LITTLEFIELD RECEIVES \$2,884 WORTH PUBLICITY DURING PAST NINETY DAYS ACCORDING TO RATEKIN'S REPORT

Littlefield is receiving some of the widest and most valuable publicity during the past ninety days, according to a comprehensive report submitted by Secretary Ratekin at the regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday afternoon at the College cafeteria.

According to Mr. Ratekin's statement, the Chamber of Commerce now has 350 active members, and at this time well organized and efficient service.

From March 1 to July 1 the Secretary has received news matter for the Chamber of Commerce and community to more than 3,200 copies of publicity appearing in the Star-Telegram, Dallas Morning News, and other papers, Austin Daily Oklahoman, St. Louis Dispatch, Kansas City Star, and others.

Ratekin's report shows that during the past ninety days Littlefield has appeared in state and national newspapers, and in an evaluation establishment, National Advertising Club, New York City, is worth more than 200 direct investments.

SUDAN CELEBRATED FOR THREE DAYS & BIG CROWDS DRAWN

Sudan, neighboring city to Littlefield, pulled off a three day celebration last week, beginning with July 4th, which enjoyed record breaking attendance, it being estimated that on the National Day fully 5,000 people were present. A barbecue had been advertised as one of the features, but so much grater was the crowd than anticipated, that nearly half of them failed to be served.

Features of the occasion were carnival, rodeo and baseball attractions. The game Thursday between Littlefield and Sudan teams was a close one, resulting in a score of 7-9 in favor of Sudan. Music throughout the day was furnished by the Sudan Band, under direction of Prof. Crain, and the Littlefield band directed by Prof. Bowron. In the afternoon these two bands joined forces and supplemented by musicians from Amherst and Leveland furnished excellent music for the rodeo attractions.

There were probably 500 people from Littlefield who attended the celebration at Sudan the first day. There was also a caravan of 38 cars from Morton who came in a body.

FIRST NAT'L BANK SHOW BIG DEPOSIT AT THIS PERIOD

The financial statement of the First National Bank, this city, published in this issue of the Leader reflects the favorable condition of the country at this time.

According to the statement there is at total of \$414,918.04 deposited in this institution, which is over \$100,000 more than this time last year.

Attention is called to the fact that there is no money borrowed by the bank this year, while at this time last year there was \$25,000 borrowed in addition to the use of \$75,000 bond money available.

It is further worthy of note that the surplus and undivided profits of the bank are placed in this statement at \$9,850.00, which is the highest record in the history of the new institution.

There is every indication that the country generally is in a better financial condition at this time of the year than ever before in its history since it became an agricultural domain.

It is estimated that the present wheat crop now being marketed will bring in approximately \$30,000 which will be a considerable lift during the present dull period between crops.

LOCAL CATS BEAT SUDAN 9-8 IN A TIGHT TILT SUNDAY

The Sudan Warriors invaded the Cats ball park last Sunday and gave battle with the local nine. The game lasted an extra session when the count stood 8 and 8 at the end of the ninth.

A SIGN OF SWEETNESS



"D. NEGRI, Confectioner at the Pine Apple, in Berkeley Square, Makes & Sells all Sorts of English, French & Italian wet & dry Sweet Meats, Cedrats and Bergamot Chips, Naples Diavolini and Diavoloni, All Sorts of Biscuits & Cakes, fine and Common Sugar Plums, Syrup of Caplaire, Orgeate and Marsh Mallow, Chamauve or Lozenges for Colds and Cough, all Sorts of Ice, Fruits & Creams in the best Italian manner. This was the way the tradesman's card read which D. Negri sent to his customers around the 1780's. A fairly voluminous account, wasn't it? But the poor confectioner was denied most of the other methods of advertising, and even this sending around of cards was just becoming well established, according to Ambrose Heal in his book on London Tradesman's Cards. In addition to their cards, the tradesmen displayed signs above the door. The confectioners of this period had chosen the pineapple.

Noble Fruit—Exclusive Trade

For the fruit, which had been imported from South America to Spain in the beginning of the sixteenth century, was still a hot-house plant, a luxury available only to kings and noblemen. What more natural, then, than to choose this richly flavored fruit to represent that most exclusive trade of the confectioner's?

