Death Row Inmate Threatens Lawmaker, Again

AUSTIN (AP) — The same death row inmate caught making a call from a smuggled cell phone in October has sent a letter threatening the life of a Texas lawmaker, officials said.

Texas prison officials also said a different death row inmate's contraband cell phone was discovered Wednesday afternoon, hours after a prison lockdown was lifted.

Prison investigators said Thursday that they received a letter this week from Richard Lee Tabler, 29, with threats against state Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, the chairman of the Senate Criminal Justice Committee, which oversees prison operations.

"My life has never been threatened," said Whitmire in a story for Friday's online edi-

tion of the Austin American-Statesman. "I take this very seriously. I am very concerned for my family and will take the necessary precautions."

A statewide lockdown of the system began last month after Tabler allegedly made threatening calls to Whitmire and shared his illegal cell phone with at least nine of his fellow inmates.

Investigators determined some 2,800 calls were made from the phone from inside the Polunsky Unit near Livingston.

Tabler has been upset about the arrests of his mother and his sister in connection with an investigation into how he obtained a cell phone, said John Moriarty, inspector general for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Tabler's letter also included

threats against Austin American-Statesman reporter Mike Ward, who broke the story about the smuggled cell phone, Moriarty said.

"Let's see you put the (expletive) senator and Mike Ward in protective custody for their (expletive) lies," states a copy of the letter shown to the newspaper.

Moriarty said there is "minimal" likelihood that Tabler could carry out his death threats against Whitmire and Ward.

After receiving the letter, investigators searched Tabler's death row cell and seized a variety of items, Moriarty said.

Prison officials also found a cell phone, a charger, a makeshift weapon and what appeared to be marijuana in the cell of a different death row inmate, just hours after a

statewide lockdown of the system ended.

The phone and other items, including a flat piece of metal sharpened to a point on both edges, were found hidden in a sock Wednesday in convicted murderer Mark Stroman's cell at the Polunsky Unit, said Texas Department of Criminal Justice spokeswoman Michelle Lyons.

The matter was turned over to Moriarty, she said.

"They will be looking into how he got these items."

Moriarty, however, said that task would be difficult because no SIM card was found with the telephone. Such a memory chip would give a record of calls and point to how the phone bill was being paid.

"It's under investigation," said Moriarty, who noted he has a special team devoted to investigating death row cases.

Moriarty said he believes the solution to the cell phone problem is to change federal law to allow state prison officials to "jam the frequencies" and thus make them inoperable.

Southern Okla. Benefits from Texas Air

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Scientists credit declines in high levels of ozone in parts of southern Oklahoma with clearing air above Dallas and Fort Worth.

Better regulation and increased government funding of cleaner energy have resulted in steadily improving air quality in the Dallas area, said Mark Sather, an environmental scientist for the Environmental Protection Agency.

"We do expect over time that the ozone concentrations will continue to decrease," Sather said, "and that will affect southern Oklahoma also."

High ozone levels in the Dallas area averaged 85 parts per

billion this year, compared with more than 100 parts per billion a few years ago, according to EPA reports.

Declines have been reported in southern Oklahoma also, according to the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality. For example, high levels in McAlester dropped to about 71 parts per billion this year from 73 parts per billion last year.

Most wind in Oklahoma comes from the south, said Derek Arndt, associate state climatologist with the Oklahoma Climatological Survey. Wind comes from the north sometimes in the winter, but the rest of the year, the breeze comes from Texas.

Stocks Retreat as Investors Refocus on Economy

NEW YORK (AP) — Wall Street retreated sharply from the previous session's big gains as investors absorbed another wave of downbeat economic news and took little comfort from hints from that another interest rate cut might be possible. The Dow Jones industrials fell more than 270 points.

Some retrenchment was to be expected after such a big advance, in which the Dow rallied more than 550 points after falling near its lows for the year. But there was also plenty of discouraging news for investors to focus on, including comments from Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke that the markets remain under "severe strain" and a sobering report on October retail sales.

The Fed chief said during a speech in Frankfurt, Germany, that he would work closely with other central banks to try to alleviate the global financial crisis and left open the door to a fresh interest rate cut. The Fed is scheduled to meet Dec. 16 at its last regularly-scheduled meeting this year.

While Wall Street would like to see another rate cut, many investors aren't sure, given the litany of bad economic and corporate news, of how effective a rate reduction would be in the near term. Many investors are still trying to assimilate the idea that the economy's downturn would be protracted, lasting well into next year and perhaps longer.

"The economic news continues to be very negative," said Ben Halliburton, chief investment officer of Tradition Capital Management. "Also, the realization that '09 is going to be a very bad year for economic activity is starting to dawn on people and they are starting to digest how bad it's going to be."

The Commerce Department reported that retail sales plunged by the largest amount on record in October as consumers cut back on spending in the wake of the financial crisis. Retail sales fell by 2.8 percent last month, surpassing the old mark of a 2.65 percent drop in November 2001 in the wake of the terrorist attacks that year.

