Farwell School Board Schedules Bond Election Totaling \$260,000

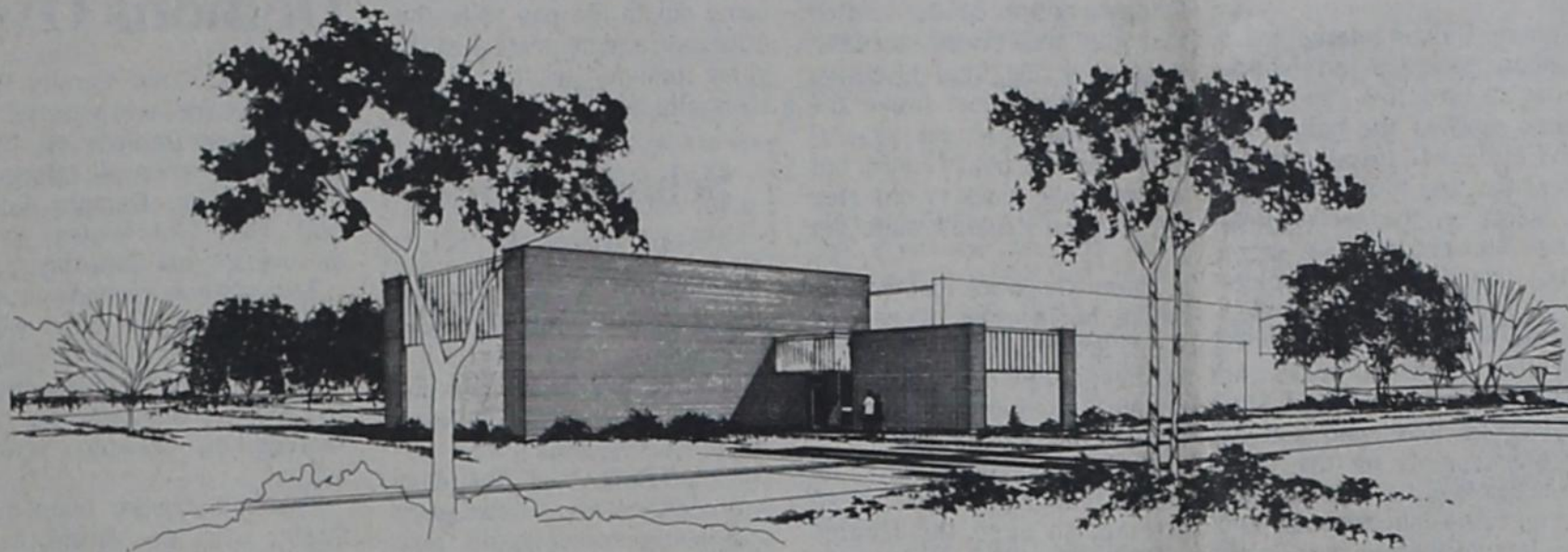
A bond election totaling \$260,000 for school improvements will be presented to qualified registered voters in the Farwell school district on Tuesday, Sept. 24, by the Farwell Independent School District Board. If the bond issue passes, the building and improvements program will include the construction of a new band hall in

an approximate amount of \$105,000; air conditioning of the cafeteria, at an estimate of \$6,000; renovation of the gymnasium and woodworking shop including dressing room facilities, flooring, electrical and windows, for an approximate cost of \$65,000 all together.

Other improvements scheduled would include renovating and relocating lights and bleachers on the football field, with an estimate of \$38,000; paving, costing approximately \$27,000; and a concession stand, with an approximate cost of \$15,000. The latter item is optional depending on funds available.

Both property owners and non-property owners may vote in the bond election, and all persons should bring their voter registration slips with them to the polls.

Polling place will be the Parmer County Court Room. The polls will open at 8 a.m. and will close at 7 p.m. CDT on Sept. 24. Absentee voting will conclude Friday (today) at 5 p.m. (Continued on Page 4)

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Texico Band Boosters Discuss Fund Raising Projects, Events

The Texico Band Boosters Club met for a called meeting on Monday at 7:30 p.m. MDT in the Texico school cafeteria, with president, Jim Rogers, presiding.