Today the pineapple has lost its old exclusiveness, but it still retains the flavor that made it a favorite. The housewife who wants to make a pineapple "sherbert, blanshange, or a pine apple and apricock tart," as the old cards would say, has only to reach up on her pantry shelf, get down a can of the fruit and make for a few cents a dish that would have cost as many pounds in the olden days.

"Sherbert and Sugar Plums"

Here are some recipes which would have made the London confectioners die of envy, but which are easily made by any American housewife:

Pineapple Sherbet: Drain the syrup from two cups of crushed Hawaiian pineapple. Add one-half cup sugar to the drained pineapple, and cook slowly thirty minutes, stirring frequently. Mix one and one-half cups sugar and three cups water. Boil fifteen minutes, cool, add the syrup drained from the pineapple and one-half cup lemon juice. Freeze, and, when done, add the cooked and cooled pineapple mixture. Mix well, pack and let stand at least an hour before serving.

Aloha Penches: Cook one-half cup brown sugar, one cup granulated sugar, one-fourth cup cream and one-half cup crushed pineapple until a soft ball forms when a little is dropped in cold water. Remove from fire, add one tablespoon butter and beat until creamy, add one-half teaspoon vanilla and one-half cup walnuts, pour into a buttered pan and cut into squares.

Idea of Immortality Impressed on Soldier

One writer, the father of a soldier, who has been studying the phenomenon of faith in soldiers hardly more than boys who have had no previous spiritual experience, says that when a soldier sees his comrade shot down at his side he does not feel that he is dead. "He is no philosopher, but some inward voice assures him this handful of battered clay is not his comrade. He feels assured that his friend has passed on and taken with him all that composed his personality. His gaiety and courage, his unselfishness and heroism and all the endearing blend of his faults and virtues. The tragic ease with which the body vanishes from sight conveys the sense of something unreal in his disappearance. So, in his simple way, not arguing the matter or being capable of argument, the soldier assumes human immortality as a necessity of thought. He could not go on with the work of war without it."

It is hard that this central tenet of the Christian creed should ever need to be taught in this tragic way, but "the roads are many that lead to God," and if out of the bitterness and horror of war this truth shall be made a part of the soldiers' belief and of the belief of those who lose them from earth, then up from the bewildering experience of grief will arise one great cause for thanksgiving. For never was higher saying to man than the promise of eternal life.—Exchange.

COTTON SCHOOL TO BE HELD AT TECH. JULY 15-AUG. 10

Lubbock, July 9.—The cotton school a feature of the summer session at Texas Technological College, will be held July 15 to August 10. The work will be given in the well lighted and spacious textile engineering building under the direct supervision of Prof. E. W. Camp, head of the textile department. Harry E. Blockner of Lubbock, president of the Blockner Cotton Company, will assist in the school as instructor. The complete equipment of the textile department is at the disposal of cotton school students for inspection and study.

Instruction covers all principal points and fundamentals of the cotton business, including grading white and colored cottons, stapling, marketing, street buying and selling, f. o. b. buying and selling, list buying and selling, and the relation between interior buying and selling and export buying and selling. Also a study is made of cotton office practice covering all of the basic principles of book work, and clerical detail such as the making of invoices, figuring grade and staple differences and the opening and closing of a set of books especially designed for the cotton business.

There are no scholastic entrance requirements necessary for enrollment.

ANTO-PISTOL LAWS IRRATIONAL

In attempts to curb crime well-meaning people often advocate laws to make the sale and possession of small arms illegal.

It is interesting to note just what effect anti-pistol laws have had in practice. In New York, which has its drastic Sullivan law applying to small arms, there is no dearth of crime. The underworld which does not pause at robbery and murder, is not stopped by a felony law against gun ownership. Large American cities are hotbeds of crime. Yet most of them

have anti-pistol laws of some kind. As a matter of fact, the most reprehensible and best organized criminal activities, gang outrages, employ guns and automobiles almost exclusively, because of their greater destructive possibilities. It is noteworthy that in a number of communities where strict anti-pistol laws are in effect, machine guns are openly sold. A citizenry which owns guns and

knows how to shoot them protection against underworld. Laws which make difficult for the law-abiding their own object and aid to class. In one week recently 6000 pounds of wool were Rio at an average price of pound.

POULTRY

FLASHLIGHT BIG
AID IN CULLING

Shows Many Loafers Among
Layers in Hen Flock.

