City Voters To Ballot on Three Special Issues

In addition to naming a mayor and two aldermen, qualified voters in the City of Abernathy will ballot on three separate propositions in the April 4 city election. The propositions are listed below:

PROPOSITIONS

Paving Sign-Up Underway Here

Representatives of the contractors and financing group are contacting local property owners in connection with the street paving project in Abernathy. Signing of these papers will open the way for actual construction on the project, which calls for the paving of 75 to 85 city blocks of streets.

Parking areas on the east and north sides of the city square will be paved in the project. The paving on the east side of the square will include sidewalk, curb and gutter dividing the parking area from Ave. D (Highway Street). Access entrances to the east side parking area will be at 8th Street and 9th Street.

Currently handling the paving sign-up work is Howard Humphrey, member of the AHS faculty. He is contacting local property owners after school hours. During school hours, all necessary papers and forms will be at the city hall for those who may want to sign for street paving during that time.

JACK LEE CAPTURES GUN CLUB SHOOTING

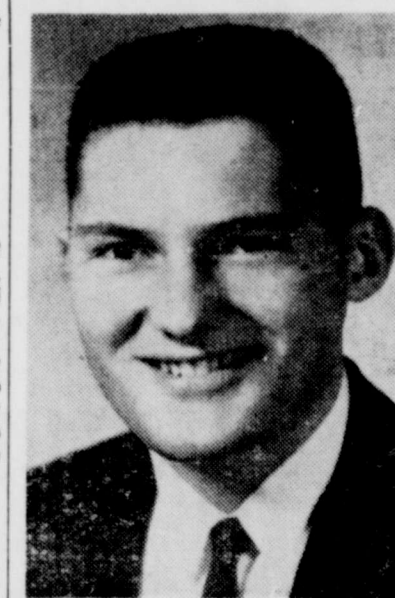

Lobstein's 1080-pound Angus captured first place in its class of heavy steers, then took the Grand Championship. Johnson's 215-pound Hampshire barrow also took top honors in its class of heavy barrows before being named the Grand Champion winner.

Reserve Champion honors were won by Loyd Hancock in both the steer and swine divisions. Hancock showed his heavy Poland China to the Reserve Championship, then also captured the same honors with his 920-pound heavy Hereford steer.

In addition to the individual awards for placings in the show, Showmanship Awards were also presented in the Beef and Swine divisions, as well as the Chris Benn Trophy.

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Cotton Acreage 'Release' Date Is April 14

Cotton growers are reminded of the importance of either using or releasing their cotton allotments this year in order to prevent reduced allotments for future years. According to E. J. Pope Jr., Chairman, Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, the 1962 cotton allotment for a farm will be reduced if certain conditions are not met in 1961. So a farmer who knows that he will not plant at least 75 per cent of his farm's cotton allotment in 1961 can help himself and also other cotton farmers by releasing his allotment before the deadline of April 14. This will assure him, as well as the county and state, of history acreage for future allotments.

Under a recent amendment of the law, the chairman explains, the 1961 allotment is required to be used as the farm's allotment base in determining the 1962 cotton allotment if at least 75 per cent of the farm's 1961 allotment is planted or "required as planted." Otherwise, the base for determining a future allotment will be reduced to the average of (1) the regular allotment for the year, and (2) the acreage planted or "regarded as planted" in that year. (Acreage may be "regarded as planted" if it is released to the County ASC Committee or if it is included under the Conservation Reserve or Great Plains Program.)

In order fully to protect the allotment base for the farm's 1962 and future cotton allotments, therefore, the farmer should (1) plant at least 75 per cent of the 1961 allotment to cotton, or (2) release at least 75 per cent of the allotment to the A.S.C. County Committee, or (3) include at least 75 per cent of the allotment acre in the Conservation Reserve, or (4) use a total acreage equal to at least 75 per cent of the farm's 1961 cotton allotment in all of

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these three ways together. Any cotton farmer in the county who now knows that his allotment will not be planted this year should visit the local ASC Office immediately to discuss how the new provisions of law will apply to his farm.

"Abernathy city council meetings are open to the public," said Mayor Edgar O. Graham, "and we invite interested citizens to sit in on these sessions," he added. Regular sessions are held at 8 p. m. on the first Monday of each month in the city hall.

