STATE SOLONS WILL SPEAK IN CITY TUESDAY

DEMOCRATS SEEK TALK BY ROBINSON; GOP WANTS BORAH

The Lubbock County political pot is boiling with unaccustomed vigor, additional kindling being piled today on the simmering fire of politics.

Local party leaders declare that interest in the national election this year is at the highest pitch in the history of the county.

With definite organizations functioning in the camps of the "regular democrats," the Hoover democrats and the republicans, speakers are being drafted from all parts of the nation in an effort to win the county over for the respective candidates in the presidential election November 6.

The South Plains Democratic club is centering an active campaign to carry this section for Governor Alfred E. Smith, while the "bolters" under the banner of "Hoover Democrats" are combining with the local republicans in an effort to sweep Herbert Hoover to victory in the general election.

A party from Cleveland on a visit to the Texas Tech College here consisting of State Senator J. T. Wadsworth, and Representative H. L. Kenyon, Ellen B. Moore, and John Moore, state legislator from Galveston, are scheduled to speak at 8 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

These speakers will be asked by the local democratic organization to stage a speaking program to the public at the courthouse at 8 o'clock tomorrow night.

Another democratic speaking will be held next Monday night at a location to be decided later. Congressman Guion Williams, of Decatur, and Sam Rayburn, of Bonham, are expected to speak.

Smith was wanted in connection with the New Orleans robbery also. Louise Magnus said she was with him at Oklahoma City.

She was held in connection with the Travis county jail last night under orders of Ranger Captain Frank Hames, Sheriff Horace Burleson said. State Senator-Elect John Hornsby finally was granted permission to see her at an attorney's office after he had remained Sheriff.

TECH CAMPUS BUSY AS TERM GETS STARTED

FRESHMAN ENROLLMENT VIRTUALLY ENDED; PROGRAM GIVEN

With freshman registration virtually completed by noon today, indications that the enrollment for the fourth long session of Texas Tech would surpass that of any previous year increased considerably.

Although no official figures were given out by college authorities this afternoon, it was indicated that the initial registration, yesterday and this morning had reached a total that exceeded expectations.

Registration of a part of the upper classes will begin this afternoon when the remaining freshmen will also matriculate. Upper classmen registration will begin in earnest tomorrow and classes will start Thursday morning.

Report from the registrar's office that more than 900 entrance credits of new students had been received served as a further proof of a large attendance this year.

With the campus already bustling in activity, much excitement is promised the remainder of the week. The first convocation will be held in the gymnasium at 10 o'clock Thursday morning with President Paul W. Horn, Attorney General Claude Pollard, and Mrs. Helen B. Moore, state legislator from Galveston, scheduled to make talks.

Alton Pollard, who attended the Tech opening last year, will deliver the principal address.

Open house will be held by the churches of the city for the entertainment of the students Friday night.

Tech's first football game will be Saturday when the Mustangs meet Schreiner on the home field. President and Mrs. Horn will be at home to the students Saturday night in the formal reception.

Prep rallies will be held Thursday and Friday nights.

County Has Record Highway Mileage

Lubbock has more highway outlets and the county has more miles of state highways than any county in the Panhandle. South Plains area district highway officials declared here today.

There are seven highways leading out of the city, including the highway from here to Levelland that has been designated as a state road, as soon as certain requirements are met.

The original requirements of a 100-foot right of way has been changed to 50 feet by the state highway department, since the first work done on the road was on the basis of an 80-foot right of way.

Anxiety Felt For Two Missionaries

CANTON, China, Sept. 25 (AP)—Ongoing anxiety was felt here today for the safety of Dr. and Mrs. J. R. Bailey, American missionaries. They were traveling in Kwangsi province from Wuchow to Kweilin and were in a region where an English missionary, Miss Tobin, was kidnapped by bandits Thursday. Dr. and Mrs. Bailey were missionaries of the Southern Baptist Convention which has its headquarters at Richmond, Va.

The Rev. Mr. C. J. Lowe and his wife and two children of the same mission who were traveling the same route were reported to be safe at Chongqing.

SWIFT ACTION FOR SUBWAYS CONTEMPLATED

NEXT STEP IS COUNTY BOND ISSUE TO CARE FOR PART OF COST

With the overwhelming passage yesterday of the city bond issue of \$350,000 and with previous agreement of the Santa Fe to undergo its third of the expense, the next step remaining in the realization of the two proposed subways for the city is for the county to call a bond election to take care of the additional third of construction expense.

In the event that such bond election should be passed soon, bids would be received and construction begun within the near future, City Manager Gus McCleary said this morning.

County Favors Project
That the county commissioners favor the subway project was indicated several weeks ago when a bond election to care for the county's third of \$180,000 was ordered. This action, however, was retracted at the request of Chamber of Commerce members, city officials and citizens, in the hope that the subway cost might be included in a larger bond issue calling also for the paving of the highways of the county. Since the retraction of that order no action has been taken by the county commission pending the presentation of a petition to them by citizens of the county.

In addition to the city's part of the subway construction, the bond issue which passed yesterday by a vote of more than 20 to 1, included a program for sewer, water, light extensions and storm sewer construction.

Although officials of the city and Board of City Development expressed regret that only 454 votes were cast in the election, the large majority of the victory served as a vote of confidence. It has been predicted that the subways will be completed by June 1 of next year.

