Supreme Court Rules Beer Out of Cisco

ERRORS WRIT FOR MAYHEW FIRM DENIED

AUSTIN, March 11.—(UP)—Justice Precinct Six in Eastland county cannot legally sell beer although it voted for such sales in a local option election. The supreme court of Texas today denied writ of errors leaving lower court decisions against beer to stand.

W. H. and C. E. Mayhew sought by mandamus to force County Judge Clyde Garrett to hold a license hearing which he refused. District Judge George Davenport refused to issue the mandamus. Facts agreed were that Eastland county was dry under local option prior to statewide prohibition, 1919, and prior to the beer amendment act of the 44th legislature in 1935.

Announcement of J. L. (Punk) Thornton for city commissioner yesterday brought the number of candidates to five as the ticket was drawn for the municipal election last night. Thornton's petition for his name on the ballot came just 10 minutes before closing time for the city secretary's office yesterday. Besides him other candidates include P. R. Warwick and the three incumbents, W. R. Winston, J. R. Burnett, and H. C. Henderson.

Gruesome Story of Mass Slaying Is Unraveled as Murder Charge Filed

ATHENS, Tex., March 11.—(UP)—Solution of one of the most gruesome mass killings in Texas crime history was believed near today after Sheriff Jesse Sweeten announced he had obtained a signed statement from George Patton, farmer living north of Athens.

Patton's statement explained his version to the mysterious disappearance in 1932 of J. W. McGeehe, his wife, and two children who lived with Patton.

In the statement Patton claimed McGeehe killed his wife and children, then attacked Patton, who killed McGeehe in self defense. After obtaining the statement, Sheriff filed four charges of murder against the farmer.

The statement alleged that McGeehe killed his wife and children with a club. When McGeehe attacked Patton, he took the club away from the drunken man and killed him, the statement said.

Patton then disrobed the bodies, according to the statement, placed them in boiling vats used for cooking meat, later he took the remains and burned them in a log fire in an attempt to destroy all evidence.

Patton first was questioned in 1932, shortly after neighbors noticed the McGeehes no longer were at the Patton home. The farmer was taken to Dallas, questioned eight days, but released when authorities were unable to shake his story that he knew nothing of the family's whereabouts.

House in Uproar Over Free Speech

WASHINGTON, March 11.—(UP)—The house plunged into an uproar during a debate on communism and the right of free speech today when the term "jackass" was flung at a member.

Representative William E. Ekwall, Ore., used the term in addressing Marion Zioncheck, d. Wash., during heated debate. Zioncheck and Ekwall started their exchange after Representative Walter Pierce, d. Ore., had replied to what he described as an attack on himself by Ekwall.

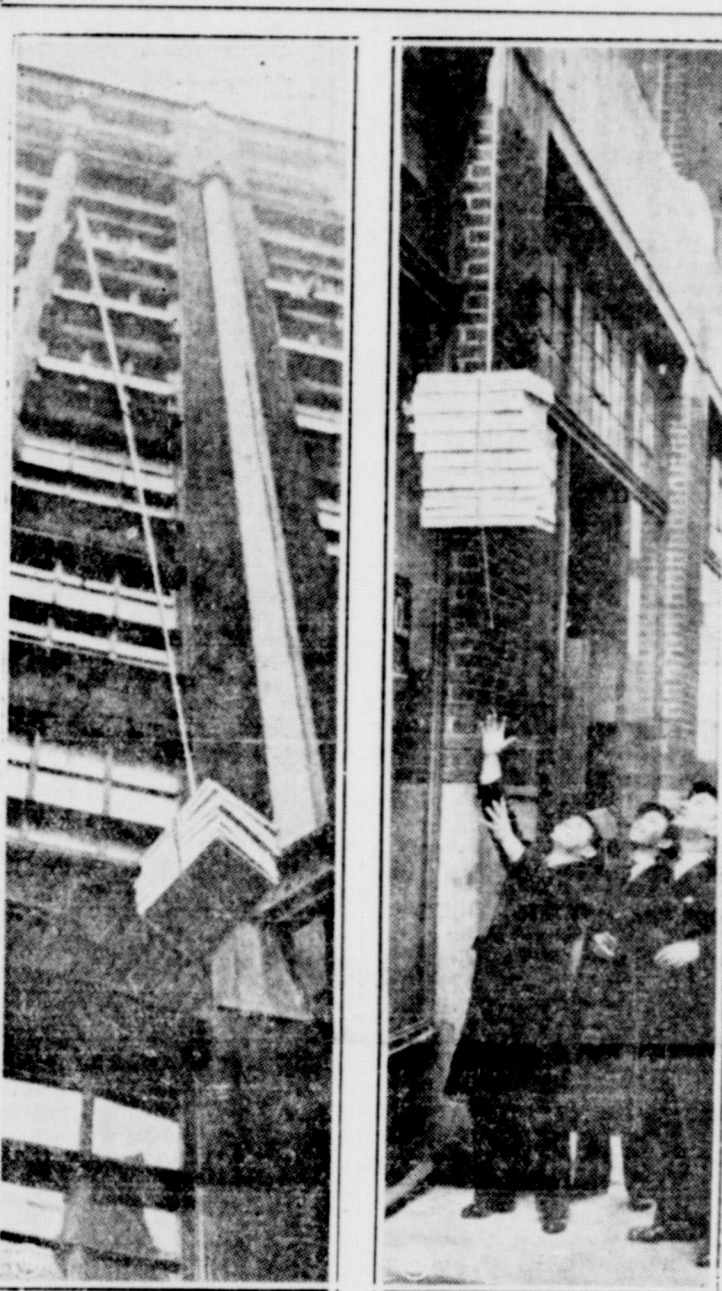
Ekwall asked for five minutes to reply to Pierce when Zioncheck interrupted. Flushing, Ekwall said: "If anybody could have made a bigger jackass of himself than the Gentleman from Washington I don't know who it is."