Those attending the meeting discussed selling magazine subscriptions as a money-making project and decided to go ahead with plans for the sale in the near future. Alta Gerles was appointed by president Rogers to be the coordinator of magazine sales.

Band students will be selling subscriptions over a 10-day

period within the next few days. According to Mrs. Hadley, secretary of the club, 40 percent of the subscription money will remain with the booster club.

Monies raised by the booster club are used to help buy music and instruments and for activities and outings for students in the band.

New uniforms have been ordered for band members, with an expected arrival of sometime in January. Band booster mothers have made

approximately 50 green tank tops to be worn by band members until their new uniforms arrive. After January, the tank tops will be used by elementary students who are in the band.

Another topic of discussion during the meeting were the various upcoming area parades in which the Texico band will participate. The band will march in Lubbock on Monday, Sept. 23, at a parade opening the South Plains Fair. Several parents are planning to accompany the band members.

The band is also planning to participate in the Maize Days parade in Friona and at Eastern New Mexico University's homecoming parade.

Approximately 20 persons attended the Monday night meeting. Any person, who is interested in supporting the band, is invited to join the Texico Band Boosters Club. It is not necessary to have a child in the band in order to join, according to Mrs. Hadley. Dues have been set at \$5.00 per family.

Lazbuddie Longhorns 'Dehorned' By Wolves

The Lazbuddie Longhorns were dehorned by the Texico Wolverines 8-0 during action in Longhorn territory last Friday night.

The Wolverines got the game going when they kicked to the Longhorns who ran the ball back to their own 33-yard line. It wasn't long before the Longhorns had to punt and the Wolverines returned it to Lazbuddie's 45-yard line. Then, on the Wolverines' second play of the game, they fumbled and Lazbuddie recovered.

After a series of plays Lazbuddie was on Texico's 11-yard line when the Longhorns' number 41 tried to gain some yardage only to be stopped by Wolverine Tommy Galvan.

Lazbuddie's quarterback attempted a pass but his efforts were foiled when Tony Summers and Sammy West tackled him and the ball went to the Wolverines. The Wolverines moved the ball to their own 23-yard line then fumbled on the following play with Lazbuddie recovering.

Lazbuddie's fullback carried the ball to the Texico two-yard line but the Wolverine defense wouldn't let the Longhorns make the touchdown and the ball went to Texico with 50 seconds left in the first quarter.

After several plays, Wolverine Roger Pace forced his way through the Lazbuddie line to Texico's 18-yard line and the first quarter ended with the

score 0-0.

Action in the second quarter began when the Wolverines punted to the Longhorns who ran the ball back to Texico's 35-yard line. The Longhorns were pushed back to about the 45 and held there until they got a pass to an end who ran to the 25-yard line where he was tackled by Steve Harrington.

A penalty moved Lazbuddie back to the 40-yard line and they were forced to punt with the punt being downed by a Longhorn linebacker. After a few plays Texico had to punt to Lazbuddie but the Longhorns didn't keep possession very long.

Tommy Galvan intercepted a Longhorn pass and ran it back to the 48-yard line. The Wolverines worked the ball down the field until Pace pushed across the line to put the first six points on the scoreboard. James Steward ran the extra points which put the Wolverines ahead 8-0. The half ended with the same score.

In the second half of action, both Tommy Galvan and Steward broke loose and almost put more points on the Wolverines' side of the scoreboard. Harrington also broke loose for near touchdowns on two punt returns. Richard Hadley recovered a fumble when Summers struck a Lazbuddie runner and made him fumble the ball.

The final buzzer of the game sounded with the Wolverines

still leading 8-0.

Leading rusher for Texico with 100 yards plus was Tommy Galvan, with James Steward gaining 75 yards and Roger Pace, 50.

"During the first quarter of action, we played the ball close to our end zone," stated Wolverine Head Coach Ray Manly. "We played pretty good offensive ball all night and our defense looked real tough with our offense looking fairly good. I am pleased with the performance of our players. They did a real fine job."

In further commenting on Friday's action, Manly related that the Wolverines accumulated over 250 total offensive yards. "We almost broke the game wide open on several long runs and punt returns but we were one block or one step off. We just couldn't quite get it."

Those who were inactive because of injuries were Joe West, Scott Creech and Barry Lindley, but all are expected to return to action against Vaughn tonight (Friday).