Mistaken Identity Claim In Slaying

FORT COLLINS, Colo., Sept. 25 (AP)—George Morrison, ranch owner, admitted to police today he was the slayer of Dale Traylor, 26-year-old Los Angeles youth, who was shot from a bush on Morrison's ranch near here Thursday night.

Traylor was a victim of mistaken identity, Morrison said in his confession to the police.

Morrison admitted, the police declared, that he had intended for three months to kill Fred Hall, his neighbor, whom he accused of paying attention to Mrs. Morrison. He mistook Traylor for Hall.

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Two Killed, Four Hurt In Smash-Up

SANTA FE, N. M., Sept. 25 (AP)—Two men are dead and four others are in St. Vincent's hospital here today with serious injuries as a result of an automobile crash on the Albuquerque-Santa Fe highway late yesterday.

Two automobile sedans driven by John A. Frazer of Washington, D. C., and Duroos O'Bryan of Santa Fe, crashed head on between La Lata, La Bajada and Big La Bajada hills.

Frazer and Frances Hennin of Huxton, England, were killed instantly and Mrs. Frazer suffered a broken wrist and pelvic bone and possibly internal injuries.

The secret of dressing becomingly is for a woman to accentuate her good points. The very first thing to be considered in summing up those points in her complexion, her eyes, her hair, her figure, her voice, her personality, her social position, her wealth, her power, her influence, her position in the world, her position in the community, her position in the family, her position in the church, her position in the state, her position in the nation, her position in the world.

Reds for Blondes

Some blondes look particularly well in red, if the shade is not too violent, and black brings out a blonde's good points startlingly, besides being distinguished. Indeed, every woman should have at least one black dress in her wardrobe. As for pastel shades, they idealize the blonde. If the complexion, however, has even a hint of sallowness, purple or green of any shade is dangerous.

These last named colors are still more unbefittingly to a brunette, for if there is a tendency to sallowness, the brunette appears to have it more marked degree. On the other hand, some shades of purple make many brunettes appear radiant. Down through the ages brunettes have worn glowing, vivid reds and yellows with charming result. But the dusky shades of brilliant colors which seem to flame as through a mist are also effective with the brunet type. They give the "corset" air.

Use Only One Reservation

The wise woman in buying any shade to be worn at night, tries out, of course, the effect under artificial light. Colors have a strange trick of changing almost beyond recognition viewed in this way, and being all think the most deceptive of all.

WATER POWER DEVELOPMENT NOW FAVORED

WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOR CONSERVATION

LAMPASAS, Sept. 25 — When the Heart of Texas division of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce went on record here yesterday in favor of dams for power purposes on the upper Colorado river, a definite movement toward that goal was made.

If the other districts of the West Texas Chamber follow the lead of the Heart of Texas, the Samuel Insull interests will be urged to enter the field on the terms which they have made. Homer D. Wade, manager of the West Texas organization, said.

Wade asserted that the Syndicate Power company, working with Insull, had made an offer several months ago which the West Texas organization, after settling the numerous disputes among communities jealous of their water rights, had finally accepted.

Just as the wearing elements were expressed and the acceptance was made, Wade said, Insull withdrew his part of the proposal and nothing has been done since that time.

Insull's offer was to let the South Texas River Growers and other residents along the river have all of those which it is in best hands. The Heart of Texas district adopted a resolution favoring the terms of that offer and acceptance, under which the furthest southernmost dam would be the Hamilton Dam in upper Burnett county.

MUSEUM FOR EDISON, PLAN

FORD RESERVES SPACE IN 'VILLAGE' FOR GREAT INVENTOR

DETROIT, Sept. 25 — A large museum is to be erected by Henry Ford in his "ancient village" near Dearborn, as a monument to Thomas A. Edison, and it will house most of the original inventions of the wisest of East Orange. Announcement of the project was made today along with the statement that Edison will arrive in Dearborn Tuesday to participate in the cornerstone laying ceremony.

In addition to the early working models of Edison's inventions, the building, to be known as the "Edison Museum," will house also his laboratory tools, notebooks and other paraphernalia used during the years when he was perfecting the telegraph, motion pictures and other devices.

The "Ancient Village" of which the Edison exhibit will be a feature, has been laid out by Ford on a plot of ground just north of Dearborn. He plans to incorporate in the place originals of many objects of household use, industry and farming of the period of the revolution, just before and after. Ford has been collecting these objects over a period of many years.

Some of the originals were exhibited here recently.

FURTHER QUIZ INTO UTILITIES

SHOW EFFORTS MADE TO SECURE SUPPORT OF COLLEGE HEADS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 — Financial records of the southeastern division of the National Electric Light Association, identified today in the federal trade commission's investigation of power utilities by Clarence M. Kilian of Atlanta, Ga., showed that annual disbursements ranged between \$2,000 and \$20,000 in recent years.

James S. Thomas, director of extension work at the University of Alabama, was named in the records as having had \$115 expenses paid for attending the convention of the association at Miami, Fla.

Examined by Robert E. Neely, commission counsel, Kilian testified that only one payment had been made to a writer by his association.

He said this was to an editor of a Birmingham newspaper for attending the April 1926 meeting of the association at Pinehurst, N. C. He did not name the editor, and said the expenses were about \$60.

He also produced extracts from the minutes of the April 1924 meeting of the executive committee, southeastern division of the N. E. L. A., held in the southern club at Birmingham. These named Thomas Bragg, whom Kilian described as vice president of the Alabama Power company, in connection with a report as "chairman of the corporation with educational institutions committee."