Literally catching the loafers napping is an excellent method of culling the poultry flock, if the culling process is carried on from week to week. Extension specialists in poultry at the Ohio State university suggest that the weekly culling may be done very conveniently with a flashlight when the birds are on the roost at night.

Birds showing shriveled combs or mott, or having empty crops, should be culled. Absence of yellow pigment is one of the indications of a good producer, and it may be difficult, under a flashlight, to determine the coloring of the eyerings, earlobes, vent, beak and shanks. If there is doubt, the birds can be isolated and examined again by daylight. The heavy egg producers will have lost yellow color from the body parts mentioned. However, the color will return should the bird cease to lay.

In the low producer, the comb is pale, small and shriveled, the vent is yellow, shrunken and dry. Eyes are small and shrunken, turning in toward the beak. Shanks are yellow, round and full, the pelvic bones close together, hard and rigid. Space between the pelvic bones and the breast bone is shallow or full of hard fat. The skin is thick and underlaid with fat. The bird is generally narrow across the ribs and hips, and the body is shallow and round.

How Much Does Pullet
Cost Till Able to Lay?

The North Carolina State college has conducted several tests to determine the amount of feed required to start a Red, Barred Plymouth Rock or Wyandotte laying pullet. In one series of tests the entire animal feed was milk and in the other meat meal. In the case of the milk-fed pullets it required 29 pounds of feed from the time the pullets were hatched till they began to lay 21 weeks later. This feed cost 71 cents. In the meat meal flock, nine and one-half pounds of mash and nine and one-half pounds of grain were used and the cost was 57 cents. Adding the cost of the chick, and other costs, the S. C. Rhode Island Red, Barred Plymouth Rock or White Wyandotte pullets just in lay would cost \$1.50 when milk fed and \$1.17 when meat meal fed. These pullets sell for \$2 each at laying time. If you have surplus milk, feed it to the growing birds.

For Early Winter and
Late Fall Production

With most ordinary flocks only 50 per cent or so of the flock is kept as aged hens, the other half being pullets, and the purpose of this is to provide for early winter and late fall egg production. Pullets, when hatched early and properly fed, will begin laying in October or November and lay quite heavily during this season of the year. Hens that are one year of age or older rarely begin laying before late December or early January. They do their heaviest laying during the late winter and early spring months. Therefore, to balance egg production it is necessary to have approximately half the flock old hens and half the flock pullets.

Poultry Facts

Birds that are not fit to be kept over as breeders should be disposed of at once.

Moldy or spoiled feed is always dangerous. It causes loss of appetite, diarrhea, fungus growth in the "inwards," and often kills the fowls.

Don't be afraid to feed oats, especially if you can get heavy white oats. They are a great poultry feed, unless too much hull and not enough kernel.

If laying fowls lose weight, give them more grain. If they're lazy, heavy, and laying poorly, cut the grain down, so they'll eat more mash.

Corn, also barley, if fed, should be given in the evening, because these feeds provide needed heat for the birds during cold nights on the roosts.

Improve your flock next year by getting some good males to breed with them. Start right now to looking or writing around and locate some good ones.

Turkeys will begin laying indoors, even in the late winter months, if they are well sheltered and given a good laying mash.

There is plenty of room for more poultry meat and it pays to keep a flock of good meat fowls that have been bred for egg production.

Don't think you have to keep Leg-horns to get eggs. Any breed or variety can be bred for egg production. It is a matter of strain more than breed.

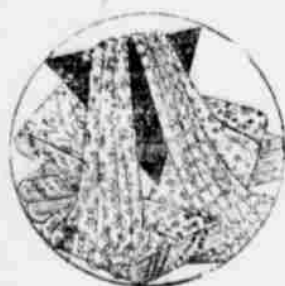

A MECHANICAL BLESSING

¶ We dare say few Littlefield citizens realize just how vital a part the motor truck plays in the agricultural life of this country. Motor trucks leave western North Carolina in the evening and the next morning they dump fresh strawberries in Washington City. About midnight big motor trucks leave Kalamazoo, Mich., and at dawn Chicago housewives are buying fresh, crisp Michigan celery. From one-fifth to one-third of all the fruit sold in New York city makes the journey from farm and orchard to market by motor truck.

