## Funeral Rites Held Sunday For Z. T. Davis

The death of Z. T. Davis, popular furniture and hardware dealer in Lamesa, came as a distinct shock to his relatives and many friends. Mr. Davis, apparently in very good health, passed away some time Friday night, April 18, probably about 4 a. m. It is presumed that his death was the result of a heart attack.

Mr. Davis had been in the hardware and furniture business here for about thirteen years, moving here, with his family, in the spring of 1923, from the Dakotas, where he was engaged in the ranching industry and had extensive real estate holdings. When a very young man, Mr. Davis was president of the Evans Overland Transportation company, and later operated a chain of hardware and furniture stores out of Sioux City, Iowa. He was instrumental in the development of the English walnut industry on the Western coast, planting one of the first walnut groves in that section, at Dundee, Oregon.

Mr. Davis had been a faithful member of the Episcopal church since he was a very young man and was also a member of the Masonic lodge.

Funeral services were conducted from the First Presbyterian church in Lamesa, Sunday, April 19, at 5 p. m., with Episcopal services under the direction of Rt. Rev. E. Cecil Seaman, Bishop of North Texas. Interment was in the Lamesa cemetery.

Survivors are his widow, one daughter, Elizabeth Lee Davis; two sons, Frank Smith Davis and Louis Lytle Davis; and three brothers, Wm. L. Jas. J. and Louis L. Davis, of Tacoma, Washington.

## ENROLLMENT INCREASES IN CCC CAMP HERE

The Lamesa camp has been designated as an enrollment center and recruiting station in the Lubbock district CCC.

Wednesday morning, April 22, 61 men arrived at the camp from Dawson, Martin, Gaines, Borden, Howard, Midland and Ector counties. These men received physical examinations, and personnel records were completed for them.

In the future the enrollment of the Lamesa camp will be stabilized at one hundred fifty-seven. Thirteen of the new enrollees will remain here and receive employment in the local soil conservation program. The others will be transferred to Lubbock from where they will travel by train to Animas, Lordsburg, and Deming, New Mexico, for assignment in camps there.

## DAWSON COUNTY TO GET CENTENNIAL MARKER

The Commission of Control for Control of Texas Centennial Celebration has advised J. D. Dyer, Dawson County Centennial Chairman, that Dawson County has been allocated a monumental marker and the following inscription has been verified for placing on it: "Dawson County, created February 1, 1858. Re-created August 21, 1876, from Bexar territory, organized Feb. 13, 1905. Named in honor of Nicholas Mosby Dawson 1808-1872, who fought at the battle of San Jacinto and fell at Dawson's Massacre, Lamesa, the county seat." There are interesting facts and will likely inspire considerable interest in local history.

## School Day Observed By Luncheon Club

Tuesday was observed as school day by the Lamesa Luncheon Club with school board and faculty members as special guests, and an appropriate program was enjoyed by over 30 members of the club.

The High School Girls' Quartet entertained with two beautiful numbers, and little Miss Carolyn Lou Tillman captivated the entire club with two lovely little readings.

W. K. Crawley, president of the Lamesa School Board, was introduced and gave a very interesting explanation of the financial set-up of Lamesa Independent School District. Mr. Crawley stated that the school was one of the largest businesses in Lamesa, involving an annual budget of over \$66,000. The taxable valuation of the school district is well over \$3,000,000, with the tax rate being \$1.00 with \$45 going into the sinking fund to pay interest on bonds and \$55 to the maintenance of the school. The aggregate salaries of the teachers for 1935-36 will be \$37,181; of this amount less than \$7,000 is paid from local taxes, the greater portion of it being paid by the state. Mr. Crawley reminded the Club that the school had grown from an enrollment of 291 in 1921 to a total enrollment of 1393 in 1936. In 1921 the number of teachers was 12, with an average of 25 pupils per teacher. Now, however, there are 35 teachers with an average of 40 pupils per teacher.

Fred Sanders, the "Silver Tongued Orator" of the school board, was introduced and gave a very interesting resume of the work of the various departments in our school system. Mr. Sanders praised very highly the faculty of the Lamesa schools, stating that none better could be found. V. Z. Rogers responded and said that much of the success of Lamesa schools should be attributed to our splendid school board, which is made up of some of the busiest men in Lamesa, yet who were willing to give of their time and services, without remuneration, to the cause of education.