The death of Dr. Riggs, the report added, had altered Bragg's plans "and he was in touch with Dr. J. J. Wil-

more, dean of engineering at Auburn, who was co-operating in the plans presented."

West Negroes' Co-operation
Following Mr. Bragg's report, the minutes continued, President Martin called the attention of those present to an element of society usually overlooked—the negroes. He suggested that the co-operation of Tuskegee Institute, one of the largest and wealthiest colleges in the country, be enlisted.

Mr. Collier supported Mr. Martin's remarks, dwelling upon the fact that the negroes, as the domestic in southern homes, are responsible for the application in household appliances of tremendous quantities of power and made a motion, which was duly adopted, that the chairman of the committee on co-operation with education institutions be instructed to foster the spirit of co-operation with the negro schools as far as he may consider advisable.

Der Colonel Is Hard

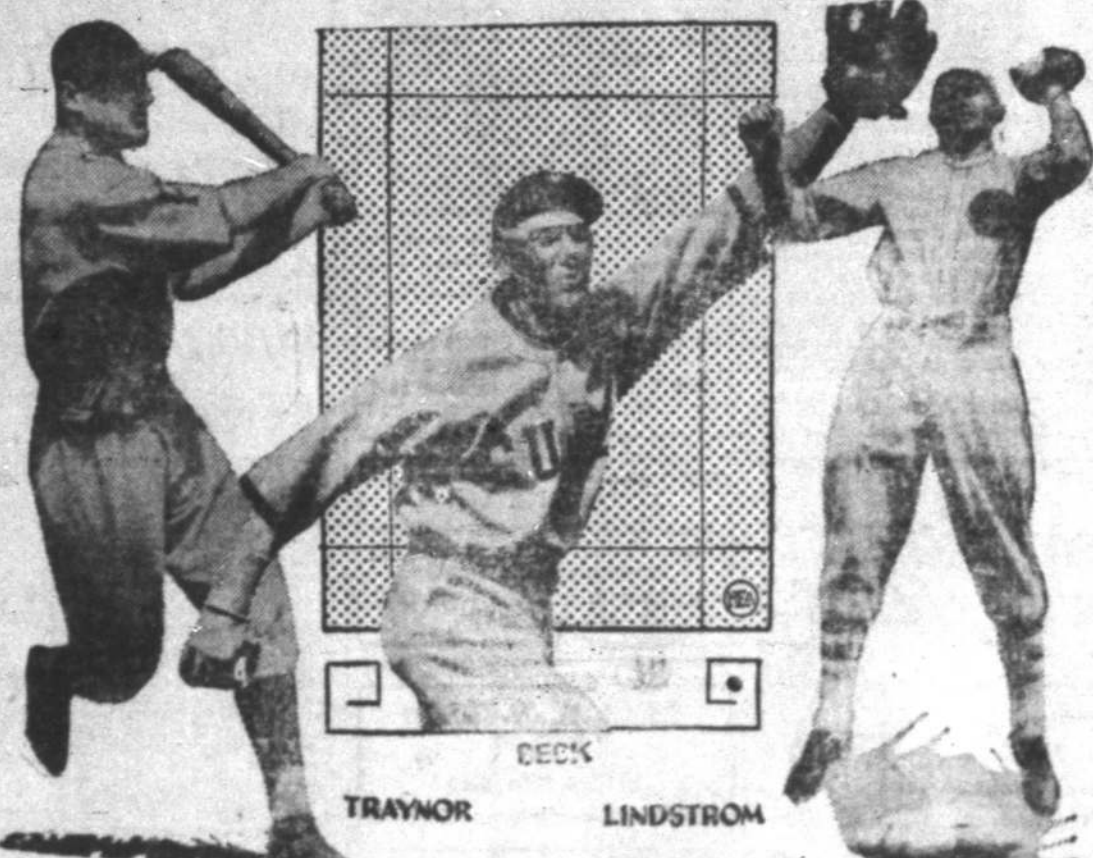

There should be little dispute offered against the statement that young Freddie Lindstrom of the Giants is the greatest third baseman of the season. It is not pertinent to argue where whether he is the greatest of all time and the same holds good for Joe Dugan of the Yankees and Pie Traynor of the Pirates. It is enough to say that they are the best of all right now.

By the application of personal opinion instead of cold figures, the third basemen of the contending teams might be ranked as follows: Lindstrom, Giants, 1; Traynor, Pirates, 2 plus; Dugan, Yankees, 3; Dykes, Fox or Hale, Athletics, 4; High or Holm, Cards, 4; Beck, Cubs, 5.

As the police rushed toward the speaker, the woman on the other side of the hall shouted over and over: "Don't say that about the 'Sidewalks of New York.' She too was shouted out."

GENERAL HIKE IN OIL AREAS

CALIFORNIA ONLY ONE OF STATES NOT TO SHOW INCREASE

(By Associated Press)

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 25.—With the exception of California, oil areas in the United States continued a general increase in average daily production of light and heavy oils during the week ending September 23, according to estimates of the current oil and gas journal.

Peculiarly, a noticeable decrease in the majority of the fields within the Oklahoma area is made up in one field, the St. Louis-Pearson, with an increase of 15,790 barrels over the preceding week brought the Oklahoma total increase to 5,245 barrels. Seminole field proper shows effects of the conservation program by dropping 9,175 barrels during the week.

