AN EDITORIAL

Gorman will soon celebrate its 75th anniversary. Farmers, ranchers, professional and business men have nurtured Gorman's growth from a railroad stop to a small, thriving rural town. The majority of Gorman's citizens are, or have been, farmers or ranchers. Those who do not fit in this category are interested in the welfare of farmers and ranchers because each plays a vital role in the other's life.

It is only natural that from time to time through the years there has been a bit of nagging and fussing among our townsmen and folks in the country. It's human, the same as large families have their problems and squabbles. Like big families the argument is usually settled and everybody is happy once more.

However, times are changing. Whether it is due to the unrest in the nation and world as a whole or people just don't have the patience, forbearance and "love thy neighbor" spirit they had in days gone by, is difficult to say. It could be we have had too much, too easy, too long and just can't stand to see our neighbors get along. Going to church doesn't seem to help any more. Sunday people smile and chat — Monday through Saturday they strive to knife each other by word and deed. There is only one time when the community, as a whole, seems to join hands and that is when someone is in distress.

Little do we realize that not someone but our whole community, and possibly our whole country, may be in distress in the not too distant future. Our small towns and communities are dying fast enough without helping to kill them. Sometimes we forget that hurting someone spiritually, physically or economically may act as a boomerang and hurt us next.

For years county and city officials have worked together to assist each other — after all the city and county are nothing more than the people who live there. If in helping each other the towns and county save a few dollars, it is our dollars they are saving.

Taxes are a thorn in man's existence, but taxes are a necessary evil. Recently our school trustees asked a number of men to work on an equalization committee. Many were asked but only a few accepted this responsibility. These men spent many hours striving to work out an equitable tax. There is no such thing as an equitable tax scale, but they did their best.

Some who are dissatisfied, but refuse to serve on an Equalization Board, have decided to appease their anger by striking back at the city and county as a whole. How this will remedy the situation, no one knows.

An injunction has been filed to prohibit county commissioners and city officials from helping each other keep our city streets and county roads in good condition. If this injunction stands both city and county will be put to additional expense in buying separate equipment for this work. This expense, naturally, comes out of the taxpayers pocket — so who will gain.

Speaking of taxes — the small additional amount one might have to pay on school taxes is deductible — wouldn't it be better to spend it locally than to give it to the government to spend on foreign aid?

Isn't there some way the people in our community can solve our problems without so much back-biting, envy, jealousy and hard feelings, and court proceedings.

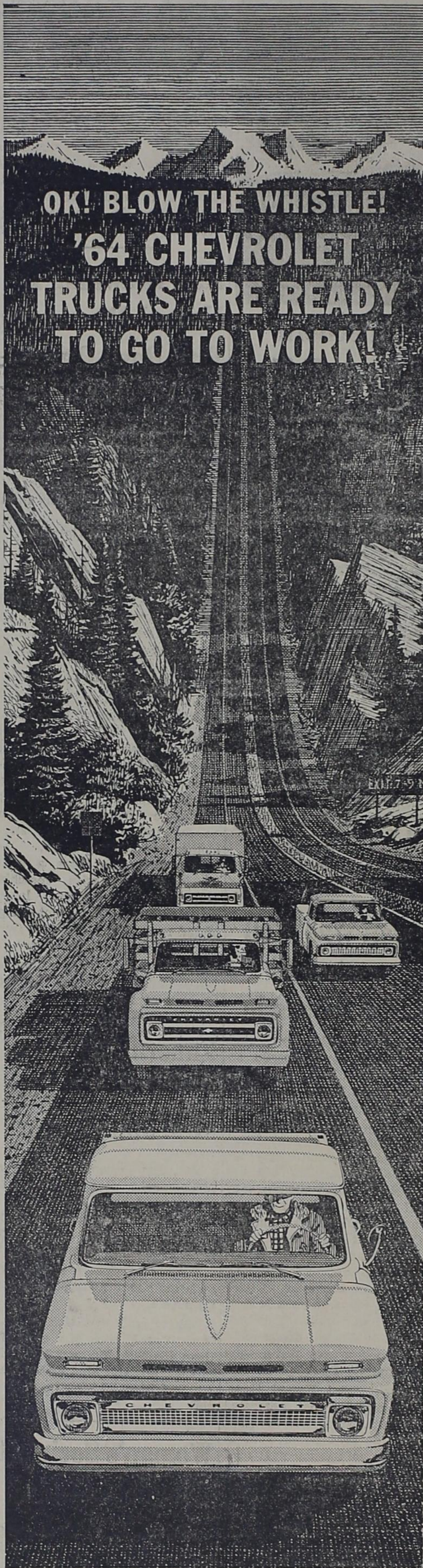
The Citizen's Band Club also assisted the Eastland Jaycees in directing the football traffic at the Peanut Bowl Game Saturday night.

