High Hopes, Caution Felt As Lightweight Bobcats Practice

Sweaty grunts and popping shoulder pads out behind the North Grade School have signaled the approach of another Dimmitt High School football season.

Twice a day—in the morning and in the afternoon—the Dimmitt Bobcat hopefuls run through their pre-school drills in preparation for another tough season.

Apparently this will be another rough season. While information on other school teams is almost non-existent at this time, three of the schools—Tulia, Canyon and Dalhart—are almost large enough to go class AAA, whereas Dimmitt and Friona have a long way to go. This is significant in that smaller schools, teams have fewer boys to draw from.

Dimmitt has been pre-season picked by area daily newsmen as the team to beat in District 1-AA. However in the past few seasons these guesses have been consistently upset.

Coach J. D. Covington has had some changes in his coaching staff.

On the high school football team staff has been added Bill Culppepper, recently of Texas Christian University, who will be line coach to replace Alvis Fuquay who is now High School Principal. Mr. and Mrs. Culppepper have one daughter and he has already assumed his new duties. John Ethridge, Dimmitt basketball coach will fill in as end coach during the football season.

A new coach is Jim Wilson, a single man from North Texas State College who is replacing Ronnie Mills who has gone to Stratford as assistant coach. Wilson will coach the grade and freshman teams plus helping out with the high school teams.

"We're awfully light this year," Covington says, "especially in the line. We can't tell yet what will happen, but the size of our boys available for line duty is not up to our hopes."

The Bobcats take on the Perry-

ton Rangers of Conference 5-AA in the season. The game will be Saturday night, September 5th at Perryton. Perryton is always a highly-respected team. Last year they won eight and lost three and in the process took their district championship.

The big thrash this year within the District will probably be Dalhart and Canyon, as usual, with Friona running as the dark horse.

The big change in the Bobcat team this year will be the shift of Junior Coffey from end to full-back. As a sophomore last year Coffey was an all-district end and he has shown promise of being one of the hardest men to tackle in the area. His place will be taken by Stanley Nelson.

Nucleus of this year's team will be more of last year's returning starters. They are Hal Rateliff, end; Jack Ragland, tackle; Carlos Barnes, quarter back;

and Jerry Hyatt, halfback.

The remainder of the team will be made up of a strong group of returnees from last year. They include Jimmy Slough, guard; Marshal Young, guard and tackle; Joe Burkett, tackle; Carl E. Kemp, center; Darless Goolsby, center; Junior Pensia, guard; Jerry Blackwell, end; James Powell, end; Ben Scott, tackle; Leroy O'Brian, tackle; Jimmy Campbell, guard; Howard Cummings, guard and tackle; Jack Thompson, guard; Jackie Clark, guard; and Clay Gable, guard; and backs Ted Collins and Marion Oakley.

There are also some sophomore linemen and backs who show promise of seeing a lot of action this season.

Only a few season tickets are still available in the reserve seat section of the local west bleachers. They are going at \$6.00 per seat and will be good for four home games.

Petition Circulates Asking For Local Option Election In County JP Precinct No. 4

A petition calling for a local option liquor election in Justice of the Peace Precinct 4 is being circulated.

The petition blank was issued at the County Clerk's office Tuesday and when signed by one-fourth of the number of people who voted in the last general presidential election, will be presented to the Commissioner's Court for the calling of an election.

The action comes as the result of a recent State Supreme Court decision to permit precincts or towns within dry counties to vote themselves wet.

The petition calls for a proposition to read "(for or against) The legal sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption."

In the case of petitions to call local option elections the names of ten applicants for the petition must be filed at the County Clerk's office. The persons whose names appear as petition applicants are Joe Warren, Mrs. Joe Warren

Mrs. Josephine Ball, Eugene Kern, Albert Gerber, Donald Annen, Albert Schulte, F. P. Schacher, Urban Ball, and Jerry H. Wilhelm.

Justice Precinct 4 takes in the northeast corner of Castro County. Should the petition acquire the requisite number of signatures and the election should be called and passed in that precinct, then the sale of alcoholic beverages would be legal on a package store basis at any point in the precinct.

