Mrs. A. Hickman Presents Party's Christmas Program

"The Christmas Story in Song and Legend" was the title of the program narrated by Mrs. A. O. Hickman for the Christmas Party of the 1921 Study Club in the home of Mrs. W. C. Hooks last week. Serving as co-hostesses were:

Mmes Hickman, P. K. Mackey, J. T. Pritchett and R. H. Ratliff, Sr. The house was decorated in a Christmas motif. Mrs. W. W. Rhode, leader, gave the opening prayer. Roll call was answered by each member showing a Christmas card she had received and telling the special significance of the card to her. Several cards were from foreign countries. The members present voted to contribute \$16 to the Mitchell County Federation Library.

Mrs. A. O. Hickman presented the Christmas program, "The Christmas Story in Song and Legend." She opened by saying that religious and secular customs have been a part of our heritage of many centuries. For many years pagan customs overshadowed religious aspects — and observance of festivals were prohibited by the church. Caroling, originated in the song of the angel host on Christmas night, was popular

in England until the 17th century, when the Puritans abolished Christmas festivities, she continued.

The legend of the Three Wise Men is told in the gospel of St. Matthew.

Decorating homes with evergreens became popular in England in the 16th century. Bells and candles are now a traditional part of Christmas. Their legend tells that the tolling of bells on Christmas Eve warned the powers of darkness of the approaching birth of our Savior. Lighted candles in windows guided the Christ Child in his wanderings on Christmas Eve, said Mrs. Hickman.

"Silent Night," one of the most beautiful carols, was written by Mohr, assistant priest in St. Nicholas' Church in Oberndorf Austria. It was set to music by the organist, Grubar. The organ repairman sang it throughout the tyrol. Now it is the traditional song of Christmas, she concluded.

Members present participated in the singing of carols. They sang "Joy To The World," "O Little Town of Bethlehem," "Silent Night," and "We Wish You A Merry Christmas."

Mrs. J. C. Garrett presented a group of solo carols. They

were "We Three Kings of the Orient Are," "O Tannenbaum," "Away in a Manger," and "White Christmas."

Mrs. W. C. Hooks also presented the solo, "Adeste Fideles."

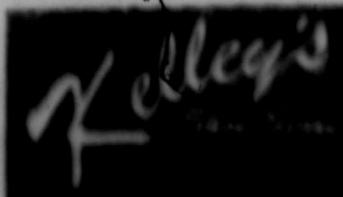

Mrs. Hodges presented a program on the problems of foreign students in American homes. She discussed the problems of language, religion and social life which both these students and their American hosts face.

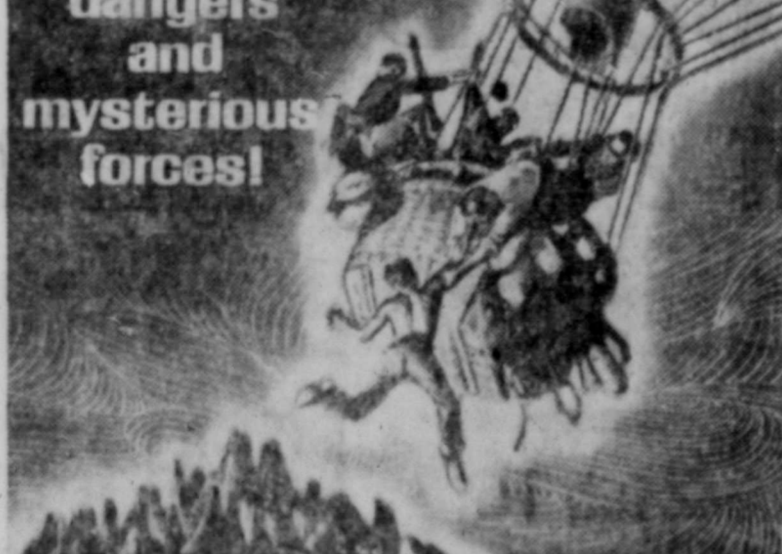

Dr. Mary Elizabeth Roe, 69, a native of Colorado City, died Monday, Dec. 4, in Austin.

She was born in Colorado City June 23, 1892, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore H. Roe.

She graduated from the local high school and attended Texas University in Austin. Miss Roe received her MD from the TU medical branch in Galveston in 1917 and then became one of its staff members.

In 1922, she became physician to women at Texas U., a position she held until 1926. The last 25 years of her professional life was spent in medicine in the field of tuberculosis — first in Kansas State Sanatorium in Norton, Kan., and as director of the school's branch in Topeka, Kan. Miss Roe also served on the Tuberculosis Service staff of the Veterans Administration in Martinsburg, W. V., before her retirement.

Miss Roe retired from active medical practice 2 1/2 years ago due to failing health and had made her home in Austin with her sister, Mrs. James F. Hardie, her only survivor, since that time.

She was an active member of the Presbyterian Church for many years and then became active in the Episcopal Church.

Funeral services were conducted in All-Saints Episcopal Church in Austin with Rev. Gerhard D. Lutz officiating. Burial was in Memorial Park in Austin.

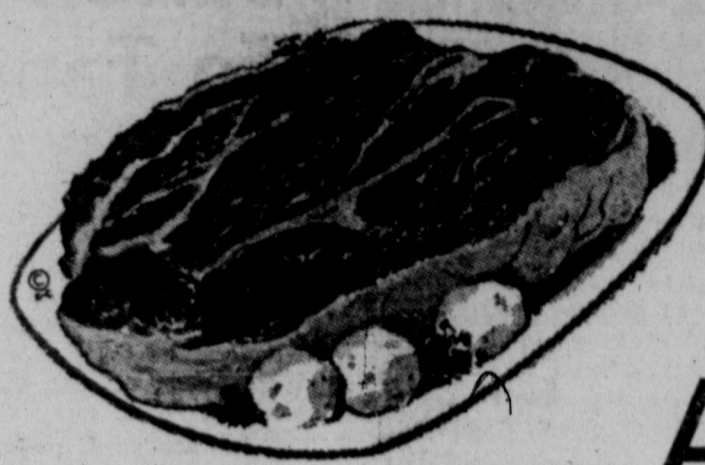
