COTTON ADVANCES \$3.50 ON GIN REPORT

MARTIAL LAW ORDERED AS FOUR STRIKERS KILLED

ROOPS OPEN FIRE WHEN BIG PARTY STORMS MINE; OTHERS ARE KNOWN SERIOUSLY HURT

(By The Associated Press)
DENVER, Colo., Nov. 21.—First blood was shed in I. W. W., coal strike today and as a result part of Colorado national guard has been called out and martial law has been declared for northern Colorado.

Four strikers are known to have been killed and more than a score were injured when state police opened fire at the Columbine mine of the Rocky Mountain Fuel company in northern Colorado. A number of state police were injured and Sam Lee, one of the officers, had a finger severed by a knife in the hands of one of the strikers.

Strikers said from seven to nine men were killed but this could not be verified. The state police turned all of bullets into the strikers and a hand to hand battle in the officers were overwhelmed by large numbers who swarmed the mine property and ignored commands to halt.

Rush Toward Gates
The strikers appeared at the mine at 5:30 and started through gates. The state police using tear gas and clubs attempted to stop them. The strikers used clubs, stones and stones to force their way into the mine. Later, the state police, then rallied the strikers, and, forming a line in front of the mine, they again ordered them to halt. When they kept coming, Scherf fired two shots over their heads and then ordered them to shoot into the ranks of the strikers. The strikers apparently were unaware they were being fired until their ranks began to thin in the shrieks of the wounded and the air. The strikers then made a hasty retreat taking many of their wounded with them. They crossed a white flag over an automobile and returned for several more wounded.

One of Dead Left
One of the dead and several of the wounded were left on the mine property. The wounded were taken to hospitals at Longmont and Denver. Some of the state officers also were taken to hospitals suffering from painful injuries. Several had their shoulders from being struck by clubs.

Other Miners Will Die, Report
LONGMONT, Colo., Nov. 21 (AP)—The striking coal miners who were today by state police are dying in the Longmont hospital. Doctors said their injuries were so serious that there was little hope they could live more than a short time. Thirteen other strikers are in the hospital receiving treatment for wounds received in the battle with the state officers at the Columbine mine.

Governor Defends Action Of Police
DENVER, Colo., Nov. 21 (AP)—Responsibility for the deaths of the men killed at the Columbine mine this morning rests squarely on the strikers themselves, Governor W. H. Adams said today in a formal statement.

"Chief Louis Scherf, of the state law enforcement squad had every patience with the advancing strikers and he ordered his men to fire only when it appeared that his own life and those of his deputies were in jeopardy."

Cook Files Brief As Hearing Nears
WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Frederick A. Cook, the explorer, has filed a brief for release from prison. The brief will be argued this afternoon in the supreme court. The brief asserts that federal officers were authorized to grant Cook even though the term of his sentence had expired, as was the case in his case.

Cook, who was sentenced to 15 years for improper use of the mails, contended that the statute, contrary to the intention of the government, was a limitation as to time and must not act.

TEN INDICTED IN AUTO 'RING' ANSWER TODAY

SHERIFF OF ARKANSAS COUNTY AMONG ONE'S UNDER INDICTMENTS

(By Associated Press)
TEXARKANA, Ark., Nov. 21.—Six of 10 men indicted by the grand jury Saturday for conspiracy to violate the motor vehicle act in connection with the operations of an alleged "ring" in Sevier county, Arkansas, for the handling of stolen automobiles, are to answer charges in the United States district court for the western district of Arkansas here Monday.

Sheriff Among Accused
Among those indicted are Sheriff Roy Hooper of Sevier county; J. T. Thorpe of Lockesburg, a rural mail carrier; Tom Penney, Lockesburg mail carrier and farmer; the Terry of Sevier county; Al Brooks of near Ben Lomond, a mail carrier, and Press Turner of Cookville, Texas.

Sheriff Hooper before going to court Monday charged that he had been "framed" on statements made by Roy Walker and John Carney, who entered pleas of guilty Saturday to certain counts in the indictment and blamed Bud Bickle, sheriff of Polk county for his arrest. Sheriff Hooper said Sheriff Bickle had done everything in his power to hinder his work in Sevier county on account of differences between them.

Auto Sales "Ring" Charged
In the indictment it is charged that the ten men, two of whom have not been taken into custody, formed a "ring" in Sevier county which handled or knew of the handling of automobiles stolen in Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma and transported into Arkansas. Specific instances are named of cars stolen in Texas and Louisiana, the alleged drivers of the cars being named.

Out-of-town speakers were W. P. Gilbert of Houston, grand secretary of the U. C. T. of Texas; Walter McGee of Amarillo, grand past counselor in the state; Newt Riggs of Amarillo, and O. V. McNay of Fort Worth, representatives of the grand council.

CAIN ANDERSON FACING SECOND FLOGGING TRIAL

TYLER, Tex., Nov. 21 (AP)—The second trial of Cain Anderson, charged with violation of the state anti-mask law in connection with the flogging of two women and a man near Marshall, last June, was under way in district court here today after both defense and state had sought delays.

