BULLDOGS DEFEAT RIDER, COYOTES, EISENHOWER TO WIN WICHITA TOURNAMENT

The Burkburnett Bulldogs defeated the Wichita Falls Coyotes, 54-49, Saturday night in the finals of the Wichita Falls Invitational Tournament.

The Bulldogs had defeated Lawton Eisenhower and the tourney favorite, Wichita Falls Rider Raiders in earlier tournament action.

Burk 74, Eisenhower 49
Burk breezed to an easy victory in the first game of the tournament with a 74-49 decision over Lawton Eisenhower. The Bulldogs led 23-10 at the end of the first quarter and then limited the Eagles to just two points in the same period as their lead soared to 37-12 at intermission.

Burk 72, Rider 67
Led by the superlative effort of 6-4 center John Edwards, the Bulldogs came up with a stunning 72-67 second-round upset over Rider's Raiders in second-round tournament action.

Ken Curl came up with 21 points to lead Burkburnett's scorers and it was his mark-

manship which handed the Bulldogs the final margin of victory as he pumped through a pair of pressure free throws with just 20 seconds left to put Burk out of range by five points.

Curl played exceptionally well but it was Edwards' finesse and polish, despite limping on an injured foot, which opened shots for Curl, helped the Bulldogs dominate the backboards, and accounted for his own sterling 20-point contribution to the Burkburnett coffers.

Burk 54, Coyotes 49
Lied by all-tournament selection John Edwards and Ken Curl the Bulldogs defeated the Wichita Falls Coyotes, 54-49, to capture the Wichita Falls Invitational Basketball tournament championship in Coyote Gym Saturday night.

Playmaker Curl poured in 14 points while center John Edwards dominated the boards over the Coyotes and sent 15 points whistling through the nets.

The contest was a thriller as Wichita Falls' Mark Campbell put in three straight baskets to keep the Coyotes within three points until the final seconds, but Edwards, Jerry Brown and Kenny Young sank six consecutive free throws to keep the Pack at bay.

Campbell and teammate Mike Hughes were also chosen on the all tournament team along with Hirsch's Jerry Hays and Steve Servis of Rider. The team was chosen by the coaches.

Campbell had 18 points and Hughes 11 in the final contest.

In District 4-AAA action last Thursday night, the Bulldogs were defeated, 65-58, by the Wichita Falls Washington Leopards.

John Edwards hit for 25 points and Steve Cozby had 13. The Bulldogs led at halftime, 30-28, and 47-34 at the end of the third quarter.

But 6-5 Roosevelt Manning of the Leopards, who sat out the last 2:40 of the second quarter and all of the third, proved too much for the Bulldog defense as he poured in 10 points in the final quarter as Washington came from behind to topple the Bulldogs.

LOWER POSTAL RATE FOR OVERSEAS PARCELS IS TOLD

Packages up to 30 pounds for American military personnel served by Army and Fleet Post Offices overseas now can be sent by air transportation at special low rates. Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman pointed out today.

"Area residents using this new airtail service will get much faster delivery on parcels to military personnel overseas," Postmaster Zimmerman said. He said the airtail is available on a space-available basis upon

payment of the domestic parcel post surface rate plus a flat \$1 fee.

Packages weighing up to 30 pounds and not more than 60 inches in combined length and girth qualify for the new special airtail rate, the Postmaster said.

Postal patrons can get the airtail service on packages mailed to all military personnel at APO and FPO addresses overseas, and in Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Postmaster Zimmerman noted that the new airtail also applies to parcels mailed back to the States by servicemen from these military post offices.

Parcels on which the \$1 fee is paid get air transportation all the way—from here to the port of embarkation, and from there to the overseas base. Postal patrons formerly had to pay air parcel post rates to get similar service. Postmaster Zimmerman said.

He said that in many instances the new airtail rates are considerably below comparable air parcel post charges. He cited these examples:

—A mother here sending a 15-pound package to her son in Vietnam pays \$3.35 for the new airtail service. The air parcel post rate for the same package is \$9.79.

—An eight-pound package going from here to Frankfurt, Germany, costs \$2.75 under the airtail service. The air parcel rate is \$5.87.

