It would express gratitude, he said, of American Poles, Jugoslavs, and Czechs for what America and Wilson did towards the independence and territorial integrity of Poland, Jugoslavia and Czechoslovakia. Sponsors of the movement propose to erect the monument in Washington, D. C., at a cost of \$200,000.

U. S. DIVORCE RING IS INVESTIGATED

MONEY ARRANGES SEPARATIONS IN MEXICAN STATES

1 MAN ARRESTED WHEN FEDERAL OPERATIVES OPEN BIG PROBE

(By the Associated Press)
PHILADELPHIA, Mar. 16.—Federal officials today were investigating an alleged ring to obtain divorces fraudulently.
Agents of the ring, the headquarters of which are believed to be in Mexico, Yucatan, is said to have been operating in New Orleans, San Francisco, Philadelphia and other American cities.
For \$500, prospective clients, it is stated have been promised divorces within thirty days and without the knowledge of the other spouse.
Question One Man
Postal authorities, who have questioned Gordon Disharon, say he has admitted that he sold nearly 100 divorces within the last year. His business card, the inspectors say, bears his name and in one corner is the word "divorce." On the reverse side is printed:
"Divorce in thirty days. No legal cause necessary."
Transactions absolute confidential.

Government agents visited Disharon's office yesterday and brought him to the federal building for examination. No charge was preferred and he was permitted to return home with the promise that he would appear for questioning.

Postal inspectors said the State Department at Washington would be asked to investigate any illegal practices emanating from Yucatan.

Terms Are Easy
Yucatan, Morelos, Sonora and Sinaloa are the Mexican states having the easiest laws affecting foreigners. Their laws require legal residence of only a month or less and do not require residence at all when the divorce is being sought by mutual consent.

Recently a Nogales attorney sent out a price list for divorces in Sonora, promising a 20 percent split to other lawyers who brought him cases. The expenses of a mutual consent divorce were given as \$562.50.

The terms within which a divorce is granted according to law is 20 days, it settles everything in three days, the attorney promises.

Want 'Em By Correspondence
The Mexican consul in Tucson, Ariz., is said to be receiving inquiries from divorcees.

Four of the children are dead and the others, their mother and Lawere are in a serious condition.

Colonel Coolidge Is Slowly Losing Life, Says Doctor

PLYMOUTH, Vt., Mar. 16. (AP)—Colonel John C. Coolidge, whose condition had shown some improvement during the two days, lost strength slightly today. This was the substance of a bulletin issued about 12:30 o'clock today by his physician, Dr. Albert M. Cram, of Bridgewater.

TRICKERY ENDS BRIBE CHARGES

Grand Juror Made Proposition To Official, Reporter and Others Discover

(By the Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Mar. 16.—The story of how a grand juror secretly listened to an alleged bribe offer resulted today in clearing Harris Bell, city recorder, of charges of attempting to bribe a member of the grand jury.
Justice of the Peace Tannehill dismissed the complaint on the grounds that there was no evidence.

The complaint was brought by George W. Boring, member of the grand jury which investigated state highway contracts. Boring said Bell had offered him \$100 to have an indictment against Bell quashed.

Conversation Is Heard
William Richardson, foreman of the grand jury and M. G. Landrum testified they listened over a microphone to a conversation in Bell's office in which they testified that Boring and not Bell made the bribe offer. W. S. White, Austin newspaperman, testified he heard the same conversation while hidden behind a bookcase in Bell's office. These three testified that Bell had arranged for them to listen in because he declared he had been approached by Boring with the bribe offer. They said that Boring offered to quash a supposed indictment against Bell if Bell would return to him on a charge of perjury. According to the story related by the three witnesses, Boring said he was hard up from crop failures and was in a position to swing the grand jury.

Boring, on the other hand, testified he had not made the offer.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Mar. 16. (AP)—Two Danish aviators, Lieutenants Boie and Henschel, flying separate planes, hopped off today on an attempted flight to Tokyo. Their route will take them over Germany, Poland, Rumania, Bulgaria, Turkey, Persia, India, Siam, Indo-China and China.