At its regular meeting Monday, the Castro County Commissioner's Court defined exactly the boundaries of the four Justice of the Peace Precincts. The southwest corner of precinct four lies in the lobby of the courthouse and the lobby extends east up the alley of the block just east (by Ray's Steak House Cafe, behind C&S Equipment Company, by the water tower, behind the old Reuben's Machine Shop building, etc.) and due east until it runs into State Highway 86 where it curves about two miles from town. The line then runs up the center of the highway to the Swisher county line where it goes north to the northeast corner of the county and then back west.

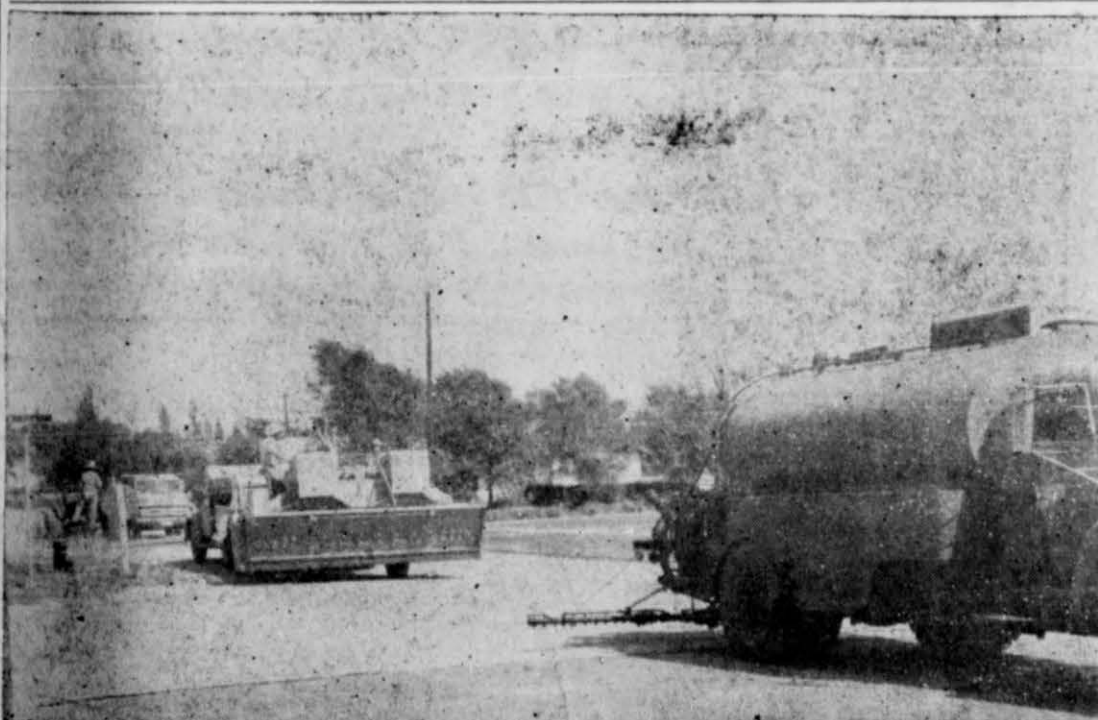
Justice Precinct 4's northwest corner falls about the center of the northern boundary of the county. It turns back south and

runs down a dirt road until it intersects with U.S. Highway 385 where that highway makes a jog to the west towards Hereford near Jumbo. From the point of intersection it runs down the center of the Highway to Dimmitt and the intersection of Highways 86 and 385. At this point the precinct line turns east and goes one-half block on to the center of the alley on the north side of the street (between White's furniture store and F and K Sales & Service). At this point it crosses the highway southwardly and joins with the other boundary to form the precinct's southwest corner in the lobby of the courthouse.

For all practical purposes, Justice Precinct 4 includes the northeast one-fourth of Castro County including all of Nazareth, Arney and Jumbo and the northeast one-fourth of the City of Dimmitt.

If the election does approve package stores it means the legal sale of alcoholic beverages within about 7 miles of Hereford, 14 miles of Tulia, and 9 miles of Happy. If it passes it will make Precinct 4 the closest wet area to Lubbock and the general South Plains area.

There is no way of telling at present when the election will be held if the petition is successful. It must be presented to the Commissioners Court and a date set.

High Plains Station Field Day Sept. 24th

The Third Annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation will be held September 24, east of Olton and 15 miles west 1959, at Halfway, Texas, 10 miles of Plainview on Highway 70, Dr. Thomas C. Longnecker, director of the Foundation, announced today.

