Crash attributed to ice accumulation?

Recorders could hold answers

Could it happen in Midland?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Investigators are hoping critical voice and instrument recordings from the crumpled Air Florida jet that crashed into the Potomac River will reveal whether excessive ice accumulation kept the plane from gaining altitude.

Divers planned to plunge back into the ice-filled river today to salvage the recording instruments, which are expected to give precise clues to the Wednesday crash that killed 78 people.

Hampered by sub-freezing temperatures and sporadic snowfall, boat crews pulled the bodies of an infant and a woman from the icy river Thursday, bringing to 11 the number of bodies recovered.

Seventy-nine people, including five crew members, were aboard the Florida-bound Boeing 737 when it crashed seconds after takeoff from National Airport. Four passengers and a flight attendant were rescued.

Sixty-five people are presumed still entombed in the broken airliner, which rests in 25 feet of water about three-quarters of a mile from the airport.

The death toll rose to 78 when two motorists, whose vehicles were struck by the plane when it clipped a bridge spanning the Potomac, died Thursday in Washington hospitals. Two other motorists died Wednesday.

Francis McAdams, who heads the National Transportation Safety Board investigative team, said it could take several days before the 100,000-pound fuselage is pulled by crane from the river. Meanwhile, drivers have marked the location of the voice and instrument recorders in the plane's wing section, which McAdams says has separated from the rest of the fuselage.

Investigation sources acknowledged that great attention is being placed on trying to determine whether the aircraft had been properly deiced before it took off from National Airport during steady snowfall Wednesday, bound for Tampa and Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

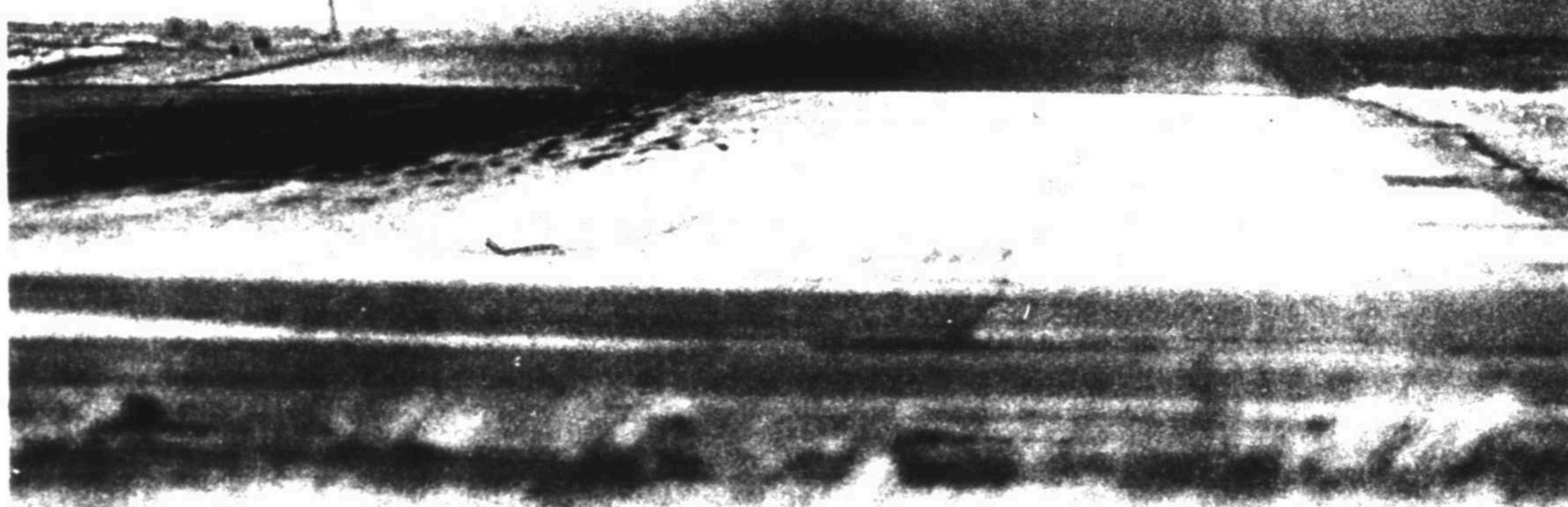
The deicing fluid used on the plane has been impounded and several witnesses who observed the aircraft preparing for takeoff have been interviewed. "We'll know a lot more about whether ice might have been a problem after we listen to the recorders," one investigator said.

McAdams told reporters the amount of ice on the aircraft "definitely is an issue" to be thoroughly examined. Investigators said excessive ice can add substantial weight, cause non-uniform air flow over the wings affecting the plane's balance and lift, or clog lift devices.

Cesar Alvarez, a senior Air Florida vice president, said Thursday that "as far as I know the plane was deiced two or three times prior to the flight." Experts said the deicing solution should last at least 30 minutes.

The aircraft which had arrived from Florida was believed to have been on the ground about 2½ hours before beginning its last flight.

But several top-ranking investigators on the NTSB team said it is premature to speculate on a cause for the crash. "Everything is speculation at this time. We've got a difficult investigation ahead to learn what happened," said veteran NTSB investigator Rudy Kasputin.

Another arctic air mass arrives

The second blast of arctic air in a week charged out of Canada today, promising no relief from severe winter weather that has killed at least 206 people and piled up snow in the South and the Northeast after twin storms.

Winds up to 100 mph in the Rocky Mountain foothills overturned two tractor-trailers Thursday, tore off an apartment building roof and brought unusually warm weather to Colorado, but forecasters said the balmy temperatures would drop sharply with the approach of the frigid air.

"The very strong arctic outbreak means we're going to be in the icebox for a couple of days," said Dean Nesley, a National Weather Service forecaster in Minnesota.

The South was hit with a storm Thursday that followed its twin by only a day. The second storm dumped up to a half-foot of snow on Southern cities that are usually spared the ravages of winter, then iced highways and lashed Florida with gale-force winds that ripped down trees and damaged mobile homes.

It snarled attempts to restore electrical power to thousands of people and

schools and businesses throughout the Sun Belt simply closed down, some for a third day, as the snow piled up on the roofs.

Like its twin, it then swung up the Atlantic coast and buried the Northeast under up to 4 inches of new snow, bringing the two-day accumulation to 10 inches in New York City and dragging some states toward the bottom of their snow-removal budgets.

It forced many Northeastern schools to close Thursday — including 90 percent of the schools in Connecticut — and gave children who were off today because of the Rev. Martin Luther

King Jr.'s birthday a four-day weekend to romp in the snow.

Like Wednesday's storm, Thursday's snow arrived in the Northeast in time for rush hour, but caused no repeat of the traffic jams because the snowplows were out in many cities and many cars stayed inside garages.

In the northern Midwest and as far west as Colorado, high winds and snow blowing down out of Canada were expected to cause a "rerun" of last weekend, when wind-chill factors hit 80 below in Minnesota, Nesley said.

The temperature was down to minus 8 in Chicago early today.

Wholesale inflation still inching along

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government's final tally of wholesale price increases in 1981 should show inflation at that level ran at its slowest pace in four years, economists say.

In advance of today's release of December's figures, economists were predicting a 0.2 percent to 0.3 percent rise, which would bring the annual rate to around 7 percent — smallest rise since 1977.

Allen Sinai, vice president and senior economist at Data Resources Inc. in Lexington, Mass., said there was no question but that last year's wholesale inflation rate would be the smallest since the 6.9 percent of 1977.

For the first 11 months of last year, the Labor Department's Producer

Price Index — the government's measure of wholesale prices for finished goods — rose at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 7.4 percent.

The expected 1981 rate is well off the 11.8 percent in 1980 and 12.8 percent in 1979. It advanced 9.2 percent in 1978.

Sinai attributed the easing of wholesale inflation last year to smaller-than-expected rises in food and energy prices and to the dampening effects of the slowdown in the economy and continuing high interest rates.

"We are on a lower plateau for inflation," he said.

Elaborating, Sandra Shaber, senior economist with Chase Econometrics in Bala Cynwyd, Pa., said good harvests last year had meant abundant supplies of food, which in turn had helped hold

down price increases.

The surplus of oil on the world market and the weak international demand for the commodity slowed energy price increases, she said.

Donald Ratajczak, director of Georgia State University's economic forecasting project, predicted the Producer Price Index would rise 0.2 percent in December, after adjustment for seasonal factors.

Sinai forecast a 0.2 percent to 0.3 percent advance.

The index rose a seasonally adjusted 0.5 percent in November, which works out to a 6.3 percent annual rate. That was better than the 0.6 percent advance of October, but more than the 0.1 percent of August and the 0.2 percent of September.

Arab leaders seeking united front

ROME (AP) — Israel's annexation of the Golan Heights has spurred Arab leaders into another attempt to paper over their differences and form a united front.

"The Arabs realize that divisions among them undermine any united position," says a European Middle East specialist.

Initial results of the fledgling campaign for unity in a sharply divided Arab world include a push for U.N. Security Council sanctions to punish Israel for its annexation of the Syrian plateau it has occupied since the 1967 Arab-Israeli War.

The United States is expected to veto a Jordanian sanctions resolution when it comes to a vote today, but observers say Syria will come away with a moral victory.

Syrian President Hafez Assad has visited Saudi Arabia and other Persian Gulf states seeking support against Israel. Okaz, a Saudi newspaper which like all others in the desert kingdom takes its tack from the government, said the United States by waving its veto sword "is standing counter to legality and participating with the aggressor in his crime."

Libya, in an apparent show of support for Damascus, said it wants to speed up efforts to merge with Syria, a goal announced 15 months ago but blocked by lingering differences between the two regimes.

Meanwhile, the Arab League enlisted Moslem Turkey as a mediator in a new effort to end the 16-month-old Iran-Iraq war, which has added to the divisions in the Arab world.

The most surprising development was the announcement New Year's Eve that radical Libya and conservative Saudi Arabia were restoring diplomatic relations.

Saudi Arabia broke relations 14 months ago after the Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy attacked the Saudi monarchy for allowing the United States to station its AWACS spy planes in the kingdom to guard it against Iranian attack.

Saudi Arabia said the reconciliation was to "heal rifts in Arab relations and unify Arab action against the common enemy," Israel.

The Saudis are also hinting they may re-establish diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union if they fail to get American backing for the Arab cause.

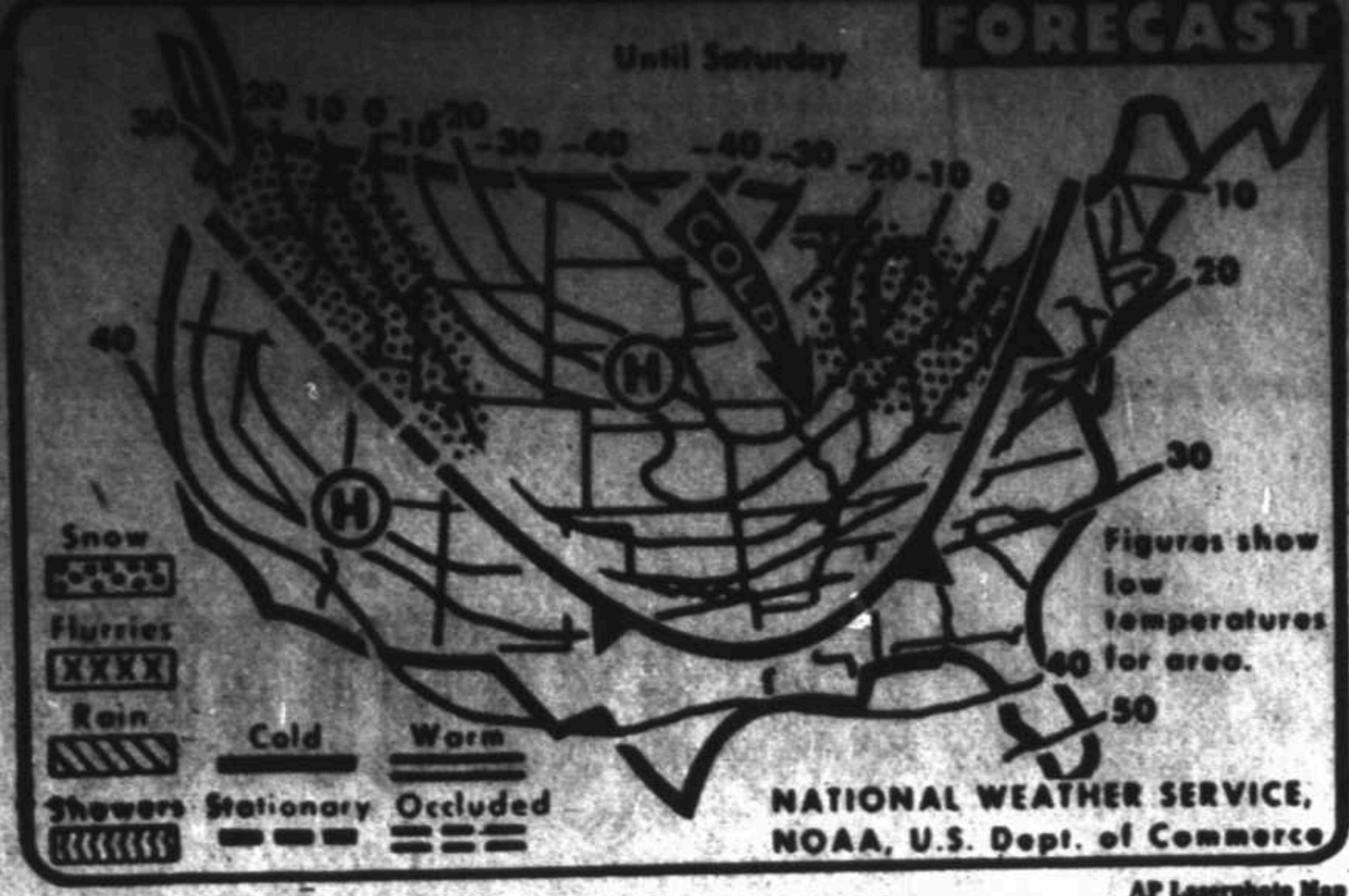

Boardings set record

Boardings at Midland Regional Airport during 1981 set a new record, surpassing the half-million mark, according to Col. Wilson Banks, director of aviation.