Coolidge Answers Pleas of Negroes

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16. (AP)—Asked today to define his stand on the Dyer anti-lynching bill, President Coolidge informed a delegation of the National Colored Republican Conference with headquarters at Jersey City, N. J., that he stood on his last message to congress in which he declared that negroes "should be protected from all violence and supported in the peaceful enjoyment of the fruits of their labor."

The Dyer bill has been pending for years, but all attempts to pass have been futile.

DRYS FROM NEAR TOWNS VOTE AND BOLSTER BALLOT

PLAINS PEOPLE GETTING IN ON OPPORTUNITY OFFERED HERE

Out of approximately a million and a quarter votes that had been tabulated at noon Tuesday in the nationwide prohibition referendum carried on by NEA service through over 700 daily papers in the United States, the wet faction, including both those seeking repeal of the Volstead Amendment and those seeking its modification to permit sale of light wine and beer are still leading by a good majority, but the lead is slowly being cut down as the dry percentage of the total vote passes beyond 25. The lead of wets has slowly been cut from 15 per cent on the first tabulation until now the drys hold a little more than 25 per cent of the total ballots.

Drys Continue Lead Locally
Locally the dry element continues to race along well in the lead, for out of more than 30 votes received in one mail at the Daily Journal office today, only two favored modification of the amendment and the sticklers for return of saloons were winning.

Now coming in through the mails from all portions of the Plains, including points to the north as far as Kress, on the west to Muleshoe, on the south to Lamesa and on the east to Spur. An occasional ballot comes in from greater distance.
Muleshoe evidently will not return of wet goods in any manner, for out of more than a dozen votes received Tuesday from there, not a single vote was polled against prohibition. Plainview is just about equally

WARNING GIVEN CHINESE REBELS

Four American Destroyers Go To Swatow To Guard Rights Of American Citizens

(By the Associated Press)
PEKING, Mar. 16.—The United States and other powers today delivered an ultimatum to Chinese factions demanding that the blockade on Port Tientsin be ended.
The ultimatum, signed by signatories of the protocol of 1901, was handed to the commanders of the forts at Tientsin. The United States, Great Britain, Japan and Italy have a loan or more naval craft in those waters. The protocol of 1901 made stipulations concerning the disarmament of forts at the mouth of the Pei river on which Tientsin is located, and also guaranteed an open way to sea.

Ships Back Peking
The blockade has been preventing access to Peking from the sea, and recently resulted in Chinese troops firing upon two Japanese destroyers.

TOYKO advices early today were that the Japanese cruiser Hiyado had been ordered to the mouth of the Yalu river from Port Arthur. A Manila dispatch last described the departure of four American destroyers for Swatow, China.

The notion of the powers was made known to the Chinese foreign office in the following memorandum, forwarded by the Doyen of the diplomatic corps:

Action Is Stated
"In order to maintain the general treaty right to intercommerce and the right of free access from the capital to the sea, provided in the protocol of 1901, the powers concerned demand:

INJURED FARMER TAKEN FROM BED BY ARMED GROUP

GROVETON MAN HELD FOR MURDER MEETS FATE IN SCHOOL FEUD

(By the Associated Press)
GROVETON, Texas, Mar. 16.—Frank Johnson, tenant farmer charged with the murder of Homer Gibson at Center Point, 15 miles North of here last Friday night, was dragged from bed in his home near that place late last night and shot to death by unidentified men.

Johnson was under arrest for the slaying of Gibson but had been so badly cut in the affray at the house that he had been left under surveillance at his home until physicians should advise that he was able to be moved. His throat had been badly slashed and other wounds inflicted. Johnson was in a bed with his baby when the slayers burst their way into the room. Realizing what they came for, he begged them not to kill him, there with the baby, according to reports here. So the men took hold of his feet and dragged him out of the room and he was shot to death.

Friend Just Left Him
Sheriff's guards and friends of Johnson both had been about the Johnson residence Monday night and had been in his room a short time prior to the killing, but he had told them he could not sleep with them present and had asked that they leave him alone. A short time after they left the party of men that killed him appeared.

So far as could be learned here no one recognized the slayers.

Trouble Over School

The scene of the shooting is almost on the line between this Trinity and Houston counties. In fact, it is believed that trouble that led to killing of both Gibson and Johnson, had its inception over a quarrel over whether the Johnson children were entitled to attend the school at Center Point which is in this county.