## Junior Texas Ranger Force Announced

Dallas, Texas—In a recent interview, Colonel Louis, featured character of the radio program, 'Riding With The Texas Rangers' announced plans to organize a Junior Ranger Force immediately for children of the Southwest.

"The Texas Rangers are idealized by nearly every boy and girl in this section of the country," the Colonel said, adding, "We believe children everywhere will welcome this opportunity to enlist in Kellogg's Junior Ranger Force—an organization that will attempt in every way, to pattern itself after the high standards set by those men who have played such a great part in the rich traditions of Texas."

To encourage enlistments, the sponsor is offering a Junior Ranger 'Commission'—a full-color certificate printed on parchment paper and counter-signed by the Colonel and W. K. Kellogg, in return for a corn flakes package top.

Explaining the constructive purposes behind the plan, the Colonel said, "Every boy and girl enlisting, promises to live up to our Junior Ranger pledge: 'I'll be brave, honest, obedient, and always keep my eyes open for danger.'"

"After receiving their commission," he continued, "the Junior Rangers are then entitled to apply for their badge and 'confidential orders.'"

The badge is a five pointed star within a circle, designed directly from the official Texas Ranger shield. It is nickel-finish metal with "Kellogg Junior Ranger" etched in black on the face.

"Riding With The Texas Rangers" is a quarter-hour radio program of range songs and true stories of Texas Ranger adventures, broadcast every Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoon at 5:30 over stations WFAA-WBAP, KPCC and WOAL. Inaugurated last summer by Governor Allred, the program is said to be one of the most popular radio features for children in this area.

## Uniform Traffic Signs Make Highways Safer

Traffic control by signs, signals, and regulations is one field at least, in which country-wide uniformity would be highly desirable, says the Bureau of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture. Variations by local authorities offer no advantage, and are likely to cause accidents.

Recently a driver passing through a strange city was responsible for the death of a pedestrian at an intersection. He ignored a red light not in the standard position to which he was accustomed in his home city. This death was not a result of speeding or willful violation of the law, but was the result of variation in local practice.

The Bureau of Public Roads has cooperated with the American Association of State Highway Officials and the National Conference of Street and Highway Safety in issuing a Uniform Vehicle Code recommended for adoption by the States.

Both sets of recommendations have been widely adopted. The Bureau believes they should be made universal.

"Several thousands of acres of land were practically ruined for cropping purposes by erosion and many thousands more seriously depleted before soil conservation work was really started in Texas," Bentley said.

"Conservation work by means of terracing started in Texas on the eastern side, but in a very limited way, some 50 years ago. It was about 1914 before any considerable acreage was terraced. During 1916 about 56,000 acres were terraced. And during the last ten years, from a half to three-fourths of a million acres have been protected

with terraces each year.

From this it will be seen that there is a considerable momentum in Texas for soil conservation work to be undertaken under the new agricultural program.

As soil conservation work spread into West Texas it was found that the running of the lister furrows and the subsequent crop rows on the contour gave good results as a soil conservation measure, at least temporarily. Now in West Texas thousands of acres of row crops are planted on contour lines in order to conserve the rainfall and soil.

Some terracing has been done in 220 of the 254 counties of the State, according to Bentley. The total for the last 20 years run to about nine million acres. Checking out possible duplications due to the need of re-terracing considerable acreage, Bentley estimates conservatively that some seven million acres are either terraced or contoured or both, at this time.

"The new farm act to be based on the conservation of our soil," comments The Farmer-Stockman in an editorial in March 15 issue, "will be just as valuable as we make it."

"If we take the attitude that the conservation of the soil is made the excuse for paying cash benefits to farmers, we will do merely those things necessary to get the money."

"But if we accept the act in the spirit in which it is being offered, it will mark the turning point in the farm industry in the southwest."

"Up to this good day we have mined our soil of the store of fertility which nature put in it. Few of us have farmed to maintain the fertility. That farm is an exception which is as fertile as the day it was broken out."

"That sort of farming can't continue sooner or later it runs its course. The gullied hillsides and the dead, hard soils which contain no longer a proper store of humus testify to our destruction."

"In the past five years we have done, in total, a fine lot of terracing. But the known total of land terraced as compared to that needing terracing, does not comprise a record of which we can be proud. The big job is still ahead of us."

"In fact, we have not yet reached the point that we are holding our own. We are losing soil faster than we are saving it. This new program can reach every farmer in the South during the first year of its operation. If we wholeheartedly accept the program, we can, in 1936, make a most definite start in conserving the soil resources on each and every farm."