During 1928 more than 12,000,000 cattle, calves, hogs and sheep were carried to market by trucks. Today this type of foodstuff is being hauled 200 and 300 miles in one-half the time it could be transported by rail, and at much less expense. To the actual observer there may seem to be but few trucks on the highway. But it must be remembered that they operate at a good rate of speed, and thousands of them travel only at night. Everybody benefits. The producer gets his stuff to market quickly and more economically; to him this form of transportation means increased profits, and to the consumer it means food freshness at no higher cost than he would otherwise have to pay for stale stuff. The farmer is enabled to get his produce to market at any time of year—and everybody has to eat.

Today the motor truck, a vehicle undreamed of 25 years ago, is proving one of the greatest blessings that has come to humanity in the history of the race.

VACATION ADVICE

¶ We believe it was King Solomon who said: "He that despiseth little things shall perish by them." What he meant was that the man who fails to watch the pennies will perish for want of that which pennies will buy.

We asked a Littlefield man the other day the secret of his ability to still maintain a bank account. He kept his large family so nicely and replied: "I have always looked out for the pennies."

Just now when our boys are out of school and earning a few pennies in the vacation season is a good time to acquaint them with this man's secret and old King Solomon's wise words.

A few words of advice on saving and thrift may put them on the road to success and comfort in their old age. You at least can't lose anything yourself by offering such advice.

You can't expect much reverence for the courts in a land where everyone knows whether the accused is innocent or guilty but nobody knows what the jury will do.

DO YOUR PART

¶ In conversation with a physician a few days ago we learned that next to the fly the mosquito probably has caused more deaths than almost any other insect. He declared mosquito control should be considered an investment, not an expense.

Mosquitoes do not generate disease, as does the fly, but can carry disease germs as readily and spread death as quickly. In fact, they are far more dangerous than flies in carrying malaria and typhoid. They can only breed in quiet or stagnant water, in such places as swamps, ponds, roadside pools, backyard puddles, rain

barrels, gutters, tin cans and old bottles full of water.

There is but one sure way to exterminate them, and that is to wipe out their breeding places. And there is no more fitting time to start on such a task than today. If Littlefield residents will join hands in eliminating all such places as may exist about their premises and will at the same time mow their weeds—and keep them mowed—we will have a community free from this dangerous pest and one blessed with good health throughout the entire summer. One single colony of mosquitoes can easily start an epidemic of disease. But if every citizen does his duty in the matter of eliminating breeding places we will not have even one mosquito family left. But to be effective the work must start now. Tomorrow may be just one day too late.

A COSTLY GRAFT

¶ Government reports show the Post-office Department deep in the hole for the last fiscal year, yet no one is surprised. As long as it is burdened with inconsistent rulings; as long as it engages in the printing business, furnishing printed envelopes below the cost of material, it will continue to lose money.

There's no more excuse for the government being in the job printing business than there is for it being in the shoe business. Yet it prints, at a huge loss to the taxpayers of this country, millions of envelopes that should be turned out by job printing offices—a fine graft for the concern that has the printing contract but a little rough on the public pocketbook.

Don't be surprised to hear that this department loses millions annually. The surprise is that we go right on electing men to congress who haven't the nerve to take this department out of the printing business and set it to doing what it was originally intended to do, and no more—to handle the U. S. mails.

Any gentleman who can change a tire in the presence of women and children with the thermometer at 90 degrees and remain a gentleman is a gentleman indeed.

CUT OFF COMMISSION OF APPEALS— VOTE FOR LARGER SUPREME COURT

In 1875 when the present State Constitution was framed Texas had perhaps a million inhabitants. The new constitution provided for a Supreme court of three justices.

In 1928 Texas had five and a half times as many people as in 1875. In property values—increases in which naturally contribute to litigation—the growth has been even more remarkable. From the \$249,000,000 assessed values in 1875, the total has steadily climbed until it is nearly \$4,000,000,000 or sixteen fold. Population and property increases, bringing human beings into closer contact than when Texas was largely a pastoral State, have increased the possibilities of litigiousness by geometric rather than arithmetic progression.

But the number of Supreme Court justices remains the same—just three.

In other words with five and half times the population and sixteen times the property values and with the increased likelihood of litigation that comes from the growth of such factors three Supreme Court justices are still striving—to the best of their ability, it is only just to say—to dispose of the vitally important litigation that ultimately must reach them for final adjudication.