Harvey Johnson, brother of Frank, is in the county jail also charged with the murder of Gibson.

There is considerable tension in the Center Point community. The sheriff has gone, and the accent that is finding it difficult to get definite facts on the tragedy.

Another Charge Is Filed On Shippers

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16. (AP)—In addition to all of its other troubles, the shipping board was accused today of intimidating ship owners into withdrawing their commendations for reorganization of the board and the fleet corporation.

Chairman Scott of the house merchant marine told the committee at a meeting that such charges had been laid before by owners of American vessels, he did not name. The shipowners complained that the board threatened to withdraw commendations their attitude on shipping legislation the chairman said, unless they changed as expressed at the national merchant marine conference held in Washington last November unanimously in favor of the chamber of commerce of the United States.

Family of Five Is Victim of Flames

DES MOINES, Mar. 16. (AP)—A family of five, Donald Trichell, his wife and three small children, were burned to death when a kerosene can exploded as Mrs. Trichell was kindling a fire in their home today. Trichell lost his life in the burning farmhouse, after he had carried his children from the building and returned to rescue his dog. The other members of the family died in a hospital here.

Menus for the Family

BY SISTER MARY

Breakfast—Tangerines, bacon in cream gravy on toast, bran and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.

Luncheon—Toasted vegetable sandwiches, baked rhubarb, plain cake, milk tea.

Dinner—Stuffed calf's heart, steamed rice, carrot timbales, stuffed celery maple custard pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Since children under ten years of age should not be allowed to eat the dinner meat a nourishing dessert is planned, making the usual protein dish of most unnecessary for them. Left-over vegetables are reheated in a cream sauce to which cheese is added. The creamed vegetable is served between crisp triangles of hot toast and a "toasted vegetable sandwich" is the result.

This stuffed calf's heart is a savory dish that is worth trying during the spring months.

Stuffed Calf's Heart

One calf's heart, 3 pound lean veal, 2 slices bacon, 4 tablespoons stale bread crumbs, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 2 eggs, salt and pepper.

Wash heart through several waters and remove veins and arteries. Let stand in cold water to more than cover for two hours. Drain and dry. Put veal and bacon through fine knife food chopper several times. Mix with bread crumbs, parsley, onion, salt and pepper. Very little salt will be needed since the bacon is salty. Add eggs and mix thoroughly. Fill heart with this forcemeat and stew. Sprinkle heart with salt and pepper, roll in flour and brown quickly on all sides in a hot frying pan. Put into a deep casserole, add boiling water to half cover, cover casserole closely and cook two and one-half hours in a slow oven. Add more water is necessary. Make a gravy with the liquor in the casserole and pour over heart on a deep platter.

SLATON IS PLEASED WITH VOTE ON POTASH BILL

Special to the Daily Journal. SLATON, Mar. 16.—The potash appropriation bill which Senator Morris Shepard has just introduced before the agricultural committee of the senate has been passed on favorably, to the satisfaction of this section of West Texas.

Lubbock county will be in position to receive a part of the \$2,700,000 appropriation if the bill is passed. Geologists who have been making surveys near Slaton relative to the location of an oil and gas test well, have announced that they believe a potash field of considerable size is located at a shallow depth in Yellowhouse canyon, according to S. E. Stages, local oil dealer. All preparations have been completed for the sinking of a well the acreage has been secured, the necessary finance arranged for, and the contract is to be let within a short time. The geologists who are working on the project, believe that they will be in position to give complete information as to the potash deposits when the well has been sunk and they are able to make tests of the underlying strata of soil.

If the federal government makes the appropriation, \$500,000 will be available each year for five years for development of the potash possibilities of West Texas.

Many Fascist notables were present.

The proceedings here constitute the closing chapter of what is considered the most important case since the Dreyfus trial in France. Matteotti was the arch enemy of Premier Mus-

solini and his murder, which anti-Fascists charge was ordered by the premier, excited tremendous struggles between Italy's dominant regime and its opponents. The defendants are Amerigo Dumini, Albino Volpi, Giuseppe Viola, Amelito Favaroni and Augusto Malausa.