After a defense motion to quash the indictment had been denied the state presented a motion asking that testimony of D. Osborne, charged jointly with Anderson and convicted, be suppressed. The state alleged that "Osborne does not come within the enumerated exceptions of the statute providing when convicts may testify in court."

Work On Standpipe Is Moving Rapidly

Work on the city standpipe, located on Nineteenth street, between Avenues U and V, is progressing nicely, and it is expected that the structure will be completed in a short time.

The standpipe will add 1,200,000 gallons of water to the city's available supply of water. At present the city is served by four underground reservoirs, one with a million-gallon capacity, two of 500,000-gallon capacity, and one of 50,000-gallon capacity.

Tech Dairy Class Sees Plains Plants

Showing the various practical methods employed in dairies, the Tech class of farm dairying made a trip to Amarillo Saturday where they visited a number of the leading creamery and dairy plants there. Plants visited included the Mistletoe Creamery, Meager's Creamery, Mauldin's Dairy Farm, Pool's Milk Plant, and other individual plants.

Permit Filed For New Texas Railroad

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Permission to build a new line of railroad 35 miles long, in Ward and Winkler counties, Texas, was asked of the Interstate Commerce Commission today by the new Texas-New Mexico Railway company.

The corporation declared that it expected to make financing arrangements with the Texas and Pacific system. Its construction will begin at Monahans, Texas, and run via Kermit, Texas, to a point on the New Mexico border traversing all territory which is now without transportation facilities. No estimates of cost were submitted.

HABEAS CORPUS ASKED BY COTTON CO. MAN IN PERMIT MIDDLE

AUSTIN, Nov. 21.—A sweeping attack on the constitutionality of the new law putting motor bus traffic under state regulation is made in habeas corpus proceedings instituted in criminal appeals court Monday in behalf of H. S. Sparks, cattle county, bus operator for relief from complaints charging him with operating without a permit from the state railroad commission.

The case is the first court test of the commission's enforcement power.

Sparks, who runs a bus line from Floydada, Floyd county, to Vernon, Wilbarger county, holds that the bus regulation act passed by the fourth legislature illegally attempts to vest the railroad commission with discretionary power to enforce a penal statute and make regulations carrying penal provisions. He referred to the penalties provided for failure to secure operation permits from the commission.

BRUTON FOUND GUILTY OF ROBBERY WITH FIREARMS AND GIVEN DEATH PENALTY IN LIMESTONE CO. COURT

(By The Associated Press)
WACO, Tex., Nov. 21.—A. P. Bruton, 21, charged with robbery with firearms in connection with the holdup of the First State Bank of Tehuacana, Texas, on November 3, today was found guilty and assessed the death penalty by a jury in district court at Groesbeck, Limestone county.

Bruton showed little emotion when the verdict was returned by the jury which had been out since Saturday. It was reported that delay in returning the verdict was occasioned because of inability to agree at first on the penalty to be assessed.

One other man accused of robbery with firearms in connection with the holdup of the Tehuacana Bank, in which the bandits escaped with \$2,024 in cash are to be tried at Groesbeck next week.

Bruton, who says his home is in Norwood, Mo., said he preferred death to a long term in the penitentiary.

COURT SUSTAINS GIFT TAX UNDER U. S. REVENUE ACT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—By a vote of 4 to 3, the supreme court today sustained the gift tax imposed by the revenue act of 1924. The tax, which was written into the law in that year, remained on the statute books only two years, being repealed under the revenue act of 1926.

It was imposed in an effort to check evasions of the estate or inheritance tax and was sponsored by Chairman Green of the House Ways and Means committee, but its friends failed to muster sufficient strength in 1926 to keep it in the law.

The court divided with Chief Justice Taft, and Justice Van De Vanter, McReynolds and Butler holding that the provision of the act applying to gifts made before the passage of the act was invalid, and Justices Holmes, Brandies, Sanford and Stone taking the contrary view. This left effective the decision of the lower court sustaining the law.

R. Reese for the construction of a 3 room brick veneer residence for Charles F. O'Neal, each to cost \$2,750.

Ten Year Old Wound Abets Death Of Man

HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 21 (AP)—A bullet wound received ten years ago when the guns of negro soldiers killed a score of white citizens here, contributed to the death of G. W. Butcher, 54, painter, who died at his home Sunday according to physicians. Justice Overstreet, who held an inquest, returned a verdict from natural causes.

U. S. Flier Killed When Bomber Falls

MANILA, Nov. 21 (AP)—Lieutenant Matthew E. Finn, stationed at Clark field, Camp Stotsenburg, was killed today when a pursuit plane which he was flying crashed to earth during bombing practice. The cause of the accident was undetermined.

Lieutenant Finn's home address was Washington, D. C. He entered the service in 1917.

SMALLER TOTAL THAN TRADE EXPECTED SENDS PRICES UP WELL BEYOND TWENTY CENTS

(By The Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 21.—The cotton market advanced over \$3.50 a bale in the early trading today on active short coverings, induced by the smaller ginnings total than the trade had looked for. Toward the end of the first half hour prices eased off 17 to 28 points on realizing but the undertone continued steady.

The reaction carried December contracts to 19.95, while January and March sold at 20.66 and 20.25 respectively, 23 to 35 points under the highs of the day, but still 41 points above the previous close. New York prices advanced \$3.00 a bale, and trade was very active at the start.

