Survivors include her husband - Robert Lomax and one son - Gene of Ira Texas.

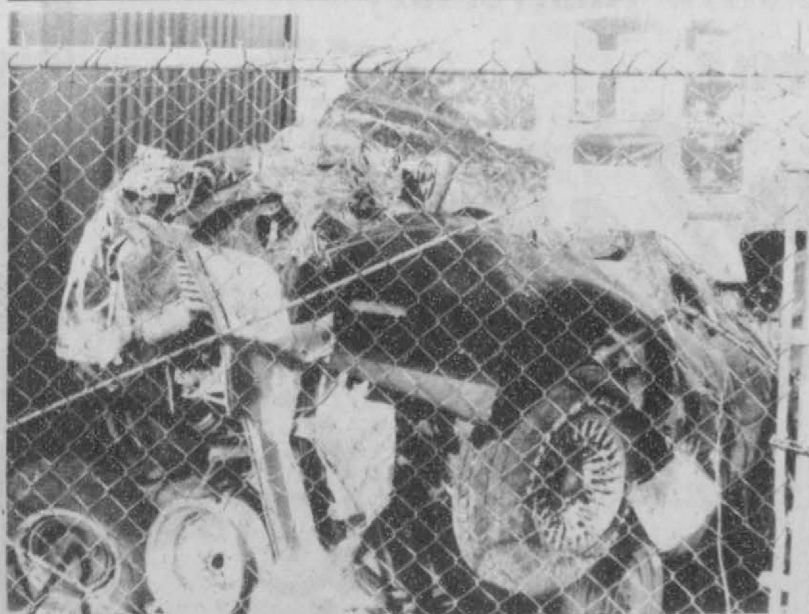

The car became airborne for approximately 50 feet before slamming into the culvert, officers said.

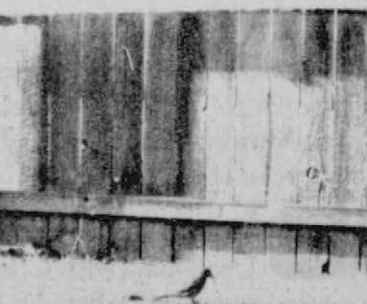

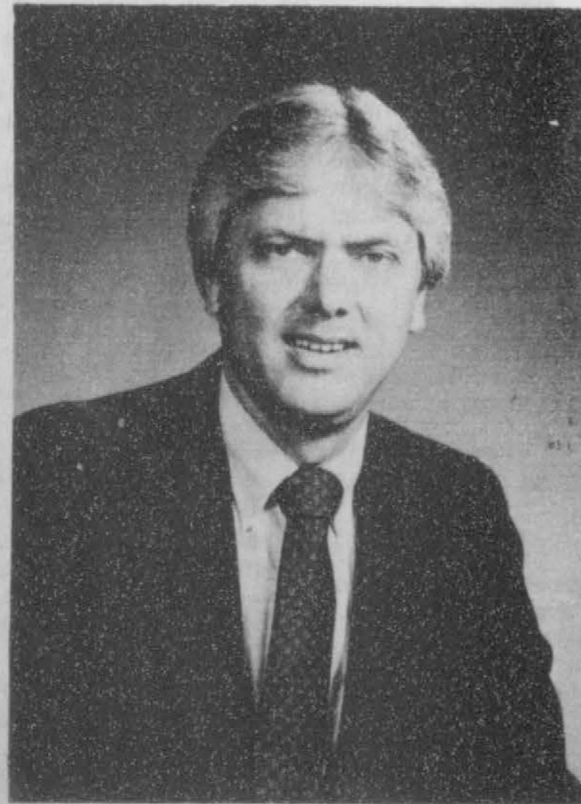
Live history will be portrayed throughout the day's activities. Among the groups participating will be the famed Kwahadi Indian Dancers from Amarillo.

Safened Grain Sorghum Seed Expands Weed Control Choices

Thanks to continuing advances in weed control options, more growers are finding grain sorghum an increasingly attractive cropping alternative due to its improved yield potential, lower input costs and ability to produce even in dry years.

According to Jim Turner, sales manager of Spearman Equity in Spearman, the recent introduction of seed protectant formulations for grain sorghum has dramatically expanded a grower's choice of herbicides for weed control, and thus his opportunity to increase profits.