EASTLAND BOY IS STELLAR TEXAS ATHLETE

AUSTIN, Mar. 16. (AP)—Maurice Staller, of Eastland, captain-elect of the 1927 Texas University basketball quintet, has established a remarkable record in athletics since entering the state university in the fall of 1923. In 1924-25, the first season he was eligible for intercollegiate athletics, the Eastland product earned letters in football, basketball, and track, thus becoming a member of the select group of "three-letter" performers in one year.

Staller's record is all the more remarkable because he is only a youngster being only 20 years old. He weighs only 160 pounds, but is sturdy enough to stand the roughest going on a football gridiron. Because of his "peaches and cream" complexion, Staller is known as "Rosy" by his team-mates and other university friends.

"Rosy" was a regular halfback on the 1925 eleven of Coach "Doc" Stewart. Because he was such a splendid interference runner, he was not used a great deal to "tote" the pigskin. He is an excellent handler of punts and the perfect fashion in which he handled the wet slippery ball in the Texas-Baylor game of 1925 was a big factor in a Loughorn victory over the Baylor Bruins.

Thanksgiving Day at College Station, where the Texas Aggies put over their great 25-0 win over the Longhorns to win the Southwest Conference championship, Staller did not fumble a punt, though "Mule" Wilson kicked a ball hard to handle and the Farmer ends were tackling fiercely.

This past basketball season, Staller was a regular forward until he was forced to undergo an operation for removal of his tonsils. Though not a flashy player, he is very steady, an excellent floor worker and a hard fighter. He should make an ideal leader for the 1927 combination, a quintet that promises to go far in the race for the Southwest conference title.

Staller is now a member of Coach Clyde Littlefield's track and field squad, and is showing better form in the hurdle races than he did last year. AS OTHERS SEE US

From the Kansas City Times:

Governor Ferguson of Texas has
announced his intention to be a can-
didate for re-election for the purpose
of vindicating her husband, former
Governor and present Gov. Emeritus
Jim. This sounds alarming. Mrs.
Ferguson, as we understood it at the
time, was elected governor for this
same purpose of vindicating former
Governor Jim. How long a process is
this vindication business anyhow?
Just when and by virtue of how many
terms as governor for Ma may Pa's
vindication be understood to be com-
plete?

"If in some states there is recognition
of the soundness of the policy of
making governors ineligible for re-
election, may not Texas ultimately
have to contemplate the necessity of
limiting the number of vindications
to which a former governor may be
entitled? Otherwise the issue is like-
ly to become confused. Say, for ex-
ample, that Ma's present term has vin-
dicated Pa for anything he may have
done when he was governor in his
own right. Very well, that's that.
But now the question arises, is he en-
titled to another vindication for any-
thing he may have done since Ma has
been governor? If so, justice de-
mands, of course, that Ma be re-elected,
because there is no doubt that our
whole political system is founded on
justice, although there is some doubt
as to whom. But under this theory
isn't it going to be a little difficult to
keep our vindications straight? There
would have to be some provision for
determining where one vindication
ended and another began. If Ma is
now re-elected to vindicate Pa there
ought to be a statute of limitations or
something to fix a period for the run-
ning of that vindication, else of course
Ma could demand still another term
to vindicate Pa for anything he might
do during her latest incumbency.

"It's too loose a system, we fear.
Granting that ours is government by
vindication there must of necessity be
a specific application of its benefits if
it is not to be abused. Officeholders
undoubtedly are entitled to vindication
for themselves, but if they can de-
mand it for members of their fam-
ilies there's no telling where the sys-
tem may lead. It has dangerous pos-
sibilities, not the least alarming of
which is that it threatens to keep vin-
dications in the family and to bar all
other deserving citizens to whom vin-
dication may have its attraction.

"Before this process goes any farther
Texas probably ought to have an
understanding with vindication seek-
ers. Legislation probably is indicated.
One vindication to a gubernatorial
term, or one to a family, perhaps,
would ease the situation. As is so
often observed, and with such trust
and wisdom, there ought to be a law."

GARZA COUNTY CONTRACT LET

Dallans Concern Will Erect a
Bridge On Post Highway;
To Cost \$15,000

The Austin Bridge company, of Dallas, was awarded construction contract on the 647 foot bridge that is to be built across the Yellowhouse canyon in Garza County at an approximate cost of \$15,000, according to advice received at the office of Geo. A. Field, Division Engineer of this city today.