The final tally was 573,130, a 20.85 percent increase over the 1980 figure of 474,524 — a difference of almost 100,000 boardings. "This was the best year in the history of Midland Regional Airport," Banks said, noting that the nationwide air traffic controllers strike "didn't hurt us at all."

December also marked an increase over the same time a year ago with 58,758 boardings. This was 29.52 percent higher than the December 1980 figure of 45,366.

Threat against mobsters seen on TV

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — It came rolling across the television screens, a message containing an implicit threat and the names of two reputed mob figures.

"Nick and Phil, you're next," said the scrawled note that went round and round the screen with other cable TV messages, popping up periodically for 12 hours early Sunday.

The authorities said they do not know if the message was a hoax or a real threat against local reputed mobsters Nicodemo Scarfo and Phillip Leonetti. Scarfo is "Little Nicky" and Leonetti is "Crazy Phil." Both were associates of Frank "Chickie" Narducci, the reputed Philadelphia mobster who was gunned down gangland style near his home.

The television message came three days after Narducci was slain in the latest mob killing in Philadelphia, "but there is nothing we can see at this time that's a real threat to Nicky or Phil," Atlantic County Prosecutor Joseph Fusco said Thursday.

Channel 2, which delivers the weather, time, advertisements and other typical cable data, was closed for the night with an automatic camera showing the same messages over and over when the message appeared.

Authorities said someone apparently broke into the studios of the Atlantic Coast TV Cable Co. in Convention Hall and taped the note to a drum that

rotates in front of the camera. Fusco said detectives are investigating because "we are very sensitive to threats on anyone's life. It's a serious thing."

But he said "it doesn't seem at this point that a suspect will be identified."

Louis MacDonald, president of Lomac Communications Inc., which operates the channel for Atlantic Coast, said he rushed to the empty studio shortly after receiving inquiries from viewers, but the message had been removed.

Scarfo, 52, was identified publicly last summer by the FBI as the new chief of the Philadelphia-based organized crime family of Angelo Bruno, who was slain in 1980. The slaying of Philip "Chicken Man" Testa, another reputed family member, came next.

Leonetti, 28, is Scarfo's nephew and a close associate, authorities say. Both live on North Georgia Avenue in this East Coast gambling city.

In June, Scarfo was sentenced to two years in federal prison and fined \$5,000 on charges of possession by a felon of a firearm used in an illegal interstate transfer. He is appealing.

In October 1980, Scarfo, Leonetti and a third man were found innocent of the gangland-style slaying of Margate cement contractor Vincent Falcone, who was shot in the head and chest and stuffed in the trunk of his car Dec. 16, 1979.

Scarfo served six months in prison for manslaughter in the stabbing death of a Philadelphia man in 1963 and 2½ years in jail for refusing to testify about organized crime before the New Jersey Commission of Investigation in 1971.

Record \$1 million raised at dinner honoring Tower

DALLAS (AP) — A record \$1 million was raised at a dinner honoring Republican Sen. John Tower's 20th year in the U.S. Senate and 90 percent came from individuals, according to the dinner's chairman.

Paul W. Eggers, chairman of the Thursday night dinner, said just 10 percent was contributed by political action committees.

The \$1 million is the most ever raised at a single event for a senator, Eggers said. A total of 1,500 people paid up to \$1,000 a seat for the dinner.

The money is for Tower's 1984 re-election campaign, though he has not formally announced that he will run again.

Tower, 56, is the second most senior Republican in the Senate. He has been re-elected three times since 1961 when he won a special election for the seat vacated by Lyndon B. Johnson.

The guest list for the dinner included presidential counselor Edwin Meese III, Energy Secretary James B. Edwards, Gov. William P. Clements Jr., former Texas Gov. John B. Connally, former Virginia Gov. Linwood Holton, and Republican Sens. Jeremiah Denton of Alabama, Peter Dinkens of New Mexico, Jesse Helms of North Carolina, Strom Thurmond of South Carolina and John Warner of Virginia.

At a news conference before the dinner, Meese praised the appointment of William Clark to succeed Richard Allen as national security adviser, and said the enlarged role given Clark is what the Reagan administration planned from the outset for the post.

"It was never anticipated that the person would not have regular, consistent access to the president. It was never anticipated that anyone other than that person would have responsibility for the day-to-day operations of the National Security Council staff," Meese said.

"That person was always intended and should be the focal point for contact with the various departments and agencies involving the nation's foreign affairs," he said.

Questioned about the performance of Federal Reserve Board and its chairman, Paul Volcker, Meese said it was not the administration's position to rate the independent agency.

But he said if the Fed "gets away from the past practices of trying to fine tune the economy" and keeps to its fiscal policies and monetary targets, its actions will be consistent with the administration's policies.

Cause of college athlete's death may never be known

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A district attorney who decided not to prosecute Signal Hill police in the jailhouse death of Ron Settles says the cause of the college athlete's death may never be known.

And District Attorney John Van de Kamp said Thursday his seven-month inquiry had not ruled out foul play.

"Nothing would have pleased me more than to be able to tell (Settles' parents) — and you — that we now know with certainty what happened to their son on June 2," Van de Kamp said at a news conference. "But...the evidence will not permit that type of a clear-cut verdict."

He said he doubts whether "we will ever know for certain the proximate cause of Ron Settles' death."

Settles, a 21-year student at Long Beach State University, was found hanged in a Signal Hill jail cell shortly after he was stopped for a routine traffic violation. Police said Settles committed suicide; his family and friends said he was slain by police.

In September, a coroner's jury found in a 5-4 verdict that Settles died "at the hands of another, not by accident."

The police department was "pleased" and not surprised by the findings, police spokesman Ken Richards said, adding: "We've known for months that no other decision could be reached."

Meanwhile, Johnnie Cochran, the Settles' family lawyer, said the decision would not stop his clients from pursuing their \$62 million wrongful-death suit against the city of Signal Hill.

"There's a different burden of proof (in lawsuits), and we feel strongly that he did die at the hands of another, that he was in fact killed. We believe we can prove that to the satisfaction of a fair and right-thinking jury," Cochran said.

Of the district attorney's investigation, Cochran said, "I appreciate the thoroughness. It was not a whitewash. But there are a lot of unanswered questions."

Van de Kamp said the investigation found that an altercation occurred in the booking area between Settles and arresting officer Jerry Lee Brown. But he said there was no evidence Brown

or other officers later killed Settles.

In a 52-page summary of the evidence in the case, it was noted that no eyewitnesses to Settles' death were discovered.

Van de Kamp also said Los Angeles County Coroner Thomas Noguchi had changed his previous finding of non-accidental death following the coroner's inquest and told the county grand jury the death may have been suicide after all.

Although the coroner's office said no trace of drugs was found, it was revealed this week that new tests by another agency had turned up small amounts of the mind-altering drug PCP or "angel dust," in Settles' stomach, blood and urine. But Deputy District Attorney Al Garretti said the drug discovery was "insignificant" to the investigation's findings.

Even though Van de Kamp declined to file charges against Signal Hill police officers, some of whom still face misdemeanor charges of brutality to prisoners, he criticized the department.

"Signal Hill today has a new connotation to many Southern Californians, a connotation that it did not have before June 2, 1981. It is not a good one," Van de Kamp said.

Midland can expect more cold weather

After a couple of days of warmer temperatures, Midlanders should expect the mercury to drop Saturday.

According to the National Weather Service at Midland Regional Airport, the forecast calls for partly cloudy skies through Saturday with the low tonight expected to be in the upper 20s.

Saturday should be colder than the last two days with temperatures dipping back down in the 40s.

Thursday's high of 52 fell short of the record high of 79 set in 1953 and the overnight low of 34 missed the record low of 6 set in 1972 by 28 degrees.

Winds should gradually shift northwesterly 10-15 mph tonight moving north-easterly 10-15 mph Saturday.

Dogs help arrest attempted burglars

The 17- and 18-year-old suspects all gave Midland addresses and formal charges are expected to be filed against them today.

Task force carries out Odessa drug bust

ODESSA — A task force of area law enforcement officers carried out a major drug bust here Thursday, capping a lengthy investigation with the arrest of 16 persons and the confiscation of an undetermined amount of marijuana, prelude and other drugs.

According to a spokesman for the Odessa police department, those arrested were Ector County residents who participated in drug deals with undercover officers during the past three months. Municipal Judge Otis Moore set bond of \$15,000 on each charge.

Participating in the investigation were officers from the Midland Police Department's narcotics division, the Odessa Police Department, the Texas Rangers, the Ector County Sheriff's Department, the Department of Public Safety Intelligence Division, the Ector County district attorney's office and federal narcotics agents.

Four other suspects are still being sought, according to the spokesman.

Although Midland Regional Airport doesn't face the same circumstances as Washington National Airport, that's not to say a crash couldn't happen, according to Banks. To prepare for the worst, last year area agencies practiced what they would do in case of a crash.

Haig said to be progressing in Mideast

JERUSALEM (AP) — Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. has prodded Israel and Egypt into a new effort to reach agreement before the end of April on autonomy for the Palestinians in the West Bank and the Gaza Strip.

Haig, after two days of meetings with Egyptian and Israeli officials in Cairo and Jerusalem said it was too soon to predict whether "important differences" can be resolved before Israel returns the eastern half of the Sinai Desert to Egypt on April 25.

"Give me a few weeks and I will answer that question," he told reporters.

Both the Egyptian and Israeli government concluded earlier that, after 18 months of deadlock, they could not agree on a plan for Palestinian home rule in the Israeli-occupied territories before Israel withdrew from the remainder of the Egyptian territory it captured in the 1967 Arab-Israeli War.

But Israeli and Egyptian officials said they were impressed by the active personal role Haig is taking in the negotiations.

His drive to obtain an agreement in the next three months reflects concern that once Egypt regains the Sinai, it won't have any incentive to negotiate seriously on Palestinian autonomy.

Haig and his aides said he was on a fact-finding mission, to hear first hand the positions of both governments on the only major area of the Camp David peace treaty in which there has been no progress.

"We are here to be a catalyst," the secretary of state told reporters Thursday. "We will go home and assess the positions we heard in both capitals and return to discuss them further."

He met for two hours with Prime Minister Menachem Begin and reported they had a "very good and extensive exchange of views." They were to meet again today before Haig left for Washington.

Haig also met with Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir, Defense Minister Ariel Sharon and Mayor Elias Freij of Bethlehem, one of the leading Palestinian officials in the occupied West Bank.

A senior U.S. official who requested anonymity said Haig met with the mayor to learn how moderate Palestinians regard the autonomy negotiations.

"It was an important meeting," the official said.

He declined to reveal what Freij told Haig. But the mayor, although not a member of the Palestine Liberation Organization, has maintained that the PLO is the legitimate spokesman for the Palestinians and has advocated a separate Palestinian state, which Israel opposes.

However, he has also argued in favor of coexistence with Israel.

U.S. officials said Haig and the Israelis did not discuss in detail Israel's annexation of the Golan Heights or President Reagan's suspension of the U.S.-Israeli strategic cooperation agreement to demonstrate the administration's anger over the annexation. Officials insisted the focus of Haig's visit was on the autonomy negotiations.

Train-car wreck kills two

EPINAY-SUR-SEINE, France (AP) — Two rush-hour commuter trains slammed into a truck today at a rail crossing in this northern Paris suburb, killing two people and injuring 25 others, police said.

Authorities said the truck apparently lost traction on an icy patch while attempting to cross the railroad track. A seven-car commuter train hit the truck from one direction and moments later another seven-car train plowed into it from the other direction, police said.

Five of the injured were in serious condition, officials said. A rescue team raced to the scene to help evacuate the injured.