The Wolverines will be facing Vaughn tonight in an attempt to cage the Eagles with game time set for 7:30 MDT in Wolverine Stadium.

"Vaughn is tough. They beat Estancia and Fort Sumner," said Manly. "They are not real fast but they like to run outside a lot and we must control their outside running game to win."

According to Manly, Vaughn's toughest boys are Leonard Garcia and Thomas Lucero, running backs. "These two boys run from a single wing formation and Vaughn has no set running backs."

The Eagles are a seasoned and young (junior and senior) club but they can be beat, Manly related. "They are little in size and they like to run at you. They sure aren't afraid to hit you and will give it a try each time they get the chance."

Texico Coaches Manly and Kenneth Shaw ask that everyone supporting the Wolverines come out to the pep rally this afternoon and be present at the game tonight as the Wolverines clip the Eagles.

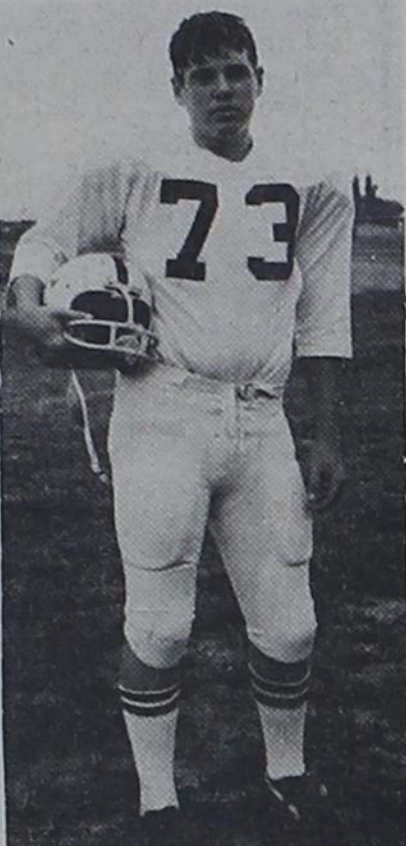

Sundown Pulls 'Lights Out' On Steers

With the Mike Waygood-Glen Fought combo, the Sundown Roughnecks made it an unlucky Friday the 13th for the Steers. The Sundowners blanketed the Steers in Roughneck territory 21-0.

Sundown won the toss and started out full steam. The Steer defense, led by Barry Goldsmith, Joe Haseloff and Clint Robertson, held Sundown. But, on the fourth down punt, Farwell drew a penalty for roughing the kicker. From there, Sundown took six plays, two of them passes, and hit pay dirt. The extra point try was good and early in the first quarter the Roughnecks led 7-0.

Farwell drew another penalty on the kick-off play, but managed to plow through for a first down on three plays by Mike Woods and George Garza. But once again, the yellow flag of the referee was thrown against the Steers, this time for clipping. The try for a first down failed and on the fourth down punt the Roughnecks drew a personal foul.

The second quarter seemed to be a repeat performance. Farwell failed to gain a first and Waygood took the fourth down punt for a return all the way for six more big ones. The Sundowners got two tries at the point after and succeeded for 14-0 early in the second quarter.

Garza took the Sundown kick-off. Gene Christian and Garza tried for a first but were stopped. The Steer defense looked good as the Roughnecks took over again. On the fourth down situation, Sundown tried a sneak play. Waygood went back for the punt, but instead of kicking, he attempted a pass. The Steers didn't fall for the trick play and smothered him before he could get the ball off giving the Steers possession.

With second quarter time running out, Christian was stopped on a play. Then pass plays to Garza and Gary Green were incomplete. On the third play illegal procedure was called on Farwell, the penalty declined and the Roughnecks took over again. Chip Craft, Robertson and Joe Haseloff stopped the next three plays, and with fourth down and eight to go, Sundown punted. Garza dropped the punt and Sundown recovered. The first half buzzer sent the Steers to the dressing room on the bottom of a 14-0 score.

During third quarter action, the Steers had possession of the ball four times but only got one first down on a plunge by Woods aided by a penalty on Sundown. During this quarter, Farwell recovered a Sundown fumble and Garza intercepted one of their passes. But, to even things up, Sundown recovered two fumbles made by the Steers.

