Chamber Announces Rules For Exhibits in Fair Here

Planning for exhibits in the 1961 Mitchell County Fair, Oct. 5, 6 and 7, is now in full swing by Colorado City Chamber of Commerce. Entry details and complete rules of entry are available at the Chamber office.

Divisions of exhibits are women's, youth arts and crafts and agricultural divisions. There are no extra fees.

Separate competition in the Youth division includes linens, clothing, crafts, bread, cakes, canned fruits and vegetables, pickles and preserves and jellies.

Women will compete for ribbons for canned fruits and vegetables, pickles, preserves and jellies and cakes and bread in foods competition.

In needlework competition, the women will tie for ribbons in embroidery, cut work, applique, infants and toddlers, quilts, spreads, comforts and rugs, crochet, knitting, tatting, weaving and holiday parade.

Arts and crafts divisions include oil painting, watercolor, paintings, handcraft and dry media.

Agricultural exhibits will include these classes of entries—cotton, grains and seeds, forage crops, sorghum heads and ear corn, vegetables and fruits and nuts.

Entries will be displayed in both Civic House and the National Guard Armory. All agricultural exhibits will be housed in the Armory. Others will be grouped together in one of the 2 exhibit places.

All agricultural exhibits must be delivered to the Armory. All entries must be made between 8 a. m. and 1 p. m. Thursday, Oct. 5. Entries will be accepted at this time only.

General entry rules include: All entries are subject to rules and regulations of each individual division.

Right to accept or reject any entry is reserved by each division chairman.

Any exhibitor may enter only 1 article under any 1 premium class.

All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor and must have been made within the past 3 years — unless specified.

No article may compete for more than 1 ribbon.

Judges may not enter exhibits in events they are to judge.

Potent Defense Rips Monahans

MONAHANS—Colorado City's Wolves went down to defeat for the first time in 1961 here Friday night, but the Coach Sam Christy's Wolves had no need for apologies.

They played their greatest game of the young season—in losing a 20-7 decision to the state's fifth-ranked Class AAA squad, Monahans' Lobos.

The Lobos burst the Wolves' gleaming unbeaten, untied and unscored upon bubble, but found their bubble cloudy after the underdog Wolves played them to a virtual draw in every phase of the game except that all important score board reading.

Two breaks in the second half, that's all—just 2 breaks, was all the Wolves needed to upset the highly touted Lobos. The Wolves did get 1 — and failed to cash in on it.

The game started out just like the experts had predicted it would go. All signs pointed to a Monahans rout.

But the experts forget the defensive talents of tackle Jerry Whitaker, guard Darrell Davis, end Stevie Hillhouse, quarterback Danny Latimer and wingback Jimmy (Chicken) Womack.

They carried a bruising attack to the Lobos all night and kept the Wolves in the game all the way.

Whitaker, limping and tired beyond degree, matched any lineman Monahans had to offer; Davis got "the block-of-a-lifetime" on a punt return; Latimer 3 times was the only defender between a Lobo runner and the goal and 3 times he made the tackle; Hillhouse kept right on picking off the opposition's passes; and Womack played his usual "mid-gear dynamite" defense and scored the Wolves' only touchdown.

The Lobos bottled up Ken (Lightning) Northcutt all night, but Charlie Houston took up the slack with 37 yards in 11 carries. Northcutt gained 30 yards in 15 carries. Latimer's running came out too — for 27 yards in 13 attempts and that would have been better if he hadn't gotten caught behind the line a couple of times on passing attempts.

TO STATE COMMISSION

County Submits Game Proposals

Proposals for hunting and fishing seasons, bag limits and methods of taking for Mitchell County were offered to the State Game and Fish Commission here Thursday night by county landowners and sportsmen.

The proposals will go to the Commission for final approval on Friday, Oct. 6. The action is a part of the Regulatory Authority of the Commission which the County was placed under by legislative action this summer — landowners and sportsmen had requested the county being placed under the authority.

County landowners and sportsmen offered the following proposals to the Commission:

A deer season of 45 days with a bag limit of 1 buck. This would include spike bucks with hard antlers protruding the skin. In this proposal it was included to make the use of a 22 caliber rifle with rim fire ammunition illegal.

Turkey season of 45 days with a limit of 1 gobbler. Quail season from Nov. 24 to Jan. 20, which is 10 additional days over last year's season, and a bag limit of 15 per day including bob white and blue.