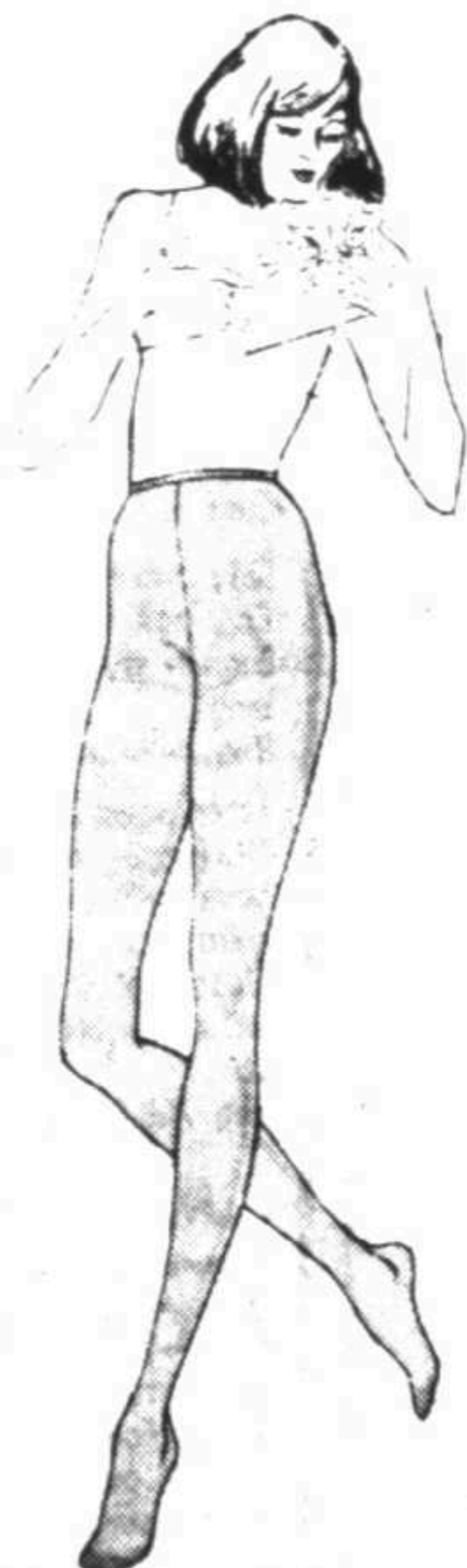

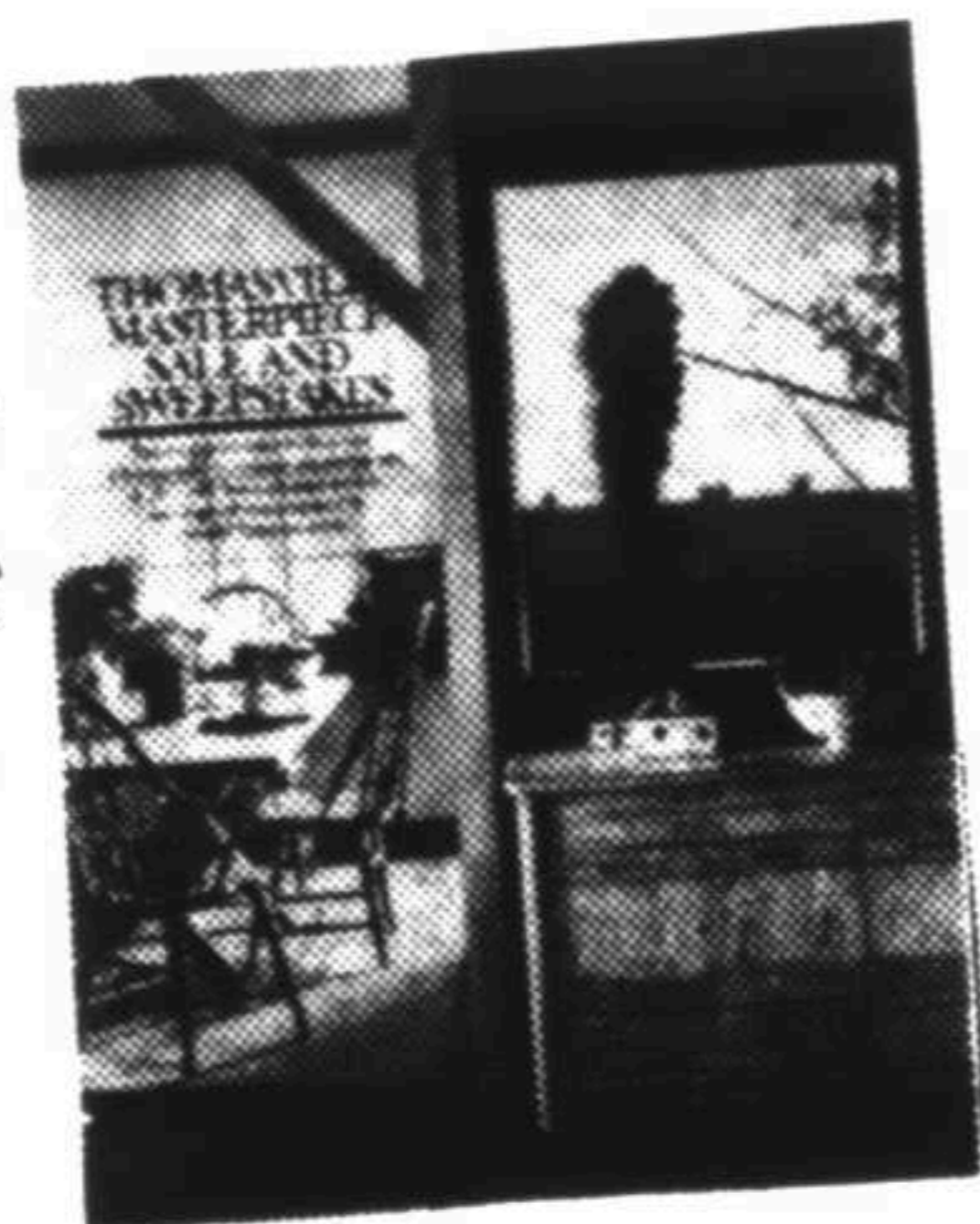

Jurek trial jurors selection continues

VICTORIA, Texas (AP) — Defense and prosecution lawyers continued questioning prospective jurors today for the murder retrial of Jerry Lane Jurek after the judge refused to move the trial again.

Jurek's trial was moved here from Cuero on a change of venue. State District Judge Clarence Stevenson refused to grant the request from defense lawyer Douglas Tinker as two more jurors were seated Thursday to hear the case.

A man and a woman were added to the panel, bringing the total to seven, five men and two women. Jury selection was expected to continue for the rest of this week and possibly into next week, as Stevenson said two alternates would be chosen in addition to the panel of 12. Jurek is being tried in the 1973 rape and slaying of Wendy Adams, 10, the daughter of a Cuero policeman. Her body was

HOUSTON (AP) — One of two employees of the Alley Theater was released late Thursday after police questioned him about the strangling of the theater's director, but officials declined to comment on the status of the worker still being held. The two men were taken into custody about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday. Lt. Guy Mason said the released man was in the theater when Iris Siff's body was found about 8:15 a.m. Wednesday. "It seemed like a logical move to question him," Mason said. Detectives said robbery still appeared to be the motive for the slaying of Mrs. Siff, 58. But officers said they are also looking into recent incidents at the theater, including a series of cryptic notes signed "King Arthur" which were left in the mailboxes of actors and actresses. Theater officials said they were not immediately concerned, believing the notes were simply jokes. Police were also examining a car found burning in Houston's impoverished Fifth Ward which belonged to theatre director Iris Siff.

Firemen extinguished a blaze in the Lincoln Continental about 8 a.m. Wednesday, about two hours before Mrs. Siff was found strangled in a fourth floor conference room of the downtown theater. The car was connected to the slaying later in the day when the person who reported the fire called police after hearing news reports of the slaying. It was towed to police headquarters, where detectives said it would be checked for fingerprints and other clues. Detectives said they believe Mrs. Siff was killed between 10 p.m. Tuesday, when she was seen backstage by a production manager, and 4 a.m. Wednesday, when a security guard noticed her car missing from the theater's driveway. Co-workers said Mrs. Siff often worked into the morning. Officers said there were apparently no witnesses to the killing. Police said Mrs. Siff's purse, fur coat and television were missing, but expensive jewelry she was wearing was left untouched. Detectives found no sign of a struggle or forced entry into the room where her body was found by a cleaning woman.

Texan to be sentenced in murder of migrant workers in Michigan

MUSKEGON, Mich. (AP) — A 23-year-old Texan faces sentencing Feb. 11 after pleading guilty to two charges of second-degree murder in the ambush-slaying last July of two migrant workers. Ruben Flores Jr. of San Antonio entered the plea Tuesday in Muskegon County Circuit Court, telling Judge James Graves he fired a rifle at the unarmed men to protect his family. As part of the plea arrangement, Flores will receive a maximum prison term of 40 years, said Steve Corwin, chief assistant prosecuting attorney for Muskegon County. Flores originally was charged with open murder and could have been sent to prison for life if convicted. He was charged with shooting J. Jesus Martinez, 36, of Weslaco, Texas, and Francisco DeLaRosa, 30, of Muskegon as the pair drove in a pickup toward the Flores' family home in Muskegon. The two men apparently were bent on continuing an argument with Flores' father over work assignments at a nearby farm. Muskegon County Sheriff's deputies had said. Corwin said Flores' claim of self-defense, as well as circumstances surrounding the incident, "gave rise to enough questions that pleas of two counts of murder in the second degree are considered by this office to be consistent with what justice requires." Corwin said 11 other members of the Flores family who were in the home may yet face murder charges if evidence indicates an involvement in the shootings. Witnesses told deputies three people fired at the truck.

Walking a tightrope

The Reagan administration's decision not to sell Taiwan the sophisticated F-16 or F-56 fighter planes it wanted, but to permit continued coproduction of an earlier model of aircraft on the island is not going to please either Taipei or Peking. And, unfortunately, the symbolism created by this "compromise" won't help clear up for the United States' European allies any of their discomfiture over where this nation stands.

The administration obviously wants to stay on good terms with China's Communist government. And with good reason. Mainland China has embarked on a program of major economic and industrial improvements that are changing the Chinese way of life and leading to a more open lifestyle. Many of those improvements are due to help from the United States, too.

Those changes are commendable and do dictate an improved relationship — complete with expanded trade and communications with United States society. But how far can the United States go without giving the impression of completely abandoning Taiwan, that little mountainous island nation only 90 miles off the mainland China coast? There's plenty of reasons for not abandoning Taiwan, which has shared a unique and culturally beneficial relationship with this nation for years.

The Taiwanese are a self-suffi-

cient and proud people who have shown through the years that a nation does not have to be large to be economically successful. Taiwan has been cited numerous times in recent years as one of this century's most notable economic success stories.

In 1972, President Richard Nixon visited Communist China and agreed to begin a gradual withdrawal of military installations on Taiwan since the Communist Chinese government had been recognized by the United Nations. As a nation, the United States is committed to following that course and upgrading relations with Communist China. That end is being achieved as evidenced by trade and cultural exchanges of the past few years.

But Taiwan has been a friend in years past and the United States must not go too far too fast in bringing about the necessary change in the relationship between the two nations. To do so would only further damage the United States' credibility as a loyal and trusted ally, particularly in the eyes of our European friends.

Walking a foreign policy tightrope is never an easy or preferable task, but such is the case involving arm sales to Taiwan. The United States should make it clear to the Communist Chinese that it wants improved relations, but not at the expense of our friends, namely Taiwan.

Gap in the Red Curtain

The Polish government has responded to a request by a group of foreign correspondents and relaxed its censorship rules. Journalists have been told by the Polish leader, General Wojciech Jaruzelski, that they now may file dispatches without being censored in Warsaw.

If reporters are really free to go about their professional business, a welcome gap will have been created in the communist curtain that has frustrated those involved in the news-gathering process.

The "if" is a big one, however. Communist governments and a free press have a history of incompatibility. The free flow of information can be dangerous to the health of a Kremlin-run regime.

Let us hope the lifting of censorship is a favorable omen. But the burden of proof will be on the gov-

ernment. It must show that it is serious about allowing reporters to roam at will and report what they see.

Until that proof is forthcoming, a wholesome skepticism is in order. Even under the new policy journalists are not to be given the liberty they enjoy in so many parts of the free world. They still must file their stories on machines set up at the government information center, Interpress. The Polish government may be engaging in what Secretary of State Haig terms "phony moderation."

Lifting the curtain of censorship, making it possible for journalists to see and report what is going on in Poland, could be an encouraging step, or it could be a hoax.

Let us hope the Poles eventually will get what they deserve, a free and responsible press.

Marcoses seeking own touch of divinity

WASHINGTON — Not since the late Evita Peron has the world seen a first lady like Imelda Marcos. The beautiful onetime song plucker and beauty-contest winner has always been unabashedly ambitious. Some regard her as the relentless genius behind her husband's dictatorship in the Philippines.

Imelda's ambition extended to her daughter, Imee; she wanted the girl to marry someone suitable. Imelda's first choice was England's Prince Charles, who — to Imelda's disappointment — did not choose Imee as his queen.

Instead, Imee eloped with Tommy Manotoc, a handsome athlete who did not come up to Imelda's giddy social standards. The young couple's "Romeo and Juliet" story stirred worldwide interest when Tommy vanished on Dec. 29, after dining with Imee in a cozy Manila restaurant.

The Manotoc family — longtime political foes of President Marcos — suggested he had his daughter's lover kidnapped. But some members of the Manotoc family really suspect that Imelda was behind Tommy's disappearance.

Imee, who dearly loves her father but quarrels with her mother, confronted the president with the news of her secret marriage. Tommy later told his family that Marcos had given the star-crossed lovers his blessing. When Imee expressed concern over her mother's reaction, the president reassured them, saying, "I'll handle her," sources told my associate Lucette Lagnado.

Imelda's latest project, meanwhile, suggests nothing less than divine status for Marcos and herself. It is a lavishly illustrated book she arranged for her husband on his 64th birthday. At a reported cost of several hundred thousand dollars, Imelda commissioned prominent Filipino writers to do the

purple text and an artist to paint the full-page color plates for the book.

Ostensibly, the volume is the legend of Malakas and Maganda, "the strong and the beautiful" mythological figures who were the parents of the Filipino race, according to Tagalog folklore.

But as the story unfolds, a not-so-subtle change occurs in the text and illustrations: The legend of Malakas and Maganda becomes intertwined with the equally legendary exploits of Ferdinand and Imelda. The illustrations show the president as clearly re-creating the mythic strength and wisdom of Malakas, while the first lady becomes indistinguishable from the divine Maganda.

In royal prose, the birthday book has this to say of Marcos: "He was born with the seeds of leadership, molded on righteousness since infancy, prepared to be better than the ordinary man, purified so that he might travel the path to nobility — to greatness."

Imelda's hired hacks were even more adulatory in their treatment of the provincial girl who clawed her way up from poverty to the presidential palace. "She was taller than the ordinary child, long-limbed, with a well-proportioned body that was rounded, not bony," the authors rhapsodized. The girl's bearing "even then was noticeably aristocratic," they wrote.

"She was tall, with the bearing of a princess, but not haughty, product of a blueblooded mold yet without arrogance," the book declares. "She displayed humility but was self-assured and confident. She was tender and affectionate, yet strong-willed and principled."

This paragon of all virtue is scarcely recognizable to those who have dared to challenge Imelda's ruthless climb to power and wealth. Such a shameless attempt to transform a onetime beauty contestant into a goddess would be embarrassing if it did not reflect the coldblooded ambition that has always driven Imelda Marcos. Divinity is just another tool for Imelda's singleminded construction of worldly power and wealth.

Footnote: Imelda charms foreign

leaders with her beauty and grace. She is popular in America among the conservative high and mighty. She is a favorite, for example, of Richard Nixon, whom she persuaded to dance a Filipino fandango at an elegant soiree in her Waldorf Towers hotel suite.

