Company To Survey Area

Kemlox, a corporation chartered in the state of Texas, is interested in starting a small manufacturing plant in Rockport, according to the president of Kemlox, Sandy Ring.

"Because of our perhaps novel employment practices," Ring said, "I thought Rockport would be a natural for this kind of operation."

The corporation hires retired or semi-retired skilled machinists who would like to work a minimum of 20 hours a week. According to Ring, these persons may later be used to train and supervise younger persons.

The company makes fixtures and small lot precision machine parts and employees would need to be experienced as first class machinists and tool makers and have experience with small machine lathes and milling machines.

New Record Set By Tax Officers

For most people, paying taxes is like going to see the dentist twice a year. You don't like to do it, but it's necessary.

However, according to the record at the Aransas County tax office, local and area residents either have good teeth or don't want to take a chance on pain in the middle of the night, because according to Allena Jones, Tax Assessor-Collector, over 70 percent of the taxes billed Oct. 1, have already been paid.

"This means," said Mrs. Jones, "that the money is already in the bank and drawing interest."

"Most of all," she continued, "I want to applaud my staff for the great job they have done in reaching this record high."

Though the collection is a record high according to Mrs. Jones, another amazing thing to be considered is that most of the office staff is relatively new to the job.

"We have six new people out of a staff of eleven in our office," Mrs. Jones noted.

Newcomers and their titles include Kathryn McLester, C.T.A., in charge of the Central Appraisal Office; Terry Green, Chief Deputy and Notary Public; and Dorothy Stone, Property Transfer Clerk.

Also Diane Van Pelt, Auto Title Clerk and Notary Public; Kerry Pyle, Auto Title Clerk and Notary Public; and Cheryl Thomas, File Clerk.

Other members of the staff include Ruth Dietrich, Bookkeeper; Harriette Tanner, Delinquent Taxes and Tax Certificate Clerk; and Andrea Martinez, Chief Auto Title Clerk and Notary Public.

Jack Staples measures for the Central Appraisal Office to round out the staff.

Mrs. Jones took office last Jan. 1 as the Tax Assessor-Collector, but had worked at the office since 1962.

"Many people do not realize how many things we are responsible for," Mrs. Jones said.

According to office records an average of 170 property transfers per month must be handled. This involves changing all records in the office to reflect new owners and current mailing addresses.

An average of 60 automobile title transactions per week are processed through the Tax Office, with automobile sales

tax collected per month averaging \$14,000.

"We collect an average of \$3,000 per month on auto registrations, except during the months of February and March, which are in excess of \$50,000 each month," said Mrs. Jones.

Tax Certificates are issued as certification that all taxes on the property in question are

paid. An average of 95 to 100 tax certificates are written each month.

The delinquent tax collections vary from \$800.00 to \$12,000.00 monthly. Beer and wine licenses are also processed through the County Tax Office, the amount of dollars collected varies monthly.

"Our greatest problem in the

Tax Office this time of year," Mrs. Jones noted, "is out-of-state vehicles. The State of Texas sets the laws regarding titling and registration of these vehicles; our office must abide by those laws.

"The requirements for out-of-state vehicles are stiff. They must be inspected by a peace

C of C Project Underway

Expansion on the Rockport Chamber of Commerce building got underway last Thursday, according to Wes Muecke, chairman of the building committee.

"We need the space for storage and working room,"

Muecke said, "in order that we may better serve the citizens and visitors to the community."

The project was proposed last April and Muecke was, at that time, also in charge of the fund-raising drive. "The money for the addition came from

Chamber members and outside donations," he continued.

Approximately \$5,000 will be spent on the project and the work is being done by sub-contractors.

The addition will measure 20 by 26 feet and is being constructed of concrete blocks.

Directors Eye Taxing Powers

Jack McDavid, re-elected president of Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District board of directors at a meeting Nov. 14 in the county courthouse. Other officers named were Cam Leonard, vice-president, and David H. Crooks, secretary-treasurer.

Appointed by the board were Reese Rozzell, business manager and legal advisor; the firm of Porter and Frasier, auditors; Bob Mosier, financial supervisor; and Carol Jahnke, recording secretary.

Three possible ways to provide funds to build a regional sanitary sewer system were discussed in detail by the board on the basis of an outline provided by the Dallas law firm of

Dumas, Huguenin, Boothman and Morrow, the firm involved in creating the present Conservation and Reclamation District.

The attorneys suggested several plans: —Amending the act of the state legislature creating the present District, so as to provide financing authority.

—Converting the District into a Water Control and Improvement District operating under provisions of Chapter 51 of the Texas Water Code.

—Converting the District into a Municipal Utility District operating under Chapter 54 of the Texas Water Code.

It was the consensus of the Board's directors that the first method-obtaining passage of

legislation amending the original act creating the District—would be slow and by no means certain as to outcome. Also, considerable time would elapse before a decision could be obtained from the legislature.

The second possibility—conversion to a Water Control and Improvement District—would involve a petition declaring such a change would best serve the interests of the District and would benefit property included in the District. A public hearing would be held. If the results were favorable to the change, an order would be issued declaring the District converted and vested with powers specified in Chapter 51 of the Texas Water Code.