It is virtually a matter of course that in spite of efforts to aid them through commissions of appeal, they are falling so far behind with their labors that citizens of Texas, vitally concerned in speedy and final adjudication of their legal controversies, are materially suffering.

That in brief is the genesis of the pending constitutional amendment to be voted on July 16 next and back of which is the strength of the Texas Bar Association and the Texas Press Association membership, together with the support of many thousands of other thoughtful citizens of Texas who believe in the axiom that justice delayed frequently means justice denied.

From the Texas of 1875 to the Texas of 1929 is a far cry. Today it is one of the greatest States in the Union in population and wealth; probably the greatest in its possibilities for future development. And the attainment of that development, very many well informed and thoughtful Texans believe, is being delayed and hindered by an unsatisfactory court system out of which has grown a very general demand for court reform. One of the first and most essential steps toward that reform, lawyers rather generally agree, is the adoption of the pending amendment which would increase the justices of the Supreme Court to nine, abolish the Commissions of appeal (with their six judges) and require the Supreme Court to remain in session continuously twelve months in the year instead of the nine months it is permitted to sit under the present constitutional provision.

Even in the constitutional convention of 1875 a strong minority, headed by John H. Reagan, was able to envisage the Texas of future years and insisted on a larger membership of the Supreme Court. But they were outvoted and ever since Texas has been trying by one means or another to meet a situation that has grown constantly worse. An amendment in 1892 created the Court of Criminal Appeals, and authorized the

Legislature to establish Courts of Civil Appeals, but it left the membership of the Supreme Court unchanged. The makeshift of Commissions of Appeals had been tried in the meantime and found wanting, but the same attempted method of relief was resorted to in 1918 when the Supreme Court docket became so congested as to make emergency relief imperative. But opinions of these Commissions are not binding unless and until approved by the court itself, which thus makes the oral arguments brought out.

No permanent relief, lawyers rather generally contend, can come from any other means than a constitutional amendment under which nine judges, with co-equal authority, can handle the ever-increasing litigation that must go eventually to the court of final resort.

Today there are eleven courts of civil appeals, whose decisions may be taken to the Supreme Court for review; these courts in turn are fed by 253 county and 106 district courts. And because of increased litigation there is constant effort to increase the number of civil appellate courts further to deluge the Supreme Court.

Confronted with a serious situation and impressed by the urgent need of action to protect the rights and properties of the citizens of Texas, the Texas Press Association, of which the Lamb County Leader is a member, has gone, by resolution, on record as urging the people to vote on this amendment—an action taken only after scrutiny of the entire amendment and inquiry as to its purposes and effect.

GETS MORE PUBLICITY

The Chamber of Commerce in promoting the interest of Littlefield and Lamb county, has outlined a general plan, the scope of which entails spreading of publicity in the form of news matter on an extensive scale.

The last issue of the Manufacturers Record published at Baltimore, Maryland, contains five reading notices about Littlefield activities. Many other out of state papers are giving notice to this city through the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce.

Twelve parties living in other states have written they will come to Littlefield this fall in view of purchasing farms and becoming permanent citizens.

"EARTH" EDITOR HERE

A. M. Hove, editor of "The Earth," a Santa Fe publication, devoted to the development of the Southwest, was in Littlefield last Monday renewing old acquaintances and making investigations relative to the growth of this particular section.

Mr. Hove expressed himself as greatly surprised at the wonderful development of Littlefield and surrounding territory during the two years past since he was here last, and predicted that this little city was destined for a great future. He stated that a near future issue of his publication would contain some valuable information regarding this town and section that would go out to more than 100,000 readers, many of whom are looking forward to homes in the great Southwest.