The market got more disappointing consumer news from retailers Abercrombie & Fitch Co. and JCPenney Co. Both warned that profits will come in below Wall Street's already lowered projections as retailers head into a holiday shopping season that could be among the slowest on record.

The great fear on the Street is that Americans' reluctance to spend will extend what is already a serious economic downturn. A stream of negative consumer news sent stocks tumbling earlier in the week.

There was also disquieting news from the tech sector. Sun Microsystems Inc. said it will cut up to 6,000 workers, or about 18 percent of global staff, as part of a massive restructuring plan. And handset maker Nokia Corp. warned the global economic slowdown will weigh on sales next year.

But some analysts said technical factors contributed to Friday's decline.

"We're trying to test new lows," said James Cox, managing partner at Harris Financial Group in Richmond, Va.

"Obviously yesterday we had a successful test, and I think we're going to have another run at it today."

The imminent Nov. 15 deadline for redemption calls at hedge funds and mutual funds added to the losses, analysts said. Redemptions are when investors ask for their money back.

"Without a doubt, there is going to be some pressure on the market to continue to liquidate those positions," said Jim Dunigan, chief investment officer for PNC Wealth Management in Philadelphia. "A lot of that has been done, but not all of it."

In midday trading, the Dow tumbled 271.52, or 3.07 percent, to 8,563.73.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index dropped 31.51, or 3.46 percent, to 879.78, and the Nasdaq composite index stumbled 63.13, or 3.95 percent, to 1,533.57.

The Russell 2000 index of smaller companies fell 22.80, or 4.64 percent, to 468.43.

Declining issues outpaced advances by about 6 to 1 on the New York Stock Exchange, where volume came to a light 427.19 million shares.

On Thursday, the Dow's surge was the third-largest single-session point gain on record, following the 889-point rise on Oct. 28 and the 936-point surge on Oct. 13. The rally came after three days of selling that wiped out about \$1 trillion in shareholder value.

Wall Street's violent swings in recent weeks are part of the market's ongoing "bottoming" process, analysts say, in which the market retests multiyear lows hit last month. The market is expected to remain volatile for some time — as evidenced by past recoveries from a bear market.

Some analysts said investors were also positioning themselves ahead of a meeting of Group of 20 international leaders in Washington this weekend. The meeting could bring decisions on how to help the troubled global financial system.

Government bond prices rose as investors looked for safety. The three-month

Treasury bill's yield fell to 0.15 percent from 0.20 percent late Thursday, and the yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note fell to 3.71 percent from 3.85 percent late Thursday. Lower yields indicate higher demand.

Meanwhile, the price of a barrel of light, sweet crude fell \$2.24 to \$56 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. Oil has been falling for the same reason as stocks

— the fear of a deep global recession.

In corporate news, Ford Motor Co. and General Motors Corp. will be in focus as Senate Democrats pressed ahead with plans to vote next week on a \$25 billion emergency loan plan. The bailout, which still faces strong GOP opposition, could come before Congress on Monday.

Texas Gasoline Prices Average \$2 per Gallon

HOUSTON (AP) — Motorists in Texas are paying about half as much for a gallon of gasoline as they did four months ago.

AAA Texas on Thursday reported the average retail price of gasoline slipped 13 cents this week, to settle at \$2 per gallon.

The nationwide average tumbled 16 cents, to reach \$2.17, as crude oil prices slipped below \$60 per barrel.

The association's survey for mid-July showed the average retail price for gasoline in Texas was \$3.98.

The price at the pumps in Houston and Corpus Christi this week averaged \$1.93 per gallon.

El Paso had the highest average price, at \$2.36 per gallon, which is still down 15 cents from last week.

AAA Texas spokesman Dan Ronan says Thanksgiving travel may be a "more affordable option" for many families.

Ronan says the current average retail cost of gasoline is nearly \$1 lower than during Thanksgiving 2007.

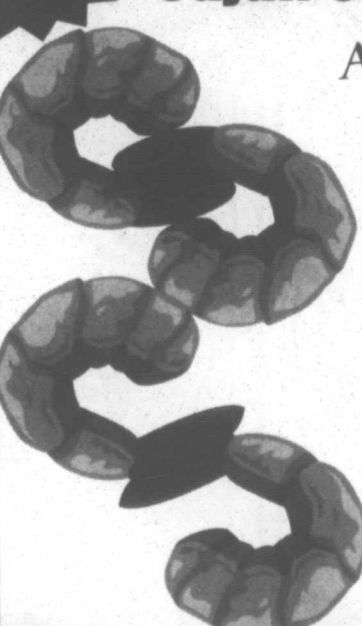

Today in History

Today is Friday, Nov. 14, the 319th day of 2008. There are 47 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 14, 1851, Herman Melville's novel "Moby-Dick; Or, The Whale" was first published in the United States.