Citizens Project Underway

A relatively new program for the older citizen is underway in Aransas County and Mrs. D'Lee Morris wants local and area residents to know about it.

"Our program," Mrs. Morris said, "is a good one but it does have some restrictions the people need to know about before they come to see me."

"We are here to help the older person on a limited income," Mrs. Morris said. "What we do is give a person

part-time work in a governmental office in Aransas County."

To qualify for the project, Mrs. Morris said that the person must be 60 or older, whose only income is a Social Security check or a supplemental check from the Social Security department.

The second qualification is that the person be in good

physical health and the project will pay for a physical examination, which must be taken.

"If accepted for work," Mrs. Morris noted, "the person will be allowed to work for six months at minimum wage."

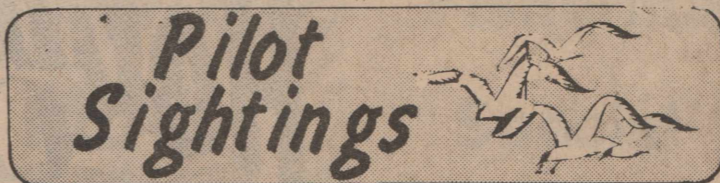
The jobs will entail approximately 20 hours a week.

"It is really important that prospective applicants understand that the program is for older people in a low income bracket," Mrs. Morris emphasized.

Mrs. Morris is at the Aransas County courthouse every Wednesday, starting about 10:00 a.m., to take applications.

Officially called the Department of Planning and Urban Development Work Experience Program, the project is funded by the Department of Labor.

"We are here to provide assistance to the older residents in this area," Mrs. Morris noted. She went on to say that prospective applicants should also keep in mind that in addition to age, income and health requirements, the program was for residents and not transients to the area.

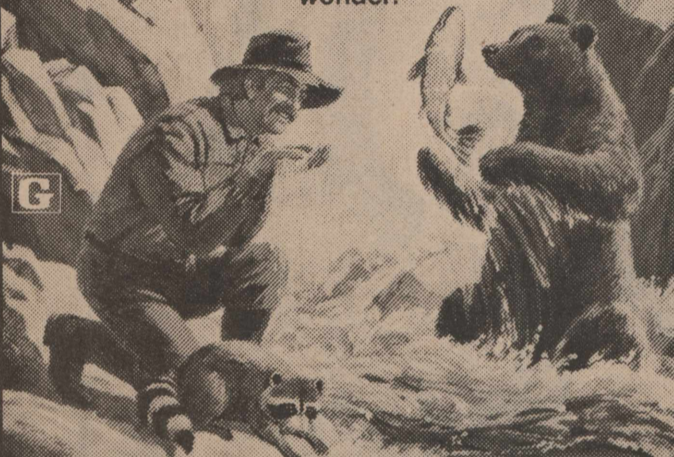

officer, for verification of the identification number, and a form completed by the peace officer.

trailer or truck, it must be weighed at a public weighing scale, and the weight certificate brought in. In addition, a sales tax of four percent of the selling

price; or a new resident tax of \$15.00 must be collected on each vehicle.

"If the proper papers are not presented, we have to reject the transaction at our counter until the proper forms are brought in. From here, our title work goes to Corpus Christi, to the District Office, for inspection. If anything is incorrect in the title application, it is returned to Aransas County for correction before it can be sent to Austin to be processed."

In addition to actually collecting the taxes and fees, all collections must be reported monthly to the State of Texas.

The Central Appraisal Office is busy year round keeping up with the building of new homes and businesses and new subdivisions that are platted.

Mrs. McLester, who is in charge of this office, prepares a card on each parcel of property for both the county and the Aransas County Independent School District tax offices.

Each new home or business must be measured and worked from a schedule to arrive at a fair market value for tax purposes.

Mrs. Jones would also like to remind the taxpayers to come into the office anytime between now and April 30 to sign their homesteads and over 65 exemptions and disable veteran exemptions.

Before issuing any tax-supported obligations to provide sanitary sewers, a second public hearing would be scheduled.

An alternate plan for financing the system by a water Control and Improvement District would include an ad valorem tax applied to the entire District or on a selective basis depending on benefits resulting from the sewage system.

The third possibility—conversion of the present district into a Municipal Utility District operating under provisions of Chapter 54 of the Texas Water Code—also would be initiated by resolution declaring that the best interests of the District would be served by this conversion. The resolution would be directed to the Texas Water Commission, requesting that a public hearing be held.