Cotton Producers Acquire Local Gin

Farmers' Gin & Supply, Inc., a cotton gin owned by Mitchell County landowners cotton producers, went into operation this week.

The gin, the newest name in Colorado City's and Mitchell County's agricultural industry, set a "speed" record as far as formation is concerned in its location at 343 Bridge St. site of the former Farmers' Gin.

The wheels began rolling on the project by county producers Aug. 19. One month later, Tuesday, the ground had been cleared and all the steel and equipment—state and even gained its first few bales of cotton.

Bob Golden, with 30 years in the cotton business, is president of the new gin. Other officers are Fay Webb, vice president and equipment manager; and Ed Webb, secretary.

The gin has undergone a complete overhaul and all the machinery and equipment is in top condition. A stock and bond structure will be installed and the gin will be in operation by the end of the year.

"The Household of God" was the title of a talk given by Mrs. Jim Johnson with comments that all men seek to find their spiritual need in one way or another.

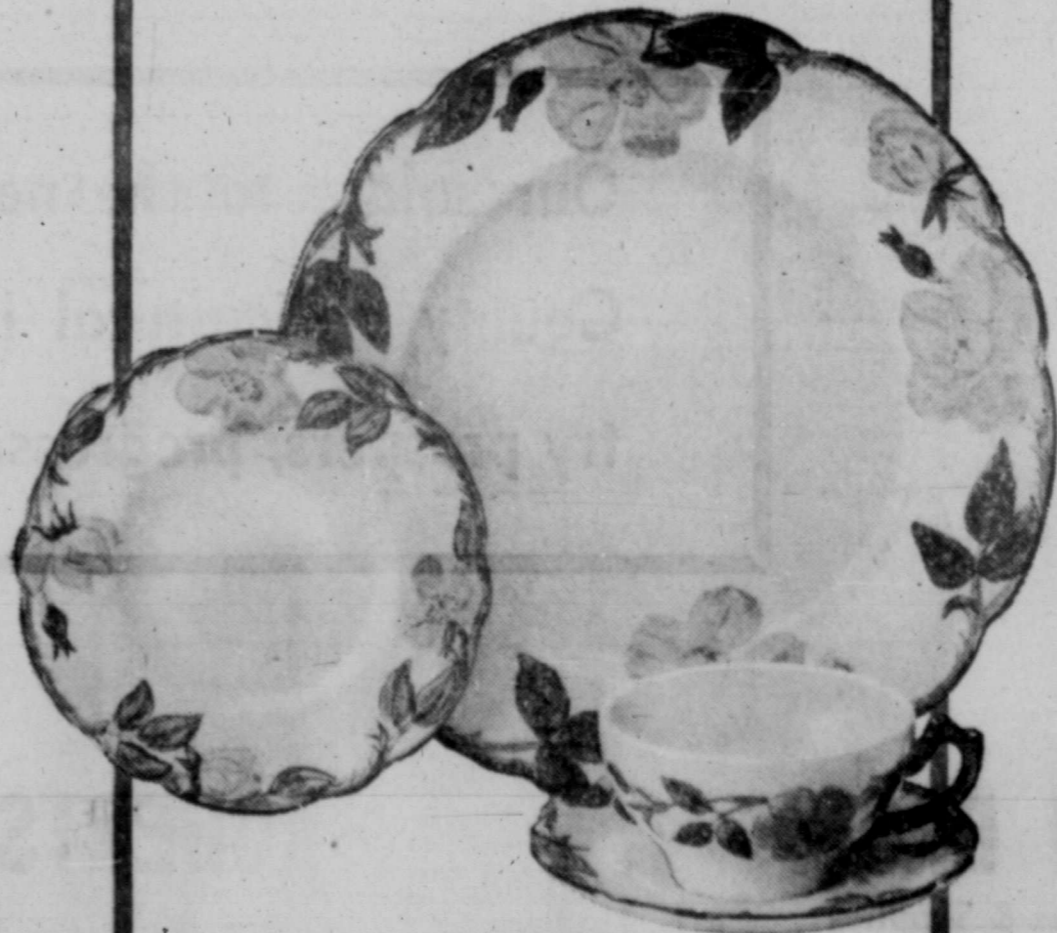