With the fourth quarter barely begun, the Roughnecks, with assists by Farwell penalties, made three first downs. A first and 10 on the one-yard line for Sundown gave them an advantage which Faught took for another TD and the PAT was good - 21-0.

The Steers had the best ball control during the early part of the fourth period. Even with one clipping penalty, two off-sides penalties and a back-field-in-motion penalty called against Farwell, Woods, in a second and 14 situation, plowed through for a first down. Woods did it again on the third try for another first. Jack Foster caught a low, low pass that looked 'real sharp' but the Steers' stampede was halted abruptly when a pass from quarterback Lesley Curtis was intercepted by Sundown.

Farwell and Sundown each had the ball two more times but the score remained 21-0. Sundown, when the final buzzer sounded.

"We played well enough to win," said Farwell Head Coach Eugene Jennings in commenting on Friday's game. "But, we made mental mistakes and penalties. We played well."

Referring to individual Steers, the coach cited Mike Woods, who "ran with the ball real good" and defensive man Chip Craft, who "played good ball." On both offense and defense, Lesley Curtis executed real well, the coach said. "Although Curtis' passing was not real good, his ball handling was commendable."

"Our penalties and Sundown's experience are probably what beat us. Sundown is larger than we are but we're pretty equal in speed and other areas. Although Sundown is ranked fourth in state, we should have won the game and all the boys realize this fact," the coach stated.

"The turning point of the game came in the third

quarter when we had a fourth down and inches to go on Sundown's two-foot line and missed getting the first down," Jennings remarked. "Our fumbles hurt us. We had three fumbles in key positions. Our passing wasn't up to par either. We had receivers open and didn't hit for yardage."

Farwell suffered a number of injuries during the clash including back injuries to Kent Gast and Clint Robertson and a leg injury to Larry Sutton. In looking forward to tonight's game, Coach Jennings said he didn't know if these players will be returned to action due to their injuries.

Farwell will be facing a newcomer to its football slate when the Steers face the Valley Patriots in action set to begin at 8 p.m. tonight (Friday) in Steer Stadium.

"Valley will be higher than average for the game tonight. They beat their opponents last week and will be as high as a kite to win two in a row. We'll have to play real good ball to beat them," stated Jennings in reference to tonight's clash.

The coach further commented that Valley's Patriots are comparable to the Steers in size. "They're probably going to be the only team all year that's our size. And they are very quick."

Following the clash with Valley tonight, the Steers will face no opponents next week as an open date had been scheduled. Due to this lapse in play, everyone is urged to turn out and support the Steers at the pep rally this afternoon and on their home field tonight as they try for a win over the Patriots.