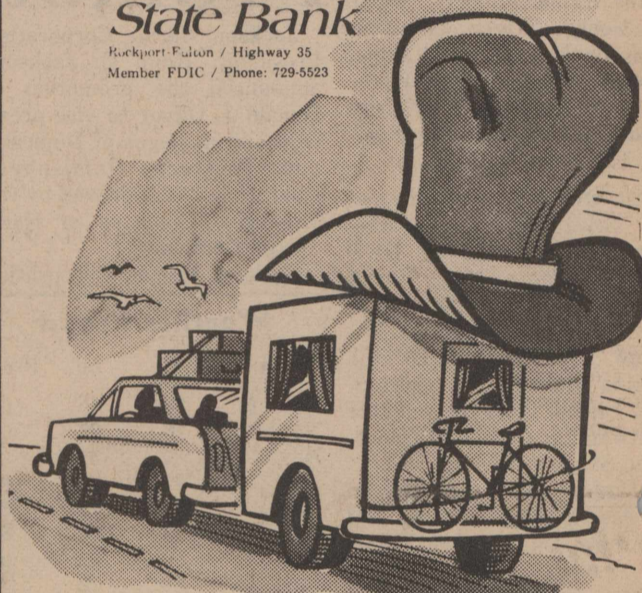

Ferry Dedicated At Port Aransas

CORPUS CHRISTI — An addition to the Port Aransas Ferry System was dedicated Nov. 18 as Texas' First Lady deposed the deck of the new vehicular passenger vessel bearing her name, the "Janey Briscoe," with water from the home port. In the tradition of ancient mariners, this practice serves to insure that the vessel will be safe and will always return to the home port.

The addition of this, the sixth vessel of the fleet, will reduce problems of getting to and from the mainland from Port Aransas. The new ferryboat had been solicited by residents and visitors to the area and had received support of local legislators.

New ferry landings, one on each side of the channel, were completed early this year and immediately utilized in the ferry system operation. It is estimated that 1.4 million vehicles will cross the channel during 1977.

Joining in the late afternoon ceremonies and in tribute to Mrs. Briscoe were local legislators, county and city officials from the surrounding area, members of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission and many local and area citizens.

The Department of Highways and Public Transportation is responsible for operation of the toll-free Ferry System.

Highway and Public Transportation Commission Chairman Reagan Houston introduced Mrs. Briscoe, citing her sponsorship of the new vessel. He gave special recognition to the Superintendent and crew of the Port Aransas Ferry System.

Noting Marine Superintendent Melvin Littleton's 26 years of service in this position, he added that five of the 33 persons employed in the operations of the ferries have also had 26 years with this operation.

Dedication ceremonies and a reception for Governor and Mrs. Briscoe were held immediately preceding the dedication and were sponsored by the Port Aransas Area Chamber of Commerce.

Program Offered By Local AARP

Program To Feature Older View

AUSTIN — The first major television series ever produced for and about older Americans will be aired over all eight of Texas' public television stations, beginning in mid-November.

The half-hour daily program, called OVER EASY, is designed to provide entertainment and information of special interest to persons 60 years of age and older.

Detailed reports on the series will explore issues of vital concern to senior citizens, such as retirement income, money management, health and medicine, housing, transportation and legal rights of older people.

Host for OVER EASY is veteran television personality Hugh Downs. As a daily feature, he will interview celebrity guests who are themselves senior citizens. "Miss Lillian" Carter, mother of President Carter, Milton Berle, Roy Rogers and Redd Foxx are among those who will appear on the show during the initial telecasts of the 26-week series.

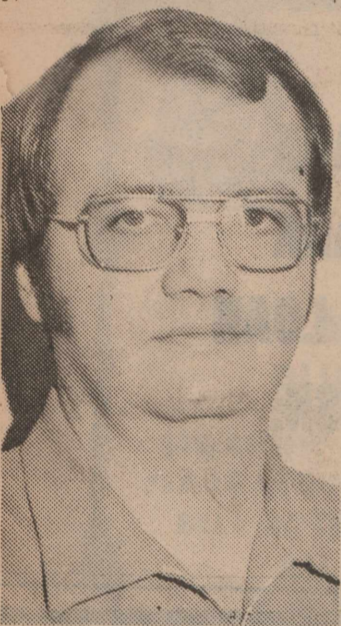
Vignettes of older Americans who are not famous but have found imaginative ways of coping with the aging process will be part of OVER EASY's daily format.

Most of the Texas public TV stations began airing OVER EASY on Nov. 14. Houston's KUHT will start the series on Nov. 25.

The show can be seen at 5:30 p.m. on affiliates of the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) in Austin-San Antonio (KLRN), College Station (KAMU), Corpus Christi (KEDT), Killeen (KNCT), Lubbock (KTXT) and Houston (KUHT).

OVER EASY is being funded with grants of \$2.23 million from HEW's Administration on Aging and \$1.75 million from the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. It is being produced by PBS affiliate KQED in San Francisco.

Pharmacy Topics



Strong neck muscles can protect against injury on the football field, especially at the high school and college level. University of Pittsburgh researchers have designed inexpensive, make-it-yourself neck-building equipment. Plans are available.

New, anti-ulcer drug, cimetidine, has been approved. It acts by reducing acid production in the stomach wall, letting the ulcers heal themselves.

Sleep lab at Montefiore Hospital in New York reports that most insomniacs get more sleep than they THINK they do.

Nerve block therapy is being used to treat the pain of "shingles" (herpes zoster) at the University of Illinois Pain Clinic. Therapy also does away with the blisters caused by the virus, though doctors don't know why.

Artificial blood may soon be available for use in surgery requiring massive transfusions and in treating blood diseases. Research groups report good results with blood substitutes in animals; human tests are expected to begin soon.