The bridge, to be built of concrete, will span the canyon on State Highway No. 84, east and west through Garza county at a point about nine miles east of Post. It is to be an eighteen foot roadway, with a ten foot clearance above the quicksand in the bed of the canyon which at flood periods is exceptionally treacherous.

Construction work will start in the near future, and will be finished in approximately two months, local officials said, if weather conditions do not hamper the work. Garza county and the state highway department will supply the finances on a fifty-fifty basis.

In this connection, bonds on a similar project in Kent county have been voted, and plans are now in the course of preparation for a bridge between Jayton and Claiborne that will be approximately 200 feet longer than the one in Garza county. This will span the east fork of the Yellowhouse canyon.

Completion of these two bridges will eliminate two of the greatest hazards on highway No. 84, which is indisputably the most direct highway route between Fort Worth and Roswell, going on an almost direct east and west course, and will undoubtedly be the cause of diverting a great deal of New Mexico traffic from the north and south routes, opening up a state highway that has been dodged on account of the hazards from quicksand in the canyon beds at the two points.

G. O. P. WAR IN TEXAS GOES ON

Cranger Replies To Chief of
Party In Denunciation
Of Recent Letter

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16. (AP)—A. B. Cranger, Republican national committee member from Texas, in a strongly worded letter to Representative John G. Tilson, Republican leader of the house, repudiated the letter that is the subject of the national committee to help the Republicans to Congress and not to endeavor to influence primary races.

Mr. Cranger's letter, which was in answer to a communication from Representative Tilson, repudiating Congressman Harry Wurzbach of the 14th Texas District, whom the Republican organization in Texas is seeking to defeat for re-election, was made public here yesterday. Mr. Cranger, who is visiting in Washington, stated that his letter also was in reply to one from Representative Will R. Wood, of Indiana, in which Mr. Wood endorsed the "Texas communication."

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TEST CASE FATAL TO GOVERNMENT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16. (AP)—The federal government lost in the Supreme Court in a test case by which it had sought to limit to \$33 a month the pay of civilians who trained for army officers in the third officers' training camp in 1918.

The highest court refused to grant an appeal from a lower court ruling in Ohio, which held that the student officers were entitled to \$109 paid them.

NEW YORK, Mar. 16. (AP)—The cotton market opened steady at a decline of one point to an advance of one point. Selling developed on prospects of warmer weather in the Southwest and indifferent showing of Liverpool which eased prices off to 18.55¢ for May and 17.52¢ for October, or about 4 to 6 points net lower. PLANS FOR OPENING OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS HERE NEXT YEAR GIVEN OUT BY SUPERINTENDENT DUNCAN

Plans are already under way, and virtually worked out by Supt. M. H. Duncan, of the Lubbock public school system for work in various departments next year, and such is the plan of activity that actual class work is to be entered on the opening day of school.

All high school pupils are to be classified this spring before school is dismissed in order to accomplish this latter purpose, for in the opinion of Supt. Duncan the loss of two or three days in classification of the various departments is unnecessary and a waste of time.

Those pupils not now in the schools here who will enter at the next term will be required to classify on Thursday and Friday preceding the opening of school on Monday morning, but those that are here now, and fail to classify before the opening of the next regular term, will have to await their turn after the school opens, the superintendent said.

Eight new courses will be added to the curriculum next term, Mr. Duncan said, and with the addition of these, additional credits may be allowed upon graduation. These new courses are: English history, general science, commercial arithmetic, advanced arithmetic, bookkeeping, sociology, stenography and typewriting, bringing the courses obtainable in the public schools here on a parity with the best of schools in the state, and a little above the average. An additional half unit of credit will be added in Civics, this course now to carry one full unit whereas it has formerly carried only one-half.

The following information in connection with the curriculum, and the school in general was released Tuesday by Supt. Duncan:

Sixteen units are necessary to graduation from the Lubbock high school, nine and one-half of which are required and six and one-half are elective. The following are the required subjects, four units in English, one unit in American History, one unit in Civics, one unit in the History of Modern Europe, two units in Science, and one-half unit in Advanced or Business Arithmetic. The related courses in Home Economics will count as a science. After 1927 seventeen units will be required for graduation from the high school, not more than two of which may be made in extra-curricular activities.