Guided tours will begin at 1:30. Staff members and scientists from the Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Texas Experimental Station and agricultural representatives of commercial companies will be at designated stops to discuss the research being conducted. The tours will cover such experimental research as cotton fertilization, grain sorghum varieties and fertilization experiments, irrigation efficiency or cotton, recharge well and bench leveling, cotton skip-row and interplanting, soybean fertilization and rate of seeding and row spacing tests, castor bean variety and fertilizer tests.

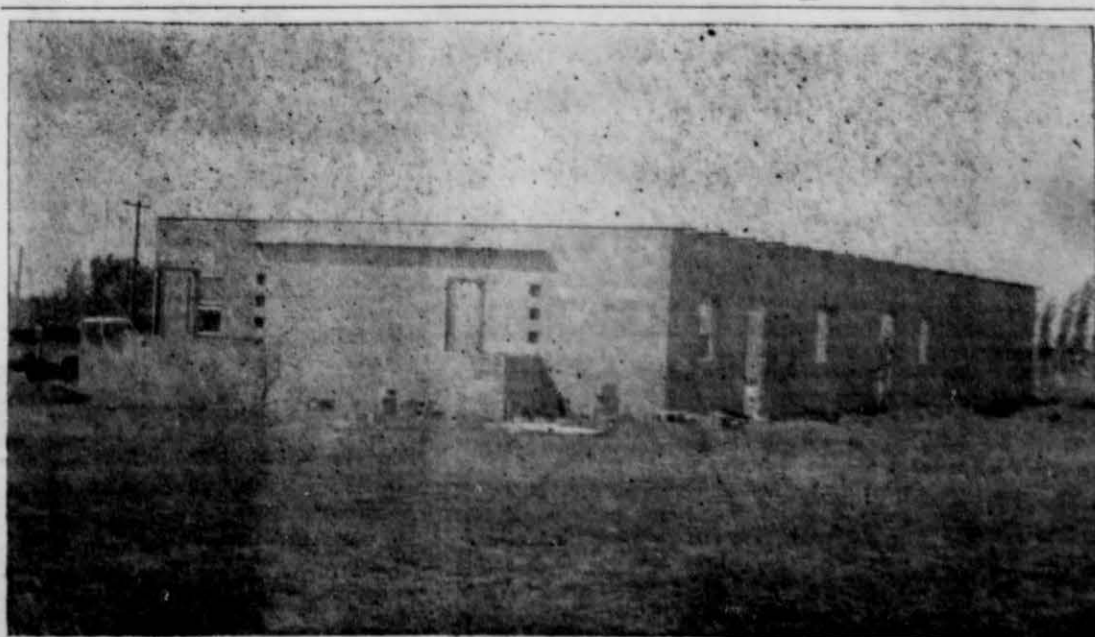

New Field House Being Built at Football Field

Under construction at the Dimmitt High School football stadium is a new field house which will contain two football dressing rooms, public rest rooms for fans, storerooms and coaches' offices.

Cost of the 74 x 36-foot building will be about \$15,000. It will be modern in every respect and according to Coach J. D. Covington, will be the best field house in the district. The only other school in the five-team district with a field house is Friona. Their's is a frame structure sitting at the north end of the field.

The new building is being constructed of concrete blocks and is located just north of the west bleachers. Coach Covington said the school had considered a frame building but that the cost would have approximated that of the concrete blocks so it was decided to go the latter route. At present the bricklaying is almost finished and carpenters were, preparing Wednesday to pour the floors. The building will probably be ready for the first home game with Hereford on September 18.

"With all roads to the Ranch now paved, we are hoping to have a record turn-out for the rodeo, and we hope there is, as this is the only event of the year when the boys get to show what they can do," said Cal Farley, Ranch founder.

Boys from five through 17 will ride in bronze, steer, bull and calf busting events for points and prizes, as well as the title of Best All-Around Cowboy. Boys taking top honors become eligible to qualify for the crack riding group at the Ranch, the colorful Boys Ranch Honor Patrol.

Among other events featuring the boys will be the clowning, trick riding, the wild horse scramble, and calf riding.

Providing music for the two performances will be the widely known 40-piece Amarillo Air Force Base Golden Spread band with War Warrant Officer Guy Stone directing.

