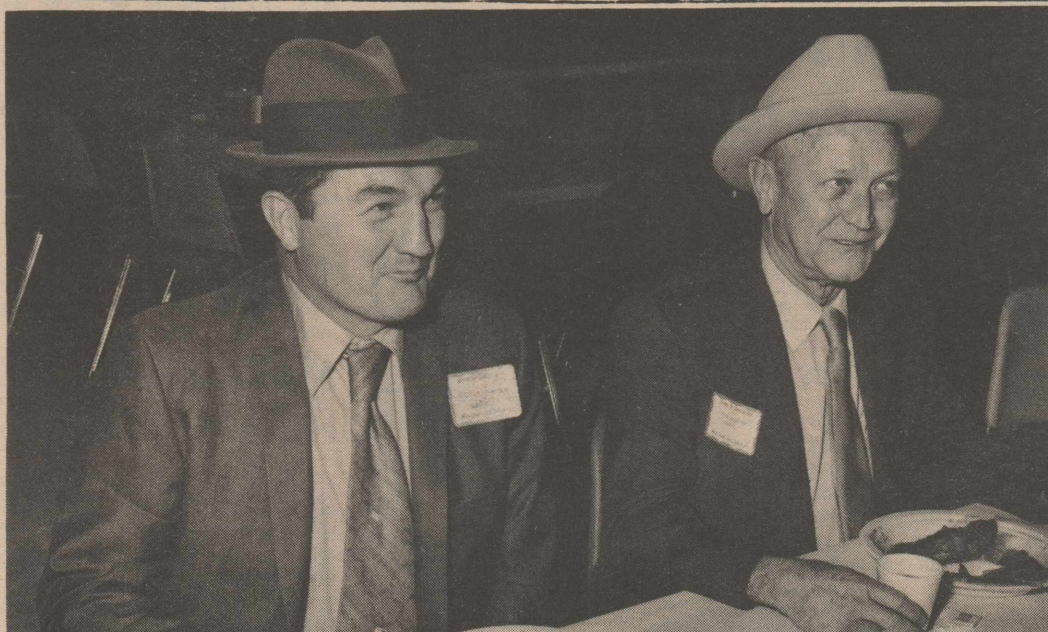

Hawkins Is Area Chairman For WTSU Research Project

Willis Hawkins Jr., Hart banker and cattleman, has been named area chairman for Hale, Castro and Lamb Counties in a fund raising campaign outlined recently for the "Nance Ranch Project." James "Doc" Potts of Amarillo, president of Taylor-Evans Seed Company is coordinator of the drive.

The famed George Nance Hereford Ranch was recently donated to West Texas State University by Mrs. Lucille Nance Jones, widow of George Nance, and her husband, L. L. Jones.

The University will assume control of the 2,393 acre ranch

in January of 1971. The ranch is located 5.5 miles east of the campus. It will be used as a research and development center in WTSU agricultural department, which was this fall elevated to the status of a complete and separate School of Agriculture.

Potts stated that "the research and development center, located in the center of the fastest growing cattle feeding industry in the world, can help cattlemen stay abreast in a fast changing business."

Goal for the drive is \$100,000 for the School of Agriculture. Of the amount to be

raised, \$35,000 will go to add 150 head of commercial cows to the school's present herd of 70 registered Angus and Herefords, \$45,000 for research facilities, and \$20,000 for improvements on the ranch and first year operating expenses. Plans call for the ranch to be self-supporting by the end of 1972.

Christmas Mailing Suggestions Told

Postmaster Jewel Brooks today listed six tips on how residents of Hart can help meet tight Christmas budgets this year by careful mailing of cards and parcels.

For the most efficient mailing, Mrs. Brooks suggested the following steps:

1. For servicemen overseas - "SAM" (Space Available Mail) Christmas parcels can be sent until Nov. 20 for only the small domestic parcel post charge involved from Hart to East and West Coast points of embarkation for military mail. Parcels up to 5 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth are accepted at this low rate.

2. Larger parcels (up to 30 pounds with the same length and girth limitations) can be sent as "PAL" (Parcel Air-lift) mail, provided they are

mailed by Nov. 27. The charge is only \$1 per parcel, plus the regular domestic parcel post postage - much less than charges that would apply later if straight airmail service must be provided.

