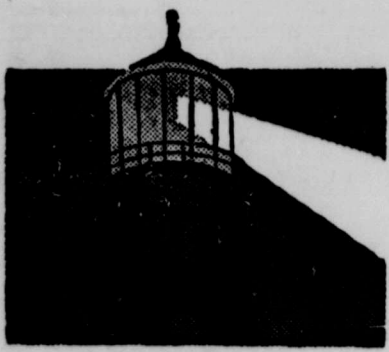

Power Failure Mon. Caused By Gas Valve

Electricity was off in Loraine for a time late Monday afternoon. The failure was caused by a gas valve at the power plant on Lake Colorado City.

The following statement was made by Beaman Fisher, President, Texas Electric Service Company: "The power supply to a number of West Texas cities and towns served by the Texas Electric Service Company System was interrupted from 20 minutes to 1 hour at 4:44 p.m. Monday due to the failure of a valve on a big gas pipe line supplying fuel from West Texas gas field to the Morgan Creek Power Plant of the Company at Colorado City. The trouble was quickly determined and corrected, but failure of the plant at Colorado City caused the Company plant at Monahans to 'kick off the line'."

Both of these plants were carrying heavy loads because of high temperatures when the gas supply failed, therefore it took from 20 minutes to 1 hour before engineers at the two plants could synchronize the several generating units and get the power system back to normal operation. Seven Cars Maize Bought To Date

Woodrow Pratt of the Coon and Pratt grain elevator, reported Wednesday morning that the elevator had purchased seven carloads of maize to date with quite a lot more to come.

Most of the maize purchased, Pratt said, came from irrigated fields where yields averaging from 1500 to 3500 pound per acre was reported. Dry land maize failed to produce much grain because of the dry hot weather that has prevailed this summer.

Litterbugs Are Tax Liability

College Station, Aug. 7—Litter thrown on streets and highways by pedestrians and motorists is more than paper, trash, cans and bottles. It is taxpayer's money, says Reagan Brown, sociologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Where does the taxpayer come in? He has to foot the bill for the clean up job, explains Brown.

In addition, when trash is allowed to collect along streets and highways, gutters and sewers may be clogged and during heavy rains flooding may occur. The damage resulting from the overflow often means further expense to the city, county and state governments and it can also be expensive to property owners, says Brown.

Texas is being judged every day in competition with other states for industrial location sites and the record can be improved, says the specialist. In some states, the state government is being asked to pass laws to prevent the marketing of any product in disposable containers or cartons and to increase the fines for 'litterbugs.'

Brown believes Texans can correct the situation without legislation. It will take teamwork, he says, and a real desire on the part of all citizens to make their state the cleanest and most beautiful in the nation.

A litterbug in every car, pickup and truck is suggested as a starting point. And finally, says Brown it may take some crusading by neighborhood leaders and others to make the public more conscious of the fact that it is their money they are wasting when they scatter litter everywhere they go.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law." Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

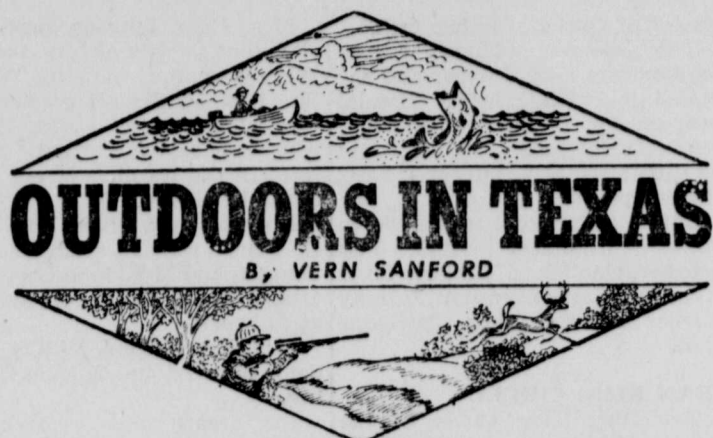

What is the best size hook to use?

This question invariably comes up wherever fishermen gather.

Actually, there is a wide tolerance in the sizes of hooks. The average fisherman knows them best by sight . . . but rarely by numbers.

Sizes are rather easy to remember, however. Generally the big hooks are given the low numbers and the higher the number the smaller the hook.

For instance the No. 1 hook is the largest. Generally it is of the O'Shaughnessy style. It has enough strength built into it to handle a 100-pound fish.

Numbering system set forth above, however, does not apply to all hooks since hooks are made by different manufacturers.

For instance some catalogs list trotline hooks as 6/0 for the largest size and grade them down to 2/0 and 1.

Many salt water treble hooks also are numbered down. In other words, the largest size may be the 8/0 and the smaller hook the 2/0.

Actually, metal hook-making is a comparatively new industry.

Although most of the present hook manufacturers are located in England, the first metal hooks were made in China. Then the idea was taken to Germany where machines were developed for manufacturing hooks. From there the industry spread to France and England. A tremendous output of hooks now comes from Norway, original home of the famous Mustad hook.

Mustad's hook-making industry came from the decline of the horse. Mustad and Sons made horseshoe nails. They started producing hooks after horseshoe nails were no longer in heavy demand.

Our hooks now are singles, doubles and trebles. They are made of carbon steel with from 0.45 to 0.95 carbon content.

There are many special-purpose hooks.

Most everyone is acquainted with the old trotline hooks.