WHITE HOUSE PIPELINE: A new White House personnel committee, headed by Helene von Damm, will be surveying, scrutinizing and double-checking all the administration's political appointees to see if they meet proper conservative standards. The loyalty review is in response to complaints from some hardline Reagan supporters that moderates have been given the best-paying jobs in the administration.

— David Gergen, the White House communications director, continues his drive for total control of the press and public-relations operation. Moving in on ailing press secretary James Brady's turf, Gergen is demanding that White House aides who issue public statements, make speeches or handle other chores submit their material to him first for personal clearance.

WATCH ON WASTE: Government bureaucrats are supposed to use the Federal Telecommunications System (FTS) for their long-distance calls. FTS calls cost the taxpayers less than ordinary commercial toll calls. But it is often less convenient to wait for an FTS line to get free. As a result, auditors found, impatient bureaucrats are running up a staggering long-distance phone bill every year — almost \$24 million in Fiscal 1981 alone. The General Services Administration is trying to figure out a way to enforce the use of FTS lines.

West facing fundamental decisions

The speaker is Alexander Solzhenitsyn, the Russian writer. The place is Harvard University. The year is 1978. This great man who is a giant in an age of pygmies fixed the nervous audience with those sad but fearless eyes and spoke:

"A loss of courage may be the most striking feature which an outside observer notices in the West in our days. The western world has lost its civil courage, both as a whole and separately, in each country, each government, each political party and of course in the United Nations.

"And decline in courage is ironically emphasized by occasional explosions of anger and inflexibility on the part of the same bureaucrats when dealing with weak governments and weak countries, not supported by anyone, or with currents which cannot offer any resistance. But they get tongue-tied and paralyzed when they deal with powerful governments and threatening forces, with aggressors and international terrorists."

Those words spoken three years ago are a perfect explanation for the Western reaction to the crushing of freedom in Poland. It took only a few hours for the powerful United States to react angrily to the annexation of the Golan Heights by Israel. Not only was this action which was really no concern of ours harshly condemned, but we helped Syria, a Soviet client state, draft a United Nations resolution declaring the annexation null and void and then suspended a memorandum of agreement we had only just announced a few days earlier.

In contrast, it took several days after the imposition of martial law in Poland before the United States could muster its courage to take any action at all and then it took steps largely symbolic and in such a way as to leave the door open to retreat as soon as the Communists are done with their dirty work. Look at the conditions we have declared must be met before we return to business as usual: (1) lifting of martial law; (2) freeing of prisoners; and (3) agreement to negotiate with Solidarity.

Those are merely empty gestures. As soon as Solidarity's neck is broken, of course the Communists will lift martial law, free the surviving prisoners, and negotiate the terms of Solidarity's surrender. Only it won't be the same Solidarity. The conditions we should have imposed are: (1) lifting martial law; (2) a public accounting of all prisoners and their freedom; (3) restoration of Solidarity's leadership; (4) strict compliance with the agreements already negotiated with Solidarity by the previous Polish government; and (5) an end to Soviet domination of Poland's internal affairs.

But as Solzhenitsyn said, the West has lost its courage. It can deal angrily and swiftly with little countries like Israel or Libya, but when it comes to dealing with the powerful Soviet Union we become cautious, circumspect, and tongue-tied. Our pitiful response — temporarily suspending some activities we shouldn't be engaged in in the first place — is at least something, most of our so-called allies in Western Europe will not only do nothing, but will complain about us doing anything.

"Western thinking has become conservative," Solzhenitsyn said in the same speech. "The world situation should stay as it is at any cost, there should be no changes. This debilitating dream of a status quo is the symptom of a society which has come to the end of its development...to defend oneself, one must also be ready to die; there is little such readiness in a society raised in the cult of material well-being."

That is merely a basic truth of human nature. In a personal contest, if one man is intent on winning no matter what price he has to pay and his opponent is primarily concerned with not getting hurt, there is no question which man will win.

The status quo cannot be preserved; the Soviet Union is not going to collapse inwardly and save us from the necessity of defending ourselves; the world is not going to wake up one morning and decide it loves us. We as individuals must examine our own hearts and decide what we value most — life and material comforts or liberty and honor. I warn you, though, if you choose life and material comforts at the expense of liberty and honor, you will lose all four.

Reagan loses control over State; Haig choices irk senators

WASHINGTON — Ronald Reagan used the long-distance telephone Friday morning to inform complaining Republican senators that there was no use campaigning against Secretary Alexander Haig's plan to name career Foreign Service officers to the State Department's No. 2 and No. 3 spots.

The president revealed he agreed with Haig and would announce the selections that very afternoon. "I didn't like it," one senator told us, "but what could I do? Reagan was elected president, not me."

However, selection of Walter Stoessel as deputy secretary and, more particularly, Lawrence Eagleburger as under secretary was steeped in irony for a president who had entered office vowing war against "the permanent government."

Contrary to all expectations, Reagan has now elevated Foreign Service officers to their highest steps on the State Department ladder during the post-World War II era. That is viewed as a significant policy defeat inside the Pentagon, by defense-oriented senators

and within the conservative movement generally. To their dismay, Al Haig has solidified his hold on the State Department in setting a policy attuned to a Western alliance solid front, even at the cost of diluting positions toward the Soviet Union.

"It's Haig's sandbox now," one disgruntled White House aide grumbled. A Pentagon official made the same point differently: "Reagan has lost control of the State Department."

If his new State Department selections seem curious, the explanation can be found in the narrow window through which President Reagan receives information. There is no sign that he encountered any criticism about the Stoessel-Eagleburger selections, widely voiced within his own White House staff, until his own decision had been made.

Oddly, Haig's horde of enemies had again been forecasting his doom with the transfer of old Reaganite Clark from deputy secretary of state to the upgraded national security adviser's post. One virulent Haig critic inside the administration predicted that the return of a separate advisory link to the president would mean a new secretary of state within nine months.

But Gen. Haig moved swiftly on the field of bureaucratic battle once Clark was gone with a flanking movement putting Stoessel and Eagleburger in place. With Congress in recess and senators scattered throughout the country, the appointments were hurried to prevent a backfire.

A backfire was expected, considering the break with precedent. Not since David Bruce in 1962 had a Foreign Service officer filled the department's No.

2 post. But while Bruce had spent only two youthful years as a vice consul in Rome and had then left the service for business and farming interests, Stoessel's entire distinguished career has been as a diplomat.

Until Stoessel, the No. 2 position at State has been the president's rather than the secretary's choice, typified by Sumner Welles in the 1930s serving as President Franklin Roosevelt's eyes and ears in the State Department. A similar function was viewed when Reagan talked his ex-aide, Bill Clark, into leaving a comfortable seat on the California Supreme Court to become Haig's deputy.

Conservatives fear that Stoessel, at age 61, will be a passive figure as deputy secretary while the department will be run by the hard-charging Eagleburger, his successor as under secretary. That is why the new State Department team has aroused so much concern on the right.

As Haig's assistant secretary for European affairs, Eagleburger has clashed repeatedly with both National Security Council (NSC) staffers and Pentagon officials on a variety of issues. The complaint has been that he magnifies Haig's own Western European emphasis in seeking a NATO consensus for U.S. approaches to the Kremlin.

Staff members of the senators belonging to the Steering Committee, the informal group of conservative Republicans, tried to mobilize their bosses to head off Haig's selections. Their real choice as deputy would have been Fred Ikle, a strategic arms expert who is under secretary of defense. But more realistically, they prompted for-

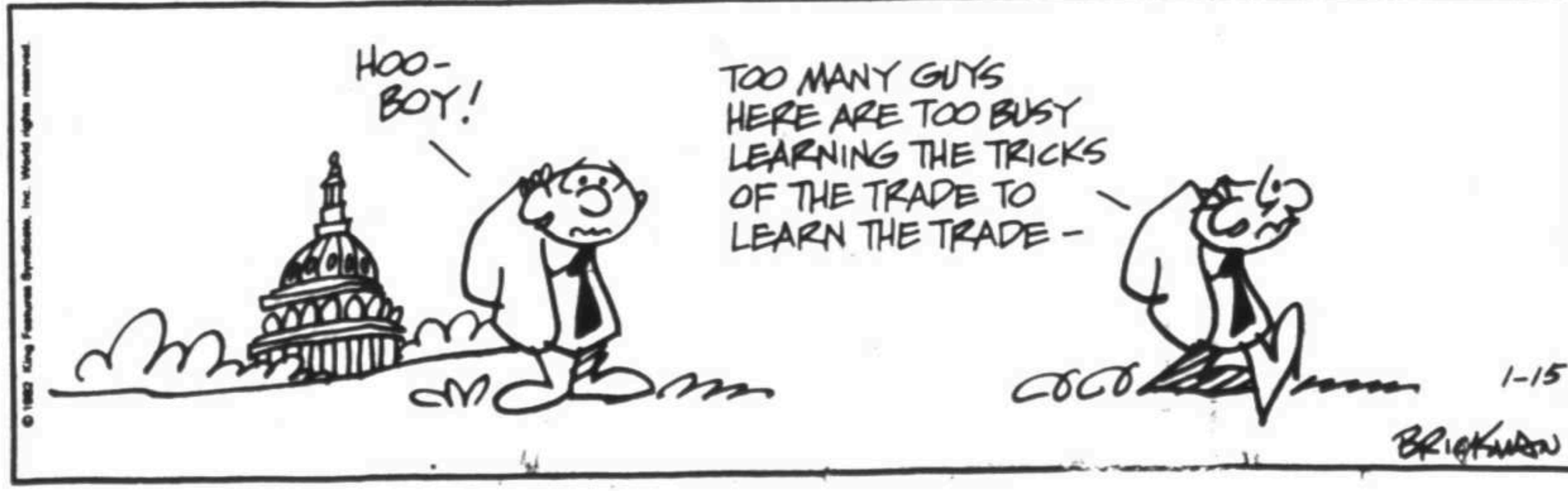
mer Sen. James Buckley, now under secretary of state for security assistance.

Several Republican members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, including North Carolina's Jesse Helms and Indiana's Richard Lugar, submitted such suggestions. But the big three senior staffers at the White House had blessed the Stoessel-Eagleburger package, and Clark agreed. Although key Pentagon subordinates were appalled by the choices, Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger did not use his considerable influence with Reagan to protest.

Hopes of playing for time to delay the appointment disappeared when Reagan telephoned protesting senators Friday morning to tell them it was too late, the decision had been made. The critics of those picks wonder whether the president really had any notion of what their objections were about.

'Great Leader' creates own 'great' image

As our decrepit, Soviet-made aircraft enters North Korean airspace, the Korean passengers quickly pin on lapel badges emblazoned with a likeness of their leader, Premier Kim Il-sung. The small silver portraits are my introduction to the extraordinary "cult of personality" saturating the communist North of the Korean peninsula.

From the airport terminal, Premier Kim's immense, oddly bland features look down on disembarking passengers. On the building's public-address system, a tenor backed by a mighty orchestra solemnly intones: "He, the sun of the time of storms raging on earth...hero of the 20th century..."

Inside the terminal building, he is everywhere — in a huge mural near the customs checkpoint; in framed portraits dominating every room. In the fields and in the streets beyond the airport, I see a veritable galaxy of Kim Il-sung badges, enough for the chests of all 17 million North Koreans.

The official name of Kim's nation is the Democratic People's

Republic of Korea (DPRK). But the DPRK is not even remotely democratic. All power is reserved to Kim, who has come a long way toward realizing one of political history's most curious achievements: turning a Marxist-Leninist revolution into a monarchy.

The Great Leader, as Kim Il-sung is constantly called, is now 69 and suffering from high blood pressure. He has already named his 40-year-old son, Kim Jong-il, his eventual successor. As one foreign diplomat put it, "The people have long resigned themselves to a monarchy. Now they're to get a dynasty!"

Kim's kingdom is a mountainous, mineral-rich Pennsylvania-size land bordering China's Manchuria province and Soviet Asia. The peninsula's history is a long list of invasions — Chinese, Mongol, Manchu, Japanese and Russian. Militarist Japanese, who occupied the peninsula from 1911, imposed their own rigid emperor-worship.

When the Japanese surrendered, Soviet armies poured into Pyongyang and beyond, to a latitude of 38 degrees. (U.S. units occupied territory south of that parallel.) With the Red Army came a 33-year-old officer, Kim Il-sung. A middle-school dropout,

he had joined anti-Japanese guerrilla forces on the Korea-Manchuria border in 1932.

Kim set about making himself the Russians' most trusted North Asian ally. With Soviet backing, he eliminated his rivals and emerged as leader of the newly formed North Korean Workers Party.

When the DPRK was established in 1948, Kim became premier. Some 21 months later, at what many authorities believe was Stalin's suggestion, Kim ordered his armies across the 38th parallel, launching the Korean War.

After three years of fighting, communist and U.N. armies stood — and still stand — on an armistice line that gave neither side territorial gains. For the sake of Kim's ambition to rule one communized Korea, five million people — 54,000 of them Americans — had died.

Within the party, however, discontent with the leader began to surface. Kim's first response was a brutal purge. His last prominent rival, Pak Hon-yong, was charged with being a U.S. spy, blamed for the war's loss and executed. Thousands of Pak's suspected sympathizers were swept into labor camps and death cells.

Korea plays Kim to hilt

In an outsider, the cult of Premier Kim Il-Sung inspires a strange mixture of hilarity and unease. A six-page Korean newspaper, for instance, mentions Kim 241 times. One typical reference: "...the steel-clad, omniscient general who can win 100 times in 100 battles..."

An English-language publication left in my hotel room informed readers that it was dedicated to "bringing the Great Leader's far-reaching great conceptions to the full efflorescence." It was a stamp collectors' magazine!

North Koreans spare no expense to glorify their leader. Pyongyang spends millions of dollars for advertising space to publish Kim's speeches in major Western newspapers. North Korea's party newspaper then reports breathlessly that the world's leading publications have given many columns to the Great Leader's thoughts on, say, phosphate development.

Veto likely on U.N.

resolution

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States was preparing to veto an Arab resolution today calling for U.N. sanctions against Israel after Ambassador Jeane J. Kirkpatrick accused both Syria and the resolution of being anti-American.

