry substances is dissolved and then it laps it up. Nice things to eat after, are they not?

Q. How do flies carry diseases?

A. They feed upon filth containing disease germs, and carry the germs on their feet and proboscis to our food. The germs may pass through the body of a fly unharmed, and may distribute in the fly specks.

Q. Where do disease germs come from?

A. From the bodies of sick people.

Q. Then flies should not be allowed in the sick room?

A. No, and all discharges from the sick person should be placed where flies cannot get to them.

Q. Can a fly carry many disease germs?

A. Yes. Over 600,000 germs have been found on a single fly.

Q. Do flies always carry diseases when they light upon our food?

A. Not always, but they are always disgusting because they carry filth to our food. They are dangerous to health only when they have access to disease germs.

Q. Can a family escape the

Q. Do flies carry sickness and death to many people in Texas?

A. Yes, there were a considerable number of cases of typhoid fever in Texas in 1928. The total number case numbered 461. Germs carried of deaths reported from this disease by flies are sometimes responsible for deaths from enteritis or "summer complaint," and have "summer complaint," and a great many other unnecessary deaths. Flies are now known to be the most deadly enemy of man. They kill more people every year than are killed by lightning, murder, snakes, wild animals, fires and floods combined.

Q. Have flies always been such an enemy to mankind?

A. They have always carried diseases, even in the Bible times. Their power to do harm has increased with the increasing of people.

Q. But people have lived in spite of flies?

A. Yes, but a great many have died. More than 7,500 Texas babies under five years of age every year. Many of these deaths are due to flies carrying germs to the babies' food.

Q. Why not apply disinfectants to manure piles and other fly-breeding materials?

A. Thus far disinfectants have been found to be very effective. Furthermore, they are very expensive and difficult to apply. Removing the manure is many times cheaper. Trying to disinfect filth and leave it around is like sprinkling on perfume, when you need a bath.

Q. How is it possible to have more protection against flies than we already have?

A. In five ways: (a) By screening every door and window in the house. (b) By killing all the flies that have been hiding in the buildings through the winter, as fast as they come out. (c) By cleaning up the manure and filth in which flies may breed. (d) By keeping traps set in covers of garbage cans and on the porches where the flies are thickest, to catch them before they enter our homes. (e) By placing saucers of fly poison around the barns or stables, or where there are many flies. The best and cheapest fly poison is made by adding two tablespoons of formalin to a mixture of half-pint of milk and half pint of water. Drop pieces of bread in the saucer for landing places for the flies. Flies will not drink this poison if they can find any other liquid to drink.

Q. If we did not clean up all the manure and filth from the neighborhood would flies swarm in from other parts?

A. A fly seldom travels over five hundred yards from its breeding place.

Q. Has anyone ever succeeded in keeping his house free from flies without using screens?

A. Yes. A number of people have used the above method indicated and have done away with screens. But be sure you have no flies before discarding the screens.

Q. Will any Texas city ever be free from flies?

A. Yes. Just as soon as everyone does his part in his own home and yard, you will have a city of flyless stores, markets, and homes. (Teachers are requested to drill their pupils in this catechism and to inaugurate fly-eliminating campaigns in the homes of their pupils.)

- d. Assist registrar in securing 100 percent vital statistical reports (Births and Deaths.)
4. Duties of school health chairman.

- a. Invite parents to be present at physical inspection of pupils.
- b. Assist with clerical work at inspection.
- c. Promote better nutrition and better oral hygiene among pupils beginning in primary grades.
- d. Assist in furnishing health material to teachers.
- e. Promote hot school lunches, safe water, safe milk in schools and sanitary conditions in homes.
- f. Arrange for regular monthly weighing of pupils and having weights put on monthly report cards.
- g. Assist in the promotion of vaccination against small pox, inoculation against typhoid fever, and inoculation with toxoid for the prevention of diphtheria.

Duties of Health Club Chairman.

- a. Adult Health Clubs. When the women in any community of the district desire a Health Club, the Chairman should after talking the matter over with the nurse, help to organize the women into a group and designate a place and time of meeting. She should keep informed of number of clubs carried on in the district, number enrolled and number completing the course. These and other reports should be given to the general committee at the regular meetings. Secure necessary demonstration material.
6. Duties of Sanitation Chairman.
- a. Promote and arrange for Clean-up campaign.
- b. Conduct sanitary toilet campaigns beginning in schools and churches.
- c. Conduct campaigns for safe water and milk supplies in schools and homes.
- d. Promote testing of cows, every 12 months for tuberculosis.

General Instructions

The Chairmen should report at each monthly meeting about health activities in their districts and also bring suggestions for discussion whereby the health program might be improved upon. The community chairmen should make requests at the monthly meeting for classes, demonstrations, etc., for the nurse and sanitarian services as desired in their communities.

Community Chairman to Be Appointed

The greater part of this health program is to be carried on in the county with a community chairman and the sub committees sponsoring the movement in their communities. These community chairman will be members of the executive committee. Sub committee men will also be appointed. The duties of the community chairman and the sub committees will be as follows:

1. Chairman organize, sub-committees, assist each member, of committee. Furnish detailed list of the following:
 1. Number of churches in district.
 2. Number of schools in district.
 3. Number of doctors in district.
 4. Number of midwives in district.
 5. Number of families living in district.
 - a. white
 - b. mexican
 - c. negro
- Study of prevailing causes, of death.
 1. Maternal deaths occurring during child birth. Medical care.
 2. Infant mortality. Cause of death and age.
 3. Free school mortality. Cause of death and age.
- Prevalence of communicable diseases in district. (1 year) Small Pox, Typhoid, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Measles, Scarlet Fever.
2. Duties of prenatal chairman. Secure name and addresses if possible, of all expectant mothers in district and send to health nurse. This will enable the nurse to make home visits with these people and to furnish them with literature pertaining to prenatal