The Postmaster pointed out, however, that it is not always to the mailer's advantage to use the airtail service. On some light packages air parcel post rates may be lower than the airtail charges.

"Postal patrons should check with the Post Office for information on the best way to mail parcels to servicemen overseas," Postmaster Zimmerman emphasized.

The new airtail service went into effect January 7. It was authorized under the postal rate bill signed into law December 16 by President Johnson.

Postmaster Zimmerman explained that the regular postage on parcels mailed to servicemen overseas is based on the distance the package is hauled within the United States. No charge is made for carrying the package between the U. S. port and the overseas base.

Until January 7 airtail parcels to servicemen overseas was restricted to packages weighing up to five pounds. Upon payment of the regular parcel post rates, these packages get service transportation to the port of embarkation and are airtailed from there to the overseas posts on a space-available basis.

There is no charge for this partial airtail and overseas parcels weighing up to five pounds will continue to receive this service, Postmaster Zimmerman said.

HOLY REDEEMER CATHOLIC CHURCH SETS CEREMONIES FOR START OF BUILDING

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Holy Redeemer Catholic Church will be held at 4:45 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 10, at the church site on Gulf Road.

The new edifice, the first Catholic church to be built in Burkburnett, will be of brick construction, in traditional design, and will cover 5800 square feet. The auditorium will seat 210 persons.

E. B. Burton Construction Company of Burkburnett is the contractor, with building time expected to take about four months.

Groundbreaking ceremonies will include a welcome by Joseph A. Janek, invocation by Rev. Don Youngblood, pastor, First Methodist Church, and remarks by Mayor A. H. Lohoefer and Jack Aaron, president of the Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce.

The new church building will be located on a seven acre tract

given to the church by Permian Oil Company in March, 1965. The site fronts on Gulf Road and adjoins a city park, also the gift of Permian Oil Company.

Erection of the building will climax more than ten years of organized activity among Burkburnett Catholics, beginning with the holding of classes of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine for Catholic youth in private homes in 1956.

In 1958, St. Boniface Study Club was organized, sponsored by Sacred Heart Church of Wichita Falls. Members of the club visited new families in Burkburnett and found such interest in establishing a Catholic Church that they began a building fund and held money-raising projects.

Later, through the courtesy of the American Legion, CCD classes were held in the Legion building. The first Catholic mass was celebrated in the Town Hall, October 15, 1965, by Mons. Vincent Micola, of Sacred Heart Church, Wichita Falls.

In 1967, Rev. Patrick Scanlan was appointed pastor of the Burkburnett group by Rt. Rev. Bishop Thomas Gorman, of Dallas.

In addition to the money raising projects of the church members, substantial memorial contributions were received for the building fund and a grant was awarded the local group by the Extension Society, whose function is to aid Catholic mission churches.

HUMAN SPIRIT BEST HOPE

In spite of the best—or worst—efforts of the political
promisers and planners, the human spirit still lives. Un-
fortunately, it usually takes a disaster of some kind to
reveal the unlimited capacity of the spirit as well as the
limited ability of the planners.

A little over three years ago, a disaster of classic
proportions was visited upon Alaska. An earthquake rem-
iniscent of the San Francisco quake and fire brought destruction
to such cities as Anchorage, Valdez and Seward.
As the news and pictures trickled out of the stricken
area, the immensity of the catastrophe was revealed. For
a short time—a matter of hours—destruction and shock
immobilized all efforts except for an elemental struggle
to survive. Then the great submerged force of the human
spirit came to the surface.

The rebirth of the stricken area during the past three
years was lately the subject of an interesting story by
Jessie Ash Arndt in The Christmas Science Monitor. He
observed that many Alaskans expressed the sentiment that,
as long as it happened, it's best that it happened here:
"We're used to taking care of ourselves." As time went on,
federal aid, of course, played a major role in rehabilitation,
but the incentive and the initiative to get started and
keep moving came from the local citizenry. As a local
businessman remarked, "We can't wait for Uncle Sam to
do it for us. We must start helping ourselves." Now, ac-
cording to Mr. Arndt, "In Anchorage, new homes along
Turnagain Arm have replaced the 80 which slid into the
sea in 1964. . . . There are new and vastly improved port
facilities, the new Captain Cook Hotel, and many new
stores and other business buildings as well as more than
100 new homes in various parts of the city." The story is
the same in Seward and Valdez.