"This new farm bill will be offered to every farmer engaged in growing any of the major crops. Thus the set-up is perfect for getting the maximum results in the shortest possible time. If we do our whole part, we will find at the end of three to five years that we have stopped our loss of soil and have, at last, started the process of building back to a once more productive agriculture."

## FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

### Terracing Demonstration Field Day Well Attended

Approximately one hundred fifty people attended the terracing demonstration held at the R. E. Echols farm Tuesday. At least fifty of these were farmers and the balance were CCC boys interested in learning how to build terraces. At the demonstration eight different types of terrace building machinery were in actual work building terraces, which included the large county caterpillar tractor and grader, CCC tractor and grader, two smaller terrace builders, pulled by farm tractors, two fresnos pulled with teams and one pulled with smaller tractor two terrace plows pulled by teams.

According to several of the men who visited the demonstration, it was one of the most complete terrace demonstrations ever conducted in the county. It is found that one quarter of mile of complete terraces can be built daily with two fresnos with three head of work stock to each. That one mile of complete terraces can be built with the larger tractor and grader, for a cost of approximately \$25.00 per mile.

The smaller graders or terracers did not put up the terraces as fast as most of the visitors expected. There was quite a lot of comment as to the progress made with the fresnos and due to the fact that farmers usually have more time than money the use of fresnos seems to be the one that is the more practical for the man with stock feed and of little cash, showing that on an average thirty days of work will be required to build terraces on the average quarter section of land with five miles of terraces to be built. While if one wants to build the terraces in a short time the larger outfit would be used usually at the average quarter section would require an expense of approximately \$125 for a complete job.

The CCC boys did the labor in demonstrating the different types of machinery in actual construction of the terraces. While the Commission

er of Precinct No. Two furnished the large tractor and grader with the men who did the work in building one of the terraces.

According to many of those present the demonstration was a highly successful one in every respect.

**Farm Program Plans Go Forward**

College Station—The whole purpose of the new farm program is to help farmers plan their farming operations so as to conserve their soil and enable them to reap greater returns from the land in the long run," Jack Shelton, vice director and state agent of the Texas Extension Service, announced in reviewing some of the major problems of the new program.

He also pointed out that diverting crops of soil depleting nature into soil conserving crops would pay the larger cash grants under the rulings of the new farm program.

"For the most part, the common, well-established soil building improvement crops and practices already in use by Texas farmers will receive recognition throughout in planning the program to fit Texas farms," Shelton said.

The temporary State Soil Conservation Domestic Allotment Board plans to apply the national farm program to Texas so that it will best meet the needs of the Texas farm people in carrying out their cropping systems.

Shelton also said: "Farmers must keep in mind that a separate base acreage will be established for each of the following crops: cotton, peanuts, rice, and sugar cane for sugar."

"The new farm program as applied to Texas is being pushed with all the resources of the Texas Extension Service to put it into the field as soon as possible," Shelton concluded.

**Spring Fever Urge  
May Lead You Into  
Trouble; Be Cautious**

Austin—Spring fever, that seasonal malady which accompanies the first warm days and early blossoms, has become more or less of an epidemic. Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer, reminds the citizens of Texas with some suggested precautions.

The most outstanding symptoms of spring fever is the urge felt by both old and young to get out into the open as often as possible. While people are getting all the benefits possible from contact with Mother Nature, Dr. Brown urges the use of common sense precautions.

"Some of the glamour has been taken from the swimming hole by the modern pools," Dr. Brown said, "but it is more than offset by the sanitation and safety devices which promote health and save lives. Swimming now can be learned by everyone without the needless sacrifice of lives and without the constant threat of typhoid fever which is a hazard of every out of the way swimming place.

"With the first excursions into woods and fields in quest of wild flowers, everybody should remember that about 75 per cent of snake bites occur on the lower extremities. Snake bites could be prevented to a large extent by wearing boots or heavy leggings and being cautious.

"If one should be bitten by a rattlesnake, prompt action is necessary and a physician should be obtained as soon as possible. No time should be lost in removing the poison by suction. Apply a tourniquet above the wound and make cross-cut incisions over the fang marks. Suction should be applied for at least half an hour. The most dangerous fluid is farthest away from the wound; its absorption must be prevented every 10 or 15 minutes at a time.

"Obtain the services of a physician at the earliest possible moment."