Perhaps the most popular hook however, is the plain fishing hook, the one used by pole fishermen who bait up with worm or minnows. Usually such hooks are purchased from open stocks with the choice determined by the individual fisherman's desires.

One man may like the Irish Limerick hook, with the turned down eye. The next may want a long-shanked Carlisle hook, especially for perch fishing. Others lean toward the gripper-type hook that has two or more barbs on its shank.

For everyday fishing the no. 6 to no. 10 sizes seem to serve best. They are good sized hooks for use with either worms or minnows in fresh waters.

Coastal fishermen will find sizes 6 and 8 good for trout. But heavier hooks will be required for reds and larger fish. Again, it is best to pick your hooks by inspection.

tion because of the variable sizes.

Fly hooks usually run in sizes between 4 and 14. Plain small perch hooks range between 10 and 16. Long shanked, snelled hooks sizes 12 to 14 are excellent for perch.

Treble and double hooks for bait casting plugs customarily run in sizes 6 to 10, depending on the manufacturer and the market.

There are many trick-type hooks. Some are spring-type. They are supposed to snap tight for a stronger grip on the fish. But more fishermen than fish are caught on these hooks.

Every fisherman should take good care of his hooks. It is best to keep a small whetstone handy to hone the point after each hook is used. They become dulled by long use. Since hooks are cheap, the wise thing to do is throw the old hooks away and buy some new ones.

Incidentally, some of the top fishermen I know always sharpen their hooks just before using—even hooks on brand new artificial lures.

Frequently a hook will straighten out when it catches on an obstruction, or even from the pull of a heavy fish. In such cases it is best to discard the hook.

Plug fishermen find this happens quite frequently. Especially when they pull their plugs over rocks or logs. Such hooks should be straightened or replaced.

Terminal equipment is the cheapest part of fishing. Certainly it should be kept in the best possible condition.

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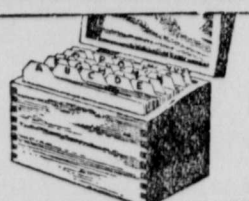

Taken From The Files Of The News Of August 11, 1949

Supt. Gilbert Parish had announced that the Loraine schools would open the new term on September 5. There were two vacancies on the faculty.

CONTROL RATS AND MICE WITH ANTICOAGULANTS

College Station, Aug. 10-If rats and mice are a nuisance on your farm and are robbing you of those precious dollars that you have invested in grain and other stored materials, then these pests should be controlled as soon as possible.

Anticoagulants have proved quite effective as a method of control, says J. E. Poore, assistant district agent for predator and rodent control, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Anticoagulants prevent blood from clotting and cause death from internal hemorrhages. Poore points out. Rats and mice must eat some of the bait every day for five or six or every other day for 10 days or more before the hemorrhages are fatal.

Apparently no pain or warning of danger is connected with this action, says Poore, and the pests will return again and again to feed if the bait is attractive.

Anticoagulants are available in concentrate or ready-to-use form. The concentrate is usually blended with a dry cereal bait, a common formula being one part concentrate to 19 parts bait. Cornmeal or rolled oats serve well as bait but are often not well accepted by the rodents, says the agent.

To make the formula more attractive, use a cup of salad oil and a cup of sugar along with eight cups of rolled oats and 12 cups of yellow cornmeal. These ingredients should be well mixed along with one cup of anticoagulant, making about six pounds of bait.

Large quantities of ready-mixed bait are quite inexpensive and can be purchased through commercial concerns.

Poore suggests that a half pound of bait be used at each station. Baits should be placed where

the rats and mice are known to feed, the entire premises being baited at the same time. Baits may be placed in shallow dishes or in small paper bags slit open at the side. Bags should be fastened to the floor or wall to prevent rats from dragging them away.

When treating for mice, smaller amounts of bait should be used and should be placed at closer intervals. This is because mice live in small areas and travel about very little, explains Poore.

Although it is difficult to determine the amount of bait to put out about five pounds is average for a Texas farm.

In addition to the dry form, a soluble material is available for use in a water bait, says Poore. One packet is sufficient for one quart of water which may be exposed in baby-chick water fountains or similar containers. In dry surroundings this is particularly effective.

Adding a tablespoon of sugar to each quart of liquid bait makes it much more attractive, provided ants aren't a problem.

Placing the liquid and dry baits together at a station is more effective for controlling rats, Poore points out. They will consume more of the bait and quicker kills will result, especially in the summer.

Poore warns that any animal or human can be harmed by anticoagulant bait if enough is eaten every day or so for several days. An injection of Vitamin K will serve as an effective antidote. Baits should be placed where only rats and mice can feed on them.

"Anticoagulants are not poisons but rather chemicals and are the safest materials for rat and mouse control that have yet been developed," says Poore.

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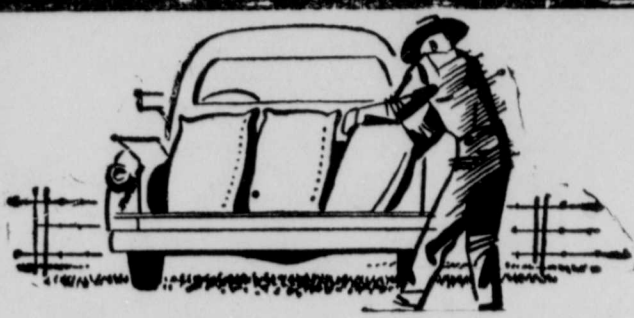