On this date:

In 1881, Charles J. Guiteau went on trial for assassinating President Garfield. (Guiteau was convicted and hanged the following year.)

In 1889, inspired by Jules Verne, New York World reporter Nellie Bly (Elizabeth Cochran) set out to travel around the world in less than 80 days. (She made the trip in 72 days.)

In 1908, Joseph R. McCarthy, the Republican senator from Wisconsin whose anti-communism campaign generated much controversy, was born in Grand Chute.

In 1922, the British Broadcasting Corporation began its domestic radio service.

In 1940, during World War II, German planes destroyed most of the English town of Coventry.

In 1969, Apollo 12 blasted off for the moon.

In 1970, a chartered

Southern Airways DC9 crashed while trying to land in Huntington, W.Va., killing all 75 on board, including the Marshall University football team and its coaching staff.

In 1972, the Dow Jones Industrial Average closed above the 1,000 level for the first time, ending the day at 1,003.16.

In 1973, Britain's Princess Anne married Capt. Mark Phillips in Westminster Abbey. (They divorced in 1992, and Anne remarried.)

In 1997, a jury in Fairfax, Va., decided that Pakistani national Aimal Khan Kasi should get the death penalty for gunning down two CIA employees outside agency headquarters. (Kasi was executed on this date in 2002.)

Ten years ago: Iraq said it would resume cooperating with U.N. weapons inspectors as it appeared to back down in the face of a threatened U.S. attack.

Five years ago: John Kerry became the second Democratic hopeful to opt out of public financing for his presidential run, following the example of rival Howard Dean. A third person died following an outbreak of hepatitis A at a Chi-Chi's Mexican restaurant at the Beaver Valley Mall outside Pittsburgh.

One year ago: Michael Mukasey took a ceremonial oath as the new U.S. Attorney General. A justice of the peace ordered O.J. Simpson to stand trial on kidnapping and armed robbery charges stemming from a confrontation with memorabilia dealers in a Las Vegas casino hotel room. (Simpson and a co-defendant were convicted last month.) The prime ministers of North and South Korea launched their first talks in 15 years.

The Internet: A Complete Waste of Time?

Believe it or not, I still receive letters from readers proclaiming the Internet "a complete waste of time." After receiving a number of these missives, I composed a boilerplate response that refuted this misconception. I thought you might enjoy reading it ...

Dear (fill in name of technophobic Luddite here),

Based on what some of the media say, I can understand your cyber-skepticism. Many sites on the "Net" are purely recreational and serve no functional purpose. However, persistent searchers will find some incredible nuggets amongst the fluff (I love mixing metaphors).

Unfortunately, most of the truly "useful" Web sites are only found by accident after countless surfing sessions on the Web. What follows is my list of favorite sites that actually save me time or money.

Let's start with "books." I love to read. When a new book comes out, I am usually one of the first people in line to buy it. However, I won't pay more than I have to. To that end, I got into the habit of checking the prices of different books on Amazon (<http://amazon.com>) and Barnes and Noble's (<http://bn.com>) Web sites. If I had quite a few books to compare, it took a while. Recently, I discovered a neat little Web site that saves me a lot of time (and probably money): Best Book Buys (<http://bestbookbuys.com>).

From their home page, you can search by author, title, subject, keyword or ISBN. After typing in your search, you'll see every book title that matched your search criteria. Clicking the title shows you the price with shipping charges at over 24 book stores! I used to think that Amazon was ALWAYS the cheapest. Boy, was I wrong. They also have a great link called "Hot Deals."

Clicking it will show you a constantly updated page of rebates, coupons and specials at the different stores. I highly recommend this site to book aficionados.

If "books" aren't your thing, maybe computers are. If your community does not have a reputable computer software shop (I always use local guys if I can), shop around on the "Net. Go no further than C'Net's Shopper Service (<http://shopper.com>). Whether you need office software, a new game or a photo organizer, this site will allow you to check the price on a brand across many (and I mean MANY) different vendors. While you won't get as good a deal as on the auctions, you definitely will find the cheapest mail-order price on the

'Net.

In the category of "saving time," I must list Google's calendar function (<http://calendar.google.com>) first. Just one piece in the megasite's offerings, this section allows you to enter your day-to-day appointments and meetings in an easy-to-use form. If you already use a calendar program, such as Outlook, you can easily upload it all to Google's site without having to retype it.

Now, from any Internet computer in the world, you can check your schedule! What makes this site truly exceptional is the number of ways it can alert you when an event is coming up. First, it can send an e-mail message to ANY account(s) reminding you of the event. You can set it to remind you minutes, hours or even days ahead of time. If you have a cell phone that can receive e-mail messages, you can have the system page you with the reminder. You can also share your calendar with friends if you want.

How many of you have ever looked over your long distance bill only to find a phone number you didn't recognize? Well, instead of calling that number (incurring ANOTHER long distance charge),

check out AnyWho (<http://anywho.com>). They are one of the few sites on the 'Net offering a "reverse search" on phone numbers. Some people refer to this as a criss-cross service.

