# Crime Data Now Speeds To And From Colorado City With Computer Accuracy

Quickly, Mrs. Juanita Schafer touched the typewriter-like keyboard, punching a narrow paper tape.

Only 20 letters and numerals: ATV - PL - CC - MVP - REG. 70-DFL10.

Without changing positions, she inserted the tape into transmitting machine, and the code sped over telephone company lines to Austin after a few clickity-clacks of a computer mechanism determined that transmitting circuits were open.

When the code was on its way, the teletype machine typed

out an all-points bulletin for law enforcement officers -- information which had cleared through circuits by computer from another Texas city.

Then the machine typed a response for the 20-letter code.

It spelled out in typewriter fashion the full name of a Colorado City resident, his address; the make, model, vehicle serial number, and description of his automobile, date purchased, lein holder and lein holder's mailing address.

Time elapsed: 90 seconds, counting the break-in of the all-points bulletin.

In those 90 seconds the teletype now operating in Colorado City Police and Mitchell County Sheriff's Departments made use of a new law enforcement communications network to ask and receive data from the state's crime information center in Austin concerning a one automobile license number.

Only individual involved was Mrs. Schafer, veteran police dispatcher in City Hall. Computers and communications equipment did the rest.

Although the new equipment has been operating for several months here, the full network of communications has just now

opened up as other area communications groups have entered the network.

It is a time-saver, reliable if the inquiry date is correct. And it is a new weapon for law enforcement in quickly obtaining identification data, tracing stolen automobiles, obtaining information on suspected law violators or speeding important information about a crime to other out-of-town police.

Both Colorado City teletypes, police and sheriff, are in the North Central network loop with its hub in Abilene. Linked into the localized network so that each point can be contacted im-

mediately by another teletype are 17 towns.

These include Colorado City, Anson, Abilene, Baird, Ballinger, Breckenridge, Brownwood, Coleman, Comanche, Cross Plains, Eastland, Haskell, Jayton, San Angelo, Snyder, Stamford and Sweetwater.

Connecting with this loop are 11 other Texas regional loops -- Panhandle, North Texas, Southwestern, High Plains, Permian Basin, Gulf Coast, Red River, Coastal, Central Texas, East Texas and Austin.

Previously, Colorado City had to code through its loop hub

in Abilene, which then coded to a regional loop. Now, however, the network allows a dispatcher here to code directly to a town in any area of Texas -- just in the same manner as the 20-letter code to Austin.

It is instant computerized communication.

Before federal funds through Councils of Governments aided in setting up the crime network, communication was a slow, risky process.

Then, a dispatcher could radio the nearest town -- say Sweetwater and ask that dispatcher to relay the message to

another town, with the same request repeated town after town until the communication reached its destination.

The dispatcher and to take her chance that the information, first, would be relayed. Second, that it would be relayed correctly. Third, that it would be answered, going through the same unreliable process.

If the relay system did not work, then police had to turn to long distance phone calls and postal letters.

And often, because of time consumed, the information arrived to late to assist local officers.

The network has broadened for Colorado City far beyond Texas. Many other states can be contacted immediately by coding through Austin. Far western states are reached by coding Austin, then switching through the Phoenix, Ariz., hub.

It also provide communication with the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D.C. where a large bank of computers are ready with instant information gathered from across the nation and around the world.

# County Rains General

## 2.3 Inches Highest Total Reported

Clouds continued to drop rain Saturday on drouth parched and wind blown soils of Mitchell County following 2 nights of desperately needed moisture.

There was no runoff. Pastures, croplands, lawns and flower beds gulped down the rain as it fell.

Although rainfall amounts varied in all area of the county, it was general. More than an inch at the lowest measuring.

Heaviest rain was reported in the areas southeast, south and southwest of Colorado City.

And soaking showers still were drenching areas near Lorraine and in the Fairview community. Sprinkles were reported in numerous county areas as the clouds kept hanging overhead.

It was the first significant moisture for Mitchell County in more than six months. Less than an inch of rain had been counted for half a year.

Mitchell County's seven million dollar agriculture industry had been knocked to its knees by the drouth period which tied onto 1970's below normal year of moisture.

