DON'T you know that Hitler and his gang of ruffians have been enjoying the strikes that have been in progress in the United States. He's a farmer boy, that is raised on a farm and he sympathizes with the farmers' problems. He knows what Big Bale smoking tobacco is, and is familiar with the one gallus farm boy to the one of more fortunate circumstances who supports a bachelor button on which to hang his gallus'.

Because of Gerald C. Mann the name of Stanton has been stamped on publicity and sent to all parts of West Texas, and to cover the State, its name has been printed in metropolitan newspapers of the State. Other folks may pass up a little town like Stanton but not Texas' Attorney General. Mann figures Marttn county voters are not disfranchised from exercising the power at the polls on June 28th, and he prides that fact sufficiently, that he is favoring Stanton with his personal appearance and solicits the voters to vote for him.

The past week he turned over to newspaper reporters and press associations of the State a photostatic copy of his income tax report for 1939-40, which shows since January, 1, 1939, the entire income of Gerald C. Mann and his household has consisted solely of the salary of Attorney General. Another trick that Gerald C. Mann has turned while in the campaign for the United States Senate I think will meet with hearty approval of the voters and that is he is turning back to the State his salary as Attorney General.

I don't believe I have ever heard of any candidate holding office while running for another turning loose of the salary of the salary of the one he is filling

PIONEER RESIDENT
SUCCUMBED SUNDAY

FAMOUS "WINDY BILL" CHARACTER IN LARRY CHITTENDEN'S FAMOUS CHRISTMAS BALL

Death, Sunday, called W. M. "Bill" Wilkinson, 79, stilling the voice made immortal in Larry Chittenden's poem, "The Cowboys' Christmas Ball."

Mr. Wilkinson, who went down in history as "Windy Bill" from "Little Deadman's Branch" died at his home in Stanton at 10 a. m., Sunday. He had been in ill health for a long time.

Long since his voice had ceased to be "like a bugle upon the mountain's heights," as Chittenden wrote, but until the last his memory of cowpunching experiences in pioneer days remained fresh and vivid.

Last rites were held at 3 p. m., Monday in the First Methodist church with Rev. A. A. Kendall pastor, assisted by the Rev. Paul Jakes, Baptist pastor, in charge. Burial was in Evergreen cemetery.

Born in Tarrant county in 1862, Mr. Wilkinson celebrated his 79th birthday on March 8. He and a sister were orphaned early when their father died in Denton county, and while still young Mr. Wilkinson moved west to get a job punching cattle.

In 1879, he went up the trail with a herd of longhorns to Dodge City, Kansas. Later he brought up a herd from 100 miles south of Fort Worth for W. T. Hutson and W. T. Carpenter, early day ranchmen. The same year he helped control a stampede of wild horses on the site of present-day Amarillo.

A long-time ambition to meet up with the famed Col. Charles Goodnight, founder of an almost legendary cattle dynasty, was realized by Mr. Wilkinson while working with "Capt." W. E. Rainer of Memphis, Tenn., in Stonewall county. He made a trip up to the Clarendon area to see the Colonel.

While more people know him for his part in the Christmas Ball, Mr. Wilkinson also was known as the first white settler of Lubbock, having staked a claim on what later became the townsite section. An adventure he loved to relate was how a herd of 500 antelope drifted along the fence near his claim, and became frightened, many of them running into the fence became hung by the horns affording much good meat for him.

After two years, he sold his claim and moved back to Jones county with the Rainer Land and Cattle Co., with whom he worked for ten years.

On Christmas night in 1885, at the Star Hotel in Anson, he went down into history as "Windy Bill," caller for the cowboys' ball. Larry Chittenden, who had

ence by virtue of his official capacity—that political success, that personal popularity, that official influence should not be capitalized by himself or his household for the purpose of lining the family pocketbook.

"The income tax reports that I have handed the press tonight show that since January 1, 1939, the entire income of the Gerald C. Mann household has consisted of my salary as Attorney General, fixed by law."