The human spirit, in the final analysis, is the greatest
builder of all. The recent disastrous floods that have
wrecked such havoc in major Alaskan communities such
as Fairbanks will put the spirit to the test again. Re-
building is a race against the inexorable approach to the
bitter northern winter. Despite all outside help that can
be given, the life of these communities will depend largely
upon the sheer strength and determination of individual
citizens.

A SENSE OF URGENCY

A recent meeting of the nation's food chain retailers
was pervaded by an unprecedented sense of urgency for
retailers and consumers to understand each other's prob-
lems.

The food chains have made strenuous efforts in
that during the past year through a series of "consumer
dialogues" held in cities throughout the nation. Con-
sumers sat down with chain and independent super-
market operators for no-holds-barred discussions of food
stores, food products and food merchandising. Where-
ever they took place, the discussions led to better under-
standing, and consumers found that retailers are not
robbers.

What makes understanding between consumer and
retailer so imperative is that our free market system
has in effect been put in jeopardy by consumeritis — a
term coined by Congresswoman Catherine May, who has
been a supporter of the free enterprise system be-
cause she believes it offers the consumer more pro-
tection than federal interference.

Those afflicted with consumeritis would substitute
government direction for the free market and free en-
terprise. They would cripple the competitive mass-dis-
tribution system as we have known it. In the name of
protecting consumers, they would impose economic dic-
tatorship over both consumers and retailers. That is
why it is a matter of the greatest urgency that consum-
ers and retailers in these days of rising prices under-
stand each other's problems — and the importance of a
free market to the welfare of all of us.

"Trying to cope with this year's huge labor cost
increases and those already set for 1968 is proving a
challenge of staggering proportions . . ." by all odds
the most serious problem facing the rail industry, Mr.
Thomas M. Goodfellow, president of the Association of
American Railroads, stated. He then indicated that the
railroads' 1967 capital spending for plant moderniza-
tion will amount to about \$1.5 billion — 20 per cent
down from the previous year's all-time record but still
the third highest ever.

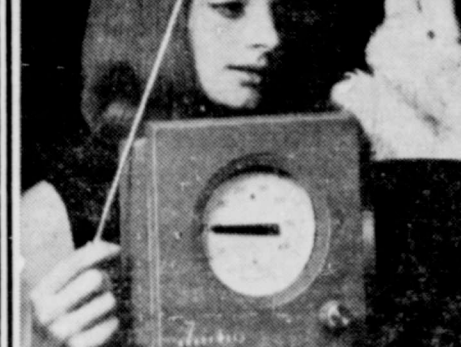

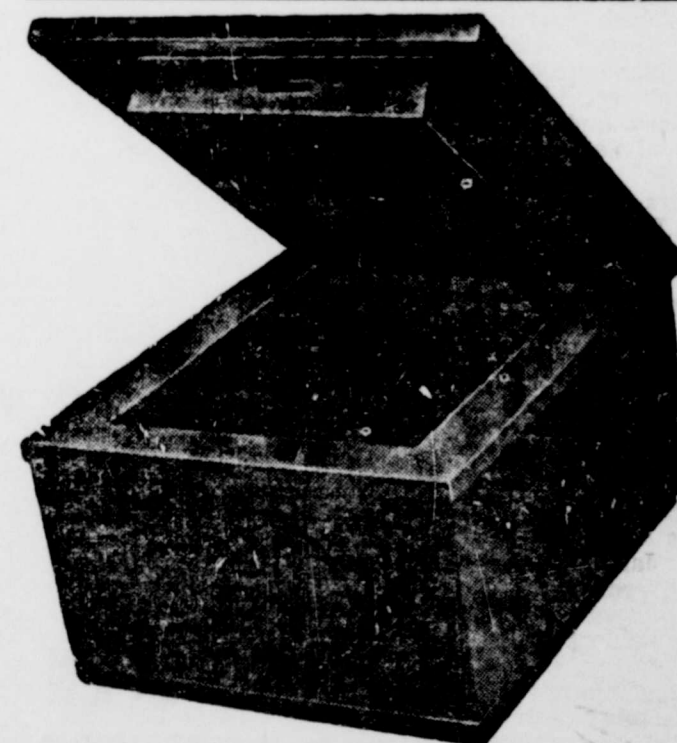

Letter Arrives From 'Catfish' In Saudi Arabia

The following is a letter received from "Catfish" Pepper, a former employee of The Burkburnett Star, now in Saudi Arabia with an oil company.