"One of the most popular safeners on the market is Screen WDG, which is applied by seed companies to protect their grain sorghum seed from the effects of alachlor-based herbicides like Lasso," says Turner. "The availability of safened seed allows growers to achieve effective, broad-spectrum and season-long control of labeled grasses and broadleaf weeds. 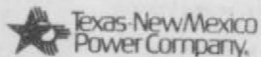

Special productivity valuation available to farmers and ranchers

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Mrs. Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of Hansford County Appraisal District, landowners can apply for special lower valuation of their land based on what it will produce rather than what it would sell for in the open market.

Landowners should apply by April 30 this year for any property to receive agricultural-use valuation, or for open-space land valuation of any property that did not receive that type of appraisal in 1985. Applications for open-space valuation made after May 1 are subject to penalty for late filing.

Mrs. Peddy said that the legal basis for special land appraisal is in the Texas Constitution in Art. 8, Secs. 1-d and 1-d-1. "The two types of land and valuation are commonly called ag-use, or 1-d, and open-space, or 1-d-1," she added.

"The requirements for application and for qualification of both the land and the owner are different for the two types of appraisal," Mrs. Peddy said.

For 1-d ag-use valuation, the owner must apply to the chief appraiser each year. The land must be owned by a "natural person," not a corporation, partnership, agency or organization; the land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use for at least three years before the year application is first made; and the agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source of income.

Also, the chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application. The owner has to file

a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use.

The other type of land valuation, 1-d-1 open-space, is the more commonly applied for by property owners. The land may be owned by an individual, corporation or partnership, and agricultural business need not be the principal business of the owner. Agricultural and timber lands and ecological laboratories are eligible for 1-d-1 appraisal.

However, the land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area; it must have been devoted principally to a qualifying use for at least five of the preceding seven years; and, again, the chief appraiser must approve the application.

Once the chief appraiser approves an application for 1-d-1 valuation, the landowner need not apply again as long as the land qualifies, unless the chief appraiser requests another application to confirm current qualifications.

Mrs. Peddy also pointed out that the law creating both types of special appraisal creates the possibility of a "rollback" tax. As a penalty for taking land out of agricultural production, a property owner may have to pay back the tax benefits received because of the lower valuation. Under 1-d valuation, this liability for additional tax is triggered by either sale of the land or change in the use of the land. The rollback extends back for the three tax years before the year in which the change or sale occurs.

Under 1-d-1, a rollback is triggered only by changing to a use that would not qualify for productivity valuation. The additional taxes are levied for the five

years preceding the year of the change.

The rollback tax is measured, Mrs. Peddy said, by the difference between taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes that would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value.

The chief appraiser said the rollback tax "is an additional tax beginning with the day the land's use changes. Whoever owns the property on that date pays the additional taxes—previous owners from the three or five year periods do not have to pay more taxes."

Mrs. Peddy noted that owners of agricultural lands located in more than one appraisal district must apply for productivity valuation with each district. Failure to do so could result in one or more taxing units taxing the land on its full market value.

More information and application forms are available from the local appraisal office. Personnel there will be able to assist landowners with the information necessary to determine if their property qualifies for the special valuation. The office is located at 709 West 7th, Spearman, Texas or you may call 659.5575 in Spearman or the Gruver line 733-5139. The office is open from 8:30 a.m.-5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