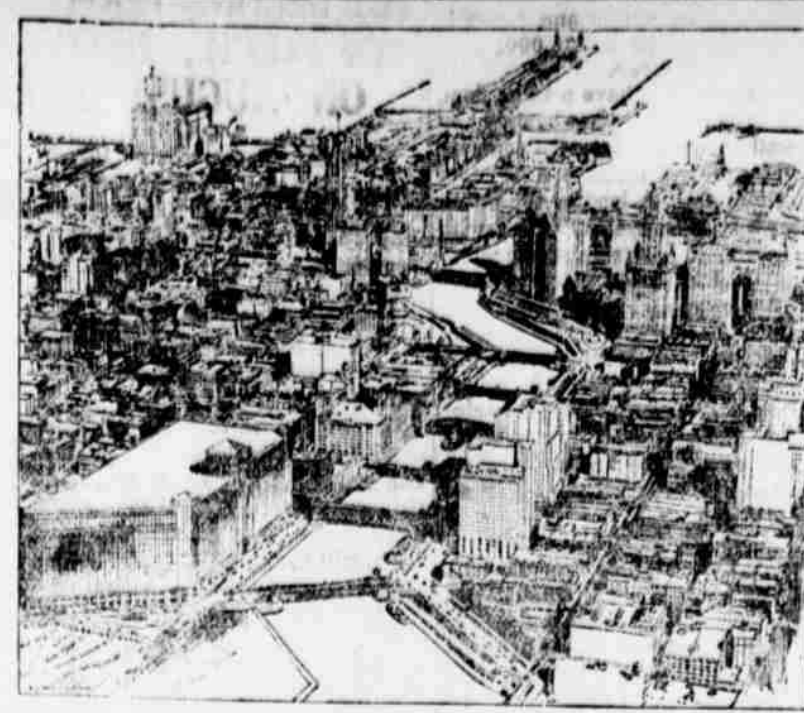

OVEREATING OR TEMPERANCE IN EATING

Of all the diabolical traditions to which modern man is enslaved the pernicious habit of overeating undoubtedly tops the list. Sir William Osler, one of the greatest surgeons the world has ever known said: "Excessive eating does more damage than excess drinking"—which can only mean that all the evils of the drink habit taken together, moral, financial, and physical, are surpassed by the direct results of immoderate eating. And yet who has not taken part in a conversation like the following:

"It's lunchtime."
 "I don't feel a bit hungry."
 "But it is time to eat!"
 "I really don't want a thing."
 "But you must eat. You'll get a headache or sick or something. You've got to eat to keep up your strength!"
 And we sit down to a table and gorge ourselves, taxing our stomachs with a load of food that it is not inclined or prepared to digest. Or else we become worried, go to a doctor, get a prescription for an expensive "tonic," and prod the appetite into a synthetic desire for food.
 This is all wrong.
 Temporary loss of appetite is nothing to worry about. For millions of years man lived in blissful ignorance of the mandate "three square meals a day." He ate only when he was hungry. Then civilization came along and originated breakfast, lunch and dinner, and man tried desperately to adapt himself to the new order of things. And in the main he has succeeded.
 But every once in a while these poor fettered bodies of ours rebel. The inborn habits of millions of years have not yet been abolished by the acquired behaviour of a mere handful of centuries. We still slay and maim and pillage as our forefathers did. And likewise—for apparently no reason at all—we suddenly find ourselves minus an appetite at the "right" time and utterly ravenous at unheard-of hours.
 So don't worry when this happens to you. Go right on about your business and wait until you are really hungry. A word about proper eating when the appetite is normal:
 Try to eat the foods that appeal to you most, provided they are sensible and nourishing. Eat only two or three different dishes at one meal and avoid those combinations that fight with each other. No matter how hungry you may be, don't fall on your food ravenously. Give yourself the pleasure of prolonging the enjoyment of eating something you like. This stimulates the entire digestive mechanism all along the alimentary canal and causes the salivary juices to pour into the mouth. Then when you swallow your food it is met in the stomach by the proper solvents.
 There is an old adage that says: "The platter kills more than the sword." Remember that. If there were any way of checking up, it would unquestionably be found that the number of people killed in war is less than the number of people who have committed suicide by overeating.

Final enrollment for the first summer term has been announced as 1,118. The next term will probably increase this to 1,500.