The rain brought relief. But it does not assure cotton and grain sorghum crops nor pasture and water for livestock.

With bottom moisture drawn out of soil by wind and sun, more rain must be forthcoming to prevent drastic curtailment of farm and ranch operations.

Here in Colorado City the official rain gauge, now located on the South Side at City Sewage Plant, measured a total of 1.12 inches of rain -- .94 Thursday night and .18 Friday night.

The official C-City gauge was

one of the county's shortest measurement.

Here is a round of reports from county areas:

Spade, southwest corner of county--Shorty Northcutt reported 2 inches at his home, 1.9 inches at Ellwood and Spade ranches. Most moisture came Thursday with about half inch Friday. Showers Saturday.

Westbrook -- Burton Hines reported 1.25 to .70 inches Thursday and .6 Friday, 2 miles north of Westbrook.

Iatan, west of Westbrook--Mrs. T. L. McKenney reported .70 inch Thursday and .75 more Friday night.

Northwest of Westbrook--Don Henderson recorded 1.3 total with some rain Saturday.

Fairview, 12.5 miles northwest of Colorado City--Total of 1 inch with showers continuing Saturday morning, according to Mrs. Dick Thompson.

Outbert--Inch or more in area of Alexander's Store, according to Mrs. G. C. Erwin.

Rogers, also northwest of Colorado City--Up to 1.3 inches with sprinkles continuing Saturday morning, according to R. A. Walker near the old Rogers school. Thursday measured .70 and Friday .60.

China Grove, northwest of City--A. R. Thompson reported .80 inch Thursday and .20 Friday at his house.

Buford--Wind blew open cellar door at Bud Loving's and broke his rain gauge Thursday See RAINS Page 5

# Funnel Near Dunn

# 2 Drouth Aids

## Acreege Applications Soon

Mitchell County's ASCS office expects to begin taking applications this week for emergency haying and grazing of acreage diverted under Cropland Adjustment Program.

The program was one announce-

ced Friday for Mitchell County by Texas State Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Office.

Also approved for the county is assistance under the emergency livestock feed program. However, procedure for applying for the grain program will not be set up until after a regional meeting of ASCS county officials in Brownwood tentatively set for Friday.

Both programs were requested recently by Mitchell County Disaster Committee in the wake of long term drouth conditions.

Going to the Brownwood meeting will be Don Stewart, ASCS executive director here, and members of the ASCS county committee -- Curtis Latimer, Ed Roach and Warren Anderson.

The diverted acreage program will permit seasonal grazing and harvesting of hay through June 30, 1971, where applicable on land retired from production under the CAP.

It's benefit to county farmers and ranchers under current conditions will be limited.

The emergency livestock feed program will provide assist-

tance to those eligible livestock owners who furnish a financial statement and meet other requirements.

Delivers of CCC-owned grain can be made from approved warehouses. After the program is set up and agreements approved, county ASCS office will make requests for CCC grain for anticipated 30-day needs. Terminating date for the program will be not later than June 30, 1971.

"The requirement for financial statements is disagreeable," said Stewart, "but it will have to be met.

The grazing and haying program on CAP land will provide grazing with reduced payment -- \$1 minimum first 2 months and 50 cents minimum the subsequent months.

Application for the 2 programs was made to State ASCS headquarters in College Station after the committee pointed out that only a half inch moisture had fallen in the last six months.

Coupled with only 12.1 inches of rain in all of 1970, the drouth had caused pastures to be depleted, breeding herds culled and livestock ponds to go dry for first time in 25 years.

them to the meeting a birth certificate showing their child will be 6 years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1971," said Kelley Principal Esten Blackmon.

Parents without birth certificates for their children should write for certification, Blackmon said, and this address will be furnished parents at the Wednesday registration.

Evidence of smallpox vaccination is another requirement for the first-grader student. Blackmon also recommended immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, poliomyelitis, tetanus, measles and mumps.

The prospective students will visit in first grade classrooms during the program to become acquainted with school facilities.

If a child cannot attend Wednesday, the Kelley school office should be notified, Blackmon said.