To use it, click on "Reverse Lookup" in the bar at the top and enter the number. It will retrieve the owner of the phone. Only two caveats exist: First, only "listed" numbers will show. People with unlisted numbers will not be listed. Second, this search only works in North America. Other countries are being added, but it is spotty at best right now.

Finally, I find myself wasting a lot of time online by having to go through so much junk e-mail (spam). Recently, I discovered a little trick that has practically eliminated this nuisance. First, sign up for one of the many free e-mail accounts on the Web. One of my favorites is Gmail (<http://gmail.com>). Now, anytime some Web site asks for your e-mail address (and you know the only reason is to send advertising), simply give them this "throwaway" address. That way, all of the spam ends up in your Gmail account, leaving your original one clean. Only give your REAL account to your family and friends. Every couple of weeks or so, log into your "throwaway" account and clean it out.

I'll see you in Cyberspace!

■ Nov. 2

Rocky Mountain News, Denver, on the federal government and U.S. automakers:

A modest sigh of relief is in order with the announcement ... that the U.S. Treasury Department will not hand over billions of dollars in federal aid to facilitate a merger between General Motors and Chrysler. ...

Treasury officials told the Detroit Free Press they were too busy managing their new stake in banks and other financial institutions resulting from the \$700 billion rescue package to get in the car business. And a lame-duck Bush administration is not eager to inject billions of taxpayer dollars in a merger that could lead to 40,000 layoffs. That's 40,000 jobs lost even if Uncle Sam pays up and the merger goes through.

Of course, the next Treasury secretary may not share those reservations. Sen. Barack Obama said he'd like to double the \$25 billion in loan guarantees already

promised to help Detroit retool its assembly lines to build more "clean" cars. And Congress already faces huge pressures to save any of the Big Three from bankruptcy.

However, any further federal assistance would be a huge mistake. The current \$25 billion loan package comes with no guarantee that U.S. consumers will buy clean cars from Detroit instead of vehicles produced by its Asian and European competitors. Upping Washington's ante would throw good money after bad. ...

Robin Hayes told a rally in Concord, "Liberals hate real Americans that work and accomplish and achieve and believe in God." Hayes lost his seat in Congress ... to Democrat Larry Kissell. Obama's victory has — we fervently hope — buried that old division. Patriotism is not the sole possession of the Republican Party. Americans come in all colors, hometowns and political beliefs. Obama won, not with a divisive campaign, but by appealing to the voters' better instincts: For unity, for an end to partisanship, for change. ...