Four Hurt In County Last Month

Aransas County's accident rate as compiled by the Texas Highway Patrol during October showed that four people were injured in car accidents in the county. There were no deaths reported.

The total so far in 1977 shows 38 people have been hurt in accidents and the accident total stands at 82 for the first ten months.

In the twelve county district, 11 lives were lost in the month.

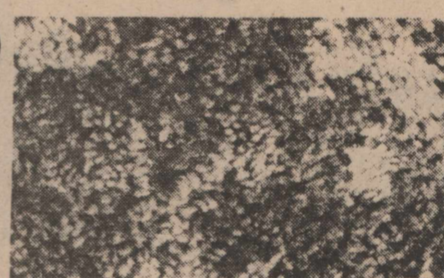

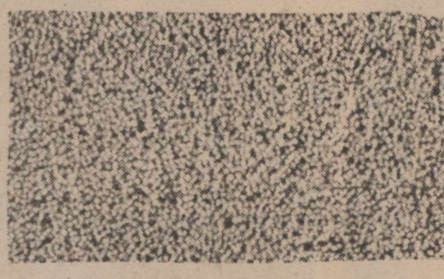

This editorial page is the first of several of those changes you expressed seeing, and we invite you to make further suggestions via our letters to the editor column.

The Scene From Austin And Wharf

IN DISCUSSING HARBOR ISLAND AS A FUTURE haven for super tankers last week, I perhaps deliberately did not mention my main objection to accommodating them. Yes, I wanted an excuse to return to the unpleasant, even sinister subject.

How many people, especially advocates, have considered how long the port will be useful? Consider. In Jimmy Carter's ten months in office, I have agreed with him on one single thing—that the world oil and gas shortage is critical. How critical no one really knows. But it is for real, despite the possibility of new discoveries in new and unsuspected places.

Estimates as to how long it will last vary widely, but the truth is that the supply may well dribble to a nibble by the time a super port is constructed. At most a decade or so, at least insofar as oil demanding super tankers are concerned.

Discoveries on our East Coast, in Mexico, for example, won't demand the use of the big ships. Then, finally, they will always be impractical as general carriers, unless someone can convince me that all major world ports will be dredged to depths of 75 feet.

THE COVER ON A RECENT ISSUE OF ONE OF MY favorite mags, "The New Yorker," caused me to wax a bit nostalgic. A checkered tablecloth with nothing on it but a single spoon and an egg cup on a saucer. Now I don't recall having seen an egg cup since early childhood, and that is a goodly few years ago. Thus I ponder, how many of you know even what an egg cup is, much less have ever seen or used one?

For the uninformed, it is shaped somewhat like a wine glass, but made of china. My wife shares my sentiments, but remembers that an egg for the cup was boiled for three minutes, placed in the cup and the pointy end cut off. One then dipped into the shell itself with a spoon. Liver Pate Removed

All imported liver pate (paste) products bearing foreign establishment numbers "6707-C" and "6707-D" should be considered potentially harmful and should not be eaten warns the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

All ports in Texas and Louisiana have been notified of the ban by the Food Safety and Quality Service (FSQS), the USDA agency in charge of meat and poultry product inspection.

The imported items—all produced by Feyel, a meat and poultry processing plant in Strasbourg, France—are sold under various product names such as "Smoked Goose Pate," "Bloc De Foie Gras with Truffles," "Wild Boar Fillets with Foie Gras and Truffles," and "Liver Pate."

Some 20 companies distribute the products from the

Feyel plant in the U.S. The products are usually concentrated in large consuming centers where they are sold by gourmet and other specialty food shops, delicatessens, department stores and some supermarkets.

from Feyel will be passed for entry until corrective processing procedures have been developed and the plant recertified to assure commercial sterility of product for export to the U.S.

FSQS officials are searching for any of the products which may have slipped by before the ban was started. They are being removed from retail shelves and delicatessens.

It seems to me that the eastern seaboard states deserve this type of dock for these larger tankers.

Then too, the economy of unloading foreign oil closer to the large population districts of the eastern coast seems to make sense to me.

I would appreciate your contacting me when your next meeting is and sending me information relating to what progress is being made to stop this expansion.

In closing, please know again that I strongly object to the improvement to the Corpus Christi Ship Channel at Harbor Island.

Mr. Carter:
I have a few remarks concerning the letter from Mary Calder to the Rockport Pilot last week.

Mrs. Calder quoted the article concerning an interview with me as stating there were "Not many cases of child abuse in Aransas County."

This quote was totally inaccurate, and not what I said at all.

I stated, "From an emergency point of view, Aransas County doesn't have a great deal of child abuse that comes to the public eye."

That is exactly what I meant. I further explained that, from an emergency medical service point of view, most of these cases are not detected, since they go to the doctor or hospital by private car. This is true.

Most parents who abuse their own child panic when they find things have gone too far, and realize they must seek medical aid. They are too embarrassed to call an ambulance and declare an emergency.

I certainly did not attempt to minimize the child abuse problem in Aransas County. The article was based on an interview with me as a paramedic, not as an authority on child abuse.

I am appalled and dismayed at the few cases I do see. Even one abused child is too much.