The Jordanian-sponsored resolution would have the council decide that, pending annulment of Israel's annexation of Syria's Golan Heights, all countries should "refrain" from sending military supplies and "suspend" aid and trade to the Jewish state.

HOWEVER, the measure would only "request" U.N. members to consider suspending diplomatic and consular relations with Israel.

Mrs. Kirkpatrick said Thursday that the resolution is "profoundly anti-U.S. in conception and intent."

She told reporters that Syria's ambassador, Dia-Allah el Fattal, in statements to the council, "applauded Hanoi because they had broken the back of the United States, applauded Cuba because they had embarrassed the United States, and it was all very gratuitous and hostile to the United States."

El-Fattal praised Vietnam and Cuba for their support of Syria's sanctions demands during the week-long council debate.

He made his remarks in response to comments by Israeli Ambassador Yehuda Z. Blum, who took the council floor to mock the support from Vietnam and Cuba, which "engage in acts of aggression in Asia, Africa and elsewhere and then come before the council to sermonize."

The Israeli diplomat said his country remained ready to negotiate unconditionally with Syria.

The resolution needs at least nine votes from the 15-member Security Council to be adopted and must avoid veto by any of the council's five permanent members, including the United States.

Party kicks off Trinity Towers fund-raising

Mabee Foundation of Tulsa would challenge us with a gift of a million dollars when we raise \$3 million, so \$600,000 will fill our total commitment effort to get the project under way. They said they had taken a lot out of Midland over the years and now they wanted to see it come back in."

Former ambassador discusses time in Iran

ODESSA — "The Iranian Revolution — An Assessment" will be the topic of discussion as William H. Sullivan describes his days as U.S. Ambassador to Iran at 8 p.m. Jan. 28, in the lower gymnasium on the campus of The University of Texas at the Permian Basin.

Recently retired from 35 years of government service, Sullivan has lived most of his life in areas of crisis from Laos to Vietnam to Iran. He served as a naval officer aboard destroyers in the Atlantic, Mediterranean and Pacific during World War

II, and later as a Foreign Service Officer to General MacArthur during the Korean War. He was involved in the events of Indochina and played a central role in 1962 negotiating agreements on Laos. He later served as Ambassador to Laos and from there began the process which led to peace negotiations with North Vietnam.

As Ambassador to Laos, Sullivan assumed the unique and controversial role of "field marshal," directing both clandestine and overt military resistance to North Vietnam

aggression. Despite the nature of the activity, he maintained the closest relations of any U.S. official at that time with the leaders in Hanoi and eventually became Henry Kissinger's immediate deputy in the final Paris peace negotiations.

While Ambassador to Iran, Sullivan experienced and reported on the rapid disintegration of the Shah's rule, the dramatic sweep of the Islamic revolution, and the drastic alteration of the strategic balance in the oil-producing heartland of the Middle East as

the pro-Israel government of the Shah was replaced by the anti-Zionist regime of Ayatollah Khomeini. He organized and directed the safe evacuation of 35,000 Americans from the violence of the

revolution, and then took the steps which saved the lives of his own Embassy staff when a well-organized mob of heavily armed guerillas attacked and ransacked his Embassy compound.

Prison guards posted at mental hospital

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) — For the first time in California history, guards are being transferred from prisons to take over security at Patton State Hospital, where 478 inmates have escaped in six years.

The prison guards are to take charge of the current 36-member security staff. The first five arrived at 6 p.m. Thursday from the California Institute for Men in Chino. A Chino associate superintendent, Bob Bales, took charge of Patton's security staff.

Hospital security had been under the jurisdiction of the state Department of Mental Health, but lawmakers pressed for tighter controls after an escape Monday night — the 12th in three months.

The Developmental Services Department will still run the psychiatric treatment program, Patton information director Kurt Reich said.

In Sacramento, an emergency measure legalizing the transfer sailed unopposed through both houses Thursday, although its sponsor, Assemblyman Terry Goggin, D-San Bernardino, said it reached Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr.'s desk too late for signing.

Bales said another 25 guards were expected from Chino and the California Rehabilitation Center in Norco by Saturday when state Health and Welfare Secretary Mario Obledo is to inspect the facility.

The five guards on the overnight shift replace psychiatric technicians who had been posted along the fence since Monday night's escape of one of Patton's 950 disturbed criminals. The 26-year-old mentally disordered sex offender remained at large after forcing his way from a classroom.

Hospital security Sgt. Jay Kaylor said the guards' arrival made the routine "the same as at any correctional facility. They're standing at posts totally surrounding the penal code area."

"It's about time. We need the extra help," said Kaylor, who has worked at Patton four years. "It's something we've been saying for a long time but it falls on deaf ears in the administration."

But Patton security staff member Pete Neigel said he felt "threatened and attacked" by the change. "When the Titanic went down, they didn't blame the guys in the engine room, they blamed the captain. It's not like we're totally unqualified, incompetent people out here."

Organize your grocery shopping

HI, THERE!
Seems like we're all meeting at the grocery store these days cause, through lack of planning, a lot of us end up there more often than we care to admit.
That's what we're going to talk about today — how to keep from having to go back so often and how, once we are there, to make the most of our time and money.
According to psychologists and statistics, we consumers have some pretty predictable habits when we shop. Seems our subconscious, or something up there, takes over when we don't have a specific mission in mind as we make our purchases.
Through research, retailers can determine what we're going to buy and why we're going to buy it. They even have ways of influencing us to buy one product over another.
Ever notice how the end-of-the-aisle displays kind of jump out at you? Also, how the milk, bread and meat are normally displayed around the perimeter of the store? There's a purpose in that!
Suppose we stop at the market to buy milk only. While we're heading for the milk, we see all sorts of enticing displays at the ends of the aisles we have to pass. Before we know it, we've talked ourselves into several more items we hadn't planned on purchasing. The name of this game is merchandising but if we know about it we don't have to play it. Instead, we can stick to our purpose and not be lured into buying things we don't need.
One tip that helps is to make a list — then stick to it. Using coupons is another proven money-saver. Check out the local newspaper for store coupons. When you see a good bargain, and your budget will allow it, stock up on that item for future use — just make sure you WILL use it eventually.
Avoid impulse buying.
Don't always think you're getting it cheaper because you're buying in bigger volume. That's not always the case. Check price per ounce or pound.
Check the label for nutritional value. If the store brand is as good as a name brand, buy it instead.

CRIB PROTECTOR
Dear Heloise: Here's a tip for new mothers. I saved an old flannel-backed vinyl tablecloth and at last I found a use for it. I cut it to fit the baby's crib mattress and it makes a waterproof pad. If you try this, just be sure to turn it flannel side down on the mattress, otherwise the flannel will become wet each time baby needs a diaper change.
If there is any of the tablecloth left over after making the pad, cut a piece the same size as a small cloth diaper and stitch the diaper onto the plastic side.
Now you have a non-slip burping pad that will keep you dry. It could be used as a changing pad too.
These can be washed in the washing machine as usual, then allowed to drip dry. — Mrs. John Kambic

Try these in your 1982 garden

Every year, a group of new varieties of home garden flowers and vegetables is announced as the "All-America Selections" for the coming garden season.
These new award-winning varieties have been rated as the best for North American gardens by a council of expert, professional judges at trial grounds across the United States and Canada. Though experienced hobby gardeners like to try these superior new varieties in their gardens each year, beginners should consider them too because they have been judged best in their class.
And for flowers, best means uniform plants and blossoms, a long season of bloom, and resistance to weather, disease and pests. In vegetables, best means top quality taste and texture, high yields on compact plants and disease resistance.
This past season I was fortunate enough to try in my own garden all five award-winning varieties for 1982. There were two vegetables and three flowers.
The two All-America award-winning vegetables are both varieties of squash. Of the two, the faster-producing one is a scallop or patty pan squash which retains its flavor even when left to grow large. It's called Peter Pan and its fruits are very attractively scalloped to make it most decorative and as appealing to the eye as it is to the palate.
My Peter Pan bushes were neatly formed and compact, smaller and easier to get at than my zucchini bushes. We enjoyed Peter Pan best raw in salads or cut in fingers with a dip. Combination raw salad plates with a dip constitute this master chef's instant vegetables for dinner.
At the end of the season, fruits left on the Peter Pan bushes still maintained their fine appearance and flavor.
Also very attractive are the fruits of a new golden acorn squash that can be eaten both young and fresh like zucchini or left on the bush to mature for stored winter squash. Jersey Golden Acorn is the name of this dual-purpose squash which takes the shape of an acorn squash and the color of golden zucchini.
The bushes are about zucchini-sized, the fruits thick with deep golden-orange, nutty flavored flesh. In the long, cool spring in my part of the country, my bushes grew healthy-looking but distinctly yellowish leaves until the warm weather came to balance their pigmentation. Jersey Acorn needs warm soil for good growth, so early outdoor planting is no advantage.
Of the three award-winning flowers, two were zinnias. My personal favorite was Fantastic Light Pink, a large, fluffy-flowered zinnia on perfectly symmetrical 16-inch plants. Both in my own garden and in display trial gardens this past summer, Fantastic Light Pink was a stand-out.
The other zinnia, whose plants are just a little shorter and more spreading, produces smaller, beehive-shaped blossoms in great profusion in magenta cherry-red. The symmetrically mounded plants, with every opening in the foliage filled with blossom, makes fine edging.

Antiques, barbecue and Benson

CLEWISTON, Fla. (AP) — Carroll Benson has been successful the last 20 years by knowing his ABCs — A for antiques, B for barbecue and C for customers.

And this industrial engineer-turned-restaurateur gives special attention to all three at the Old South Bar-B-Que Ranch he owns here at the edge of Lake Okeechobee.

The 64-year-old Benson is proud that his restaurant has been ranked among the Top 500 in the country, even though he has no liquor license and there's only one brand of beer in the place — and that comes from a barrel.

"I guess people keep coming back because the food is good, there are plenty of antiques they can look at and touch, and they are treated well," said the Ocean City, Md., native, who bought the place when it was in bankruptcy in 1961.

He said there's no deep secret to preparing the barbecued ribs, chicken, beef and pork his customers keep coming back for. But neither does he allow a substitute or shortcut in his kitchen.

"I don't parboil the meat and I refuse to use gas or electric stoves to make barbecue," he said. "We have always used open pits."

Benson explained that he burns a truckload of oak every week that costs \$600 and involves a 500-mile roundtrip to obtain.

"And," he said, "I'll keep using wood until the price gets completely unreasonable."

For meat, Benson said he buys the best in large quantities when the market is right, and then stores it in West Palm Beach.

"We serve between two and four tons of meat a week at Old South," he said. The fried catfish served is freshly caught at nearby Lake Okeechobee.

Old South isn't the kind of place where you have to be concerned about how you dress or whether you should leave the kids at home.

The outside of the building is adorned with signs painted in western "lingo." There also are life-size versions of the historic OK Corral shootout

and Judge Roy Bean's courthouse. The signs and figurines are made by John Griffin, who has worked in the kitchen here for 25 years.

"Griffin has more seniority than I have," Benson said with a laugh. Inside, it's sturdy wooden tables and benches. One takes little notice of the furniture, however, because of the antiques that seem to be everywhere.

"Most of them are items that were used around the house and farm in the 1800s," explained Benson, "but everything works."

He estimated that more than 1,000 antiques are in his restaurant, most secured to shelves or walls, but, he said, they can be touched and operated by inquisitive patrons.

"I have no idea what their worth is. I'd hate to put a price on them because many are irreplaceable. Some of them you won't even find in a museum," he said.

The only difficulty he's encountered with having such rare pieces of American history in his place is that "some people get indignant because I won't sell something."

Waitresses at Old South are a friendly bunch and blend in with the place because of their "uniforms."

Each is dressed as a cowgirl complete with boots, denim shirt and skirt, cowboy hat and a well-worn holster and six-shooter.

Benson and his wife, Reva, live in one of the oldest houses in Clewiston. Built in 1929 as a palatial hospitality house for guests of Bror G. Dahlbereg, whose company eventually became the U.S. Sugar Corp., the home has a spacious kitchen, porches, large bedrooms and a glass tower on the third floor.

It is pleasantly decorated with antique dinnerware, furniture and conversation pieces. Mrs. Benson's collection of antique finger purses is prominently displayed in one room.

The Bensons enjoy traveling in search of antiques, and get away during the two slowest months of the year — May and October.

"We never go west of Arkansas and Missouri," said Benson, "but my station wagon never gets past an antique store without stopping."



Six oil, gas discoveries finalized in Lea, Eddy counties, N.M.

Six oil and gas discoveries have been finalized in the New Mexico counties of Lea and Eddy. Also, four Eddy and Chaves wildcats have been planned.

LEA DISCOVERY

A 12,107-foot wildcat drilled by Inceco Oil, five miles west of Knowles, flowed 386 barrels of oil and 222,000 cubic feet of gas per day from perforations in the Strawn (Pennsylvanian) formation.

'Ski mask rapist' in permanent residence at Louisiana prison

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The man called the Ski Mask Rapist, who says his three-year terror spree included 31 crimes in 13 states, is now in permanent residence at Angola Prison — facing 21 life sentences plus 2,001 years in jail.

During each of six court appearances since early December, Jon Barry Simons said he was sorry about everything, but couldn't help himself.

"I am guilty of these crimes. I knew extremely well what I was doing beforehand, while I was doing it, and I know now," Simons told District Judge Charles Beedel during a Dec. 10 hearing in Donaldsonville.

Simons, who turns 31 Friday, said he would wear a ski mask during break-ins and often rape woman residents who happened to be home.

He received his 21 life sentences on rape convictions, the extra years for other crimes like armed robbery, burglary and auto theft.

Simons began his prison terms Sunday.

A six-footer with broad shoulders, moustache, wavy brown hair and hooded blue eyes, Simons was arrested Nov. 27 in Lake Charles, his home town.

Officers had been told that a car like Simons' was seen near the scene of one of the "ski mask rapist" attacks. Simons was placed under surveillance and was taken into custody as he left a store near his home.