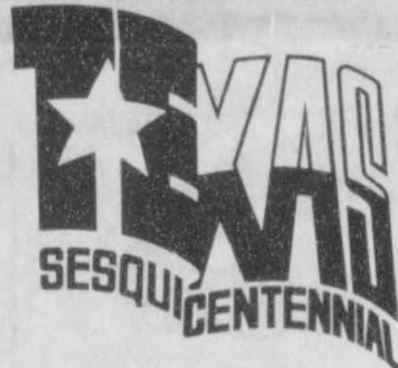

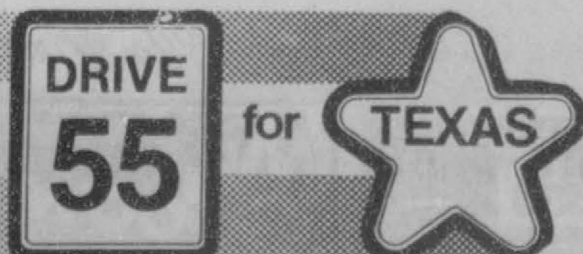

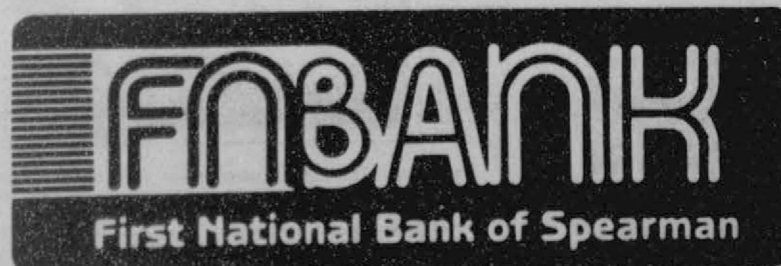

Savings Bonds Sales in Texas Up 40 Percent

Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds during January 1986 in Texas amounted to \$28,095,341, an increase of \$5,183,035 for 39.9 percent over the January a year ago, T. J. Morrow, District Director for U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Dallas, Texas, announced today. These sales represent 7.6 percent of the state's 1986 assigned dollar goal of \$370,000,000.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$4490.00 during January 1986 in Hansford County, C.A. Gibner, Volunteer County Chairman said. These sales represent 4 percent of the County's 1986 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, January 1986 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$575 million, an increase of 39 percent over 1985 sales, highest January total since 1979. Savings Bonds held by the public topped \$80 billion in January, increasing \$451 million in the month to \$80.25 billion.

Much of the growth in sales is due to Savings Bonds' new market-based rate which was effective November 1, 1982. This rate is adjusted on May 1 and November 1 each year. Bonds held at least five years earn 85 percent of the average rate on 5-year Treasury securities or 7.5 percent, whichever is higher. The current rate for the six month period ending April 30, 1986 is 8.36 percent. The average rate for the period Nov. 1, 1982 through April 30, 1986 is 9.69 percent. 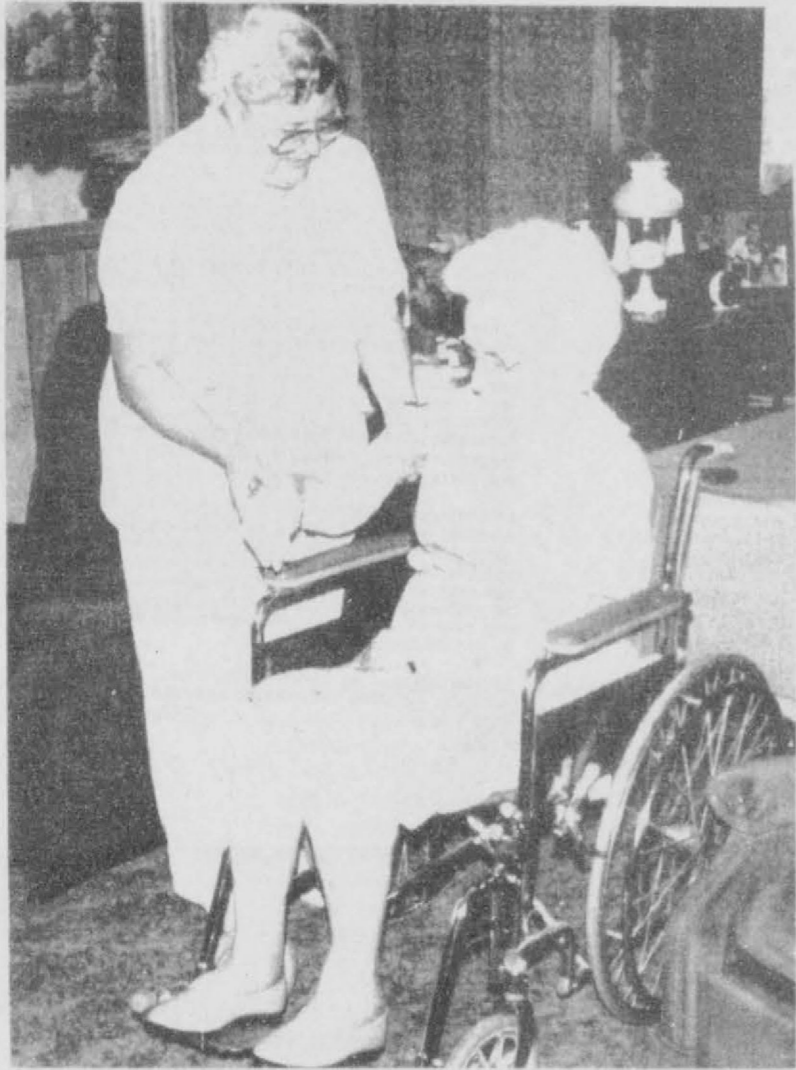