Much more than a name.

Local Art Group Schedules Trip To New Orleans

"To speak the name of the dead is to make him live again. To speak the name of the dead restores the breath of life to him who has vanished." So wrote the ancient Egyptians who believed they would live forever through their tombs.

For over a year now, Americans have been bringing the spirit of an ancient Pharaoh back to life, if the Egyptian proverb has any validity, and in January members and guests of the Rockport Art Association

will add to the number of people talking about Tutankhamen when they journey to New Orleans to see the exhibit of the treasures of the long dead Egyptian ruler on view there.

Mrs. Syliva Berry is president of the Rockport Art Association and has worked to put together a good package deal for anyone who would like to see the treasures of the king on its United States' tour.

"We will leave Rockport Jan. 9 and return the afternoon of Jan. 11," she said. "We also want to invite anyone interested to come with us. You do not have to be a member of the Art Association to go," she explained.

The cost for the trip will be \$175. This, according to Mrs. Berry, will include the airfare and hotel accommodations for two nights and two breakfasts. The price will also include the ticket for the exhibit.

Reservations need to be with the Art Association by Dec. 15 and anyone interested may contact Estelle Stair.

"We still have room for several people," Mrs. Berry noted, "and we have to have a full number to take advantage of this price."

The exhibit is in this country through the efforts of the National Endowment for the Humanities, the United States government and the Egyptian government. A money value cannot be placed on the price-

less objects of antiquity. A total of 55 treasures are shown in the exhibit including the death mask, alabaster cups, elegant furniture and dazzling jewelry.

The death mask is made of gold, beaten and burnished, inlaid with carnelian, lapis lazuli, colored glass and quartz. It is said to be one of the most remarkable effigies in the history of man.

Several area residents have already seen the show and

recommend it highly. Dr. Marjorie Kirkpatrick, Dr. Kay to her friends, said that mere words just could not describe the beauty to be seen.

"We went to see the exhibit on All Saints' Day, not knowing that it was a holiday, and we had to wait awhile but it was worth it. The death mask is just a beautiful thing."

Dr. Kay further said, "It's just so fascinating to see the great attention to detail and one marvels at the preservation

of the objects." Dana Taggart of Rockport is an artist herself, and she describes the whole thing as "incredibly beautiful."

"I was amazed at the advanced skill of the artisans responsible for the work. I think I was most impressed with a little box made of solid gold and hunting scenes were etched all around the exterior of the box. It really is a wondrous exhibit and I would recommend the trip to anyone,"

she concluded. Little is known about the boy-king who died shortly after a celebration in 1325 B.C. His death was so sudden that he was buried in a tomb originally meant for someone else.

It is thought that his tomb was desecrated twice and resealed. Approximately two hundred years later, a larger tomb for another pharaoh was dug and the debris was spread over King Tutankhamen's burial site and was thus protected until Nov. 26, 1922, when British excavator Howard Carter discovered the tomb and its beautifully preserved objects.

Because the pharaohs were thought to be gods, many superstitions have existed about a "curse" on those who violate the holy ground.

Lord Carnarvon, financial backer of the 1922 expedition that uncovered the tomb, was reportedly bitten by a mosquito when he came back out of the tomb the first time.

He died six weeks later in the middle of the night at the precise moment that the city of Cairo was in a power failure that was unexplained. It was also reported that Lord Carnarvon's dog, back in England, gave a weird howl and died the exact same moment of his master.

Another report noted that the English lord was bitten on the cheek in the exact spot where Tutankhamen's mummy also had a blemish.

At any rate, according to the ancients, Americans who view the relics and speak the name of the dead are keeping his spirit alive and that can be counted as a favor and will nullify any curse still floating around for over three thousand years.

A Corpus Christi man, Bill Niel Black, 35, was found hung in his cell at the Aransas County Jail last Wednesday, Nov. 16. Justice of the Peace, Bill Walston, ruled the death as a suicide.

Sheriff Bob Hewes stated that Black had been arrested and jailed the day before the incident on charges of intoxication and burglary of a vessel.

Black had allegedly boarded a boat in the Fulton Harbor and stolen and then sold items from the boat.

The Corpus Christi address that Black had given officers was a half-way house for alcoholics. Black is survived by his mother in Missouri.

John B. Herrington of 301 North Colorado in Edna, died Nov. 14 in an Edna hospital.

He was born on April 17, 1905 in Prairie Dell, Texas and was district superintendent for Pennzoil.

Survivors include his wife, Mildred Herrington, Edna; a son, Bob Herrington, Houston; a daughter, Mrs. Elaine Brannam, Edna; one sister, Mrs. R.R. Rice, Rockport.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Nov. 16 at the First United Methodist Church in Edna.

Funeral services for Polly A. Iles, 81, a 20-year resident of Texas City, were held Oct. 26 in DeRidder, La., with V.G. Farquer, Mrs. Iles' nephew, officiating.

District Judge Rotary Speaker

A trend away from over-zealous protection of the rights of the accused in criminal cases toward more concern for the plight of the victims of criminals on the part of the courts was foreseen by Judge John H. Wood, federal judge for the Western District of Texas, in a talk before members of the Rotary Club, Nov. 9, at Sandollar Restaurant.