A unit of work is a study pursued for a period of thirty six weeks with an average grade of not less than seventy five.

Students expecting to go to college should complete at least fifteen units of work required for admission to the particular school they want to attend. Most of the colleges require for admission four units in English, two in Science, two in Algebra, one in Plane Geometry, two in History, and two in a foreign language. Students intending to go away to school should decide as early as possible on the school they want to attend and arrange their program of work to meet the requirements of that particular school. The entrance requirements of the colleges are so varied that it is impossible for a student to prepare for admission to all of them without greatly sacrificing other considerations more important. The Lubbock high school offers subjects which, if properly chosen, will prepare for any college or university in America.

Students will ordinarily carry four studies. However, students who do not fall below eighty five in any of their subjects this semester may take five studies next semester.

Students will not be allowed to classify for a subject that is more than one year below or above their present class standing.

No credit will be given for less than two years in a foreign language.

At the end of next year, the high school will ask for college credit in Stenography and Typewriting, and these subjects may be offered for admission to college on the basis indicated below. Students taking Typewriting will be required to pay a fee of five dollars per year in advance for the use of the machine.

If you do not know the contents of a course you are considering, ask your roll-call room teacher or the principal about it.

Consider your program of work for next fall very carefully before definitely making it out, for after you have once made it out, you will not be allowed to change it unless you have a very good reason for doing so.

American courts, however, have been chary of recognizing Mexican divorces. Justice Tompkins at White Plains, N. Y., refused to recognize a Mexican divorce, as did a Connecticut court in a non-support case.

"One, hostilities in the channel from Takur to Tientsin must be discontinued; two, the mines and other obstructions must be removed; three, navigation signals must be restored and not further collected; four, combatant vessels must remain outside the bar refrain from interference with foreign ships; five, searches of foreign vessels, except by customs authorities, must be discontinued.

"If satisfactory assurances on these points are not received by noon Thursday, March 15, the naval authorities of the foreign powers will proceed to take such measures as they find necessary for the purpose of removal of obstructions that prevent free and safe navigation from the channel.

Billy Richardson, foreman of the grand jury of which Boring is a member, W. S. White, Austin newspaper man, and M. G. Landrum of Austin testified at the Bell hearing they heard Boring in Bell's law office offer to quash an indictment against Bell, if Bell would pay Boring one hundred dollars.

MUSIC SUPERVISOR TO BE EMPLOYED AT LUBBOCK HI

A full time music supervisor for the Lubbock Public school system will be employed next year. It has been announced here by Supt. M. H. Duncan, in an effort to keep the public schools here abreast with demands of the modern day world. The supervisor will give two days in the system who will give actual instruction in the high school, and three days in supervising work in the grade schools.

At the high school the supervisor will have charge of all chorus classes and glee clubs and will give instructions in the theory of music, in addition to drilling the boys and girls in sight singing, glee club and chorus work.

An honest effort will be made to secure a real artist to head this new department," Supt. Duncan said Tuesday, "one who will be able to take his or her place as a leader among the musicians of the city, as this department is considered to be among the most important among the entire public school course."

In addition to the general supervisor, there will be a music teacher for each of the schools in the system who will give actual instruction in the principals and practice of music, and this subject will hereafter be on the same basis with arithmetic, history, language and other such studies, Mr. Duncan said. In short, the music course will now be considered as one of the elective courses of the system, and a grading system in this department will be maintained similar to that in the more routine courses.

divided on the question, with modification voters holding about an equal break with drys. Not a wholly wet was recorded, however.

In Texas, as a whole, the wet majority is slowly slipping away from the prohibition side, with the dry vote remaining about the same as yesterday, while the modification crowd increased their vote by several hundred.

Maryland Vote Unique
Maryland, bordering on the National Capital, continues to hold the center of the spotlight, with sentiment either for wholly wet or for strict prohibition, as not a modification vote has been recorded in the state. Out of approximately 15,000 votes tabulated to date, only 552 dry votes have been shown.

New Mexico wets are leading the dry element almost three to one with approximately 7,000 votes tabulated. The drys hold 1,872 votes out of the total.