Hello Euk Star:

Am sure you are aware of the fact that "Wandering Me" is back in the desert again. Yep, the Texas cold was getting too rough for my tropical blood. Took off from Wichita at 11:20 a.m. Sun., Dec. 10. Left Dallas at 12:30 p.m. via American Airlines for New York City. Due to rough weather along the eastern seaboard, we flew up the middle. Was a smooth flight to Indianapolis, but from there to NYC was rather rough. Landed at John F. Kennedy Airport at 3:00 p.m. your time. Took a cab into NYC and checked with East Side Terminal on a flight out. Was able to catch one at 7:45 p.m. (your time), so due to the rain and 35 degree temperature in NYC, I decided to go elsewhere.

Took a KLM (Royal Dutch Airlines) flight out of JFK at 7:45 p.m. and landed in Amsterdam, Holland at 2:50 a.m. Monday (your time). By this you can see, my movements weren't exactly in slow motion. Am really glad that I decided to fly on into Amsterdam as this gave me two days in that city. As I'd never had the pleasure of visiting this city, it was quite a thrill to me, despite the fact that it rained or snowed practically all of the time I was there. Will say this, "The people of Holland are a happy, smiling, and industrious race of people." They were very courteous and tried in every way to please. Here I met people from all over the world including Alaska and a lady lawyer from Houston. Hope to get back there again in the summer time.

Flew out of Amsterdam Wed. at 11:45 a.m. bound for Athens, Greece. On the flight down, the cloud cover broke enough that we had a splendid view of the Austrian Alps. If one likes snow that'd be the place to go. Right Now!!! We were about one minute of touchdown at Athens (flaps and gear down) when ground radio advised us not to land. Maybe I should say, they demanded that we didn't. Uh huh, they had another two or three hour war. Guess if we'd got out of Amsterdam on time, I'd have got to see some of it. Oh well, you can't expect to see it all on one trip, better luck next time maybe.

Being as the Greeks were angry, we pulled up and flew on into Beirut, Lebanon. Here we were down long enough to visit around the airport (with machine gun-carrying guards

all around). Anyway the refreshment counter was open to us and that kinda washed away our troubles. Didn't tarry long here, before blasting off for Baghdad, Iraq. Here all passengers except Yours Truly, left the flight. Believe it or not, I had me a whole DC8 jetliner by my lonesome. That is except the crew and that included two very nice Dutch stewardesses. Now if that isn't living, I'd like to know what is???

Dhahran was uneventful, just a matter of checking in and receiving my new assignment. I'm assigned to a crew known as Seismo No. 6. To reach my new assignment, I flew out of Dhahran on an Aramco Fokker F-27 (twin turbo prop) plane to crew Seismo No. 3. This was a 2 hour or 500 mile flight. Due to the rough terrain here at Seismo No. 6 a large plane is unable to land, this forced me to spend the night at S.3. where I got to visit with some of the people I know. 7:00 a.m. Tuesday found me in the air again. This time aboard a DeHavilland Beaver that lands and takes off in a front yard. This flight took 1 1/2 hours and put me to my final destination. Now you can understand what I mean when I say "You're all up in the air when you go Doodle Bugging." Ha Ha.

As of now, this crew consists of 11 white men and 78 locals. Of the 11 ex-patriots (as we are called) 6 of us are Texans, 1 from Nebraska, 1 Canadian, 1 British, and 2 Australians. A much better situation than my last crew which was about 75% British and Australian. Anyway the Texans are in the majority.