Total West Texas fields reported an increase of 2,695 barrels; Midcontinent fields of 9,213. California showed a decrease of 6,009 barrels. The grand total for both heavy and light oil production during the week was estimated at 2,313,000 barrels daily, a 7,864 barrel increase over the week ending September 15.

INFIELD POWER OF TEAMS LEFT IN RACE VARIES

YANKEES HOLD EDGE ON PAPER BUT OTHERS ARE BRILLIANT

NEW YORK, Sept. 25 (AP).—The infield strength or weakness of the four clubs still in the thick of the major league pennant battles offers a wide range of contrast in figuring the World's Series dope.

The Yankees have the heaviest hitting array of the lot and the most experienced. The Giants have the fastest and youngest set of inner workers, a brilliant quartet that averages only 25 and hits for .308. The Athletics are another seasoned group, with a young fireballer in Jimmy Pons. The Cardinals rely chiefly on the twin stars of the right side, Bottomley and Frisch.

Yankees Have Edge

On paper, the Yankees, averaging 120 at bat, present the most formidable array but their defense has been weakened by the removal of Joe Dugan and the long absence of Tony Lazzeri, now back at his post but not up to his 1927 form. The substitution of Gene Robertson and Dugan at third adds more punch to the quartet, all the other members of which are well over the .300 mark, but jumping Joe's skill in the field is missed.

Much of the late season spurt of the Athletics was due to the infield shift that first put the hard hitting Fox on third base, then moved him to first, with the veteran Jim Dykes at the far corner. Bishop and Boley form a great combination around second base while Mack has taken a new lease on life at bat.

There isn't a snappier combination to watch in either league than the infield quartet of the Giants. It matters whether Andy Rose or Andy Cohen is at second base. Terry, always a hard stickler, has developed into one of the game's best first basemen, while Jackie and Frisch around third make a wall defense on the left side.

Cardinal Infield Oldest and weakest hitting of the four now in the limelight, but not to be misled by the name. Frisch, who has the most spectacular fielding second-sacker in Frisch, whose batting has fallen off, and the league leading cleanup slugger in Frisch, who has been out of the lineup since the Cardinals' loss to the Yankees at St. Louis, are the only warhorses. Rabbit Maranville, can't keep up at short the way Tommy Thayer did in 1926 before a broken leg stopped his progress. Andy High has replaced Frisch at third and is doing reasonably well at it but he doesn't compare with Lindstrom in any department of the game.

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HOOVER FACES BUSY DAY FOR DASH TO SOUTH

WILL VISIT TWO CITIES AND PASS THROUGH HALF DOZEN MORE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP).—A rather strenuous schedule has been arranged for Herbert Hoover on his one day excursion into the South next month, during which he will visit two cities and pass through half a dozen others in the Tennessee and Virginia mountains by train or automobile.

The republican presidential candidate will make two speeches, the principal one at Elizabethton, Tenn., in mid-afternoon on October 6, and the other at Johnson City, Tenn., late in the day just before he boards his private train for the overnight run to Washington.

As the schedule is now arranged the party will leave here over the Southern railway at 11 p. m. on the night of October 5 with the first stop at Lynchburg, where the transfer will be made to the Norfolk and Western. Bristol, which straddles the Virginia-Tennessee line, is to be reached around 9:30 a. m., and there the nominee will make a rear platform appearance.

Switched back to the Southern, the special train will then proceed to Elizabethton, arriving about 11:30 a. m. The train will be halted outside the city limits and the party will motor through the town, the parade ending in time for luncheon at 12:30 o'clock at which Mr. Hoover will be the honor guest, and at which he may have a word or two to say.

At 2 p. m. the nominee is to review a pageant in connection with the industrial and battle of King's mountain celebration, which then will be in progress. From the reviewing stand the nominee will be taken to a natural outdoor amphitheater where he will deliver the fourth prepared address of the campaign, but one which will be as nearly non-political in character as can be one delivered by a candidate for the presidency.

After the address, Hoover and his party will enter automobiles for the ten mile ride over a mountain highway to Johnson City, which is planning a fine welcome for the republican nominee.

CHICAGO, Sept. 24. — Two Sicilians were reported under indictment today on kidnapping and extortion charges, accused before the grand jury of membership in a band of terrorists who have preyed on their countrymen here for six months.

Pasquale Capotosto, identified by four wealthy Italian contractors as "secretary" of the Black Mail ring that wrung tribute from under threats of death, was reported named in a true bill charging him with extortion. Angelo Pettiti, held for a week as the agent of Billy Rancieri's abductors, was said to have been charged with extortion and kidnapping for ransom, punishable by death.

The ten year old Italian youngster, whose kidnapping two weeks ago led to investigation of the Mafia Blackmail Syndicate and the discovery of 200 families made victims of its plotting, was a grand jury witness. The boy and his father, A. Frank Rancieri, and an uncle already had identified Pettiti as the man to whom they were directed to pay a \$50,000 ransom for Billy.

Mrs. Rancieri was hysterical when she appeared with her husband and son at the court building. A new demand had been made for money, threatening the bombing of their home if the extortionists were not paid \$5,000 by Wednesday night.

Meanwhile conferences were had with Signor Giuseppe Castruccio, Italian consul here, and with immigration authorities as a preliminary to deportation proceedings against at least 15 Sicilians suspected of blackmail activities.