The rodeo, staged entirely by Boys Ranchers, features only the youngsters from the ranch. Specialty acts by well-known rodeo performers will be presented between the fast, action-packed regular events, but these will be the only "outsiders" in the show.

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1,600 Bracerios Available for County Cotton

Three Castro County citizens, Judge-elect Raymond Wilson, Jim Hayes and Bascom Nelson, will serve as a County Farm Labor Committee and meet with Mr. Thomas R. Jewell, manager of the Texas Employment Commission office in Littlefield, to review the total seasonal employment needs developed by the TTX. Also in attendance was Mr. Wayne Grant, district director of Amarillo.

The committee was presented with the figures of the TTX that Castro County will be short 1,600 cotton pullers during the peak period of the cotton harvest. This shortage will be met by the importation of Mexican National Bracerios workers.

The committee will function under Public Law 78 obtaining facts relevant to the supply of domestic farm workers existing in Castro County and the shortage of workers, if any, which must be met by importing Mexican Nationals to harvest the cotton crop. Under Public Law 78 the TTX must supply this information to the Secretary of Labor who must limit the number of Mexican Nationals to be used in this country by granting a "ceiling." The committee consists with the local office manager to assist him in estimating the number of workers who will be needed, based on current local conditions affecting the cotton crop.

"Ceilings" granted by the Secretary of Labor limiting the importation of Mexican Nationals into this area will be posted in Post offices in Dimmitt, Hart, and Nazareth, in the County Agent's office and in the County Court-house.

In addition to the Bracerios, the Employment Commission considers there are a maximum of 1,650 local seasonal hands available and that more than 2,500 migratory workers can be expected although crops south of here will hold up many for some time. The county has 58,000 acres of cotton and general estimates are that less than 45,000 bales will be produced due to heavy spring rains.

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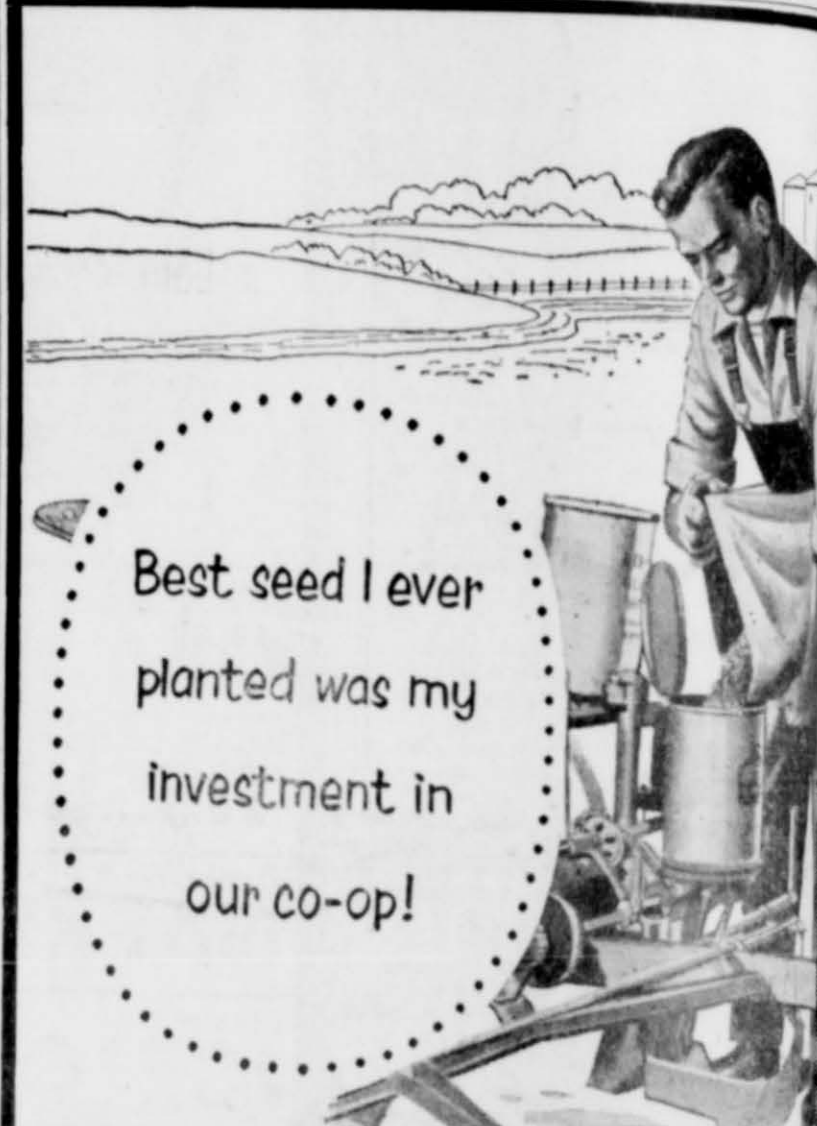