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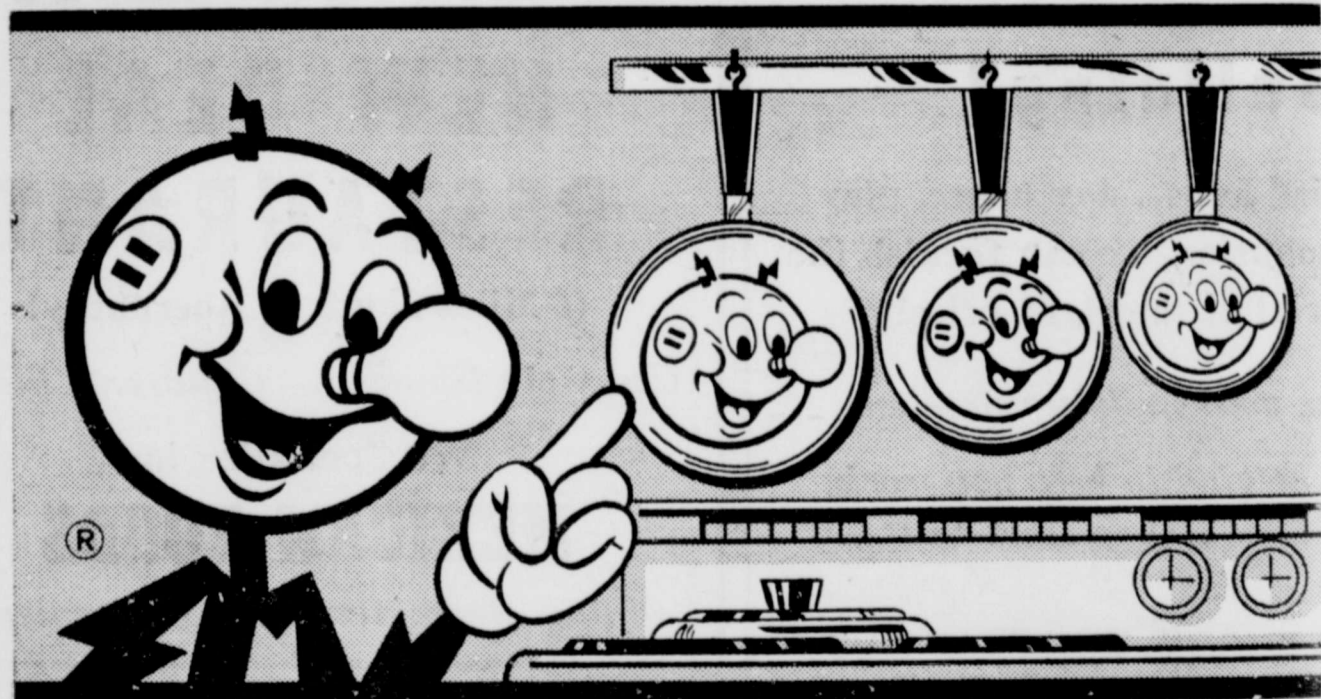
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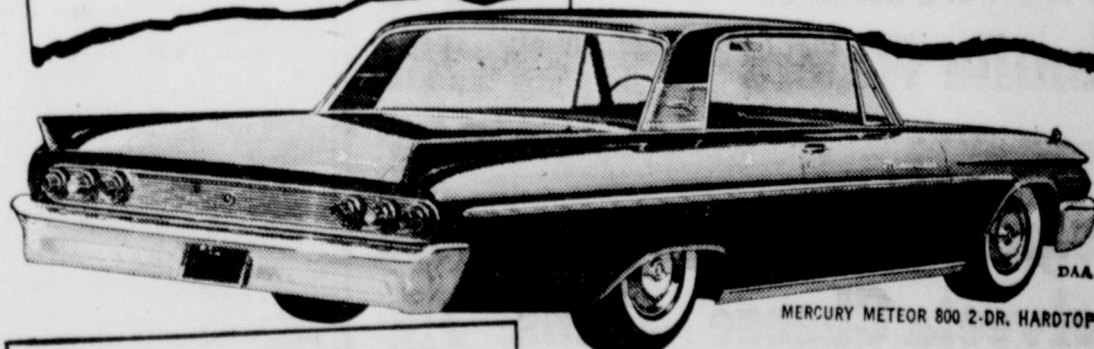

School Bus Law

The following is paragraph (a) of Section 194 of the School Bus Law, regarding Overtaking and Passing a School Bus:

The driver of a vehicle upon a highway outside of the limits of any incorporated city or town upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus which has stopped on the highway for the purpose of receiving or discharging any school children shall stop the vehicle immediately before passing the school bus, but may then proceed past such school bus at a speed which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children.