TWO COUNTIES LIST FOR FAIR

SWISHER AND BAILEY TO MOVE EXHIBITS HERE FROM AMARILLO

Addition of three new county exhibits to the Panhandle-South Plains Fair from Swisher and Bailey in Texas and Roosevelt in New Mexico was announced here yesterday by D. P. Eaton, county agent who is in charge of the exhibits, following the receipt of telegrams from representatives of these counties. This makes seventeen counties to list for exhibits at the fair next week.

Exhibits from these three counties will be brought here from Amarillo where they are being displayed at the Tri-State Fair this week. In addition to the county exhibits about fifteen community exhibits will be shown, Mr. Eaton said. He reports that interest is high throughout the county concerning the coming fair, with virtually everyone cooperating to make the exposition the greatest in its history.

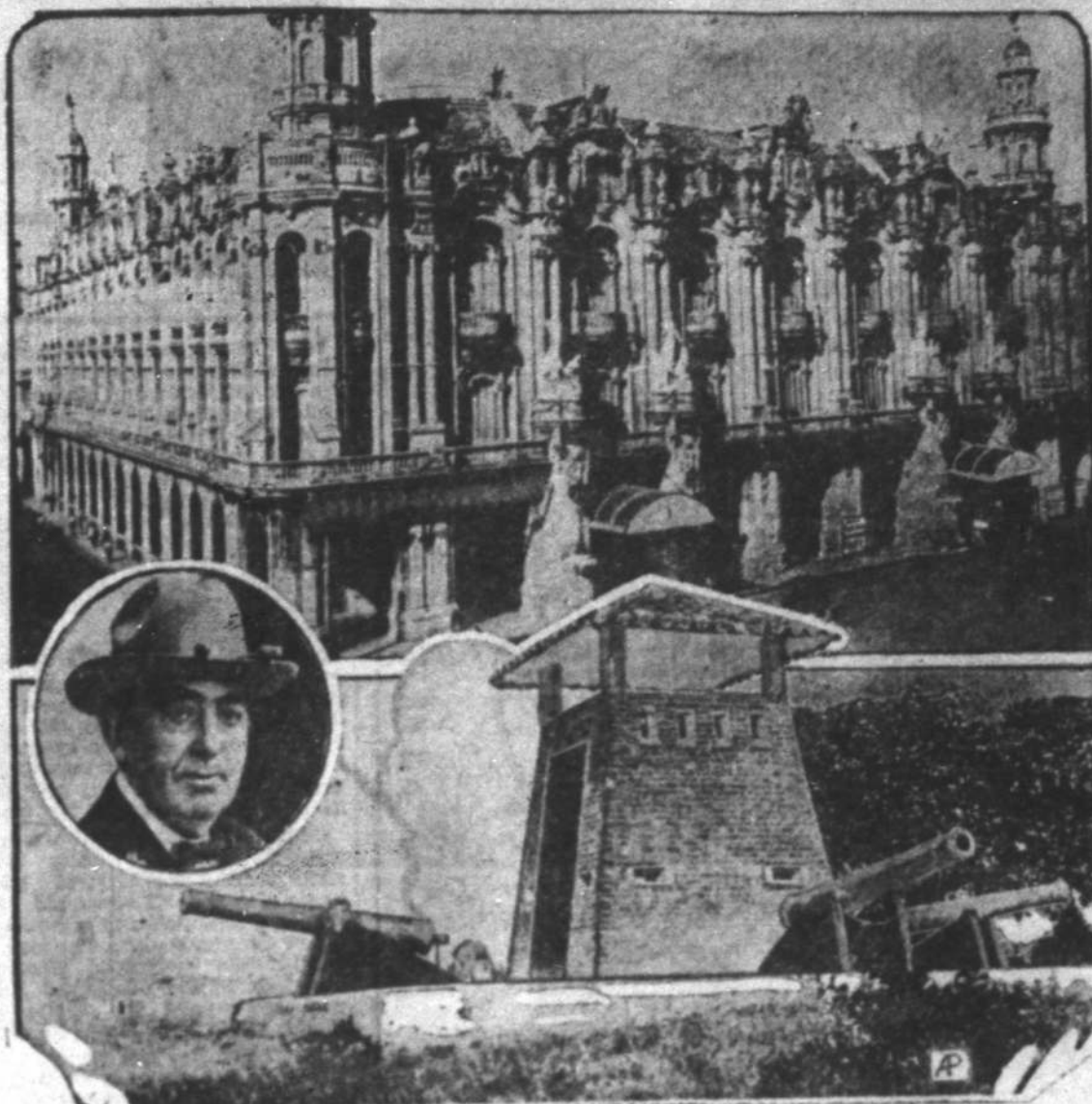
Texas Motorways Moves Up Schedule

Two-War Vet Leads "Boys Of '98" To Cuba

CHICAGO, Sept. 25 (AP).—A gray-haired veteran of two wars will lead the United Spanish War Veterans when they march on Havana in October—this time not to fight for Cuba, but to accept the hospitality of that country at the veteran's annual encampment.

John J. Garrity, infantry captain in the Spanish war, colonel on the Mexican border patrol and in the world war, and now brigadier-general in the Illinois national guard at Chicago, heads the veterans as national commander.

Garrity formerly was chief of police in Chicago. He has been active in civilian military affairs since 1899, when he enlisted in the Illinois national guard. Thirty months later he was commissioned a second lieutenant.