REMUS HALTED IN EMOTION AT MURDER TRIAL

COURT RULES SIMPLE STATEMENT OF FACTS ONLY ADMISSIBLE

(By Associated Press)
CINCINNATI, Nov. 21.—The emotional elaboration of the history of his recent life, George Remus had planned to lay before the jury in his murder trial, was barred today from his opening statement.

When Walter K. Sibbald, assistant prosecutor, arose to make the state's opening statement, Judge Chester R. Shaffer ruled:

"Each side will be limited to a plain statement of its case. There will be no emotion and no argument. There will be a simple statement of the facts that the evidence will bring out."

Says Others Guilty
Sibbald, 6 feet 4 inches tall, and with a voice that rivaled Remus' deep roar, asserted that the state not only would prove the first degree murder charge upon which it asks Remus be electrocuted, but that there were others equally as guilty. "Remus is Remus' gang."

"The state will show that in planning and preparing and carrying out this murder, Remus had the assistance and encouragement of others."

Sibbald declared:

"It will be shown that on the night of October 3, last, Remus went to the hotel where Mrs. Remus was staying, to kill her," said Sibbald. "Mrs. Remus was shot to death October 6."

Woman, 3 Children Die As Home Burns

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 21 (AP)—Mrs. Charles Marshall perished today in heroic effort to save her four children from flames which destroyed their home. One child was saved but three died with their mother.

Neighbors, who discovered the flames, said they saw Mrs. Marshall fight her way to a window through which she flung her son, Walter, six. She then ran back into the fire and her body was found in the room in which the other children, Ruth 11, Robert 4, and John 3, were suffocated as they slept. The father had left home for work.

Aged Minister At Houston Is Dead

HOUSTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Arrangements were being made here Monday for the funeral of Rev. Robert H. Jones, 75, retired Baptist minister, one of the two preachers who officiated at funeral of Jesse James, famous outlaw. He died yesterday.

Hunting Accidents Fatal To Two Boys

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 21 (AP)—Hunting accidents cost two lives in the state yesterday. Joseph Hanfelt, 18, died here after injuries received when a gun exploded.

Lillie Schults, 12, died at Humboldt, Neb., from an accidental rifle wound.

New York Prices Advance \$3 Bale

Cotton prices advanced more than \$3 a bale on the New York cotton exchange today on the government ginning report showing smaller figures than had been generally anticipated, and tending to confirm the smaller estimate of the crop. Trading was very active at the start, March selling up to 20.30 cents a pound.

Ginnings Shown At 10,899,182 Bales

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Cotton of this year's crop ginned prior to November 14, the census bureau announced today, totalled 10,899,182 bales, including 401,605 round bales, counted as half bales and excluding linters.

Ginnings to November 14 last totalled 12,956,124 bales, including 427,323 round bales, and in 1925 they totalled 12,260,353 bales including 218,288 round bales.

Last Year's Total
This year's crop as indicated by conditions November 1 has been estimated by the department of agriculture as 12,842,000 equivalent 500 pound bales. Last year 72.1 per cent of the crop had been ginned to November 14 while in 1925 ginnings to that date represented 76 per cent of the crop.

American people are to be responsible for and pass upon questions of foreign policy, they should know something about the subject; it is our profound conviction that these questions are at this stage of our history of very great importance; we have noted the fact that in different parts of the country such conferences are held with great profit to those participating, and it is hoped not without influence in the formation of a national policy; it seems to us that our geographical situation makes it especially opportune that we should exercise influence with reference to Pan-American questions; and that the cause of Pan-Americanism has suffered severely in recent years is generally recognized, and it is hoped that through these unofficial, cul-

tural and friendly relations we may make known to our neighbors the school of international problems established at Lubbock with our national neighbors.