At the present time, we are located about 100 kilometers (60 miles) from the Aden border. We will be moving within a week or 10 days to within 12 miles of the border. My failure to have any excitement in Athens, could very easily be supplemented by some real thrills soon. Ha Ha. I understand those people are real proud of their rights to shoot a gun. Well aren't we all???

Guess that about sums it up as of now, so in canning the "batter for this time, will say "A Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to All."

Did the baby's book splash in the bathtub?
No matter — if it's made of a special paper.

He can spill cereal on it, chew it, or try to tear a page. He and the book are protected. Three new picture books for babies — the titles are *Baby's Toys*, *Quack Quack* and *This Little Pig* — are made of a new substance.

The paper is actually a thin plastic that took years of experimentation, and today is being used by Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wisconsin, nation's leading producers of children's books.

"Plus being perfect for infants' or toddlers' picture books, it proves practical for covers of classics and fiction books as well," according to Whitman's art director June Behling. The plastic paper is long wearing, lint free, holds color with fidelity and resists stain. Safety and convenience factors all count when a baby looks at his first picture books. Non-toxic inks are used, and the pages are not stapled but sewn together.

The plastic paper, out of the laboratories of Union Carbide, went through long graphic arts testing before being adopted. It was tried with as many as 50 different coatings and 300 kinds of ink.

A printing material so versatile is bound to have other uses. Documents for tropical climates may be printed on it. Army tests have shown that maps printed in the new manner can be buried in swamp-land for a week, can be retrieved and washed off, and still be as good as new.

It takes more than an army of experimenters to perfect a new idea. Today you can buy a book to take a toddler's tough treatment. Tomorrow the plastic may be used in dozens more ways — a new page in printing history.

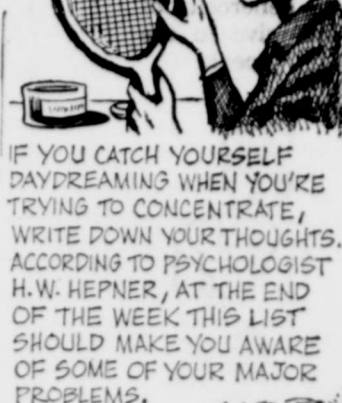

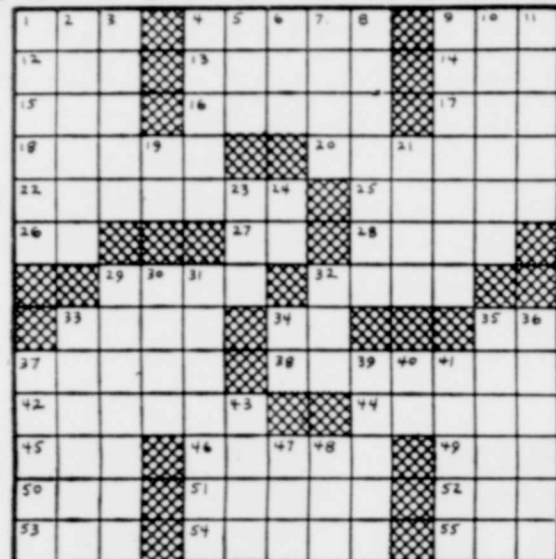

Too Busy To Be Careful?

Are you going to be too busy to be careful about preventing accidents in your home during 1968?

A pause to do the safe thing, says the Council on Family Health, rather than rushing from task to task, will let you get more done during 1968.

Will you be too busy to wipe spills from the floor when they happen? Remember that some member of your family may be seriously injured by slipping on that wet floor.

Will you be too hurried to change from dress shoes to low heeled house shoes when you get home? High heels are impractical for housework.

Will you be so rushed to get something from a high shelf that you'll use an open drawer as a ladder to reach for it? Then you may be one of the more than twenty million persons injured in home accidents each year.

When you prepare food for the skillet, will you take the time to dry the food before placing it in the hot fat? If you don't, you may find yourself spattered with hot grease.

When you use medicine for yourself or a member of the family, will you take the time to return it to the medicine cabinet? If you leave it on a table or counter, 1968 may be the year your small child tries to swallow the contents.