He served through the Spanish-American war as a captain and in April, 1899, was made a major. By 1907 he had jumped to colonel. He commanded a regiment on the Mexican border during the troublesome times of 1915. With the outbreak of the world war Garrity was given command of the 132nd infantry. He trained infantrymen for overseas service. On July 24, 1924, he was raised to brigadier general and given command of the 65th brigade, national guard.

Garrity organized the first camp of the Spanish War Veterans in Chicago, serving three years as camp commander. He next was aide de camp of the national organization and inspector general, 1920-21. Garrity was national adjutant in 1922 and a member of the national legislative committee in 1926.

The veteran's head is 59 years old. He was born in Chicago. Garrity was police chief from November, 1918, to November, 1920. He now is in the insurance business.

SMITH RAPPED IN SPEECH OF NORRIS HERE

TAMMANY HALL COMES IN FOR CRITICISM OF TEXAS PASTOR

Violently attacking the record of Governor Alfred E. Smith, Tammany Hall, and what he termed the political side of the Roman Catholic church, J. Frank Norris, well-known Fort Worth Baptist preacher, last night spoke before several thousand people in the interest of the campaign for presidency of Herbert Hoover, republican standard bearer.

The speaking was held in a specially arranged open air auditorium on Ninth street, just north of the Lubbock Inn. Brought here under the auspices of the "Hoover Democrats," Dr. Norris spoke for three hours, extending a definite urge for the hearers to support Hoover, who was characterized as "that great Christian gentleman with a colossal mind."

Frequent interruptions by both sympathetic and unsympathetic listeners came throughout the speech. Dr. Norris answered numerous questions expounded to him by members of the audience. In addition to Smith's stand on the liquor question, Dr. Norris roundly denounced John J. Raskob, Senator Joe Robinson, and all members of Tammany Hall, defending the right of preachers to enter into the political campaign. RACKET'S GROWTH GIVES HOPE THAT IT WILL FALL OF OWN WEIGHT

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the twelfth of a series of articles on racketeering in large cities by James P. Kirby. Today, Kirby takes up the story of New York.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—With all its undoubted claims to distinction, its first in everything, New York nevertheless stands second today in one respect. It remains but a province in the realm ruled by America's underworld king, "Scarface Al" Capone of Chicago, whose minions are engaged in the hazardous but lucrative pursuit of exacting tribute under threat of violence.

True, it was in Brooklyn, where Al Capone "trained" as a youthful member of the old "Navy Street Gang." But New York's rackets, traditional in fiction for their ferocity, today appear as the mainstay of another era as equipped with the methods and string of Capone's "mob."

The old gangs of New York—the "Monk Eastmans" and the "Hudson Dusters"—and scores of others, which provided material for many a melodrama have passed. In their place there has arisen a new type of gang—with new leadership—and with a new technique.

Capone dominates all. And dominating it all, ruling with a firmness and finally never fanned by gang leaders of the past, is "Scarface Al" Capone.

Capone stands out today unique in the history of American crime. For never before has there arisen a figure to challenge law not only of his own but a half dozen other cities. New York, Detroit, Philadelphia, St. Louis—all pay tribute to the man who has established crime as "big business" and on a scale comparable to that of commerce and industry.

And therein lies the hope of the downfall of racketeering: already the game is growing so big, so many agents are necessary for its far-flung activities that it may supply of its own weight as envy, rivalry and greed take the upper hand. A monster organization cannot be controlled like a small gang of desperadoes.

The judgments passed by Capone are far more irrevocable than those of the law, for when Capone decrees death, there are no technicalities, no courts of appeal, and no reprieves.

Thus it was that Frankie Yale of Brooklyn, long the friend and associate of Capone, died when he challenged the rule of Scarface Al. Years ago, when the Navy Street Gang was at the height of its power, there were few who saw in the juvenile Capone, a hanger-on on the fringe of the gang, the mighty figure who today challenges the magnitude of the best detectives.

Moved To Chicago

The exact date of Capone's removal to Chicago is still a matter of conjecture here. But it is known that he frequently returns to the old stamping ground.

Capone is known to have been in a cafe in Brooklyn on Christmas, 1926, when "Big Leg" Langan, powerful figure in the old "Coney Island Gang" and two others were killed on Twentieth street in Brooklyn. Capone was brought in by the police, with scores of others, but released when it was impossible to directly connect him with the crime.

"Big Bill" Lovett and Frankie Hinky, other gang leaders in lower Manhattan and lower Brooklyn were killed when it is said Capone was in the immediate neighborhood.

After Capone moved to Chicago Frankie Yale is known to have made numerous trips to that city. It is declared by Detective Inspector James J. Sullivan of Brooklyn, who knew both well in their days here, that Yale's trips were on the summons of Capone when the latter wanted certain jobs done, for which Yale was peculiarly fitted by training and temperament.

Capone had an intimate friend in the Navy Street Gang over which, eventually, Frankie Yale became the boss. This was Ralph De Amato, who is said to have been a brother-in-law of Disgraced Joe Esposito of Chicago.

De Amato, Yale and Capone were friends of long standing. Not so long ago their friendship was sealed by Capone himself, who presented each with a four-karat diamond ring, each valued at \$5000 and which adorned the finger of each until his death.