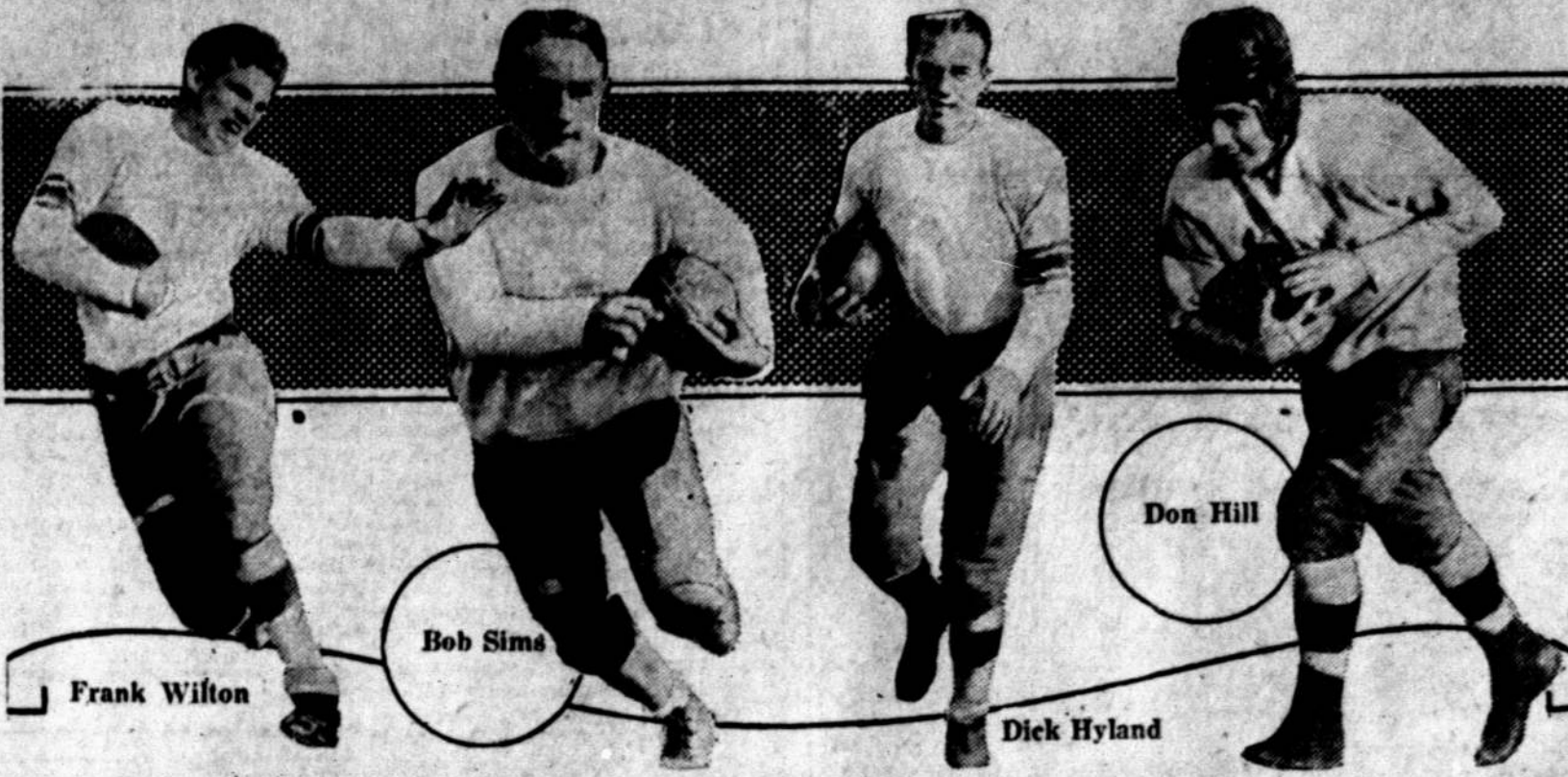
Colorful Spectacle

FLOYDADA AND SLATON CLASH IN TITLE GAME

BOTH UNDEFEATED AND BITTER FIGHT SEEN ON THANKSGIVING

FLOYDADA, Nov. 21.—Today the undefeated Whirlwinds, of the Floydada high school, started in the final week of preparation for the championship game with the Slaton Tigers in Slaton on Thursday, Thanksgiving Day, November 24. Coach Ike Jay hopes to keep his record unmarred at least in the South Plains district, and to do that he realizes that the Tigers of Slaton will have been of trouble to them.

Best in History
The record the Green and White machine has chalked up for the 1927 season indicates one of the best teams in the history of the high school. Thus far, their goal has been crossed, but twice, and both instances, the Lubbock high school Westerners, one of the strongest teams of the Class A division, turned the trick—by at that the Floydada eleven won the victory over the Westerners by a one point margin, 13 to 12. A total of 225 points have been scored by the Green and White machine in eight games, which is an average of four touchdowns with goals kicked in each game they have played. Plainview, another Class A team, held the Whirlwinds to a 6 to 0 score, which is the lowest they have been held this season and that game was played on a sloppy and soggy gridiron.

Fourth Straight Year
When Jay's machine lines up Thanksgiving against the Tigers in Slaton it will be the fourth straight year the two teams have battled for the district title. The Whirlwinds have an one game edge on championship games by taking the first two with scores of 13 to 6; and 20 to 13, respectively. Last year the Floydada outfit drubbed the Tigers with a 19 to 0 count.

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KEARNS SUIT ON DEMPSEY HALTED THRU AGREEMENT

(By Associated Press)
COURTROOM NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 21.—Plaintiff's charges of attempted tampering with justice on the part of Jack Dempsey and Tex Rickard brought an end to Jack Kearns' \$332,333.33 court action against Dempsey.

Both sides agreed to ending the case by a voluntary non-suit. Judge Runyon had told the defense, who wanted the trial to go on, that the only alternative would be a mistrial. Just before Judge Runyon issued his ultimatum the court was thrown into an uproar by George L. (Tex) Rickard, who so resented a remark of Kearns' counsel that the promoter had having the case "in the bag," that he called the lawyer a "contemptible liar" in open court.

All the charges of "influence" were made by Arthur Sager, chief counsel for Kearns, who seeks damages on a contract made when he was the former boxing champion's manager.

Sager complained about a three day adjournment last week, granted because Arthur Driscoll, Dempsey's chief counsel, had said he was sick.

He charged Driscoll with faking sickness so that Dempsey might have time to stomp the state, beating up public sentiment for himself, and that "the sinister shadow of George L. Rickard, Dempsey's spiritual adviser," might be cast over the court.