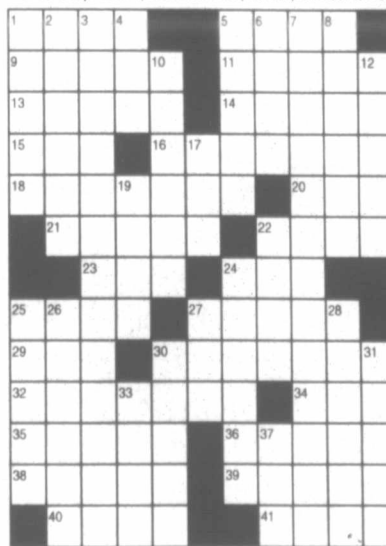

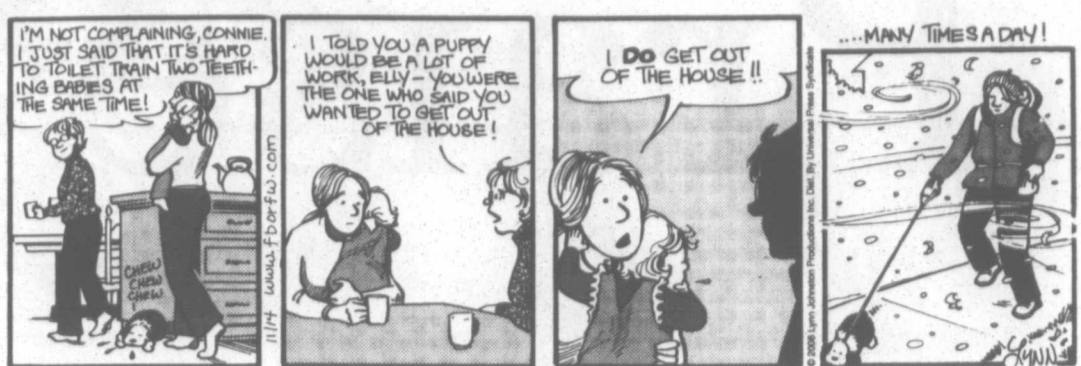

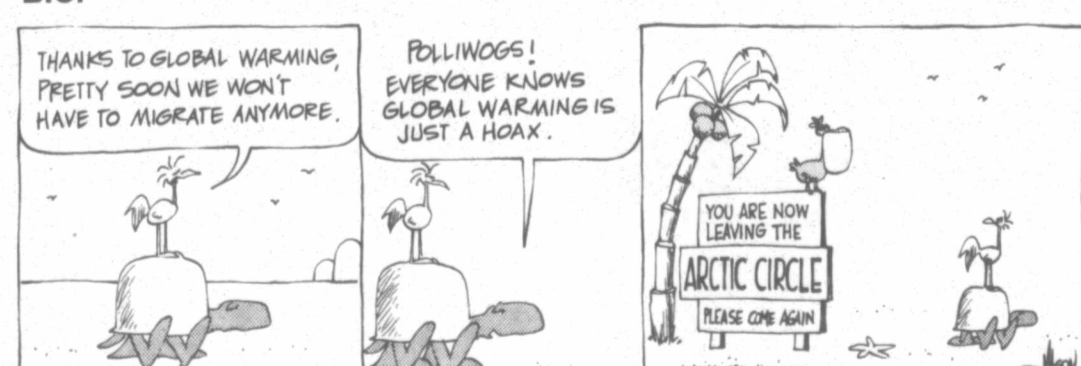

Feely's Field Goal in OT Gives Jets 34-31 Win

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. (AP) — Brett Favre and the New York Jets stand alone atop the tight AFC East standings — barely.

Jay Feely kicked a 34-yard field goal on the only series of overtime after New England tied the game on Matt Cassel's pass to Randy Moss with one second left in regulation and the Jets survived a Tom Brady-like comeback with a 34-31 victory Thursday night.

The win broke a tie for the division lead between the teams and gave the Jets (7-3) sole possession of first place for the first time since Nov. 19, 2001, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. The Patriots (6-4) have won the AFC East the last five seasons and six of the last seven.

New England "had all the momentum," said Favre, who threw two touchdown passes and directed the winning drive. "Based on history, you would have bet against us. This says a lot about our team."

The Jets, who led 24-6 in the first half, extended their winning streak to four with their sixth victory in seven games and are 1 1/2 games ahead of Buffalo and Miami in the division. They beat the Patriots for only the second time in 13 games.

"It's a great, great feeling for us," Jets coach Eric Mangini said. "Everybody understands that this game was extremely important, and it's important because it allows us to make the next game (against Tennessee) extremely important. It's a really positive step for our team."

The loss wasted a brilliant performance by Cassel, whose first pro start after Brady's season-ending knee injury in the opener came in a 19-10 win over the Jets. Cassel completed 30 of 51 passes for 400 yards, all career highs, and three touchdowns. He ran eight times for 62 yards, sixth-most in team history for a quarterback and the most since Steve Grogan ran for 65 in consecutive games in 1978.

"It's not enough," Cassel said.

The Patriots got the tying touchdown on Cassel's 16-yard pass on fourth down. Moss' diving sideline catch was reviewed when he was pushed out of bounds by cornerback Ty Law, but the touchdown stood.

New England had marched to Moss' touchdown from its 38-yard line with no timeouts and 1:04 left.

Stephen Gostkowski's extra point tied it and erased a 31-24 lead the Jets had taken on Thomas Jones' 1-yard touchdown run with 3:10 left.

"I don't know what their record was in overtime," Mangini said, "but I'm sure they've been pretty successful."

Favre made his 263rd consecutive regular-season start, an NFL record, and went 26-of-33 for 258 yards and, on the only drive of overtime, marched the Jets 64 yards on 14 plays in 7:50. His 16-yard pass to Laveranues Coles brought the ball to the Patriots' 24-yard line, three running plays moved it to the 16 and Feely connected for his second field goal of the game — giving Favre his 42nd win in games his team trailed or were tied in the fourth quarter.

"I was nervous as heck" heading into overtime, he said. "I said, 'Why can't we make this easy?' But it's what I'm capable of doing."

"This one ranks right up there near the top" of all his wins.

The Jets scored on their first three series, plus a 92-yard kickoff return by Leon Washington, four days after

scoring on all seven of their first-half possessions in a 47-3 rout of the St. Louis Rams.

Washington scored on a 7-yard pass play before the Patriots cut the lead to 7-3 on their first series on the first of Gostkowski's three field goals, a 42-yarder.

Feely kicked a 22-yarder for the Jets before Gostkowski connected again, from 31 yards to cap a 12-play drive.

New York needed just one play — Washington's return — to score on the ensuing kickoff. It was his first kickoff return for a touchdown this season after he tied a team record last year with three.

And when Favre threw a 15-yard scoring pass to Jericho Cotchery, the Jets led 24-6 with 4:57 left in the first half and the outlook was very bleak for the Patriots.

"We dug ourselves a hole," New England coach Bill Belichick said. "We made some plays to get back in there."