Yale's collections on gambling, on the long-known Italian "policy game," a form of lottery well established in Brooklyn, in alcohol and wash basins and the various other rackets in which he was engaged, are known to have included certain amounts which went to Capone. There is the story here that even after the presentation of the rings Capone suspected Yale of hooding out, and set De Amato to spy on Yale.

When Yale found out he was being double-crossed by De Amato, he ordered him killed, it is said. At any rate, on July 7, 1927, De Amato was killed.

A year to the day, July 7, 1928, the anniversary of De Amato's death, Frankie Yale, while riding in his automobile fell beneath the bullet of assassin, Inspector Sullivan and District Attorney Charles J. Dodd of Brooklyn are convinced that Yale was killed on orders of Capone, to avenge the killing of De Amato.

Yale is known to have resented the system which compelled him to pay part of his own income to Capone, and at times is credited with leaving apit to Capone's high place.

Retaliation Flares

Retaliation for Yale's killing was not long in coming, and even more definitely widened the breach between the Yale "mob" in Brooklyn and the Capone "mob" in Chicago.

Just recently Tony Lombardo,

Lieutenant of Capone, was murdered on the streets of Chicago. The killing is credited to friends of Yale, who thus avenged his death.

The war is on. Capone's rule has been challenged by none other than those with whom he started on his career. Their methods are well known to each other, and Capone's bodyguard has been doubled. Capone knows as Yale knew, and as all the members of their respective mobs know, that no killing in the underworld in which they move goes unavenged.

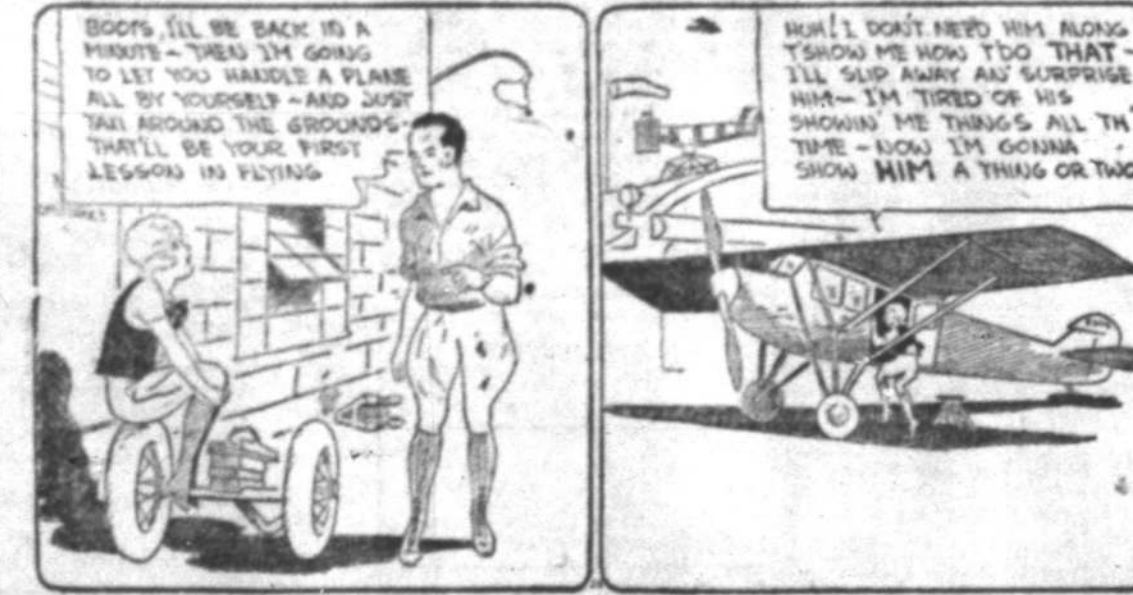

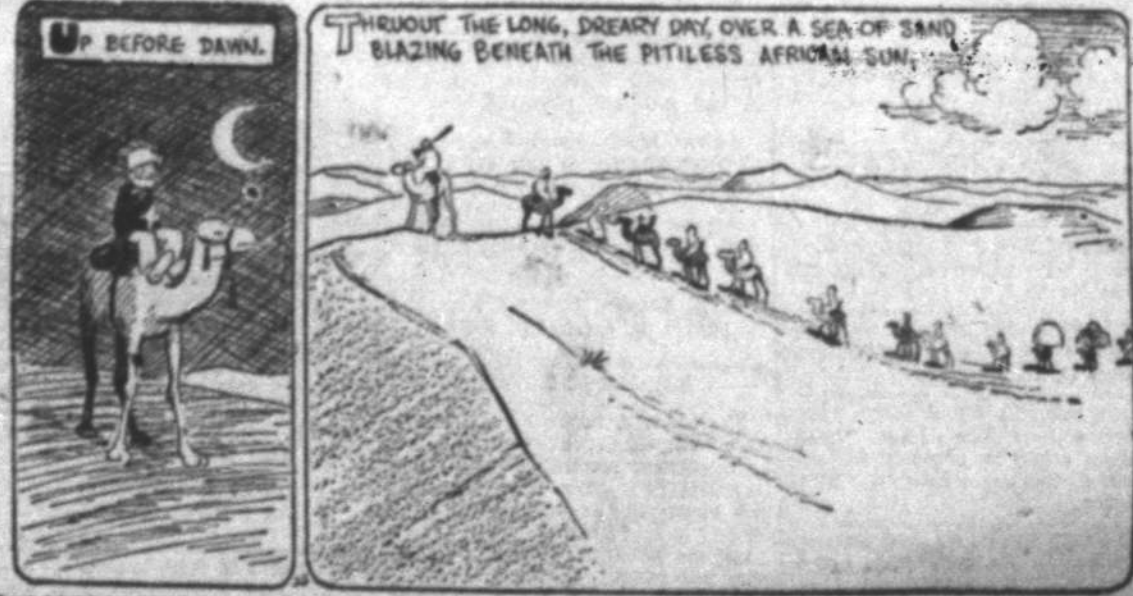

Protect Rail Rate

NEW YORK, Sept. 24 (AP)—Representatives of Virginia and Maryland industries told the interstate commerce commission here today that ocean-rail rates place eastern shippers at disadvantage with west coast concerns in competition for the southwestern trade.