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Flame Cultivation on grain sorghums to control weeds had its first full year of study during 1960 at the High Plains Research Foundation. "Two methods were used in the study," Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director, said as he released the Research report last week.

The most successful experiment was the use of a standard type of flame cultivator which the grain sorghum plants were 10 to 12 inches tall. The highest yield of 6,062 pounds per acre was secured with three flaming as compared with 5,234 pounds per acre for the unflamed plants. Better weed control probably accounted for a part of the 828 pounds increase. Some of this gain should be accredited to the fact that there was no deep cultivation to damage the root system.

On this flame cultivation test two burners were used per row, set for cross flaming, with a pressure setting of 40 pounds, and a tractor speed of 2 3/4 miles per hour.

A second method was used where wet weather at planting time resulted in grain sorghum and weeds coming up together and made the usual methods of weed control ineffective. Usually, when this happens, replanting is the only solution. Under these conditions, the flame cultivator was used when the grain sorghum was 1 to 4 inches high, the weeds less than 2 inches. In this method both the weeds and grain sorghum were subjected to heat, but only weeds were killed.

This method of early flaming was used on a neighboring farm, where grain sorghum hybrid 610 had been planted May 12. When the plants were 2 to 3 inches high,

a good stand of weeds was present. The weeds consisted primarily of crab grass and careless weeds, with a few horse nettle.

The grain sorghum had been planted so that the row areas were slightly higher than the middles. Four burners per row were set parallel, so that both rows and middles were covered with the flame. Crab grass and pig weed were killed almost 100% but the horse nettle was affected very little by the flame. Within one week, the flamed plants had recovered, but were 4 inches shorter than the adjacent unflamed plants. This difference became less as the crops neared maturity, and by the time they were headed out there was no difference. When harvested, the moisture content of both were the same. Very few crab grass plants remained after harvest and therefore, less seed were available for future infestation. Six different flaming systems

were compared with the unflamed grain sorghum in this test.

Further study on flame cultivation is underway at the present time in the lower Rio Grande Valley. This study, which will give two years' results in one, is sponsored by the Propane Producers and Distributors.

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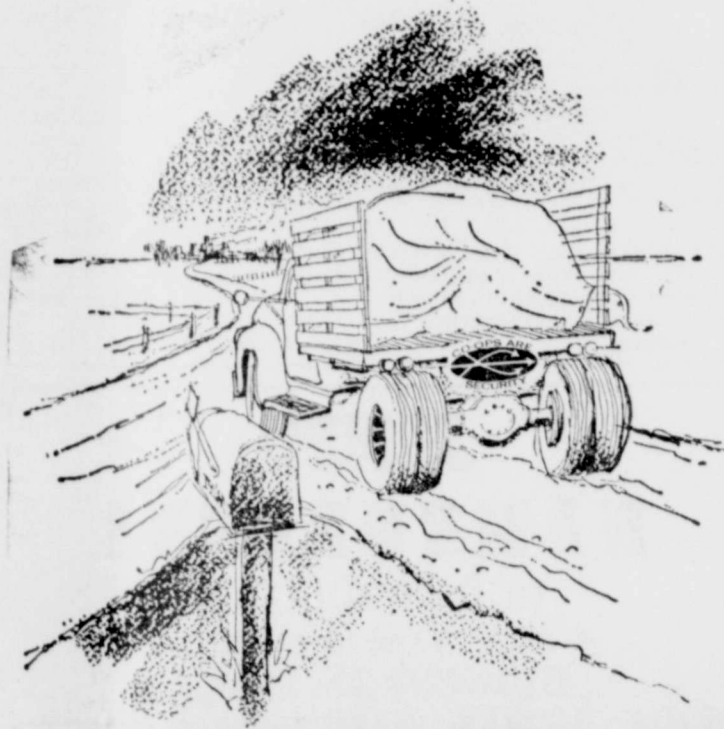