Cassel threw a 19-yard scoring pass to Jabar Gaffney with 15 seconds left in the half and a 10-yarder to Benjamin Watson on the final play from scrimmage of the third quarter. Then New England made it 24-21 on Cassel's 2-point conversion pass to Gaffney.

"Anytime you can come back from a 24-6 deficit, it's a building block," Cassel said. "That was great for the team."

The Patriots tied it on Gostkowski's 47-yard field goal with 10:16 left in the fourth quarter.

But they never led and never got the chance after the Jets won the overtime coin toss.

"We usually win those type of games," Patriots defensive end Richard Seymour said, "but there's still a lot of football left."

Notes: Jones rushed or 104 yards after running for 149 yards and three touchdowns against St. Louis. ... New England's Wes Welker extended his record of catching at least six passes in a game to start the season to 10 games. ...

Longhorns Look to Stay in Chase Against Kansas

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — He's a proud kid, an undersized quarterback who grew up in Texas and loved his home state Longhorns — only to be spurned by them.

Todd Reesing's also a straightforward kid. He won't deny that getting ready to lead Kansas against the fourth-ranked Longhorns on Saturday is causing his competitive heart to beat a bit faster.

"I grew up in Austin, obviously watching the 'Horns," Reesing said. "My dad went to UT. So I would be lying if I told you (the game) wasn't a little bit bigger for me."

Rejected by the school he always dreamed of playing for, Reesing wound up at Kansas, and the Jayhawks couldn't be happier. In less than two full seasons, he already holds 32 school passing records. Through the first 10 games this year for the Jayhawks (6-4, 3-3 Big 12), he ranks in the top 10 nationally in completions, yards and total offense.

Texas coach Mack Brown graciously agreed last year, while Reesing was leading the Jayhawks to a 12-1 record, that "anyone who did not recruit him made a mistake."

It's not that Reesing's making it any sort of vendetta game, or grimly setting out to show Texans everywhere what they missed. But Kansas' first game against Texas since 2004 may be like none other for the junior quarterback.

"You got to try to not make it as big to yourself, but it is going to be fun," he said. "I grew up watching Texas and cheering for them, so now that I am playing against them, it will be a lot of fun."

As proud as Kansas fans are of Reesing, however, it would be hard to mount a credible argument that he would be starting for Texas this season. The Longhorns (9-1, 5-1) have a guy named Colt McCoy who's pretty good, too.

After throwing five touchdown passes last week in a rout of Baylor, McCoy's passer rating in 36 games is

158.2, No. 1 all-time among Texas quarterbacks. He's hit a shade under 70 percent of his passes for 8,752 yards and 79 touchdowns in his career.

"He is a quality player," said Kansas coach Mark Mangino. "He is one of the most improved quarterbacks from last year to this year. Whoever works with him in the offseason has done a magnificent job. He is way ahead of where he was at this time last year. He has a lot more poise, he is throwing the ball better and he is running the ball better."

The Longhorns' lone loss this year was to Big 12 South rival Texas Tech, ranked No. 2 in the country this week right behind No. 1 Alabama. But Texas has a victory over Oklahoma, and if the Sooners should beat Tech in their upcoming game while Texas wins out, the Longhorns

could slip out of the crowded South into the Big 12 championship game next month.

A win there, and they might get a chance at another national championship.

"It is what it is," said Texas cornerback Ryan Palmer. "The main thing is winning, and we didn't win against Tech, so we're here now. We can't go back and 'what if's' and this and that. We just have to finish strong and win our last two conference games and see where we go after that."

Kansas, a 13-point underdog, needs to win its last two games, against Texas and Missouri, or face an embarrassing drop-off from its historic 12-1 season of 2007.

Texas expects the Jayhawks to be at the top of their game.

What's at Stake

Texas must avoid an upset to stay in contention for the Big 12 South title and the national championship hunt. Colt McCoy's big game last week against Baylor may have taken the personal sting out of the loss to Texas Tech the week before, but another big game is needed to bolster his flagging Heisman Trophy stock. Kansas, which finishes the regular season next week against No. 12 Missouri, needs to win at least one of these last two to secure a decent bowl bid and avoid falling too much further from last year's 12-1 campaign.

Key Matchup

Texas DE Brian Orakpo and Kansas' freshmen tackles Jeremiah Hatch and Jeff Spikes. Hatch and Spikes have switched sides since conference play began but both have had their troubles. Orakpo did not play last week after hurting his knee against Texas Tech. But he was expected to return.

Players to Watch

Texas: QB Colt McCoy and WR/KR Jordan Shipley. McCoy bounced right back from the Texas Tech loss by throwing five touchdown passes in the victory over Baylor. Shipley has two returns for touchdowns and Kansas has been hurting in kick coverage.

Kansas: QB Todd Reesing. A native of Austin who was ignored by the Longhorns, Reesing will be as motivated as he's been in any game of his career. But the undersized junior also had the worst game of his life last week in Kansas' loss at Nebraska.