Oklahoma drys are running neck and neck with both opposing factions, with the latter two holding a slight lead. Out of approximately 21,000 votes tabulated, the drys are only eleven votes short of 10,000.

The national total as shown in the noon report Tuesday is 1,218,274, with 224,160 drys, 401,466 for repeal, and 592,648 for modification. The tabulation by states is as follows:

COMMITTEE SEEKS SCOUTS CAMP NEAR POST

Boy scouts of the South Plains area council, which includes eleven counties surrounding Lubbock will have a permanent scout camp and recreational park, if plans instituted here are given approval of the heirs of the C. W. Post estate who have been asked to set aside a certain tract of land near the city of Post for the purpose.

A committee, headed by Senator W. H. Bledsoe, composed of Dr. Paul W. Horn, R. J. Murray, Kenneth N. Kemp, L. S. Harkey and W. O. Stevens, all of whom are enthusiastic scout supporters, recently made a trip to Post for a conference with C. W. Bardwell, manager of the estate there in connection with the proposition, and in addition to this have drafted a letter to heirs of the estate which will go out from Mr. Bardwell seeking approval of the plan by heirs.

Mr. Bardwell has promised his personal assistance in the matter in any way that he may aid in securing the grant, and has said that he will take the matter up with heirs of the estate at the earliest time possible.

Selection of the tract desired has been made, consisting of one section of ranch land centering around the old Llano ranch headquarters about 4 miles southwest of Post. The location is considered almost ideal in every respect, and is about as near the center of the South Plains area council as can be found. The ranch house on the tract is believed to be one of the oldest in this part of the state, and around it centers some of the most romantic history of the entire southwest, for all evidences point to the fact that here many Indian battles were engaged in.

If the grant is made, and leaders of the movement believe that such will be the case, improvements to make of the place one of the most beautiful scout playgrounds in the southwest, including a dam across the canyon for a lake, and various other phases that will be in keeping with the scout program. The place would be known as the C. W. Post Scout camp, and would be used not only as a summer camp, but for week end jaunts and outings for boy scout organizations all over the South Plains council.

The Lubbock chamber of commerce and Board of City Development took steps at a meeting of the Board of Directors here Tuesday morning to assist in every way possible the bill introduced in the national congress by Representative Marvin Jones, of this district, seeking a division of the federal court in the Northern district of Texas, and establishment of a federal court here.

Much data in connection with the growth and development of the southern portion of the district has been assembled by a committee named at a recent meeting, and this will be submitted to congress in an effort to impress upon the minds of the national law makers the importance of such a step. Seventeen counties are affected by the proposed division, and these counties without an exception have put the stamp of approval upon the measure.

Representation for Lubbock at the meeting in Stamford tomorrow of committees from various towns along the Lubbock-Fort Worth highway via Dickens and Breckenridge was brought up at the meeting and W. K. Dickinson, vice president of the association formed at a meeting in Spur recently, and Garnet Reeves publicity manager of the chamber of commerce were named as representatives from here.

At this meeting it is expected that a name for the association will be selected, and many matters of great interest to all towns concerned will be discussed. Although the entire route of the highway as proposed is now under designation by the state highway department, it is the purpose of the association to foster and encourage the placing of hard surface on the entire route, and take steps to divert traffic from central Texas over this route that is considered to be the shortest available.

Davis to Lamesa tonight, where he with other Lubbock men, will assist further in bringing to a successful close the campaign of the chamber of commerce there which sought to increase the membership and interest in the organization. NEW ELECTION IS RULED INVALID

OKLAHOMA CITY, Mar. 16 (AP)—A prefatorial primary law passed by the last Oklahoma legislature providing that a voter must in most cases name at least two choices in order to have his ballot counted, was declared unconstitutional today by the state Supreme Court.

The court held that the requirement deprived the voter of his right of free suffrage in that he is obliged to vote for candidates whom he might oppose in order to give effect to his active choice.

"When a voter is compelled to vote for someone he does not want in order to have his vote counted for the one he does want, then the free exercise of his right of suffrage is materially interfered with and the effect is just the same whether such interference comes from a provision of the statute or from the point of the bayonet," the decision said.