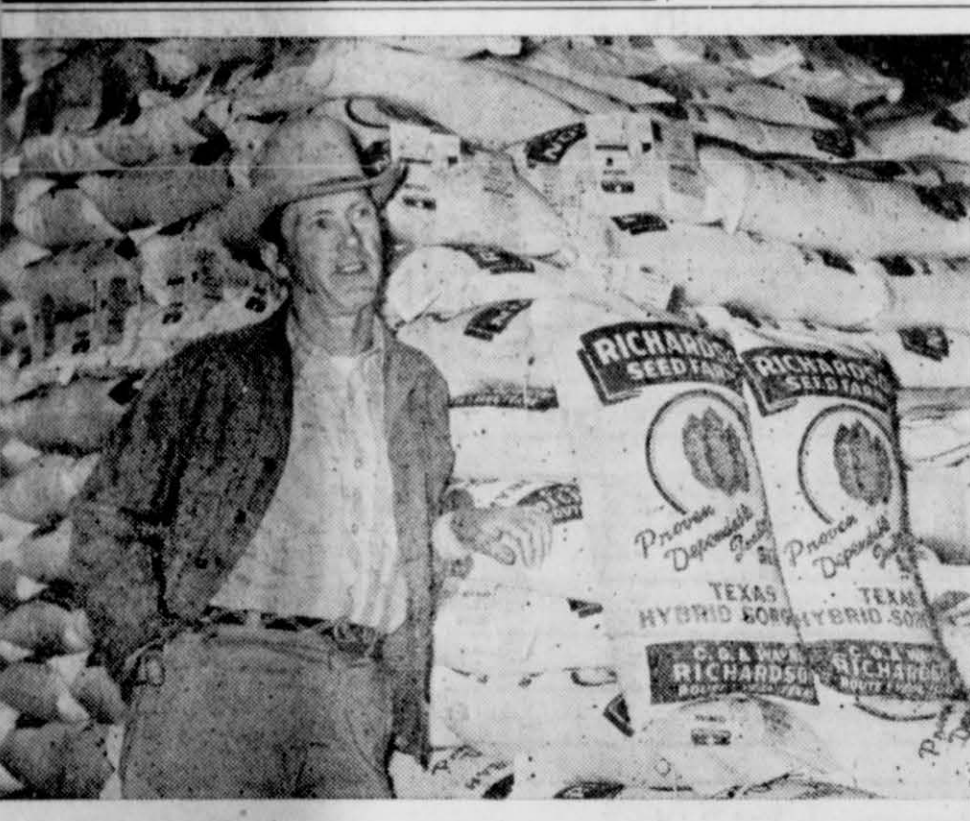

EQUAL TIME
The House last week passed the Equal Time bill. Under the communications Act, any radio or TV station permitting a candidate for public office to appear on their facilities is required to afford equal time to other contestants in that race.

This provision in the law had been under fire for a long time from the TV and radio industry. Many in these groups wanted to repeal the section outright. This would leave it to the discretion of TV and radio operators as to how they would handle political appearances. This could not be done without opening the door to possibilities of abuse and fraud and resulting scandals which could shake the industry as a whole. The whole matter came to a head when a perennial candidate in Chicago who had been displayed on TV taking part in some official and semi-official activities. The matter was appealed to the Federal Communications Commission which ruled that under the law as written, the perennial candidate was entitled to the equal time, even though the activities of the mayor were in an official or semi-official capacity and on a regular scheduled newscast. The matter underwent long and exhaustive hearings before the Interstate Commerce Commission. The result was that the bill passed the House last week. This bill makes it possible for the people to receive the news regardless of what personalities might be involved, without affecting the TV and radio stations.