"Your honor," Sager pleaded, "if you do not call a halt to this trial, such a scandal will develop as will make the activities of the F. B. I. detectives in the Fall-Sinclair action swell like roses."

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 21.—Counsel for Jack Kearns charged in open court today that "the sinister shadow" of George (Tex) Rickard had been cast over the federal court here in an attempt to influence the jury.

The lawyer said that Dempsey, who is being sued for a third of a million dollars on an old contract had been stamping the state during an unnecessary adjournment. "I feel that attempts have been made," he said, "to influence the jury in a way that would make the Fall-Sinclair trial smell like attar of roses."

WILLIAMS TO PILOT SPUDS NEXT YEAR

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 21 (P)—Carl Williams, who piloted the Wichita Falls, Texas league club to its first pennant and the Dixie championship, will manage the Spudders again next year. Williams signed a one year contract as player-manager for the 1928 season, according to President J. Alvin Garner.

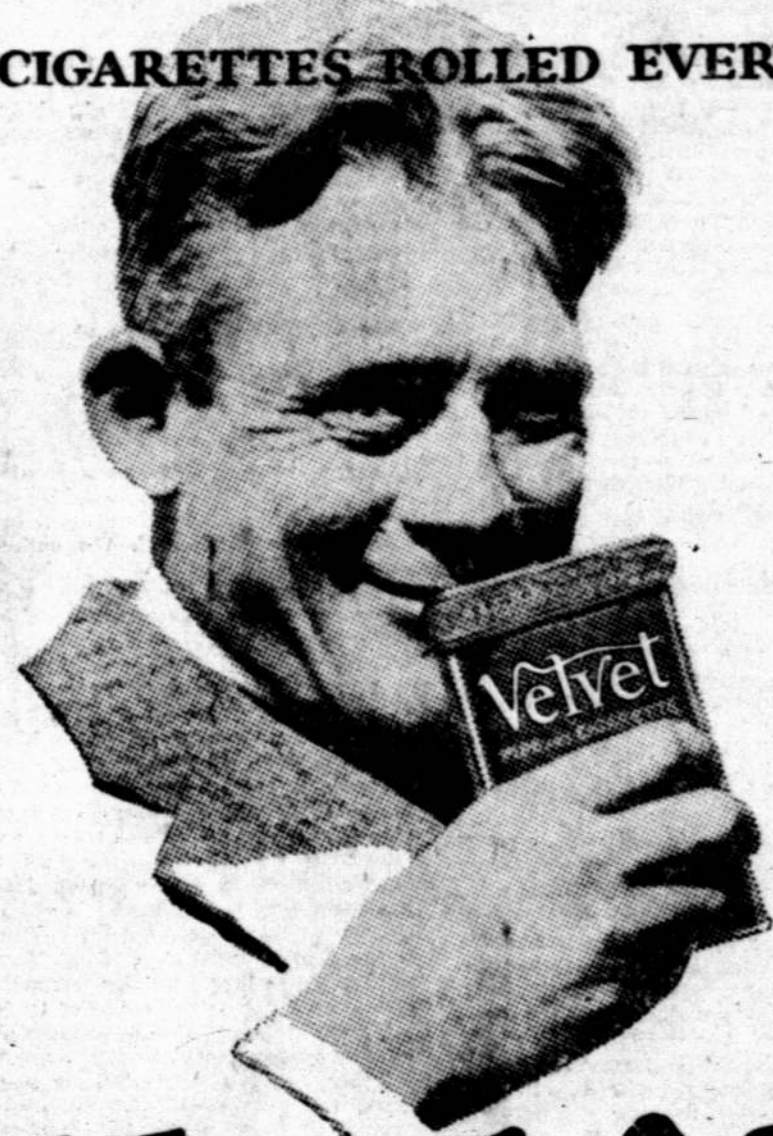

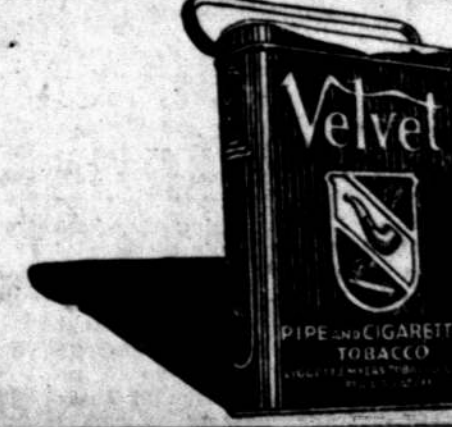

The Plainsman is of the opinion that more care should be taken of the downtown streets. He believes that they should be kept cleaner and in order to bring that about the entire citizenship must co-operate.

Most of us know that we have a street cleaner—a big automobile which sweeps up most of the dirt and trash. But it is impossible for one sweeper, working night and day, to give the downtown streets a thorough cleaning and that's where the rest of us come in.

On every important downtown street corner should be stationed a waste can—and by a waste can the Plainsman doesn't mean a gaudy tin box, painted in seven colors with advertisements. What he means is a neatly painted waste can regularly emptied, for the people to throw their trash into, keeping it off the streets and out of the gutters. An educational campaign to bring the general public to the use of the cans would soon find a cleaner, more inviting city—something which is not to be sneered at in this age of hustle and bustle.