It was then that he told investigators about 81 armed robberies or burglaries in 30 cities in 12 states — many of them involving rape or other sexual crimes.

Other men had been convicted in two of the crimes described by Simons.

In Texas, one man was quickly freed but there was some confusion, because the rape victim insisted she was not convinced Simons was the man who attacked her.

"Everything Simons knew could have come from newspapers, anybody who attended the trial or anyone

who investigated the case," she said.

However, Clarence Von Williams, serving 50 years on the rape conviction, was released on Dec. 5 at a special court session in Orange, Texas, on a motion filed by both the defense and prosecution.

"Simons knew too many details not to have committed the rape," said Orange County District Attorney Jim Jenkins.

In Athens County, Ohio, a 22-year-old man apparently will be cleared of a rape and robbery conviction because the victim identified Simons as her assailant, prosecutor Michael Ward said earlier this week.

Two other rape-robbery convictions continue in nearby Fairfield County against Bradley C. Cox of Lancaster, Ohio, but Simons also has confessed to them.

In addition, queries about Simons have been received from law enforcement officials in California, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Michigan, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma and Wisconsin, State Police in Louisiana say.

The string of prison terms imposed by Louisiana courts was the full extent of what the law could do to Simons in that state. Only first-degree murder carries the death penalty.

"He would be a candidate for frying, I guarantee it, but unfortunately under our law, which was changed by the U.S. Supreme Court, the death penalty no longer applies on these crimes," Jefferson Davis Parish District Attorney Gregg Arnette, said after Simons' 21st life sentence was announced.

In Louisiana, a life sentence without parole really does mean life. Only a governor's pardon can cancel it. Authorities here say Simons' stiff sentences in Louisiana make it unlikely that other states will seek to try him.

"We think Jon Simons is going to spend the rest of his days in Louisiana," said state police Lt. Ronnie Jones.

Lawyers say Hughes, Moore marriage valid

HOUSTON (AP) — Attorneys for Terry Moore claim in an appeal her secret marriage to Howard Hughes was valid because the 52-year-old actress and the reclusive billionaire believed it was.

But attorneys for the 22 people declared by a probate court here as heirs to the Hughes estate argue Ms. Moore, a Hollywood starlet in the late 1940s, married and divorced three different men after she allegedly wed Hughes.

Records also showed Hughes was married to actress Jean Peters from 1967 until 1971, the heirs' attorneys said.

"This is opportunistic position swapping...to improve her own economic position," said Tom Schubert, attorney for 17 maternal relatives.

Last July, a probate judge dismissed Ms. Moore's claim to the estate because she had no records to prove she was Hughes' widow.

The Texas 14th Court of Civil Appeals will decide whether to uphold the ruling or to order her claim be decided by a jury. If her claim was ruled valid, it would make her the sole heir to Hughes' vast estate, worth as much as \$2 billion.

Attorneys in the case predicted the three-judge panel will hand down a ruling within 60 days.

Ms. Moore claims she married the eccentric tycoon

aboard his yacht in 1949 "somewhere out at sea...headed toward Mexico" and later bore his child, a baby she says died shortly after birth.

The marriage was kept secret because she and Hughes did not want to harm her screen image as an innocent, naive girl.

During oral arguments Thursday, her attorney, Arthur Leeds, contended his client's marriage to Hughes was valid because both Ms. Moore and Hughes believed it was.

"If one party believes in the marriage, it remains so until dissolved," Leeds said.

But Associate Justice Paul Pressler asked Leeds if he was "branding" his client a "bigamist and a perjurer" because of her three subsequent marriages.

"Would not that thrice make her a bigamist?" Pressler asked.

Leeds responded, "I am not capable of giving an opinion," on that law.

Other appeals have been filed, including challenges by two women also claiming they were married to Hughes when he died in April 1976. A Las Vegas, Nev., woman who says she is Hughes' daughter, and another 500 distant paternal cousins whose claims were swept away by a jury last September have asked for new trials.

Rebels, Bulldogs seek 5-5A victories

Following Midland High's overtime loss to Abilene High and Midland Lee's victory over first place pretender Abilene Cooper Tuesday, the District 5-5A basketballers have now set up a first half stretch run that boggles the mind.

With only three loop games by the boards, only Abilene High has escaped without a loss while MHS, Lee, Cooper and San Angelo are all only a step out of first place. And the Eagles still have a rough road ahead in the four games left on the first half schedule.

Today at 8 p.m., the Rebels of Lee take on the Big Spring Steers, winless in district play but close in all of their games, at Chaparral Center while Midland High makes another crucial road trip to face the Bobcats of San Angelo, with one of the teams destined to fall from the hunt — for the time being anyway. The way this league is going, nothing is for certain.

BUT ONE fact does remain, the defending champion Bulldogs now need some help to win the first half crown because they can't do it by themselves. Someone will have to beat AHS before the Bulldogs can win or share the first half crown.

Lee, on the other hand, has its destiny in its own hands after belting Abilene Cooper out of first place last Tuesday since they still have a road date with the Eagles later in the race. But the Rebels need to keep their minds on the Steers tonight since Big Spring has shown talent enough to make it hard on all of their opponents.

Abilene High travels to Odessa High tonight and the Bronchos are another team which has not won in district play. Cooper will try to keep the pace against Odessa Permian in Abilene.

"I said from the start that this league would be super close, and I wouldn't be a bit surprised if Odessa High doesn't beat Abilene High tonight. They (OHS) have the strong, physical type team that can beat Abilene," MHS coach Jack Stephenson said. "We were ready

to play against Abilene Tuesday, but it may have been a case of confidence that hurt us early in the game. We were playing too fast and missed some easy shots, but I still feel we have the best team. I don't think they can finish the first half unbeaten.

"San Angelo is at the top of their game right now and they have two super players in Hercules Miller and Lorand White. I think our kids know what it is going to take to beat them down there. It won't be easy."

THE DANGER for the Rebels is also apparent at this stage of the season. They play Big Spring tonight and Permian Tuesday before hitting Abilene High and Midland High to finish the first half. It is the part of the schedule where a let down could really hurt. Victories tonight and Tuesday, however, would vault Lee into the crucial first half ending in the right frame of mind.

"I like the way our kids adjusted against Cooper Tuesday after we were down by seven at the half, but Big Spring has a good team and we have to be ready to play," Lee coach Paul Stueckler said.

If the Rebels play inspired defense like they did in the second half against Cooper, Lee should be in good shape tonight. "When you are not hitting from the field, you have to be able to change some things and I think we showed we could do that against Cooper. We didn't play well in the first half, but I was pleased with the job our kids did in the second half," Stueckler noted.

Lee's Andre Van Buren is averaging 18.3 points per game this season and scored 11 of his 13 points in the fourth quarter against Cooper. Alvin Dunson is hitting at a 15.4 per game clip while Barry Blackwell, who is beginning to show some potent scoring potential, has moved up to 7.4 per game after 13 points against Cooper. Randy Peeper (8.4) and Kenneth Brown (7.3) complete the starting lineup.

Preston Robertson, who scored only four points against AHS Tuesday, dropped to 19.3 points per game average, but the Bulldogs have a lot of scoring punch as Don Sharnowski averages 14.1 and Raymond Parker 13.4. Also Jim Gunnels, who fouled out against AHS, is hitting at 8.6, but has been in double figures in every district game.

"Parker was fantastic against Abilene," noted Stephenson. "He played a great game with 22 points. Robertson and Gunnels were hurt with fouls, and both scored negative on team value in the game. Their limited playing time did hurt overall because they usually score high on team value."

Chaps hold off Plainsmen, 88-80

It was beginning to look like a rerun of past Frank Phillips-Midland College scripts, one of those tragedies of the plains where the locusts gobble up the crops, the rustlers run off with all the cattle and the guy in the black hat winds up with the girl.

The Chaparrals had led by 21 points with 15 minutes to play and now were on the verge on blowing it on a roll of the dice at the finish. Frank Phillips had closed the gap to 80-77 and missed two shots under the basket that could have closed it to one. The second shot came off the boards and while a crowd of 6-8ers stretched on tippy-toes for possession, guess who came up with it. That's right, 5-6 Spud Webb.

HIS OUTLET pass downcourt found Puntus Wilson driving for the iron and led him perfectly. Instead of a one-point pot-boiler, Wilson's layup made it 82-77 with 2:24 left and the Chaps went on to post an 88-80 win at the Chaparral Center Thursday night.

MC now stands 14-5 on the year, but more importantly retained its grip on second place with a 5-1 Western Junior College Conference record. Frank Phillips skidded to 1-4 after losses to the Chaps and league leading Amarillo College this week.

"WHEN I went in the locker room after the game, you'd have thought we

had lost," said Coach Jerry Stone. "Everybody had their heads down. I thought we'd gotten Christmas out of our system, but I guess not."

Despite the harrowing finish, the Chaps played good basketball at times and then played fadeaway as the Plainsmen whittled a 61-40 deficit to 71-70 with 5:38 to play.

"I think some of them may be coming down with something and, yes, a lack of depth hurt us," Stone said. "MC used just nine players and Webb, who scored a game high 31 points, never got any relief. Audie Apple kept a constant stream of players going in and out and it almost paid off."

Yet, when the outlook appeared most bleak, the Chaps, to their credit, responded to the challenge.

SHARING SCORING honors with Webb was Wilson, who pumped in 30 points with 12 of 18 from the field, a dramatic improvement from Monday when he was an uncharacteristic 6 of 17 against Howard.

Webb converted 13 of 16 from the line and his nine field goals came on 18 attempts.

Six-six Chester Smith, who turned in such a strong performance under the boards against the Hawks, hit most of his six baskets for 12 points from the 12' to his foot range.

Midland charged into an early 13-4 lead and then trailed 21-20 and 23-22 before opening a 46-38 halftime bulge. Rodger Hughes, a 6-1 sophomore from Childress, ramrodded the Plainsmen's comeback with 16 first half points, winding up with 20 for the night.

It looked like a case of "turn out the lights, the party's over" when MC scorched the cords by hitting seven of their first eight second half shots while FPC was making only one of seven, to take a 61-40 lead with 15:02 left. Webb and Wilson led the charge as MC flected the FPC defense with a series of fast breaks.

BUT THEN Avery Lovely and Cliff Morgan, a couple of bench warmers the first half, ignited Frank Phillips' retaliatory strike. Where a few minutes before MC could do no wrong, it was a case of one or not shots and here come the Plainsmen again and it seemed that the Berger team was on its way one of its disturbingly frequent come back wins over MC.

"I think I've been at fault some in the past," said Stone. "I've had a tendency to take them lightly, but not this time. I really got up for the game."

Murphy to guide M-Cubs

The Chicago Cubs named Brian Murphy, a veteran minor league infielder, to manage the Texas League Midland Cubs in 1982. It was announced by Midland General Manager Bill Schammel Thursday.

The National League club also named Ramon Conde, who played in the American Association and Texas League, as coach. Conde will be the first full time coach carried by the Midland club.

The 37-year-old Murphy resides in Fairfield, Conn., and last year managed Fort Myers in the Class A Florida State League.

He attended Fairfield Prep School and attended the University of Bridgeport for two years

before breaking into Organized Baseball with Batavia of the New York-Penn League in 1962.

In 1964 he led the California League second baseman in put-outs (262) and chances (635) while playing for Reno. In 1968, he led the Carolinas League second baseman in assists and chances and was named to the league all-star team while playing for Raleigh.

Murphy played for Louisville and Winnipeg in the International League in 1970-71 and finished his active playing career with Omaha of the American Association in 1976-77-78.

The 5-11, 174-pound Murphy is single and will be the Cubs eighth manager since the team moved

here from San Antonio in 1972. Predecessors were Al Spangler, Walt Dixon, Doc Edwards, Denny Somers, Randy Hundley, Roy Hartsfield and George Enright.

Edwards, now managing in the International League, guided the Cubs to a Texas League pennant in 1975, the year Midland had a pitching staff that included Bruce Sutter, Mike Krukow and Dennis Lamp, all of whom are in the majors.

Since the start of last year the Chicago Tribune Company has taken over the ownership of the Chicago club from the Wrigley Company and Dallas Green has succeeded Bob Kennedy and Herman Franks as general manager of the team.

Halas to strip Finks of Bear power

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Bears owner George Halas acknowledges that he has decided to strip General Manager Jim Finks of power and that he plans to take a more-active role in running the team.

Halas' remarks came after a meeting Thursday with Finks in which the two discussed the future of the National Football League club.

Following the meeting, the Bears' office issued a three-paragraph statement that said Halas and Finks had agreed on a "course of action to improve the fortunes of the club."

The statement said the two "had a

mutual meeting of minds to determine the future of the Chicago Bears," adding that "the course of action to improve the fortunes of the club was mutually resolved and agreed upon."

But Finks, who reportedly has been at odds with Halas since the Bears owner fired former head Coach Neil Armstrong, emerged from the meeting and said he had "no idea" what Halas planned for him in the future.

Later, Halas was asked to explain the news release and said Finks' authority as general manager would be decreased and that, in effect, he personally was taking on greater responsibility for the club.

"It means some of Finks' authority was taken away," Halas said. "Jim will negotiate player contracts, but they will be submitted to me. He will have input in the draft, but I will hire the coaches."

Halas also made it clear that he intends to have the final word on all decisions affecting the Bears.

"Nothing will be done without my authority," Halas said.

In the statement, Finks said: "My goal has not changed. I want to see the Chicago Bears world's champions."

Williams was discovered by a graduate assistant in an equipment room at the university's new Rincon Vista Track Stadium. A .38-caliber revolver was clutched in his hand with one of six bullets fired, Ragland said.

Ragland said he found a box of ammunition and a receipt for the gun, purchased earlier Thursday. In the coach's car parked nearby, Williams apparently left no note, the officer said.

Abila, Banda vault to pro fight scene

Now it's time to play for pay. A pair of Midland boxers, Richard Abila and Benito Banda, will enter the boxing ring tonight in their respective divisions like they have many times in the past. But it won't be the same. Each will be seeking a victory in his first professional fight.