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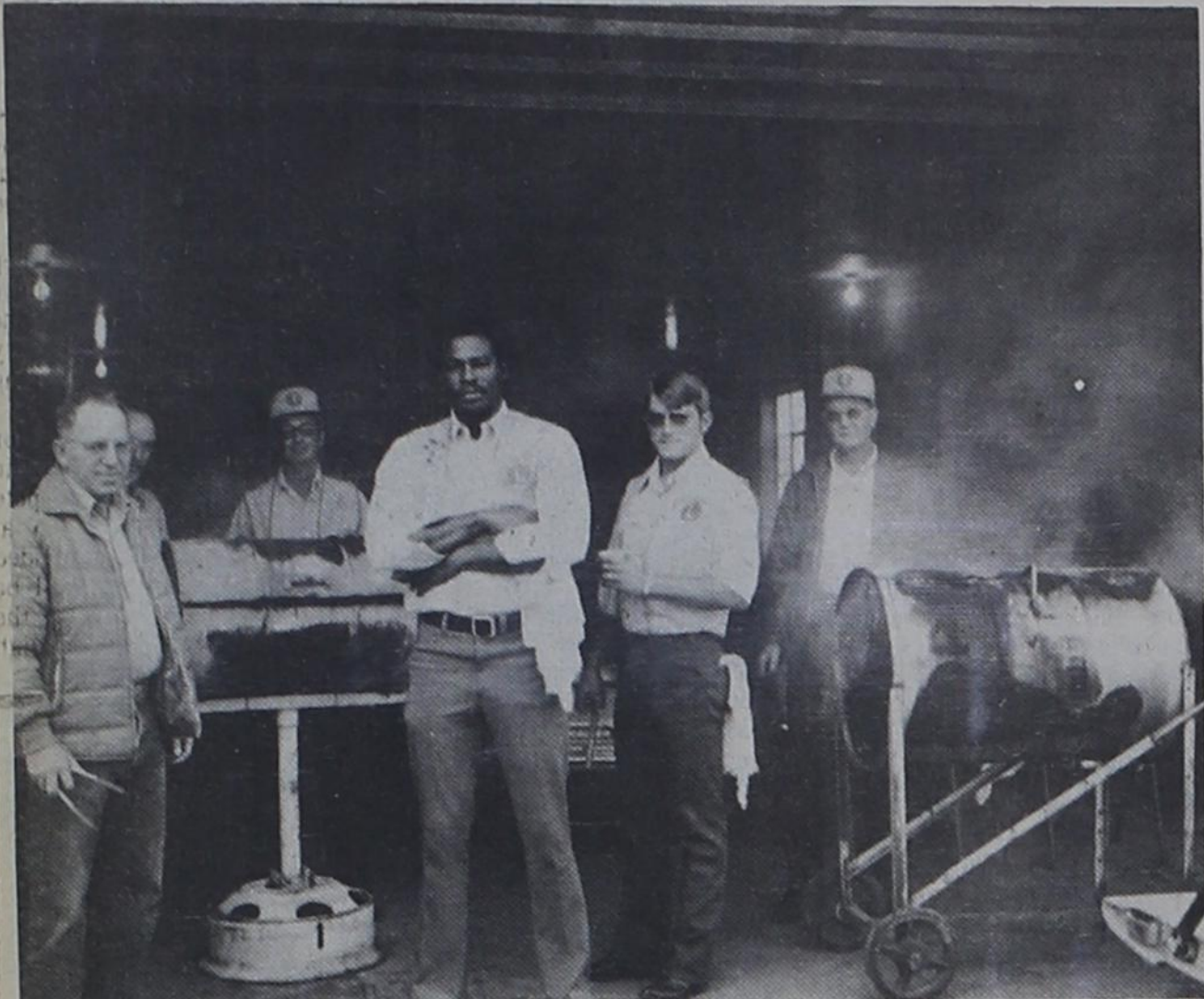

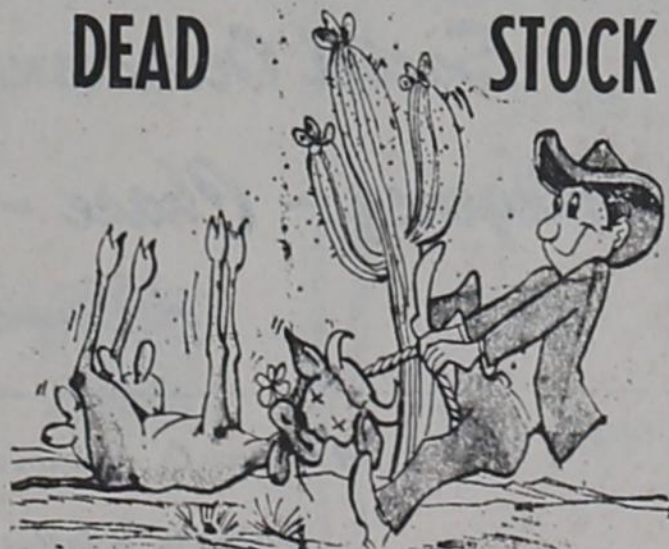

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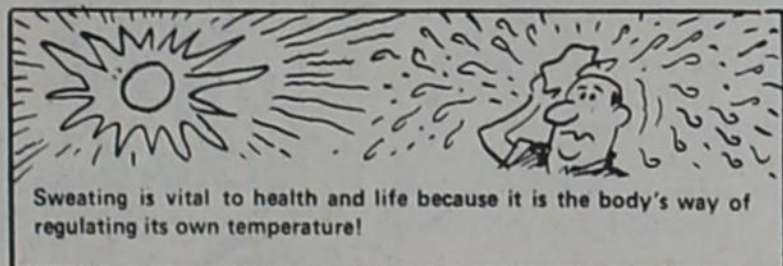