As the Plainsman sees it this would be a good municipal project for one of Lubbock's civic clubs or one of the ladies' study clubs to undertake.

A grumbling man was in the Plainsman's office today, very much put out because he had been fined several weeks ago in Lubbock county for having only one license plate on his automobile. He exhibited a letter, given him by a West Texas official, signed by a member of the attorney general's staff, stating that appeals made on such arrests often resulted in decisions not being sustained. Lubbock County Attorney L. A. Howard erred in his prosecution of the case, the traveling man said, and he told the Plainsman that he planned to send copies of the letter which he possessed to every person so fined here.

There is a law in the state of Texas which says that a motorist must display a license plate on the front and rear of his vehicle. In upholding that law Mr. Howard is doing nothing more than following the path of office which he took upon taking his present position. Whether appeals on cases of this kind are or are not sustained in higher courts is no affair of Mr. Howard, or any other public prosecutor. These men are not blamed for the fallacies of the statutes passed by our state.

The Plainsman, of course, believes that our justice should be tempered with judgment. But when the law plainly lays down the action of public prosecutors he cannot see where they are given any choice in the matter. If they follow their oaths they can do nothing except prosecute to the letter of the law.

This dissertation is being presented in the interest of fairness to Mr. Howard and to the other public prosecutors who have been criticized in the dispatching of their duties. If the law is at fault—if it will not stand up in higher courts—it should be stricken from the statute books. These prosecutors should be saved the embarrassment attendant upon it. No man should be criticized for doing his duty.

A Senator Is Not Always A Hero At Home—Drawing Line Between Nuisance And Needed Taxes, Dutcher's Subjects

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—A clipping from a western newspaper tells the story of a prominent senator who recently made a speech in a hostile county seat. The occasion apparently was a frost and according to this newspaper's report, the senator was accosted by the sheriff on the street and in the presence of numerous witnesses heard himself called a liar, a crook and other bad names. The senator started for the sheriff and the sheriff threatened to kick his head off. It was all very undignified and humiliating and the senator retired.

The story would indicate, if true, that some senators who figure rather importantly down here aren't always such a much at home. It may be an untrue version, however, so we won't mention the senator's name. This particular paper is a weekly and violently inimical to the senator.

THE administration's proposal to refrain the automobile and other so-called "nuisance" taxes may not be quite so terrible as some persons would have us believe. "Nuisance" taxes as applied to automobiles and admissions seems rather a misnomer. "All taxes are nuisances," said a former secretary of the treasury. "I think it's both more of a nuisance and more unjust to tax the necessities of life and let the luxuries such as automobiles and prizefight tickets go free. It's better to tax an automobile owner for his joy rides than a man who can't afford a car for his bread and his clothes. We don't seem to realize that the corporation taxes on the big fellow are always passed right down to the last ultimate consumer."

SENATOR SMITH WILDMAN, BROOKHART's latest hero against railroad rates is worthy of attention because it seems to set railroad valuations at a lower figure than anyone else has proposed to date.

The railroads want them valued at the cost of reproduction, the contested Interstate Commerce Commission decision has used the original investment cost plus certain extras, the late Senator La Follette, Commissioner J. R. Egan, man and Justice Brandeis have favored the prudent investment yardstick and now comes Brookhart, insisting that a railroad is worth no more than the market value of its stocks and bonds.

Brookhart points out that when the Interstate Commerce Commission fixed a tentative value nineteen billion dollars on the railroads the stock and bond market value was only twelve billion dollars.

THE trouble with Brookhart's theory, as with most others, is that it can't always be depended on to work for the man who demands a low valuation—any more than the railroads' reproduction cost theory will work to the advantage of the railroads if prices ever drop to former levels. The late W. J. Bryan, for instance, started out arguing for the reproduction theory and later had to switch to the original cost theory. Most low valuationists believe that one of the biggest losses at stake is involved in the likelihood that the government will buy the

LOOKING IN THE FUTURE

Member cities of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce are being urged by the executive vice president of the organization to establish municipal airports. This recommendation is of interest to the people of Vernon aside from the fact that it comes from a former Vernon man. A Chamber of Commerce committee at this time is investigating the feasibility of establishing an airport here, and the appeal to the cities of South Texas to provide landing fields as preparation for commercial activities of the future is just another indication that the project under consideration here is one warranting attention.

That air transportation will develop in the future can hardly be denied. That the development will take place in the immediate future is indicated by the rapid strides taken by aviation during the past year. More long distance flight have been made during the past year than in the previous history of aviation. These flights have contributed to the development of aviation in that they no doubt have served to reveal weak points in machines and instruments, and they have attracted attention to aviation. With attention directed toward transportation as a result of numerous long distance flights made during the past year, and improvements in planes and instruments likely as a result of the experiences of flyers during the past year, it is reasonable to believe that the next twelve months will see more rapid development in aviation than that which has taken place this year.

