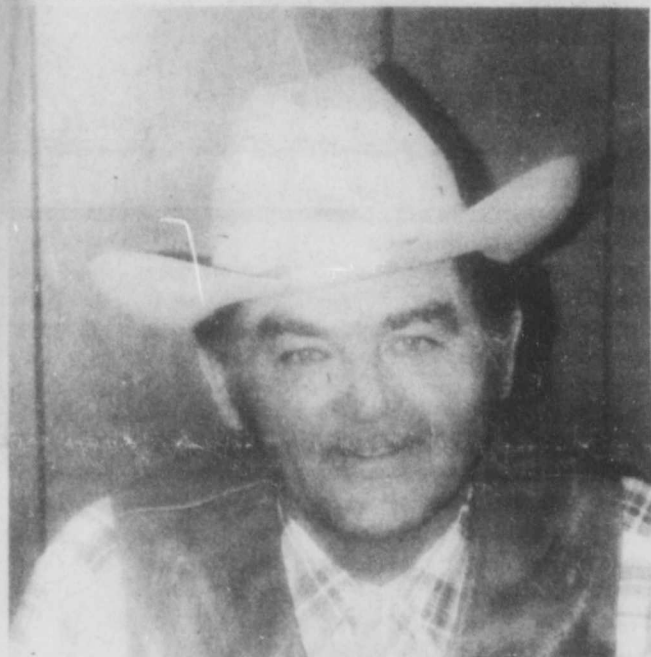
"One of the heroes in my life has always been Leon Yeager, and I have tried to pattern my law enforcement efforts after his."

...Speak Up

Van Mills, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, has been informed that the public has until January 29 to comment on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposed soil and water conservation program. The original deadline of January 15 was extended to January 29 in order to give more people a chance to respond.

The Secretary's preferred program features expanded roles for local and state governments and the targeting of USDA dollars and personnel to conserving critical resource problem areas.

People who are interested in the program, or potentially affected by it, are urged to comment. Responses will be accepted through January 29, and can be mailed to State Conservationist, Soil Conser-

vation Service, P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76503.

Mills said the program is the Secretary's proposed response to the RCA Act of 1977. It is contained in the RCA Program report and a summary leaflet with a response form that can be reviewed at the local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

The basis for the program is an appraisal of the condition, trends and natural resource problems of the nation. Published in two reports, the appraisal is also available for public reference in the two USDA offices.

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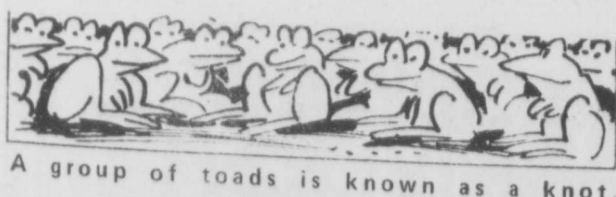

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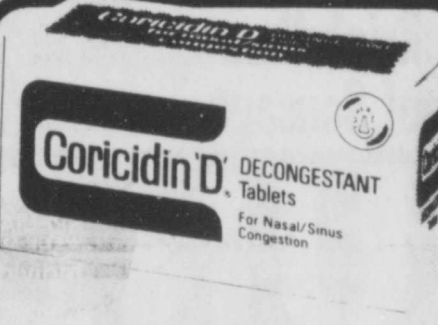


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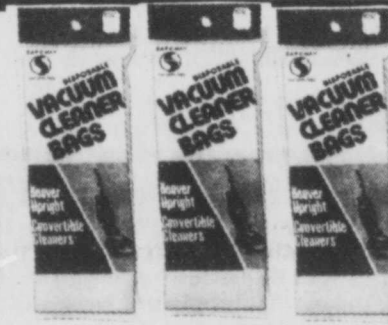

Conservation Tillage Controls Erosion Of Nations Cropland This Year

Conservation tillage appears to be the most cost effective method of controlling erosion of the nation's cropland, Norm Berg, Chief of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, said in an editorial in the January issue of "Soil and Water Conservation News."

Conservation tillage is a form of noninversion tillage that retains protective amounts of residue on the surface throughout the year. These include no-tillage, strip tillage, stubble mulching, and other types of noninversion tillage.

"Conservation tillage alone is not the total solution to erosion problems, but leaving adequate amounts of crop residue on the surface year round can reduce sheet and rill erosion by

as much as 90 percent," Berg said. Under some conditions, conservation tillage must be applied as part of a complete conservation system. It must complement a system of terraces, grass waterways, diversion, and other needed practices in some areas.

The Chief speculated that some form of conservation tillage can be applied to every acre of cropland in the United States. He said there is a definite trend away

from using the moldboard low, and U.S. farmers seem to be increasingly aware of the benefits of reduced tillage systems. Conservation tillage has grown from 26.7 million acres in 1972 to an estimated 98.8 million acres in 1981. The SCS has spearheaded technical assistance in many areas to get this practice started.

Berg also said more research is needed to learn how to use conservation tillage under all

soil and climatic conditions.

A conservation crop rotation is needed in order to carry out a conservation tillage system. A cropping system with frequent high residue producing crops is needed to provide adequate amounts of crop residues to protect the land during critical periods between harvest and planting.

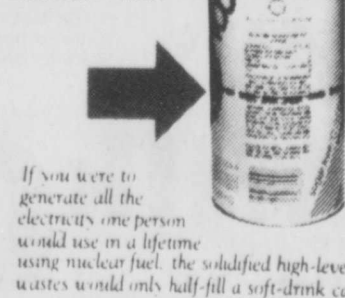