Facts & Figures

Kansas has started the same 22 players on both offense and defense the past two games. ... The game is a sellout and the Jayhawks are on pace to set a stadium attendance record for the fourth consecutive year. ... The last time Texas visited Kansas, in 2004, the Longhorns rallied for a 27-23 and Kansas coach Mark Mangino had to apologize for remarks he made about officiating in a heated postgame news conference.

Thursday's National Sports in Brief

NEW YORK (AP) — Cliff Lee won the American League Cy Young Award in a runaway, capping a dominant comeback season that made him the second consecutive Cleveland Indians lefty to earn the honor.

Demoted to the minors last year, Lee went a major league-best 22-3 this season with a 2.54 ERA. He received 24 of 28 first-place votes and 132 points in balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

Toronto ace Roy Halladay was a distant runner-up with four first-place votes and 71 points. Record-setting closer Francisco Rodriguez of the Los Angeles Angels finished third with 32 points.

Lee became the third Cleveland pitcher to win a Cy Young, following Hall of Famer Gaylord Perry in 1972 and CC Sabathia last year.

An 18-game winner in

2005, Lee was hurt in spring training last year and struggled so badly he was sent to the minors. He returned to the big leagues and finished 5-8 with a 6.29 ERA, then was left off Cleveland's postseason roster.

He won a spot in the rotation during spring training and was the league's top pitcher from April on. Lee had an amazing 0.67 ERA through his first seven outings and was 12-2 with a 2.31 ERA when he started for the AL in the July 15 All-Star game at Yankee Stadium.

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — Imprisoned NFL quarterback Michael Vick expects to return to pro football, according to his bankruptcy attorneys, who laid out a plan to pay creditors based in part on his anticipated earnings.

The former Atlanta Falcons star is serving a 23-

month sentence in a federal penitentiary for bankrolling a dogfighting ring in rural Virginia and is scheduled to be released on July 20.

Once the NFL's highest-paid player, Vick has assets of \$16 million and liabilities of \$20.4 million, according to the court filing in which attorneys wrote in extraordinary detail about Vick's dizzying financial mess — listing a fleet of vehicles, properties, businesses and the extended family he supported.

A Vick attorney said a committee representing all his debtors has proposed a plan to pay off his debt. A judge scheduled a hearing for mid-December on the appointment of a trustee, which Vick's attorneys oppose.

Vick still faces two state felony counts — dogfighting and animal cruelty. They carry maximum prison terms

of 10 years, but under a plea deal, Vick would serve a suspended sentence and a year of probation.

He is scheduled to appear in Surry County Circuit Court on Nov. 25.

NEW YORK (AP) — Nick Swisher became the first part of the New York Yankees' offseason makeover when he was acquired from the Chicago White Sox in a five-player trade.

Choosing to address first base before concentrating on pitching when the free-agent market opens Friday, the Yankees obtained Swisher and right-hander Kaneoka Texeira for pitching prospect Jeff Marquez, infielder Wilson Betemit and minor league pitcher Jhonny Nunez.

A switch-hitter who turns 28 on Nov. 25, Swisher was acquired by the White Sox

from Oakland last January and hit .219 with 24 homers and 69 RBIs. He struck out 135 times and his .332 on-base percentage was the lowest of his career.

Swisher, a son of former major league catcher Steve Swisher, could replace Jason Giambi at first base. Should the Yankees sign free agent Mark Teixeira or another first baseman, Swisher could take over in right field from Bobby Abreu, who is a free agent.

In another trade, the Chicago Cubs acquired reliever Kevin Gregg from the Florida Marlins, a move that appears to end Kerry Wood's career in Chicago.

Wood, the 1998 NL Rookie of the Year who saved 34 games this year, had been the longest-tenured player on the Cubs. General manager Jim Hendry said Wood was deserving of a three- or four-year deal and

the Cubs are not prepared to offer him one.

ASHBURN, Va. (AP) — Clinton Portis' sprained knee has shown no improvement, and the Washington Redskins running back appears unlikely to play in Sunday night's game against the Dallas Cowboys.

The NFL's second-leading rusher left Redskins Park during practice, wearing a gray hooded sweat shirt and burgundy sweat pants as he stepped into his Maserati.

Portis sprained his left knee in the 23-6 loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers before last week's bye.

With Portis ailing, Ladell Betts appears set to start Sunday. Betts has missed the last three games with a sprained knee, but he was on the field in steady rain for practice.

Report: Illegal Immigrant Minors Mistreated by US

DALLAS (AP) — Federal authorities have compromised the rights and safety of some unaccompanied illegal immigrant children they have detained, and inadequate government guidelines are partly to blame, according to a Texas-based research group.

Many children appeared before immigration judges without legal representation, some were transported home in shackles or cages, and the medical needs of some were ignored, according to a report released Thursday by the Center for Public Policy Priorities, a nonprofit think tank.