Commercial aviation already is an established industry in Europe, and the flights which have linked this continent with the old world this year have served to bring this fact to the attention of the United States. Flyers returning from trips across the Atlantic have expressed the intention of directing their efforts toward development of commercial aviation in this country along the lines existing in Europe, and once American capital gets behind the project, it may be expected to surpass the progress attained in Europe.

Location on a commercial air transport line in the future will mean about as much to the city as location on a railway at present. The city that does not have come an air station—Vernon Record.

But few if any can really look into the future and determine just what will be the requirements of air lines in the next few years. It is hard to determine just what the development is going to be in flying machines of the various kinds, but it is a pretty safe statement that the cities that prepare for taking care of traffic in this line will be the city that will reap a harvest from the sowing.

We are of the opinion that the next ten years will bring about a wonderful improvement in the air service in the United States. If the past ten years can be taken as an index to the yearly progress, there will be regular passenger lines established and express and possibly freight and there will be regular routes and those towns on the routes will be the fortunate ones. The routes will be established, either merely by reason of the natural location, but as in the matter of railroads they will go where there is inducement offered, and where there will be business for them.

It then behooves the towns wanting to become air ports to begin now to interest those interested in the development of the air crafts, and get them thinking their way.

A. J. Cook, secretary of the miners' federation and organizer of the march, announced that with the aid of the Welsh members of parliament, William John and Richard Walford, had arranged for a conference, this afternoon with representatives of the marchers in the hope of being able to bring about an interview with Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin.

"We are fighting a battle for bread," Cook told his army on their arrival here.

"It is not bolshevism, but Baldwinism that we workmen must contend with," he declared as the men gathered at the base of Lord Nelson's statue. "We came to London to give Baldwin notice to quit. We claim the right to life."

Dr. L. D. LeGear, V. S., national poultry expert of St. Louis, Mo., arrived in Lubbock today to conduct series of lectures and clinic demonstrations on poultry over Lubbock and Crosby counties.

Meetings will be held at Slaton, Acuff, Shallowater and Lubbock and all South Plains people interested in poultry raising are cordially invited to attend any of the meetings.

Invitation Widespread

The citizenship of Lubbock through the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce are offering a special invitation to all South Plains people to attend the meeting which will be held at Lubbock at the court house at 2 p. m. Saturday.

Dr. L. D. LeGear is a graduate veterinary surgeon, a practical poultry raiser and a national poultry expert of 35 years of experience. He comes highly recommended by the St. Louis Chamber of Commerce, and Missouri state board of agriculture. He has addressed audiences of 2,000 and more farmers and others interested in the poultry raising industry, many times in Missouri and other states.

LeGear will discuss methods of housing, feeding and caring for flocks to get the highest egg production; how to successfully hatch, feed and raise baby chicks; how to detect and cure diseases of poultry, and how to cull flocks.

One important feature of his clinic demonstrations is postmortem examinations. LeGear invites anyone to bring sick poultry. He will kill the fowl, dissect it and show the cause of the disease in order that the remainder of the flock may be cured and saved.

All the meetings are free and free individual consultation will follow each meeting. Every poultry raiser, whether on the farm, black lot, or commercial plant on the South Plains should attend at least one of the meetings.

Dr. LeGear talked to Florida poultry raisers last spring, he visited California last summer and the Charleston, West Virginia, fair earlier this fall. He has a poultry farm at St. Louis where he raises poultry and makes a daily study of his life work. He comes from Lubbock to his home in St. Louis.

But few people realize the extent to which such gifts have been and are constantly being made to the public schools of this country, elementary schools, high schools, and state colleges and universities.

Social Betterment. More and more has it been evidenced during the past two generations that our people of wealth consider the fortunes which they have earned or with which they have been entrusted as public responsibilities, and that the greatest satisfaction that can come to them is the realization that a generous portion of these fortunes has been dedicated to the social betterment of the country that has made possible the accumulation of their riches. The belief that "Private wealth is a public trust" has taken a firm hold on the minds of America's wealthy class. The resulting improvements in living conditions throughout the country, brought about by the endowment of public hospitals, public libraries, public parks, public art galleries, educational institutions and what not, are staggering in their totals, if one stops to figure them up.

Then, too, thoughtful students of adolescent psychology—and all fathers, rich or poor, are such in a measure at least—are coming to realize the significance of the biologic law that living organisms, whether in the plant or animal kingdom, need both exercise and struggle in order properly to develop their latent possibilities, and that when parents attempt to shield their offspring from the necessity of genuine exercise and honest work and struggle by making them independently wealthy, they are, in reality, robbing them of life's finest heritage.

Carnegie Desires No Wonder. But back of it all, among most of our people of wealth, is the realization that "life is short and time is fleeting," and that the greatest monument a person can leave behind him is one that will give his countrymen a better chance to live happy, useful lives. Andrew Carnegie's desire to die poor is no longer the cause for nine days of wonderment.

Naturally, when a person of wealth decides to make a public gift, he is concerned as to the means best to be employed. Some gifts have not been wise, and have not brought to their donors the expected satisfaction in the realization of good accomplished that they had hoped for. That gifts to education are not in this class is evidenced by the increasing number of these gifts that are being made each year. The reason for this is not hard to find.