3. For all packaging, invest in good quality, sturdy wrapping materials. This small investment can help insure undamaged delivery of valuable gifts and prevent delays which might result if rewappings were required in transit.

4. Insure parcels realistically to cover full value but do not overinsure. A \$10 gift, for example, can bring only \$10 compensation, if lost, even if "insured" for \$100.

5. Get plenty of stamps on your first trip to the post office to avoid the time and expense of additional trips.

6. Use ZIP Code as a tool for economy in mailing. When it is used consistently on parcels and cards, ZIP Code helps prevent errors in delivery and expedites handling. If only a few Christmas cards go astray, an investment of several dollars may be lost, for example.

"The key to efficient Christmas mailing," Mrs. Brooks commented, "is to mail early and carefully. Clear addressing, with the ZIP Codes, proper packaging and early depositing can prevent most problems and provide the greatest value for money spent for postage."

Delta Gamma Meets Monday In Dimmitt

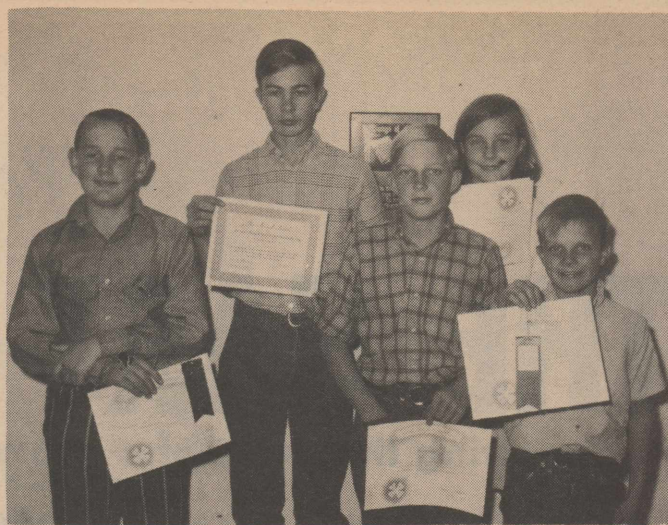
"We Have a Charge to Keep" was the program presented Monday evening to members of the Iota Zeta Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma Society.

JEWELLED CHEESE PUFFS

Mrs. Cecil Burke, 2426 Walnut, Amarillo

2 cups sifted	1/4 teaspoon salt
all-purpose flour	1 cup butter
2 teaspoons	1 package (8-oz.)
baking powder	cream cheese
2 tablespoons sugar	2 eggs, beaten
Preserves or jelly	

Sift together dry ingredients. Beat butter and cream cheese until fluffy. Add beaten eggs and beat well. Blend into sifted dry ingredients. Chill dough one hour. On lightly floured board, roll dough 1/4 inch thick. Cut individual rounds with floured biscuit cutter. Make an impression in center of each round with thumb. Fill imprint with preserves or jelly (about 1 teaspoon). Bake on an ungreased baking sheet in moderate gas oven (375 degrees) for 15 minutes or until delicately browned. Serve warm. Makes about 24.

Valiant Horns Lassoed, 4

Hart Longhorns proved they still had pride and fight left in them at Happy Friday night but it was to no avail. Happy scored three quick touchdowns and then held off a furious Hart effort to come out ahead 42-14.

The game began with Hart receiving, but the Horns got off to a slow start and had to punt. Happy then took the ball and marched promptly to the Hart 4 yard line where Reuben Garcia ran in for the score. Garcia also ran the extra points making the score 8-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, the Horns got a good run but an untimely fumble called it off and Happy recovered. After a pass play that left a little question in the crowd about whether the ball had touched the ground, Happy found themselves marching for another score. This time it came on a 3 yard run by Bill Pearson. The extra point try was stopped making the score 14-0.

Still the Horns could not seem to get moving and had to punt.