Will you take the time to put matches and lighters where small children cannot find and experiment with them? If you do, you will help prevent a fire in your home, and perhaps accidental burn injuries to your child.



Will you take time to get rid of accumulations of old clothes, newspapers and magazines, and other things that clutter the basement, attic or storage space in the home? If you don't, you are leaving a fire hazard.

The Council on Family Health, a non-profit organization sponsored as a public service by members of the drug industry to promote home safety and family health, says that Mom can help prevent many an accident in the home during 1968, by just not being too busy to be careful.

A new kind of coloring book is in stores today.

It's a fill-in-idea book in which a child can add to a picture any way he likes. The missing element might be a boat in a marine scene, animal in a zoo cage, or portrait of the artist at the park.

The books encourage imagination. "Since no two children think alike, each child will finish the book differently," say editors at Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wisconsin, leading producers of children's activity items and art supplies. The creative drawing books are to be found at local stores along with racks of crayons, colored pencils and other juvenile art materials. Householders will find the books a welcome new approach.

A book of Simple Objects, for example, will show a boy fishing and ask the question: "In the water can you show some of the things that swim below?" That gives the artist a free hand. On another page he draws inhabitants in houses—a wigwam, an igloo wait to be occupied.

A book of Word Pictures gives ideas in rhyme, and he draws missing parts of the scene.

New books in the series include Zoo Trip, in which a child can draw food for animals and fill in other scenes. And there is Shape Pictures; something as evocative as a big blue circle can be turned into a pond or a goldfish bowl with crayon work.

Inventive parents often suggest similar ideas to children. But the adult who runs out of fresh ideas on a frazzled day will find the books good play-time helpers.