Senate Warns Court Of Contempt Charge

WASHINGTON, March 11.—(UP)—Attorneys for the senate lobby committee, fighting an effort to block their subpoena of telegrams, warned District of Columbia supreme court today that contempt of the senate proceedings might result from refusal to comply with a senate subpoena.

In answer to a charge that the committee's effort to subpoena telegrams from the Western Union company was unconstitutional, company counsel told Justice Alfred Wheat of the district court that a "conflict over jurisdiction" with the senate was threatened by the proceedings.

Colorful Trippers On Special Train Invite Ciscoans To Fat Stock Show

Cisco today was extended an invitation to attend the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show when 125 representatives of the Exposition Roundup Club stopped here with their special train on their invitation tour of West Texas.

The Fort Worthians were met by a Cisco delegation composed of the Chamber of Commerce, Junior Chamber of Commerce, and the Lions and Rotary clubs.

Colorful in Texas Centennial cowboy hats, bright bandanas, and cowboy boots, the Stock Show men were accompanied by their ROTC band, which played several numbers at the railroad station. E. G. Parker was trip chairman.

The trippers were to have lunch in Abilene and then go to Lubbock, Amarillo, and Childress, swinging back by way of Wichita Falls tomorrow night. They were to visit 22 towns and cities on the trip.

On board the train were Bob Calen, outstanding trick roper, who will be at the Stock Show, March 13-22; Bob and Gene McLaughlin, youngsters who will perform in the show, and other entertainers.

France Denies Aim Of Leaving League

PARIS, March 11.—(UP)—Government officials today denied categorically a report circulated abroad France had threatened to withdraw from the League.

As a compromise on France's insistence on withdrawal of German troops from the Rhineland and Hitler's refusal, the British envisage a Franco-German-Belgian pact pledging Germany not to fortify the Rhineland for 25 years. Britain and Italy would guarantee the pact.

THOUSANDS TO ATTEND, CLAIM OF ORGANIZER

Plans for a mammoth convention to draw thousands of Townsendites here April 8 were announced by E. G. Kemper, chairman of the Townsend forces for the Seventeenth congressional district.

Kemper said he expected between 15,000 and 20,000 adherents to the plan for old age pensions advocated by the California doctor to flock to Cisco for the meeting. The convention will be held outdoors, Kemper said, with seats and platforms built for the purpose.

In selecting Cisco as the Townsend plan headquarters for the Seventeenth congressional district, it was my purpose to make Cisco the base of operations for the district, not only in name but headquarters in fact also," Kemper said. "That is the reason that Cisco has been chosen as the city in which to hold the district convention, which will be one of the first ever held in the state. Those associated with me are planning to make this convention one of the largest gatherings in recent years."

National Speakers
Kemper said that there will be a number of speakers of state and national reputation at the convention.

"I was present at one of the regular meetings of the Townsend club of Breckenridge Monday night, at which there was one of the largest gatherings I ever attended. The Breckenridge Townsend club is one of the largest in the district, with approximately 1500 persons signed up as working members," he said.

"When I announced the convention to be held in Cisco on April 8 and asked for cooperation of the club members I met with a 100 per cent response. I was assured that Breckenridge and Stephens county would be represented 1,000 strong."