Abila, 20, has been boxing since he was 12 years old and has a record of 290 wins against 10 losses in 300 amateur fights. His opponent, Hector Hernandez of Houston, has a pro record of 2-0-0.

Like most athletes going into competition, especially one with such importance, Abila is nervous about his pro debut.

"I'm very excited and very nervous," he said. "I'm excited but I'm ready to go. I've been preparing for the fight for a month and a half and I found out who I'll be fighting last week."

According to Abila and his manager, Rick Fleetwood, not much is known about Hernandez except that in his previous fights he was a flyweight.

"This guy normally fights 112 and I don't think he has the power to stay past two with Richard," said Fleetwood. "We don't know anything about the kid. From the reports we've got, he's a good fighter, fast."

Preparing for a fight is an every day task beginning with running at 6 a.m. followed by work at a part-time job and then workouts at night. And like a lot of boxers, he doesn't like the road work.

"I hate running, especially getting up in the morning to do it, it's a drag," said Abila.

Abila began his boxing career at the age of eight through the encouragement of his father.

"My dad started me off in boxing," he said. "At first I didn't really care about it but when I won all those first place trophies it became fun." Now he's in it as a career because "they (the trophies) don't mean anything now."

But he isn't in boxing just for the money he can make. His first paycheck for the four-round fight will be \$300 which isn't exactly a living wage considering expenses like the \$50 he had to spend for a mouth piece. But he said, "it isn't bad for four rounds and not bad for a start either."

Abila admires a lot of boxers who have made it big in the ring including two of the biggest in the boxing world today, Sugar Ray Leonard and Roberto Duran.

"Sugar Ray Leonard and Roberto Duran, they're BAD FIGHTERS," said Abila meaning bad to tangle with. "They're not up there just throwing punches, they're up there because they want to be there. They're good fighters."

Throughout his 12 years in the ring, Abila has faced several good amateurs, including his final non-professional bout.

"In his last amateur fight he beat Fred Perkins from Ft. Hood by a three-round decision," said Fleetwood. "Perkins is the All-Army champion, a National AAU champion and International champion. He's the top ranked amateur flyweight and he's been chosen to be on the All-American boxing team for 1981."

A pretty impressive conclusion to a pretty impressive amateur career.

Meyer to leave SMU for Patriots

DALLAS (AP)—Ron Meyer, a young and ambitious coach who said he would only leave Southern Methodist University for a chance to direct a National Football League team, was to tell his squad today he is going to the New England Patriots, a source close to the school's athletic department said.

Meyer, 41, scheduled a team meeting at noon to announce he will replace fired Patriots Coach Ron Erhardt, the source said.

"Yes, I have been offered the job with the New England Patriots," Meyer told The Dallas Morning News on Thursday. "The decision is up to me. I'll make a decision within 24 hours."

SMU Athletic Director Bob Hitch, who said he had not spoken with Meyer, said, "any news regarding this situation will be coming from New England."

Meyer met with Patriots officials in New York Thursday, the source said. "As of now, we do not have a press conference scheduled..." Tom Hoffman, director of media relations for the Patriots, said he can neither confirm or deny anything to do with the coaching situation... until we have the new coach signed and at that time we will make the formal announcement.

"We have said all along that we would like to name a new coach hopefully prior to the Super Bowl," the Patriots previously were turned down by Southern California Coach John Robinson and Penn State Coach Joe Paterno as replacements for Erhardt, who led the team to the worst record in the NFL, 2-14, in the just concluded season.

Members of the SMU coaching staff told the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star that Meyer met in New York with Patriots President Billy Sullivan, his son Chuck, the Pats' executive vice president, and General Manager Bucko Kilroy. Meyer was supposed to return to Texas immediately after the interview but made such an impression in the session that he was given the job, the newspaper said.

Meyer checked into a New York hotel under an assumed name and met with Kilroy for several hours Thursday.

hammering out details of a four-year contract for an estimated \$700,000, the Sentinel Star said.

Only two months ago Meyer said, "I would not leave SMU for another college... but there is no secret about my ambition to coach in the National Football League."

In just six years, Meyer brought the Mustangs from a dismal 3-8 record in 1976 to the Southwest Conference championship with a 10-1 mark in 1981 and to their highest ranking in The Associated Press poll in 30 years.

But the 5th-ranked Mustangs could not play in the Cotton Bowl because they were on probation.

Meyer was 62-39-1 in nine seasons as a head coach, first at Nevada-Las Vegas and then at SMU. He coached UNLV into the 1974 Division II playoffs.

Meyer was a scout for the Dallas Cowboys and Gil Brandt, the personnel director who hired him, said, "I've been a Ron Meyer fan since I hired him... He is an extremely bright coach and will do a very good job... he is highly organized."

The source close to the SMU athletic department said Meyer was expected to take a number of his assistants with him to New England.

Speculation for his replacement has already centered around Cowboy's innovative assistant coach John Mackovic, who has spent a year under Tom Landry.

The Sentinel Star also said Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne would be considered for the SMU job.

Meyer began his SMU career with a pass-oriented attack, but switched to a running game out of the 1 formation when he recruited Eric Dickerson and Craig James. The two juniors both rushed for more than 1,000 yards last season.

"It's hard to believe but everybody around here expected it," James told the Dallas Morning News. "It's not the first thing to hurt us, but it's a loss, a big loss."

Minnesota stuns No. 5 Hawkeyes

A change in strategy might lead the way to the change in the rankings that the Minnesota Gophers feel is warranted.

Minnesota, 10-2, and rated 11th, beat No. 5 Iowa 61-56 Thursday night in a battle of Big Ten powers. The Hawkeyes, also 10-2, led by two points at halftime, but Minnesota went to a man-to-man defense rather than a zone and that turned the game around.

Now, Gophers Coach Jim Dutcher wants to see the rankings turned around. "It was a game we wanted and a game we needed," said Dutcher. "They are ranked fifth and that's where we feel we should be ranked."

"I was really pleased with way we played the man-to-man. I thought we played a great defensive second half. I thought our man-to-man really shut them off."

Randy Brewer, the Gophers' 7-foot-3 center who led the way with 22 points, agreed with his coach after Minnesota's first home victory over Iowa in four

years. "The zone wasn't doing it for us," said Brewer. "We had to go to the man-to-man and it picked up the tempo and they couldn't keep up."

"I felt the momentum shift when we went to the man-to-man," added Minnesota's Trent Tucker. "I said to myself we're going to roll now."

Both teams now stand 2-1 in the Big Ten.

"They played a very strong defense in the second half, especially in the man-to-man," said Hawkeyes Coach Lute Olson. "We weren't surprised they came out in it but we couldn't handle it."

"Our shot selection wasn't the greatest and Randy was intimidating inside," added Iowa's Kevin Boyle, who had 10 points, four fewer than teammate Kenny Arnold.

In the decisive second half, Iowa shot only 37 percent, while Minnesota hit on 58 percent of its shots.

In other contests involving ranked teams, it was No. 3 Virginia over Wagner 99-67, No. 16 Wichita State beating Creighton 69-56, and 18th-ranked Tulsa topping Drake 71-54.

Teams fight for Jackson

Owner Ted Turner of the Atlanta Braves and California Angels Executive Vice President Buzze Bavasi are making renewed efforts to sign New York Yankees outfielder Reggie Jackson, according to published reports.

"I've gotten word (Yankees owner) George Steinbrenner is not really interested," Bavasi was quoted as saying in Friday's editions of the New York Times. "The attitude I've gotten is 'Hey, go ahead and do what you can do,' so I'll do it. We will make an offer that he can say yes or no to and then we'll be in or out."

In Friday's editions of the Los Angeles Times, it was reported that Jackson will meet with Bavasi and Angels' President Gene Autry in Palm Springs, Calif., Friday morning.

"As far as I'm concerned, this is it," Bavasi was quoted as saying. "And I think Reggie feels the same way. He's an honorable young man and we don't want to drag this thing out."

"This is the first time we've really sat down to serious negotiations. The only other time we've talked, he indicated he wanted to play out here (in California) or in New York. But things change, he's talked with the people in Baltimore and Atlanta this week."

Tom Kite moves into position

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — An obscure Japanese rookie had the lead but golf's biggest money-winner last year, Tom Kite, who is Midland's new touring pro of Green Tree Country Club, was in a threatening position after two rounds of the five-day Bob Hope Desert Golf Classic.

And Kite, who last season had one of the most consistent records in the game, had but one thought in mind — winning more often.

"I want to improve this season," Kite said. "But even if I don't, if I play just like I did last year, I ought to just fall into more victories than I had."

"That's my goal, one of my goals, this year. Win and win often."

Kite, who topped the 1981 money-winning list and took the Vardon Trophy for the low stroke average on the tour, was in the top 10 finishers in 21 of 25 starts and finished the season with a string of 18 consecutive events in which he placed eighth or better.

But he won only one individual title. He's in position again.

A 6-under-par 66 Thursday at tough Eldorado gave Kite a 134 total, 10 under par, and lifted him to within two strokes of the surprise leader, long-hitting Jet Ozaki.

Ozaki, younger brother of former Japanese star Jumbo Ozaki, used his vast distance off the tee to birdie all of

the par-6 holes on the way to a 68 at Bermuda Dunes. That gave him sole control of the 36-hole lead at 132.

Journeyman Rex Caldwell, who shared the first-round lead with Ozaki, shot a 66, also at Bermuda Dunes, and was one stroke back at 133.

Tied with Kite at 134 were former PGA champ Lanny Wadkins, Skeeter Heath and Cal Peete. Peete had a 65 at La Quinta, Wadkins 69 at Eldorado and Heath 67 at Indian Wells.

The format for this, the only 90-hole event on the tour, calls for the 128 pros to play one round on each of four desert courses, each day with a different, three-man amateur team. After four rounds the amateurs drop out and the field is cut to the low 70 scorers for the pro-only windup Sunday at Indian Wells.

Most of the celebrity amateurs, including former President Gerald Ford and the host comedian, along with the top-name pros played Wednesday at Eldorado. But Lee Trevino was among the missing. He suffered the recurrence of chronic back trouble after an opening round of 69 and told officials he would not be able to compete.

Masters champ Tom Watson had a 72 and was at 141. Defending titleholder Bruce Lietzke shot 69-141. U.S. Open champ David Graham was 71-138. And Arnold Palmer, the current national seniors champion and a five-time winner here, had a 72-147 while playing with President Ford. All were at Eldorado.

PGA king Larry Nelson was 69-144 at Bermuda Dunes.

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP) — Super Bowl XVI has generated such a ticket squeeze that in many cases it would be cheaper to buy a new television set and watch the game in the comfort of your home.

Tickets for the Jan. 24 game between the Cincinnati Bengals and the San Francisco 49ers in the Silverdome sell for a face value of \$40 but they are bringing anywhere from \$200 to \$400 on the resale market.

In fact, resale of Super Bowl tickets has become so lucrative that newspapers in Detroit and elsewhere around the country are full of classified ads offering to buy and sell the tickets.

This is the first time the

premium... The largest ticket dealer appears to be Dave Adelman, a president of Murray's, a ticket brokerage and tour company in Los Angeles that claims it can get you a ticket to anything — from tennis at Wimbledon to Super Bowls in Detroit.

Murray's has been advertising in newspapers around the country for months and Adelman said at midweek he expected to buy and resell about 5,000 Super Bowl tickets

— down from nearly 8,000 for last year's game in New Orleans.

Adelman, whose prices range from \$225 for end zone tickets to \$400 for seats on the 50-yard line, said he nets about \$30 for every ticket he sells.

Aggries woo Michigan's Schembechler

CORLENE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M officials say a decision is imminent by Michigan football Coach Bo Schembechler on whether he will accept a 10-year, \$2.25-million offer to become the new A&M athletic director.

The Bryan-College Station, Eagle Thursday quoted A&M Board of Regents Chairman H.R. "Dum" Bright as saying that Schembechler had been offered the job to replace Marvin Tate, who resigned in September.

"That's the job that's offered right now and he is considering it," said Bright. "I can only say that Texas A&M would be pleased and honored to have a man the caliber of Bo Schembechler come to A&M."

Schembechler could not be reached for comment Thursday night and

reportedly was huddled with Michigan Athletic Director Don Canham and university President Harold T. Shapiro.

Canham told the Dallas Times Herald there would be a statement by Schembechler today.

"But we are going to do what we can to keep him," he said in a separate interview with the Detroit News.

The Houston Post, in a copyright story, reported an "unimpeachable source" said Schembechler also has been offered the head coach's position. And Dave Diles, a sportscaster for WXYZ-TV in Detroit, reported sources at Michigan said Schembechler was considering an offer to become both head coach and athletic director.

The Post said current Head Coach Tom Wilson, whose contract was

extended last month for another season, will be fired and his contract paid off. Wilson was on a recruiting trip and could not be reached for comment.

But interim A&M Athletic Director Wally Groff denied Schembechler had been offered the coaching job.

"We've already got a coach, and he's contracted for one more year," Groff said. "The only opening we have right now is for the A-D position."

The Post said sources told the newspaper Schembechler tentatively agreed to a contract after the Bluebonnet Bowl, but has delayed making a final decision at least twice.

The newspaper said Bright got help in his negotiations from Alabama Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant, Georgia Coach Vince Dooley and former Oklahoma Coach Bud Wilkinson.

A&M regents and alumni have been frustrated by a football program that has produced one Cotton Bowl team in the past 40 years and only three South-west Conference champions, the latest a tri-champion in 1975 that did not go to the Cotton Bowl.

Schembechler, 52, the dean of Big 10 coaches, has compiled a 123-24-3 record in 13 seasons at Michigan. He was named college Coach of the Year in 1969 and Big Ten Coach of the Year in 1972 and 1980.

His worst season at Michigan was 6-4 in 1970. Eight of his Michigan teams won 10 or more games in a season and nine were Big 10 champions.

Schembechler's Michigan teams have finished in the Top Ten of The Associated Press final poll every year except 1979 and 1981. The Wolverines were 12th in last season's last poll.