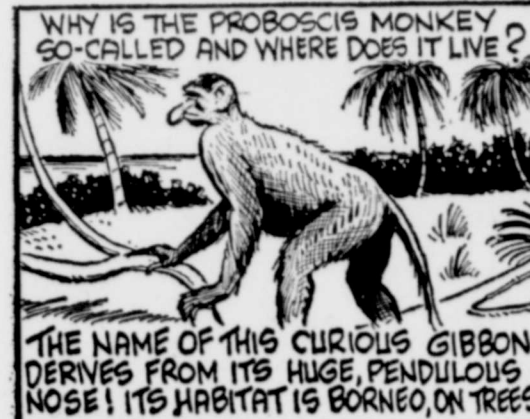

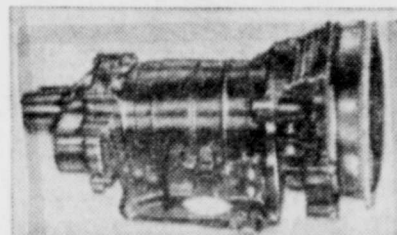

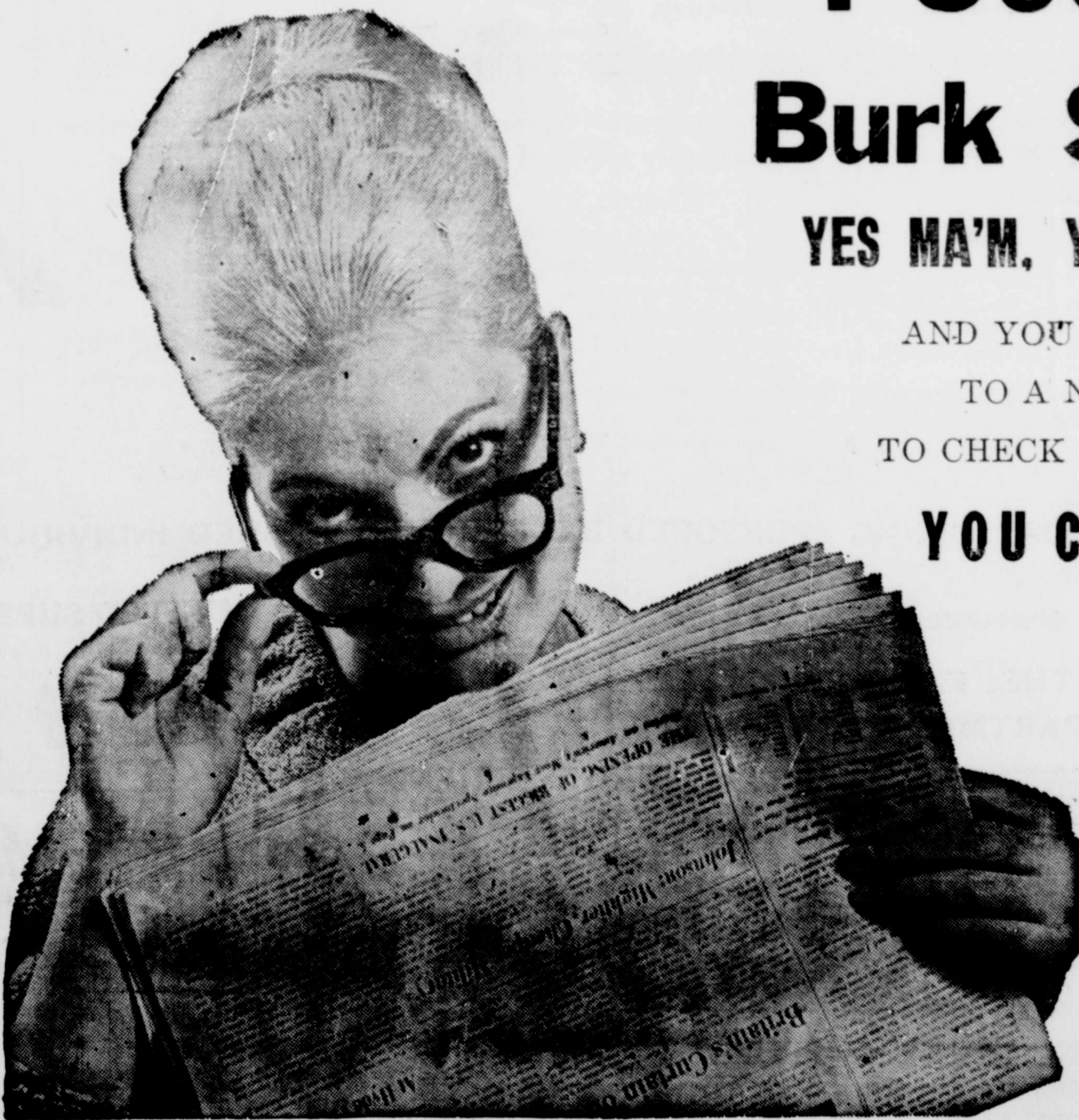

BABSON'S POINT OF VIEW

Babsons Point of View On: SET-INCOME RETIREES AND INFLATION

Babson Park, Mass. — Housewives in all income brackets are acutely aware of the climbing prices in food, clothing, shoes, services, just about whatever they buy. But the ones who really are at the mercy of price inflation are the retirees, those with no extra family income, no raises, no stretch in their budgets. How are they going to make out? How can they keep their expenses down to a reasonable level?

Planning Ahead Is a Must

With such people—most of them 60 years old and more—there is a real need for meticulous health care, including the consumption of foods that are nourishing but within monetary reach. Most people think of meats as the prime source of proteins, and the cost of meats may be just about prohibitive for many fixed-income older people. But there are ways of having plenty of proteins without laying out \$1.0 a pound or better for fine steaks. The cheaper cuts of many different types of meat are fully as tasty and nutritious even though they usually have to be cooked longer.

Then, too it should be emphasized that there are many other common sources of protein, such as beans, cheese, milk and eggs. For those who need help in planning nourishing but thrifty meals, the government has many booklets obtainable. Your local library will help you find plentiful sources of such information. Also on the shelves there will be books on sound nutrition which may open entirely new doors to those who have never given enough thought to the importance of careful food selection and cooking in terms of health.

Illness Prevention Easier Than Cure

While balanced meals are an essential for those in the higher age groups, there are many other considerations that are worth attention in preventing costly and distressing medical outlay. An annual checkup with your regular doctor will make you feel safer from diseases that early detection may make easily curable. Weight-control programs are extremely valuable, although frequently ignored or postponed. Safety features — such as night lights in treacherous parts of the house, hand-bars on bathtubs, and non-slip rugs—may avoid broken bones and hospitalization.