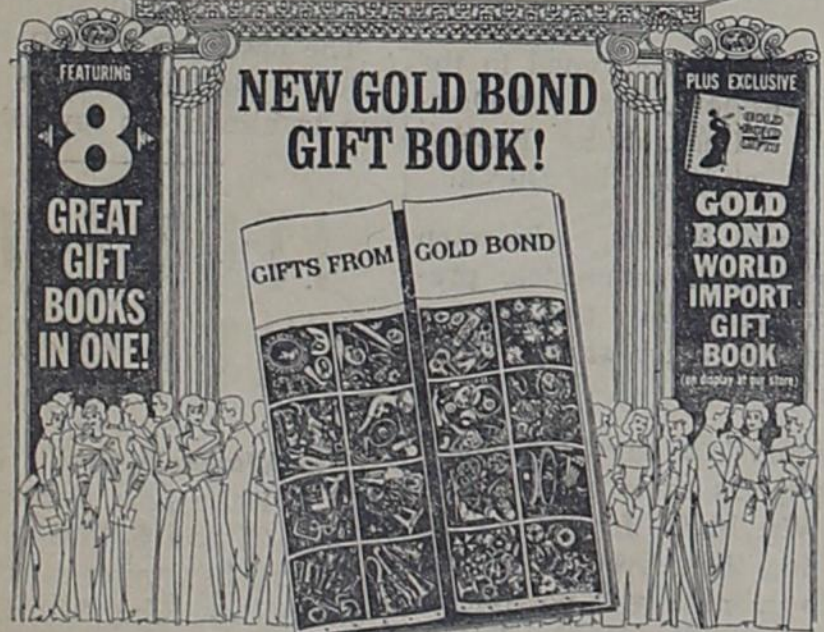

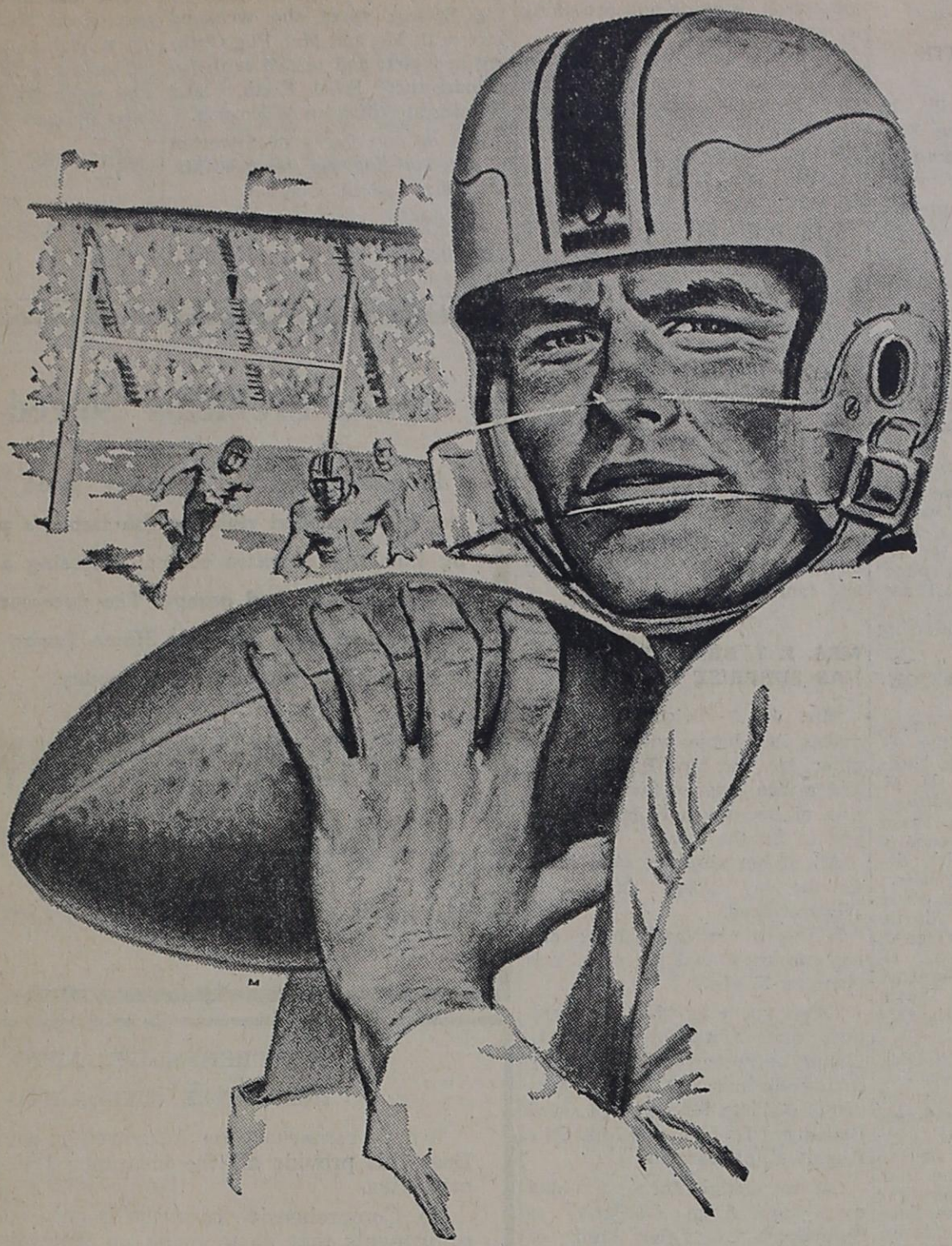

Time arrangement can be taught by helping youngsters see that it is best to stay with a job until it is finished — in order to be free later to do something else he wants or needs to do. Training in money management also can start early, for by the time a child is in school he already