Judge White, a native of Rockport and a member of a local pioneer family, presides over a district with a larger land area than any other federal court district in the United States.

He holds court in seven different cities in the district and also occasionally is assigned to courts in Georgia, Florida, Mississippi and the Panama Canal Zone.

Judge White pointed out that federal courts have authority to set aside any judgement of state courts.

However, he said he favors and exercises as much judicial restraint as is possible in such

instances within limits of the law and under prior decisions of the United States Supreme Court.

He said that the question of school busing currently is perhaps the basis for most of the disagreement between local and federal courts.

Judge White asserted that he restrains himself as much as possible on decisions in this area except in the most flagrant instances.

He pointed out that jail conditions often give rise to charges of violation of human rights, but added that prisoners do give up some of their rights after arrest but not all of them.

Finally, he paid tribute to the quality of most local law enforcement officers, adding that the accused have more safeguards for their rights in the United States than in any other country in the world.

Don't forget that our Game Night each Monday, is now set to start at 7:30 and the doors open at 6:30.

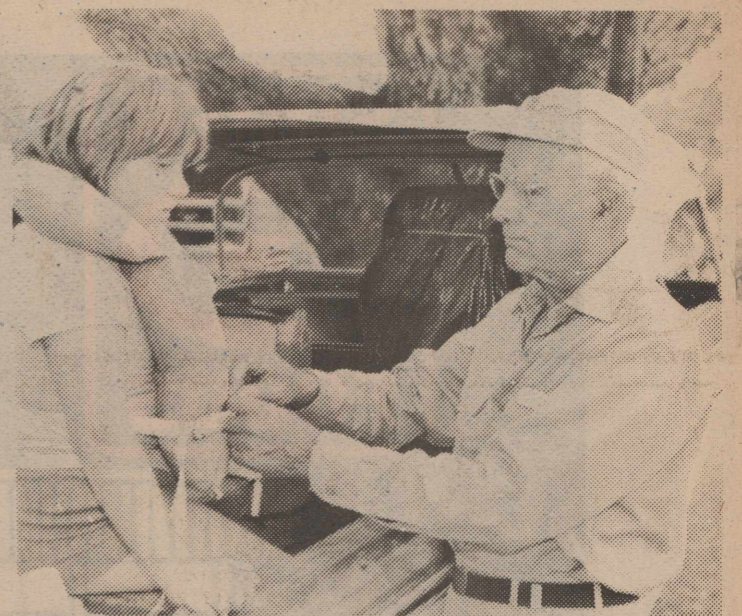

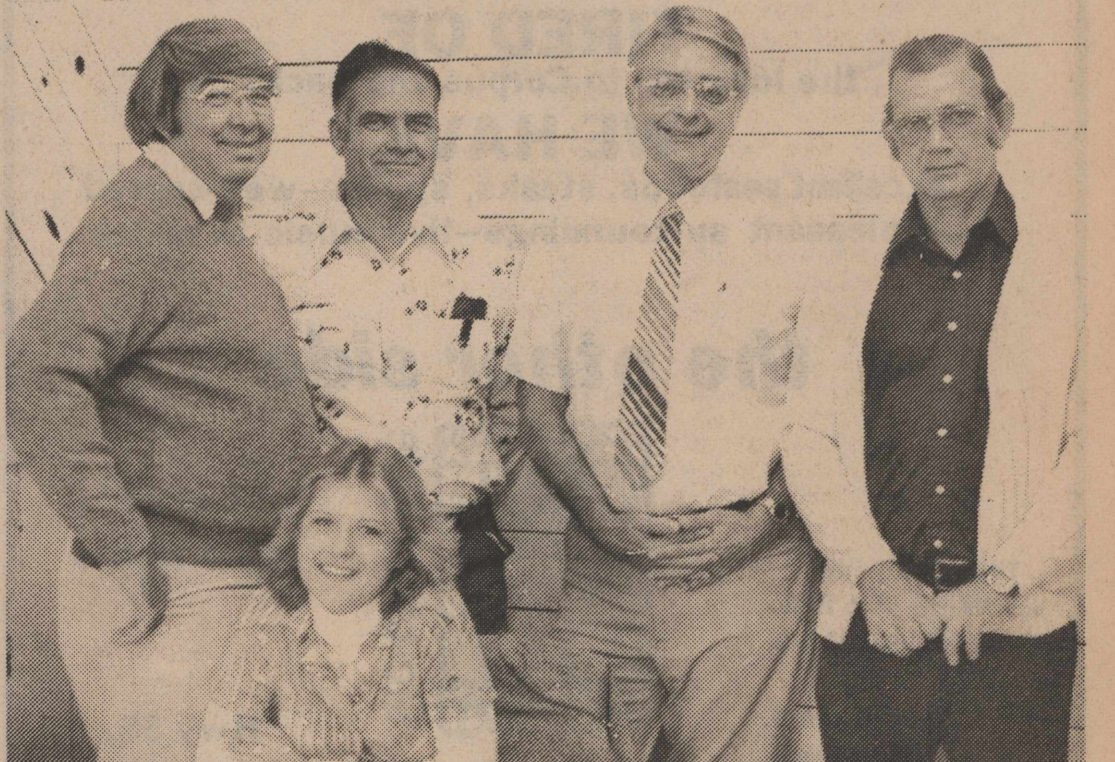

Hunters To Be Cautious

AUSTIN—A shotgun doesn't shoot very far, but at close range it can be one of the most terrible man-killers there is. With dove season in full swing and waterfowl seasons just ahead, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department suggests this is a good time to think about the shotgun and some vital precautions in its use.