Stinnett High School Rodeo Is April 25

The 34th Annual Stinnett High School Rodeo is scheduled April 25, 26 and 27.

The annual week-end celebration activities include rodeo performances on Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday afternoon.

The schedule of events has been finalized with rodeo activities kicking off at 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 25. The rodeo performance will include both Junior Rodeo and high school events and a calf scramble.

AT 7:30 P.M. MAYOR BLODGETT DECLARED A QUORUM PRESENT AND CALLED THE MEETING TO ORDER. THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO OUR FLAG WAS LEAD BY MAYOR BLODGETT AND FOLLOWED BY THE INVOCATION GIVEN ALSO BY MAYOR BLODGETT.

CONSIDERATION OF THE MINUTES OF THE REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON MARCH 25, 1986.

MOTION WAS MADE BY CUDD TO APPROVE THE MINUTES OF REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON MARCH 25, 1986, AS CORRECTED. SECOND BY BUCHANAN. MOTION UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED.

CONSIDERATION OF ORDER DECLARING THE RESULTS OF THE 1986 CITY OFFICIALS' ELECTION HELD APRIL 5, 1986, AND CANVASSING THE BALLOTS OF SAID ELECTION.

MAYOR BLODGETT READ THE RESULTS OF THE ELECTION. THE RESULTS WERE AS FOLLOWS: FOR MAYOR FOR A TWO YEAR TERM: C. RALPH BLODGETT - 297 VOTES. FOR TWO ALDERMEN FOR A TWO YEAR TERM: JIM NICHOLSON - 316 VOTES, ED GARNER - 295 VOTES.

ADMINISTRATION OF OATH OF OFFICE TO THE MAYOR AND TWO CITY ALDERMEN.

JIM MURRAY, CITY MANAGER, ADMINISTERED THE OATH OF OFFICE TO C. RALPH BLODGETT, JIM NICHOLSON, AND ED GARNER.

CONSIDERATION OF REFINANCING THE LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT FOR THE T-HANGERS LOCATED AT THE MUNICIPAL AIRPORT TO PROVIDE FOR A LOWER RATE OF INTEREST.

PROPOSALS WERE OPENED BY THE CITY MANAGER AND READ ALOUD ON THE REFINANCING OF THE LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT FOR THE T-HANGERS LOCATED AT THE MUNICIPAL AIRPORT. THE FIRST STATE BANK OF SPEARMAN PROPOSAL INCLUDED A NEW LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT WITH A FORTY-TWO MONTH, SEMI-ANNUAL REDUCTION PERIOD AT A RATE OF 10% PER ANNUM. A SECOND PROPOSAL RECEIVED FROM THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF SPEARMAN PROPOSED TO REFINANCE THE EXISTING LEASE BETWEEN THE CITY AND THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF PERRYTON BY ACCEPTING THE ASSIGNMENT. THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF SPEARMAN WOULD PAY ALL LEGAL AND FILING COSTS OF ASSIGNING THE LEASE AND OWNERSHIP PROVIDED THAT THE BANK CAN USE LEGAL COUNSEL OF ITS CHOICE. THE BANK WILL FINANCE THE REMAINDER OF THE LEASE PRINCIPAL AT A RATE OF 8 1/2% PER ANNUM AND ADJUST THE SCHEDULED PAYMENTS TO REFLECT THE REDUCTION IN RATE. THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF SPEARMAN PROPOSAL IS TENDERED WITH THE RIGHT TO WITHDRAW THE BID IF IT IS DETERMINED AT A LATER DATE, PRIOR TO ASSIGNMENT, THAT THE CITY OF SPEARMAN DOES NOT HAVE THE CONTRACTUAL RIGHT TO PAY THE LEASE OFF EARLY AND/OR FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF PERRYTON WILL NOT ASSIGN ITS RIGHTS TO FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF SPEARMAN. IN SUCH INSTANCE THIS PROPOSAL WILL BE VOIDED AND THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF SPEARMAN WILL NOT BE REQUIRED TO ABIDE BY THE TERMS OF THIS PROPOSAL. BILL FITTMAN, CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF SPEARMAN WAS PRESENT AND ANSWERED QUESTIONS RAISED BY THE CITY COUNCIL. THE MAYOR DID NOT LEAD ANY DISCUSSIONS CONCERNING