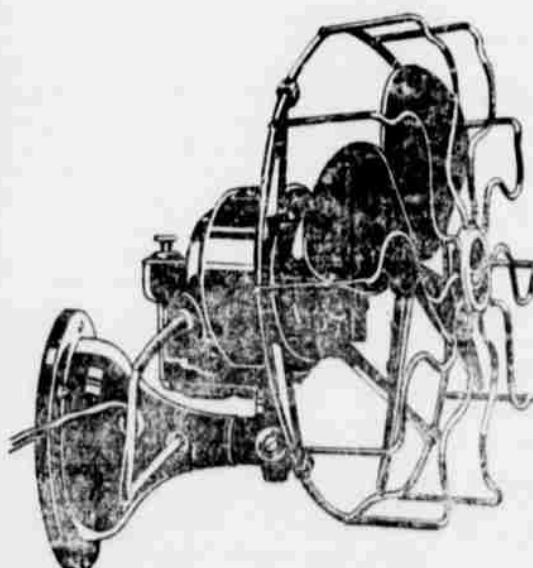

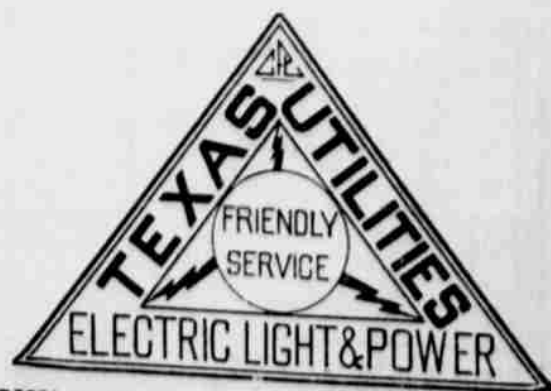

A Two-Dollar Dinner for Six

A two-dollar bill will cover the cost of this colorful dinner.

Cheese Crackers, Tomato Soup, Fried Sausages, Fried Apples, Wax Beans in Sour Sauce, Rolls and Butter, Vanilla Wafers, Cranberry Ice

THE two cans of tomato soup will cost 20 cents; cheese crackers, 5 cents; sausages (a number 1 can and a number 2 can, Vienna style), 48 cents; apples, 15 cents; wax beans (19 cents and other ingredients, 10 cents) 29 cents; rolls and butter, 20 cents; vanilla wafers, 10 cents; cranberry ice, 33 cents; coffee, 10 cents; total, \$1.90, leaving ten cents for fuel and condiments.

Because this is rather a heavy dinner, the soup can be diluted with water instead of the more usual milk. The sausages and the red-skinned apples are sautéed in the ordinary way.

To prepare the beans, bring a number 2 can of cut, golden wax beans to the boil in their own liquid. Then drain, reserving one-half cup of the liquid. To make the sauce, melt two tablespoons butter, add two tablespoons flour and pour on the bean juice. Add one-fourth cup vinegar, one-fourth cup cream, one teaspoon sugar, one-half teaspoon salt and pepper to taste. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick, then add the beans, heat and serve.

In making the cranberry ice, boil one-fourth cup sugar and three-fourths cup water to a syrup and dissolve it in one-half tablespoon gelatin which has been soaked in two tablespoons cold water. Add two tablespoons lemon juice, one-half cup orange juice, and one number 2 can of cranberry sauce which has been well mashed. When cool, freeze to a mush, add one well-beaten egg white and continue beating. When done, pack for several hours in ice and salt. This quantity, which costs 44 cents, will serve eight generously. Six servings would therefore cost only 33 cents, and the remainder will keep if well packed.

WIDESPREAD NEED FOR OLD AGE PENSIONS EMPHASIZES THE GENERAL NEED OF THRIFT

By S. W. STRAUS, President American Society for Thrift.

Considerable attention at this time is being given to the subject of old age pensions. No one can in fairness say that the hand of helplessness should not be extended to those whose years are many and whose possessions are few. Opportunities for employment are not plentiful for such as these.

Generally speaking, those who have reached the afternoon of life must depend on charity unless in their younger years they have been able to accumulate enough to furnish a living income. While it is right that every humanitarian consideration should be given to our aged dependents these humane activities should not blind us to the folly of thriftless habits during that period of life when we are able to earn and save. Even though society may throw out its protecting arms to those who have neglected to provide for their old age, this assured help in times of want does not in the slightest degree justify the neglect of safeguarding one's own future.

To shirk one's duty self willingly in this regard is to accept dependence as being quite as desirable as independence.

Every individual should rise above the plane simply of striving to protect himself against aged pauperism. His thrift should carry him to the greatest possible heights of usefulness and success. He should not be satisfied with the mere condition of material independence. Nevertheless the very fact that so much attention today is being given to old age pensions shows that many of our citizens have neglected even to care enough for their own welfare to provide against the exigencies of old age.

Let us view with generous and charitable consideration current old age pension activities but let us meanwhile do all we can to encourage widespread practices of thrift which will reduce to the minimum the possibility of old age dependence.