The man who hunts with a rifle, especially a deer hunter, usually hunts alone. He would, in fact, rather have a large tract of land for his exclusive use. The dove and duck hunter usually likes to hunt with a party; hunters are often standing shoulder to shoulder.

The blast of a 12-gauge at a few feet, regardless of the size of the shot involved, can be devastating. This alone should be enough reason never to close the action of a shotgun until you are ready to shoot.

Many shotguns explode every year because the careless hunter has fired the gun with some form of obstruction in the barrel. A tiny dab of mud in the muzzle or a cleaning patch left in the bore is enough to destroy

a fine firearm. The muzzle needn't be entirely plugged—just a partial obstruction is enough. Again, it is the person standing near the shooter who will receive the whistling fragments of the gun barrel as it explodes.

Many fine guns are destroyed and people hurt when the hunter is shooting a 12-gauge and has some 16, 20 or 28-gauge shells mixed in with his 12's. One of these smaller shells will not remain in the chamber if it is accidentally loaded into the gun. It will slide on up into the barrel and when the correct ammunition is fired an explosion usually results.

Hand-loaded shells, loaded by a careless person, can be disastrous in any type firearm. If you must load your own shells, do it exactly by the book. Don't experiment.

Probably the most dangerous thing you can do with a shotgun is carry it loaded in an automobile. If the action is closed you never can be sure it is not loaded. When you take any shotgun out of a car and the action is closed, you may shoot

yourself just above the belt buckle, shoot your friend standing on the other side of the car, or shoot a very unsightly hole in the side of your car or pickup.

Bird shooting is a fine sport. But careless handling of any firearm, especially a shotgun, can turn a pleasant afternoon's hunt into a disaster.

A leaflet recently published by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department asks the question, "will you be one of the some 600 people who will die in water-related accidents in Texas each year?" The leaflet is a reprint from the July 1977 issue of Texas Parks and Wildlife magazine.

Don't just assume that one of these water-related accidents will not also happen to you because more than 7,000 Americans die in them each year. You also cannot assume that this won't happen to you just because you never go swimming or go out in a boat. Of the 8,000 people who drowned in the United States during 1975, almost half of them drowned because they fell off a bridge, dock or dry land.

If you are a nonswimmer, and do not wear a life preserver, you take a chance of drowning anytime you go near the water. Movies filmed from a life-guard tower at Orchard Beach in New York of near-drownings and rescues prove, without a doubt, that drowning nonswimmers cannot call for help. They are so busy trying to get air for breathing that their body will not allow them to use it up in calling for help.

It is impossible for drowning nonswimmers to wave their arms to attract attention. This would involve supporting their body with a swimming kick, which they cannot do.

These films also show that the drowning nonswimmers can only struggle for 20 to 60 seconds on the surface before they submerge—for good. That is the title of the new leaflet—20 TO 60 SECONDS. They also show that the average person is usually unable to recognize a drowning nonswimmer, even though he is within a few feet of the victim.

The lifeguards at Orchard Beach also found out that a drowning nonswimmer is unable to grab a ring buoy of floating cushion, even when it is pushed against his face. They found, in fact, that he was totally unable to help himself in any way.

A distressed swimmer (a swimmer who, for some reason, is unable to swim to safety without assistance) is another story entirely. He can call for help, wave his arms to attract attention, and he is able to grab a floating object such as a ring buoy. It is much easier to save a distressed swimmer than a nonswimmer.

This just leads to the logical conclusion that you should learn to swim at the earliest age possible. If you are 50 years old, you should know how to swim before you are 51 years old.

If your child is six months old, he or she should be taught to swim before he is a year old. Instructors have found that it is easy to teach a young child to swim—sometimes much easier than teaching an adult.

In spite of this, more than half the people of Texas cannot swim well enough to save themselves from drowning.

Deer Season Starts Slow For Hunters

ROCKPORT—Reports from the field indicates that hunters in many areas found the hunting rather slow on the opening weekend of deer season.

Wardens and biologists attributed this to dense vegetation and the weather, not to any shortage of deer.

Bill Brummel, a biologist on the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's (TP&WD) Chaparral Game Management Area, said that hunters in the Cotulla area had done "all right" on opening day, but vegetation was dense and limited the

hunters' vision. Even though not as many deer were killed as had been anticipated, the hunters were pleased. The deer that were killed were fat—some very fat. Antlers were as good, or better, than last year.

On the Chaparral Area, the kill was higher on opening day than last year's, and the deer were in excellent condition. Antlers there were better than usual, Brummel said.