F. R. Bain of the American Petroleum corporation of Norfolk, Va., said the rate from Norfolk to Fort Worth, Texas, is five cents more a hundred pounds than that from San Francisco.

C. D. Bartleside said the half million dollar annual business in southwestern states of the American Hardware company and subsidiaries of Petersburg, Va., would be lost under the new rates announced by the commission. The rates are suspended pending the outcome of the rehearing now under way.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Sept. 25 (AP)—While surveys of needs of the hurricane ravaged area went forward today, Floridians poured fresh emergency supplies and personnel into the most sorely stricken districts.

A. L. Shaffer, director of disaster relief for the national Red Cross, went into the everglades with Dr. William Dekle, medical officer of the national organization and John Hendricks, also of national headquarters, to survey the ruin reported in the Pelican bay district.

After seeing the situation at Belle Glade, Pahokee and near Okechobee City, and issuing a call for funds, Governor Martin was enroute to Jacksonville where he would make another appeal over radio.

Shaffer held his estimate of the known dead at 1,200 persons but Howard W. Selby, a chairman of the Palm Beach county Red Cross committee announced again today that surveys of casualties completed for him by O. C. Geiger, one of his workers, showed a total of 2,200 persons. Other official estimates varied from 1,500 to 2,000, the latter figure wired to President Coolidge by business men of Okechobee City.

Search for bodies still went forward. Relief workers said they were disposing of the bodies as best they could.

Emergency receivers divided by the defunct Citizens Bank of West Palm Beach was announced today and officials said this would place approximately \$200,000 in circulation.

Wealthy residents of the Palm Beach are driving automobiles and trucks in relief work.

GARBLER WIRE TELLS OF

DALLAS, Sept. 25—Garbled dispatches from Pecos today indicated some of the fliers in the Los Angeles to Cincinnati air race, who passed through there over the week end, had harrowing experiences with terrific storms in the Guadalupe mountains.

Sunday" municipal airport El Paso Merritt and Chadwick down with me here please forward weather report Captain Collier. Caught in terrible storm and fog cleared the mountains by one foot. Landed safely. Merritt lost plane. Bradford."

The Merritt referred to is thought to be R. J. Merritt, Newcastle, Pa. He is flying a Ryan burgham. Captain Collier was in a Fairchild and Stuart Chadwick was flying a Waco. Other reports that reached here from El Paso indicated that a flier named Terkesky, flying a Waco, was also down near Kent. Kent is in the extreme western part of Texas near El Paso.

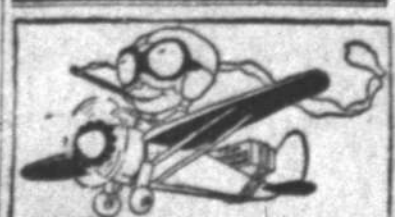

MOODY TO GIVE MORE SUBDUED PARTY APPEAL

PLEA TO VOTERS FOR STRAIGHT TICKET TO BE MODIFIED

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 25.—Governor Moody, Attorney General Claude Pollard and other state officials expect to issue an appeal somewhat more subdued than the one proposed by the Texas democratic campaign committee urging Democrats to vote the ticket straight in November, and championing Governor Al Smith, presidential nominee.

At a meeting late yesterday, officials who are nominees for election in November, failed to sign the campaign committee statement sent them from the headquarters. Instead, at Governor Moody's suggestion, Pollard and State School Superintendent S. N. Marra were named as a committee to draw up a substitute statement, eliminating some of the words criticized in the statement prepared at Dallas.

Just what parts of the latter are objectionable could not be learned definitely. The meeting was executive and the participants reticent later.

Moody Opposes Statement
Governor Moody and Pollard are not in favor of the campaign committee statement as it stands. State Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher and George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, are in favor of signing anything calling for solid support of the straight ticket. Hatcher gave notice that he would sign the Dallas statement and would prepare one of his own.

As near as can be learned, Governor Moody, Pollard and Marra want to make a simple appeal for support of the party nominees and let it go at that.

Consistency Is Point
The Dallas statement sent to all democratic nominees, makes a point of consistency, recognizing the right of anti-prohibitionists to vote against a prohibition nominee of the party if the prohibitionists insist on voting against Governor Smith because of his personal views on the liquor question. This, however, would make the democratic party simply one of prohibition or anti-prohibition, depending on the views of its presidential nominee the statement declared.

The Catholic religious issue also is deplored. Right of Catholics to vote against a protestant nominee as well as vice versa, was recognized as a matter of consistency.

Pollard and Marra are expected to have a substitute statement laid this week. Pollard will be out of town for two or three days. He went to Houston last night.