Many Assurances
Kemper said that this and similar assurances from towns of the district had led him to expect between 15,000 and 20,000 persons for the convention. Many persons are expected from outside the district.

Kemper denied that the Townsend plan is "the brain child of some visionary theorist" but said it is "based on facts and figures of experts actuaries, just the same as the insurance experts figure the rates of insurance."

Kemper's headquarters for the Townsendites have been established at the Daniel hotel, Cisco. He asked that persons wishing to become more familiar with the Townsend plan call him there.

Claiming to have the support of "some of the leading citizens of Cisco," he said that many people are coming to the headquarters every day to join the Townsend organization.

Knox Defines Issue In President Race

HOUSTON March 11.—(UP)—Frank Knox, Chicago publisher and candidate for the republican presidential nomination, said today issues in the approaching national election will be threefold.

The issues, he said will be "spending of the national administration and the resultant taxes, the broken promises of the president, and the kind of government that is coming out of the present program."

He said he was "pleased with the result" of yesterday's election in New Hampshire.

Death Sentence For Hitch Hiker Upheld

AUSTIN, March 11.—(UP)—Death sentence of James McAlister, ex-convict hitch-hiker, convicted of murdering Percy Calkins, Houston traveling salesman, was upheld today by the court of criminal appeals.

Calkins was slain between Alice and Raymondville by two men whom he had given a ride from San Antonio.

KING EDWARD MAY MARRY, HE TELLS NATION

LONDON, March 11.—(UP)—King Edward VIII, Britain's 41-year-old bachelor king, informed the house of commons today there is a possibility he may wed.

The news was contained in a message from the king asking commons to renew the civil list, which provides funds for the royal household and family and is set by commons at the start of each sovereign's reign.

The paragraph in the message which referred to his possible marriage, said:

"His majesty desires that the contingency of his marriage should be taken into account so that even should he be married, the provisions for his majesty's family, corresponding to the provisions which the house of commons has been willing to make in like circumstances in the past."

In the above reference to the king's family, the king evidently was referring to the possibility of his having children.

The king's announcement delighted the nation, which has long looked for him to marry and have a son to succeed him. He is Britain's last bachelor king since 1760.

Two Million Ready For Erosion Fight

AUSTIN, March 11.—(UP)—Parts of a \$2,000,000 federal allotment for erosion control was earmarked for use in the panhandle plains section of Texas.

Governor James Allred was notified yesterday that the federal department of agriculture had made \$2 million available for use in five states, Texas, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

The golfers of Cisco and the members of the Country Club who have made the grass greens possible are to be congratulated. They have taken a step in the right direction.

McFarlane, a resident of Eastland county for 18 years, has been a spudder contractor and connected in oil field work in that time and in 1933 through 1935 he was a special agent for the Texas rangers in East Texas.

He has been connected with the major oil developments in Texas for many years, leaving the county occasionally for new fields near Cross Plains, Coleman, Borger, Kilgore and other points.

McFarlane has also been a special officer for the Prairie Oil and Gas company, working at Cushing, Okla.

Wool Production Of U. S. Is Listed

The total production of wool in the United States in 1935 was 429,145,000 pounds, of which 363,145,000 pounds were shorn wool and 66,000,000 were pulled wool, according to the estimates of the division of crop and livestock estimates. This compares with a total production of 429,536,000 pounds in 1934 and a 5-year (1929-1933) average of 419,000,000 pounds. The estimated number of sheep shorn in 1935 was 45,451,000 head, compared with 46,575,000 head in 1934 and the 5-year (1929-1933) average of 44,921,000 head. The estimated quantity of wool shorn per sheep shorn in 1935 was 7.96 pounds, compared with 7.92 pounds in 1934.

The estimates of the number of sheep shorn and of shorn wool production have been revised in line with the revised estimates of sheep on farms made in February of this year on the basis of the 1935 census reports of sheep on farms January 1, 1935, and other information. The information secured by the Census Bureau on the number of sheep shorn in 1934 and shorn wool production in 1934 is not yet available. When this report is received the estimates of wool shorn per sheep for 1934 and several other recent years may be revised somewhat in some States. No revisions in the estimated wool shorn per sheep by states in 1934 and earlier years have been made at this time.

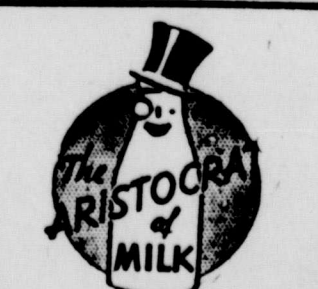