Hunters returning from the La Pryor area south of Uvalde said the hunting was slow on the opening weekend.

Louis Sinclair, game warden in Kerrville, said that the opening weekend in that area was very good. More deer were killed on the opening days than were taken at the same time last year. He said this was probably due to the layer of ice that covered the area last year. Sinclair reported better than average antlers and most of the deer were good and fat.

In some parts of the Hill Country, however, the deer were not in very good condition.



Deputies Clear Year Old Heist

The Aransas County Sheriff's office had a busy week last week, including the solution of a burglary that occurred over a year ago.

Sheriff Bob Hewes reported that a burglary that was reported in April of 1976 was cleared by his department last week. On information obtained by a departmental officer, a search warrant was obtained from Justice of the Peace Lawrence Miller for the residence of Gary Don Langston of Rockport.

At Langston's residence were found three wood chandeliers that were taken in a burglary at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. S.G. Walker at Holiday Beach. The Walkers now live in Clute, Texas.

Several other items taken in that haul are still missing according to Sheriff Hewes. Burglary charges were filed against one subject and other charges are pending.

Another burglary was reported to deputies by Sam Canterbury at the Aransas Warehouse in Fulton. Canterbury told officers that someone had evidently climbed the fence to the area and jacked up a trailer and removed six tires and six wheels. Canterbury valued the missing tires and wheels at \$800.

James Frandolig reported to deputies that someone had stolen a butane tank from his property. The tank was valued at \$60 and was stolen sometime between Nov. 3 and Nov. 13.

Texans Pay Double For Natural Gas

AUSTIN — State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that the price of natural gas produced and sold in Texas crept upwards 19 percent during the first half of fiscal 1977.

During that same period (Sept. 1, 1976 - Feb. 28, 1977), Texas-produced natural gas cost Texas purchasers more than twice as much as buyers from out-of-state, Bullock noted.

An analysis compiled for "Fiscal Notes," the monthly financial statement published by the Comptroller's Office, shows that the price for all Texas natural gas averaged 81.1 cents per thousand cubic feet (mcf) for the six-month period.

This is 11.8 cents over the fiscal 1976 average price of 69.3 cents per mcf for Texas natural gas.

The average price of Texas-produced natural gas to in-state buyers during the six-month period was 97.1 cents per mcf. This is 19 percent over the 81.5 cents per mcf average for intrastate sales in Fiscal 1976.

At the same time, out-of-state purchasers of Texas-produced natural gas paid an average of 46.8 cents per mcf during the first six months of fiscal 1977.

Natural gas production for the six-month period totaled 3.75 trillion cubic feet, according to the Comptroller. Slightly more than two-thirds of this gas was sold in-state.

The financial report also shows that state expenditures for the 1977 fiscal year which ended August 31 totaled \$6.6 billion. Revenues for the year totaled \$7.36 billion.

NIT PICKINS...or something

Nothing makes me happier than to run into a man and wife at the supermarket or at church and have him say, "Hello, Uncle John. We are back for the winter." I don't always remember your names or where you came from. On the other hand, I welcome you. Yes, I welcome you, wherever you came from. Rockport and Aransas County is glad you are here. Let's don't beat around the bush—you are good for our economy.

In return, I hope every merchant in Rockport—every citizen, whether in business or not—will meet you with a smile and warm handshake and make you feel at home. As an individual, I am happy to say that I have made some real good friends among our winter visitors. May you continue to spend some time with us.

Now—SOME SUGGESTIONS. If you came pulling a big house trailer, it is possible you have not removed your large rear view mirrors which extend out beyond your fenders. It's against the law to use them in Texas when not towing a trailer. Besides that, it is dangerous.

We want you to see our ducks and birds—we also want you to live. So, as you drive down our bayfront roads, do two things, please. One—don't drive as in a funeral procession—you may get run over by some of our impatient hot-rod drivers. Second—if you do decide to stop and look at the birds (and I hope you do) look out your rear view mirror and be darn sure no one is tailgating you, then signal—step on the brakes a few short taps before pulling off the road. You may be thankful you did for the car that did NOT get mashed from the rear may be yours.

WHAT ABOUT TEXAS ROAD SHOULDERS? In Texas, and on most of our highways, we have good paved shoulders. In this area, some are separated from main lines by good white lines. Now these shoulders are not for regular driving or for passing anyone on the right.

However, they have a use—which we call courtesy lanes. If you are driving along at 55, or slower, and a car approaches you from the rear doing 60 or 65 (which is breaking speed laws—but that is his problem) simply be courteous—pull over onto the passing shoulder and let him go. That's the way we do it in Texas. We don't like road hogs no matter where they come from or what they are pulling.

FISHING
Sorry, I can't promise you a mess of fish every time you go out. I don't know why—all I can say is if you keep your baited hook in the water enough you will catch fish. Just keep on trying. It will pay off.

I am sorry I cannot tell you about any new fishing piers for your use. I have tried, time and again, to sell our political

fathers on the value of building some new piers for you, our winter visitors, as well as our bread and butter. Don't give up. Keep coming and some day you are going to find some real nice new fishing piers. I promise I intend to ride this idea every chance I get.

So I close. We love you!
