Ralph Yarborough is a Democrat and I believe he will make a good Governor—as good as Mr. Shivers has made or better. He will have some new ideas to put before the legislature and I am sure they will be sound and good ideas.

I know one thing, the Republicans haven't helped the National or International situation any, neither have they "cleaned up that mess in Washington."

V. C. Shipman Wins First In Judging

Shipman, vocational agriculture teacher in the Loraine High School, walked off with first place honors among 63 vocational ag. teachers in a livestock judging contest held at Texas Tech recently. The 63 vocational ag. teachers were from Area 2, which includes the territory from El Paso to Sweetwater and between Lubbock and Del Rio.

Shipman won first place plaque and Raymond Holt of Highland won second place to make a clean sweep in the judging contest for the Lone Wolf FFA District.

Bob Post, vocational agriculture teacher in Colorado City school, received a certificate of merit for the best supervised farming program in the 18-school Lone Wolf District, which includes Mitchell, Nolan, Coke and Tom Green counties. He also was re-elected for a two-year term as director of State Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association.

In his judging, Shipman scored 298 points out of a possible 300 to capture first place. He had a perfect score on swine and beef cattle and was only 2 points shy of a perfect score on sheep. The judging was of both breeding and fat animals.

Yarborough Asks Action On Water-Soil Conservation

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough of Austin told a Central Texas farm and ranch audience this week that "action now" is needed to preserve Texas' "precious water and soil resources"—not "five more years of crippling delay."

Yarborough, speaking at Johnson City, only a few miles from the multiple dams of the Lower Colorado River Authority, said: "One of the great governmental needs of Texas is a water conservation program of action now."

"Five years of delay in the midst of the worst drought in Texas history ought to be enough to convince everyone that action—not words—is needed."

The Austin attorney, member of the original board of directors of the river authority, called for the construction of "50 great dams on the lower reaches of Texas' main rivers" for the two-way purpose of preventing flood destruction and conserving precious water.

He would supplement this basic program, he said, with the building of many smaller dams on the upper reaches of our rivers, and their tributary streams and ponds and tanks on our farms and ranches.

Yarborough added: "I think it tragic that Texas soil and water conservation has been crippled by the constant backbiting of the United States government by my opponent."

"I am opposed to burning the American flag to satisfy one demagogue. States' rights can be preserved in a cooperative, harmonious local, state, federal conservation program."

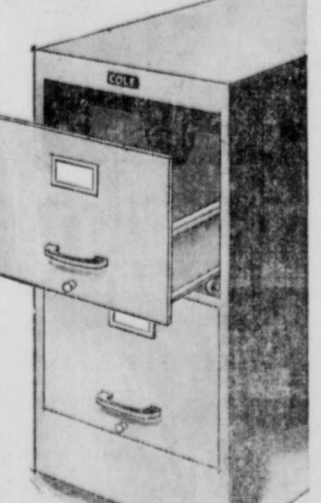