Schembechler has a 2-7 post-season bowl record, with both victories ironically coming in 1981. The first was the Jan. 1 Rose Bowl victory over Washington following the 1980 season, with the other being the Dec. 31 Bluebonnet Bowl beating of UCLA, 33-14.

He began his head coaching career at Miami of Ohio in 1963, where he compiled a 40-17-3 record and won two championships in the Mid-America Conference.

Rinaldi, King capture Avon tennis victories

CINCINNATI (AP) — The news wasn't good for the top players in the \$150,000 Avon Tennis Championships, with top-seeded Tracy Austin succumbing to injury and the second and third seeds being upset.

But it was all good Thursday for 38-year-old Billie Jean King and 14-year-old Kathy Rinaldi. King, enjoying a resurgence, stunned No. 2 seed Sylvia Hanika of West Germany, and Rinaldi upset No. 3 Pam Shriver. Both won quarterfinal matches by 7-6, 6-4 scores.

Austin, who a day earlier was named Associated Press Female Athlete of 1981, was forced to withdraw after suffering lower back pains while warming up for her after-

noon match.

"I can't tell you how disappointed I am not to be able to play tonight," Austin said in a press release issued Thursday night. "Nobody feels worse than I do and I only hope that this injury will get better as soon as possible."

McEnroe beats Connors despite pulled leg muscle

NEW YORK (AP) — John McEnroe, apparently changing tactics because of a pulled leg muscle, played a baseline game Thursday night to defeat Jimmy Connors 6-2, 7-5 in the second round of the \$400,000 Volvo Masters tennis championships.

Using chips, different spins and varying the pace, McEnroe, seeded second in this eight-man, round-robin tournament, kept Connors off balance, winning seven straight games in the middle of the match, while dropping only eight points.

Earlier, top-seeded Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia crushed Guillermo Vilas of Argentina 6-4, 6-1 and Eliot Teltscher downed Roscoe Tanner 4-6, 6-1, 6-4. In the final match of the night, Jose-Luis Clerc of Argentina played Vitas Gerulaitis.

It was Connors, not the tempestuous McEnroe, who first became visibly upset. The event's third seed stared at the floor where he thought a ball landed long on the game's fifth point. Then, in the sixth game, he complained about another line call.

McEnroe, his face drawn, tried to overlook what he thought were bad line calls. But in the second set, his emotions boiled over several times.

The first occasion came in the first game when Anita Shukow made a line call that McEnroe disagreed with. McEnroe, at the other end of the court, said: "I'm not going to expect anything from you. You cheated me last time."

But the 22-year-old New Yorker was

sailing along then, in the midst of his mid-match winning streak where he toyed with Connors, slicing sometimes, hitting top-spins at other times — and everything finding the insides of the lines.

After he closed out the first set and moved to a 4-2 lead, however, things changed for the reigning Wimbledon and U.S. Open champion.

With the huge crowd of around 18,000 cheering for Connors, the Belleville, Ill., native broke McEnroe's serve at 15 in the seventh game, then fought off a break point to hold serve and level the second set at 4-4.

During the eighth game, Connors was upset at a line call. And at the end of the game, McEnroe kicked a box surrounding a side linesman's position.

In the ninth game, umpire Ken Sive of Alexandria, Va., erroneously gave McEnroe a time-delay point penalty, but he immediately reversed himself and said it was a time-delay warning.

The two held serve until the 12th game when McEnroe, still roaming the baseline and rarely playing his normal serve-and-volley game, won the first two points when Connors netted a backhand, then hit a forehand long. McEnroe then got a break when his backhand hit the top of the net and rolled over, giving him triple break point.

Connors save the first as McEnroe, backing a rare move to the net, hit a forehand volley long.

Worth southpaw Craig Adams and like Abila's opponent Hernandez, Banda and Fleetwood don't know much about him.

"I know he's a southpaw and I'll have to work a little harder because I usually have a little trouble with southpaws," said Banda. "I'll have to work a little harder and try to mix it up a little more."

Banda has been boxing for eight years and has posted a 75-16 amateur record. He said he got into boxing to get himself off the streets.

"When I was younger I was always fighting after school, getting beat up," he said. "That wasn't for me so I decided to stay out of the streets and started boxing."

And now that he's turning professional, is he nervous?

"Always a little," said Banda. "but I'm not scared though."

For his four-rounder against Adams, Banda will be making \$200 a round if everything goes like planned," said Fleetwood. "That is if it's a KO in the first round. The price he's getting for this fight is not what I'm concerned about, it's getting him recognition."

Banda is a full-time iron worker in Midland and doesn't get a chance to start his training as early as Abila. He starts his road work "around 3:30, three or four miles a day and then I go to the

gym for an hour and a half or two hours," he said.

While in the gym he'll go through a normal workout which includes sparring with Abila, who happens to be a boxer he looks up to along with Tony Ayala (the main attraction to their boxing card tonight) and Steve Cruz.

"He's got speed on me," said Banda about Abila. "With Richard I can't get out there and slug it out, I have to out-smart him."

Against Adams, Banda will have to use his wits because he and Fleetwood know that Adams is a good fighter, but beatable.

"We know he's a southpaw and we know he's got a good amateur record," said Fleetwood. "He sticks and moves and the thing Benito will have to do is corner him because he sticks and moves. He was a good amateur-style fighter, he piled up a lot of points as an amateur. Benito fights pro style. He'll have to cut the ring off and corner the guy, make him slug with him."

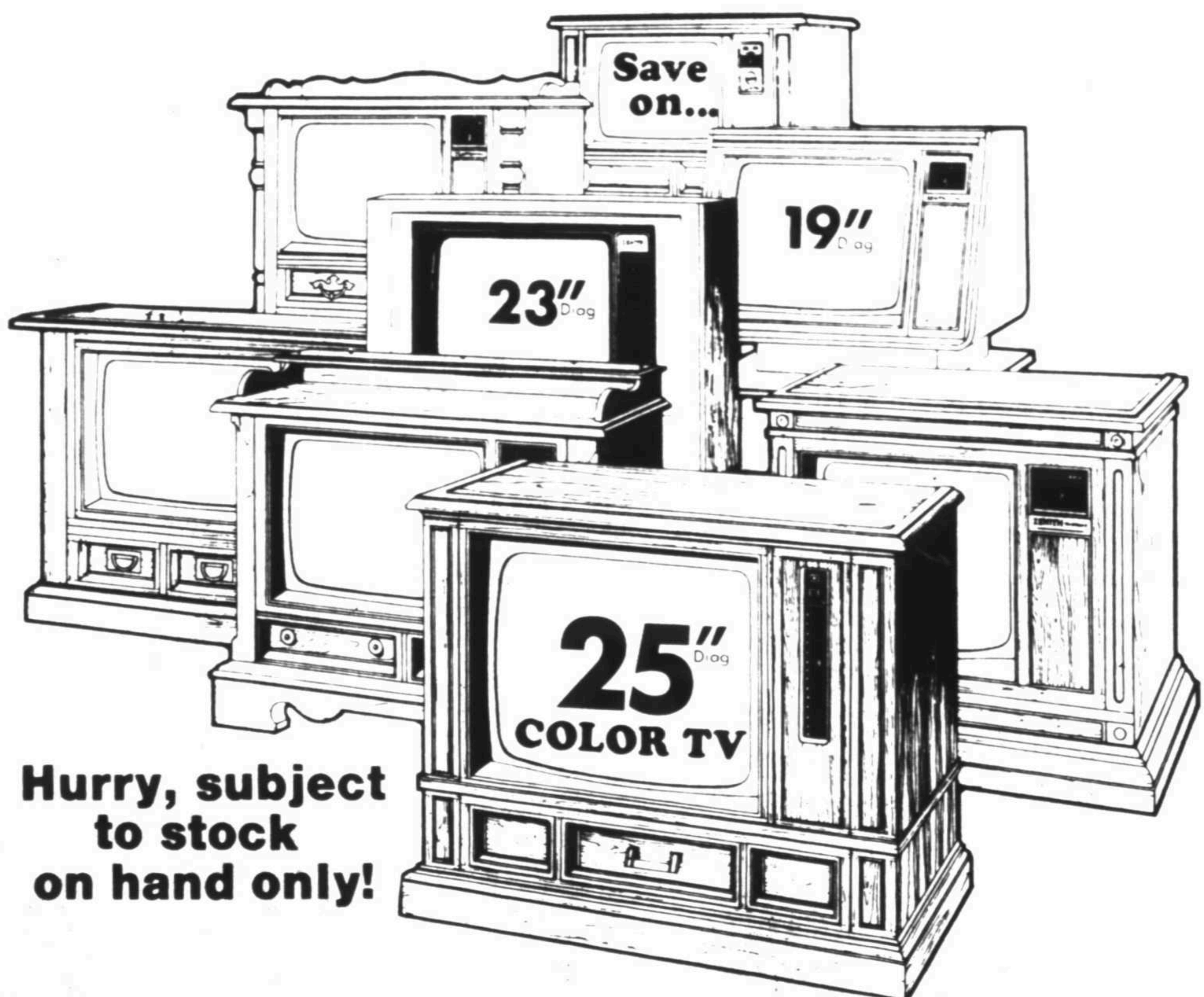
IN THIS their first professional fight, Fleetwood feels his boxers have been paired up well.

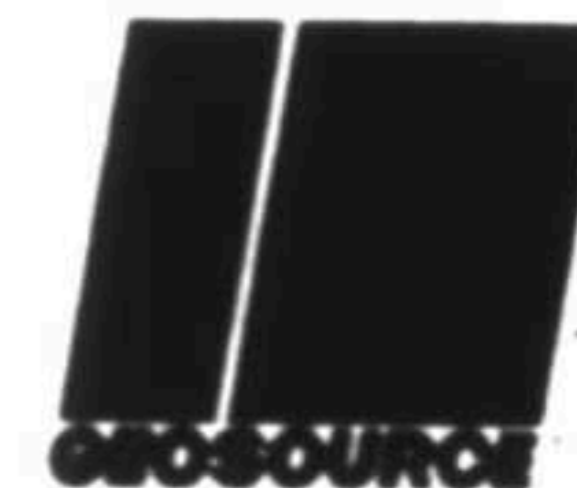

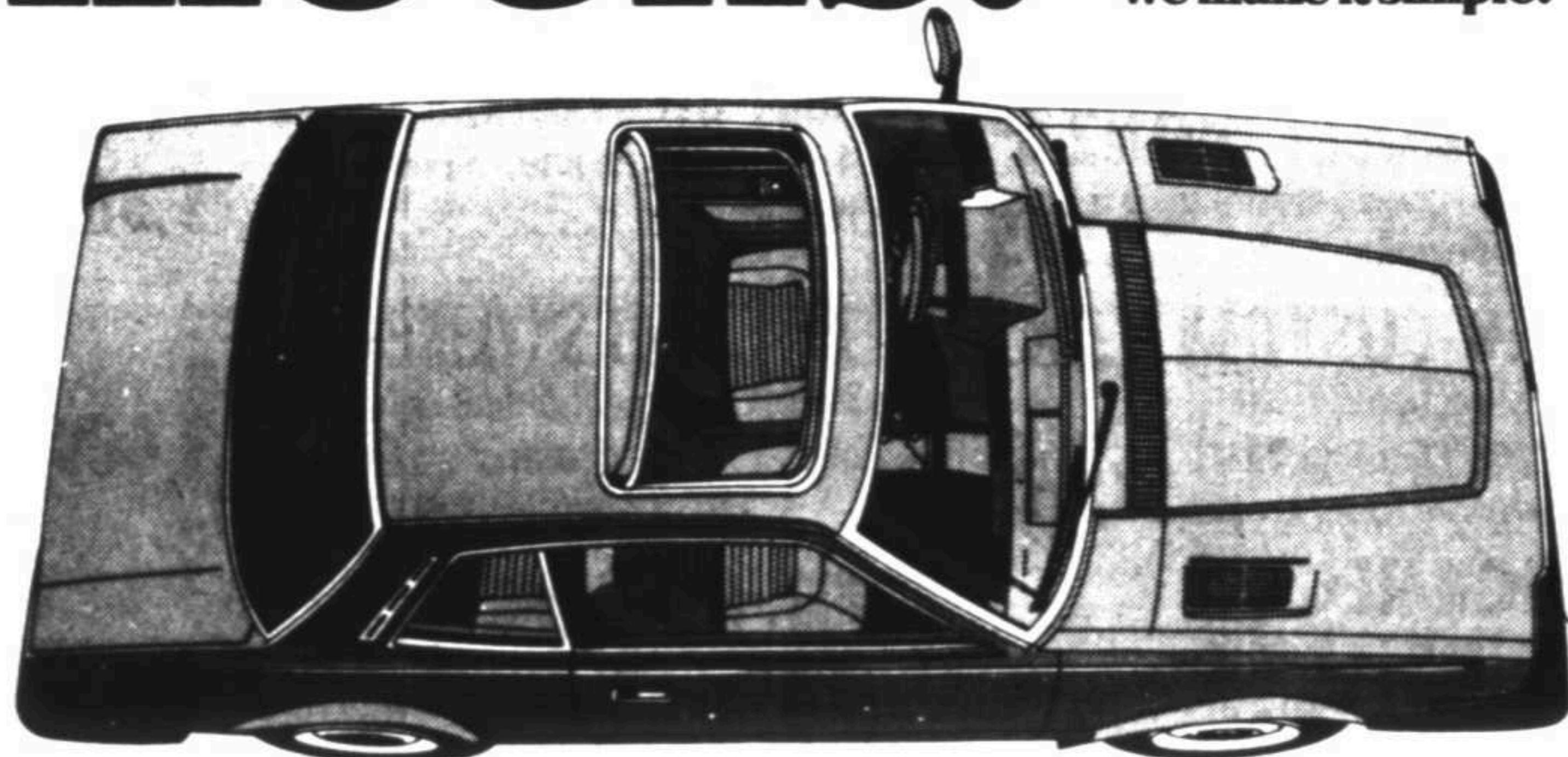