Exercise, especially outdoors, should be included wherever possible. Dr. Paul Dudley White's insistence upon walking and bicycling to prevent heart disease has gained nationwide attention. Even the milder sports such as ping-pong, swimming, croquet, and golf are fine constitutional, and good for the morale as well as the physical condition. Particularly rewarding for those with no regular occupation are the simple hobbies that cost little or nothing: Birding, painting or sketching, collecting wild flowers, mushrooms, mosses, sea shells, tree leaves or minerals.

Many Paying Jobs Handy For Retirees

Many who have long looked forward to their retirement find that they would like to work at least part-time, either through restlessness or from a need for additional income. In practically every part of the country there are openings for such folk, if they will look around a bit. Men can usually find opportunities in fields formerly their forte, and often only when they feel like helping out. Women are often needed as part-timers in selling, typing, receptionist work, babysitting, and cooking or cleaning in private homes. Wages are generally high, and even an occasional job can boost income nicely.

Social workers usually find that those retirees maintaining their own homes are in better spirits than those who try to cut back too drastically. Advance planning on the part of those looking toward retirement should take this into consideration. When a couple is parted by death, there may be a way for the widow or widower to pool resources with a relative

or close friend. In this fashion the pain of loneliness and personal loss can be reduced, as well as the expenses of living during price-inflationary times. Here, again, social workers often see better results in contemporaries making a home together than in the elders moving in with young couples or in laws.

County H-D Agent News

Homemakers interested in developing projects in their own home for their own families are now enrolling as demonstrators, Miss Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, works with demonstrators to help them plan and develop their projects.

Mrs. Dee Hamlin recently made plans for improvements inside her home. Mr. and Mrs. Hamlin work together on home projects and have made many. Added space, surface finishes and furniture remodeling are only a few.

As the new year comes in the future will show: glass walls that can be changed from transparent to opaque to save on heating and cooling costs; stronger and lighter automobile bodies made of plastic; a device in your home furnace to generate all the electricity needed for lighting and appliances; an electric car that costs only two cents a mile to run and can be recharged at home overnight.

Glorified "pin-ups," see through and the revivals of the floor lamp top the pole for new lamp trends, says Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

The pin-up or wall lamps are seen in many periods and styles and with great aplomb. These range from the elaborate Louis XVI Style with gold leaf to the extreme modern or polished stainless steel.

Miss Wirges points to one unusual wall lamp on the market which has a mirror-surfaced spherical shade slightly reminiscent of football helmet in stainless steel. The lamp reflects the color and movement of its surroundings.

"Metal lace lattice work, French cane and other devices are used to give lamps a light, opened-up, see-through look," the agent says. Complexly cut and bent metal sections join to reflect light between the surfaces.

These lamps not only create an airy appearance, but when lighted make unusual reflections on the ceiling, floor and walls. This somewhat psychedelic effect is in vogue with some of the modern furniture of today.

Many of the hanging lamps have gotten away from the swing chains and now hang directly from the ceiling on their own cord. Colored and smoked glass shades with clear bulbs are common combinations for hanging lamps. Modern styled floor lamps appear in all types in almost all rooms.

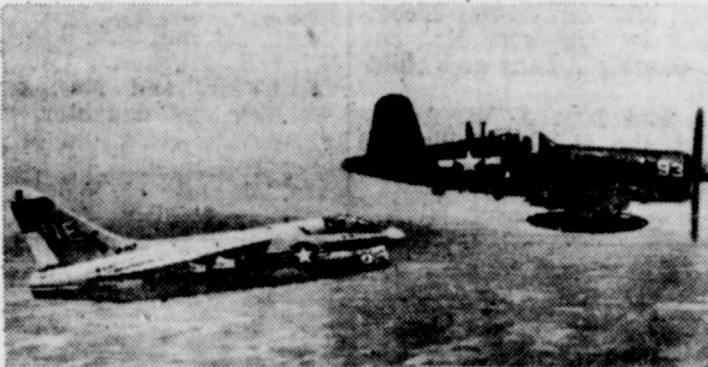