Mann reiterated his stand, that next to national defense, protection of the farmer and his

markets is the most important problem facing the nation.

"Industry is protected during peace times and during war," he said. "Capital has its protection, always. But agriculture never has been protected, in peace time or in war time. Now is the time it must start. The American farmer must not be sabotaged in this national emergency."

"When elected to the Senate, I shall endeavor to equalize the freight rate structure of Texas, I shall support rural electrification and soil and water conservation."

Today, Friday Mann will be in Floydada at 9 a. m., Spur at 11:30 where he will ride in the rodeo parade; Stamford at 4:15; Haskell at 5:15, and Abilene at 8 p. m.

Saturday he speaks in Sweetwater at 9 a. m.; Colorado City at 10:15; Big Spring 11:30; STANTON 1:15 p. m.; Midland at 2:15 p. m.; Monahans at 4:00 p. m.; Pecos at 5:00 p. m., and at 8:30 p. m., in Odessa, before the Little International Oil Show in the Odessa auditorium.

The last week of the campaign Mann will spend in Houston, San Antonio, Corpus Christi, Dallas and Fort Worth, closing his campaign Friday, June 27, with a rally at Fair Park Auditorium in Dallas.

with crisp new currency. That would be the most runic course this country could take. That would be direct inflation. The dollar would buy less and less. Prices would spiral upward with ever-gathering momentum. And the result would be a collapse similar to that occurring in Germany after the first world war, when literally billions of marks were needed to buy a loaf of bread.

There are others who still believe the government can follow its old policy of forcing more and more Federal securities on the banks. But this long continued, breeds still another kind of inflation—credit inflation—which in the long run can be disastrous to a country.

What it all comes down to is that part of the defense program which cannot be financed out of current government revenue, must be financed by borrowing directly from the people. That is why the Treasury is issuing special defense bonds now—and why the nation's banks, without profit to themselves, are doing everything in their power to encourage their purchases. We've reached the point where all of us are going to have to finance defense—and no one else can do it for us.

bugle upon the mountain's heights'; His feet were antimated and A MIGHTY MOVIN' SIGHT, when he commenced to holler, 'Neow fellers, stake yer pen! Lock horns ter all them heifers, an' russel 'em like men. Saloot yer lovely critter, neow swing an' let 'em go. Climb the grape vine 'roun' 'em—all hands do-ce-do! You Mavericks line the round-up—juse skip her waterfall."

He and Mrs. Wilkinson were wed at Rainer in Stonewall county in 1891. After 11 years they moved to Yoakum county engaging in the ranching business. In 1906, they moved to Stanton to school their children. He operated a grocery and ranched in Martin county until his health failed.