One of the cardinal principles underlying philanthropy is that a gift should do more than help the

the greatest measure of public service. And even when legislative bodies are willing to be generous they are usually met with constitutional prohibitions or tax limits that render them impotent.

Visions Made Effective. Standing above the masses though, on the skyline of humanity, even as tall buildings on the skyline of our cities, are men and women who see clearly and who have the means to make their vision effective. They know what a great medical center means to the health and happiness of a state, or what a great school of law will be able to accomplish in the improvement of American jurisprudence. And they realize that our public schools are playing a very important part in this scheme of human betterment. They realize that "educated mind is the guardian genius of democracy," and they are glad to use their wealth in bringing nearer that ideal, still very far away, even in America—an equal chance for every American boy and girl through equal educational opportunities. After all, what a wonderful privilege it is to provide such opportunities for little Johnny Smith, and for Johnny's brothers and sisters, and for their children and their grandchildren in the years to come. And who can foretell what contributions to civilization will be the result?

Concrete Form in Gifts. And when this gift takes the concrete form of a collection of artistic campus adornments, such as fountains, memorial arches, or the like, or beautiful buildings, or libraries, or endowments for research and teaching, or for the aid of needy students, one can easily visualize the inestimable benefits that will accrue to the state, the ever-increasing stream of students flows on from year to year through our educational institution. And one can easily realize the satisfaction that must come to the donors of such gifts. A worthy gift to education is an investment in human life. It becomes a living memorial to the donor, representing to generation after generation the altruistic idealism and the aspiration of its founder. If wisely administered, it becomes each year increasingly useful. It is not like a mere lofty monument of stone erected to ensnare the pride and egotism of an individual. A student loan fund, for example, is as much more valuable than the Pyramid of Cheops, as human life surpasses in importance and stone and granite.

More and more are American gifts to education being distributed among state controlled institutions of learning. More and more are our people of wealth realizing that the machinery of city councils and state legislatures is, in the very nature of the case, too cumbersome to be depended on solely to furnish our public school systems with what they need and can wisely use in the way of educational facilities. These legislative bodies reflect the mind of the average citizen, and men of vision are consequently able to see more clearly what our public schools need to enable them to

BULK HANDLING OF WHEAT CUTS EXPORT COSTS

SACK WHEAT ALMOST THING OF PAST IN NORTHWEST U. S.

(By Associated Press)
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 21.—By handling grain in bulk instead of sacks, wheat growers of the Pacific coast are saving approximately 10 cents a bushel in operation costs, and are enabled to place their product on foreign markets in competition with Canadian growers who have the advantage of lower freight rates.

Sacked wheat has disappeared almost entirely from export channels at Portland, and bulk handling is rapidly gaining favor in Seattle. Sacks still are used extensively, however, on many farms and at country shipping points.

Abandonment of the sack method was advocated by federal market experts when freight rates west were materially reduced by the Canadian National and the Canadian Pacific railways, which carry export wheat from the interior to Vancouver. Able to place their grain in Pacific ports at a much lower cost Canadian farmers were in position to take the foreign market almost entirely away from the American growers unless economic strategy made it possible for them to offer their wheat at a corresponding price.

It is apparent, official observers say, that bulk shipping is a feasible solution. Government charts show that the farm cost of handling 100 pounds of sacked wheat is 15 cents minimum and 25 cents maximum. In bulk the same quantity costs but 2 cents minimum and 5 cents maximum.

By discarding the sack method for bulk shipping, says E. N. Bates, investigator for the Federal Bureau of Agricultural Economics, harvesting and handling as well as marketing costs are reduced.

"The farmer," he explains, "is relieved of the yearly sacks and twine bill. High priced labor for sewing and handling the sacks is eliminated. Grain in bulk can be cleaned and conditioned in the country, saving freight on dockage and enabling the farmer to market a higher grade of wheat. Grain in bulk bins is readily protected from damaging weather and loss from rodents. It is weighed and inspected faster and cheaper."

SELLS FINE BULL

HOT AIR CURING DEVICE CLAIMED BY IOWA SOLON

(By Associated Press)

ROLAND, Iowa, Nov. 21.—A device has been perfected by State Senator Lars J. Skromme of Roland by which he claims he can take seed corn, not yet dried, and cure it with a hot air blower so it will keep through sub-zero weather and retain more than 95 per cent germination properties.

The invention is especially useful in "soft corn" years. Skromme says corn cured by the process rarely molds or freezes.

The first model was set up at the Iowa state college of agriculture at Ames. It consisted of a crib with a stove arrangement in the center. It failed because the corn dried out in the center nearest the stove and failed to dry out sufficiently near the outer rim of the crib. Skromme then installed an ordinary hot air furnace.

From the furnace, the air is drawn through a flue to a blower where the heated air is mixed with enough cold air to bring about a temperature of from 125 to 130 degrees Fahrenheit.

From the blower the air is forced through a flue between two parallel rows of cribs, to every portion of the crib containers. As many as

2,250 bushels of corn can be handled at one time. The furnace is allowed to run 48 hours and permitted to cool for 24 hours, after which the heat again is turned on for six hours, and then cooled for six hours. During the cooling process, the corn can be blanketed to keep in the heat. By the process, the corn moisture content is reduced to less than 10 percent.