THESE TWO PROPOSALS.

SECOND BY BUCHANAN. MOTION CARRIED, CUDD OBS-TAINING.

Soil Conservation Service

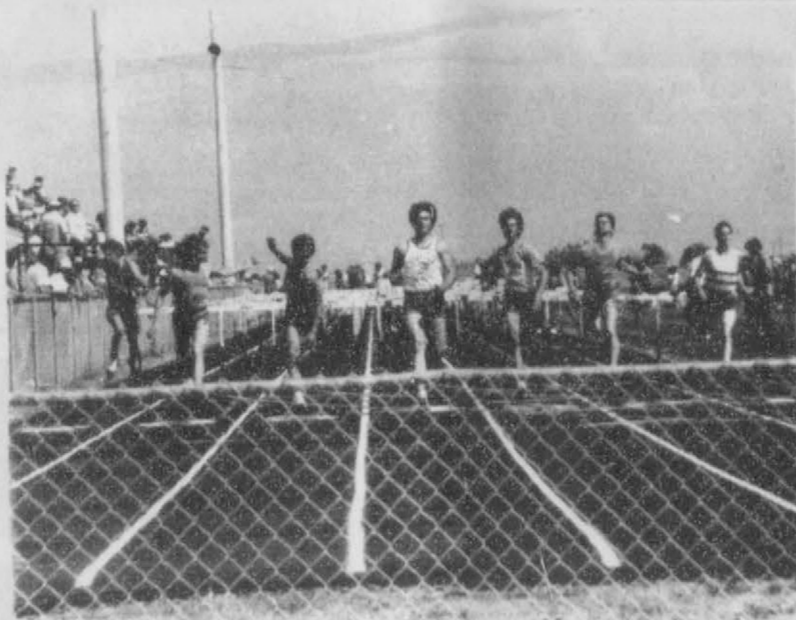
Bids on only 31,298 acres of land in Texas were accepted by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in the USDA's Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) for 1986. Bids were accepted from 155 farmer. The state was divided into seven bidding pools. The highest bid accepted for pool 1, which included Hansford County, was \$35.00 per acre. Locally, 4 land-owners had 648 acres accepted into the program with bids ranging from \$14.50 to \$29.00 per acre annual payment. Nationally, bids were made by 44,480 farmers on 4.8 million acres. Some 10,307 bids were accepted on 838,356 acres. Accepted bids ranged from \$5 to \$90. Cropland that is in Land Capability Class VI, VII, and VIII or land that appeared to be eroding at greater than 3.5 times the tolerance level at sign-up time is

eligible for participation in CRP. Soil Conservation Service personnel are now in the process of preparing conservation plans on land accepted in CRP. This cropland will be planted to native or introduced grasses. For land accepted into CRP, farmers will receive their per acre bid annually shortly after October 1 for ten years. They will also receive 50 percent cost-share assistance for establishing the permanent vegetative cover. The sign-up period for the 1987 reserve is scheduled to begin May 5th.

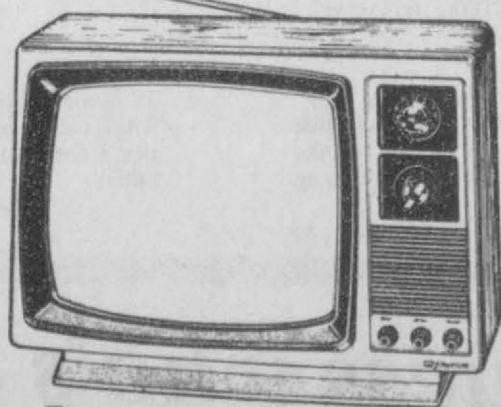