is using a considerable amount of money. Skillful buying habits can be taught with the money management.

some six years ago and would be glad to visit Gorman again.

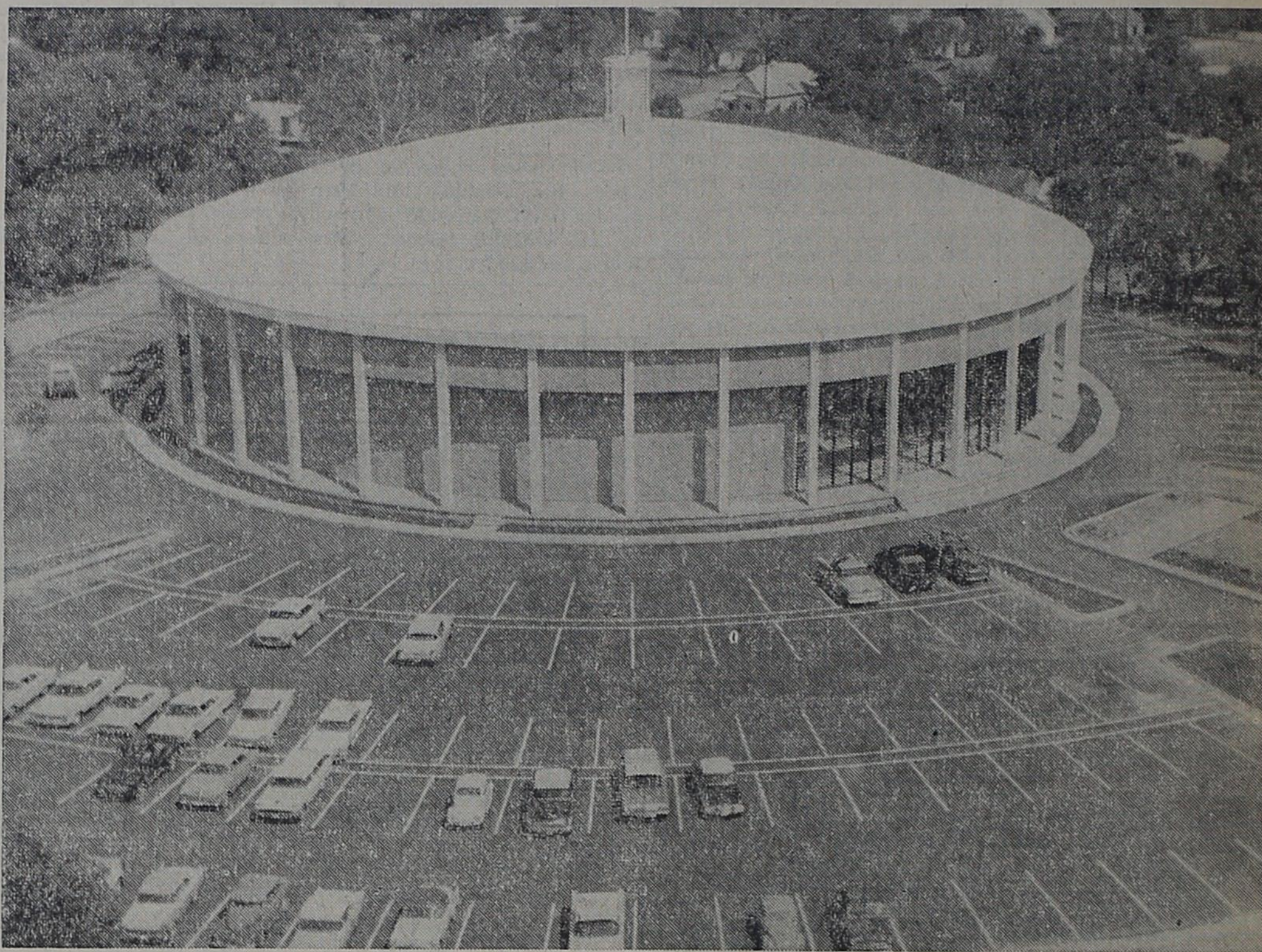
However, this is impossible as I am recovering from a stroke that hit me last December and, while able to get around, I would be unable to make a long trip.