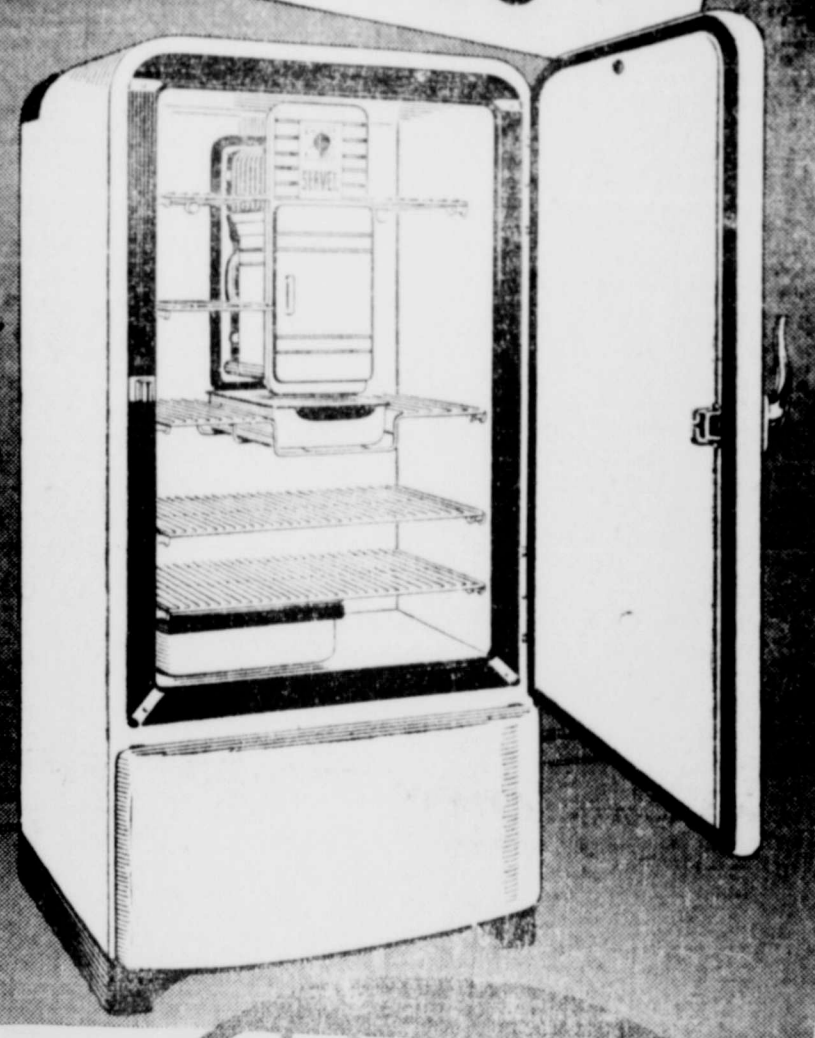

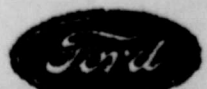

MATTRESS SUPERVISOR IMPROVES HOME WITH MONEY SECURED FROM WORK

Mrs. Otis Davidson of the Stanton mattress center, has used the money which she made from her work as mattress supervisor, to improve her home. She has papered the kitchen and one bedroom. To her kitchen she

has added new curtains, new linoleum, and has remodeled the cabinet. In her bedroom she refinished an old dresser that is 25 years old by first removing the old paint and then enameling it. The old-fashioned mirror was taken off the dresser and a round one placed on the wall above the dresser. A dresser stool was made from a small table with striped broadcloth. An old-fashioned tall iron bed 25 years old, was made to look very modern by turning the foot of the bed for the head and sawing off the posts of the other end which was used as the foot of the bed. Mrs. Davidson has made spring covers for all her beds and one new mattress has been added. New pictures have been added to her bedroom and dining room.

The living room has been brightened up by the new material with which she upholstered a rocker and covered a foot

stool. She has added new shades and cranes for her drapes. The only new piece of furniture which she has added is a radio table.

Porch furniture she bought second-hand has been added.

About three months ago Mrs. Davidson refinished a dining room suite which improved the appearance of her dining room very much.

Her home is an example of a home which has had great improvement with a small amount of money and a great deal of work.

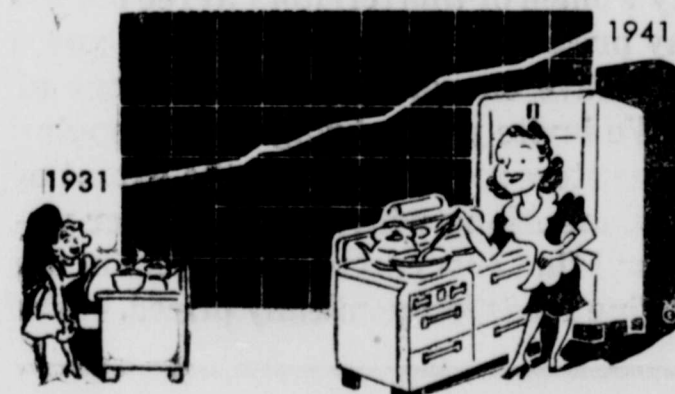