"There's no consistent policy. There's nobody who's responsible for these kids, in looking out for their safety," report author Amy Thompson said. "It's

being handled in ad hoc fashion."

The Department of Homeland Security, which oversees immigration and border enforcement, disputes the center's findings.

"DHS and its component agencies treat all minors, including unaccompanied alien children, with dignity, respect and special concern for their particular vulnerabilities," spokeswoman Laura Keehner said in a statement Thursday evening.

The report was compiled by examining U.S. immigration agency documents and immigration policies and statistics in the U.S., Mexico and Honduras. The center also interviewed children who were apprehended, government officials, contractors and nonprofit

workers in the three countries, and toured two Texas facilities where unaccompanied illegal immigrant children are held.

An estimated 43,000 unaccompanied illegal immigrant children were removed from the U.S. in 2007, according to the report. They were caught while traveling alone, or with siblings, other children or adults whom they may not know.

Fifty to 70 percent of unaccompanied minors who appeared before an immigration judge last year did so without legal representation, the center contends. Sometimes, consulates weren't notified about the repatriation of children from their country, a violation of an international treaty, the report says.

SC Gov. Sanford Named Head of GOP Governor Group

MIAMI (AP) — South Carolina Gov. Mark Sanford was elected the new chairman of the Republican Governors Association today.

Sanford succeeds Texas Gov. Rick Perry, who will now serve as finance chairman. The association has been meeting this week in Miami — and some discussions have revolved around what went wrong for the party on Election Day.

"I am honored and excited to become chairman of the Republican Governors

Association as we work together to win a majority of governors by 2010," Sanford said in a statement released by the group. "Republican governors are natural leaders who will find solutions to our nation's challenges and bring back the party."

Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour was selected vice chairman; Georgia Gov. Sonny Perdue will head up recruitment efforts; and Florida Gov. Charlie Crist will be in charge of the group's annual gala.

Sanford is a 48-year-old for-

mer congressman. His second term as governor ends in 2011 and term limits prevent him from running again.

While Republicans lost the White House and some strength in Congress earlier this month, South Carolina continued its solidly red state track record on Election Day. Voters in the state picked John McCain for president, returned Lindsey Graham to the U.S. Senate and kept the GOP in control of the Legislature.

Dunwoody First Female 4-Star General

WASHINGTON (AP) — From its humble beginning 33 years ago at Fort Sill, Okla., the career of Ann E. Dunwoody ascended Friday to a peak never before reached by a woman in the U.S. military: four-star general.

At an emotional promotion ceremony, Dunwoody added a fourth star and, looking back on her years in uniform, said it was a credit to the Army that she was given a chance to rise through the ranks in a male-dominated military.

"Thirty-three years after I took the oath as a second lieutenant, I have to tell you this is not exactly how I envisioned my life unfolding," she told a standing-room-only auditorium. "Even as a young kid, all I ever wanted to do was teach physical education and raise a family."

"It was clear to me that my Army experience was just going to be a two-year detour en route to my fitness profession," she added. "So when asked, 'Ann, did you ever think you were going to be a general officer, to say nothing about a four-star?' I say, 'Not in my wildest dreams.'"

"There is no one more surprised than I — except, of course, my husband. You know what they say, 'Behind every

successful woman there is an astonished man.'"

Later, at Fort Belvoir, Va. — her birthplace — Dunwoody was being sworn in as commander of the Army Materiel Command, responsible for equipping, outfitting and arming all soldiers. Just five months ago, she became the first female deputy commander there.

Dunwoody, 55, has made it clear that she feels no need for special acclaim for her historic achievement.

"The recognition makes her a little bit uncomfortable from the standpoint of the gender aspect — that we're making a big deal (that) she is the first female general officer," Bryan Whitman, a Pentagon spokesman, said Thursday in announcing that Defense Secretary Robert Gates would attend her promotion ceremony.

When she was nominated by President George W. Bush in June for promotion to four-star rank, Dunwoody issued a statement saying she was humbled.

"I grew up in a family that didn't know what glass ceilings were," she said. "This nomination only reaffirms what I have known to be true about the military throughout my career — that the doors

continue to open for men and women in uniform."

She also told an internal Army publication, "While I may be the first, I know I won't be the last."

Her nomination was confirmed by the Senate in July.

There are 21 female general officers in the Army — all but four at the one-star rank of brigadier. It was not until 1970 that the Army had its first one-star: Anna Mae Hays, chief of the Army Nurse Corps.

Women now make up about 14 percent of the active-duty Army and are allowed to serve in a wide variety of assignments. They are still excluded from units designed primarily to engage in direct combat, such as infantry and tank units, but their opportunities have expanded over the past two decades.

Dunwoody received her Army commission after graduating from the State University of New York in 1975.

Her first assignment was to Fort Sill, as supply platoon leader in June 1976, and she remained at Sill in various positions until she was sent to quartermaster officer school at Fort Lee, Va., in July 1980.

She later served in Germany and Saudi Arabia.