Happy could do no wrong again and with the aid of a few penalties scored again on a 13 yard run by Reuben Garcia. Bill Pearson ran the extras. Forced to punt again following a pass on third down that missed by only inches, the Horns' defense began to come alive. They stopped Happy cold forcing a punt. Then came a play that will be remembered and talked about for weeks to come. The Cowboy punt was blocked by a horde of Hart defensivemen and Ralph Bell came up with the ball, but in the end Happy had the ball and another first down. This seemed to make the Horns even angrier as they stopped the Cowboys cold the rest of the

quarter leaving the score at 22-0.

The second quarter was all defense mostly HART defense as the Cowboys were unable to move out of their own end of the field until a pass interference call near the end of the half. That didn't help Happy much as the tough Horn defense buckled down and stopped them at the Hart 5 yard line to end the half.

In the third quarter, the Horns dominated. Stanley Dyer took the ball on the Happy 39 yard line and raced to the 15. Then disaster struck!

The Horns fumbled. Then all of the night's defensive efforts paid off as Stanley Dyer, Ralph Bell, and Dirk Rambo tackled Mark Hargrave in the end zone for a safety. This made the score at the end of the third quarter, 22-2.

All havoc broke loose in the fourth quarter with the Horns and Cowboys both getting into the scoring act.

First it was Happy on a long pass play to Steve Cole. The run for 2 extras was good.

Then Ricky Farris threw a 70 yard pass to Erasmo Castillo who ended up on the Happy 1-yard line. Two plays later, Stanley Dyer bulled in for the score. The extra point try was blunted. HOT SPICED PUNCH

2/3 c. sugar
2 T. whole allspice
1/4 tsp. salt
1 No. 2 can pineapple juice
3 c. water
6 (inch) sticks cinnamon
2 T. whole cloves
1 qt. cranberry cocktail juice
1 small can lemon juice

Tie spice in bag and place in large pan with juices. Simmer for 10 minutes and serve while hot.

PERCOLATOR PUNCH

2 1/2 c. pineapple juice
2 c. cranberry juice
1 3/4 c. water
1/2 c. brown sugar, lightly packed
1 T. whole cloves
1/2 T. whole allspice
3 sticks cinnamon
1/2 tsp. salt

Put pineapple juice, water and cranberry juice in bottom of eight cup percolator. Put rest of ingredients in the top. Perk for 10 minutes. Serve hot in mugs or punch cups.

HOLIDAY PUNCH

2 c. fresh cranberries
2 c. sugar
2 c. water
6 cloves
1 c. lemon juice

Dissolve Jello in hot water, add lemon juice, orange juice, pineapple juice, sugar and cold water. Chill. Just before serving, add ginger ale and bananas.

1 orange
2 tea bags
1 tsp. whole allspice
5 c. water
2 lemons
1 c. sugar
1 tsp. whole cloves

Bring water to boil, add tea bags, spices, lemon juice, orange juice and sugar. Strain and serve.

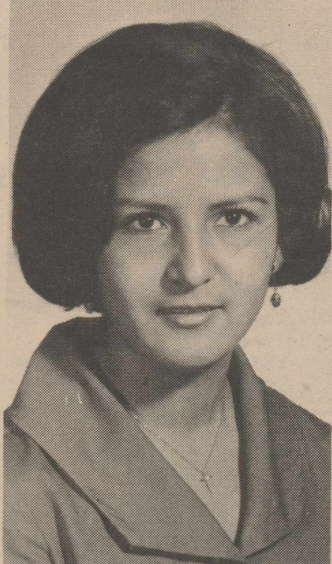

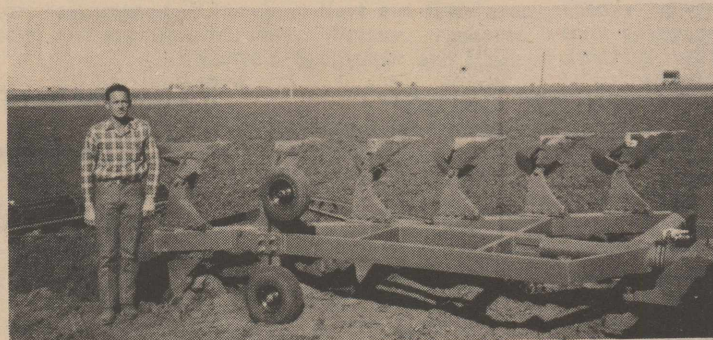
